KATE HARTLEY AT THE MAYOR'S OFFICE OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY 1 DEVELOPMENT IN SAN FRANCISCO LAUNCHED IN EARLY 2016 THE DAHLIA 2 3 HOUSING PORTAL AND IN SAN FRANCISCO WHAT THAT DID IS IT PUT ALL AFFORDABLE HOUSING LISTINGS IN ONE PLACE SO IT MADE IT 4 5 MUCH EASIER TO FIND AND APPLY FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AND NOTING WITH THE APPLICATION IF YOU DID IT ON YOUR PHONE WHICH 6 THE SYSTEM IS DESIGNED DO DO IT WORKS ON ALL PLATFORMS IT CAN 7 8 TAKE TEN MINUTES WE FOUND IT MUCH EASIER FOR USERS TO GET THIS NEED MET. YOU SEE ON SCREEN AN EXAMPLE FROM ALAMEDA COUNTY 9 BECAUSE SAN FRANCISCO DESIGNED THIS WITH OPEN SOURCE CODE OPEN 10 TO BE USED BY ANY JURISDICTION THAT NEEDS TO USE IT TO DATE 11 THE CODE HIS ALSO BEEN USED BY THE CITY OF DETROIT 12 INTERESTINGLY ENOUGH IN DEVELOPMENT BY CITY OF CHICAGO, USED 13 NOW COUNTY OF SAN JOSE SAN MATEO COUNTY AND THE PROPOSITION IS 14 USING THIS ALL IN ONE PLACE, TASK IS TO BUILD A REGIONAL 15 16 HOUSING PORTFOLIO WHERE YOU CAN FIND OPPORTUNITIES ALL IN ONE PLACE THIS IS IN PROCESS. JUST A NOTE ABOUT IMPACT TO DATE, 17 SAN FRANCISCO DAHLIA, THESE ARE THE NUMBERS, THE MOST ROBUST 18 NUMBERS FROM SAN FRANCISCO. BUT THERE HAVE BEEN OVER A MILLION 19 ONLINE APPLICATIONS TO DATE. 97% HAVE APPLIED ONLINE. THAT'S 20 PROBABLY MY FAVORITE STATISTIC ON THIS ON SCREEN. THAT'S IS 21 SOMEWHAT RADICAL VOLUME. PAPER APPLICATIONS ARE STILL 22 AVAILABLE FOR THOSE THAT CHOOSE TO DO THAT, AND WE WILL ALWAYS 23 KEEP THOSE AVAILABLE. THAT TELLS US, WITH THE 97% FIGURE, IS 24 THAT, ONE THAT THE TECHNOLOGY WORKS, AND TWO, PEOPLE KNOW HOW 25

TO USE IT. THAT'S BECAUSE OF A RIGOROUS USER-FOCUSED TESTING 1 PROCESS TO MAKE SURE THAT FOLKS THAT WE'RE TRYING TO HELP AND 2 3 THE ONES THAT KNOW HOW TO USE THIS. IT'S NOT RANDOM TESTING WITH ANYBODY. IT'S FOLKS THAT WE'RE HOPING TO HELP GET HOUSED. 4 5 COUPLE OF OTHER NOTES HERE 2.3 MILLION UNIQUE USERS TO DATE AND OVER 7 MILLION VISITS TO DATE ON THE SAN FRANCISCO HOUSING 6 PORTAL ALONE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, DOORWAY IS TWO WEB SITES. 7 8 IT'S THE USER/APPLICANT PORTAL, THE PLACE YOU GO TO FIND --AGAIN, FIND AND APPLY FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING. BUT ALSO A SITE 9 10 FOR PARTNERS. A QUICK GLANCE ON THIS SCREEN FOR PARTNERS THEY CAN SEE APPLICATIONS RECEIVED, THEY CAN TYPE IN ANY PAPER 11 APPLICATIONS THAT HAVE BEEN FORWARDED TO THEM AFTER LOGGING 12 FOR TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY AND THEY CAN USE THE 13 SYSTEM ALL THE WAY UP TO LEASING UP. FOR INSTANCE, A LOTTERY 14 15 HAPPENS THEY SEE THE ORDER OF DECISION ON THE APPLICATIONS, 16 THEY CALL FOLKS IN THAT ORDER, AND LOG DECISIONS MADE ON APPLICATIONS, APPROVED, DECLINED, ET CETERA. INCREDIBLE DATA 17 18 IN TERMS OF UNDERSTANDING PRACTICES OF OUR ESTEEMED PROFESSIONAL PARTNERS, DEVELOPERS, AND LEASING AGENTS, AND 19 UNDERSTANDING THE NEED WE FACE IN TERMS OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING. 20 21 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AS THE NAME POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL STATES WE REVIEW AND COMMENT ON POLICY DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION. IN THOSE COMMUNITIES OR OUR EOUITY AND ACCESS SUBCOMMITTEE, 1 INCLUDING US EARLIER RATHER THAN PRESENTING A BAKED PRODUCT 2 3 WOULD HAVE RESULTED IN A SLIGHTLY MORE DIFFERENT PRODUCT. AT OUR RECENT MEETING, AFTER A 30 MINUTE DISCUSSION IT WAS CLEAR, 4 5 WE, WHO ARE TRAINED IN INDUSTRY JARGON AND SUPPORTIVE DID NOT UNDERSTAND WHERE THERE WERE MULTIPLE INTERCONNECTING FACES TO 6 7 CLIPPER. WHILE THE TWO DOZEN PEOPLE IN OUR REGION ARE ABLE TO 8 CALL STAFF THAT'S NOT VIABLE WHEN THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE HAVE OUESTIONS. STAFF HAS REACHED OUT SO WE CAN FIX THIS MESSAGE. 9 THESE LESSONS ARE A REMINDER THAT WE ARE A PROXY FOR PUBLIC 10 OUTREACH AND CAN HELP A PROCESS BE MORE CLEAR FOR THE END USER 11 AS MTC TAKES ON MORE OF THESE CUSTOMER FACES PROJECTS. I CAN 12 THINK OF TWO AREAS WHERE EARLY INPUT WILL BE TO EVERYONE'S 13 BENEFIT IN SEVERAL MONTHS WE'LL BE MEETING WITH THE BAY TRAIL 14 GROUP AND HOPE TO HAVE DISCUSSIONS THAT EDUCATE OUR BODY ABOUT 15 16 THE TRAIL AND ITS CURRENT CAPACITY BUT WE ALSO WANT TO MOVE FORWARD TO ENSURE THAT WE ARE DEVELOPING STANDARDS ACROSS THE 17 BOARD THAT WILL CREATE A FULLY ACCESSIBLE TRAIL AND A WEB SITE 18 THAT ALLOWS PEOPLE TO PLAN AROUND PERIODIC CLOSURES OR 19 HAZARDS. YEARS, AND I KNOW FROM EXPERIENCE THAT THE SIX YEARS IT TOOK 1 FOR MY MOTHER TO REACH THE TOP OF THE LIST IS TOO LONG. OUR 2 3 HOMELESS POPULATION WITH RISING NUMBERS OF SENIORS AND DISABLED, ALONG WITH AGING BOOMERS NEED ADAPTABLE HOUSING AND 4 5 WE'RE GLAD TO IDENTIFY THOSE NEEDS. CONVENING SENIORS AND DISABLED CARE TAKERS WILL ALLOW US TO DEVELOP SUPPORTIVE 6 HOUSING THAT DOES NOT NEED RETROFITTING AND STILL ACCOMMODATES 7 8 ABLE BODY RESIDENTS. WE LOOK FORWARD TO PARTICIPATING IN THAT PROCESS. FOR ALL OF THESE PUBLIC FACING THINGS WE HAVE HAD A 9 PATH, AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO WORK WITH STAFF TO IDENTIFY 10 ISSUES. MY BIG CONCERN, HOWEVER, IS WHAT FEELS LIKE A 11 DIMINISHMENT OF THE PROMISE OF THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN 12 BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE WAS NOT FIRST TIME WE HEARD FROM THE 13 PUBLIC REGARDING SYSTEMIC CHANGE NEEDED IN TRANSIT COVID WAS A 14 15 CATALYST FOR CREATING TRANSFORMATIONAL PLANS. IN ORDER TO DO 16 THAT, WE INCLUDED EVERYBODY, INCLUDING THE PUBLIC AT THE TABLE. YOU HAVE A LETTER IN YOUR PACKET FROM ADINA LEVIN, WHO 17 IS THE COUNCIL'S CHAIR FOR THE TAP'S GROUP AND WHO SITS ON THE 18 BUSINESS CASE STUDY COMMITTEE THAT OUTLINES THIS CLEARER THAN 19 I CAN. BUT WE HAVE CONCERNS THAT WE'RE RECEIVING FROM THE 20 GENERAL PUBLIC. I WANT TO BE CLEAR THAT THERE IS NO INTENT TO 21 STALL PROJECTS IN THE PIPELINE, AND MY CONCERN IS IF THERE IS 22 NO PLACE IN THE TIMELINE FOR PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT, OTHER THAN TWO 23 MINUTES AT A MEETING, WE WERE REPEATEDLY TOLD STAKEHOLDERS 24 WERE CONSULTED ON ITEMS, BUT WHEN WE ASKED WHO THE 25

STAKEHOLDERS WERE, THEY WERE DESCRIBED AS INTERNAL STAFF AND 1 STAFF FROM TRANSIT AGENCIES. WE NEED TO ENSURE THAT THE PUBLIC 2 3 STILL FEELS THAT THEY HAVE A SEAT. THIS ISN'T ABOUT DELAYING PROJECTS, IT'S ABOUT MAINTAINING THE PUBLIC SEAT AND ENSURING 4 5 THAT THE WORD STAKEHOLDER INCLUDES MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. AND I WANT TO END THIS WITH A THANK YOU TO AWFUL YOU WHO APPOINTED 6 PEOPLE THAT SURROUND THIS, THEY'RE AN INCREDIBLE GROUP AND ARE 7 8 EAGER TO ENGAGE IN A VARIETY OF DIFFERENT ISSUES WHEN I ASKED VOLUNTEERS TO SIT AND REPRESENT AND WHO ARE FAMILIAR WITH 9 STAFF THERE IS AN ABUNDANCE OF HANDS RAISED I CAN ASSURE YOU 10 THIS HAS NEVER HAPPENED IN THE PAST AND THAT ENDS MY REPORT. 11 12
