Contract Amendment – Ventek Transit Inc. (\$900,000)

Subject:

Request for approval of a Contract Amendment for integration of next generation Clipper[®] software into the current Clipper Ticket Vending Machines (TVMs): VenTek Transit Inc. (VenTek) (\$900,000).

Background:

In 2019, MTC executed a sole source contract with VenTek (manufacturers of ticket vending machines used by Caltrain, Golden Gate Transit and Ferry, Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit and Valley Transportation Authority) to perform integration work between the Clipper system and the VenTek TVMs. The contract was divided into three separate tasks; the first two tasks have been completed. This contract amendment would add funds to the contract to complete the third task: integrating the TVMs with the next-generation Clipper library so the TVMs can communicate with the Clipper system in real-time to support the new account-based Clipper program. VenTek is not a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise or a Small Business Enterprise and has no subcontractors. This item was approved by the Clipper Executive Board on January 23, 2023.

Issues:

None identified.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the Operations Committee authorize the Executive Director or designee to approve a Contract Amendment with VenTek in an amount not to exceed \$900,000 for development, testing and integration work needed to update the current Clipper TVMs to function in the next-generation Clipper system.

Clipper® Contract Change Order Amendment – Statement on Standards for Attestation Engagement No. 18 (SSAE 18) Annual Audit of Clipper Program: Cubic Transportation Systems, Inc. (Cubic) (\$200,000)

Subject:

Request for approval of Clipper Contract Change Order No. 159, Amendment No. 10 – Clipper Program SSAE 18 Audit for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23: Cubic Transportation Systems, Inc. (\$200,000).

Background:

In May 2012, the MTC Operations Committee approved a contract change order (CO 159) to the Clipper contract for Cubic to engage a firm to assess Cubic's financial and system controls associated with fare processing, financial reconciliation, cardholder support services, card fulfillment, information system operations and card account management functions. These tasks are completed via a standard approach called an SSAE 18 Audit. This change order amendment (Amendment 10 to CO 159) would allow Cubic to engage a firm to perform an SSAE 18 Audit for FY 2022-23.

Industry best practices recommend conducting annual audits to maintain a vendor's focus on controls. Transit agencies rely upon the SSAE report as part of their own annual audits, as an SSAE report can reduce the procedures required in agencies' own audit processes.

The first SSAE Audit under CO 159 was completed in November 2013 for FY 2012-13. CO 159 was subsequently annually amended to provide for SSAE Audits of each subsequent fiscal year. Most recently, this Committee approved the FY 2021-22 SSAE 18 Audit (Amendment 9) in April 2022.

Cubic is not, nor is the subcontractor that would assist in this work, a Small Business Enterprise or a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise.

The Clipper Executive Board approved the proposed change order amendment at its January 23, 2023 meeting.

Staff recommends the Operations Committee authorize the Executive Director or designee to negotiate and enter into a change order amendment with Cubic in an amount not to exceed \$200,000, for the SSAE 18 audit for FY 2022-23, as described above.

Contracts—Freeway Service Patrol Towing Services: Beat 5- Bay Area Tow, Inc. (\$4,667,767), and Beat 27- Atlas Towing Services Inc. (\$4,374,920)

Subject:

Request for approval of five-year contracts with Bay Area Tow Inc. and Atlas Towing Services Inc. for their respective not to exceed amounts, totaling \$9,042,687, as specified above.

Background:

The Bay Area Freeway Service Patrol (FSP) program is in its 30th year of service. FSP continues to be a vital program in providing congestion relief and motorist assistance by quickly clearing incidents during commute hours on the Bay Area's busiest freeways. MTC Service Authority for Freeways and Expressways (SAFE) contracts with private tow operators to patrol 27 different segments of highways that are referred to as "beats." At its October 14, 2022 meeting, this Committee awarded nine five-year contracts starting in Fiscal Year 2023-24 to cover 13 beats; this included the award of the Beats 5 and 27 Freeway Service Patrol contracts to American Automobile Association Northern California, Nevada & Utah (AAA NCNU) dba AAA Roadside Services. Upon notification of the award, AAA NCNU indicated to MTC SAFE that they declined to accept the contracts for Beats 5 and 27.

On December 15, 2022, MTC SAFE issued an Invitation for Bids (IFB) for Beats 5 and 27 and received seven price proposals on December 23, 2022. Proposers with the lowest contract hourly rate are recommended for this committee for contract award, subject to the award limitations designed to ensure that bidders are not extended beyond their operational capacity. Bay Area Tow Inc. is recommended for Beat 5. Atlas Towing Services, Inc. is recommended for Beat 27. Beat 5 is located in Contra Costa County on I-680 between Marina Vista Road and Alcosta Boulevard and on State Route 24 from Acalanes Road to I-680. Beat 27 is located in Alameda County from Keller Avenue to Foothill Boulevard on I-580.

MTC SAFE incorporated a Small Business Enterprise (SBE) preference with a ten percent bid preference awarded to SBE certified vendors. Three proposers requested and received the SBE preference in this IFB. One SBE certified proposer, Atlas Towing Services, Inc., submitted a

price proposal that resulted in an SBE preference being a determining factor for Beat 27 in this recommendation. Bay Area Tow Inc. submitted a price proposal that resulted in an SBE preference that was not a determining factor for Beat 5 in this recommendation.

The FSP Program is authorized by California Street & Highways Code Sections 2560-2565, and MTC SAFE receives dedicated funds from vehicle registration fees and SB 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, for this purpose. There are sufficient funds in existing FSP state grants, MTC SAFE reserves, and future FSP grants to undertake these contracts through Fiscal Year 2027-28.

Recommendations:

Staff recommends that the Committee authorize the Executive Director or designee to negotiate and enter into a five-year contract with Bay Area Tow Inc. for FSP towing services on Beat 5 for an amount not to exceed \$4,667,767 and enter into a five-year contract with Atlas Towing Services Inc. for FSP towing services on Beat 27 for an amount not to exceed \$4,374,920, their respective not to exceed amounts together totaling \$9,042,687, subject to annual approval of MTC SAFE budgets.

Contract - Bay Wheels Bikeshare E-bike Expansion: Lyft, Inc. (\$15,940,000)

Subject:

Approval of a contract with Lyft, Inc. (Lyft) for expansion of the Bay Wheels bike share system in the form of electric bikes and other improvements in a not to exceed amount of \$15,940,000.

Background:

Accelerating transportation electrification is a key Plan Bay Area 2050 strategy to help achieve the greenhouse gas reduction target for passenger vehicles. MTC administers transportation funding through the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) program, including \$65 million for transportation electrification initiatives. As part of the transportation electrification initiative, up to \$20 million has been identified for electric bikeshare.

Staff seek authorization for the Executive Director to negotiate and enter into a sole source contract with Lyft, subject to funding being allocated, to expand shared electric bikes (e-bikes) in the Bay Wheels bikeshare system. The capital investment will include additional e-bikes, spare parts, docking stations, and infill docks in all five Bay Wheels cities and a station electrification pilot in San Francisco, with potential opportunities to expand the pilot to other member cities. This contract would also include a subsidized low-cost membership program for college students, and a new price accumulator for monthly memberships. Lastly, the investment allows for a \$19 decrease in the cost of annual membership, and a \$0.05 decrease in the e-bike per minute fees for members.

While this contract would cover the majority of the \$20 million of funding, the remaining amount, subject to approval, will include funding for an adaptive bikeshare program, partial funding for expansion of e-bike share to adjacent cities, funding for staff needs for participating cities, and grid connection for station electrification. The proposed allocation of the expected programming and investment is summarized in Attachment B and the remaining amount will be brought to the Commission at a later date.

Staff presented to the Operations Committee on November 4, 2022, and to the Policy Advisory Council on January 11, 2023, with an update on bikeshare in the region, focusing on Bay

Wheels. In addition, a report was provided to the MTC Planning Committee in December that included proposed transportation electrification investment details. The MTC Executive Director authorized MTC to enter into a sole source agreement with Lyft for the remainder of the Program Agreement. Concurrently, staff have been working internally and with the five member cities on a proposal and term sheet that aligns regional and jurisdictional goals that can be implemented quickly. The proposed key terms are attached hereto as Attachment A.

Executive Summary:

MTC staff believes that bikeshare will play a valuable part in achieving the Plan Bay Area 2050 statutory target to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, as well as the goal of reducing vehicle miles traveled. Given that implementation of all thirty-five strategies outlined in the Plan is expected to nearly double biking and walking commute trips, increasing from 5% to 9% by 2050¹, a sustainable bikeshare system will be a key implementation component to encourage Bay Area residents to take more trips by biking than by single occupancy vehicles.

As the end of the Bay Wheels contract approaches, in July 2027, MTC and the participating cities need to be proactive in preparing for the future regional bikeshare system. While many aspects of the system are working well, there is also room for improvement, and the system is not equal across all five member cities. To fortify the system, MTC is looking to make an investment by bringing new e-bikes across the entire system. The investment focuses on e-bikes, with additional capital funding to add stations, and pilot station electrification. It includes additional equity program funding, including a subsidized low-cost membership program for college students. The investment focuses on investing in new e-bikes to build regional cohesion and have a substantial e-bike fleet in all member cities. It will add and replace e-bikes in San Francisco and San Jose, and bring e-bikes to Berkeley, Emeryville, and Oakland.

This investment will improve the system's financial sustainability by reducing operational costs through station electrification and longer lasting batteries in the new e-bikes and building ridership by lowering membership costs and e-bike fees. Assessing the financial sustainability of the system post investment will help to understand what investment might be needed for a future

system, and how successful the system can be. The new e-bikes have better theft deterrents, a significant issue for bikeshare and scooter operators in the Bay Area, and lower operational costs. In addition, e-bikes have had higher utilization than pedal bikes, so adding e-bikes in Berkley, Emeryville, and Oakland is expected to increase ridership. Finally, reducing annual membership cost and member per minute e-bike are expected to increase membership and ridership by offering a more affordable option. Although this funding approval is subject to the key terms in Attachment A, it does not approve specific details of program implementation or circumscribe the range of possibilities for the expansion.

Next Steps:

MTC and Lyft will negotiate a contract that includes the terms provided in Attachment A. Contract execution would be subject to MTC programming actions necessary to fund the contract up to the 'not to exceed' amount. Staff will continue to work with cities on how to document their coordination.

Issues:

None identified.

Recommendations:

Staff recommends the Committee authorize the Executive Director or designee to negotiate and enter into a contract with Lyft for the expansion of the Bay Wheels bike share system in the form of electric bikes and other improvements in an amount not to exceed \$15,940,000, subject to necessary allocation actions.





I write in support of the staff recommendation for Bay Wheels Bikeshare E-bike Expansion with Lyft, Inc. For the past nine years, the City of San José has proudly been a service area for Bike Share, which has been widely used by those who live, work and play in San José. This shared mobility system has provided users in San José a greener transportation alternative to traverse throughout the Capital of Silicon Valley. Furthermore, San José has one of the highest proportion of riders using Bay Wheels equity program Bike Share for All, which provides discounts based on income. Unfortunately, COVID-19 significantly impacted system usage with decreased ridership.

The one silver lining we have seen is that while E-bikes constitute approximately 10% of the total 1,000 bike fleet in San José, they are consistently chosen over pedal bikes (Classic Bikes). Therefore, we are excited by the potential introduction of 650 new E-bikes into the San José market, and expansion of service and equity programming. This regionwide approach and \$16 million investment are critical to restoring the vision for bike share and further our mode shift goals in San José.

While we fully support the proposed framework shaped by MTC staff, I request that the committee ensures that cities are kept involved in the forthcoming negotiation process to ensure that major service areas like San José have a voice in shaping a more equitable and sustainable regional bike share system.

My name is Sandhya Laddha, Policy Director at Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition, a non-profit that aims at building healthier and more just communities by making bicycling safe and accessible for everyone in San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties.

We want to applaud MTC's efforts on putting a major investment toward bike share in the Bay Area - this is the very first much needed public subsidy for bikeshare which will help bring some financial stability to the system; and we hope this is one of the many to come! We are thankful to MTC to start laying the groundwork for next steps as the contract with Baywheels ends in 2027.

This investment will bring 650 new bikes and 21 new stations in San Jose alone against 100 e-bikes that the City currently has. It will also bring e-bikes to the East Bay which currently do not have any! At the same time the program proposes a price drop in fees, a new accumulator feature and a college student discount program - all these initiatives would not only benefit those already using bikeshare but also encourage others to use this as a viable option to commute to places - helping reduce the number of cars on our roads - ultimately reducing traffic and congestion. We are also excited about the potential of expanding the current Baywheels program to adjacent cities which would add great value to the bikeshare system given all the Bay area cities are so close to one another.

This is an important first step and down payment toward a publicly funded, seamlessly integrated, equitable, accessible regional micro mobility program.
