2	SPEAKER: GOOD MORNING, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE. MY
3	NAME IS DEBBIE TOTH, PRESIDENT AND CEO OF CHOICE IN AGING I AM
4	COMMENTING ON THE ITEM 2C, LEGISLATIVE HISTORY. I WAS
5	CONCERNED TO SEE THE AGENDA PACKET AND NOT SEE THAT THE LETTER
6	OF SUPPORT FROM THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WAS INCLUDED ON A.B.
7	540. THIS IS LEGISLATION FOR ACCESSIBLE TRANSPORTATION TO
8	MODERNIZE FORMER LEGISLATION AND LIFT UP THE COORDINATED
9	TRANSPORTATION SERVICES AGENCIES WITH A DEDICATED FUNDING
10	STREAM TO ENSURE WE HAVE ACCESSIBLE TRANSPORTATION FOR ELDERS
11	AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES. I WANT TO POINT OUT THAT
12	LEGISLATION CLEARLY ARTICULATES THE HISTORY OF STAGNATION IN
13	INVESTMENT IN THIS PARTICULAR FORM OF TRANSPORTATION. SO WE
14	OBVIOUSLY HAVE PUT A LOT OF MONEY INTO BUILDING TUNNELS,
15	ROADS, STREETS, PATHS, WIDENING ROADWAYS MAKING STREETS
16	WALKABLE AND I COULD GO ON AND WE HAVE DONE NOTHING OVER THAT
17	SAME 20 YEAR PERIOD FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES AND OUR AGING
18	POPULATION THEY ARE GROWING AT A RAPID RATE AND IT'S A SOCIAL
19	JUSTICE ISSUE AND EQUITY ISSUE AND WE NEED TO ENSURE WE GET
20	THIS SUPPORT AND I HOPE THAT MTC AND ALL OF OUR PROVIDERS
21	RECOGNIZE THIS AND I WANT TO INCLUDE PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES
22	AND AGING POPULATION IN ENSURING THEY GET WHERE THEY NEED TO
23	GO, GOING FAR BEYOND WHAT PARATRANSIT WAS DESIGNED TO DO.
24	CONTINUUM OF AGING AND DISABILITY IS FAR GREATER THAN THE

SERVICE OF PARATRANSIT CAN MEET WE NEED TO DO THINGS TO

- 2 ITEM THREE, STATE LEGISLATION 3A. UPDATE ON THE MTC ABAG STATE
- 3 LEGISLATIVE VISITS. AND I WOULD LIKE TO TURN THE FLOOR OVER TO
- 4 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN. THIS IS AN INFORMATION ITEM.

- 6 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: GOOD MORNING CHAIR ARREGUIN AND
- 7 COMMITTEE MEMBERS. I DID WANT TO PROVIDE AN INFORMATIONAL
- 8 UPDATE ON THE LEGISLATIVE VISIT THAT YOUR MTC AND ABAG
- 9 REPRESENTATIVES PROVIDED UP IN SACRAMENTO LAST -- OH GOSH,
- 10 FEBRUARY 28TH, TO MARCH 1ST. SO, JUST A COUPLE OF WEEKS AGO.
- 11 THAT WAS THE FIRST OF TWO PLANNED 2023 SACRAMENTO DAYS. YOUR
- 12 MTC AND ABAG DELEGATION THAT WENT UP THERE DID REPRESENT A
- 13 GOOD CROSS SECTION OF MTC AND ABAG LEADERSHIP, THAT YOU DO
- 14 HAVE QUITE A FEW FOLKS THAT WERE UP IN SACRAMENTO HERE TODAY.
- 15 SO I'M JUST GOING TO PROVIDE A BRIEF UPDATE THEN TURN IT BACK
- 16 OVER TO THE CHAIR TO SEE IF SOMEBODY ELSE WANTS TO ADD. SO, WE
- 17 WERE ABLE TO SECURE FACETIME WITH A GOOD CROSS SECTION OF THE
- 18 BAY AREA DELEGATION. WE WERE ABLE TO CONNECT WITH 18 OF THE 26
- 19 BAY AREA DELEGATION MEMBERS, IN THEIR OFFICES. IN GENERAL, THE
- 20 MEMBERS SEEMED VERY WELL INFORMED ABOUT MTC AND ABAG'S TOP
- 21 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITY THIS YEAR WHICH CITIZEN TRANSIT OPERATING
- 22 FISCAL CLIFF. I THINK IT'S PART OF WHAT HELPED THERE IS THAT
- 23 YOUR STAFF HAD BEEN ABLE TO BRIEF THEM SEVERAL TIMES ON THE
- 24 ISSUE. TRANSIT OPERATORS HAVE -- AND HEARING QUITE A BIT FROM
- 25 LOCAL ELECTED OFFICIALS AND OTHER PARTNERS IN GENERAL THERE



- 1 WAS A PRETTY REMARKABLE AMOUNT OF CONSENSUS FROM THE BAY AREA
- 2 DELEGATION MEMBERS ON REALLY THAT THE TRANSIT FISCAL CLIFF IS
- 3 A NEED THAT SACRAMENTO SHOULD CARE ABOUT AND SHOULD BE REALLY
- 4 LOOKING TO ADDRESS, AGAIN, THEY WERE VERY WELL INFORMED ON IT.
- 5 WHAT WE DID REALLY HEAR FROM THEM IS THAT THEY WOULD LIKE TO
- 6 REALLY BE PRESENTED WITH SOME POTENTIAL SOLUTIONS ON THIS SO I
- 7 THINK WE HAVE A CHARGE TO MOVE IN THAT DIRECTION IN THE NEXT
- 8 COMING WEEKS AND MONTHS. THE OTHER TIME SENSITIVE TOPIC THAT
- 9 WAS A PRIORITY FOR YOUR DELEGATION TO CONVEY TO MEMBERS WAS AN
- 10 UPDATE ON THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, THE
- 11 POTENTIAL REGIONAL PLANNED 2024 HOUSING MEASURE AND REALLY
- 12 REQUESTS THAT FOLKS SUPPORT THE BAHFA CLEAN-UP BILL THAT MTC
- 13 AND ABAG ARE COSPONSORING THIS YEAR. A.B. 1319 BY
- 14 ASSEMBLYMEMBER WICKS, AND IT WAS REALLY NICE THAT QUITE A FEW
- 15 MEMBERS IN THAT -- THOSE MEETINGS CONVEYED THAT THEY REALLY
- 16 STRONGLY SUPPORTED BAHFA, THEY WERE EAGER TO LEARN MORE ABOUT
- 17 THE PLANS ON THE REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE AND HAD EITHER
- 18 ALREADY COAUTHORED THE BAHFA CLEAN UP BILL OR CONCUR SAID TO
- 19 SIGN ON TO THE CLEAN UP BILL. I'LL TURN IT OVER TO THE CHAIR
- 20 TO SEE IF HE HAS ANYTHING ELSE TO ADD.
- 22 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. MY COLLEAGUES WERE ALSO PART
- 23 OF THE DELEGATION, AND WHO CAN ADD TO, I'LL JUST SAY THAT I
- 24 THOUGHT IT WAS GREAT THAT SO MANY MEMBERS WERE AWARE OF THE
- 25 TRANSIT FISCAL CLIFF FOR AGREEMENT WE NEED TO FIND A SOLUTION



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- 1 I THINK THERE IS AN OPENNESS TRYING TO SEE WHAT ROLES THEY CAN
- 2 PLAY, THERE WAS SOME DISCUSSION RELATIVE AROUND PLANNING
- 3 MOVING AHEAD WITH THE REGIONAL HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION
- 4 MEASURE IN 2024 AND I THINK WE CONVEYED TO MANY OF THE MEMBERS
- 5 WE'RE GOING TO CONDUCT SOME POLLING TO GET A SENSE OF WHAT
- 6 VOTERS PRIORITIES ARE IN THE BAY AREA. I'LL TURN IT OVER.

- 9 DOES MAKE A DIFFERENCE BUT STAFF DID A GREAT JOB. THEY WERE
- 10 ALREADY AWARE OF THE CHALLENGES AROUND THE FISCAL CLIFF. THANK
- 11 YOU FOR THAT. BUT MY TAKE AWAY IS THERE IS SO MUCH THAT WE'RE
- 12 DOING AS AN ORGANIZATION IN TERMS OF NETWORK MANAGEMENT THERE.
- 13 ARE SO MANY THINGS THAT THE LEGISLATOR WAS VERY INTERESTED IN
- 14 THAT I THINK WE COULD COME BACK AND FOLLOW UP ON. BECAUSE A
- 15 LOT OF THE CONVERSATIONS WERE AROUND THE FISCAL CLIFF, TRANSIT
- 16 DEPENDENT RIDERS AND THAT RESONATE WITH LEGISLATORS
- 17 UNDERSTANDING WHO IS RIDING OUR TRANSIT SYSTEM AND WHAT THE
- 18 FISCAL CLIFF MEANS TO FOLKS IN OUR REGION. SO, IT WAS REALLY
- 19 CRITICAL TO HAVE THAT CONVERSATION. THANK YOU TO ALL
- 20 COMMISSIONERS THAT PARTICIPATED.
- 22 **JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR:** COMMISSIONER DUTRA-VERNACI?
- 24 CAROL DUTRA-VERNACI: YES. THANK YOU. IT WAS GREAT. I REALLY

- 9 AND YEARS. SO, THAT, AGAIN, WAS A BIG TAKE AWAY.

- 25 VERNACI REGARDING PG&E. IN PETALUMA THERE IS A 100% AFFORDABLE



1	HOUSING PROJECT THAT HAS A FOUNDATION IT HAS BEEN SITTING IDLE
2	FOR FIVE MONTHS NOW BECAUSE PG&E NEED TO COME IN AND MOVE A
3	POWER POLE WIRES RUN ACROSS THE PROPERTY \$50,000 A MONTH FOR
4	THAT PARTICULAR PROJECT IN HOLDING COSTS ONGOING COSTS.
5	REBECCA I WAS GOING TO ASK YOU, BECAUSE ON THE MARKET RATE
6	DEVELOPMENT, UP BY OUR AIRPORT THAT IS COMPLETELY BUILT AND WE
7	CALLED PG&E LIKE A DEVELOPER WOULD, TO HOOK UP THE POWER AND
8	PG&E SAID WE DON'T HAVE THE CAPACITY. LITERALLY, THE CAPACITY
9	OF THE POWER, THEY HAVE TO REDO THE AND WE HAVE HAD OUR
10	BATTLES WITH PG&E OVER THE COURSE OF THE FIRES WE WERE TOLD
11	THAT CPUC RESTRICTS PG&E FROM PLANNING FORWARD AND OVERSIZING
12	THEIR SYSTEM BECAUSE OVERSIZING THEIR SYSTEM THOSE RATES WOULD
13	GET PASSED ON TO HATE PAYERS FOR PG&E'S INVESTMENT FOR FUTURE
14	HOOK UPS OR REVENUE. I DON'T KNOW IF THAT'S TRUE BUT I THINK
15	OF A COUPLE OF EXAMPLES THAT I KNOW OF AND MY FELLOW
16	COMMISSIONERS SPOKE OF, IT COULD BE VERY TRUE. AND I KNOW THAT
17	IT'S VERY DIFFICULT IT'S ALWAYS BEEN DIFFICULT TO GET PG&E,
18	QUITE HONESTLY TO GET POWER TO A BUILDING. BUT IT'S BECOMING
19	MORE AND MORE SO. AND IF THERE IS SOMETHING THAT WE COULD DO
20	AT THE STATE LEVEL, WORKING WITH, THROUGH THE CPUC, AND THE
21	GOVERNOR'S OFFICE, WHATEVER IT TAKES. SO, THANK YOU.

THIS IS A BIG ISSUE IN THE NORTH BAY BUT ALSO ACROSS THE STATE. 11 12 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: VICE CHAIR JOSEFOWITZ? 13 14 NICK JOSEFOWITZ: I WAS GOING TO SAY SENATOR WIENER AND BECKER 15 16 HAVE TWO DIFFERENT BILLS ON SIMILAR ITEMS AS WELL, AND THERE MAY BE MANY MORE BILLS OUT THERE. THIS IS AN ISSUE FIDUCIARY 17 HOUSING, ISSUE FOR HOSPITALS. THERE ARE HOSPITALS UNBUILT THAT 18 ARE WAITING TO BE INTERCONNECTED. VEHICLE PERMIT, VEHICLE 19 CHARGING STATIONS, ET CETERA, ET CETERA. AND I DO THINK, YOU 20 21 KNOW, CHAIR PEDROZA, AND PRESIDENT ARREGUIN, AND I, I THINK WE WERE ALL IN THAT -- EVERYBODY WAS IN -- I THINK -- WAS IT A 22 MEETING WITH BRAD ABOUT, SORT OF, THE NEXT STEPS FOR THE BAY 23 AREA'S ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY, WHICH IS SOMETHING THAT 24

WAS IN THE, SORT OF, HELD BY ABAG BUT KIND OF SOMEWHAT

- 12 MOST OF THE PG&E REACH -- WE ARE IN SO MANY OF PG&E'S
- 13 TERRITORY, SO I DON'T KNOW EXACTLY WHAT IT IS, BUT I DO HOPE
- 14 WE CAN -- WE DON'T JUST KIND OF -- I HOPE WE DON'T TRY TO
- 15 SOLVE THIS CITY BY CITY OR COUNTY BY COUNTY SOMETHING THAT'S
- 16 GOING TO BE UNDERPOWERED AND NOT ALLOW US TO KIND OF SOLVE IT

- 2 DIRECTOR OF LEGISLATION AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS. THIS ITEM BUILDS A
- 3 LITTLE BIT MORE IN DETAIL WHAT GEORGIA SHARED AS FAR AS OUR
- 4 ADVOCACY TRIP, THIS IS OUR TOP PRIORITY THIS YEAR. AND I
- 5 WANTED TO INFORM THE COMMITTEE SOME OF THE PROGRESS THAT HAS
- 6 BEEN MADE AND SOME OF THE CONVERSATIONS MORE THAN WHAT'S IN
- 7 THE MEMO. LAST MONDAY WAS A JOINT HEARING OF THE ASSEMBLY AND
- 8 SENATE POLICY COMMITTEES TO TALK ABOUT BOTH THE SHORT-TERM
- 9 CRISIS FACING TRANSIT AS WELL AS LONG-TERM TRANSFORMATION AND
- 10 I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT THE CONCEPT OF TRANSFORMATION THAT THE

- 4 PERFORMANCE METRICS FOR TRANSIT, THAT PRETTY MUCH THE ONLY ONE
- 5 THAT'S BEEN USED TRADITIONALLY IS THE FARE BOX RECOVERY RATIO
- 6 WHICH IS THE SHARE OF YOUR OPERATING COSTS THAT ARE COVERED BY
- 7 FARES, AND THAT HAS BEEN, OVER TIME, REALLY WEAKENED IN TERMS
- 8 OF EVEN BEING WHAT THAT METRIC MEASURES BECAUSE OVER TIME
- 9 THERE HAVE BEEN EXCEPTIONS THAT YOU CAN COUNT OTHER SUBSIDIES
- 10 SALES TAX IN THAT METRIC SO IT ISN'T A USEFUL METRIC
- 11 PARTICULARLY GIVEN MANY AGENCIES INCLUDING OURS WITH THE

- 21 PROPOSAL TO REDUCE THE TRANSIT CAPITAL FUNDING BY \$2 BILLION.
- 22 AS A REMINDER THERE WAS A \$4 BILLION AUGMENTATION PROPOSED, \$2
- 23 BILLION IN THIS NEXT BUDGET YEAR THEN 2 BILLION THE GOVERNOR
- 24 HAS PROPOSED CUTTING THAT IN HALF THAT WOULD AMOUNT TO \$400
- 25 MILLION TO THE BAY AREA AND FUNDS ARE FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS AND



- 1 MTC ADOPTED POLICY HAS CUTS, AND EXPRESSED BY THE CHAIR DERAZO
- 2 AND HIGHLIGHTED AT THE TOP OF THE HEARING CONCERNS AROUND
- 3 TRANSIT OPERATING FUNDING. UNDERSTANDING THAT A PROBLEM THAT
- 4 NEEDS TO BE ADDRESSED. THERE ARE 50 COMMENTS OF PUBLIC
- 5 TESTIMONY. I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO HIGHLIGHT A LETTER THAT WE
- 6 FINISHED COLLECTING SIGNATURES ON IT HAS OVER 108
- 7 ORGANIZATIONS MANY FROM THE BAY AREA BUT ALSO STATEWIDE IT'S
- 8 GOT BUSINESS COMMUNITY LABOR, EQUITY ADVOCATES, A BROAD SET OF
- 9 STAKEHOLDERS THEN 30 PEOPLE WHO CALLED IN. THE MESSAGE IS
- 10 CERTAINLY BEING DELIVERED AND THE CONVERSATION GEORGIA
- 11 REFERENCED IN TERMS OF NEXT STEPS, WHAT IS THE PROPOSED
- 12 SOLUTION WHERE IS THE MONEY GOING TO COME FROM. AS I AT THE
- 13 HEARING YESTERDAY, THE CONVERSATION WITH THE LEGISLATIVE
- 14 RESPECT AND SHIFTS TO HIGHWAY FUNDING, THAT'S REASONABLE GIVEN
- 15 HOW MUCH ADDITIONAL HIGHWAY FUNDING THE STATE HAS RECEIVED
- 16 FROM THE FEDERAL INFRASTRUCTURE BILL AND SO THE STATE IS
- 17 GETTING ABOUT A BILLION DOLLARS MORE THAN IT DID
- 18 PREINFRASTRUCTURE AND GOVERNOR PROPOSED FUNDS PRIMARILY FOR
- 19 ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION AND RESILIENCE. THERE WAS CONCERN
- 20 EXPRESSED BY THE COMMITTEE MEMBERS. OPPORTUNITIES THAT WE'RE
- 21 LOOKING AT OUTSIDE OF THE GENERAL FUND ARE ALSO DIFFICULT
- 22 WE'RE HEARING THE COALITION BUILDING ON LEGISLATURE ITSELF IS
- 23 GOING TO BE THE NEXT STEP. ALSO HEARINGS NEXT WEEK ON THE
- 24 ASSEMBLY SIDE AND WE'LL CONTINUE TO KEEP YOU INFORMED AND WITH
- 25 THAT I'LL OPEN IT UP FOR QUESTIONS.



1 2 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: COMMISSIONER RABBITT? 3 DAVID RABBIT: REBECCA THANK YOU FOR THE REPORT AND ALL THE 4 5 WORK. SORRY I MISSED THE TRIP TO SACRAMENTO. HAVE WE -- AND I'M GLAD THEY'RE TALKING ABOUT THE REVENUE SOURCES FOR TRANSIT 6 OBVIOUSLY THERE IS GOING TO BE SOME ADJUSTMENTS NEEDED TO 7 8 STATE LEAST. ON THE FISCAL CLIFF PIECE WE ALL KNOW THAT OUR TRANSIT OPERATORS ARE FACING A DIFFERENT FINANCIAL DILEMMA 9 WITH DIFFERENT PERIODS OF TIME REALLY BASED UPON THEIR CURRENT 10 REVENUE SOURCES. HOW NUANCED DID WE GET? DO WE KEEP IT BROAD 11 WHEN WE TALK ABOUT THE FISCAL CLIFF OR DO WE GET INTO THE 12 NITTY-GRITTY OF THE INDIVIDUAL AGENCIES? AND THEN ALSO TALK BY 13 THE TIME TRANSIT DEPENDENT VERSUS COMMUTE OBVIOUSLY THOSE THAT 14 15 ARE COMMUTE ORIENTED HAVE TAKEN THE BIGGEST HIT AND PROBABLY 16 HAVE THE LONGEST RECOVERY PERIOD TO GET BACK TO WHATEVER THAT NEW NORMAL WILL BE. SO I'M JUST CURIOUS ON HOW WE BREAK THIS 17 DOWN AND WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO REALLY ATTAIN. 18 19 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU FOR THOSE OUESTIONS, COMMISSIONER. ON 20 21 THE OUESTION OF HOW DETAILED ARE WE GETTING. YOU KNOW AT THIS POINT MOST OF OUR COMMENTS ARE TALKING ABOUT REGION-WIDE AND 22 WE'RE GIVING THE RANGE OVER FIVE YEARS WHICH IS THE TOTAL. AND 23 THAT ESTIMATE, RIGHT NOW, IS BETWEEN TWO AND A HALF TO \$29 24 25 BILLION. THE ACCUMULATIVE OVER FIVE YEARS. CERTAINLY, YOU



- 1 KNOW, WE -- AS THE CONVERSATION EVOLVES, WE'RE HAVING
- 2 TRANSPARENT THAT THE VAST MAJORITY OF THAT SHORTFALL IS REALLY
- 3 FROM TWO OPERATORS, AND THAT'S SAN FRANCISCO MTA, MUNI, AND
- 4 BART. AND THOSE ARE ACTUALLY QUITE DIFFERENT AGENCIES IN TERMS
- 5 OF THE PURPOSE OF THE TRIPS THAT THEY SERVE, AS WELL AS THE
- 6 REVENUE SOURCES. BART'S FINANCIAL CHARGES ARE PRIMARILY DRIVEN
- 7 BY THE REDUCTION IN FARE REVENUE. FOR MUNI, IT'S A
- 8 COMBINATION. THEY CERTAINLY HAVE NOT FULLY RECOVERED THEIR
- 9 RIDERSHIP. I BELIEVE THEY'RE AROUND 60%, WHEREAS BART IS
- 10 AROUND 40% OF RECOVERY. BUT SAN FRANCISCO MUNI'S REVENUE MIX
- 11 IS VERY TIED TO THE WORK-FROM-HOME CHALLENGES. AND SO, FOR
- 12 EXAMPLE, THEY GET A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF PARKING REVENUE, SO
- 13 AS FEWER AND FEWER PEOPLE HAVE BEEN COMING INTO THE CITY TO
- 14 COMMUTE, THAT PARKING REVENUE HAS GONE DOWN. THEY ALSO GET A
- 15 SIGNIFICANT PORTION OF THE CITY'S GENERAL FUND WHICH HAS ALSO
- 16 BEEN REALLY REDUCED AS A RESULT OF THE PANDEMIC. SO WE'RE
- 17 TRANSPARENT ABOUT THAT. WE -- I WAS JUST ASKED YESTERDAY TO
- 18 PROVIDE SOME DETAIL BY OPERATORS. AND WE'RE SHARING THAT WITH
- 19 THE BUDGET COMMITTEE STAFF, BECAUSE AS YOU POINTED OUT,
- 20 COMMISSIONER, IT'S NOT AN EVEN DISTRIBUTION ACROSS THE REGION.
- 21 I WOULD SAY THAT, WITHIN OUR OPERATORS, THERE -- THE SENSE OF
- 22 CAMARADERIE, AND KIND OF WE'RE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER THAT
- 23 EVOLVED DURING THE HEIGHT OF THE PANDEMIC REALLY IS STILL
- 24 THERE, AND SOME OF OUR SMALLEST OPERATORS, YOU KNOW, WHO DON'T
- 25 FACE THE SAME EXTENT OF REVENUE SHORTFALLS, BECAUSE THEIR



COVID RELIEF MONEY IS EXPECTED TO LAST LONGER. THEY'RE FULLY 1 ON BOARD WITH ASSISTING WITH THIS FISCAL CLIFF BECAUSE THEY 2 RECOGNIZE THAT LONG-TERM, THEIR FUTURE, YOU KNOW, RISES OR 3 FALLS WITH BART, WITH THESE OTHER LARGER OPERATORS THAT, YOU 4 5 KNOW, THEY PROVIDE A HUGE EXTENSIVE FEEDER BUS SERVICE TO THOSE SYSTEMS. HOPEFULLY THAT CONTINUES. 6 7 8 DAVID RABBIT: I VERY MUCH APPRECIATE IT.
