THAT BRINGS US TO AGENDA ITEM TWO, 17 INCLUDES AGENDA ITEM 2A THROUGH 2B, DO I HAVE A MOTION AND 18 SECOND TO APPROVE THE CONSENT CALENDAR. 19 20 CAROL DUTRA-VERNACI: DUTRA-VERNACI MOVES THE ITEM. 21 22 23 SPEAKER: SECOND. 24 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. THANK YOU. 25

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1 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: THERE ARE NO WRITTEN COMMENTS RECEIVED 2 3 FOR THIS ITEM, AND NO MEMBERS IN THE BOARDROOM WITH PUBLIC COMMENT AND IN THE ATTENDEE SPACE, NO MEMBERS WITH RAISED 4 5 HANDS FOR PUBLIC COMMENT AT THIS TIME. WOULD YOU LIKE ME TO GO THROUGH THE ROLL CALL. 6 7 8 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: I WOULD LIKE THAT. YEAH. 9 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: THANK YOU. CHAIR CANEPA? 10 11 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: YES. 12 13 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: ARREGUIN? MOULTON PETERS? 6 7 STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: YES. 8 9 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: RABBITT? 10 DAVID RABBITT: YES. 11 12 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: SPERING? TIEDEMANN? IS ABSENT. MOTION 13 14 PASSES UNANIMOUSLY BY ALL MEMBERS PRESENT. 15 16 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THAT BRINGS US TO AGENDA ITEM 3A, FISCAL YEAR 2024, 2025, STATE BUDGET UPDATE. 17 JULIE SCHNEIDER, WILL YOU PLEASE GIVE THE REPORT? 18 19 JULIE SCHNEIDER: GOOD MORNING CHAIR CANEPA AND MEMBERS. I GET 20 TO DO THE FUN STUFF THIS MORNING. WE'LL TALK ABOUT THE STATE 21 BUDGET. THERE ARE THREE THINGS I'M GOING TO HIGHLIGHT. FIRST 22 ARE RECENT NEW PROJECTIONS FROM THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST 23 OFFICE. SECOND IS OUR EFFORTS IN SACRAMENTO TO FOLLOW YOUR 24 DIRECTION AND PROTECT OUR FUND. AND THEN THIRD IS ASSEMBLY 25

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CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ONE. SO, FIRST, ON THE LEGISLATIVE 1 ANALYST OFFICE, THEY REPRESENTED NEW PROJECTIONS ABOUT THREE 2 3 WEEKS AGO, WHICH WAS BASED ON NEW STATE REVENUE DATA. THEY'RE CURRENTLY PROJECTING THAT THE STATE WILL FACE ABOUT A \$73 4 5 BILLION DEFICIT IN THE COMING FISCAL YEAR. THIS IS ROUGHLY 15 BILLION MORE THAN THEY HAD PREVIOUSLY FORECASTED, AND 6 SIGNIFICANTLY MORE THAN THE 38 BILLION GAP THAT THE GOVERNOR 7 8 ESTIMATED IN JANUARY. I THINK THE TAKE AWAY, WHILE THE LEO AND ADMINISTRATION ARE ALWAYS OUIBBLING ON THE EXACT FIGURES, IS 9 THAT BOTH AGREE THEY FACE INCREASING PRESSURE TO FIND SAVINGS 10 ANYTHING FEDERAL FUND IS THAT RISK IN FACT LAO IN THE SAME 11 REPORT OUTLINED A SERIES OF OPTIONS FOR THE LEGISLATURE TO 12 CONSIDER INCLUDING ADDITIONAL CUTS IN THE HOUSING 13 14 TRANSPORTATION AND CLIMATE PROGRAMS. IN THIS CONTEXT AND 15 FOLLOWING THE DIRECTION OF THE COMMISSION AND THE BOARD, OUR 16 ADVOCACY IS HEAVILY FOCUSED ON PROTECTING THE \$600 MILLION THAT WAS PREVIOUSLY APPROPRIATED TO REGIONAL AGENCIES FOR WHAT 17 WE CALL REAP 2.0, THAT'S THE REGIONAL EARLY ACTION PLANNING 18 PROGRAM. THE GOVERNOR'S JANUARY BUDGET PROPOSED CUTTING THIS 19 FUNDING IN HALF FOR EACH REGION. MTC IS RESPONSIBLE FOR 20 DISTRIBUTING THE BAY AREA'S SHARE OF 100 MILLION SO THAT CUT 21 COULD RESULT IN LOSS OF 50 MILLION. THIS IS AN INTERESTING 22 PROPOSAL AND NOT SOMETHING I HAVE SEEN, EVER, THAT I CAN THINK 23 OF IN MY TIME, WHICH IS A PROPOSAL TO CUT A PROGRAM THAT WE'RE 24 IN THE MIDDLE OF IMPLEMENTING. SO, YOU MIGHT REMEMBER VERY 25

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RECENTLY THE DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING APPROVED OUR SPENDING PLAN. 1 IT INCLUDED FUNDING TO PRESERVE AFFORDABLE HOUSING, TO BUILD 2 3 NEW AFFORDABLE HOMES ON THE PRIORITY SITES OUR LOCALITIES HAVE IDENTIFIED, AS WELL AS MONEY TO IMPLEMENT TRANSIT 4 5 TRANSFORMATION PRIORITIES, LIKE FARE INTEGRATION AND MAPS AND WAYFINDING. SO, WE'RE MAKING THE CASE, AND A NUMBER OF YOU 6 WILL BE IN SACRAMENTO NEXT WEEK, MAKING THE CASE, THAT IT IS 7 8 REALLY UNPRECEDENTED OR PROPOSE WITHDRAWING FUNDING IN THE MIDDLE OF IMPLEMENTING A PROGRAM WHERE WE HAVE ISSUED NOFAS, 9 ENTERED CONTRACTS AND HIRED STAFF. PROBABLY MORE SIGNIFICANTLY 10 JEOPARDIZES OUR REGION'S PROGRESS IN MEETING THE CLIMATE 11 TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING GOALS THAT ARE OUTLINED IN OUR 12 SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITY STRATEGY. ON TRANSIT, I WANT TO NOTE 13 THAT WE HAVE CONVEYED TO THE ADMINISTRATION HOW GRATEFUL WE 14 ARE THAT THE GOVERNOR'S JANUARY BUDGET PROTECTS THE MONEY THAT 15 16 WE SECURED LAST YEAR FOR TRANSIT. BUT DOING DUE DILIGENCE KNOWING THAT ANYTHING FUNDED BY THE GENERAL FUND COULD BE AT 17 RISK SO PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT THAT WE CONTINUE TO PRESENT A 18 UNITED FRONT WITH OUR STATEWIDE AND REGIONAL PARTNERS IN THIS 19 SPACE. LAST ITEM I WANT TO COVER IS ACA ONE LEGISLATIVE 20 21 LEADERSHIP IN ASSEMBLY IS HEAVILY ENGAGED CURRENTLY ENSURING 22 THAT WHEN THE MEASURE IS VIABLE WHEN IT APPEARS ON THE BALLOT IN NOVEMBER. IT WOULD LOWER THE THRESHOLD FOR LOCAL AND 23 REGIONAL BONDS AND SPECIAL TAXES AND BOOST OPPORTUNITY 24 STATEWIDE FOR SELF-HEALTH. AND THIS WILL POTENTIALLY HELP US 25

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1 AT THE STATE BUDGET SITUATION. THIS IS A KEY PRIORITY FOR THIS 2 AGENCY AND FOR LEGISLATIVE LEADERSHIP AND WE'LL CONTINUE TO 3 STAY HEAVILY ENGAGED THERE. I'LL GO AHEAD AND CLOSE. HAPPY TO 4 ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS.

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6 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: ARE THERE QUESTIONS FOR JULIE? YES? VICE7 CHAIR JOSEFOWITZ?

8

NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THANK YOU. ACA ONE, OBVIOUSLY, IS VERY 9 10 RELEVANT TO, LIKE, TO A LOT OF WHAT WE'RE DOING HERE WITH HOUSING. COULD YOU JUST GIVE US SOME MORE COLOR ON WHAT ARE 11 THE THINGS THEY'RE CONSIDERING TO MAKE IT MORE VIABLE? DO YOU 12 THINK THAT WILL MAKE IT MORE VIABLE, IF THEY WILL BE ABLE TO 13 GET THAT INTO THE LEGISLATION OR INTO THE, SORT OF -- I DON'T 14 KNOW IF IT'S TECHNICALLY LEGISLATION, WHATEVER IT IS, INTO THE 15 16 THING. [LAUGHTER]

JULIE SCHNEIDER: (LAUGHTER) THE THING. WHAT THEY'RE LOOKING 18 AT, THE RANGE OF OPTIONS IS QUITE BROAD IT COVERS BOTH BONDS 19 AND SPECIAL TAXES. FOR A SERIES OF TYPES OF INFRASTRUCTURE, 20 21 EVERYTHING FROM FIRE HAZARDS, TO OPEN SPACE, NOT TECHNICALLY INFRASTRUCTURE, BUT OPEN SPACE AND PARKS, TO HOUSING, TO 22 TRANSIT. AND I THINK THERE IS A QUESTION ABOUT THE EXTENT TO 23 WHICH VOTERS WILL BE INTERESTED IN TACKLE SUCH A LARGE SWATH 24 OF PROJECT TYPES. I DON'T WANT TO PREDICT WHERE THE 25

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LEGISLATURE IS GOING ON THIS THEY SAY NEGOTIATIONS ARE 1 DELICATE THERE IS INTERSECTION WITH A MEASURE BY THE 2 3 CALIFORNIA BUSINESS ROUNDTABLE THAT MAY APPEAR ON THE NOVEMBER BALLOT ACTUALLY INCREASE VOTE THRESHOLDS SO NEGOTIATIONS ARE 4 5 DELICATE. BUT ANYTHING WITHIN THAT LIST WHETHER IT'S TYPES OF INFRASTRUCTURE, WHETHER IT'S SPECIAL TAXES VERSUS BONDS, I 6 THINK IS ON THE TABLE FOR DISCUSSION. DOES THAT FULLY ANSWER 7 8 YOUR OUESTION? 9 NICK JOSEFOWITZ: I MEAN -- ASIDE -- UNLESS YOU HAVE THIS MAGIC 10 EIGHT BALL, CAN YOU REMIND ME WHAT OUR POSITION IS AS AN 11 AGENCY LIKE WHAT WE WANT TO SEE OUT OF THIS, PRIORITIES, WHAT 12 WE'RE BRINGING TO THIS DISCUSSION? 13 14 JULIE SCHNEIDER: HAPPY TO HIGHLIGHT A COUPLE, THEN ASK IF MY 15 16 COLLEAGUES WANT TO ADD ANYTHING. NUMBER ONE LENS WE'RE LOOKING THROUGH IS MAKING SURE IS THAT IT CONTINUES TO FACILITATE AND 17 ADVANCE BAHFA'S ABILITY TO PASS ITS NOVEMBER BOND. SO IN TERMS 18 OF WHAT CAN BE FUNDED EXACTLY HOW IT CAN BE DONE, I WOULD SAY 19 THAT'S A VERY IMPORTANT LENS. OF COURSE, WE'RE ALSO INTERESTED 20 21 IN THE IMPACTS ON TRANSPORTATION, ON CLIMATE RESILIENCE PROJECTS, AND WE'RE INCREDIBLY INTERESTED IN MAKING SURE IT 22 CAN PASS. SO, I THINK IT'S A BALANCE OF ALL THREE OF THOSE. 23 OKAY. REBECCA? 24

1 REBECCA LONG: NOTHING TO ADD.

NICK JOSEFOWITZ: GREAT. AND SO MY LAST QUESTION IS TO JUST GO 3 A BIT DEEPER. THE BUSINESS ROUNDTABLE MEASURE IS TRULY 4 5 FRIGHTENING IT'S LIKE PROP 13 ON METHOD OR SOMETHING. I MEAN, IT'S REALLY TERRIBLE. (LAUGHTER) IS THAT THE DISCUSSIONS 6 AROUND HOW TO GET THE MEASURE OFF -- I MEAN, IS THE COMPROMISE 7 8 GOING TO BE WITH THE BUSINESS ROUNDTABLE TO GET THEIR MEASURE OFF THE BALLOT? OR THAT WAS -- ARE THEY COMMITTED TO TAKING ON 9 10 THE BALLOT? IF THAT'S GOING TO MOVE FORWARD, I THINK IT'S RELEVANT FOR THIS COMMISSION AND ABAG, AS WELL, TO KIND OF 11 HEAR AN UPDATE ON. 12

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REBECCA LONG: VICE CHAIR JOSEFOWITZ. YES, I WOULD AGREE. I 14 15 SAID THE SAME THING, I SAID PROP 13 ON STEROIDS, BUT I LIKE TO 16 HEAR PROP 13 ON METHOD. I THINK IT'S VERY CONCERNING. I THINK AS FOLKS ARE AWARE, THIS IS BEING CHALLENGED AND REVIEWED BY 17 THE COURTS RIGHT NOW, I BELIEVE, SUPREME COURT, AND AS A 18 POTENTIAL REVISION SO THAT IT CAN'T BE DEALT WITH AS A 19 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT IT WOULD REQUIRE A CONSTITUTIONAL 20 CONVENTION, WE'LL SEE HOW IT WINE ITS WAY THROUGH THE PROCESS. 21 I THINK WE JUST DON'T HAVE ENOUGH INTEL ON EXACTLY THE NATURE 22 OF THESE NEGOTIATIONS. BUT I WOULD SAY THERE IS A SIGNIFICANT 23 CONCERN THAT IF IT REMAINS ON THE BALLOT, ACA ONE WILL NOT 24 HAVE MUCH OF A CHANCE. SO, IT REALLY IS, YOU KNOW, FUNDAMENTAL 25



TO THIS BOARD, ABAG, AND BAHFA'S ABILITY TO PURSUE THE HOUSING 1 2 BOND. 3 NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THANK YOU. 4 5 SPEAKER: AND THE ONLY THING I WOULD ADD IS IN THE ACA 6 NEGOTIATIONS IN PARTICULAR WE DO HAVE A SEAT AT THAT TABLE. 7 8 NEGOTIATIONS ARE BEING HELD FAIRLY TIGHT, SO WE ARE AT THE TABLE THOUGH. 9 10 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: ANY ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS? 11 JULIE I'M OUITE CONCERNED ABOUT THE TWO-YEAR FUNDING THAT WE 12 WERE PROMISED. YOU CAN ADD A LITTLE FLAVOR TO THE 13 CONVERSATIONS? ARE THEY REALLY CONSIDERING CUTTING THOSE 14 15 DOLLARS IN HALF? AND I GUESS, I DON'T NEED AN ANSWER TODAY, 16 BUT I REALLY WANT TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THE PLAN IS TO DEAL WITH THAT. BECAUSE, TO ME, WE'RE TRYING TO SOLVE ANOTHER PROBLEM, 17 18 IN THE NEXT ITEMS MOVING FORWARD, BUT, REALLY TRYING TO UNDERSTAND THIS PROBLEM. WHAT ARE YOUR SENSE -- I KNOW WE HAVE 19 -- AND I KNOW YOU PENSIONED -- WE HAVE DIFFERENT ALLIES AND 20 21 DIFFERENT BUDGET SHARE POSITIONS, HOW SERIOUS IS THIS MATTER 22 OF TAKING AWAY THE FUNDING?

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24 **REBECCA LONG:** THANK YOU, CHAIR CANEPA. YOU KNOW, I THINK IN 25 THE THEME OF THINGS, RIGHT, YOU HAVE TO LOOK AT WHAT IS THE

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HOLE THAT THE LEGISLATURE HAS TO CLOSE. YOU KNOW, WHETHER IT'S 1 A \$73 BILLION GAP, OR A \$38 BILLION GAP, 600,000 IS NOT THAT 2 3 BIG, I THINK WE HAVE THAT GOING FOR US. I THINK JULIE POINTED OUT, CLAW BACK OF A PROGRAM THIS'S FAR ALONG I THINK THE 4 5 PRIORITIES OF THE REAP 2.0 PROGRAM ARE HELD BY THE ADMINISTRATION, PROPOSED THIS CUT BUT I THINK WE HAVE A STRONG 6 CASE TO MAKE THIS FUNDAMENTAL TO A LOT OF STATES GOALS. THERE 7 8 ARE LETTERS IN THE PACKET OF ALL OF OUR PEER AGENCIES, CALIFORNIA ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS, OUTSIDE OF THE TRANSIT 9 PUBLIC AGENCIES, SHARE FORWARD, THE HOUSING COMMUNITY IS GOING 10 TO BE SUPPORTIVE OF PROTECTING REAP 2.0. WE'RE GOING TO HAVE 11 TO WORK HARD AT IT, BUT I THINK WE HAVE A SHOT. OTHER THING 12 WE'RE LOOKING AT IN PARTNERSHIP WITH CALCOG SIMILAR TO OUR 13 STRATEGY WITH THE TRANSIT OPERATING CHALLENGE LAST YEAR IS ARE 14 15 THERE OTHER FUNDING SOURCES THAT COULD BACKFILL FOR THE 16 GENERAL FUND HERE. THAT'S SOMETHING WE'RE EXPLORING. ARE THERE OTHER ELIGIBLE SPECIAL FUNDS THAT COULD HELP KEEP THIS FUNDING 17 LEVEL IN TACK TAX AND ALSO PROVIDE GENERAL FUND RELIEF. 18

4 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. THAT BRINGS US TO AGENDA ITEM 3B
5 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION MEASURE AUTHORIZING LEGISLATURE.
6 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN, WILL YOU PLEASE GIFT REPORT.

7

8 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: GOOD MORNING MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE. GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN MTC ABAG STAFF. INFORMATION ITEM. AND 9 REMINDER LAST MONTH THE COMMISSION TOOK ACTION TO DIRECT MTC 10 TO SPONSOR REGIONAL AUTHORIZING LEGISLATION FOR A REGIONAL 11 TRANSPORTATION REVENUE MEASURE OVER THE LAST SEVERAL MONTHS 12 STAFF HAVE BEEN WORKING ON TRANSLATE THE COMMISSION'S JANUARY 13 GUIDANCE LANGUAGE, AS THE SCAFFOLDING THERE WERE BIG POLICY 14 15 ITEMS UNDETERMINED AT THAT JANUARY MEETING SO AT OUR 16 COMMISSION MEETING WE HAVE COME BACK REGULARLY AND KEPT YOU UPDATED ON WHAT'S GOING ON AND ALSO CONTINUE TO SEEK DIRECTION 17 ON POLICY ITEMS. A COUPLE OF LATE BREAKING POLICY ITEMS TO 18 FLAG FOR YOU TODAY ARE THAT WE HAVE, SORT OF, TWO BIG ITEMS 19 THAT WE ANTICIPATE BEING IN THE BILL LANGUAGE IN THE FIRST 20 21 ROUND OF AMENDMENTS. FIRST IS WE ANTICIPATE THERE WILL BE A MINIMUM AMOUNT OF FUNDING FOR TRANSIT TRANSFORMATION LOCATED 22 IN THE BILL, AND SECOND WE ANTICIPATE THAT THERE WILL BE A 23 SHIFT IN THE BILL'S STRATEGY TO INTEGRATE -- TO ESSENTIALLY 24 MERGE THE TWO BILLS IN THE SENATE THAT WERE ABOUT REGIONAL 25

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TRANSPORTATION -- BAY AREA TRANSPORTATION, OR BAY AREA 1 TRANSIT, AND MERGE THAT INTO ONE BILL. AND, SO, I'LL JUST DIG 2 3 IN A LITTLE BIT MORE ON EACH OF THOSE ITEMS. THE FIRST ON THE MINIMUM FUNDING FOR TRANSIT ON TRANSFORMATION. AS YOU KNOW 4 5 SENATOR WIENER WHO AGREED TO BE THE PRIMARY AUTHOR OF THE BILL, HIS PRIMARY INTEREST IN THIS EFFORT WAS REALLY ABOUT 6 PROTECTING AND PRESERVING TRANSIT SERVICE IN THE REGION. THE 7 8 COMMISSION AGREES THIS IS THE PRIMARY REASON WE'RE SEEKING AUTHORIZING LANGUAGES THIS YEAR, ALTHOUGH THE COMMISSION GAVE 9 DIRECTION BASED ON POLLING AND PRIORITIES THAT ARE BALANCED 10 MEASURES AS REALLY IMPORTANT WITH SUFFICIENT RESOURCES TO BE 11 AVAILABLE FOR NON-TRANSIT INVESTMENTS LIKE LOCAL STREETS AND 12 ROADS AND CONNECTIVITY. THIS PAST WEEK SENATOR WIENER HAD 13 SHARED STRONG INTEREST IN STARTING OUT NEGOTIATIONS WITH 14 15 MINIMUM DOLLAR AMOUNT FOR TRANSIT OPERATIONS THAT SHOULD BE IN 16 THE FIRST SET OF AMENDMENTS AFTER SOME BACK AND FORTH COMMISSION LEADERSHIP MADE A DECISION TO SET A FLOOR OF \$750 17 MILLION PER YEAR FOR TRANSIT OPERATING EXPENSES TO MAINTAIN 18 19 EXISTING SERVICE AND DELIVER ON SERVICE IMPROVEMENTS, REALLY A SUBSTANTIAL UPDATE THERE IS CONVERSATION THAT NEEDS IN 20 FUNDING, STRUCTURE OF LEGISLATION, SENATOR WIENER UNDERSTANDS 21 THIS NEGOTIATION WITH KEY STAKEHOLDERS IS JUST THE BEGINNING 22 SO WE EXPECT THIS TO BE AN ONGOING NEGOTIATION CONVERSATION. 23 ON THE SECOND BIG UPDATE, PRO TEMPORE SENATOR MAG CHOIR HAS 24 HELD SEVERAL MEETINGS WITH SENATOR WIENER AND SENATOR WAHAB 25

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ABOUT REGIONAL TRANSIT BILLS RELATED TO REGIONAL TRANSIT IN 1 THE BAY AREA. PRO TEMPORE HAS PROVIDED DIRECTION THAT SENATOR 2 3 WIENER AND SENATOR WAHAB SHOULD DROP THEIR INDIVIDUAL EFFORTS MERGE THEIR EFFORTS INTO ONE PIECE OF LEGISLATION. SO SENATOR 4 5 WAHAB PORTION OF THIS PROPOSAL WILL BE RELATED TO REOUIRING THAT THE STATE DO A CONSOLIDATION STUDY RELATED TO BAY AREA 6 TRANSIT AGENCIES. AND THEN SOME ADDITIONAL COMPONENTS IN THERE 7 8 THAT WE AREN'T POSITIVE EXACTLY WHAT THEY'RE GOING TO BE YET BECAUSE WE HAVEN'T SEEN THE LEGISLATIVE LANGUAGE. AGAIN, THIS 9 IS A REALLY BIG CHANGE. AND I'LL MAKE AN EDITORIAL COMMENT. 10 MTC IS SPONSORING THIS BILL. WE DID NOT REQUEST THIS, BUT THE 11 PRO TEMPORE'S EARLY ENGAGEMENT ON THIS IS AN ENCOURAGING SIGN 12 IT SHOWS THAT THE BILL IS REALLY IMPORTANT AND THAT IT BODES 13 WELL FOR THE BILL'S PASSAGE IN THE SENATE AND I'LL SAY THAT 14 IT'S RELATIVELY TYPICAL THAT LEADERSHIP WOULD ENCOURAGE BILL 15 16 AUTHORS TO BASICALLY NOT BE RUNNING BILLS THAT ARE DIRECTLY RELATED TO THE SAME TOPIC IN THE SAME HOUSE. SO, AGAIN IT'S 17 SOMETHING THAT'S NOT THAT ATYPICAL. SO, I WILL PAUSE NOW ON 18 THAT. I DO WANT TO MAKE SURE TO SHARE THAT WE UNDERSTAND THAT 19 THIS ADDITION OF A CONSOLIDATION STUDY WOULD BE ADDED, IN 20 ADDITION TO THE PROVISIONS THAT SENATOR WIENER HAS ALREADY 21 BEEN INCLUDING IN HIS DRAFT AMENDMENT WITH COMMISSION'S 22 DIRECTION TO STRENGTHEN COMMISSION'S ROLE IN REGIONAL NETWORK 23 MANAGEMENT. SO WE EXPECT THOSE WOULD BE TWO COMPONENTS RELATED 24 25 TO ACCOUNTABILITY REFORM IN THE TRANSIT SPACE. ON THE TIMING,

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WE HAD ANTICIPATED AMENDMENTS WOULD BE PUBLIC ON MARCH 11TH. 1 THIS IS A REALLY SIGNIFICANT UPDATE AND IT'S GOING TO DELAY 2 3 THE TIMING TO ANTICIPATE THE NEXT TARGET IS MARCH 18th. SO WE THINK WE'LL SEE DRAFT AMENDMENTS BEFORE THEN ONCE WE DO WE'LL 4 5 CIRCULATE IT TO THE COMMISSION FOR INPUT AS WELL AS WITH KEY PARTNERS FOR INPUT. AND THEN, YOU KNOW, ON THE KEY PARTNERS 6 PIECE, I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE TO SHARE. WE HAVE BEEN MEETING 7 8 VERY REGULARLY WITH KEY STAKEHOLDERS FROM AROUND THE BAY AREA, AND BIG INTEREST IN SACRAMENTO, WE HOST A WEEKLY REGIONAL 9 10 TRANSPORTATION REVENUE MEASURE WORKING GROUP. SO THAT'S ONE FORUM, AND WE ALSO GO TO A LOT OF OTHER FORUMS TO PRESENT TO 11 MAKE SURE FOLKS ARE ENGAGED AND ARE ENGAGED, AND SO THOSE ARE 12 GOOD FORUMS TO BE ABLE TO, IN ADDITION TO COMMISSION INPUT TO 13 BE ABLE TO GET FEEDBACK FROM STAKEHOLDERS AS WE MOVE THROUGH 14 15 THIS PROCESS. WE EXPECT COMING BACK TO YOU NEXT MONTH WITH 16 THE, YOU KNOW, THE LATEST CHANGES TO GET YOUR DIRECTION, SO 17 THAT THE COMMISSION CAN FORMALLY ENDORSE ANY SUBSTANTIVE NEW PROVISIONS, OR GIVE DIRECTION TO STAFF TO PURSUE REVISIONS TO 18 THOSE NEW PROVISIONS. LOTS OF ISIONS. ANOTHER THING I WANT TO 19 SHARE, THIS IS DEFINITELY GOING TO MAKE OUR SACRAMENTO 20 21 MEETINGS NEXT WEEK TIMELY. THE LATEST, ONE MORE UPDATE ON THE BILL NUMBER, THE BILL THAT YOU ALL -- THAT THE COMMISSION 22 ENDORSED US TO SPONSOR WAS SENATE BILL 925, SENATOR WIENER, WE 23 DON'T HAVE IT IN PRINT YET, BUT WE THINK A NEW BILL NUMBER IS 24



GOING TO BE SENATE BILL 1031. SO WE'LL START KEEPING THAT NEW 1 2 NUMBER IN OUR MINDS. 3 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. THANK YOU. ARE THERE ANY BOARD 4 5 MEMBER COMMENTS? 6 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: WHEN DOES THE -- COMMISSION -7 8 - AND I'M ASSUMING, WHEN WE START LISTING, WHAT ARE OUR PRIORITIES TO SEE IN THIS BILL? HAVE WE DONE THAT? 9 10 REBECCA LONG: I'LL TAKE THAT ONE. WE ADOPTED SOME VERY 11 COMPONENTS, EXPENDITURE CATEGORIES, REVENUE SOURCES, WHAT ARE 12 THE GOALS, YOU KNOW, HOW LONG SHOULD THIS BE AUTHORIZED FOR, 13 WHAT IS THE SCOPE. SO WE HAVE AN OUTLINE, AND THAT'S WHAT'S 14 15 GOING TO BE IN PRINT ON MARCH 18th, BUT WERE A LOT OF 16 IMPORTANT VERY DIFFICULT QUESTIONS THAT WE DIDN'T WANT TO JUST GO OUT THE GATE, HERE IS WHAT THE COMMISSION WANTS WITHOUT 17 KNOWING THE NEGOTIATION, WE WOULD HAVE TO WALK BACK AND 18 CONSTANTLY PIVOT, SO THOSE THINGS LIKE WHAT SHARE, WHAT AMOUNT 19 IS GOING TO EACH OF THESE CATEGORIES, HOW ARE WE GOING TO 20 21 PROVIDE GEOGRAPHIC BALANCE. I WOULD SAY THOSE TWO PIECES ARE PROBABLY MOST CONTENTIOUS AND WITH OUR EXPERIENCE FROM 22 REGIONAL MEASURE THREE, REGIONAL MEASURE TWO, VERY DIFFERENT 23 TYPES OF MEASURES BUT THOSE WERE MORE DETAILED EXPENDITURE 24 PLANS. WE KNOW THAT'S GOING TO BE A VERY LEGISLATIVELY 25

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DIRECTED TYPE OF NEGOTIATION, AND, SO, YOU KNOW, THAT'S JUST 1 BEGINNING. BUT WHAT WE DO INTEND TO DO COMMISSIONER, BECAUSE 2 AS GEORGIA OUTLINED, WE'RE THE SPONSOR OF THIS, WE DO WANT TO 3 MAINTAIN OWNERSHIP, AND MAINTAIN STRONG SUPPORT FOR IT. WE'RE 4 5 GOING TO BRING BACK ANY OF THE SUBSTANTIVE ITEMS. INCLUDING THE 750 MILLION, INCLUDING THE INCLUSION OF THIS CONSOLIDATION 6 STUDY, WE'LL BE BRINGING THAT BACK TO YOU IN APRIL. THIS JUST 7 8 HAPPENED, LIKE, YESTERDAY, RIGHT? SO, YOU KNOW, WE WEREN'T PREPARED TO FORMALLY ENDORSE OR NOT ENDORSE. BUT IN APRIL 9 WE'RE GOING TO COME BACK TO THIS COMMITTEE WITH AN UPDATE ON 10 EITHER THE PROVISIONS THAT THE SENATOR AND OTHERS WANT TO PUT 11 IN THERE OR EVEN HAVE PUT IN THERE AS WELL AS OUR OWN IDEAS, 12 RIGHT, I MEAN ON OUR PRIORITY LIST IS THE GEOGRAPHIC RETURN TO 13 SOURCE AND HOW DO WE STRUCTURE THE BALANCE OF INVESTMENT 14 15 KNOWING THAT, YOU KNOW, WE DON'T HAVE A DOLLAR AMOUNT YET, 16 RIGHT, THAT WE'RE SPECIFICALLY TARGETING, AND THE COMMISSION DIRECTED US NOT TO DO THAT, RIGHT? THAT IT WAS MORE STRATEGIC 17 TO AUTHORIZE TAX TYPES THAN TO GO IN AND SAY, "IT'S A HALF 18 CENT. IT'S 1%. IT'S X PERCENT PAYROLL TAX." AT THE END OF THE 19 DAY THERE IS UPWARD PRESSURE ON THE AMOUNT IN ORDER TO HAVE A 20 BIG TENT BUT THEN THERE IS ALSO THE REALITY OF WHAT THE VOTERS 21 ARE GOING TO SUPPORT. RIGHT? SO THAT'S GOING TO HAVE TO BE 22 INFORMED BY POLLING. SO WE'RE GOING TO COME BACK IN APRIL TO 23 GET THE COMMISSION'S DIRECTION ON ANY ITEMS THAT HAVE NOT YET 24 25 STARTED TO BE RESOLVED IN SACRAMENTO, AND ANY THAT HAVE, WE

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WANT TO KNOW, IS THE COMMISSION COMFORTABLE WITH THIS, OR DO 1 THEY WANT TO DIRECT STAFF TO PURSUE MODIFICATION. 2 3 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. CHAIR PEDROZA. 4 5 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: I'M CONCERNED REACTING A 6 DOLLAR AMOUNT HAS TO BE INTRODUCED YOU KNOW I DON'T REMEMBER 7 8 US HAVING THAT CONVERSATION AND YOU I THINK WE HAVE TO BE CAREFUL THAT WE ESTABLISH WHAT'S IMPORTANT TO US. AND THE 9 PIECE THAT'S MISSING FOR ME IS ACCOUNTABILITY NOBODY'S TALKING 10 ABOUT ACCOUNTABILITY. 11

REBECCA LONG: WE HAVE LANGUAGE IN THE DRAFT YOU PROVIDED 13 DIRECTION TO STAFF, VERY CLEAR THAT YOU WANTED TO STRENGTHEN 14 MTC'S EXISTING AUTHORITY SO THE LANGUAGE IN THE DRAFT DOES DO 15 16 THAT. IT KIND OF GOES INTO OUR EXISTING AUTHORITY AND AMENDS IT. SO, FOR EXAMPLE, YOU KNOW, UNDER CURRENT LAW, THERE IS 17 PROVISIONS THAT SAY THE COMMISSION CAN'T CONDITION STA FUNDING 18 ON A, B, AND C. THE LANGUAGE IS BROAD RIGHT NOW, YOU KNOW, 19 FARE, POLICY, SUCH AND SUCH. WHAT WE WANT TO DO IS GO IN AND 20 21 REALLY NAME THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN COMPONENTS AND MAKE IT CLEAR THAT WE CAN CONDITION STA FUNDING ON IMPLEMENTATION 22 OF THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN PRIORITY. SO, MAPPING AND 23 WAYFINDING IS LISTED. REALTIME TRANSIT INFORMATION IS LISTED. 24 SO WE HAVE TAKEN THE COMMISSION'S DIRECTION. WE HAVE DRAFTED, 25

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THAT'S GOING TO BE THE NEGOTIATION WITH OPERATORS. YOU CAN 1 IMAGINE THEY'RE NOT ALL THRILLED WITH WHAT WE HAVE DRAFTED TO 2 3 DATE. WE ALSO NOW HAVE THE PRO TEMPORE WEIGHING IN, BUT AN ADDITIONAL LAYER OF ACCOUNTABILITY WOULD BE, YOU KNOW, THIS 4 5 CONSOLIDATION STUDY. AND YOU KNOW, THAT'S -- COMMISSION DIRECTED STAFF TO REALLY FOCUS ON COORDINATION. BUT THAT IS 6 NOW ANOTHER COMPONENT THAT, YOU KNOW, ONE BEING SAY IT TIES 7 8 INTO ACCOUNTABILITY. WE'RE ALSO WORKING, RIGHT NOW, ON SOME CONCEPT THAT THE COMMISSION HASN'T YET DIRECTED US TO, BUT 9 10 COME BACK IN APRIL FOR MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT WE'RE GOING TO TAXPAYERS AND ASKING THEM TO TAX THEMSELVES TO ASSIST WITH 11 TRANSIT OPERATIONS. I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT TRANSIT OPERATORS 12 ARE MAINTAINING REVENUE SOURCES THEY ARE COMMITTING TO TODAY, 13 TO RUN THEIR SERVICE, THAT THERE ISN'T A SHIFT IN THEIR 14 15 FUNDING. BECAUSE THIS IS DESIGNED TO BE VALUE-ADD. SO WE 16 DEFINITELY ARE MINDFUL OF ACCOUNTABILITY. WE THINK THE LEGISLATURE IS GOING TO HUG SOME IDEAS TO MTC ABOUT ACCIDENT 17 ACCOUNTABLE. 18

CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT WHEN
STAFF MAKES THESE PRESENTATIONS THAT YOU TALK ABOUT THOSE
THINGS TOO. BECAUSE YOU'RE NOT DOING THAT. I THINK IT'S
IMPORTANT THAT BOTH COMMISSION AND PUBLIC KNOWS THESE ARE
THINGS WE'RE ASKING FOR AND ARE REQUIRING. IN YOUR
PRESENTATION IT SHOULD ALWAYS BE INCLUDED.



1 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU. 2 3 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU. CHAIR PEDROZA? 4 5 ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU, CHAIR CANEPA I APPRECIATE CHAIR 6 7 SPERING'S OUESTIONS. THIS HAS BEEN SOMETHING THAT'S BEEN 8 MOVING FAST PACED AND WE HAVE HAD CONVERSATIONS AT THE COMMISSION. BUT I ALSO ACKNOWLEDGE IT'S A DIFFERENTLY 9 SITUATION. SENATOR WIENER HAS BEEN A GREAT ALLY OF OURS AND HE 10 HAS BEEN BOLD IN FIGURING OUT TRANSPORTATION GOING BACK TO 11 WHEN WE MADE THIS REQUEST TO THE STATE. WE STARTED THIS 12 RELATIONSHIP OFF DIFFERENTLY BECAUSE IT WAS ALL TETHERED 13 TOGETHER. WHAT I HAVE SHOWN AT THE COMMISSION STAFF HAS BEEN 14 15 WORKING CLOSELY WITH SENATOR WIENER. KEEPING LEADERSHIP 16 APPRISED AND WE HAVE ATTENDED MEETINGS WITH SENATOR WIENER TO UNDERSTAND OUR PRIORITIES, COALESCING AROUND AREAS OF INTEREST 17 WHAT WE WANT TO SEE WHAT WE WANT STAFF TO COMMUNICATE MORE BUT 18 ALSO ACKNOWLEDGMENT THAT THERE ARE STAKEHOLDERS AND PARTNERS 19 IN THE DISCUSSION YOU ALSO HAVE THE LEGISLATORS, ADVOCATES, 20 21 EVERYONE'S AT THE TABLE. I KNOW THAT WE'RE DRIVING THIS AND I 22 APPRECIATE STAFF. I WANT TO MAKE SURE WE CONTINUE TO HAVE OPPORTUNITIES AT THE COMMISSION, BEING HEARD AND STAFF IS 23 GETTING DIRECTION FROM THE COMMISSION. I THINK WE'RE DOING 24 THAT NOW. WHAT I HAVE SHARED AND HEARD MY COLLEAGUES SAY FROM 25

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THE BEGINNING IS THE BOLD ISSUES WE WANT TO TAKE ON THAT'S 1 BEEN CONSISTENT FROM DAY ONE. MAKING SURE THERE IS CAPITAL, WE 2 3 HEARD FROM OUR LABOR PARTNERS, A NEED FOR THAT, THAT'S AN AREA OF INTEREST WE NEED TO FINE TUNE MORE AND MAKING SURE IT GETS 4 5 BACK TO JURISDICTIONS. REBECCA YOU MENTIONED THE NEXT PHASE. WE'RE GOING ALONG THIS JOURNEY IT'S HAPPENING QUICKLY. THERE 6 IS A LOT OF CHANGES AND I ACKNOWLEDGE STAFF REACTING TO IT BUT 7 8 I THINK WE HAVE BEEN PROACTIVE IN ADDRESSING CONCERNS. THERE HAS BEEN OTHER PROPOSALS AT DIFFERENT AGENCIES TALKING ABOUT 9 ADDITIONAL BOARD OVERSIGHT AND WE HAVE TALKED ABOUT, AND WHAT 10 I SHARED WITH THE SENATOR AND I'LL SAY HERE IS, LET'S IDENTIFY 11 THE PROBLEM WE'RE TRYING TO SOLVE BEFORE WE DESCRIBE THE 12 SOLUTION. I THINK THAT'S SOMETHING WE SAID THAT WE'RE 13 INTERESTED IN BUT ALSO ACKNOWLEDGE PEOPLE MIGHT HAVE QUESTIONS 14 AND THEIR WILLINGNESS TO ADDRESS FARE COORDINATION MAPPING AND 15 16 WAYFINDING. THOSE ARE THE OUESTIONS AND DIRECTION WE NEED TO APPRISE STAFF OF WHAT'S THE RIGHT TOOL TO ADDRESS THAT PROBLEM 17 THAT WE'RE ALL TRYING TO SOLVE. I APPRECIATE YOU ALL COMING 18 BACK. THERE IS GOING TO BE MORE OPPORTUNITIES. I WANT TO 19 ENCOURAGE OUR COMMISSIONERS TO LOOK AT IT THROUGH THE LENS OF 20 THIS IS OUR TIME TO TALK ABOUT THAT. WE HAVE TO FIND CONSENSUS 21 22 AROUND THOSE AREAS OF INTEREST. THANK YOU.

24 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU. COUNCIL MEMBER PAPAN?

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GINA PAPAN: THANK YOU. AND THANK YOU TO MY COLLEAGUES. I THINK 1 2 THE CONCERN HERE IS, AS COMMISSIONER SPERING POINTED OUT HERE, 3 THIS IS AN MTC BILL. THIS STAFF WORKS FOR MTC. AND IF WE'RE NOT GETTING OUR GOALS OUT FRONT, EVEN THROUGH THE CONVERSATION 4 5 AND NEGOTIATION, THEN THEY'RE LOST. AND WHEN THE SENATOR IS HAVING A PRESS CONFERENCE BEFORE THIS BOARD HAS DECIDED OR 6 REALLY PRESENTED OUR, REALLY, CONCERNS, BECAUSE WE ADOPT THIS 7 8 TO PASS AND OUR JURISDICTIONS WANT THIS TO PASS. SO IF THAT'S NOT UP FRONT AND DOESN'T STAY UP FRONT, WE HAVE BEEN CLEAR. 9 THERE IS AN AGREEMENT HERE ON THE BLUE RIBBON POINTS. THOSE 10 SHOULD BE THE LEAD EACH AND EVERY STEP OF THE WAY. BECAUSE THE 11 PUBLIC IS LOOKING FOR ACCOUNTABILITY. THE GEOGRAPHIC ASPECT IS 12 EXTREMELY IMPORTANT. IT'S NOT GOING TO PASS UNLESS IT IS 13 BALANCED IN SUCH A WAY. I AM CONCERNED ABOUT A COUPLE, REALLY, 14 15 THE EQUITY POSITION THAT'S BEING PUT OUT THERE, RIGHT NOW, 16 BECAUSE IT JUST LOOKS LIKE THE BIG TWO ARE GOING TO GET THE FUNDING. WE'RE NOT GOING TO HAVE THE ACCOUNTABILITY. AND I CAN 17 TELL YOU FROM OUR LEGISLATIVE BODIES, OUR REPRESENTATIVE, THAT 18 ACCOUNTABILITY HAS TO BE UP FRONT HERE. THOSE GOALS HAVE TO BE 19 UP FRONT HERE. AND IF MTC STAFF IS DELIVERING THAT MESSAGE, WE 20 21 NEED YOU TO TAKE THAT. WE NEED YOU TO KEEP THAT UP FRONT IN THE CONVERSATION OTHERWISE IT DOESN'T REFLECT THIS BOARD. 22 BECAUSE WE -- THERE WAS AGREEMENT. WE DID THE TRANSPORTATION 23 PLAN. THAT HAS TO BE UP THERE. I LOVE THE FACT THE ANNUAL 24 REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE, THAT'S GREAT. WE COULD USE ALL THE 25

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HELP WE CAN GET HERE. THE EMPLOYER ASPECT, IF YOU COULD FIND 1 OUT HOW DO REMOTE WORKERS FIT INTO THAT, WHAT ARE THE COST OF 2 3 THE ELECTIONS ARE THE COUNTIES SUPPOSED TO ABSORB THAT OKAY SO SAME THINGS WE DON'T KNOW BUT IT WOULD BE HELPFUL FOR US TO 4 5 KNOW AND THEN THE DEFINITION OF CLOSE TO TRANSIT. SOMEWHERE WE HAVE DEFINED IT BUT IT WOULD BE HELPFUL FOR EMPLOYERS TO KNOW 6 THERE'S NO CAP OR SUNSET IN SOME OF THESE THINGS IF WE WANT 7 8 BUSINESS TO BE PART OF OUR SOLUTION HERE I THINK WE NEED TO NEGOTIATE AND THE CHAIR HAS POINTED OUT IT NEEDS TO BE 9 CLEARER. WE CANNOT HAVE OUR STAFF OUT THERE WITHOUT PRESENTING 10 THE KEY THINGS WE HAVE ALL AGREED TO HERE AND THAT ARE SO VERY 11 IMPORTANT. THE LEGISLATURE NEEDS TO KNOW THAT. AND I KNOW SOME 12 OF -- WE WANT OTHER MEMBERS FROM THE LEGISLATURE ON BOARD 13 HERE, THEY'RE GOING TO WANT TO SEE THAT MTC IS COMMITTED TO 14 15 THAT. SO, ANY PRESENTATION REALLY NEEDS TO HAVE ALL OF THAT UP 16 FRONT, NO MATTER WHAT WE'RE DOING HERE, THIS IS WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO ACHIEVE. THAT IS SO IMPORTANT. AND I HOPE IT JUST 17 STAYS THAT WAY IN A PRESENTATION. BECAUSE WE'RE NOT JUST OUT 18 THERE PRESENTING SB1031 AS THIS IS IT AND THAT'S ALL, AND MTC 19 IS BEHIND EVERY PART OF THAT. BUT IT'S REALLY RAW, BUT WE'RE 20 21 NOT WRONG IN WHAT WE SEE. IT'S OUR LEGISLATION. IF WE DON'T 22 KEEP OUR GOALS UP FRONT IT'S GOING TO BE HARD FOR US TO PASS 23 THIS. THANK YOU.

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ALFREDO PEDROZA: COMMISSIONER PAPAN IF I COULD RESPOND YOUR 1 COMMENTS ARE APPROPRIATE. I WOULD LIKE TO REMIND PARTNERS THAT 2 3 THE COMMISSION HAS TO BE APPRISED OF THESE DISCUSSIONS NOT JUST BECAUSE IT'S THEIR JOB BUT IT'S THE RIGHT THING TO DO 4 5 THAT WE HAVE DISCUSSION. IT'S 11 JUST SUCH A FLUID ENVIRONMENT AND SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE IS 12 GETTING INVOLVED AND THAT ADDS ADVOCACY. WHEN WE NEED SENATOR 13 WIENER TO DO I PRESS CONFERENCE THAT MIGHT ADD. I WANT TO MAKE 14 15 SURE COMMISSIONERS ARE APPRISED AND WE'RE NOT GETTING 16 INFORMATION SECOND HAND I WANT TO MAKE SURE STAFF IS AWARE OF THAT I HAVE PROVIDE DIRECTION ON IS MAKE SURE WE'RE NOT 17 SURPRISED THEN KEEP GOING FORWARD. 18

SENATOR WAHAB 6 EARLIER THIS YEAR HAD INTRODUCED A BILL THAT WOULD HAVE 7 8 REQUIRED A STUDY TO CONSOLIDATE ALL THE BAY AREA 27 TRANSIT OPERATORS INTO ONE BILL THAT DID NOT MAKE IT PAST THE FIRST 9 COMMITTEE. AND IT'S NOT FAIR FOR 18 THEM TO BE USING DIFFERENT COST ESCALATION NUMBERS, HAVE A 19 THEY CAN SEE RATES, SO STANDARDIZED SHORTFALLS, GAP SIX HELPED 20 21 MILLION, NOT 750 MILLION, PROBABLY ARGUE UNTIL THE COWS COME HOME BUT THE REAL NUMBER IS, THE FACT IS WE'RE NOT GOING TO 22 KNOW UNTIL WE KNOW. 750 MILLION LEAVES ABOUT 1 MILLION FOR 23 TRANSIT TRANSFORMATION THAT CAN GO TOWARDS THINGS LIKE 24

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EXTENDING CLIPPER START EXTENDING FREE AND REDUCED TRANSFERS
 AMONG OTHER INVESTMENTS.

4 SUE NOACK: IS THERE ANY DISCUSSION THROUGH THIS WHOLE PROCESS
5 ON THIS BALANCE CONCEPT. FOCUSING ON THE TRANSIT

6 TRANSFORMATION, GETTING TO THAT BALANCE CONCEPT THAT WE HAVE
7 WITH THE MORE RURAL AREAS -- I WOULDN'T SAY RURAL, BUT THAT
8 BALANCE, HOW DO WE -- IS THERE ANY DISCUSSION IN THAT, SINCE
9 IT'S SUCH A FOCUS ON THE TRANSIT AGENCIES.

I GUESS THE ANSWER IS THAT SENATOR 14 WIENER'S PRIORITY IS THIS TRANSIT TRANSFORMATION PIECE. AND 15 16 HE'S RECOMMENDING AND WILL BE PUTTING IN THIS FLOOR, AS 17 GEORGIA MENTIONED, HE RECOGNIZES THAT THIS IS SUBJECT TO NEGOTIATION, WE HAVE HEARD PUBLICLY, THE ALLIANCE FOR JOBS AND 18 OTHERS INDICATE THEY WANT TO SEE A SUBSTANTIAL OF THE OVERTURN 19 PACKAGE GO TOWARDS CAPITAL. SENATOR WIENER IS AWARE THAT THERE 20 WILL BE SOME NEGOTIATIONS THAT HAPPENS. 6 JAMES P. SPERING: YOU KNOW, THE COORDINATION AND

CONSOLIDATION, WHATEVER YOU WANT TO CALL IT, WE ALL HAVE A 7 8 DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVE. TO HAVE FIVE OPERATORS IN SOLANO COUNTY THAT AREN'T COORDINATED ISN'T EFFICIENT AND IT DOESN'T COST 9 10 MONEY TO GET THEM TO FUNCTION AS ONE SYSTEM. SO, I HOPE WE HAVE THAT KIND OF STRENGTH IN THIS BILL TO DEAL WITH THOSE 11 TYPES OF ISSUES. BUT THE LAST THING I WANT TO SAY, I JUST WANT 12 TO THANK OUR STAFF. YOU GUYS ARE WORKING VERY HARD, JUGGLING A 13 WHOLE BUNCH OF BALLS IN THE AIR DEALING WITH LEGISLATION AND 14 ADVOCATES. I CAN'T THANK YOU ENOUGH YOU'RE BRINGING FORWARD 15 16 TRANSFORMATION IN THE BAY AREA FOR THE NEXT GENERATION. I WANT TO THANK YOU FOR THE HARD WORK. KEEP IT, AND HOPEFUL WE'LL GET 17 ACROSS THE FINISH LINE. 18

CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: NEXT MONTH. YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE THINGS 6 I'M INTERESTED IN, YOU KNOW, WE TALKED A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE 7 8 PRIORITIES, RIGHT? AND WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE FOR THE BOARD. YOU KNOW, AS THEY MOVE FORWARD WITH THIS LEGISLATION, I WANT TO 9 10 MAKE SURE, AND AS WE AS MTC COMMISSIONERS ARE ABLE TO VOTE ON IT, THAT FROM OUR LENS, I THINK ONE OF THE BIG THINGS THAT'S 11 REALLY IMPORTANT TO SOME OF IT, AND YOU HAVE HEARD IT A COUPLE 12 OF TIMES, I THINK THE FIRST THING IS, WERE WE RELATIVE TO THE 13 BUSINESS COMMUNITY? WERE WE RELATIVE TO THE ALLIANCE FOR JOBS. 14 15 THAT, SORT OF, COMMUNICATION IS REALLY CRITICAL. BECAUSE IF WE 16 DO NOT HAVE THOSE STAKEHOLDERS TO BE QUITE HONEST WITH YOU, THIS MEASURE WILL FAIL. THAT'S JUST THE FACT. AND, SO, I THINK 17 WE'RE ALL ALIGNED IN MAKING SURE -- AND I UNDERSTAND IT'S A 18 PART OF THE PROCESS, RIGHT? WE HAVE TO BE PATIENT, WANT TO 19 MAKE SURE AND THAT'S THE NEXT ITEM WE'RE TAKING IN TERMS OF 20 THE CONCEPT, BUT I THINK WHAT WE NEED TO DO IS REALLY BRING 21 THESE STAKEHOLDERS ALONG. BECAUSE WHAT I'M HEARING FROM 22 DIFFERENT GROUPS AND CONSTITUENCIES, IS THAT THEY ARE REALLY 23 CONCERNED. AND WHAT I DON'T WANT TO DO OR SEE HAPPEN -- I KNOW 24 25 IT WOULDN'T, IS FOR THIS BOARD TO BE PUT IN A POSITION WHERE

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WE HAVE A TAKE A VERY IMPORTANT VOTE AND WE HAVEN'T BROUGHT 1 PEOPLE ALONG. BUT I KNOW YOU AND YOUR STAFF AND GEORGIA ARE 2 3 WORKING EXTREMELY HARD ON THIS. SO, I REALLY THINK WE HAVE A LOT OF WORK TO DO WITH A COUPLE OF THOSE CONSTITUENCIES. I DO 4 5 THINK THE -- IN TERMS OF ADDRESSING THE CLIFF, I THINK IT'S THE MONEY FIGURE IS IMPORTANT. THE ONE THING WOULD SAY IS THE 6 NETWORK MANAGEMENT PIECE OF IT. I MEAN, THE NETWORK MANAGEMENT 7 8 PIECE IS GOING TO BE EXTREMELY IMPORTANT. AND I THINK WE SHOULD CONTINUE WITH THE WORK THAT THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE, 9 10 REGIONAL NETWORK MANAGEMENT CONTINUES TO DO. AND THEN, I THINK, FINALLY, I THINK WE NEED TO REALLY UNDERSTAND THE 11 RETURN TO SOURCE. BECAUSE THIS IS NOT A ONE COUNTY MEASURE 12 IT'S A NINE COUNTY MEASURE. WHEN I SIT ON THE BOARD OF 13 DIRECTORS, SAMTRANS, WE WANT TO UNDERSTAND, AND RIGHTFULLY SO, 14 15 WE WANT TO LOOK AT BIG PICTURE, BUT WHAT'S IN IT FOR US. AND I 16 KNOW THERE HAVE BEEN ANIMATED CONVERSATIONS. JUST LAST NIGHT AT VTA, ABOUT -- YOU KNOW, AND THEY HAVE A SALES TAX, THERE IS 17 A LOT OF CONCERNS OUT THERE, AND I THINK WHAT WE HAVE TO DO IS 18 REALLY GET OUT AHEAD OF IT AND CONTINUE TO DO THE WORK OF THE 19 BUT I'M OPTIMISTIC, ESPECIALLY HEADING UP TO SACRAMENTO. I 20 21 THINK WE HAVE A GREAT GROUP OF PEOPLE, GREAT GROUP OF COLLEAGUES WITH US. BUT THIS IS NOT GONNA BE EASY. AND WE'RE 22 GOING TO REALLY HAVE TO DEPEND ON OUR STAFF FOLLOWING, AS THEY 23 HAVE BEEN DOING. BUT REALLY FOLLOWING SPECIFICS AND THE 24

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DIRECTION OF THIS COMMISSION. AND, SO, WITH THAT, DO WE HAVE 1 2 ANY PUBLIC COMMENT, MARTHA? I SEE ONE CARD. 3 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: YES. WE HAVE COMMENTS IN THE ROOM AND IN 4 5 ZOOM. HOW MUCH TIME WOULD YOU LIKE TO GIVE? 6 7 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: ONE MINUTE. 8 9 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: ONE MINUTE? 10 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: YES. 11 12 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: OKAY. FIRST WE'RE GOING TO TAKE THE ZOOM 13 PEOPLE. BOB ALAN FOLLOWED BY WENDI KALLINS. BOB GO AHEAD AND 14 UNMUTE YOURSELF. ONE MINUTE. 15 16 SPEAKER: THANK YOU COMMISSIONERS. BOB ALAN URBAN HABITAT. 17 WE'RE ENCOURAGED BOOT DIRECTION THAT'S MOVING FORWARD, WITH 18 SEVERAL CAVEATS BEFORE US WE THINK IT'S REALLY INCREDIBLY 19 IMPORTANT THAT THIS MEASURE SUPPORTS AN OUTCOME WHERE WE GET 20 21 TRANSIT SERVICE, NOT JUST RESTORED, BUT THAT WE TRANSFORM IT, AND THAT STARTS WITH HAVING ENOUGH ADEQUATE OPERATIONS MONEY 22 TO HAVE A TRANSFORMATIVE SYSTEM AS WELL AS THE OTHER RIDER 23 CENTRIC REFORMS THAT MANY OF US HAVE SPOKEN ABOUT. SO WE THINK 24 WE'RE GOING IN A GOOD DIRECTION BUT THERE IS GOING TO BE 25

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TRADE-OFFS, LIKE HIGHWAY FUNDING IT'S GOING TO HOLD
 ACCOUNTABLE COMMITMENTS AROUND CLIMATE CHANGE. WE LOOK FORWARD
 TO WORKING WITH FOLKS AND TRYING TO CLARIFY SOME OF THESE
 QUESTIONS AND TO MOVE FORWARD TO GET A MEASURE WE CAN ALL GET
 BEHIND AND SUPPORT. THANK YOU TO STAFF.

7 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: THANK YOU, BOB. NEXT UP IS WENDI KALLINS
8 FOLLOWED BY ZACK DEUTSCH-GROSS. WENDI, YOU HAVE ONE MINUTE.

WENDI KALLINS: THANK YOU. WENDI KALLINS, I SERVE ON THE 10 CITIZEN'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE I ALSO SERVES ON THE CUSTOMER 11 ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO THE REGIONAL MANAGEMENT. SO I HAVE BEEN 12 FOLLOWING THIS CLOSELY. I WANT TO EMPHASIZE WHAT THE LAST 13 SPEAKER SAID, HOW IMPORTANT IT IS THAT THIS BE TRANSFORMATIVE 14 15 AND NOT JUST BRINGING US BACK TO WHERE WE WERE BEFORE THE 16 PANDEMIC. I THINK IF WE WANT TO SEE A MEASURE THAT THE VOTERS WILL APPROVE, THEY WANT TO SEE SOMETHING WHERE THEY DON'T HAVE 17 TO -- WHEN THEY'RE CHANGING SYSTEMS, WAIT A HALF HOUR FOR THE 18 NEXT BUS, WHERE IT TAKES THEM 2 TO 3 HOURS TO GET WHERE THEY 19 WANT TO GO, WHEN IF THEY WERE GOING TO DRIVE, IT WOULD ONLY 20 TAKE THEM A HALF HOUR. AND THAT'S THE KIND OF IMPROVEMENTS 21 THAT PEOPLE ARE BEING LOO -- LOOKING FOR. AND I WANT TO 22 APPLAUD THE STAFF FOR THE WORK THEY'RE DOING AND FOR 23 CONTINUING TO LISTEN TO US AND BRINGING OUR CONCERNS TO THE 24 COMMISSION BODIES AND TO THE LEGISLATURE. THANK YOU. 25

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CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: THANK YOU WENDI. NEXT UP IS ZACK

TO PASS THE MEASURE WE'RE GOING TO NEED SUPPORT FROM 10 ALL NINE COUNTIES DRIVERS AND TRANSIT RIDERS ALIKE WE SUPPORT 11 PRIORITIZING STATE OF GOOD REPAIR FOR LOCAL ROADS AND STREETS 12 AS PART OF THE MEASURE THESE NEEDS ARE UNDERFUNDED IN THE BAY 13 AREA AND SHOULD BE PRIORITY TO THE MEASURE COMING AT THE 14 15 EXPENSE OF OTHER THINGS LIKE HIGHWAY EXPANSION THAT WILL TAKE 16 US FURTHER AWAY FROM CLIMATE GOALS INCREASE NEEDS FOR GOOD REPAIR AND BISECT COMMUNITIES. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR 17 TIME LOOKING FORWARD TO WORKING WITH YOU AS THE MEASURE MOVES 18 FORWARD. 19

24 IAN GRIFFITHS: GOOD MORNING. IAN GRIFFITHS, SEAMLESS BAY AREA.
25 I WANT TO FIRST EXPRESS GRATITUDE TO STAFF FOR WORKING

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COLLABORATIVELY WITH ALL THE STAKEHOLDERS. WE'RE ENCOURAGED BY 1 THE DIRECTION THAT THIS IS GOING AND WE SUPPORT STRENGTHENING 2 3 NETWORK MANAGEMENT WHICH IS CRITICAL TO ACHIEVE TRANSFORMATION. WE RECENTLY DID POLL BE OF THE PUBLIC SUPPORT 4 5 FOR A REGIONAL FUNDING MEASURE IT'S SITTING AT ABOUT 57% RIGHT NOW BUT PEOPLE ARE MOST MOTIVATED TO SUPPORT THIS MEASURE 6 AROUND THE THINGS AROUND TRANSFORMATION AND COORDINATION OF 7 8 SERVICE. SO IT'S REALLY -- IT'S IMPORTANT TO GO BOLD HERE AND TO BE BUILDING THAT COALITION AMONG THE STATE LEGISLATURE 9 THAT'S WILLING TO PROPOSE THOSE BOLD IDEAS. THANK YOU FOR YOUR 10 ONGOING COOPERATION AND SUPPORT FOR THIS, AND LET'S WIN THIS 11 TOGETHER. 12 13 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: THANK YOU. NEXT UP IS DON CECIL. 14 15 16 SPEAKER: HI. GOOD MORNING. DON CECIL, SAN MATEO COUNTY

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION, BETTER KNOWN AS SAMCCTA. 17 THANK YOU TO COMMISSION STAFF THANK YOU TO COMMISSIONERS TODAY 18 FOR YOUR THOUGHTFUL DIALOGUES, QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS. AS ONE 19 OF THE STAKEHOLDER GROUPS THAT GETS REFERENCED AND AS PART OF 20 21 THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY, I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT TO LISTEN TO US, AND I'M NOT GOING TO GIVE YOU THE LAUNDRY LIST OF LIKES 22 AND DISLIKES AT THIS POINT. I'LL JUST ASK YOU ALL TO NEVER 23 FORGET THAT IT IS THE VOTER THAT WE NEED TO SUPPORT US. NOT 24 THE RIDER, NOT THE DRIVER, BUT THE VOTER. AND, SO, POLITICS IS 25

GOOD TO BE WITH YOU IMPORTANT TO SPEAK SIMPLY, AS A USE 14 OF PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION, PAYING TAXES, I APPRECIATE THE 15 16 PREVIOUS SPEAKER ABOUT IMPORTANCE OF THE VOTERS THAT'S WHO IS GOING TO VOTE FOR THIS OUR MESSAGE IS ABSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL, I 17 HEARD THIS TERM BEFORE ABOUT US MAKING POLITICAL SAUSAGE. I 18 MADE SAUSAGE IN MY KITCHEN. ANYWAY, HOW DO WE GET THIS OVER 19 THE LINE. I'M DEPENDING ON YOUR EXPERTISE AS ADVOCATES GETTING 20 UP THERE TO SACRAMENTO GETTING THIS ENABLED SO WE CAN GET ON 21 22 WITH THE PROCESS OF GETTING THIS INTO AN ELECTION. THANK YOU. 23

24 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: ADINA LEVIN.

ADINA LEVIN: ADINA LEVIN, SEAMLESS BAY AREA AND SERVING ON 1 POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL. I WANTED TO ECHO SOME OF THE PREVIOUS 2 3 SPEAKERS IN THANKING WHAT STAFF AND COMMISSIONER JOSEFOWITZ SAID IN TERMS OF SUPPORTING A FLOOR FOR TRANSIT TRANSFORMATION 4 5 AND A FLOOR, NOT A SEALING. IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT WHAT'S BEEN MENTIONED IN TERMS OF APPEALING TO THE VOTERS. AND THE VOTERS 6 SAY CONSISTENTLY, THEY WANT TO SEE TRANSIT STAY THE SAME AND 7 8 NOT DECLINE BUT GET BETTER. AND IN TERMS OF BRINGING STAKEHOLDERS ALONG, I THINK THAT STAKEHOLDERS WOULD UNDERSTAND 9 THAT WE DON'T WANT TO PASS A BALLOT MEASURE HAVE VOTERS VOTE 10 FOR SOMETHING THAT WOULD ALSO WIPED UP WITH BART CUTTING 11 WEEKEND SERVICE. THOSE THINGS ARE NOT COMPATIBLE AND ALSO WITH 12 HAVING COORDINATION THAT NEEDS TO BE AFFIRMED WITH NETWORK 13 14 MANAGEMENT FOR WHAT VOTERS WANT. THANK YOU.

16 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: I GUESS THAT'S ALL THE PUBLIC COMMENT.
17 THAT BRINGS US TO AGENDA ITEM 3C, SENATE BILL 960, WIENER
18 TRANSIT PRIORITY AND COMPLETE STREETS AND THAT'S GEORGIA GANN
19 DOHRMANN.

20

21 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: SO, THIS IS AN ACTION ITEM. WE'RE
22 RECOMMENDING THAT THE COMMISSION SUPPORT SB 960 IN CONCEPT.
23 THE BILL WOULD REQUIRE CALTRANS TO INCORPORATE INFRASTRUCTURE
24 NEEDS FOR ALL ROAD USERS INCLUDING BICYCLISTS, PEDESTRIAN, AND
25 TRANSIT RIDERS INTO THE STATE ASSET MANAGEMENT PLAN, ADOPT A

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TRANSIT PRIORITY POLICY AND THEN MAKE OTHER CHANGES TO 1 STREAMLINE TRANSIT PRIORITY PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION ON STATE 2 3 OWNED ROADS THAT SERVICE THOROUGH FAIRS FOR TOWNS AND CITIES, SO NOT SOMETHING THAT'S ON AN INTERSTATE, OR CLOSE TO A STATE 4 5 HIGHWAY, BUT YOUR MAIN STREET, SAN PABLO E ET CETERA. TRANSIT PRIORITY PROJECTS ARE TREATMENTS LIKE TRANSIT LANES AND 6 TRANSIT SIGNAL PRIORITY HELP MOVE BUSES OUT OF TRAFFIC MAKES 7 8 BUSES FASTER AND MORE RELIABLE ONE OF THE HIGH PRIORITY CUSTOMER FOCUSED IMPROVEMENTS THAT THE COMMISSION IDENTIFIED 9 THROUGH YOUR BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT RECOVERY TASK FORCE AND THE 10 TRANSIT TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN THAT THE REGION SHOULD BE 11 FOCUSED ON THE NEAR-TERM TO BRING RIDERS BACK TO TRANSIT. 12 SINCE ADOPTING THAT TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN BACK IN 2021, 13 MTC, YOUR STAFF HAS BEEN WORKING TO DO A LOT AROUND FASTER AND 14 15 MORE EFFICIENT IMPLEMENTATION OF TRANSIT PRIORITY PROJECTS AND 16 THAT INCLUDES A LOT OF WORK ON TRYING TO ACTUALLY GET REAL PROJECTS ON THE GROUND AND IT HAS ALSO BEEN AROUND CONDUCTING 17 EXTENSIVE OUTREACH TO IDENTIFY BARRIERS AT ALL LEVELS OF 18 GOVERNMENT TO IMPLEMENTING TRANSIT PRIORITY. AND ONE OF THE 19 THINGS THAT STAKEHOLDERS HAVE REALLY CONSISTENTLY IDENTIFIED 20 21 AS A BARRIER IS A REALLY STATE LEVEL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES 22 RELATED TO SECURING TRANSIT PRIORITY PROJECT APPROVALS. 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WORK TO TRY TO RESTRUCTURE AND DO MORE ABOUT SERVING ALL ROAD 1 USERS, BUT SOMETHING LIKE TRANSIT PRIORITY JUST DOESN'T HAVE A 2 3 HOME AT CALTRANS RIGHT NOW, AND, SO, STAKEHOLDERS, YOU KNOW, FOLKS WHO IMPLEMENT PROJECTS AT THE LOCAL LEVEL, AT THE 4 5 TRANSIT AGENCY LEVEL, AND AT THE MTC LEVEL, YOUR OWN STAFF WORKS ON IMPLEMENTING TRANSIT PRIORITY PROJECTS AS WELL. AND 6 ONE OF THE THINGS WE HEAR A LOT IS THE PROCESS IS COMPLEX, 7 8 CONFLICTING STAFF OPINION CAN HOLD UP PROJECT APPROVALS, AND STAFF TURNOVER CAN RESULT IN REVERSAL OR A NEW INTERPRETATION 9 OF PROJECT REOUIREMENTS. THERE ARE MISSED OPPORTUNITIES THAT 10 STAKEHOLDERS HAVE IDENTIFIED THAT ARE RELATED TO IMPLEMENTING 11 AT THIS TIME PRIORITY PROJECTS THAT ARE REALLY RELATED TO --12 THAT COULD BE ADDRESSED BY SOME CHANGES IN RECOMMENDATIONS TO, 13 AT THE CALTRANS LEVEL, TO HELP SPEED UP TRANSIT PRIORITY 14 15 IMPLEMENTATION. SO, WHAT THIS BILL WOULD DO IS IT TRIES TO ADDRESS THOSE CORE PRIORITIES. IT TRIES TO SAY, FIRST, HOW CAN 16 17 WE HELP ENSURE THAT CALTRANS IS RESOURCED IN THIS AREA, AND HAS SPECIFIC GUIDANCE IN PLACE THAT CAN LET CALTRANS EMPLOYEES 18 KNOW HOW AND WHEN TO INTEGRATE TRANSIT PRIORITY INTO THE 19 PROJECT THAT THEY BUILD, AND THEN SECOND, IT TRIES TO EXPEDITE 20 AND STREAMLINE THE APPROVAL OF TRANSIT PRIORITY PROJECTS THAT 21 LOCAL STAKEHOLDERS ARE TRYING TO IMPLEMENT ON CALTRANS OWNED 22 ROADS. SO THE BILL RIGHT NOW THE LANGUAGE IS A LITTLE BIT 23 INFLUX SO IT'S A LITTLE BIT UNUSUAL THAT WE WOULD COME TO ASK 24 YOU FOR SUPPORT IN CONCEPT POSITION BUT THIS IS NAG HAS BEEN 25

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CLEARLY IN THE COMMISSION AIR ADVOCACY PROGRAM FOR A LONG TIME 1 AND IT'S ALSO ALIGNED WITH THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN THAT 2 3 WE WANT TO BE ABLE TO RECOMMEND THAT THE COMMISSION BE NAMED IN SUPPORT, AT LEAST THE SUPPORT IN CONCEPT BEFORE IT GOES TO 4 5 ITS FIRST COMMITTEE WHICH WILL BE EARLY NEXT MONTH. SO THIS 18 HAPPENS ALL OVER THE COUNTRY. SO, THIS BILL WILL HELP BRING A 19 STATE MANDATE TO BUILDING BETTER STREETS. SHOULDN'T JUST BE 20 21 FOR CARS. BUT FOR PEOPLE WALKING AND WHEELCHAIRS, ET CETERA. 22 THANK YOU.
