1 ALFREDO PEDROZA, CHAIR: I DO WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT WE HAVE 2 3 HAD SOME BUSY DAYS. WE WERE IN WASHINGTON, D.C. LAST WEEK ADVOCATING OUR REGIONAL PRIORITIES WE ALSO HAD OPPORTUNITY TO 4 5 GO TO SACRAMENTO THIS WEEK AS WELL. WE'RE SHARING OUR STORY OF REGIONAL PRIORITIES AND THE OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK AS ONE VOICE 6 FOR REGIONAL PRIORITIES THAT CARRIED A LONG WAY FOR FEDERAL 7 8 AND STATE DELEGATIONS. I WANT TO THANK EVERYONE WHO CAME TOGETHER ON THOSE PRIORITIES IT RESONATED WITH OUR FEDERAL AND 9 STATE DELEGATION AT THE NEXT MEETING NEXT MONTH WE'LL PROVIDE 10 A MORE DETAILED REPORT. AT THIS POINT WE'RE GOING TO PRECEDE 11 TO ITEM FIVE AND I'M GOING TO ASK RANDI KINMAN FROM THE POLICY 12 ADVISORY COUNCIL TO GIVE THE REPORT. 13 14 15 RANDI KINMAN: GOOD MORNING CHAIR AND GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS. THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL MET THIS MONTH, AND 16 OUR FIRST BIG TOPIC WAS TRANSIT ORIENTED COMMUNITIES POLICY, 17 WHICH LED TO A RATHER LENGTHY DISCUSSION, A VERY FULL 18 DISCUSSION. SOME OF THE ISSUES THAT WERE RAISED WAS, WERE THE 19 FACT THAT THE NEW POLICY DON'T INCLUDE AREAS WITHOUT FIXED 20 21 GUIDEWAYS AND THE PRESERVATION OF WHAT WERE PREVIOUSLY FIXED GUIDEWAYS FOR THE FUTURE USE. MULTIPLE ISSUES WERE BROUGHT UP 22 REGARDING CHILD CARE IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF HOUSING, MIXED USE 23 AND COMMERCIAL AREAS. BECAUSE THE REALITY IS, WE CANNOT 24

REBUILD OUR COMMUNITIES. WE CANNOT REBUILD OUR WORKFORCE, AND





- 1 WE CANNOT GET PEOPLE OUT OF VEHICLES IF WE DON'T HAVE CHILD
- 2 CARE. IT'S -- AND IT WILL ADDRESS A LOT OF PREEXISTING
- 3 INEQUITIES TO SOMEHOW MAKE ROOM FOR THAT IN ALL OF OUR
- 4 POLICIES. THERE WERE A NUMBER OF ITEMS DISCUSSED A NEED FOR
- 5 COMMITMENT TO BUILD HOUSING ACROSS THE BOARD THAT MEETS THE
- 6 NEEDS OF DISABLED COMMUNITIES WEATHER WHEELCHAIR ACCESS OR
- 7 ACCOMMODATIONS FOR VISUAL OR HEARING IMPAIRED. AND TO MEET THE
- 8 NEED FOR PEOPLE WHO REQUIRED ATTENDANCE. AND IN THE WORDS OF
- 9 KRISTINE F STATED YOU NEVER KNOW WHEN OR WHY YOU MIGHT NEED
- 10 THESE ACCOMMODATIONS. OR WHETHER THEY WILL BE PERMANENT OR
- 11 TEMPORARY. THE COUNCIL UNANIMOUSLY VOTED TO RECOMMEND STAFF TO
- 12 THE COMMISSION HOUSING DEVELOPMENT GUIDELINES, REQUIRING THE
- 13 DEVELOPMENT OF UNIVERSAL DESIGN GUIDELINES ENSURING THAT ALL
- 14 HOUSING PROJECTS BUILT, ALL UNITS ALREADY ADAPTIVELY INCLUDE
- 15 AT ALL LEVELS OF INCOME WE OBVIOUSLY DID NOT DEVELOP
- 16 RECOMMENDATIONS AS TO HOW, BUT IT SEEMS THAT'S WHAT'S MUCH
- 17 NEEDED. IT CAN BE EFFECTIVELY DEVELOPED AS WITH ALL OF OUR
- 18 POLICIES, WHETHER IT'S HOUSING OR LOW-INCOME HOUSING WE NEED
- 19 TO DEVELOP A CARROT AND STICK APPROACH. SECOND ISSUE WAS
- 20 LEGISLATION THE COUNCIL VOTED BY A LARGE MAJORITY TO SUPPORT
- 21 STAFF MOVING FORWARD WITH INVESTIGATING REGIONAL SUPPORT BOTH
- 22 TRANSIT AND HOUSING. WE DIDN'T BIFURCATE THE TWO ISSUES. WE
- 23 WANT STAFF MOVING FORWARD ON BOTH OF THESE TO MEET THE
- 24 DEADLINES THAT ARE REQUIRED FOR ANY FUTURE INITIATIVES ON THE
- 25 BALLOT. OUR LAST ITEM WAS THE ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION NETWORK



- 1 AND THE FIVE YEAR IMPLEMENTATION PLAN, AND I WANT TO THANK
- 2 KARA OBERG FOR BEING PATIENT WAITING TO THE END OF OUR LENGTHY
- 3 MEETING. THIS IS A TOPIC THAT I'M PROBABLY GOING TO BUMP TO A
- 4 DIFFERENT SUBCOMMITTEE SO WE CAN SPEND MORE TIME ON IT AS SHE
- 5 BRINGS HER PRESENTATIONS FORWARD. AND THAT'S MY REPORT FOR
- 6 TODAY.

- 21 RICHARD HEDGES: THANK YOU. RANDI GAVE A GOOD REPORT ON ALL OF
- 22 OUR DISCUSSIONS. THE MAIN TOPICS THAT REALLY TOOK A LOT OF
- 23 TIME WERE ACCESS FOR THE DISABLED AND CHILD CARE. CHILD CHAIR,
- 24 FROM THE VERY BEGINNING OF IT OD WAS PUT ON THE LIST TO
- 25 SOMETHING THAT'S NECESSARY TO KEEP PARENTS FROM GETTING IN



THEIR CARS TO LEAVE THE AREA OF TRANSIT ORIENTED COMMUNITIES 1 FOR CHILD CARE THAT MEANS THEY NEVER GET ON TRANSIT WHEN THAT 2 3 HAPPENS. ON DISABLE ACCESS FOR TRANSFER IN COMMUNITIES --[INDISCERNIBLE] SOMETIME BACK -- HELLO? 4 5 CLERK, KIMBERLY WARD: I MUTED THE PERSON THAT WAS -- GO AHEAD, 6 7 MR. HEDGES. 8 RICHARD HEDGES: -- SOMETIME, BACK, I WOULD SAY PROBABLY 15 9 YEARS AGO, ON THE LACK OF ABILITY ON DISABLE PEOPLE TO LIVE IN 10 11 SOME OF THE ALREADY TRANSIT ORIENTED DEVELOPMENTS WE HAD, AND THE LACK OF ACCESS TO MANY OF THE STATIONS. SO, AT THAT TIME, 12 ON PLANNING GRANTS, MTC HAD ACTED. AND, HOPEFULLY WILL DO MORE 13 WORK TO MAKE SURE THAT THE DISABLED HAS ACCESS TO TRANSIT 14 ORIENTED COMMUNITIES. BECAUSE THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT IN 15 16 ELIMINATING THE NEED FOR ALREADY OVERTAXED DISABLED TRANSPORTATION. THANK YOU. 17 18

- 5 TOGETHER. IT TAKES A BIT OF MUSCLE MEMORY TO GO BACK AND DO
- 6 THESE IN-PERSON TRIPS. SO KUDOS TO THEM FOR DOING AN
- 7 OUTSTANDING JOB. SO WANTED TO LIFT THAT UP. WITH RESPECT TO
- 8 CLIPPER, THE CLIPPER NEXT GENERATION EQUIPMENT IS ROLLING OUT
- 9 IN THE FIELD TO OUR TRANSIT PARTNERS, SMART IS FULLY EQUIPPED
- 10 WITH READERS, AND EQUIPMENT IS BEING INSTALLED ON MUNI
- 11 EQUIPMENT. A LOT OF PROGRESS. ALSO TO NOTE ABAG HELD ITS
- 12 GENERALLY ASSEMBLY ON JUNE 17TH, 2022. THE DAY INCLUDED A
- 13 LISTENING SESSION WITH DELEGATES ON A POTENTIAL 2024 REGIONAL
- 14 HOUSING MEASURE WHICH YOU WILL BE HEARING ABOUT MORE AND WAS
- 15 MENTIONED BY POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL CHAIR KINMAN AS A BIG
- 16 TOPIC OF CONCERN, AS TO HOW WE PREPARED TO CONSIDER A REGIONAL
- 17 MEASURE FOR HOUSING, AS WELL AS FOR TRANSPORTATION. AND, I
- 18 WANTED TO ALSO MAKE A NOTE THAT TONY TAVARES, WHO WAS A FORMER
- 19 DISTRICT FOUR DIRECTOR. HE WAS THE DISTRICT FOUR DIRECTOR WHEN
- 20 I JOINED THE AGENCY, THEN HE WAS PULLED DOWN TO TAKE CARE OF
- 21 LOS ANGELES, DISTRICT SEVEN BUT HE HAS NOT BEEN NOMINATED TO
- 22 BE HEAD OF CALTRANS. EXCITING NEWS FOR OUR FORMER COLLEAGUE
- 23 AND A KIND OF WELCOME HOME. HE KNOWS A LOT ABOUT BATA AND THAT
- 24 WILL BE A PLUS FOR US IN OUR CONTINUING WORK WITH CALTRANS.
- 25 CONGRATULATIONS THERE. HE'S STILL AWAITING CONFIRMATION, BUT



- 1 HOPEFULLY THAT WILL PROCEED A PACE. AND I WOULD LIKE TO END BY
- 2 SAYING THAT DUE TO THE REQUIREMENTS OF A.B. 361, MTC AND ABAG
- 3 AND OUR OTHER ENTITIES WILL NEED TO MEET IN AUGUST. AUGUST IS
- 4 NORMALLY A DARK MONTH BUT WE WILL HAVE TO MAKE PROVISIONS FOR
- 5 THE ACTIONS RELATED TO 361. WE WORK ON A TIME SO THAT WEEKEND
- 6 HAVE ONE OR TWO MEETINGS TO ENSURE THAT WE NEED THE 30-DAY
- 7 MANDATE. SO JUST WANTED TO GIVE A HEADS UP THAT THAT WILL BE A
- 8 BIT OF A PIVOT FROM OUR EXPECTED -- [INDISCERNIBLE] BACK TO
- 9 YOU MR. CHAIR.

- 4 TO SEEING THIS EQUIPMENT GETTING DEPLOYED. I DON'T KNOW WHEN
- 5 I'LL BE ON SMART AGAIN BUT I HAVE BEEN USING CLIPPER SINCE ITS
- 6 INCEPTION A DOZEN YEARS AGO, AND THE READERS ON THE BUSES AND

GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS. 4 5 REBECCA LONG, MTC ABAG STAFF. AS THERESE MENTIONED THERE IS A HAND OUT IN THIS PACKET THAT REVIEWS SOME ADDITIONAL 6 AMENDMENTS THAT WERE REQUESTED AND STAFF IS STILL RECOMMENDING 7 8 A SUPPORT IF AMENDED POSITION. - 1 DISCRETIONARY REVIEW. CERTAIN PROJECTS WOULD BE DEEMED A USE
- 2 BY RIGHT AND SUBJECT TO A STREAMLINED ADMINISTERIAL REVIEW.
- 3 THE NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. UP FRONT, NOTE THAT SINCE THIS
- 4 PRESENTATION WAS PUT TOGETHER AND THAT THIS BILL WAS PRESENTED
- 5 TO THE LEGISLATION COMMITTEE IN JUNE, THE -- WE HAVE WORKED
- 6 WITH THE AUTHOR AND CITIES HAVE WORKED WITH THE AUTHOR AND
- 7 THERE HAVE BEEN NUMEROUS AGREEMENTS THAT REQUIRE UPDATES TO
- 8 THIS SLIDE. IN GENERAL THE BILL WOULD PROVIDE THAT THERE ARE
- 9 TWO TRACKS OR SETS OF CRITERIA THAT WOULD BE REQUIRED FOR
- 10 MIXED INCOME PROJECTS IS THOSE ARE LISTED ON THE RIGHT OF THE
- 11 SLIDE AND THEN 100% AFFORDABLE PROJECTS WOULD GO THROUGH A

- 17 WANTED TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF A.B. 2011 STREAMLINING A WHOLE
- 18 RANGE OF CRITERIA REOUIRED TO BE MET FIRST A DEVELOPER WOULD
- 19 BE REOUIRED TO COMMIT TO AT LEAST MINIMUM 15 UNITS WOULD BE
- 20 DEED RESTRICTED AFFORDABLE UNITS FOR 55 YEARS AND THIS MINIMUM
- 21 IS EITHER 15% OR IF A LOCATE HAS HIGHER THRESHOLD FOR
- 22 INCLUSIONARY ZONING THAT THE HIGHER THRESHOLD WOULD APPLY. ON
- 23 THE LOCATION SIDE THIS IS WHERE THERE HAS BEEN SOME
- 24 SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE BILL. WHAT THE BILL WOULD REQUIRE
- 25 IS THAT ON -- A PROJECT MUST BE LOCATED ON A COMMERCIAL





- 1 CORRIDOR WHICH IS TYPICALLY A 4 TO 6 LANE ROAD AND ON AN URBAN
- 2 INFILL SITE THAT IS ZONED FOR RETAIL OFFICE OR PARKING EXCEPT
- 3 IF A SITE IS WITHIN A SPECIFIC AREA PLAN THE SITE MUST ALLOW
- 4 FOR RESIDENTIAL. SO, THE USE BY RIGHT COMPONENT OF THE BILL

- 10 AREA COVERED BY A SPECIFIC PLAN, BY AN AREA PLAN, PRECISE PLAN
- OR MASTER PLAN. THE OTHER EXEMPTION IN HERE THAT'S IMPORTANT,
- 12 AND THERE HAVE BEEN NUMEROUS CITIES THAT HAVE WORKED WITH
- 13 WICK'S OFFICE IS SPECIFICALLY EXEMPTS INDUSTRIAL LAND FROM
- 14 A.B. 2011 STREAMLINING IN RESPONSE FROM NUMEROUS BAY AREA
- 15 CITIES IS THE BILL DOESN'T GO FAR ENOUGH TO PROTECT JOBS FOR
- 16 INDUSTRIAL AREAS. THE BILL IS WORKING ON REFINEMENTS. BUT THE
- 17 EXISTING AMENDMENTS NEED THE INDUSTRIAL EXEMPTION STRONGER.
- 18 THE LAST PIECE IS SPECIFICS OR PROJECT CHARACTERISTIC THAT A
- 19 PROJECT MUST COMPLY WITH THAT ARE RELATED TO SPECIFIC DESIGN -
- 20 OBJECTIVE DESIGN STANDARDS, DENSITY, HIKE, ET CETERA.
- 21 THERE'S A LIST OF THEM THAT ARE LISTED IN ATTACHMENT B, BUT IN
- 22 SHORT, A MIXED INCOME PROJECT WOULD HAVE TO BE THREE STORIES
- 23 NO HIGHER, MEDIUM DENSITY PROJECT AND WOULD ALLOW FOR
- 24 RESIDENTIAL OR MIXED USE. ANOTHER ITEM IS HOUSING DEVELOPMENTS
- 25 WOULD STILL BE REQUIRED TO MEET LOCAL OBJECTIVE PLANNING





- 1 STANDARDS AND COMPLY WITH DESIGN REVIEW PROCESS SO LONG AS
- 2 THEY DON'T CONFLICT WITH PROVISIONS IN THE BILL, OR PRECLUDE
- 3 THE DEVELOPMENT OF HOUSING. THIS COMPONENT OF THE BILL WAS
- 4 ALSO RECENTLY AMENDED TO ADDRESS THE CONCERN THAT COMMISSIONER
- 5 PAPAN HAD RAISED AT THE COMMITTEE MEETING. SO THERE IS NOW A
- 6 CLEAR REQUIREMENT THAT A FIRST FLOOR RETAIL REQUIREMENT IS AN

- 16 PARCELS, YOU KNOW, FOR HOUSING. AND, SO, AS LONG AS THREE
- 17 SATISFIES THAT, OR ADDRESSES THAT ISSUE, YOU KNOW, I WOULD
- 18 DEFINITELY APPRECIATE THAT AMENDMENT. BUT I GUESS THE OTHER --
- 19 THE QUESTION I HAD, TOO, WAS, IN TERMS OF RHNA GOALS FOR THE
- 20 NUMBER ONE AMENDMENT, ARE WE TALKING ABOUT TOTAL RHNA NUMBERS
- 21 OR ARE WE TALKING ABOUT SATISFYING OR BEING ON TRACK TO
- 22 SATISFY, YOU KNOW, THE DIFFERENT INCOME CATEGORIES? BECAUSE
- 23 THAT'S AN ISSUE WE HAVE HAD. LIKE, WE'RE AT 371% OF OUR ABOVE
- 24 MARKET RATES NUMBERS. BUT YOU KNOW, THE CHALLENGE OF, WE ALL
- 25 KNOW, THE AFFORDABLE IS, THERE'S JUST NOT THE FUNDING STREAMS



TO DO THAT. SO I DON'T WANT US -- IF IT'S BY INCOME CATEGORY, 1 I DON'T THINK ANY CITY IS GOING TO MATCH THAT. SO I JUST 2 3 WANTED TO CLARIFICATION. SO, YEAH, IF STAFF COULD PROVIDE THAT, THAT WOULD BE GREAT. 4 5 ALFREDO PEDROZA, CHAIR: THANK YOU COMMISSIONER. CAN STAFF 6 7 RESPOND TO THE OUESTION? 8 9 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: SURE. WE DON'T SELL OUT IN OUR AMENDMENTS WHETHER OR NOT IT'S PRODUCTION BY ALL CATEGORIES OR 10 RHNA PRODUCTION AS A WHOLE -- NOT RHNA PRODUCTION BUT 11 PERMITTED UNITS AS A WHOLE, I THINK WE'RE OPEN TO FEEDBACK ON 12 WHAT'S APPROPRIATE. 13 14 MARGARET ABE-KOGA: OKAY. SO, IN THAT CASE, YEAH, I WOULD ASK 15 16 THAT WE LOOK AT TOTAL NUMBER. [LAUGHTER] JUST BECAUSE I DON'T THINK ANYONE IS GOING TO QUALIFY IF IT'S BROKEN DOWN BY 17 INCOME. BUT, AT THIS POINT I THINK THERE'S JUST A LOT MORE 18 ISSUES THAT WE WOULD NEED TO ADDRESS. AND, SO, I WOULD ALSO 19 SUPPORT TAKING A NEUTRAL POSITION AT THIS TIME. THANK YOU. 20 21 22 ALFREDO PEDROZA, CHAIR: THANK YOU COMMISSIONER. LET'S GO TO

COMMISSIONER DUTRA-VERNACI AND THEN COMMISSIONER WORTH.

CAROL DUTRA-VERNACI: YES, THANK YOU, CHAIR PEDROZA. MY 1 2 THOUGHTS ON THIS ITEM AS REFLECTED BY SOME OF THE OTHER 3 COMMENTS HERE ARE THE UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES. WHILE THE INTENT OF THE BILL IS NOBLE BECAUSE WE KNOW WE NEED MORE 4 5 HOUSING AND THIS IS AN ATTEMPT TO REACH THAT GOAL, I THINK 6 ABOUT MY OWN CITY, LIKE, I AM SURE IS NOT UNIQUE, AS EXAMPLES, OUR SCHOOL DISTRICT'S ENROLLMENT WAS DECLINING, TORE DOWN 7 8 ALMOST NEW SCHOOLS AND BUILT HOUSING TO HELP WITH FUNDING SCHOOL ACTIVITY SO AS WE CONTINUE TO INCREASE HOUSING WE'RE 9 10 GOING TO HAVE UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES POTENTIALLY OF NOT CONSIDERING SCHOOLS, AND THE DETERIORATING OF ROADS, THE 11 CITIES DON'T HAVING THE MONEY BECAUSE INCREASED TRAFFIC 12 CONTINUES TO IMPACT THAT. ONE SIZE CERTAINLY DOES NOT FIT ALL, 13 AND EXAMPLE OF COMING UP WITH OUR CURRENT HOUSING ELEMENT 14 15 UNION CITY IS LOOKING AT REZONING COMMERCIAL PROPERTIES 16 BECAUSE WE DON'T HAVE THE LANDS TO PUT IT ANYWHERE ELSE. SO, AGAIN, WHILE IT'S NOBLE, I THINK, IN LISTENING TO ALL OF THESE 17 VALID COMMENTS, I WOULD, AS WELL, SUPPORT A NEUTRAL POSITION. 18 19 ALFREDO PEDROZA, CHAIR: THANK YOU COMMISSIONER. COMMISSIONER 20 21 WORTH? 22 AMY R. WORTH: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIR. FIRST OF ALL, I REALLY 23 WOULD LIKE TO THANK STAFF FOR THEIR INCREDIBLE WORK ON THIS. 24

THIS IS PROBABLY THE MOST THOROUGH REPORT ON A BILL THAT I

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- 1 HAVE EVER RECEIVED. AND IT IS A THOUGHTFUL REFLECTION OF THE
- 2 OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES WITH THIS BILL. SO, I REALLY
- 3 APPRECIATE THAT. WE WERE UP IN SACRAMENTO ON MONDAY, AND
- 4 MEETING WITH LEGISLATORS AND HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO SIT DOWN
- 5 WITH ASSEMBLYMEMBER WICKS TO TALK ABOUT OUR PRIORITIES FOR
- 6 BOTH TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING. LAST WEEK, ON THURSDAY NIGHT,
- 7 THE EAST BAY DIVISION, LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES HAD THE
- 8 OPPORTUNITY TO MEET WITH THE DISTRICT DIRECTOR AND WE HAD
- 9 OPPORTUNITY TO TALK ABOUT THIS BILL ONE REQUEST WAS THAT WE
- 10 HAD OPPORTUNITY TO ENGAGEMENT IN DIRECT CONSERVATIONS WITH HER
- 11 OFFICE IN REGARDS TO THE BILL AND THE NEXT MORNING THAT
- 12 HAPPENED. AND THE THERE ARE ONGOING CONVERSATIONS RIGHT NOW
- 13 WITH THE LEAGUE OF CITIES AND ASSEMBLYMEMBER WICKS' OFFICE ON
- 14 AMENDMENTS TO THIS BILL TO ADDRESS SOME OF THE LOCAL CITY'S
- 15 CONCERNS ABOUT IT. BUT THE CHALLENGES, THE REALITY IS WE'RE
- 16 NOT PRODUCING AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THIS REGION. IF YOU LOOK
- 17 AT THE STATE'S STATISTICS AROUND RHNA PRODUCTION OVER THE LAST
- 18 THREE HOUSING ELEMENTS THE PERCENTAGES ARE DROPPING
- 19 PRECIPITOUSLY. AND WHILE I COMPLETELY SUPPORT AND HAVE SPENT
- 20 MANY YEARS ADVOCATING IN SACRAMENTO FOR LOCAL CONTROL, I THINK
- 21 THAT THERE'S A REAL BALANCE THAT CAN BE ACHIEVED THROUGH THIS
- 22 BILL. AND ASSEMBLYMEMBER WICKS WORKING WITH THE LOCAL
- 23 GOVERNMENT TO ENDORSE THESE AMENDMENTS, I IS REALLY AN
- 24 IMPORTANT ELEMENT IN IT. WE ALL KNOW THAT, FOR EXAMPLE, WE
- 25 ALL, CITIES ARE HAVING CHARGES NOW IN DEVELOPING OUR HOUSING





- 1 ELEMENTS WITH THE NEW RHNA REQUIREMENTS. AND ONE OF THE
- 2 ELEMENTS THAT THIS BILL, IMPORTANTLY ADDRESSES IS FOR THE
- 3 CITIES THAT HAVE CREDIT FOR THE RHNA REZONING THAT THEY ARE
- 4 DOING IN COMMERCIAL AREAS. BECAUSE ONE OF THE CHARGES THAT
- 5 MANY OF OUR CITIES ARE GOING TO FACE IS THE ABLE TO HAVE OUR
- 6 HOUSING ELEMENT APPROVED BY THE STATE BECAUSE OF THIS. AND
- 7 WE'RE LOOKING IN THE BACK OF EVERY DRAWER TO FIND EVERY PIECE
- 8 OF LAND TO DO HOUSING DEVELOPMENT. THE OTHER ISSUE IS BECAUSE
- 9 OF THE COST OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING AT A MILLION DOLLARS A DOOR,
- 10 THERE IS NOT GOING TO BE A LAND RUSH TO REZONE ALL THE
- 11 COMMERCIAL PROPERTY IN EVERY CITY. IT IS GOING TO BE A SLOW
- 12 LABORIOUS PROCESS. WE HAVE WORKED HARD FOR THE MONEY IN
- 13 CALIFORNIA -- IN THE STATE, TO FUND AFFORDABLE HOUSING, BUT WE
- 14 NEED TO DEAL WITH THE REGULATORY ELEMENTS OF IT, SO THAT WE
- 15 CAN BUILD THIS. ONE OF THE AREAS THAT WE TALKED ABOUT IS
- 16 TEACHER HOUSING. YOU KNOW, WE HAVE A SHORTAGE OF TEACHER
- 17 HOUSING. DISTRICTS CANNOT HIRE MATH TEACHERS BECAUSE THEY
- 18 CANNOT AFFORD TO LIVE IN THE BAY AREA. MTC AND ABAG HAVE BEEN
- 19 REAL LEADERS IN THIS. I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE SUPPORT
- 20 THIS BILL WITH AMENDMENTS. I THINK THERE ARE OBVIOUSLY -- WE
- 21 HAVE TALKED ABOUT SOME OF THE LOCAL PROTECTIONS AROUND
- 22 STREAMLINING WHICH MANY OF THE ELEMENTS ARE ALREADY INCLUDED
- 23 THERE ARE MORE TO BE INCLUDED AS STAFF HAS INDICATED AND
- 24 SECOND OF ALL, THE GRAND BARGAIN ON LABOR ISSUES THAT I AM
- 25 HOPEFUL THE CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE WILL BE ABLE TO ADDRESS



- 1 THIS YOU REMEMBER IS. BECAUSE WE REALLY HAVE TO BE PRODUCING
- 2 HOUSING. AND I REALLY THINK THAT THERE ARE A LOT OF
- 3 ACCOMMODATIONS THAT ARE IN THIS BILL. AND, AGAIN MORE TO COME.
- 4 IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE AS LEADERS BOTH IN TRANSPORTATION AND
- 5 FUNDING AND GRAPPLING WITH THESE ISSUES IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE
- 6 SUPPORT THIS BILL WITH THE AMENDMENTS THAT ARE INCLUDED IN OUR
- 7 STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION.

- 9 ALFREDO PEDROZA, CHAIR: THANK YOU COMMISSIONER WORTH. GREAT
- 10 COMMENTS. LET ME GO TO COMMISSIONER SCHAFF THEN COMMISSIONER
- 11 LICCARDO.

- 13 LIBBY SCHAFF: THANK YOU, CHAIR PEDROZA. I -- IT'S INTERESTING,
- 14 WHEN I LISTEN TO PEOPLE WHO HAVE JUST SAID THEY'RE GOING TO
- 15 VOTE NO. IT SOUNDS LIKE YOU HAVE SOME ISSUES WITH THE
- 16 TECHNICALITY OF THE MEASURE, BUT NOT THE INTENT. AND IF THAT
- 17 IS, INDEED, THE CASE, I WOULD URGE YOU TO ABSTAIN, RATHER THAN
- 18 VOTING NO. IF YOU, INDEED, DO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THERE IS A
- 19 HOUSING CRISIS, AND THAT WE MUST TAKE COORDINATE STEPS AT THIS
- 20 MOMENT TO ADDRESS IT, THEN I WOULD URGE YOU TO ABSTAIN, RATHER
- 21 THAN VOTE NO. FROM MY PERSPECTIVE, I BELIEVE THAT
- 22 ASSEMBLYMEMBER WICKS DESERVES OUR FULL SUPPORT. SHE HAS VERY
- 23 BRAVELY NEGOTIATED A NEW PATH WITH LABOR STANDARDS AND
- 24 ADDRESSING WAGE THEFT AND PREVAILING WAGE IN A WAY THAT
- 25 ACTUALLY WILL NOT QUASH AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT. AND





- 1 SHE REALLY DESERVES OUR SUPPORT FOR HER WORK. I CAN SAY, FROM
- 2 EXPERIENCE, THAT THIS TYPE OF STREAMLINING IS SOMETHING THAT
- 3 THOSE OF US WHO HAVE HOMEKEY PROJECTS IN OUR JURISDICTION, SAW
- 4 THE INCREDIBLE IMPACTS OF. IN OAKLAND, WE HAD AN ABANDONED
- 5 COLLEGE DORMITORY THAT WE RECEIVED HOMEKEY FUNDING FOR BUT
- 6 BECAUSE OF THE STREAMLINING THAT NORMALLY WOULD HAVE TAKEN US
- 7 ONE YEAR TO CONVERT AND GET APPROVAL PROCESS, WE WERE ABLE TO
- 8 CONVERT, RENOVATE, AND ACTUALLY GET OCCUPIED IN JUST THREE
- 9 MONTHS WE WERE ABLE TO PROVIDE FAMILIES AND SENIORS WITH A
- 10 ROOF OVER THEIR HEAD IN TIME FOR CHRISTMAS. IT WAS AMAZING.
- 11 THIS IS TRULY A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO SUPPORT HOUSING
- 12 DEVELOPMENT AND GOOD PAYING JOBS BECAUSE OF THE WAY THAT THIS
- 13 VERY INNOVATIVE IS IMPRESSIVE PIECE OF LEGISLATION HAS BEEN
- 14 STRUCTURED. THESE COMMON SENSE AMENDMENTS WHICH MANY OF US
- 15 PUSH FOR, INCLUDING THE RECOGNITION OF LOCAL CONTROL. LOCAL
- 16 CONTROL, SOMETHING THAT PEOPLE TALK ABOUT OFTEN WHEN THESE
- 17 ISSUES COME UP IS BEING RESPECTED BY ALLOWING AREA-SPECIFIC
- 18 PLANS TO TRUMP, OR SUPERSEDE THIS LEGISLATION. THAT IS
- 19 HONORING LOCAL CONTROL. AND THAT IS WHY I TRULY BELIEVE IT IS
- 20 INCREDIBLY IMPORTANT FOR US TO RESPECT THE RECOMMENDATION OF
- 21 OUR PROFESSIONAL STAFF TO RESPECT THE INCREDIBLE WORK THAT
- 22 ASSEMBLYMEMBER WICKS HAS DONE TO ACTUALLY FIND A WAY TO HAVE
- 23 BOTH AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND GOOD JOBS AND GOOD JOB STANDARDS,
- 24 AND TO RECOGNIZE THAT IN ORDER TO MEET THOSE RHNA GOALS THAT
- 25 WE JUST SET FOR EACH OF OUR JURISDICTIONS, WE ARE GOING TO

- 5 THEN TO ABSTAIN RATHER THAN VOTE NO. I APPRECIATE EVERYONE'S
- 6 CONSIDERATION OF MY COMMENTS. THANK YOU.

- 9 COMMISSIONER LICCARDO THEN TO PUBLIC COMMENT.

- 11 SAM LICCARDO: THANK YOU. I THINK IT'S BEEN A VERY GOOD
- 12 DISCUSSION, AND APPRECIATE THE COMMENTS ON ALL SIDES,
- 13 PARTICULARLY OF MOST TWO RECENT COMMISSIONERS, COMMISSIONER
- 14 WORTH AND MAYOR SCHAFF. YOU KNOW, I HEARD FROM SEVERAL
- 15 COLLEAGUES THAT, HEY, WE'RE DOING THIS ALREADY. AND I DON'T
- 16 DOUBT THEIR ACCURACY OR SINCERITY IN MAKING THOSE STATEMENTS,
- 17 BUT IF IT'S TRUE, THEN YOU GOT NOTHING TO LOSE WITH THIS
- 18 LEGISLATION. ON THE OTHER HAND IF WE'RE NOT DOING THIS BLUNTLY
- 19 AS A REGION WE'RE NOT DOING THIS BLUNTLY, AS I A REGION WE'RE
- 20 FAILING BY HOUSING, FAILING BY A LOT. IT SEEMS TO ME WE NEED
- 21 TO EM EMBRACE WHAT I SEE AS THE MOST POTENT LEGISLATIVE TOOL
- 22 WE HAVE SEEN YESTERDAY. I APPRECIATE THAT WE HAVE GOT AN
- 23 AUTHOR IN CHAIR WICKS WHO IS VERY RECEPTIVE TO THE INPUT OF MY
- 24 CITY, AND OF OUR REGION, AND I THINK OF MANY CITIES I HAVE
- 25 ALREADY HEARD FROM SEVERAL COLLEAGUES IN OTHER CITIES THAT



- 1 WE'RE ACTIVELY WORKING WITH ASSEMBLYMEMBER STAFF ON REVISIONS
- 2 TO ENSURE THAT WE REALLY GET TO THE INTENDED OUTCOME. BUT THE
- 3 REALITY IS, NO MATTER HOW MUCH WE THINK WE'RE DOING ALREADY --
- 4 LAST NIGHT I EMERGED FROM A CITY COUNCIL MEETING WHERE WE
- 5 HEARD UPSET NEIGHBORS OBJECT TO THE FACT THAT THE COUNCIL
- 6 CONVERTED AN OLD SHOPPING CENTER TO A THOUSAND UNITS OF
- 7 HOUSING AT 100 UNITS TO THE ACHOR AND WE ALSO APPROVED
- 8 INVESTING IN CITY FUNDING IN FIVE SEPARATE AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- 9 PROJECTS ALL LAST NIGHT AND NONE OF THAT IS NEARLY ENOUGH. SO
- 10 WE'RE ALL DOING A LOT. BUT WE'RE ALL FAILING COLLECTIVELY AS A
- 11 REGION, UNLESS WE CAN EMBRACE NEW TOOLS THAT IT WILL ENABLE US
- 12 TO GET THROUGH THE EXTRAORDINARY CHALLENGE WE HAVE. WE ALL
- 13 FACE THIS CHALLENGE IN OUR REGION THERE ARE OFFSETTING
- 14 CONCERNS WE HAVE ABOUT THE FISCAL SUSTAINABILITY OF OUR CITIES
- 15 AND OUR LOCAL CONTROL AND URBAN PLANNING. BUT, THE MORE WE
- 16 CONTINUE TO CLING TO IS OUTMODED APPROACHES TO HOW WE'RE GOING
- 17 TO ADDRESS THIS PROBLEM AND REFUSE TO LOOK FOR NEW TOOLS, WE
- 18 WILL CONTINUE TO DO EXACTLY THE SAME AS WE HAVE DONE FOR THE
- 19 LAST SEVERAL YEARS, WHICH, I THINK IN THE VIEW OF ALL OF OUR
- 20 RESIDENTS, HAS LARGELY BEEN A FAILURE. I HOPE WE CAN BE OPEN
- 21 TO THIS. UNDOUBTEDLY THERE IS MORE TO DISCUSS WITH REGARD TO
- 22 AMENDMENTS AND UNFORTUNATELY WE HAVE AN AUTHOR WHO IS OPEN TO
- 23 THE CONVERSATIONS.



ALFREDO PEDROZA, CHAIR: THANK YOU, VICE CHAIR LICCARDO. LET'S 1 2 CLOSE COMMENTS WITH COMMISSIONER SPERING, RABBIT, THEN WE'LL 3 GO TO PUBLIC COMMENT. 4 5 JAMES P. SPERING: THANK YOU. GEORGIA, HAS ABAG TAKEN A 6 POSITION ON THIS BILL? 7 8 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: ABAG HAS NOT TAKEN A POSITION ON THIS 9 BILL YET. WE DID NOT HAVE QUORUM IN THE LEGISLATION COMMITTEE 10 AND WE DIDN'T END UP BRINGING -- WE'RE BRINGING IT TO ABAG IN JULY. 11 12 JAMES P. SPERING: I HAVE A CONCERN OF THIS WEIGHING IN AHEAD 13 OF THAT DISCUSSION. WHAT WAS BEING DISCUSSED AT ABAG A LOT OF 14 CONTROVERSY, A LOT OF CONCERN. I WOULD JUST HATE TO SEE -- I 15 GUY WITH BOTH SIDES, THE BIGGER CITIES, I CERTAINLY UNDERSTAND 16 THEIR ISSUES AND CONCERNS AND SOME OF THE OTHER CONCERNS OF 17 THE SMALLER CITIES, BUT YOU KNOW, IF WE GET OUT THE SYNC WITH 18 ABAG, YOU KNOW, I THINK THERE IS ENOUGH PRESSURE THERE, 19 POLITICAL PRESSURE THERE TO, SORT OF, HAVE -- GO FORWARD. AND 20 21 GETTING CONSENSUS MAKING SURE WE ALL SUPPORT -- I THINK THE BILL IS GOING IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION FOR ME PERSONALLY, BUT WE 22 HAVE GOT TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE THIS BROAD SUPPORT AND I WOULD 23 JUST HATE TO SEE US TAKE THIS POSITION AND THEN ABAG COMING UP 24 25 WITH SOME OPPOSE POSITION OR ADDING CONDITIONS THAT, YOU KNOW,



- 1 WE REALLY HAVEN'T HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO VET OR GO THROUGH. SO,
- 2 YOU KNOW, I JUST HOW MUCH WE KIND OF FIND SOME MIDDLE GROUND
- 3 HERE. AND I HATE TO SEE COMMISSIONERS VOTING NO OR ABSTAINING
- 4 ON THIS BILL. SO, I THINK WE HAVE TO BE MORE UNITED AND GET IN
- 5 SYNC WITH THE ABAG CONCERNS ABOUT THIS ISSUE. THANK YOU, MR.
- 6 CHAIRMAN.

- 10 DAVID RABBIT: THANK YOU. I SHARE THE CONCERNS EXPRESSED BY

- 12 SUPPORT. AND I WOULD HOPE THAT THOSE WHO HAVE RESERVATIONS
- 13 ABOUT THIS PARTICULAR BILL, I THINK, I ALSO SHARE WHAT
- 14 COMMISSIONER LICCARDO SAID, THE TRUTH IS, THE MATTER -- OF THE
- 15 MATTER IS THAT WE'RE FAILING ON THIS FRONT. AND DOING THE SAME
- 16 THING OVER AND OVER AGAIN IS NOT GOING TO SOLVE THE PROBLEM.
- 17 AND I CAN TELL YOU THIS, AS WORKING IN MANY OF YOUR
- 18 JURISDICTIONS OVER THE COURSE OF 35 YEARS AS AN ARCHITECT IN
- 19 MANY OF THESE TYPES OF PROJECTS IT'S BECOME INCREASINGLY
- 20 DIFFICULT MORE EXPENSIVE AND TAKES LONGER WE CAN ALL SAY WE

- 25 DO TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE GOING FORWARD THAT WE CAN GET THESE



- 1 UNITS BUILT. I TAKE THIS PERSONALLY, I HAVE KIDS THAT WOULD BE

THE STONES TOWN SHOPPING CENTER IN SAN FRANCISCO IS BEING 12 DEVELOPED WITH MIXED USE TWO LARGE PROJECTS BROUGHT BY SAN 13 FRANCISCO GIANTS AND PIER 70 HAVE 40% AFFORDABLE HOUSING 14 REQUIREMENTS FOR THOUSANDS AND THOUSANDS OF UNITS.
