




# **Mobility Hubs Program Overview**

- Mobility hubs = community anchors that enable travelers of all backgrounds and abilities to access multiple transportation options - including shared scooters, bicycles and cars, and transit – as well as supportive amenities in a cohesive space, oriented to the customer
- Pilots launched September 2021
  - 7 projects funded at \$2.7 million total

# Proposed Direction for the Grant Call

- The grant call builds on lessons learned from the recent pilot program to allow a greater number of hubs to be implemented throughout the region
- Increasing the size of capital grants to up to \$3 million will allow inclusion of multiple features that create a cohesive, community-oriented hub
- Focusing on hub locations in Priority Development Areas (PDAs), Transit Oriented Community (TOC) Policy compliance areas or in Equity Priority Communities (EPCs)






#### **Parking Management Grant Program Overview**

- Awarded parking management grants to local jurisdictions in 2015
- Resources for local jurisdiction staff to develop and implement parking policies provided in the Parking Policy Playbook



# Parking Management Grants: Planning and Capital

- To better understand local parking needs, staff invited public agencies to submit implementation project ideas in July 2022, and received over 20 submittals in response
- In addition to capital, many jurisdictions expressed need for planning support. Staff
  is therefore proposing the following approach to support local jurisdiction parking
  needs:

#### 1. Capital grants (up to \$13 million)

Evaluate and recommend awards to committee in early Spring 2023

#### 2. Planning grants (up to \$2 million)

Issue call for planning projects


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#### **Letter of Interest (LOI)**

#### **Potential Investment Categories (Draft)**

- Charging Infrastructure Implementation (\$35m-\$40m)
  - Transit station lots
  - Partnerships with BAAQMD, Community Choice Aggregators (CCAs)
  - Focus on Equity Priority Communities (EPCs)
- Electric Bikeshare (\$15m-\$20m)
  - Electrifying docking stations
  - Increase in regional e-bike fleet with focus on BayWheels
  - Focus on EPCs
- Public Fleet Electrification (\$8m)
  - Municipal fleet vehicle charging infrastructure
- Regional Transportation Electrification Program Evaluation and Strategic Plan (\$2m)
