MY COMMENTS ARE, SORT OF, A COLLECTION OF WHAT STAFF HAS SEEN SOME OF THIS AND WHERE I 6 THINK WE NEED TO GO AND HOW DO WE REGROUP ON THIS ISSUE. TRANSIT PASS NOW BEING TESTED BY A NUMBER OF LARGE EMPLOYERS 1 AND PROVING INCREDIBLY POPULAR, AND WE POSE TO OFFER FREE 2 3 TRANSFERS WITH THE LAUNCH OF THE NEXTGEN CLIPPER. A LOT HAS CHANGED OVER THE PAST FOUR YEARS. ONE THING THAT HASN'T 4 5 CHANGED IS THAT THE BAY AREA TRANSIT STILL FACES A CHALLENGING FUTURE THAT IN SOME CORRIDORS WILL BUILD ON TO A CRISIS IF 6 SOMETHING ISN'T DONE. IT'S A CRISIS THAT WON'T GO AWAY ON ITS 7 8 OWN. THE COMMISSION HAS A RESPONSIBILITY TO ADDRESS REGIONAL PROBLEMS AND BUILD A REGIONAL CONSENSUS THAT WE ALL CAN 9 SUPPORT. LASTLY, WE MUST RECOGNIZE THAT OUR POST COVID 10 EMPLOYMENT PATTERNS ARE HERE TO STAY AND CREATE A MUCH MORE 11 DIFFICULT CHALLENGE FOR SOME AGENCIES AS OPPOSED TO OTHERS. 12 THAT'S WHY WE'RE HERE TODAY. AND, OF COURSE, OUR FOCUS IS ON 13 BART. I'M TALKING ABOUT THE SITUATION THAT BART IS FACING. I 14 15 THINK WE ALL CAN AGREE BART'S FISCAL CLIFF NEEDS TO BE 16 ADDRESSED. BART'S PRIOR BUSINESS MODEL WAS ACUTELY DISRUPTED BY COVID AND IT'S ALMOST CERTAIN THAT THIS DISRUPTION IS AS 17 PERMANENT AS FAR AS THE EYE CAN SEE. AS A RESULT, THIS 18 COMMITTEE IS GOING TO DELVE DEEPLY INTO BART ISSUES. AND THE 19 DOMINOS WILL START FALLING IF WE CAN'T FORGE THE CONSENSUS 20 21 NEEDED TO NOT ONLY PASS LEGISLATION BUT EVEN HARDER TASK OF 22 CONVINCING VOTERS TO PASS THE MEASURE. WHERE WE LIVE AND WORK, TRANSIT MATTERS TO ALL OF US. OUR 1 POLLS OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS HAVE SHOWN THAT THE BAY AREA 2 3 VOTERS GET THIS, REGARDLESS OF HOW THEY TRAVEL. I'M ASKING MY FELLOW COMMISSIONERS TO SET ASIDE THE ARGUMENTS OF THE RECENT 4 5 PAST SO WE CAN ALL EMERGE AS PART OF THE SOLUTION. I FEEL VERY STRONGLY THAT ANY SOLUTION CANNOT BE AT THE EXPENSE OF ANY 6 COUNTY IN THIS REGION. THIS RESET IS ALSO AN IMPORTANT MOMENT 7 8 TO HEAL THE DIVISIONS THAT EMERGED AND TO REASSURE MY COLLEAGUES THAT THEIR CONCERNS WERE HEARD AND ACTED UPON. 9 THAT'S WHY WE'RE HERE TODAY BECAUSE WE DID HEAR FROM OUR 10 FELLOW COMMISSIONERS AND WE CERTAINLY WANT TO CORRECT AND 11 ADDRESS THOSE ISSUES. THIS IS, IN PART, WHY WE REALLY ARE HERE 12 TODAY. A BETTER TRANSPORTATION NETWORK IS GOING TO TAKE MORE 13 MONEY FOR TRANSIT OPERATIONS TO BE SURE, BUT WE HAVE TO KEEP 14 15 OUR MINDS OPEN FOR OTHER PRIORITIES THE VOTERS VALUE IN ORDER 16 TO CREATE A MEASURE THAT IS WIDELY SUPPORTED. AND AS YOU KNOW, THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF CONTROVERSY, TRANSIT ONLY, DO WE 17 INCLUDE INFRASTRUCTURE, SO FORTH. BUT WE, THIS COMMISSION HAVE 18 TO SORT THAT OUT, FIND THE SWEET SPOT AND FIND THE BALANCE AND 19 SUPPORT SOMETHING WE CAN ALL SUPPORT. CHAIRMAN, I'M HONORED THAT YOU ASSIGNED ME TO THIS [LAUGHTER] I WILL -- YOU KNOW, I'M GOING 4 5 TO WORK VERY HARD, THAT ALL THE COUNTIES, YOU KNOW, ARE INVOLVED IN THIS DISCUSSION, AND THAT WE ADDRESS THE ISSUES 6 THAT ARE BEING RAISED. AND I KNOW YOU ALL KNOW THIS, AS MTC COMMISSIONERS, AND I THINK IT'S SO IMPORTANT FOR 4 5 ALL STAKEHOLDERS, AND THE TRANSIT OPERATORS AND THE COUNTIES, AND THE PUBLIC TO UNDERSTAND THAT WE ARE POTENTIALLY PLAYING 6 WITH FIRE AS WE GO THROUGH THIS. WE, 13 YOU KNOW, I HAVE LEARNED OVER THE LAST 15 YEARS IN HAVING 14 15 SERVED ON THE COMMISSION FOR SIX YEARS, THAT REGIONAL 16 TRANSPORTATION FUNDING POLITICS IS SOME OF THE TOUGHEST 17 POLITICS IN EXISTENCE. EVEN THOUGH BEFORE THE 12 PANDEMIC SO MANY OF OUR TRANSIT SYSTEMS WERE FACING PERSISTENT 13 OPERATING FINANCING CHALLENGES. AND SO, IT'S A WAY FOR US TO 14 15 SHORE UP LONG-TERM. IT'S A WAY FOR US TO INVEST IN MODERNIZING 16 AND INTEGRATING THE SYSTEM.
