ANY PUBLIC COMMENT RECEIVED RECEIVED WITH THIS ITEM AGENDA 2 BY 5:00 P.M. YESTERDAY INTO 6 7 THE RECORD. 8 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: THERE WERE NO COMMENTS. IN THE BOOED ROOM, 9 10 THERE ARE NO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. AND THE ZOOM ATTENDEE SPACE, THERE ARE NO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC FOR PUBLIC COMMENT. 11 THANK YOU. 12 13 PRES, BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO MUCH. AT THIS TIME I'LL CLOSE 14 15 PUBLIC COMMENT AND MOVE OVER TO OUR EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER 16 ANNOUNCEMENTS. DO WE HAVE ANY ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM BOARD MEMBERS? SEEING NONE, WE WILL MOVE ON TO THE ABAG PRESIDENT'S 17 REPORT. AND I WOULD LIKE TO WELCOME ALL OF MY COLLEAGUES WHO 18 ARE FIRST MEET -- TO OUR FIRST MEETING OF 2024. I AM 19 INCREDIBLY EXCITED FOR WHAT THIS NEW YEAR MEANS FOR ABAG. AND 20 21 I WILL SAY THAT ONE OF THE THINGS THAT REALLY COMING HERE AND BEING ABLE TO SERVE AS YOUR -- AS YOUR PRESIDENT AND KNOWING 22 THE WORK THAT WE'VE DONE THAT WE STARTED, ACTUALLY FIFE YEARS 23 AGO LAST NIGHT, AND THAT WAS WITH THE COSTA COMPACT THAT WILL 24 25 LEAD US TO A VERY, VERY PIVOTAL YEAR FOR THIS BOARD AND FOR

TWO MAJOR INITIATIVES THAT WE HAVE AND THAT IS PLAN BAY AREA 1 2 2050 PLUS AND OUR HOUSING BOND MEASURE THAT IS BEING TAKEN UP BY BAFA SO DON'T LOSE A SIGHT OF THAT EVER IN GOVERNMENT. WE 3 SOMETIMES MAY SEEM LIKE WE MOVE SLOW, BUT FIFE YEARS FROM VOTE 4 5 OF CASA COMPACT TO INITIATIVE IS ACTUALLY NOT THAT BAD. I'M PRETTY PROUD OF THE WORK THAT OUR STAFF HAS BEEN ABLE TO DO 6 AND THAT OUR COLLEAGUES COLLECTIVELY HAVE DONE THROUGHOUT THE 7 8 YEARS. IN MARCH, THE EXECUTIVE BOARD WILL CONDUCT THE BULK OF ITS MEETING AS A WORKSHOP ON THE HOUSING BOND MEASURE IN 9 ADVANCE OF AN APRIL DECISION OF WHETHER TO PLACE THE REVENUE 10 MEASURE ON THE NOVEMBER BALLOT SO PLEASE MAKE SURE YOU ARE IN 11 ATTENDANCE ON THE MARCH 21 MEETING AND APRIL 18 MEETING 12 BECAUSE THAT WILL BE ABSOLUTELY PIVOTAL AS WE MAKE A DECISION 13 TO MOVE COLLECTIVELY TOGETHER. NO WAY WE CAN HAVE SUCCESS IF 14 15 WE ARE NOT DOING THIS ON A UNIFIED FRONT. WE WILL RECEIVE A 16 REPORT AND TAKE ACTION ON THE JOINT MTC-ABAG ADVOCACY PROGRAM 17 AND WE WILL RECEIVE AN INFORMATIONAL REPORT ON ADVANCING NATURE-BASED SHORELINE SOLUTIONS. BUT BEFORE WE GET TO OUR 18 BUSINESS, WE'VE HAD SOME CHANGES HERE AT THE FRONT. REALLY, WE 19 JUST EXCHANGED SEATS. THAT'S PRETTY MUCH WHAT WE DID. AND 20 21 REALLY TRYING TO THINK -- WE NO LONGER HAVE AN IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT BECAUSE OUR IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT IS OUR VICE 22 PRESIDENT. AND IT IS AN INCREDIBLE HONOR TO BE ABLE TO SERVE 23 ALONGSIDE MAYOR OF BERKELEY JESSE ARREGUIN AND TO RECOGNIZE 24 25 HIM FOR HIS WORK AT ABAG AS OUR PRESIDENT OVER THE LAST FOUR

YEARS. SO I'VE -- I'M GOING TO RUN THROUGH AND SHARE A LITTLE 1 BIT ABOUT YOUR LEADERSHIP. BUT I WILL TELL YOU THAT THE ONE 2 3 THAT STICKS OUT TO ME THE MOST IT THAT ON MARCH 13, 2020, WE WERE ALL SITTING HERE AT AN ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE MEETING 4 5 AND WE WERE TOLD TO LEAVE THE CITY. AND WHAT TRANSPIRED FROM THAT MOMENT IN 2020 AND WHAT WE WERE TOLD TO BE TWO WEEKS 6 TURNED INTO TWO MONTHS, TURNED INTO TWO YEARS. THE LEADERSHIP 7 8 THAT YOU BROUGHT AND THE FORWARD-THINKING TO SAY, LIFE HAS CHANGED AT THIS POINT FORWARD, AND WE NEED TO INCORPORATE 9 10 THOSE CHANGES THAT HAVE HAPPENED INTO OUR REGION, INTO EVERYTHING THAT WE DO. SO I WANT TO -- I WANT TO START WITH 11 THAT. THEN, THERE'S THE TECHNICALITIES OF -- I DID NOT KEEP A 12 TALLY OF ALL YOUR MEETINGS, BUT THAT'S IMPRESSIVE. I KNOW. I 13 SAT WITH YOU IN MOST ALL OF THEM, AND IT IS ABSOLUTELY 14 15 IMPRESSIVE. ESPECIALLY, WHEN YOU EVEN LOOK AT -- LOOKING AT 16 OUR APPEALS HEARINGS THAT WE HAD. THE MOST EVER THAT WE HAVE HAD. WITH TREMENDOUS GRACE, YOU LED THIS ORGANIZATION THROUGH 17 THAT. YOU HAVE -- YOU GUIDED US THROUGH A PANDEMIC WHERE 18 REALLY TO BE A LEADER IN THAT SPACE AND TO BE ABLE TO 19 INCORPORATE WHAT WE HAVE LEARNED INTO OUR LONG-RANGE PLANNING 20 21 THAT IS NOW BEFORE US AS PLAN BARRIER 2050 PLUS, THAT IS --THAT WAS UNDER YOUR WATCH. AND SO MUCH OF THE INSIGHT THAT YOU 22 BROUGHT AS A MAYOR OF A PROGRESSIVE TOWN BUT ALSO AS A 23 REGIONAL LEADER AND SOMEONE WHO HAS ALWAYS BOUGHT INTO, WE 24 WILL ALL SUCCEED IF WE DO IT ALL TOGETHER. THE NEXT PART THAT 25

I THINK IS INCREDIBLY IMPORTANT FOR THE WORK THAT WE DO AS A 1 REGION AND RIGHT NOW IN THIS MOMENT THAT WE FIND OURSELVES IN 2 3 CONSIDERING THE BAHFA HOUSING BOND MEASURE IS REALLY THE HOUSING METHODOLOGY. AND ONE OF THE THINGS THAT REALLY STANDS 4 5 OUT IN THIS -- THROUGH YOUR LEADERSHIP AND WORKING WITH OUR HOUSING COMMITTEE CHAIR, WE REALLY LOOKED AT HAVING A 6 METHODOLOGY THAT REALLY INCORPORATED WHAT WE HADN'T DONE AS A 7 8 REGION BEFORE, ACKNOWLEDGING IT AND BEING ABLE TO HAVE AN EQUITY ADJUSTMENT TO MOVE US FORWARD. WHILE IT WASN'T 9 10 NECESSARILY ON AN INDIVIDUAL JURISDICTIONAL BASIS, EASY TO HANDLE, YOU REALLY LED US THROUGH IN MAKING ALL OF US BUY IN 11 REGIONALLY WE WILL DO BETTER IF WE ALL LOOK OUT FOR OUR 12 REGION. AND SO I REALLY WANT TO THANK YOU FOR THAT. YOU HAVE 13 BEEN A PERSON WHO HAS BEEN ABLE TO MANAGE ALL OF THE VARIOUS 14 15 ASPECTS THAT WE HAVE. AND BUDGET IS -- I SAY THAT LAST, BUT 16 THAT IS ACTUALLY ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT THINGS HERE AT ABAG 17 AS WE'VE GONE THROUGH THE CONSOLIDATION, AS WE LOOK AT HONORING OUR OBLIGATIONS TO OUR CLOSED PENSION SYSTEM AND 18 BEING ABLE TO LOOK AT THAT. YOU HAVE -- YOU HAVE BEEN A 19 TREMENDOUS LEADER IN THAT SPACE AND ALWAYS WILLING TO LOOK AT 20 21 THINGS IN A NEW WAY. YOU HAVE BEEN A COUNCILMEMBER SINCE 2008. THE CITY OF BERKELEY. AND YOU'VE BEEN MAYOR SINCE 2016 AND RE-22 ELECTED IN 2020. AND I'M JUST GOING TO PUT A PIN IN THAT. 23 WHERE YOU ARE RIGHT NOW, WE MAY LOSE YOU HERE, BUT OUR LOSS 24 25 HERE IS REALLY OUR GAIN AT A LARGER LEVEL. SO I JUST WANT TO,

ON BEHALF OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD AND THE STAFF OF MTC AND
 ABAG, I WANT TO THANK YOU FOR EVERYTHING YOU HAVE DONE IN THE
 REGION, AND WE WILL NOW PRESENT YOU WITH THE MOST BEAUTIFUL
 GAVEL. AND APPRECIATION FOR EVERYTHING THAT YOU HAVE DONE FOR
 OUR ORGANIZATION. THANK YOU? ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE]

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VICE PRESIDENT, JESSE ARREGUIN: WELL, I AM VERY TOUCHED BY 10 THAT RECOGNITION. THIS BEAUTIFUL AWARD. I GUESS YOU'RE ALWAYS 11 A CHAIR. SO THANK YOU FOR -- THANK YOU FOR THIS. IT'S REALLY 12 BEEN MY GREATEST HONOR TO NOT ONLY SERVE ON THIS BOARD, SERVE 13 WITH I THINK INCREDIBLE LEADERS IN THIS REGION, SUPERVISORS, 14 15 MAYORS, COUNCILMEMBERS, REALLY THINKING ABOUT THE NEEDS OF OUR 16 WHOLE REGION, OUR STATE. AND THE BAY AREA IS REALLY LEADING 17 THE STATE IN SO MANY WAYS AND THE WORK WE DO IN THIS BUILDING WITH OUR INCREDIBLE STAFF IS REALLY AT THE CORE OF REALLY 18 TRANSFORMING THIS STATE AND THIS COUNTRY BUT TO WORK WITH 19 EXCEPTIONAL STAFF WHO EVERY DAY SHOW UP AND ARE SO DEDICATED 20 AND TALENTED. WE COULD NOT DO THE WORK THAT WE DO WITHOUT 21 THEM. AND IT HAS BEEN A VERY BUSY FOUR YEARS. AND I JUST WANT 22 TO THANK THE EXECUTIVE BOARD AND ALL THE ELECTED OFFICIALS IN 23 THE BAY AREA FOR ELECTING ME AND RE-ELECTING ME TO SERVE AS 24 PRESIDENT. TO BE ABLE TO HELP LEAD OUR AGENCY DURING A PERIOD 25

OF TRANSITION, NOT JUST TO HELP CONTINUE WITH THE 1 2 CONSOLIDATION OF OUR STAFF BUT TO MAKE SURE OUR BOARDS, MTC 3 AND ABAG, THAT WE'RE WORKING TO COME TOGETHER AND TO WORK TOGETHER TO SOLVE SOME OF OUR BIG REGIONAL CHALLENGES. AND SO 4 5 THE WORK WE DID WITH OUR GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE, TO LOOK AT CONSOLIDATING OUR COMMITTEES, THAT WE CAN HAVE SHARED 6 GOVERNANCE FOR THE BAY AREA WAS SOMETHING THAT AND I WERE 7 8 INVOLVED IN AND THEN THE PANDEMIC HAPPENED. WE HAVE TO NOT ONLY LOOK AT THE SAFETY OF OUR STAFF AND HOW WE'RE GOING TO 9 CONTINUE TO CONDUCT OUR BUSINESS BUT ALSO HOW WE'RE GOING TO 10 ADDRESS THE CHALLENGES FACING OUR REGION DURING THIS PANDEMIC. 11 WE WERE PART OF A LISTENING TOUR THAT MET WITH LEADERS OF 12 MAJOR BUSINESS -- BUSINESS ORGANIZATIONS IN THE BAY AREA AND 13 GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS TO UNDERSTAND WHAT ARE THE CHALLENGES 14 15 FACING OUR REGION DURING THIS PANDEMIC AND WHAT ABOUT ECONOMIC 16 RECOVERIES. WE HOPE TO BRING IDEAS FORWARD WITH THE ONGOING WORK OF THIS AGENCY BECAUSE THE RECOVERY STILL CONTINUES. AND 17 REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION, WE GOT A NEAR UNANIMOUS 18 VOTE AS A BOARD TO APPROVE AT THE BAY AREA ARENA PLAN. THAT 19 WAS A TESTAMENT TO REALLY LISTEN TO EVERYONE AND REALLY TRY TO 20 21 BUILD CONSENSUS. AND THEN THE WORK WE DID TO PASS PLAN BARRIER 2050. THE WORK WE'RE DOING AROUND THE REGIONAL HOUSING 22 MEASURE. THERE ARE SO MANY BIG THINGS WE HAVE DONE DURING THE 23 LAST FOUR YEARS. I WAS PROUD TO PLAY A MAJOR ROLE IN HELPING 24 25 MOVE FORWARD AND TO BE ABLE TO CONTINUE ON THIS BOARD FOR THE

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NEXT 11 MONTHS TO HELP MOVE FORWARD AS WELL. SO IT'S BEEN A
 REAL HONOR AND A REAL PRIVILEGE AND I WANT TO THANK THE STAFF,
 THANK THE BOARD AND LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH ALL OF YOU
 THE NEXT FEW MONTHS WORKING WITH HELPING OUR REGION AND THANK
 YOU FOR THIS RECOGNITION, THANK YOU FOR THIS HONOR.

CARLOS ROMERO: JUST A BRIEF ONE. I DIDN'T REALIZE YOU WERE 12 ELECTED THE YEAR I WAS ELECTED IN 2008. YOU ARE OBVIOUSLY 13 GOING PLACE I AM NOT. [LAUGHTER] I DID WANT TO SAY THROUGHOUT 14 15 THE ENTIRE TIME THAT I SERVED WITH YOU -- THAT YOU HAVE 16 ALLOWED ME TO ACTUALLY SERVE ON COMMITTEES, YOU HAVE BEEN 17 VERY, VERY DELIBERATE IN TRYING TO OPEN UP COMMITTEES TO WOMEN, TO PEOPLE OF COLOR, TO MAKE SURE THERE ARE DIVERSITY ON 18 THOSE BODIES. I'VE SEEN YOU DELIBERATE AND YOU ASKED ME, WHAT 19 DO I THINK ABOUT THIS PERSON? HOW COULD WE WIDEN THE -- FOR 20 LACK OF A BETTER TERM -- COMPLEXION OF A PARTICULAR BODY, AND 21 YOU WERE DELIBERATE ABOUT IT. I THINK IT IS THE ONLY WAY WE 22 ACTUALLY GET TO A PLACE WHERE SOCIETY, OUR INSTITUTIONS THAT 23 PROVIDE ADVICE AND GOVERN US ACTUALLY ARE REPRESENTATIVE OF 24 THE PEOPLE WHO LIVE HERE. SO I THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THAT. 25

AND REALLY HAVE LEARNED QUITE A LOT IN TERMS OF THE WAY YOU
 LED IN ALL THESE AREAS. THANK YOU.

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PAT EKLUND: THANK YOU. I WANT TO JOIN IN GIVING JESSE AN 6 INCREDIBLE EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION. I HAVE BEEN ON THE ABAG 7 8 EXECUTIVE BOARD FOR QUITE A WHILE. AND JESSE, YOU'RE ONE OF THE REALLY FIRST PRESIDENTS THAT I HAVE SEEN WHERE YOU HAVE 9 10 BEEN FAIR, VERY THOUGHTFUL, AND VERY INCLUSIVE. I REALLY LOVE HOW YOU ENGAGE PEOPLE ON THE BOARD AND YOU'RE JUST -- YOU'RE 11 GREAT. I LOVE SERVING ON THIS BOARD WITH YOU. AND REALLY GLAD 12 THAT YOU JOINED ABAG IN A LEADERSHIP ROLE AND HELPED MOVE US 13 THROUGH. THAT WHOLE PANDEMIC THING WAS A MESS, BUT YOU KEPT US 14 15 TOGETHER, AND WE WERE ABLE TO GET THROUGH IT ALL TOGETHER, 16 TOO. AND THEN ALLOWING US TO DO THIS REMOTELY -- AS SOME OF 17 YOU MAY KNOW, I AM GOING TO NEED A HIP REPLACEMENT, AND SO DOING REMOTE PARTICIPATION HAS ALLOWED ME TO STILL PARTICIPATE 18 AND BE ENGAGED AND JUST WANT TO THANK YOU, JESSE, FOR REALLY 19 ENCOURAGING THAT AS WE CONTINUE WITH THE GOVERNANCE THROUGHOUT 20 21 THE WHOLE REGION SO THANK YOU FOR YOUR TREMENDOUS WORK. 22

AND HERE WE ARE 23 YEARS LATER AND I'M STILL 3 EDITING DOCUMENTS ON HOW TO IMPLEMENT THAT WITH THE VERY SAME 4 5 PLANNING CONSULTANTS. [LAUGHTER] AT LEAST NOW WE'VE BEEN ABLE TO DO MUCH MORE TO ASSIST LOCAL GOVERNMENTS WITH THE REGIONAL 6 HOUSING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM. PRODUCTS SUCH AS THE 32 7 8 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WEBINARS THAT I HELPED PRODUCE OVER THE LAST THREE YEARS NOW DRAW PLANNERS AROUND THE STATE AS WELL AS 9 THE REGION. ALONG THE WAY, I WORKED WITH 10 ABAG PRESIDENTS, 10 11 AS OF TODAY, FROM THROUGHOUT THE REGION, SIX EXECUTIVE 11 DIRECTORS, AND MANY, MANY AMAZING PEOPLE FROM THROUGHOUT THE -12 - ON A VARIETY OF PROJECTS THROUGHOUT THE AGENCY. CARLOS ROMERO: THANK YOU, MADAM PRESIDENT. WE MET ON NOVEMBER 6 8, 2023. THERE WERE TWO ITEMS THAT WE DISCUSSED AND APPROVED. 7 8 ONE WAS A BAFA LEGAL SERVICES BENCH. IT'S A PREQUALIFICATION OF THE FOLLOWING FIRMS TO PROVIDE LEGAL SERVICES TO BAHFA. 9 THAT IS OUR BENCH OF LEGAL SERVICES FOR BAHFA. AND THE OTHER 10 ITEM WE ADDRESSED WAS THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO NEGOTIATE. 11 THIS IS ACTUALLY PRETTY EXCITING. ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH 12 THE NAPA COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND HOMELESS SERVICES 13 FOR AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$5 MILLION TO LAUNCH AND 14 15 ADMINISTER ONE OF OUR BAHFA RENTAL PILOT PROGRAM WHICH WITH 16 ANY LUCK WHEN OUR BOND PASSES WE WILL BE ABLE TO REPLICATE THE 17 GREAT WORK THAT WILL HAPPEN WITHIN NAPA ON THIS PILOT PROGRAM SO REALLY LOOKING FORWARD TO THAT PROGRAM ROLLING OUT. THE 18 HOUSING COMMITTEE DID NOT MEET IN DECEMBER AND JANUARY. SOME 19 OF MY WIND HAS BEEN STOLEN FROM MY SAILS BY THE BOARD 20 PRESIDENT BUT THIS IS REALLY -- NO, NO. IT'S FINE. I JUST WANT TO 2 3 REMIND BOARD MEMBERS THIS WILL BE A VERY SIGNIFICANT YEAR FOR THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY AND OUR HOUSING 4 5 EFFORTS. STAFF WILL BE COMING BEFORE US TO SEEK APPROVAL BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF DOCUMENTS THAT REPRESENT THE 6 CULMINATION OF TWO YEARS AND WE'VE ALL KIND HAVE BEEN INVOLVED 7 8 IN THESE DISCUSSIONS OF FOCUSED WORK ON HOUSING AND ADDITIONAL TWO YEARS OF PLANNING BEFORE THAT. THAT'S PART OF THE GENESIS 9 10 OF THIS WHOLE CASA PROJECT. NIECE WILL INCLUDE BAHFA'S PLAN, THE EXPENDITURE PLAN FOR THE 20% OF THE FUNDING THAT WOULD GO 11 TO BAHFA. WE ARE NOT CREATING AN EXPENDITURE PLAN FOR THE 12 COUNTIES. THE COUNTIES GET TO DO THAT AND THE CITIES. AND ALSO 13 A RECOMMENDATION TO APPROVE THE NOVEMBER, 2024 BALLOT MEASURE 14 15 WITH RELATED BALLOT DOCUMENTS. THE ABAG BOARD APPROVAL IS 16 REQUIRED BEFORE THE BAHFA BOARD CAN TAKE ITS FINAL VOTE TO 17 PLACE A MEASURE ON THE NINE-COUNTY BALLOTS IN THIS BODY. IT IS COMING TO THIS BOARD I BELIEVE IT IS IN APRIL. ATTACHED TO 18 THIS ITEM THAT I MENTIONED EARLIER IS THAT SPECIFIC TIMELINE 19 FOR THIS PROCESS. WE HOPE TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE A FULL HOUSE 20 21 WHEN WE DISCUSS THESE AND ACTUALLY GO AHEAD AND PUT THIS ITEM ON THE BALLOT. SO, AGAIN, WE WILL BE REVIEWING BOTH THE ABAG 22 HOUSING COMMITTEE AND THE BAHFA OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE IN 23 FEBRUARY. WE WILL BE LOOKING AT THESE TIMELINES AND DEALING 24 WITH OTHER ACTIONS THAT WILL THEN BE PASSED ON TO THE ABAG 25

SO THERE'S A PRETTY ROBUST 6 OUTREACH EFFORT HERE. WE WANT TO MAKE SURE WE KEEP THAT UP IF 7 8 WE WANT TO GET ACCEPTANCE OF THIS. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. SORRY THAT IT TOOK A LITTLE LONGER THAN I WANTED TO. 9

I 12 BELIEVE THAT'S THE SAN JOSE LOCATION. 13 14 TREVA REID: IT'S AN ORGANIZATION THAT I WOULD LIKE TO ADD TO 15 16 OUR OUTREACH STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT IF THAT'S NOT YET HAPPENED WITH THE EFFORTS THEY'VE BEEN LEADING WITHIN OUR BAY AREA 17 REGION AND STATEWIDE WITH THE COALITION. THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP IS PART 21 OF THE U.S. E.P.A.'S NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM SITTING WITHIN 22 ABAG, IT BRIDGES BETWEEN AGENCIES AND ORGANIZATIONS WITHIN THE 23 REGION REALLY WORKING TO ACHIEVE OUR COLLECTIVE VISION OF WHAT 24 A HEALTHY ESTUARY CAN BE. AND THE PARTNERSHIP WORKS TO HAVE 25

KEY PARTNERS TO SCALE UP INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS TO MEET THE 1 CHALLENGE OF CLIMATE CHANGE AT THE REGIONAL LEVEL. SO TODAY, 2 3 MY COLLEAGUE, HEIDI NUTTERS, AND I WILL BE TALKING ABOUT A CORE PART OF THE PROJECT WHICH IS ADVANCING NATURE-BASED 4 SOLUTIONS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. FIRST, JUST A BIT OF BACKGROUND 5 ON WHAT WE MEAN BY THE TERM NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS. I THINK 6 THIS IS A DETERMINE WE'RE -- THIS IS A TERM WE'RE HEARING MORE 7 8 AND MORE. AND IT STATES THAT NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS 13 LEVERAGE NATURE AND THE POWER OF HEALTHY ECOSYSTEMS TO PROTECT 14 15 PEOPLE, OPTIMIZE INFRASTRUCTURE AND SAFEGUARD A STABLE AND 16 BIODIVERSE FUTURE. SO ANOTHER WAY OF THINKING ABOUT IT IS THAT NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS ARE AN INTENTIONAL AND AN INTEGRATED 17 APPROACH TO DELIVER ENVIRONMENTAL, ECONOMIC, AND SOCIAL 18 BENEFITS. AND HOPEFULLY IN AN EFFICIENT AND SUSTAINABLE WAY. 19 SO TODAY, WE'RE GOING TO SPECIFICALLY FOCUS ON SHORELINE 20 21 NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS TO INCREASE RESILIENCE TO CLIMATE CHANGE. NEXT, PLEASE. AS WE ALL KNOW, IN THE FACE OF GLOBAL 22 CLIMATE CHANGE, COASTAL CITIES ARE EXPERIENCING MORE INTENSE 23 STORM EVENTS AND THE CONSTANT CREEP OF SEA LEVEL RISE. AND IN 24 RESPONSE TO THESE ISSUES, THERE REALLY IS AN URGENT NEED TO 25

IMPLEMENT CLIMATE ADAPTATION PROJECTS ALONG OUR SHORELINE. AND 1 THIS PROVIDES A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO ADVANCE PROJECTS THAT USE 2 3 NATURE-BASED APPROACHES TO PROVIDE, AGAIN, MULTIPLE BENEFITS, INCLUDING FLOOD PROTECTION, HABITAT, OPEN SPACE, AND OTHER 4 5 BENEFITS. MANY OF OUR REGIONAL PLANNING EFFORTS CALL OUT THE IMPORTANCE OF NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS, INCLUDING THE ESTUARY 6 PARTNERSHIPS ESTUARY BLUEPRINT, WHICH I PRESENTED TO YOU ALL 7 8 ABOUT LAST YEAR, AND THE BAY ADAPT JOINT PLATFORM, COMING OUT OF THE BIG CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION. AND ALSO 9 AS A REMINDER, PLAN BAY AREA 2050 INCLUDES ACTION WITHIN THE 10 ENVIRONMENT ELEMENT TO, QUOTE, PRIORITIZE IMPLEMENTATION OF 11 NATURAL AND NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS INCLUDING THE ESTUARY 12 PROJECTS, PROGRAMS. WE ALSO HAVE SEVERAL STATE AND FEDERAL 13 EXECUTIVE ORDERS SIMILARLY FOCUSING ON SUPPORTING AND 14 ADVANCING NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS THROUGHOUT THE STATE AND 15 16 NATION. NEXT. SO THERE ARE SEVERAL DIFFERENT TYPES OF SHORELINE NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS. AS THOSE NATURAL OR RESTORED 17 HABITATS STABILIZE THE SHORELINE AND PROVIDE PROTECTION 18 AGAINST STORM SURGES AND SEA LEVEL RISE. WE CAN ALSO UTILIZE 19 HYBRID APPROACHES THAT AND AN EXAMPLE OF THAT MIGHT BE A SEA 20 21 WALL THAT'S ENGINEERED TO ALSO GROW PLANTS AS AN EXAMPLE OR FLOOD PROTECTION LEVEE THAT INCLUDES VEGETATIVE AREAS. AND 22 THEN ECOTONE AND HORIZONTAL LEVEES ARE SIMILAR TYPE OF NATURE-23 BASED SOLUTIONS CENTERING AROUND ESSENTIALLY A GENTLY SLOPED 24 VEGETATED LEVEE. FOR TODAY'S PRESENTATION I WILL DIG IN A 25

LITTLE MORE SPECIFICALLY ON HORIZONTAL LEVEES BECAUSE THIS IS 1 REALLY AN EXCITING INNOVATIVE SOLUTION TO A MYRIAD OF PROBLEMS 2 3 WE'RE FACING AND WE'RE REALLY EXCITED FOR THE SPECIFIC TYPE OF NATURE-BASED APPROACH. NEXT. SO I'LL WALK THROUGH THIS GRAPHIC 4 5 TO SHOW REALLY WHAT THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE IS AND HOW WE CAN MEET OUR SHORELINE ADAPTATION NEEDS. SO ON THE LEFT OF THIS 6 GRAPHIC IF SHOWS ESSENTIALLY THE CONVENTIONAL APPROACH THAT 7 8 INVOLVES BUILDING A VERTICAL FLOOD PROTECTION LEVEE OR A SEA WALL. IT'S HEAVILY ARMORED ON THE SHORE SIDE. REALLY AN 9 ENGINEERED APPROACH TO PROTECT INLAND INFRASTRUCTURE SUCH AS 10 WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANTS WHICH IS SHOWING ON THIS GRAPHIC. 11 THIS APPROACH IS VERY EXPENSIVE. AND ALSO SUSCEPTIBLE TO 12 FAILURE WITH THE FORCE OF MORE FREQUENT AND POWERFUL STORMS 13 THAT WE'RE SEEING. IT ALSO DOESN'T PROVIDE ANY SPACE TO 14 15 ACCOMMODATE RISING WATERS. WE'RE -- THE ONLY OPTION TO KEEP 16 BUILDING HIGHER AND HIGHER. THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE IS AN ALTERNATIVE TO THIS HARD LANDSCAPE. AS SHOWN IN THE GRAPHIC ON 17 THE RIGHT, A HORIZONTAL LEVEE IS A GRADUALLY SLOPED LEVEE 18 PLANTED WITH NATIVE VEGETATION. SO THIS APPROACH PROVIDES 19 HABITAT FOR NATIVE SPECIES. IT PROVIDES WAVE ATTENUATION. 20 21 PROTECTING FROM STORMS. AND IT PROTECTS SPACE FROM RISING SEA LEVELS. ADDITIONALLY, A HORIZONTAL LEVEE CAN BE ENGINEERED TO 22 RECEIVE TREATED WASTEWATER AT THE BACKSIDE AND RUN IT THROUGH 23 A SUBSURFACE TREATMENT LAYER TO REMOVE NUTRIENTS, ADDITIONAL 24 25 NUTRIENTS, AND ALSO OTHER CONTAMINANTS, ADDING IMPROVED WATER

OUALITY TO THE BENEFITS IT CAN PROVIDE. NEXT. IN PARTNERSHIP 1 WITH WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANTS, HORIZONTAL LEVEES ARE 2 3 ADVANCING THE REIMAGINING OF WASTEWATER AS A NUISANCE TO A RESOURCE. SO TREATED WASTEWATER CAN PROVIDE A SOURCE OF 4 5 IRRIGATION FOR THE VEGETATION PLANTED OR THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE PROVIDING A DROUGHT-PROOF SUPPLY. AND ALSO PROVIDING FRESH 6 WATER TO THE BACKSIDE OF THE LEVEE CAN HAVE A HABITAT TYPE 7 8 THAT WE DON'T HAVE A LOT AROUND THE BAY. ADDITIONALLY, AS I SAID, HORIZONTAL LEVEES CAN BE ENGINEERED TO REMOVE NUTRIENTS 9 10 FROM WASTEWATER WHICH IS A REGULATED IMPERATIVE. WE'VE SEEN SOME GREAT SUCCESS THUS FAR IN CONSTRUCTED PILOT PROJECT THAT 11 HEIDI WILL TALK ABOUT LATER. NEXT. HORIZONTAL LEVEES ARE ALSO 12 REIMAGINING OF SHORELINE WETLANDS. OF INFRASTRUCTURE FOR 13 MULTIPLE BENEFITS. SO THEY PROVIDE HABITAT FOR CRITICAL 14 15 SPECIES. THEY ALLOW FOR SPACE FOR WETLANDS TO MIGRATE LANDWARD 16 AS SEA LEVELS RISE. THEY CAN PROTECT INFRASTRUCTURE FROM STORM 17 SURGES, OTHER CLIMATE-RELATED HAZARDS AND PROVIDE RECREATIONAL SPACE WHICH WE KNOW NOW MORE THAN EVER HOW IMPORTANT IT IS TO 18 PEOPLE'S HEALTH AND WELL-BEING. NEXT. SO THE ESTUARY 19 PARTNERSHIP WORKS WITH A MYRIAD OF FUNDERS AND PARTNERS TO 20 21 ADVANCE NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS. WE HOST TECHNOLOGY TRANSFER WORKSHOPS AND OTHER KINDS OF CONVENES AND WORKING FOR BARRIERS 22 OF IMPLEMENTATION PART OF THESE NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS SUCH AS 23 FUNDING, REGULATORY HURDLES, GOVERNANCE CHALLENGES, THINGS OF 24 25 THAT NATURE. AT THE SUBREGIONAL SCALE, WE'RE WORKING IN

SEVERAL AREAS AROUND THE BAY TO SUPPORT SUBREGIONAL CLIMATE 1 ADAPTATION PLANNING. AGAIN, WITH THE FOCUS ON NATURE-BASED 2 3 OPPORTUNITIES. IN ADDITION, WE ALSO WORK WITH LOCAL PARTNERS TO ADVANCE LOCAL ON-THE-GROUND IMPLEMENTATION PROJECTS. NEXT. 4 5 SO THIS MAP SHOWS THE AREAS WHERE WE ARE CURRENTLY PARTNERING TO IMPLEMENT SHORELINE NATURE-BASED PROJECTS. SPECIFICALLY 6 HORIZONTAL LEVEES AND ALSO ENGINEERED WETLANDS. AND AT THIS 7 8 POINT I'D LIKE TO TURN IT OVER TO HEIDI NUTTERS, SENIOR PROGRAM MANAGER AT THE PARTNERSHIP WHO WILL SPEAK ABOUT THESE 9 10 PROJECTS IN MORE DETAIL.

HEIDI NUTTERS: THANK YOU. AS CAITLIN TALKED ABOUT, WE'VE BEEN 12 PARTNERING WITH AREAS IN THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY TO ADVANCE 13 NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS AND THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE. SO THIS MAP 14 15 SHOWS SOME OF THE COMMUNITIES THAT WE'VE PARTNERED WITH ON THE 16 SHORELINE. THERE'S A LOT OF STORIES TO TELL ABOUT THIS WORK BUT I'M JUST GOING TO HIGHLIGHT A COUPLE OF PLACES WHERE WE'VE 17 ADVANCED THESE PARTNERSHIPS IN THE LAST FEW YEARS. SO NEXT 18 SLIDE. SO THE FIRST HORIZONTAL LEVEE WAS A PROOF OF CONCEPT, 19 CONCEPTUAL DESIGN AT THE ORO LOMA SANITARY DISTRICT AND IT WAS 20 A PILOT PROJECT BUILT IN 2015 TO REALLY TRY TO TEST THIS 21 CONCEPT OUT AND IN PARTICULAR THE USE OF TREATED WASTEWATER 22 AND STUDY THE WATER OUALITY IMPROVEMENT BENEFITS OF THIS 23 CONCEPT. SO WE'VE BEEN PARTNERING AT THIS LOCATION SINCE THEN. 24 WE PARTNERED WITH THEM THROUGH DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE 25

HORIZONTAL LEVEE AND HAVE BEEN MONITORING EVER SINCE WITH UC 1 BERKELEY AND VALLEY WATER KIND OF LEADING THE CHARGE ON THAT 2 3 AND WE CONTINUE TO STUDY DIFFERENT DESIGN APPROACHES AND DIFFERENT KINDS OF WATER OUALITY IMPROVEMENTS AT THIS SITE. SO 4 5 IN PARTICULAR, WE'VE SEEN INCREDIBLE RESULTS WITH THE REMOVAL OF NUTRIENTS FROM TREATED WASTEWATER. PHARMACEUTICALS. AND 6 ALSO, ADDITIONAL CONTAMINANTS OF EMERGING CONCERN WE'RE 7 8 STUDYING RIGHT NOW PFAS, THE FOREVER CHEMICAL, HOW THAT CAN BE REMOVED AS WELL AS MICROPLASTICS. SO THIS IS AN ONGOING KIND 9 OF LIVING LABORATORY WHERE WE'RE STUDYING THIS CONCEPT AND 10 EVOLVING OUR UNDERSTANDING. NEXT SLIDE. THE OTHER PROJECT I 11 WANTED TO TALK ABOUT -- AND I REALIZE THIS IS OUT OF ORDER. 12 THE PALO ALTO HORIZONTAL LEVEE WHICH IS A PROJECT THAT ABAG 13 AND SFEP HAVE BEEN WORKING ON THROUGH DESIGN AND WILL NOW BE 14 15 BUILDING IN 2024. SO THIS YEAR. THIS WILL BE THE FIRST 16 HORIZONTAL LEVEE THAT WE'LL SEE IN THE REGION THAT WILL ACTUALLY BE ON THE SHORELINE WITH TREATED WASTEWATER CONVEYED 17 THROUGH THE SYSTEM OUT INTO THE BAY SO IT'S A REALLY BIG 18 ADVANCE FOR THE REGION. IT'S IMPLEMENTS ARE ESTUARY BLUEPRINT 19 AND PAVES THE WAY FOR FUTURE PROJECTS LIKE IT. IT WAS REALLY A 20 21 PILOT FOR US TO MOVE IT TO THIS PHASE AND TO UNDERSTAND AND LEARN A LOT IN THE PROCESS. NEXT SLIDE. SO THE PALO ALTO 22 HORIZONTAL LEVEE, WHICH IF YOU KNOW THAT AREA, IS IN HARBOR 23 MARSH RIGHT NEXT TO THE PARK IN THE CITY OF PALO ALTO. HAS 24 SEVERAL GOALS THEY ARE TRYING TO ACHIEVE. IMPROVING HABITAT 25

ALONG THE PERIMETER OF HARBOR MARSH. ADAPTING TO SEA LEVEL 1 RISE. AND THIS PROJECTS IS WITH THE SAFER BAY AND SHORELINE 2 3 STUDY. IF YOU'RE FAMILIAR WITH THAT. THE PREFERRED ALIGNMENT OF THAT PROJECT FOR FLOOD PROTECTION. MAINTAINING AND 4 5 IMPROVING PUBLIC ACCESS TO THE TRAIL SYSTEM. ENSURING PERSPECTIVES OF MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES THAT ARE INCORPORATED 6 WITH SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE. THERE'S BEEN EXTENSIVE ENGAGEMENT 7 8 WITH SURROUNDED COMMUNITIES. AND ONGOING COMMUNITY-BASED MONITORING PROGRAM THAT'S BEING DEVELOPED AND WILL CONTINUE 9 THROUGH CONSTRUCTION AND BEYOND. AND TO PROVIDE THIS POLISHING 10 TREATMENT OF TREATED WASTEWATER THROUGH THE SYSTEM. I JUST 11 WANT TO HIGHLIGHT OUR INCREDIBLE PARTNERSHIP WITH THE CITY OF 12 PALO ALTO, SAVE THE BAY, AND SEVERAL COMMUNITY-BASED 13 ORGANIZATIONS, INCLUDING EAST PALO ALTO THAT HAVE REALLY 14 15 CHAMPIONED THIS PROJECT AND HAVE BEEN WITH US THROUGH THIS 16 WHOLE THING. NEXT SLIDE. SO JUST TO TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE TIMELINE OF THIS PROJECT, BECAUSE THIS IS A GREAT STEP FOR 17 SFEP. WE BEGAN THIS IN 2017 WITH JUST EARLY FEASIBILITIES AND 18 DESIGN AND COMMUNITY-BASED WORKSHOPS. AND HAVE BEEN WORKING 19 THROUGH THE LAST FEW YEARS ON PERMITTING, STUDIES, 20 21 GEOTECHNICAL SUPPORTS. WE HAVE ALMOST ALL OUR PERMITS IN HAND RIGHT NOW. I THINK WE HAVE ONE OR TWO MORE THAT WE'RE WAITING 22 ON. AND THE DESIGN IS ALMOST ABOUT TO BE STAMPED BY THE 23 ENGINEERS IN THE NEXT COUPLE OF WEEKS. AND AS I SAID, AS WE 24 25 MOVE INTO THIS YEAR, THIS BIG CONSTRUCTION YEAR FOR THE

PROJECT, WE HAVE SEVERAL ABAG/SFEP WILL BE MANAGING 1 CONSTRUCTION OF THE PROJECT WHICH IS EXPECTED TO BEGIN IN JUNE 2 3 OR JULY OF THIS YEAR. NEXT SLIDE. SO WITH ALL OF THESE ADVANCES, THIS IS THE FOUR SORT OF KEY IMPLEMENTATION 4 5 CHALLENGES THAT WE SEE. AND CAITLIN TALKED ABOUT OUR REGIONAL COORDINATION WORK WHERE WE ARE TRYING TO GET INTO THESE 6 CHALLENGES AND ADDRESS THEM AND THAT IS REALLY PACE AND SCALE. 7 8 REALLY ADVANCING NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS AT THE KIND OF SCALE AND PACE THAT WE NEED TO SEE IN ORDER TO ADAPT TO SEA LEVEL 9 10 RISE. ADDRESSING REGULATORY CHALLENGES. NOT ALL OF THESE PROJECTS HAVE A CLEAR PATH THROUGH THE PERMITTING PROCESS AND 11 WE'RE WORKING VERY HARD ON THAT WITH OUR REGULATORY PARTNERS. 12 LOOKING AT GOVERNANCE ON THE SHORELINE. REALLY, THESE ARE 13 CROSS-JURISDICTIONAL PROJECTS THAT OFTEN REQUIRE EXTENSIVE 14 15 COORDINATION ON THE GROUND WITH MULTIPLE ENTITIES. AND 16 FINALLY, CENTERING COMMUNITIES AND EQUITY AND KEEPING THAT AT THE HEART OF THESE PROCESSES. SO WE'RE WORKING CLOSELY WITH 17 OUR ON-THE-GROUND PARTNERS ON ALL FOUR OF THESE AREAS. NEXT 18 SLIDE. I'LL TURN IT OVER TO YOU. 19

21 CAITLIN SWEENEY: THAT CONCLUDES OUR PRESENTATION. THANK YOU22 VERY MUCH.

PRES., BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO MUCH. DO WE HAVE ANY
 EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER DISCUSSION, QUESTIONS? SUPERVISOR
 SACKETT.

5 MARY SACKETT: THANK YOU. I HAVE A COUPLE OF OUESTIONS AND COMMENTS. THANK YOU SO MUCH. I'M EXCITED ABOUT THE NOTION OF 6 NATURE-BASED. I THINK IT DOES SEEM LIKE THE RIGHT THING TO DO 7 8 AND THE MOST ECONOMICAL THING TO DO. WE'VE GOT A COUPLE OF SMALL PROJECTS IN MARIN THAT KIND OF FIT UNDER THIS NOTION. 9 10 AND WHEN WE HEARD THE PRESENTATION ON BAY ADAPT FROM BCDC, I KIND OF RAISED THE SAME QUESTION. I THINK WE HAVE THE 11 VISIONING DOCUMENTS. I THINK WE HAVE THE VISION, BUT I'M NOT -12 - IT DOESN'T FEEL LIKE IT'S TRICKLING DOWN INTO THE AGENCIES 13 AND THE RULEMAKING AND REGULATORY PIECE OF IT. I APPRECIATE 14 15 THE COUPLE OF PLACES WHERE YOU TALK ABOUT THOSE REGULATORY 16 HURDLES. BUT IT'S ALMOST AS THOUGH, ING YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE PROJECTS I'M LOOKING AT IS BREACHING A TURN OF THE CENTURY 17 AGRICULTURAL LEVEE IN ORDER TO LET NATURE RESTORE THE AREA AND 18 THE AMOUNT OF REGULATORY HURDLES. IT'S AS THOUGH WE'RE 19 BUILDING A HUGE ENGINEERED PROJECT. AND GOING -- YOU KNOW, IF 20 21 IS INTENDED TO WORK THROUGH SOME OF THESE BUT EACH TIME WE'VE GONE BACK TO THE BRIT, A DIFFERENT AGENCY HAS COME UP WITH 22 SOMETHING ELSE. I THINK WE NEED TO WORK WITH THAT PIECE TO 23 MAKE SURE THE RULES LINE UP WITH THE GREATER VISION AND REALLY 24 A CHANGE IN THEORY FROM ENGINEER TO NATURE-BASED. AND THE 25

OTHER BIG THING THAT'S COMING OUT OF, AGAIN, A SORT OF SMALL 1 IDEA OF A PILOT PROJECT IS THE LONG-TERM MITIGATION AND 2 3 HABITAT MONITORING. AND I DIDN'T, SEE, LIKE, IN THE PALO ALTO PROJECT, THAT'S NOT ON THE TIMELINE. I'M CURIOUS KIND OF WHAT 4 5 YOU HAVE TO SAY IN THAT REGARD AND WHAT YOU'RE ANTICIPATING. BECAUSE THE ONE I'M LOOKING AT IS SORT OF HOW WE'RE -- YOU 6 KNOW, THE HARVEST MICE GOING TO BE DOING 10 YEARS FROM NOW AND 7 8 HOW THAT ADDS, YOU KNOW, THAT LONG-TERM MONITORING ADDS TO THE COST AND COMPLEXITY, FRANKLY, OF WHO'S DOING THE PROJECT. 9

10

11 CAITLIN SWEENEY: YEAH. SO FOR THE PALO ALTO HORIZONTAL LEVEE 12 PROJECT, WE ARE PARTNERING WITH UC DAVIS AND USGS ON 13 MONITORING.

14

HEIDI NUTTERS: WE JUST GOT RESULTS THAT THEY DID MONITORING 15 16 FOR SALT HARVEST MICE IN PARTICULAR. AND WE REALLY THINK THIS 17 IS AN OPPORTUNITY TO UNDERSTAND HOW QUICKLY THOSE SPECIES RE-ESTABLISH ONCE THE HABITAT IS IMPROVED AND THE IMPACT OF 18 CONSTRUCTION ON SENSITIVE SPECIES. SO THEY DID THEIR 19 PRECONSTRUCTION SURVEYS AND WILL CONTINUE TO MONITOR POST-20 21 CONSTRUCTION TO SEE HOW THESE SPECIES RETURN OR EVEN INCREASE IN NUMBERS AT THE SITE. AND WE'LL ALSO BE STUDYING THE WAY 22 THAT THE PROJECT EFFECTS SEDIMENT DYNAMICS AND LOOK AT 23 SEDIMENT PRE AND POST CONSTRUCTION AS WELL. THERE WAS MULTI-24 YEAR MONITORING THAT WAS DEVELOPED WITH THE BRIT THROUGH AN 25

ADAPTIVE MONITORING AND ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PLAN. SO
 DEFINITELY COULD ADD THAT TO THE TIMELINE.

4 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: GREAT. MAYOR GARCIA.

5

LEON GARCIA: THANKS FOR THE PRESENTATION. I'VE SEEN SEVERAL 6 WITH THE STATE AND THE NORTH BAY WATERSHED ASSOCIATION. EXCUSE 7 8 ME. AND WE'RE VERY FORTUNATE WITH THE PROJECT MOVING FORWARD BY LOCAL NONPROFIT. THE AMERICAN PARKS FOUNDATION IS BUILDING 9 AN ECOLOGY CENTER IN WHAT WAS FORMALLY THE CITY COOPERATION 10 YARD WHICH IS RIGHT ON THE WETLANDS. IT HAS BEEN EDUCATION FOR 11 THE COMMUNITY. OUR VISITORS OR WHOEVER WOULD LIKE TO HAVE 12 INTEREST IN THAT. IT'S A TIDAL MARSH. MORE THAN 450 ACRES. 13 VERY SIMILAR TO THE STATE ROUTE 37 ON THE WETLANDS THERE. 14 15 WE'RE TRYING TO EXPAND EDUCATION ON THIS SUBJECT MATTER. 16 MIDDLE SCHOOLS ACROSS THE STREET. THERE'S AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEXT TO THE MIDDLE SCHOOL. THERE'S ANOTHER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL 17 ABOUT TWO OR THREE BLOCKS ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THAT. SO I LOOK 18 FORWARD TO CONFIRMATION THAT CAN BE MADE ON THIS TYPE OF 19 PROJECT. WOULD LIKE TO SHARE THE INFORMATION WITH OUR 20 21 COMMUNITY PARKS FOUNDATION. THANK YOU.

23 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU, MAYOR. ANY OTHER EXECUTIVE
24 BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS OR QUESTIONS? COUNCILMEMBER ROMERO.

CARLOS ROMERO: THANK YOU. THIS PROJECT IS ACTUALLY VERY --1 ALMOST IN MY BACKYARD, RIGHT, BECAUSE IT'S RIGHT THERE BY THE 2 3 DUCK POND. THE AIRPORT IS QUITE CLOSE TO PALO ALTO. THE QUESTION, IT'S A VERY SMALL PIECE, RIGHT, IF YOU LOOK AT THE 4 5 MAP. I'M ON THE WEBSITE. IN TERMS OF COST, HOW MUCH MORE EXPENSIVE IS THIS THAN, LET'S SAY, BUILDING, YOU KNOW, ONE OF 6 THOSE HORRIBLE LEVEES, RIGHT? AND SOMETIMES THEY'RE MADE OUT 7 8 OF SHEET PILES AND OTHER STUFF. THAT DOESN'T LOOK VERY GOOD. COMPARED TO THAT, DO WE KNOW KIND OF WHAT IS THE COST RELATIVE 9 10 TO, YOU KNOW, DOING THIS PROJECT? OBVIOUSLY, THERE ARE PLENTY OF OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL BENEFITS THAT WOULD GO ALONG WITH THIS. 11 WHICH MIGHT OFFSET THE COST, OBVIOUSLY. BUT CAN YOU SHARE WITH 12 US WHAT WE KNOW? OR ARE WE GOING TO LEARN THAT FROM THIS 13 14 PROJECT?

15

16 CAITLIN SWEENEY: BOTH. THINKING ABOUT COST BENEFIT, WE'RE THINKING ABOUT ALL OF THE BENEFITS, INCLUDING THE 17 ENVIRONMENTAL AND THE OPEN SPACE AND COMMUNITY BENEFITS. I 18 THINK, ALSO, COST OVER TIME IS SOMETHING TO CONSIDER. IT MAY 19 BE, YOU KNOW, DEPENDING ON THE SITE, CHEAPER TO PUT UP A QUICK 20 21 LEVEE THAN INVEST IN SOMETHING MORE -- MORE LIKE A NATURE-BASED SOLUTION. MAYBE. BUT OVER THE LONG TERM, YOU MAY HAVE 22 COST BENEFITS OVER TIME RATHER THAN HAVING TO CONTINUE TO 23 BUILD YOUR LEVEE UP AND UP AND UP. SO I THINK, YOU KNOW, YOU 24 HAVE TO CONSIDER OVER TIME AND ALSO CONSIDER MULTIPLE 25

BENEFITS. I DON'T KNOW IF WE HAVE INFORMATION ABOUT THIS
 PARTICULAR PROJECT, THE COST-BENEFIT ANALYSIS OF A SEA WALL
 VERSUS WHAT THEY ARE OPPOSING.

5 CARLOS ROMERO: SORRY. WAS SOMEONE GOING TO TRY TO ANSWER? YEAH. IF YOU WANT TO ANSWER THAT. NOT GETTING THE MATH RIGHT 6 IN MY HEAD. SHALL I ASK IT OR DO YOU WANT TO -- OKAY. SO LET'S 7 8 ASSUME WE ARE LOOKING AT -- CERTAINLY -- IN PALO ALTO WE'RE TRYING TO DESIGN EIGHT FEET ABOVE WHICH WOULD INCLUDE THREE 9 10 FEET OF FREE BOARD, SEA LEVEL RISE, RIGHT? TO DESIGN FOR THAT, SO THAT'S 100-YEAR EVENT, TECHNICALLY, RIGHT, PLUS FLOODING. 11 IF YOU HAVE A HORIZONTAL LEVEE THAT IS NOT THAT HIGH, RIGHT, 12 AND WE DO GET TO, YOU KNOW, FIFE FEET OF SEA LEVEL -- FIVE 13 FEET OF SEA LEVEL RISE AND LET'S SAY IT'S 2050, WHICH IT'S NOT 14 15 SUPPOSED TO HAPPEN BUT HOW DO WE KNOW, HOW DOES THAT 16 HORIZONTAL LEVEE HOPE, MITIGATE TOPPING OVER THAT LEVEE? 17 THAT'S THE ONE THING I DON'T UNDERSTAND. I UNDERSTAND HOW IT CERTAINLY SLOWS THE MOTION OF WAVES WHICH CAN BE DEVASTATING, 18 RIGHT, BUT CAN YOU EXPLAIN WHAT WOULD HAPPEN THERE? 19

20

21 HEIDI NUTTERS: SO WITH THE COMPARISON OF THE CONVENTIONAL SEA 22 WALL COMPARED TO A HORIZONTAL LEVEE, IT REALLY DEPENDS ON THE 23 PROJECT. SO IN SOME CASES, YOU WOULD HAVE A -- UTILIZE A 24 CONVENTIONAL SEA WALL WHICH IS VERY EFFECTIVE WITH HABITAT 25 ADJACENT TO IT SO THAT YOU'RE GETTING THE LONG-TERM FLOOD

PROTECTION BENEFIT WHILE ALSO GETTING THAT REDUCTION OF THE 1 IMPACT OF, YOU KNOW, WAVE RUN-UP OR EXTREME STORMS BECAUSE WE 2 DO KNOW THAT THE VEGETATION, YOU KNOW, ON THE HABITAT SLOWS 3 THE IMPACT OF THAT FROM STORMS. AND THEN WITH WETLANDS, WE 4 5 KNOW THEY NATURALLY INCREASE IN THEIR HEIGHT OVER TIME. PARTICULARLY, AS WE HAVE A HEALTHY SYSTEM WITH SEDIMENT 6 FLOWING INTO THOSE WETLANDS. SO THEY HAVE THE ABILITY TO 7 8 CONTINUE TO INCREASE OVER TIME. SO AS LONG AS WE ENSURE THE HEALTH OF OUR ESTUARY, THEN, THEY CAN CONTINUE TO DO THAT. 9 10 ALTHOUGH, THERE'S DEFINITELY A SEDIMENT DEFICIT FOR OUR REGION THAT'S BEEN HEAVILY STUDIED. 11 12 CARLOS ROMERO: THANK YOU. THAT WAS HELPFUL IN KIND OF 13 UNDERSTANDING HOW THAT GETS MITIGATED. APPRECIATE IT. 14 15

16 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU. CONGRESS MEMBER EKLUND.

17

PAT EKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, PRESIDENT RAMOS. CAITLIN, I'M 18 REALLY, REALLY SUPER EXCITED ABOUT THIS PROJECT. ONE OF THE 19 CONCEPTS IS -- COULD YOU TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE REUSE OF 20 THE WASTEWATER, THE TREATED WASTEWATER? BECAUSE LOVE TO KNOW 21 HOW THAT'S GOING TO BE USED. I DON'T REMEMBER HEARING IT IN 22 THE PRESENTATION BUT MAYBE IT WAS THERE. BECAUSE WHEN I WORKED 23 FOR THE E.P.A., I WAS VERY INVOLVED IN ACTUALLY -- AND 24 ACTUALLY WENT BACK TO D.C. TO HELP WRITE THE AGENCY'S POLICIES 25

ON THE REUSE OF MUNICIPAL SLUDGE AS WELL AS THE REUSE OF 1 MUNICIPAL WASTEWATER. AND SO THAT WAS DECADES AGO. AND SO IT'S 2 3 REALLY EXCITING TO SEE BECAUSE MOST PEOPLE DON'T -- MOST MUNICIPALITIES OR SANITARY DISTRICTS JUST DISCHARGE IT INTO 4 5 THE BAY OR WHATEVER. I'D LIKE TO KNOW HOW IT'S GOING TO BE USED IN THIS PARTICULAR PROJECT AND THEN HOW -- THAT'S ONE OF 6 THE BENEFITS OF DOING A HORIZONTAL LEVEE AS WELL AS USE OF 7 8 TREATED WASTEWATER AND IS THERE ANY TYPE OF ANALYSIS --FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF WHAT COULD BE SAVED, POSSIBLY, BY 9 MUNICIPALITIES OR SANITARY DISTRICTS? 10

CAITLIN SWEENEY: THANK YOU, PAT. YES, THE IDEA WITH THE 12 HORIZONTAL LEVEE, AS WE USE THAT TERM, IS ONE THAT HAS TREATED 13 WASTEWATER FILTERED THROUGH THE LEVEES. THIS IS WASTEWATER 14 THAT CAN BE TREATED TO THE BAY BUT FILTERING IT THROUGH THIS 15 16 LEVEE ALLOWS MORE ADDITIONAL REMOVAL OF NUTRIENTS AND OTHER CONTAMINANTS. AND IT IS A TOOL THAT I THINK LOCAL 17 MUNICIPALITIES ARE LOOKING AT IN PARTICULAR WITH THE IDEA THAT 18 THEY ARE EXPECTING, PERHAPS, INCREASED REGULATORY REOUIREMENTS 19 WITH REGARD TO NUTRIENT REMOVAL. SO THIS MIGHT BE A WAY TO 20 21 ADDRESS THOSE COMING DOWN -- COMING DOWN THE PIPE SOON, THOSE ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FROM REGULATORY AGENCIES WITHOUT 22 HAVING TO UNDERTAKE A MASSIVE OVERHAUL OF THEIR GRAY 23 INFRASTRUCTURE OF THEIR TREATMENT PLANT. 24
