CHAIR, NATE MILEY: OKAY. THANK YOU. SO, AGENDA ITEM 3A. THE 23 REGIONAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, PROJECT PARTNERS IN MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH PROJECT SPONSOR AND FUNDING PARTNERS, 24 BAY AREA MEGA PROJECT, DIRIDON STATION, AND THE TRANSBAY JOINT 25

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POWERS AUTHORITY REQUEST TO AUTHORIZE THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR 1 WITH DIRIDON STATION COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT WITH PROJECT 2 3 PARTNERS IN THE TRANSBAY JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY IN MEMORANDUM UNDERSTANDING WITH THE PROJECT SPONSOR FUNDING AND ESTABLISH 4 5 ROLLED AND RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE NEXT PHASE OF THESE PROJECTS. I WOULD LIKE TO TURN IT OVER TO OUR EXECUTIVE 6 DIRECTOR IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO MAKE ANY INTRODUCTORY MARKS 7 8 BEFORE TURN IT OVER TO JAMES AND THERESA TO PRESENT THIS ITEM 9 TO THE COMMISSION FOR APPROVAL.

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ANDREW FREMIER: THANK YOU VICE CHAIR MILEY I THINK IT'S AN 11 EXCITING OPPORTUNITY TO TALK ABOUT THESE PROJECTS AND IT'S 12 IMPORTANT TO PUT CONTEXT TO THE DISCUSSION IN 2022 A WORKSHOP 13 ON MEGA PROJECT DELIVERY THE COMMISSION DIRECTED STAFF TO 14 ESTABLISH THE MAJOR PROJECT POLICY TO ASSIST IN DELIVERING 15 16 MEGA PROJECTS INCLUDED IN PLANNED BAY AREA STAFF WAS DIRECTED TO GET MORE INVOLVED IN THE REGION'S MEGA PROJECTS ESPECIALLY 17 DURING PROJECT DEVELOPMENT STAGES EARLY AND OFTEN TO REALLY 18 DEAL WITH RISK MANAGEMENT AND TO BE AN ACTIVE INVESTOR. THE 19 DIRIDON STATION IN SAN JOSE AND THE PORTAL PROJECT WHICH WOULD 20 21 EXTEND CALTRAIN TO DOWNTOWN SAN FRANCISCO ARE TWO EXAMPLES 22 WHERE MTC IS PURSUING THAT CHANGE AS PART OF AN INTEGRATED 23 MULTI-PARTNER PROJECT TEAM THIS. HAS GIVEN US A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF THE PROJECT DESIGN, CONTRACTING APPROACHES 24 AND RISKS, AND ALLOWS US TO BRING BETTER INFORMATION MORE 25

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OUICKLY TO THE COMMISSION. IN BOTH CASES, THE AGENCIES 1 INVOLVED WISH TO CONTINUE THE PARTNERSHIP INTO THE NEXT 2 3 DELIVERY PHASES, ENVIRONMENTAL CLEARANCE FOR DIRIDON AND CONSTRUCTION FOR THE PORTAL. THE AGREEMENTS BEFORE YOU TODAY 4 5 ARE ALSO INTENDED TO DO JUST THAT, AND I CONSIDER THIS TO BE A VERY GOOD DEVELOPMENT THAT IS HELPING THE REGION APPROACH MEGA 6 PROJECTS MUCH MORE EFFECTIVELY. REGIONAL PARTICIPATION AND 7 8 LEADERSHIP BY MTC IS MORE IMPORTANT NOW THAN EVER AS WE SEE INCREASED COMPETITION FOR SCARCE CAPITAL GRANT OPPORTUNITIES 9 AT THE FEDERAL, STATE, REGIONAL, AND LOCAL LEVELS, LOOKING TO 10 THE FUTURE, DELIVER OTHER CAPITAL PROJECTS ON TIME AND WITHIN 11 BUDGET IS ONLY THE FIRST STEP. EXPANSION PROJECTS WILL ONE DAY 12 COMPETE FOR LIMITED OPERATING AND MAINTENANCE FUNDING THAT IS 13 ALREADY NOT ABLE TO SUPPORT THE EXISTING BAY AREA TRANSIT 14 15 SYSTEM AS WE KNOW IT. WE ARE WELL AWARE FROM YOUR LEADERSHIP 16 AROUND THE TRANSIT OPERATORS FACED REAL CHALLENGES IN THIS 17 ARENA. AS WE MOVE FORWARD WITH PROJECTS IN THE EARLY STAGES, SUCH AS DIRIDON, VALLEY LINK, AND STATE ROUTE 37, IT'S 18 IMPORTANT TO CONTEMPLATE THE PROS AND CONS OF ESTABLISHING NEW 19 ENTITIES TO DELIVER, OPERATE, AND MAINTAIN THE NEW 20 21 INVESTMENTS. THIS IS CONSISTENT WITH THE FINDINGS FROM THE BAY AREA REGIONAL RAIL PARTNERSHIP STUDY THAT WAS COMPLETED IN 22 2023. IT NOTED THAT THE DELIVERY GOVERNANCE MODEL FOR MEGA 23 PROJECTS SHOULD BE INFORMED BY THE UNDERSTANDING OF THE 24 25 PROJECTS IN A REGIONAL PORTFOLIO, RATHER THAN IN PROJECT IN

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ISOLATION. ESTABLISHING A CONSTRUCTION DELIVERY AUTHORITY THAT 1 IS INDEPENDENT OF A SPECIFIC PROJECT AND INDEPENDENT OF 2 3 ADVOCATES FOR ITS -- INDEPENDENTLY ADVOCATING FOR FUNDING FOR THAT SPECIAL PROJECT SHOULD BE CONSIDERED AS WE MOVE FORWARD 4 5 IN THE PORTFOLIO. WE DO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THE PORTAL IS A DIFFERENT STAGE THAN DIRIDON. THE PORTAL IS BEING DELIVERED BY 6 AN EXISTING AGENCY AND IS OUITE ADVANCED BUT THE WORK ON OTHER 7 8 PROJECTS WE SHOULD BE CAUTIOUS ABOUT CREATING ADDITIONAL SINGLE PURPOSE ENTITIES FOR THESE MEGA PROJECTS. THERESE AND 9 JAMES WILL PROVIDE SOME DETAILS ON THE AGREEMENTS BEFORE YOU. 10 BUT WE DO RECOMMEND THAT YOU AUTHORIZE THE AGREEMENT AND THAT 11 WE CONTINUE TO BRING FORWARD CONCEPTS AND FRAMEWORKS TO REFINE 12 THE REGIONAL LEADERSHIP ROLE IN THESE PROJECTS AND IN OTHERS. 13 THANK YOU. THERESE? 14

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16 THERESE TRIVEDI: GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS, THERESE TRIVEDI ASSISTANT DIRECTOR AND JAMES TO THINK WE'LL BE REQUESTING THE 17 COMMISSION TO APPROVE THE COMMITTEE AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO 18 ENTER INTO PROJECTS, DIRIDON STATION COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT 19 WITH PROJECT PARTNERS AT THE CORRIDOR WE HAVE TRANSBAY JOINT 20 POWERS AUTHORITY PORTALS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING MOU I'LL 21 START WITH DETAILS ABOUT DIRIDON AND JAMES WILL TALK ABOUT THE 22 PORTAL. BEFORE DIVING INTO DIRIDON I WANT TO REFERENCE THE 23 2022 COMMISSION WORKSHOP SETTING CONTEXT AND BACKDROP FOR BOTH 24 25 PROJECTS. AS ANDY MENTIONED IN HIS INTRODUCTION, THE

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COMMISSION HELD THIS WORKSHOP A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO THAT 1 REALLY FOCUSED ON DISCUSSION ABOUT CHARGES AND OPPORTUNITIES 2 3 OF DELIVERING MAJOR PROJECTS IN THE REGION AND MTC'S ROLE IN THE DELIVERY OF THOSE PROJECTS BOTH LOOKING BACK AND LOOKING 4 5 AT OPPORTUNITIES AHEAD. AND IN THAT DISCUSSION, OBVIOUSLY, THERE WAS THE REQUEST TO DEVELOP FUNDING STRATEGIES TO 6 PRIORITIZE AND SEQUENCE REQUESTS THAT COME THROUGH FOR THESE 7 8 PROJECTS AND OTHER ENTITY IN THE REGION WHICH DID LEAD TO THE ADOPTION OF MTC'S MAJOR PROJECT ADVANCEMENT POLICY LATER THAT 9 YEAR. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO NOW MOVING INTO DIRIDON, MTC STAFF 10 HAS BEEN ENGAGED IN DIRIDON PLANNING EFFORTS FOR MANY YEARS 11 DATING BACK TO THE EARLIER 2000s WITH SOME STATIONARY PLANNING 12 SUPPORT AS WELL AS OTHER PARTICIPATION IN OTHER PLANNING 13 EFFORTS OVER THE YEARS FAST FORWARDING TO 2020, THAT IS WHEN 14 15 MTC ENTERED INTO THE INITIAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT WITH OUR 16 PARTNER AGENCIES. I SHOULD NAME THEM, THEY'RE LISTED HERE, THE CITY OF SAN JOSE, CALTRAIN, VTA, AND CALIFORNIA HIGH SPEED 17 RAIL. AT THAT TIME, THERE WAS SOME CONCEPTUAL WORK THAT WAS 18 BEING COMPLETED FOR THE DIRIDON STATION AREA. AND AT THAT 19 TIME, THE PARTNERS IDENTIFIED THE NEED TO, IN ORDER TO ADVANCE 20 21 THE PROJECT, IT REALLY WOULD NEED MORE EFFORT ON THE DESIGN 22 THAN THE THEN CONCEPTUAL DESIGNS WERE ILLUMINATING. THE IDEA HERE WAS THAT THE TIME FRAME PARTNER AGENCIES DEVELOPED A 23 SCOPE OF WORK TO ADVANCE BUSINESS CASE LOOK AT EXPANDING 24 FURTHER CONCEPTUAL DESIGN AND REALLY DEFINE PROJECT MOVE INTO 25

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ENVIRONMENTAL AND MOVE AHEAD. IN 2021 MTC CONTRIBUTED \$2 1 MILLION TO COMPLETE THIS BUSINESS CASE AND IN ADDITION TO 2 3 DEVELOPING SOME DESIGN ALTERNATIVES THAT WOULD ADVANCE, THE IDEA WAS ALSO TO EXPLORE BOTH SHORT-TERM AND LONG-TERM 4 5 GOVERNANCE OPTIONS TO GUIDE THE PROJECT FORWARD. FINALLY TO NOTE DIRIDON IS AN RM3 PROJECT THERE IS \$100 MILLION IN THE 6 MEASURE FOR DIRIDON AND TO DATE THE PROJECT HAS RECEIVED JUST 7 8 OVER \$30 MILLION MAINLY FOR RIGHT OF WAY PURCHASE BUT ALSO FOR PREENVIRONMENTAL WORK. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO NOW TALKING A 9 LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE AGREEMENT BEFORE YOU TODAY. AS NOTED MTC 10 IS IN THE CURRENT AGREEMENT WITH THE PARTNER AGENCIES AND IT'S 11 WORTH NOTING THAT THE NEW CO-OP AGREEMENT ENGAGES PARTNERS IN 12 A MANNER SIMILARLY TO WHAT'S INCLUDED IN THE EXISTING 13 AGREEMENT. I WILL SAY WITH THE PARTNER AGENCIES THERE ARE MANY 14 15 LEVELS OF STAFF THAT ARE INVOLVED IN THE PROJECT THERE, IS A 16 TECHNICAL LEVEL, A POLICY LEVEL, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND THE GENERAL MANAGER'S PARTICIPATE AS WELL AS THE JOIN POLICY 17 BOARD WHICH IS MADE UP MAINLY OF ELECTED OFFICIALS, 18 COMMISSIONER MAHAN REPRESENTS MTC ON THE AS THE NAME IMPLIES 19 AN ADVISORY BODY WORTH NOTING IT'S A NEW AGREEMENT IN ORDER TO 20 21 MOVE THE PROJECT FORWARD WE NEED MORE DECISION-MAKING CO-OP 22 AGREEMENT EVOLVING ADVISORY P JAB DECISION MAKING STEERING COMMITTEE AND MTC WOULD CONTINUE TO HAVE A SEAT ON THAT 23 COMMITTEE THE AGREEMENT DOES HAVE PROVISIONS FOR STAFFING OF 24 THE PARTNER AGENCIES AND HOW THEY WOULD PARTICIPATE DOES 25

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IDENTIFY AREAS OF LEAD RESPONSIBILITY FOR EACH PARTNER AGENCY 1 AND AS MAY BE OBSTACLE MTC WILL LEAD THE REGIONAL LEGISLATIVE 2 3 ADVOCACY FUNDING AND NETWORK COORDINATION. ALSO NOTE ANOTHER HIGHLIGHT FROM THE CO-OP AGREEMENT IS THAT CURRENTLY AS I 4 5 MENTIONED THERE IS A LOT OF STAFF THAT PARTICIPATE FROM THE PARTNER AGENCIES. THERE ISN'T A DEDICATED STAFF PERSON THAT'S 6 FOCUSED ON DIRIDON, YOU KNOW, AS THEIR FULL-TIME DAY JOB. SO, 7 8 THE CO-OP AGREEMENT DOES ALLOW FOR HIRING OF A PROJECT DIRECTOR THROUGH CALTRAIN, WHICH WOULD SERVE AS THE LEAD 9 AGENCY. AND THAT PROJECT DIRECTOR WOULD REPORT TO THE STEERING 10 11 COMMITTEE AND WOULD BE ALLOWED TO DEVELOP ACTIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE STEERING COMMITTEE. THE CO-OP 12 AGREEMENT DOES SERVE AS THE NEAR-TERM GOVERNANCE FOR THE 13 PROJECT AND THE NEAR-TERM AGREEMENT IS UP TO FOUR YEARS WHICH 14 IS ANTICIPATED TO CARRY THE PROJECT THROUGH THE ENVIRONMENTAL 15 16 PHASE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO NOW TO TOUCH ON NEXT STEPS. AS A RESULT THE BUSINESS CASE WORK THAT I MENTIONED EARLIER IS 17 WRAPPING UP. THERE ARE TWO DESIGN ALTERNATIVES THAT ARE STILL 18 AROUND CONSIDERATION AND IN EARLY 2025, WE ANTICIPATE THERE 19 WOULD BE A SELECTION OF PREFERRED VERSION THAT WOULD ADVANCE. 20 THE CO-OP AGREEMENT BEFORE YOU IS ALSO A MAJOR MILESTONE AS 21 22 ONE OF THE BUSINESS CASE DELIVERABLES. AND THEN FINALLY AS 23 ANDY HAD ALLUDED TO IN HIS OPENING REMARKS THERE IS STILL DISCUSSION THAT IS ONGOING ABOUT THE LONG-TERM GOVERNANCE FOR 24 THE PROJECT. THE CONSULTANT TEAM THAT IS SUPPORTING THE 25

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PROJECT WITH THE BUSINESS CASE HAS LOOKED AT SEVERAL PEER 1 ORGANIZATIONS AND GOVERNANCE STRUCTURES OVER THE LAST YEAR AND 2 3 THE CURRENT CONSIDERATION IS LEANING TOWARDS ESTABLISHING A CONSTRUCTION DELIVERY AUTHORITY. AND AS ANDY NOTED MTC STAFF 4 5 DOES HAVE SOME INTEREST HERE. IN ADDITION TO DELIVERING THE DIRIDON PROJECT THERE COULD BE SOME POSSIBILITIES FOR 6 DELIVERING OTHER MEGA PROJECTS IN THE REGION, AS YOU KNOW, 7 8 ALSO REFERENCING THE 2022 WORKSHOP, I THINK ONE OF THE CHALLENGES FOR THE REGION IS THAT THERE ISN'T CONSISTENT 9 STAFFING EXPERTISE AND CAPACITY TO DELIVER THESE MEGA PROJECTS 10 SO THIS COULD BE AN OPPORTUNITY TO DO SO AND THAT HOPEFULLY 11 WOULD HELP TO ELIMINATE DELIVERY RISK AS WE GO FORWARD. ON THE 12 OTHER -- MAYBE ANOTHER SIDE OF THAT COIN IS THAT ANOTHER THING 13 THAT ANDY MENTION SIDE THAT BY CREATING ANOTHER ENTITY IN THE 14 15 REGION, IT WOULD ADD TO THE MANY OTHER THAT ARE ALREADY 16 EXISTING AND MAY SERVE TO COMPLICATE AN ALREADY COMPETITIVE LANDSCAPE SO THESE ARE AREAS THAT WE WANT TO CONTINUE THE 17 CONVERSATION PART OF THAT DISCUSSION. I'LL TURN IT OVER TO 18 JAMES WHOLE TALK ABOUT THE PORTAL. 19

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SPEAKER: THANK YOU THERESA. GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS. NEXT SLIDE. A QUICK OVERVIEW AND BACKGROUND OF THE PROJECT, THE IMAGE IN FRONT OF YOU SHOWS THE TWO MILE TUNNEL THAT WILL CONNECT THE FOURTH AND KING STATION TO THE SALESFORCE TRANSIT CENTER THIS IS WHAT WE CALL THE PORTAL, PORTAL MOU, THAT WE'LL

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BE PRESENTING TO YOU TODAY FOLLOWS PREVIOUS MOU THAT WAS 1 ESTABLISHED IN JUNE OF 2020 AND IT HAS EXPIRED IN MAY OF THIS 2 3 YEAR HAD SET UP A WORKING RELATIONSHIP WITH SIX PARTNER AGENCIES INCLUDES TRANSBAY JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY, TJPA, 4 5 CALTRAIN, CALIFORNIA HIGH SPEED RAIL AUTHORITY, COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY AND CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO 6 AND OF COURSE MTC. AND SINCE THAT TIME, MTC HAS HAD GREAT 7 8 INSIGHT AND PARTICIPATION INTO THE PORTAL PROJECT. THE TEAM HAS ESTABLISHED THE PROGRAM DELIVERY STRATEGY WE HAVE 9 DEVELOPED THE PROCUREMENT DOCUMENTS AND ADVANCED THE PROJECT 10 THROUGH THE FTA NEW STARTS PROGRAM. THE PROGRAM TOTAL IS \$8.2 11 BILLION, AND THIS PROJECT DOES RECEIVE RM3 CONTRIBUTION OF 12 \$325 MILLION. AND JUST AS A NOTE, THAT LAST BULLET IS NOT JUST 13 FOR PRECONSTRUCTION IT'S FOR THE WHOLE PROJECT. I BELIEVE THAT 14 PRECONSTRUCTION IS LESS THAN 325. SO APOLOGIES FOR THE ERROR. 15 16 NEXT SLIDE. THE NEW MOU ESTABLISHES A NEW FRAMEWORK WHICH WAS DEFINED IN THE PORTAL OF GOVERNANCE BLUEPRINT THAT WAS 17 APPROVED BY THE TJPA BOARD IN AUGUST OF 2023. THE GRAPHIC ON 18 THE RIGHT SHOWS YOU THAT GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE AND THE BUBBLES 19 SHOWN IN RED HIGHLIGHT THE AREAS OF MTC PARTICIPATION. AND 20 JUST TO DIRECT YOUR ATTENTION TO THE PORTAL BOARD COMMITTEE, 21 THIS COMMITTEE WILL HAVE MTC PARTICIPATION, AS WELL. WE HAVE A 22 NON-VOTING MEMBER, OUT OF THE FOUR MEMBERS TOTAL. SO, THE KEY 23 FUNCTIONAL GROUPS FOR MTC PARTICIPATION WILL BE THE BOARD 24 COMMITTEE, JUST MENTIONED, THE EXECUTIVE WORKING GROUP, THE 25

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INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT TEAM, AND THE CHANGE CONTROL BOARD. SO, 1 WE REALLY DO HAVE GOES VISIBILITY INTO THE GOVERNANCE OF THE 2 3 PORTAL PROJECT. THE IDEAL OF THIS NEXT MOU IS TO PROVIDE MANAGEMENT FOR THIS PROJECT THROUGH THE DELIVERY PHASE. WE 4 5 EXPECT THE TERM OF THIS AGREEMENT TO LAST APPROXIMATELY NINE YEARS, AND SUNSETTING AT THE TESTING AND COMMISSIONING PHASE. 6 AND JUST TO NOTE THAT THIS MOU DOES HAVE AN ATTACHMENT WHICH 7 8 IS A WORKPLAN AND THAT WORKPLAN WILL DEFINE THE WORKING RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN EACH PARTNER AGENCY. NEXT SLIDE. AND 9 10 JUST TO GO THROUGH THE NEXT STEPS FOR THE PROJECT, THE NEXT --ONE OF THE NEXT DOCUMENTS WE NEED TO DEVELOP IS THE CHANGE 11 CONTROL BOARD CHARTER. AND THIS CHARTER DOCUMENT WILL DEFINE 12 THE RULES FOR ENGAGEMENT WITH THE CHANGE CONTROL BOARD. TJPA 13 WILL LEAD THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE CHARTER, ALONG WITH 14 CONSULTATION WITH MTC AND SFCTA. WE MUST STAND UP THE VARIOUS 15 16 COMMITTEES AND BOARDS AND BODIES THAT WE JUST SAW IN THE PREVIOUS GRAPHIC AND WE MUST INITIATE PRECONSTRUCTION 17 CONTRACTS. THIS IS ALL TO REALLY TARGET AN FTA FULL FUNDING 18 19 GRANT AGREEMENT DATE OF JULY 2027. AND ALONG THE WAY, WE WILL CONTINUE TO APPLY FOR GRANTS AND EVALUATE THE COST SAVING 20 MEASURES SUCH AS VALUE ENGINEERING ACTIVITIES TO TRY TO REDUCE 21 22 THE COST OF THE PROJECT. NEXT SLIDE. AND JUST TO WRAP UP, WE ARE REQUESTING COMMITTEE APPROVAL TO ALLOW THE EXECUTIVE 23 DIRECTOR TO DESIGN THE COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT WITH THE -- FOR 24 THE DIRIDON PROJECT WITH THE CITY OF SAN JOSE, CALTRAIN, VTA, 25

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AND THE CALIFORNIA HIGH SPEED RAIL AUTHORITY. AND, ALSO, TO
 ENTER INTO THIS MOU WITH TJPA, CALTRAIN, CALIFORNIA HIGH SPEED
 RAIL AUTHORITY, SFCTA, THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO,
 AND, AGAIN, FOR THE PORTAL PROJECT. THANK YOU, COMMISSIONERS.
 CHAID NATE MILEY: OKAY THANK YOU COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

6 V. CHAIR, NATE MILEY: OKAY. THANK YOU. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS7 OR QUESTIONS? PAPAN?

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21 THERESA ROMMELL: THERESA ROMMEL MTC. I DON'T BELIEVE THE 22 FUNDING PLAN FOR THE PORTAL INCLUDES FUNDING FROM SAN 23 FRANCISCO ITSELF. SO, PLEASE IF WE CAN GET THAT? 17 18 THERESA ROMMELL: I WILL NOTE, I BELIEVE IT'S IN JANUARY THAT 19 WE WILL BE BRIEF -- JANUARY OR FEBRUARY WE'LL BE COMING BACK 20

22 PORTAL PROJECT SPECIFICALLY AS IT RELATES TO THEIR STAGE GATE23 ANALYSIS AS THE PROJECT IS CURRENTLY UNDERWAY WITH.

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16 THERESE TRIVEDI: I MIGHT ADD, THERE HAS BEEN PART OF 17 DISCUSSION OVER THE PAST YEAR WITH BUSINESS CASE AGAIN I THINK 18 IN THE NEAR-TERM DELIVERABLES WE'RE TALKING ABOUT, IT'S ON 19 EVERYBODY'S RADAR.

I 12 INVOLVED IN THE CHALLENGE I THINK OUR SUGGESTION IS THAT ONE 13 OF THESE WE HAVE IDENTIFIED WITH STATE OF CALIFORNIA WHEN THEY 14 15 BUILT THE BRIDGE SYSTEM AND TUNNELS THEY DO FIRST TIME OUT THE 16 GATE ON PROJECTS FOR THE FIRST TIME 5060 YEARS AT TIMES IN THE CASE WHERE ENTITY HAD TO LEARN HOW TO BUILD THE BRIDGE, 17 THEY'RE GOING TO DO A TUNNEL, OUR SUGGESTION IS MAYBE LOOK AT 18 WHETHER WE GET THE BENEFIT OF THE DELIVER THAT CAN DO MULTIPLE 19 MEGA PROJECTS, LEARNING THE INTENT AND NEEDS SEPARATE 20 21 MECHANISMS TO FIGURE OUT HOW TO DELIVER THE QUESTION HOW YOU CAN DELIVER MEGA PROJECTS MORE EFFICIENTLY IN THE REGION THEN 22 BUILD ON CAPITAL INVESTMENT WHAT YOU LEARN ABOUT THE DELIVERY 23 PROCESS ALONG THE WAY. 24

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CONSTRUCTION AS YOU MOVE FORWARD IN ORDER TO BE MORE EFFICIENT 1 2 AND SAVE FUNDING. BECAUSE COMMISSIONER ABE-KOGA AND I ARE 3 REALLY HAVING PROBLEMS WITH GRADE SEPARATIONS ALONG THOSE LINES. SO, JUST A BIT OF ADVICE. BECAUSE WE WANT TO MAKE SURE 4 5 THIS WORKS AND IN AN EFFICIENT MANNER. THANK YOU. 6 7 V. CHAIR, NATE MILEY: ANY OTHER COMMISSIONERS? OKAY. SEEING 8 NONE. THERESA ROMMELL: THROUGH THE CHAIR IF I COULD MAKE A QUICK 13 REMARK IN REGARD TO THIS ITEM AND THE NEXT YOU WILL BE HEARING 14 TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL CONTEXT. BUT THE COMMON THREAD TO ALL OF THEM IS THAT THEY 19 EACH INCLUDE PROGRAMMING THAT WILL SATISFY MUCH OF THE 300 20 MILLION IN REGIONAL FUNDING COMMITMENT TO ADDRESS FISCAL YEAR 21 22 2025 AND 2026 PUBLIC TRANSIT OPERATING SHORTFALLS. THIS COMMITMENT WAS MADE THROUGH MTC RESOLUTION 4619 REVISED THAT 23 WAS APPROVED BY THE COMMISSION LAST MONTH. TODAY'S ACTIONS 24 IMPLEMENT THAT COMMITMENT. AND THESE ACTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN 25

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AS SEPARATE ITEMS AND ARE NOT COMBINED BECAUSE ACTIONS BEING 1 PROPOSED DO MORE THAN JUST ADDRESS TRANSIT OPERATING 2 3 SHORTFALLS. I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT THIS PROGRAMMING AND REGIONAL COMMITMENT AS A CONTINUATION. ACTIONS THE COMMISSION HAS TAKEN 4 5 SINCE 2020 TO AVERT MAJOR CUTS TO BAY AREA PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION. THESE ACTIONS ARE CONSISTENT WITH SB125 PLAN 6 THAT WAS SUBMITTED TO THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA, WHICH REFLECT 7 8 BOTH STATE AND REGIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS TO TRANSIT OPERATIONS. SO, THAT ADDITIONAL CONTEXT, I WILL HAND IT OVER TO RALEIGH 9 10 FOR THE PRESENTATION.

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ADDRESS UNANTICIPATED BUDGET DEFICITS IN THIS FISCAL YEAR AND 1 \$100,000 FOR COUNTY CONNECTION TO SUPPORT LOCAL CONNECTIONS TO 2 3 BART. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. TO TIE TODAY'S PROGRAMMING INTO THE BIG PICTURE OF HOW RM3 ELIGIBLE OPERATOR SHORTFALLS ARE BEING 4 5 ADDRESSED THIS TABLE IDENTIFIES STANDARDIZED SHORTFALLS THREE YEARS OF WRIGHT M THREE OPERATING PROGRAM FUNDING ACROSS 2024, 6 7 '25, AND '26 AND OTHER OPERATING FUNDING THAT WOULD FULLY 8 ADDRESS STANDARDIZED SHORTFALLS WHERE THOSE OPERATORS STANDARDIZED SHORTFALLS ARE GREATER THAN RM3 ELIGIBLE 9 EXPENSES.
