CHAIR, BELIA RAMOS, ABAG AC: MOVING TO ITEM 9A MTC RESOLUTION
 4687 AND ABAG RESOLUTION NUMBER 042025, PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+
 FINAL BLUEPRINT. WE WILL RECEIVE A REPORT FROM CHIRAG RABARI,
 BUT ALSO DAVE VAUTIN IS ON HAND SO I'LL HAND IT OVER TO YOU,
 PLEASE.

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DAVE VAUTIN: THANK YOU PRESIDENT RAMOS. AND GOOD MORNING 7 8 COMMISSIONERS AND BOARD MEMBERS. DAVE VAUTIN, PLANNING DIRECTOR. I WANT TO OUICKLY SET THE STAGE FOR THIS MORNING'S 9 ACTION ITEM ON PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+, THE REGIONAL PLAN FOR 10 TRANSPORTATION, HOUSING, THE ECONOMY, AND THE ENVIRONMENT, 11 WHICH HAS BEEN UNDER DEVELOPMENT FOR THE PAST 18 MONTHS. THIS 12 IS THE SECOND OF FOUR KEY APPROVAL MILESTONES FOR THE LONG 13 RANGE PLAN AND WOULD ADVANCE THE FINAL BLUEPRINT FOR ANALYSIS. 14 SIMILAR TO PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 THE FINAL BLUEPRINT CONTINUES 15 16 TO INCLUDE 35 STRATEGIES THAT HAVE BEEN STRATEGICALLY REVISED TO MEET THE MOMENT WITH SIGNIFICANT PUBLIC AND STAKEHOLDER 17 INVOLVEMENT OVER THE PAST YEAR. THROUGHOUT THE FALL, KEY 18 PIECES OF THE PUZZLE HAVE BEEN ROLLED OUT AT THIS COMMITTEE 19 FOR FEEDBACK, INCLUDING THE TRANSIT 2050+ NETWORK IN SEPTEMBER 20 21 AND DECEMBER. THE REVISED STRATEGIES IN OCTOBER AND THE TRANSPORTATION AND RESILIENCE PROJECT LIST IN DECEMBER. THIS 22 ITEM PUTS TOGETHER ALL OF THOSE PIECES INTO A PLAN THAT IS 23 MORE FISCALLY CONSTRAINED AND REFLECTS THE STRONGER HEADWINDS 24 FACING THE BAY AREA THAN IN YEARS PAST. WHILE THE FINAL 25

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BLUEPRINT IS OPTIMISTIC ABOUT NEW REVENUES COMING INTO 1 FRUITION IN DECADES AHEAD THERE IS LESS MONEY OVERALL THAN IN 2 3 PRIOR CYCLES WHICH MADE THE TRADE-OFFS TOUGHER. DESPITE ALL THAT IT INTEGRATES THE VISION FOR BAY AREA TRANSIT THAT PUTS 4 5 RIDERS FIRST FOCUSES ON FREQUENCY AND RELIABILITY SAFETY EXPANDED CLIMATE STRATEGIES DESIGNED TO HELP US MEET EVER MORE 6 DIFFICULT GHG TARGETS AND CONTINUES TO LEAD INTO HOUSING AND 7 8 LAND USE STRATEGIES AS AVENUES TO ADVANCE EQUITY, AFFORDABILITY, AND SUSTAINABILITY GOALS. TODAY'S ACTION IF 9 APPROVED BY THE COMMISSION AND ABAG BOARD LATER THIS MONTH 10 WOULD ADVANCE THE FINAL BLUEPRINT AND ITS COMPOSITE 11 GEOGRAPHIES STRATEGIES AND PROJECTS FOR FURTHER STUDY AND 12 ANALYSIS THIS WINTER ALLOWING STAFF TO REPORT BACK TO ALL OF 13 YOU IN THE SPRING ON OUTCOMES AND FINDINGS. THAT INCLUDES 14 15 ALLOWING US TO DETERMINE IF THIS BLUEPRINT MEETS OR FALLS SHORT OF THE CRITICAL GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS TARGET, GIVEN 16 THAT KEY TRANSPORTATION FUND SOURCES ARE DEPENDENT ON THAT 17 ACHIEVEMENT AND WE'LL BE ABLE TO PROVIDE THAT INFORMATION TO 18 ALL OF YOU PRIOR TO THE THIRD OF THOSE FOUR ACTION ITEMS, 19 20 WHICH WOULD ADVANCE THE PLAN INTO THE CEOA PROCESS. WITH THAT, 21 I'LL TURN IT OVER TO CHIRAG RABARI, PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ PROJECT MANAGER. 22

24 CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU DAVE AND GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS25 AND BOARD MEMBERS. WE CAN GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE. I THINK DAVE

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COVERED THE PROCESS AND SCHEDULE TO DATE PRETTY WELL. I THINK 1 2 I WOULD JUST NOTE WE'RE ABOUT A YEAR AND A HALF INTO THIS 3 PROCESS AND THIS IS A KEY TRANSITION, AS WE MOVE OUT OF THIS BLUEPRINT ANALYTICAL PHASE AND INTO THE FINAL YEAR OF THE PLAN 4 5 WHERE WE WILL BE DEVELOPING AN EIR DRAFT PLAN AND DRAFT IMPLEMENTATION PLAN, AND WE DO EXPECT BRINGING THE PLAN 6 FORWARD FOR APPROVAL TO YOU ALL AT EITHER THE END OF 2025 OR 7 8 BEGINNING OF 2026. NEXT SLIDE. SO, WE DO THROW A LOT OF TERMINOLOGY AROUND, AND WE THOUGHT IT WOULD BE HELPFUL JUST TO 9 10 CLARIFY SOME OF THE KEY ELEMENTS OF WHAT WE CALL THE BLUEPRINT. IT'S REALLY THREE KEY TRACKS OF WORK. THERE ARE --11 THERE IS OUR BASELINE DATA WHICH IS REALLY ABOUT WHERE ARE WE 12 RIGHT NOW IN TERMS OF OUR EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES, THE 13 ZONING AND LAND USE DATA THAT WE USE TO UNDERSTAND, YOU KNOW, 14 15 WHERE WE ARE WITH RESPECT TO THE HOUSING AND LAND USE IN THE REGION, AS WELL AS OUR TRANSIT SERVICE LEVELS. WE THEN TRY TO 16 UNDERSTAND WHAT COULD HAPPEN IN THE FUTURE WITH RESPECT TO 17 DIFFERENT KEY EXTERNAL FORCES, LIKE WORK-FROM-HOME LEVELS, OR 18 SEA LEVEL RISE, HOW MUCH WE THINK THE REGION IS GOING TO GROW 19 IN TERMS OF POPULATION, JOBS, AND HOUSING, AS WELL AS NEEDS 20 21 AND REVENUE ANALYSIS IN OUR TRANSPORTATION, HOUSING AND ENVIRONMENT ELEMENTS. BUT IMPORTANTLY WE NEED THEN TO 22 UNDERSTAND HOW ARE WE GOING TO GET TO WHERE WE WANT TO GO IN 23 TERMS OF OUR REGIONAL VISION AND GOALS, AS WELL AS DEVELOPING 24 A PLAN THAT CAN COMPLY WITH ALL OF THE VARIOUS STATUTORY 25

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REQUIREMENTS AND THAT'S WHERE THE POLICY AND INVESTMENTS COME 1 IN AND THAT'S WHAT YOU ALL ARE TAKING ACTION ON TODAY. THESE 2 ARE OUR GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES, STRATEGIES, AS WELL AS OUR 3 TRANSPORTATION PROJECT LIST AND RESILIENCE PROJECT LIST. NEXT 4 5 SLIDE. SO, AS A QUICK REFRESHER, THE COMMITTEES DID APPROVE, AND WE DID STUDY THE DRAFT BLUEPRINT DURING THE FIRST HALF OF 6 2025. IMPORTANTLY, THAT DRAFT BLUEPRINT DID NOT INCLUDE 7 8 TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS, SO THAT IS A KEY ELEMENT OF WHAT WE'RE APPROVING HERE TODAY. HOWEVER, THE DRAFT BLUEPRINT STILL 9 DID SHOW A LOT OF PROGRESS IN SOME IMPORTANT AREAS SUCH AS 10 HOUSING AFFORDABILITY, ACCESS TO OPPORTUNITY, PROTECTIONS FROM 11 NATURAL HAZARDS AS WELL AS OTHER GOALS. HOWEVER, AS WAS 12 ALLUDED TO EARLIER, ARE THE PLAN WAS FALLING SHORT IN SEVERAL 13 KEY AREAS. THAT WAS THEN THE FOCUS OF OUR OUTREACH OVER THE 14 15 LAST SEVERAL MONTHS TO UNDERSTAND HOW WE COULD DEVELOP SOME 16 FINAL BLUEPRINT REFINEMENTS THAT COULD PERFORM BETTER. BUT 17 MOST IMPORTANTLY, WE WERE FALLING SHORT OF THAT STATUTORILY REQUIRED GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS REDUCTION TARGET. YOU KNOW, 18 THE PRIMARY REASON BEING, FOR THAT BEING THAT THE REGION 19 TRANSIT USAGE IN THE REGION IS MUCH LOWER THAN IT WAS PRIOR TO 20 THE PANDEMIC, AND THAT IS REALLY THE BIGGEST HEAD WIND THAT 21 WE'RE FACING IN TERMS OF TRYING TO GET ON THE BETTER TRACK IN 22 TERMS OF GHG PERFORMANCE. BUT WE CAN GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE. I'M 23 GOING TO WALK THROUGH ALL THE DIFFERENT KEY COMPONENTS OF THE 24 FINAL BLUEPRINT ONE BY ONE. WE PRESENTED TO COMMITTEES LAST 25

MONTH ON OUR EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES UPDATE, AND YOU KNOW, 1 AS A REMINDER, WE RELEASED A DRAFT EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES 2 3 MAP EARLIER THIS YEAR AND WORKED CLOSELY WITH ALL OF OUR PARTNERS AND STAKEHOLDERS, AND REALLY LISTENS TO AND HEARD 4 5 SOME OF THEIR CONCERNS REGARDING THE POTENTIAL LOSS OF EPC STATUTES BETWEEN THE PREVIOUS PLAN AND THE CURRENT PLAN 6 UPDATE. AND, SO, FOR PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ WE ARE 7 8 RECOMMENDING THAT WE INCORPORATE -- THAT WE INCLUDE BOTH EPCS THAT WERE A PART OF PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, AS WELL AS EPCS 9 10 THAT WERE NEWLY IDENTIFIED WITH MORE RECENT CENSUS DATA. AND WE WILL ANALYZE BOTH OF THESE DATA LAYERS AS PART OF OUR 11 STATUTORILY REQUIRED EQUITY ANALYSIS. AND WE THINK THAT THIS 12 APPROACH WILL ADDRESS THE CONCERNS THAT WE DID HEAR FROM OUR 13 PARTNERS REGARDING PLANNING AND FUNDING IMPLICATIONS. WILL 14 15 ADDRESS OUR STATUTORY REOUIREMENTS AND WILL CONTINUE OUR 16 EXISTING BOARD APPROVED METHODOLOGY FOR IDENTIFYING EPCS. 17 IMPORTANTLY, AS WE DID MENTION LAST MONTH, WE'LL BE MOVING FORWARD WITH A BROAD EFFORT TO RE-ENVISION THIS EPC FRAMEWORK 18 AND WE LOOK FORWARD TO COLLABORATING WITH ALL OF YOU AS WELL 19 AS OUR PARTNERS OVER THE NEXT SEVERAL YEARS AS THAT MOVES 20 FORWARD. NEXT SLIDE. SO, IT'S A REMINDER, EXTERNAL FORCES, 21 THESE ARE WHAT WE CALL "EXTERNAL FORCES" REFLECT ASSUMPTIONS 22 ABOUT FUTURE YEAR CONDITIONS IN THE BAY AREA BUT THEY'RE 23 SEPARATE FROM THE PLAN'S STRATEGIES. AND CONSIDERING WHERE WE 24 25 ARE IN THE REGION, WE MADE SOME TARGETED UPDATES TO AREAS SUCH

AS WORK-FROM-HOME LEVELS, ANTICIPATED SEA LEVEL RISE AS WELL 1 2 AS PEOPLE'S TRANSIT TRAVEL PREFERENCES. AND JUST TO REFLECT, 3 YOU KNOW, HOW SOME OF THOSE CHANGED WITH MORE RECENT DATA, FOR EXAMPLE, OUR WORK-FROM-HOME ON A TYPICAL DAY, YOU KNOW, IN 4 5 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, THE OBSERVED WORK-FROM-HOME LEVEL, IN 2019, WAS RELATIVELY LOW AT 11% BUT WE ASSUMED THAT THE 6 PANDEMIC IMPACTS WERE GOING TO BE TEMPORARY AND THAT BY THE 7 8 YEAR 2050, THAT RATE WOULD HAVE GONE BACK DOWN TO 13% AND THEN WITH THE IMPACT OF PLANNED STRATEGIES WOULD HAVE GONE HIGHER 9 10 TO ABOUT A 20% SHARE OF WORK-FROM-HOME. HOWEVER, GIVEN MORE RECENT DATA FROM THE CENSUS, AS WELL AS FROM OUR BAY AREA 11 TRAVEL STUDY, WE HAVE A HIGHER ASSUMED -- OBSERVED WORK-FROM-12 HOME LEVEL IN 2023 AND THINK WE THAT WILL MODERATELY TAIL OFF 13 AS WE MOVE TOWARDS 2050. AND WHAT WE'LL BE DOING OVER THE NEXT 14 15 SEVERAL MONTHS IS TO FURTHER UNDERSTAND THE IMPACT OF THE PLAN 16 STRATEGIES IN TERMS OF WHAT THE FINAL 2050 WORK-FROM-HOME 17 LEVEL IS GOING TO BE. AS A REMINDER, WE DO NOT HAVE AUTHORITY TO INDEPENDENTLY SET THESE EXTERNAL FORCES. THEY ARE SUBJECT 18 TO REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CALIFORNIA AIR RESOURCES BOARD, 19 WHICH, AGAIN, COULD HAVE IMPACT ON OUR GHG PERFORMANCE, IF 20 21 THEY DON'T AGREE WITH SOME OF OUR ASSUMPTIONS. NEXT SLIDE. SO, IN TERMS OF OUR REGIONAL GROWTH FORECAST FOR FUTURE 22 POPULATION, JOBS, AND HOUSING, WE DID SHARE A DRAFT -- A 23 DETAILED DRAFT VERSION OF THIS FORECAST LAST YEAR WITH 24 25 COMMITTEES AND WE ARE RECOMMENDING CARRYING THIS FORECAST

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FORWARD AS PART OF THE FINAL BLUEPRINT. SOME OF THE NOTABLE 1 THINGS TO BE AWARE OF WITH RESPECT TO THIS FORECAST IS THAT IT 2 3 DOES HAVE LOWER PROJECTED POPULATION GROWTH THAN THE PREVIOUS -- THE PREVIOUS PLAN. HOWEVER, THE JOBS PICTURE IS EXPECTED TO 4 5 REMAIN RELATIVELY STRONG, GIVEN THE REGION'S, YOU KNOW, 6 ONGOING RELEVANCE AS A CENTER FOR INNOVATION, TECHNOLOGY, AND HIGH VALUE SERVICES AND INDUSTRIES. SOME OTHER NOTABLE 7 8 CHANGES, YOU KNOW, WE DO EXPECT TO SEE A CONTINUING AGING POPULATION. WE DO EXPECT TO SEE DECLINING HOUSEHOLD SIZES, 9 10 CONTINUED DIVERSIFICATION, AS WELL AS, UNFORTUNATELY, A CONTINUED SHRINKAGE OF THE MIDDLE CLASS. NEXT SLIDE. SO, OUR 11 GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES, AGAIN, THESE ARE PLACES THAT WE TRY TO 12 PRIORITIZE THROUGH ALL OF THESE FUTURE HOMES, JOB SERVICES AND 13 AMENITIES THEY INCLUDE LOCALLY NOMINATED PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT 14 15 AREAS AND PRIORITY PRODUCTION AREAS AS WELL AS REGIONALLY 16 IDENTIFIED TRANSIT-RICH AREAS, AND HIGH-RESOURCE AREAS THAT MEET STATE CRITERIA FOR ACCESS TO JOBS AND GOOD SCHOOLS THAT 17 ALSO MEET CERTAIN BASELINE TRANSIT SERVICE LEVELS. THESE 18 GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES DO NOT INCLUDE AREAS IN VERY HIGH FIRE 19 HAZARD SEVERITY ZONES AND AREAS THAT ARE NOT EXPECTED TO BE 20 PROTECTED FROM SEA LEVEL RISE, AS WELL AS, OBVIOUSLY, PARKS 21 AND OPEN SPACE. THERE WERE MINOR UPDATES TO THESE GROWTH 22 GEOGRAPHIES WHICH WE SHARED PREVIOUSLY WITH COMMITTEES 23 PRIMARILY REFLECTING CHANGES TO THE REGION'S TRANSIT NETWORK 24 AS IDENTIFIED THROUGH THE TRANSIT 2050+ PROCESS. NEXT SLIDE. 25

DAVE TALKED A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE REVENUE PICTURE FOR THE 1 PLAN. JUST AS A QUICK REFRESHER, YOU KNOW, ONLY THE 2 3 TRANSPORTATION ELEMENTS OF THE PLAN IS SUBJECT TO FISCAL CONSTRAINT REOUIREMENTS, WHEREAS OUR HOUSING, ECONOMY, AND 4 5 ENVIRONMENT ELEMENTS ARE MORE VISIONARY IN NATURE. ONE PERSONALITY CLARIFICATION TO OFFER THERE IS THERE ARE SOME 6 TRANSPORTATION REVENUES THAT ARE ASSIGNED TO SELECT 7 8 ENVIRONMENT ELEMENT STRATEGIES, PARTICULARLY IN TERMS OF REDUCING CLIMATE EMISSIONS AND THAT IS BECAUSE OUR REGULATOR, 9 AIR RESOURCES BOARD, YOU KNOW, DOES WANT TO SEE THAT WE ARE 10 SUPPORTING OUR CLIMATE, YOU KNOW, CLIMATE REDUCING STRATEGIES, 11 YOU KNOW, WITH PROJECTED REVENUES THAT ARE ANTICIPATED TO BE 12 AVAILABLE. YOU KNOW, AS YOU CAN SEE, A MAJORITY OF THE 13 EXISTING REVENUES THAT WE DO PROJECT ARE IN THE TRANSPORTATION 14 15 ELEMENT. HOWEVER, WE ARE STILL VERY MUCH RELIANT ON NEW 16 REVENUES IN TERMS OF BEING ABLE TO SUPPORT OUR EXPANSION AND ENHANCEMENT INVESTMENTS. EXISTING REVENUES ARE MUCH MORE 17 CONSTRAINED IN THE OTHER ELEMENTS OF THE PLAN. NEXT SLIDE. SO, 18 AS WE HAVE SHARED PREVIOUSLY ON, YOU KNOW, THE PLAN 19 STRATEGIES, I THINK, YOU KNOW, THE MAIN THING TO COMMUNICATE 20 21 THERE IS THAT THESE STRATEGIES ARE INTENDED TO WORK TOGETHER AS AN INTEGRATED SUITE OF STRATEGIES TO HELP US ACHIEVE OUR 22 REGIONAL VISION OF AN AFFORDABLE, CONNECTED, DIVERSE HEALTHY 23 ENVIRONMENT BAY AREA FOR ALL THE YEAR 2050 SO THESE DO INCLUDE 24 25 REGION-WIDE PROTECTIONS FROM SEA LEVEL RISE TRANSIT ORIENT THE

COMMUNITIES PROTECTING OUR EXISTING INDUSTRIAL LANDS AS WELL 1 AS PRESERVING URBAN GROWTH BOUNDARIES, SIGNIFICANTLY EXPANDING 2 3 INVESTMENTS IN CLEAN VEHICLES AND THE LIKE CHARGING AS WELL AS MAJOR INVESTMENTS IN AFFORDABLE HOUSING NEAR LOCAL TRANSIT AS 4 5 WELL AS UPGRADING COMMUNITY PARKS. NEXT SLIDE. WITH RESPECT TO THE TRANSPORTATION ELEMENT, AGAIN, AS MENTIONED, THESE \$512 6 BILLION IN INVESTMENTS THAT INCLUDE BOTH TRANSPORTATION 7 8 STRATEGIES AS WELL AS SELECT ENVIRONMENT STRATEGIES, THE VAST MAJORITY OF THE FUNDING CLOSE TO THREE OUARTERS GOES TOWARDS 9 SUPPORTING OUR LONG STANDING FIX IT FIRST POLICY OF OPERATING 10 AND MAINTAINING OUR EXISTING TRANSPORTATION NETWORK THAT IS 11 NEARLY \$380 BILLION. THE NEXT LARGEST CATEGORY OF EXPENDITURES 12 ARE TO SUPPORT TRANSIT EXPANSION AND ENHANCEMENT, AND, AGAIN, 13 THE TRANSIT 2050+ PROCESS WORKED CLOSELY -- WORKING CLOSELY 14 15 WITH OPERATORS AS WELL AS OTHER PART PARTNERS THROUGHOUT THE 16 REGION FOCUSED ON TARGETED IMPROVEMENTS TO MAKE HIGH IMPACT CHANGES OVER THE NEAR-TERM AS WELL AS EXPANDING A NETWORK FOR 17 FUTURE GENERATIONS. WE ALSO HAVE VERY SERIOUS INVESTMENTS, \$34 18 BILLION, OR 7% OF THE TOTAL THAT GOES TOWARDS BICYCLE 19 PEDESTRIAN IMPROVEMENTS NON-CAPACITY ROAD IMPROVEMENTS AS WELL 20 21 AS A VERY LIMITED NUMBER OF FREEWAY EXPANSIONS, INCLUDING MITIGATIONS, THEN WE TRY TO FRONT LOAD AGAIN THOSE CLIMATE 22 STRATEGIES WHICH INCLUDE THINGS LIKE PRICING, LOW PROVIDE 23 SAFETY -- LOWER FREEWAY SPEED LIMITS, ELECTRIFICATION, AND 24 25 TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT TO HELP US MEET THAT 2035

CLIMATE TARGET. NEXT SLIDE. SO, AGAIN, WE PRESENTED THE DRAFT 1 2 TRANSPORTATION PROJECT LIST LAST MONTH, AND AS WE DID NOTE AT 3 THAT TIME, THERE WERE SOME CONCERNS THAT WE DID RECEIVE FROM PARTNERS REGARDING PROJECTS THAT WERE NOT INCLUDED ON THAT 4 5 INITIAL DRAFT LIST AND THE DIRECTION FROM THE COMMITTEE WAS TO WORK WITH SPONSORS TO IDENTIFY POTENTIAL PROJECT SWAPS THAT 6 WOULD HAVE, AGAIN, MINIMAL NET COST AND GHG IMPACTS. SO, WE 7 8 HAVE INCLUDED ON THE TABLE HERE SOME OF THE MORE NOTABLE CHANGES THAT WE WANTED YOU TO BE AWARE OF, INCLUDING 9 10 ACCELERATING THE IRVING TO KNOW BART STATION TO THE FIRST HALF OF THE PLAN WHICH WAS ACCOMPLISHED BY MOVING THE SOUTH BAY 11 CONNECT PROJECT TO THE SECOND HALF, INCLUDING SR SOUR 12 WESTBOUND OPERATIONAL IMPROVEMENTS IN CONTRA COSTA THROUGH THE 13 REMOVAL OF SOME OTHER LOCAL ROADWAY PROJECTS, ACCOMMODATING 14 THE WETA REDWOOD CITY FERRY THROUGH THE SAN MATEO BRIDGE 15 16 EXPRESS BUS PROJECT ACCOMMODATING EXPRESS LANES PHASE SIX U.S. 101 IN SANTA CLARA AGAIN SWAPPING OUT ROADWAY PROJECTS AS WELL 17 AS ACCOMMODATING THE SMART TO CLOVERDALE EXTENSION BY REMOVING 18 A SERIES OF PROJECTS IN SONOMA COUNTY. SO WE REALLY DO WANT TO 19 THANK OUR PARTNERS FOR THEIR CLOSE COLLABORATION AND 20 21 COOPERATION ON THIS EFFORT. WE DO THINK THAT THIS HAS ARRIVED AS A GOOD PLACE, AND WE DO HOPE TO MOVE THIS FORWARD. NEXT 22 SLIDE. SO, IN TERMS OF THE RESILIENCE PROJECT LIST, AGAIN, 23 THIS WAS IN CLOSE COLLABORATION WITH BCDC STAFF, AS WELL AS A 24 LARGE NUMBER OF LOCAL PARTNERS AND JURISDICTIONS. I THINK A 25

COUPLE NOTABLE CHANGES WE WANT YOU TO KNOW AWARE OF IN TERMS 1 OF THE FINAL RESILIENCE PROJECT LIST IS THAT THERE WERE TWO 2 3 CHANGES TO BE AWARE OF. AFTER HEARING FROM SOME PARTNERS WE DID ADD A PROJECT THROUGH THE ONE SHORELINE EFFORT IN SAN 4 5 MATEO COUNTY TO PROTECT HIGHWAY 101 FROM BRISBANE AND SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, AS WELL AS ACCOMMODATING A SMART PROJECT IN 6 NOVATO IN MARIN COUNTY TO PROTECT A THOUSAND FEET OF LOW LYING 7 8 TRACK. OVERALL, I WOULD JUST REFERENCE WITH THE RESILIENCE PROJECT LIST, AGAIN, WE TRY TO BEND THESE NEEDS IN TERMS OF 9 10 WHAT WE NEED TO PROTECT IN THE SHORT RUN BETWEEN NOW AND 2035, PROJECTS THAT FLOOD AT ONE FEET VERSUS A LONGER TERM LIST OF 11 PROTECTIONS BETWEEN NOW AND 2050, AGAIN, TOTALING ABOUT \$96 12 BILLION. NEXT SLIDE. SO, IN TERMS OF THIS, YOU KNOW, FINAL 13 BLUEPRINT, WE DO JUST WANT TO REMIND MEMBERS THAT, YOU KNOW, 14 15 THIS PLAN UPDATE IS A LIMITED AND FOCUSED UPDATE TO PLANNED 16 BAY AREA 2050 WHICH WAS UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED BACK IN OCTOBER OF 2021. AND THAT -- THAT PLAN DID INCLUDE A SIGNIFICANT SCENARIO 17 PLANNING EFFORT THAT TRIED TO EVALUATE A WHOLE SERIES OF 18 FUTURE POTENTIAL CONDITIONS AND IDENTIFY STRATEGIES THAT COULD 19 BE EOUITABLE AND RESILIENT IN THE FACE OF UNANTICIPATED 20 CHALLENGES. AND THAT'S REALLY THE BASELINE FOR WHAT WE HAVE 21 PUT FORWARD AS PART OF THIS PLAN UPDATE. SO WHAT WE HAVE 22 REALLY BEEN FOCUSING ON IS UPDATING THE BASELINE AND PLANNING 23 ASSUMPTIONS WITH THE BEST AVAILABLE INFORMATION, YOU KNOW, 24 UNDERSTANDING THAT WE ARE IN A TIME OF SIGNIFICANT UNCERTAINTY 25

FOR THE REGION, AS WELL AS REVISING OUR PLAN STRATEGIES AND 1 2 IMPLEMENTATION ACTIONS TO BETTER ADDRESS THE NEEDS THAT WE HAVE IDENTIFIED, UNDERSTANDING THAT THE BAY AREA IS IN A 3 CHALLENGING PLACE RIGHT NOW AND FACING A NUMBER OF HEADWINDS. 4 5 BUT WE WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE, YOU KNOW, WE HAVE NOT EXPLORED EVERY POSSIBLE SCENARIO FOR A TRAJECTORY FOR THE REGION, 6 WHETHER IN TERMS OF FUTURE AVAILABLE FUNDING, FUTURE GROWTH 7 8 TRAJECTORIES OR INVESTMENT PARADIGMS, BUT WE THINK THIS IS, YOU KNOW, FOR A LIMITED AND FOCUSED UPDATE, THE, SORT OF, BEST 9 THAT WE CAN DO AT THIS TIME BUT WE WANT TO RECOMMEND THAT THE 10 TYPE OF SCENARIO PLANNING THAT WE DID IN THE PREVIOUS PLAN BE 11 SOMETHING THAT WE REALLY PUSH FORWARD AS PART OF THE MAJOR 12 PLAN UPDATE, YOU KNOW, THAT IS GOING TO KICKOFF IN, ROUGHLY, 13 15 MONTHS OR SO, PLANNED BAY AREA 2060. NEXT SLIDE. SO, AGAIN, 14 15 THE ACTION THAT'S REQUESTED OF YOU ALL TODAY IS TO APPROVE 16 THESE FINAL BLUEPRINT GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES, THE FINAL BLUEPRINT STRATEGIES, INCLUDING THE PROJECT LIST FOR FURTHER STUDY AND 17 ANALYSIS. THAT WILL THEN ALLOW US TO MOVE INTO THAT MODELING 18 PHASE, REPORT BACK ON OUTCOMES, INCLUDING THAT IMPORTANT GHG 19 RESULT, AND THEN MOVE THE PLAN INTO THE ENVIRONMENTAL PHASE, 20 21 AND THEN KICKOFF BOTH LAST ROUND OF PUBLIC FEEDBACK AND ENGAGEMENT OVER THE SUMMER. AND WITH THAT, THANK YOU FOR YOUR 22 TIME AND ATTENTION AND HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS. 23

CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. THANK YOU. YOU KNOW, 1 2 FIRST I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR THEIR REVISIONS. YOU KNOW, 3 JUST MORE EXAMPLE OF LETTING THE COUNTY SET THEIR PRIORITIES, SO, I APPRECIATE THE FACT THAT STAFF LET THEM DO THESE TRADE-4 5 OFFS. AND I THINK IT'S SUPERINTENDANT THAT NONE OF THESE PROJECTS ARE ADDED WITHOUT TRADE-OFFS. THAT'S SOMETHING THAT 6 HAD TO BE EITHER REMOVED OR MODIFIED. AND, SO, THANK STAFF FOR 7 8 THAT. FIRST ON THE NEW REVENUE, THE 89 BILLION THAT MAKES UP THE 512. GIVE ME EXAMPLES THESE NEW REVENUE. WHAT ARE WE 9 10 TALKING ABOUT?

CHIRAG RABARI: THESE NEW AND ANTICIPATED REVENUES INCLUDE SOME 12 OF OUR STRATEGIES IN THE PLAN, SO, IT DOES INCLUDE ROADWAY 13 PRICING, IT INCLUDES PARKING PRICING IN GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES, IT 14 15 ALSO INCLUDES A REGIONAL REVENUE MEASURE, YOU KNOW, CONSISTENT 16 WITH SOME OF THE DISCUSSIONS THAT HAVE BEEN HAPPENING, YOU KNOW, AT THE COMMISSION, AND IT ALSO INCLUDES, YOU KNOW, WHAT 17 WE CALL, YOU KNOW, "ANTICIPATED UNSPECIFIED REVENUES" WHICH 18 COULD INCLUDE A VARIETY OF FUTURE FEDERAL AND STATE STIMULUS 19 BILLS OR AUGMENTATIONS THROUGH THE FEDERAL AND STATE 20 GOVERNMENTS. THOSE ARE REALLY THE CORE OF WHAT COMPRISING THE 21 \$90 BILLION CATEGORY. 22

24 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. OTHER COMMITTEE MEMBERS 25 QUESTIONS? PAT?

PAT ECKLUND: YEAH, I HAVE A COUPLE OF BIG PICTURE QUESTIONS 2 3 ACTUALLY. BUT BEFORE I DO I WANTED TO, FIRST OF ALL, ACKNOWLEDGE, I THINK MOST OF US WATCHED THE JIMMY CARTER THING 4 5 YESTERDAY, 100 YEARS OLD, NOT BAD. IMAGINE WHAT HE SAW THROUGH THE HIS WHOLE LIFE. I ALSO WANTED TO MENTION, TOO, SOME OF YOU 6 ALL KNOW THAT ON MONDAY, MY MOM IS GOING TO TURN 98, AND SHE'S 7 8 DOING REALLY WELL. SHE IS GOING TO LIVE TO 100, I HOPE. BUT I TALKED TO HER A LOT ABOUT WHAT IT WAS LIKE TO GROW UP IN 9 10 ALAMEDA, AS A KID AND SEE SOME OF THE CHANGES, AND SHE --OBVIOUSLY ALL OF US HAVE SEEN CHANGES IN OUR LIFETIME -- BUT 11 ONE OF THE THINGS THAT, WHEN I WAS GOING TO COLLEGE, WE TALKED 12 ABOUT WHAT IS THE CARING CAPACITY OF A PARTICULAR GEOGRAPHIC 13 REGION. HAVE WE EVER DETERMINED WHAT THE CARING CAPACITY IS 14 15 FOR THE BAY AREA? BECAUSE IT CAN ACCOMPANY SO MUCH GROWTH CAN 16 ONLY ACCOMMODATE SO MANY PEOPLE WHAT'S THE CARRYING CAPACITY BECAUSE THE CHART KEEPS GOING UP AND UP BUT AT SOME POINT THE 17 BAY AREA WILL NOT BE ABLE TO ACCOMMODATE THE PEOPLE THAT WANT 18 TO LIVE HERE WITHOUT MAKING SOME DRAMATIC ENVIRONMENTAL 19 CHANGES THAT CHANGES OUR OUALITY OF LIFE AND CHANGES THE 20 21 EARTH, WHICH MAY NOT BE IN THE BEST INTEREST FOR A GLOBAL SURVIVAL. THAT'S A PHILOSOPHICAL QUESTION AND IF YOU CAN'T 22 ANSWER IT, THAT'S OKAY I JUST WANT TO ASK HAVE WE LOOKED AT 23 WHAT THE CARRYING CAPACITY IS? 24

DAVE VAUTIN: THAT IS A GREAT OUESTION. WHAT I WOULD SAY IS 1 THERE IS NOT A SINGLE VALUE FOR THE REGION'S CARRYING VALUE. 2 3 YOUR DESCRIBING KEY CONSTRAINTS ENVIRONMENTAL UTILITIES ALL SORTS OF THINGS THAT EXIST IN ANY REGION. WHAT WE'RE DOING IN 4 5 THE PLANS BECAUSE THE TYPE OF GROWTH THAT MATTERS A LOT IN TERMS OF THOSE DEMANDS THAT OUR DECISIONS ON WHERE TO FOCUS 6 GROWTH AND TO PROTECT GROWTH AFFECTS THAT. A HOUSEHOLD LIVING 7 8 IN AN APARTMENT OR CONDO WITH NO YARD HAS A LOT LESS WATER NEED THAN ONE THAT HAS A BACKYARD THAT NEEDS TO BE WIRED OR 9 10 VEGETATION THAT REQUIRES WATER. I WOULDN'T THINK IT AS A SINGULAR NUMBER, CAPS FOR THE REGION BUT MORE THERE ARE 11 CONSTRAINTS THAT EXIST IN THE REGION IN OUR CHOICES AND 12 STRATEGIES OF THE PLAN THAT AFFECT AND ACCOMMODATE GROWTH 13 ENVIRONMENTALLY THAT'S NOT A SINGLE NUMERICAL VALUE BUT, SORT 14 15 OF, CONSTRAINTS THAT WE THINK ABOUT WHILE CRAFTING STRATEGIES 16 TO ACCOMMODATE GROWTH AND WORKING WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE REGION IN TERMS OF UTILITIES AND RESOURCES. 17

19 PAT ECKLUND: I THINK SUBVALUE OF MAYBE ALL THE REGIONAL 20 AGENCIES THAT DEAL WITH DIFFERENT FACETS OF OUR QUALITY OF 21 LIFE, BCDC, BAY AREA AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT, MTC ABAG 22 REGIONAL BOARD I MEAN ALL OF THOSE COULD START HAVING THOSE 23 GLOBAL DISCUSSIONS. AS CARLOS AND I WERE LOOKING, 2060S 24 PROBABLY MOST OF US WILL NOT BE HERE BY 2060 PROBABLY MOST OF 25 US IN THIS ROOM. ANYWAY, I WAS JUST CURIOUS. THE OTHER THING I

HAD IS I'M REALLY GLAD THAT SEA LEVEL RISE IS REALLY 1 EMPHASIZED IN THIS, BUT EACH JURISDICTION AND THE COUNTIES ARE 2 3 GOING TO BE REQUIRED BY BCDC TO CREATE REGIONAL SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLANS, SO THE PLANS THAT WE DEVELOP MAY BE 4 5 DIFFERENT THAN SOME OF THE ASSUMPTIONS THAT YOU'RE MAKING. I LOOKED ON THE MAPS, I'M REALLY WORD ABOUT BAHIA MARIN IS 6 VULNERABLE BUT BEL MARIN KEYS WHICH IS DEFINITELY VULNERABLE 7 8 AS WELL BUT BAHIA IS TOO BECAUSE PEOPLE HAVE WATER, RIGHT NOW, UNDERNEATH THEIR HOMES. SO THAT WATER IS GOING TO RISE. SO, IS 9 10 MTC AND ABAG, ARE WE GOING TO BE ABLE TO CHANGE WHAT THAT SEA LEVEL RISE IS BASED ON, WHAT SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLANS THAT 11 EACH OF THE JURISDICTIONS DEVELOP. 12

CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU, MEMBER ECKLUND. I WOULD SAY THIS 14 RESILIENCE PROJECT LIST ON THIS IS OUR FIRST FORAY INTO THIS 15 16 AREA. IT'S THE PRODUCT OF SEVERAL YEARS OF WORK COLLABORATING 17 WITH BCDC, AS WELL ALL THE LOCAL JURISDICTIONS IN THE REGION. WE UPDATE THESE PLANS EVERY FOUR YEARS. SO, AS FURTHER 18 PLANNING TAKES PLACE ACROSS THE REGION, THAT WILL BE 19 INCORPORATED INTO FUTURE ITERATIONS OF THE RESILIENCE PROJECT 20 LIST. I THINK ONE NOTABLE THING THAT IS WE IDENTIFIED A LOT OF 21 THESE PLACEHOLDER TYPE PROJECTS, RIGHT? AND FOR JURISDICTIONS 22 THAT DIDN'T NECESSARILY HAVE THE CAPACITY TO DO THAT TYPE OF 23 INITIAL PLANNING, AND WE HOPE THIS PROJECT LIST CAN SERVE AS A 24

PLANNING RESOURCE, COMMUNICATIONS RESOURCE, ADVOCACY RESOURCE 1 2 THAT WILL BE REFINED AND UPDATED OVER TIME. 3 PAT ECKLUND: I'M GLAD IT'S GOING TO BE FLEXIBLE. THE LAST 4 5 COMMENT I WANTED TO MAKE IS, THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR ACCOMMODATING NOVATO LEAD. REALLY APPRECIATE THAT A LOT. AND 6 THAT'S SOMETHING THAT -- YOU KNOW, NOVATO HAS A LOT OF AREAS 7 8 THAT ARE GOING TO BE ADVERSELY IMPACTED BY SEA LEVEL RISE, AND OTHER THINGS. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR ACCOMMODATING THAT. 9 10 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: BOARD MEMBER SILVA, DO YOU 11 HAVE YOUR HAND UP? 12 13 CINDY SILVA: YES I DO. THANK YOU. I THINK I HAVE TWO 14 QUESTIONS. FIRST OF ALL, THANK YOU FOR THE PRESENTATION. IT 15 16 GETS CLEARER AND CLEARER EVERY TIME I HEAR IT. AND IT TAKES MULTIPLE -- [AUDIO DISTORTION] [INDISCERNIBLE] DIG THROUGH 17 ALL OF THIS. WE HAVE ABOUT A YEAR LEFT ON THIS WORK. TO WHAT 18 EXTENT IS OUTREACH TO OUR ELECTED OFFICIALS BEYOND THE ABAG 19 BOARD AND THE MTC COMMISSION -- [INDISCERNIBLE] IS THAT 20 21 INCLUDED IN THIS? I DON'T SEE A -- AND MAYBE YOU CAN ELABORATE HOW YOU PLAN TO GET TO THAT LOWERED LEVEL OF ELECTED 22 23 OFFICIALS.

CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU MEMBER SILVA, YEAH, AND I DO WANT TO 1 EMPHASIZE THAT THAT LAST ROUND OF ENGAGEMENT WHEN THE DRAFT 2 PLAN HAS BEEN DEVELOPED, YOU KNOW, WE REALLY DO SEE THAT AS AN 3 OPPORTUNITY TO DO MORE OF THAT TYPE OF OUTREACH. SO, YOU KNOW, 4 5 WE WOULD BE HAPPY TO CIRCLE BACK WITH A LITTLE BIT MORE DETAIL OVER THE SUMMER AND EARLY FALL WHEN WE, YOU KNOW, EXPECT TO GO 6 BACK OUT ACROSS THE REGION AGAIN TO COMMUNICATE THE DRAFT PLAN 7 8 AND FINDINGS AND GATHER ADDITIONAL FEEDBACK. BUT THAT IS TYPICALLY THE TIME, YOU KNOW, WHEN WE DO THESE ROADSHOWS FOR 9 10 ADDITIONAL ELECTED OFFICIALS.

CINDY SILVA: THANK YOU. I WAS AT THE CONTRA COSTA COUNTY 12 MAYOR'S CONFERENCE, AND SUE NOACK AND I WERE THERE I WOULD BE 13 HARD PRESSED TO PRESENT THE DEFINITELY OF DETAIL AT THE HIGH-14 LEVEL SUMMARY THAT YOU DID TODAY, IN 30 SECONDS. WE NEED TO 15 16 GET FROM 30 SECONDS TO A LITTLE BIT MORE DETAIL FOR PEOPLE. MY 17 OUESTION INVOLVES WORK-FROM-HOME ASSUMPTIONS WHAT WAS IT IN THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ WHAT IS IT YOU'RE LOOKING AT NOW 18 BECAUSE WE HAVE NO CONTROL OVER WHEN OUR LARGE MAJOR EMPLOYERS 19 SAY NO LONGER WORK-FROM-HOME RETURN TO WORK WHICH IS HAPPENING 20 IN OTHER MARKETS FOR EXAMPLE, AMAZON, SEATTLE HAS TOLD 21 EVERYBODY YOU'RE BACK IN THE OFFICE FULL-TIME THAT CHANGES 22 TRANSPORTATION PATTERNS BUT IT ALSO CHANGES ECONOMIC PATTERNS 23 WHAT THEY'RE DOING AT LUNCHTIME AND THE IMPACTS IT HAS ON OUR 24

LOCAL COMMUNITIES WHAT'S OUR ASSUMPTION NOW AND HOW ARE WE
 KEEPING ABREAST OF THAT EFFECT?

CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU MEMBER SILVA THIS IS A GOOD OUESTION 4 5 AND THIS IS DEFINITELY ONE OF THE MORE CHALLENGING SPACES TO NAVIGATE CONSIDERING DYNAMIC THINGS, I WILL SAY IT'S PART OF 6 THE REASON WHY WE UPDATE THESE PLANS EVERY FEW YEARS AS WE GET 7 8 NEWER AND BETTER DATA. IN THE LAST PLAN WE HAD RELATIVELY LOW-LEVEL OF OBSERVED WORK-FROM-HOME IN 2019 THIS SPIKED UP PRETTY 9 10 HIGH OBVIOUSLY AS THE PANDEMIC WORKED ITS WAY THROUGH, AT THAT TIME WE FELT THE WORK-FROM-HOME WAS GOING TO BE A TEMPORARY 11 PHENOMENON AND LEVELS WOULD THEN MODERATE BACK CLOSER TO WHAT 12 HAD BEEN PRIOR TO THE PANDEMIC HOWEVER WHAT WE HAVE SEEN IS 13 THE BEST AVAILABLE DATA THAT'S AVAILABLE THROUGH THE CENSUS AS 14 15 WELL AS OUR PRETTY EXPENSIVE BAY AREA TRAVEL SURVEY THAT MTC 16 CONDUCTED OVER THE COURSE OF 2023 IS THAT WORK-FROM-HOME LEVELS ARE A LITTLE BIT STICKIER THAN WE ANTICIPATED THEY 17 WOULD BE. SO, WE ANTICIPATE THAT, YOU KNOW, FROM RELATIVELY 18 MODERATE LEVELS THAT THEY ARE AT RIGHT NOW, ABOUT 27% SHARE OF 19 WORK-FROM-HOME ON A TYPICAL DAY, THAT WILL MODERATE SLIGHTLY 20 21 BY THE YEAR 2050. AND AGAIN THAT'S BASED UPON THE BEST AVAILABLE QUANTITATIVE DATA THAT WE HAVE RIGHT NOW. AS WE GET 22 MORE DATA OVER THE NEXT SEVERAL YEARS AND WE'RE ABLE TO SEE 23 WHETHER THESE PRONOUNCEMENTS OF DIFFERENT EMPLOYERS ARE MAKING 24

INTO TRANSLATING INTO ACTUAL CHANGES TO BEHAVIOR WE'LL UPDATE
 THAT ASSUMPTION IN THE NEXT PLANNING CYCLE.

4 CINDY SILVA: LET ME ASK THE QUESTION TO MAKE SURE I HAVE THIS
5 RIGHT. WE WERE ASSUMING IN -- [INDISCERNIBLE] MARCH 2019 AND
6 COVID WE WERE ASSUMING AT 2050 THE WORK-FROM-HOME PERCENTAGE
7 WOULD BE AT 27%. DID I HEAR THAT RIGHT?

8

CHIRAG RABARI: NO. SO, IN PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, THE PREVIOUS 9 PLAN, WE ASSUMED THAT BY THE YEAR 2050, THE WORK-FROM-HOME 10 LEVEL WITHOUT ANY INTERVENTIONS FROM THE PLAN'S STRATEGIES 11 WOULD BE ABOUT 13%, ONLY SLIGHTLY HIGHER THAN THE OBSERVED 12 LEVELS OF 2019. BUT WITH THE IMPACT OF PLAN STRATEGIES TO HELP 13 US MEET OUR GHG TARGET, WE ANTICIPATED THAT LEVEL WOULD BE 14 CLOSER TO 20% BY THE YEAR 2050. WHAT WE'RE NOW ASSUMING IS 15 16 THAT WE THINK THAT WORK-FROM-HOME LEVEL IN 2050 WILL BE CLOSER TO 25%, NOT ACCOUNTING FOR THE IMPACT OF ANY PLAN STRATEGIES. 17 18 THAT'S THE WORK THAT WE'RE GOING TO DO OVER THE NEXT SEVERAL MONTHS TO ANALYZE WHETHER THE PLAN STRATEGIES MAY HAVE AN 19 ADDITIONAL EFFECT ON FUTURE ANTICIPATED WORK-FROM-HOME LEVELS. 20 21 WE THINK THAT THE IMPACT OF THE PLAN STRATEGIES COULD BE FAIRLY MODEST. SO, YOU KNOW, THAT FINAL FIGURE COULD BE A 22 LITTLE BIT HIGHER THAN THE CURRENTLY ASSUMED 25%. BUT WE'LL 23 KNOW MORE IN THE SPRING. 24

CINDY SILVA: THANK YOU. [AUDIO DISTORTION] [INDISCERNIBLE]
 FROM MY PERSPECTIVE IT WOULD BE GOOD TO HAVE THAT AS A CLEAR
 COMPARISON CHART SO WE CAN START TO REMEMBER WHAT OUR
 ASSUMPTIONS ARE. THANK YOU.

6 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. THANK YOU. COMMISSIONER
7 NOACK?

8

SUE NOACK: SO, I WANT TO, FIRST, THANK YOU FOR THE 9 PRESENTATION. I CAN DO THIS NOW IN MY SLEEP. I THINK I HAVE 10 SEEN IT SO MANY TIMES [LAUGHTER] NOT THE PROJECT LIST BUT THE 11 PRESENTATIONS. I DEPARTMENT TO NOTE I APPRECIATE AS YOU'RE 12 TALKING ABOUT CHANGING SOME THINGS ON THE 2060 PLAN, I'M 13 LOOKING AT DIFFERENT TRAJECTORIES, SEVERAL OF US HAD EXPRESSED 14 15 CONCERN NOT BEING ABLE TO GENERATE NEW REVENUES DEPENDING ON 16 THE ADMINISTRATION DEPENDING ON TAX MEASURES AND THINGS LIKE THAT I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO BE ABLE TO LOOK AT 17 DIFFERENT TRAJECTORIES GOING FORWARD SO I APPRECIATE NOT BEING 18 ABLE TO DO THAT IN THIS BUT IN THE INTERIM UPDATE I REALLY 19 HOPE WE TAKE A HARD LOOK AT THAT IN THE 2060 PLANNING. THANK 20 21 YOU.

23 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: ANY OTHER BOARD MEMBERS?
24 STEPHANIE?

STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: I WANT TO EXPRESS MY CHANGES IN THE 1 SWAPS IN THE PROJECT LIST I KNOW THAT WAS A CHALLENGE TO DO 2 YOU DID IT AND I APPRECIATE IT, AND INCORPORATING OUR NORTH 3 BAY PROGRAM THANK YOU FOR THAT AND THEN MARIN CITY AS 4 5 CONTINUING EQUITY COMMUNITY. JUST TWO OUESTIONS ON THE GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES AND THE COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING CONTEMPLATED FOR 6 THAT I'M WONDERING THERE ARE SOURCES FUNDING EITHER NOW OR 7 8 CONTEMPLATED IN THE FUTURE FOR PLANNING FOR GROWTH IN THE 9 GROWTH GEOGRAPHY AREAS?

MATT MALONEY: MATT MALONEY DEPUTY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR METRO 11 PLANNING AND POLICY, THE SOURCES THAT WE HAVE RELIED ON OVER 12 THE PAST COUPLE OF DECADES, THE BIGGEST SOURCE HAS BEEN, SORT 13 OF, FEDERAL SURFACE TRANSPORTATION MONEY THAT WE HAVE USED TO 14 15 DO OUR PDA PLANNING PROGRAM AND EPISODICALLY WE HAVE COME TO 16 THIS COMMITTEE TO PROVIDE UPDATES ON THE PROGRAM I THINK WE'RE 17 OUT FOR ANOTHER CALL FOR PROJECTS LARGER CALL FOR PROJECTS OF THE MONEY COULD BE USED FOR PDA PLANNING SO CALL FOR PROJECTS 18 HAS BEEN OUT INNOVATE RECENTLY OVER THE PAST FEW MONTHS IT'S, 19 SORT OF, ONGOING. WE ALSO THINK IT'S GOING TO BE IMPORTANT IN 20 21 YEARS AHEAD TO TRY TO BUILD MORE CONSISTENT FUNDING FOR REGIONAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS INCLUDING PLANNING WE 22 HAVE HAD TWO ROUNDS OF REAP MONEY THE FIRST ROUND FLOWED 23 THROUGH ABAG A LITTLE OVER 20 MILLION AND WE REALLY PUT THAT 24 25 MONEY TO WORK WITH OUR LOCAL JURISDICTIONS, INCLUDING A LOT OF

PLANNING, THAT'S MORE HOURS ELEMENT TYPE OF WORK THEN WE HAD
 REAP TWO, WHICH ALLOWED US TO CONTINUE SOME OF THAT TYPE OF
 WORK BUT I THINK WE REALLY NEED AN ONGOING SOURCE OF PLANNING
 ASSISTANCE MONEY I THINK FROM THE STATE TO CONTINUE THIS WORK.
 YOU CAN SEE ON THE MAP WE HAVE A TON OF GROWTH AREAS AND NOT
 ENOUGH MONEY TO DO THE PLANNING.

8 STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: GOOD. I WOULD SUPPORT THAT. ANOTHER 9 COMMENT, CHIRAG, YOU MENTIONED THE SCENARIO PLANNING, WHICH I 10 THINK IS EXCELLENT, AND I AGREE WITH COMMISSIONER NOACK. WE'RE 11 GOING TO BE AT THIS FOR A LONG TIME. IT'S AN ITERATIVE 12 PROCESS. IS THE SCENARIO PLANNING WE DID THIS ROUND DIFFERENT 13 THAN WHAT WE HAVE DONE IN THE PAST? OR IS THIS MORE OF THE 14 SAME? JUST NOT HAVING BEEN HERE THAT LONG, I DIDN'T KNOW.

15

16 DAVE VAUTIN: SO WE TYPICALLY DO OUR SCENARIO PLANNING WORK IN MAJOR PLAN UPDATE CYCLES. SO, WE DID IT AS PART OF THE FIRST 17 PLANNED BAY AREA, AND WE DID IT AS PART OF PLANNED BAY AREA 18 2050. THAT EFFORT THAT WE DID FOR SCENARIO PLANNING IN 2050 19 EXPLORED THESE WHAT-IF SCENARIOS, DIFFERENT TRAJECTORIES 20 21 DIFFERENT FUNDING LEVELS, ALL OF THAT. SO WHAT WE'RE, YOU KNOW, EXPLORING, AND HAVE LISTED ON THIS SLIDE, WHICH IS 22 PLANNED BAY AREA 2060 WHICH WILL BE A MAJOR UPDATE STARTING 23 WITH THE SCENARIO PLANNING AGAIN AND DELVING INTO DIFFERENT 24 25 TRAJECTORIES WILL BE VALUABLE TO DO THAT, SORT OF, THINKING AT

THE START OF THE PLAN PROCESS MINOR UPDATES YOU KNOW WE REALLY
 TRY TO BE MORE TARGETED AND FOCUSED IN HONING IN ON EXISTING
 STRATEGIES.

5 STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: GREAT. THEN MY LAST COMMENT REALLY TO MY COLLEAGUES I WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE CHALLENGES MEETING 6 THE GREENHOUSE GAS REQUIREMENTS THEY'RE REALLY JUST A SKEW OF 7 8 PLANS IN THE DIRECTION IT'S DIFFICULT TO ACHIEVE, SO I WANT TO THANK YOU FOR THE COMMUNICATIONS THAT YOU AND OTHER MPOS ARE 9 HAVING WITH CARB AND HOPE WE CAN PURSUE AND PERHAPS THROUGH 10 OUR LEGISLATORS THAT SIT ON THE BOARD BUT THIS IS A BIG 11 ELEPHANT IN THE ROOM THAT MAKES LOCAL PLANNING DIFFICULT. 12 13

14 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: DAVID.

15

16 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU DAVID, MATT, AND EXECUTIVE 17 DIRECTOR, I THINK WHAT WE'RE DOING AROUND TRADE-OFFS, AND 18 CHALLENGES THAT WE FACE, I THINK IT'S 81 OR \$84 BILLION IN 19 TERMS OF THE PLAN?

20

21 CHIRAG RABARI: IN TERMS OF, LIKE, HOW MUCH LESS REVENUE?
22

23 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: CORRECT.

CHIRAG RABARI: YEAH, IT'S CLOSE TO 80 BILLION LESS THAN THE
 LAST PLAN.

CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: I THINK MANY IN SAN MATEO COUNTY AND 4 5 THROUGHOUT APPRECIATE THE INCLUSION OF THE WETA REDWOOD CITY FERRY. SO, I WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE STAFF FOR THEIR EFFORT AND 6 FLEXIBILITY. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT STRUCK ME WAS ON THE 7 8 PLANNING ASSUMPTIONS IS AROUND INCOME, I'M WONDERING FROM STAFF SHRINKAGE OF THE MIDDLE CLASS OFFSET BY INCREASE BOTH 9 HIGH AND LOW-INCOME POPULATIONS, WITHIN THE PLAN THERE IS A 10 NUMBER OF STRATEGIES THAT TRIES TO ADDRESS THIS, WITHIN THESE 11 ASSUMPTIONS, THIS IS GOING TO CONTINUE TO INCREASE, HOW DO YOU 12 ADDRESS THAT WITHIN THE PLAN FOR THAT, SORT OF, PEOPLE WHO ARE 13 IN THE MIDDLE CLASS AND ARE REALLY MAYBE NOT GOING TO BE IN 14 15 THE MIDDLE CLASS? SO, THAT PROVIDES A SIGNIFICANT GAP IN A 16 PARADIGM SHIFT. I'M JUST CURIOUS TO YOUR THOUGHTS ON THAT.

17

CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU, COMMISSIONER, FOR THAT QUESTION. 18 AND, YES, IN TERMS OF THE PLANNING ASSUMPTIONS, THIS IS, 19 ESSENTIALLY, YOU KNOW, WHAT WE THINK OR PROJECT IS GOING 20 21 HAPPEN IN THE FUTURE WITHOUT INTERVENTION FROM THE PLAN'S STRATEGIES. SO, THE PLAN REALLY, IN PARTICULAR, IS HOUSING AND 22 ECONOMY ELEMENTS, DOES TRY TO PROPOSE VARIOUS POLICY 23 INTERVENTIONS THAT CAN MAKE THIS A, YOU KNOW, A MORE LIVABLE, 24 25 AFFORDABLE, DYNAMIC PLACE FOR FOLKS IN THE MIDDLE CLASS. SO,

THAT'S, YOU KNOW, PRIMARILY THROUGH MAKING HOUSING MORE 1 2 AFFORDABLE THROUGH, YOU KNOW, A BROAD SUITE OF HOUSING 3 STRATEGIES, INCLUDING PRODUCING SUBSIDIZED AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AS WELL AS YOU KNOW MORE MARKET RATE HOUSING. AS WELL AS 4 5 CERTAIN ECONOMY STRATEGIES THAT TRY TO TARGET, YOU KNOW, PATHWAYS THROUGH THE MIDDLE CLASS, YOU KNOW, WHETHER THAT'S 6 JOB TRAINING AND INCUBATOR PROGRAMS, YOU KNOW, PATHWAYS TO 7 8 APPRENTICESHIPS, AS WELL AS, YOU KNOW, REALLY CREATING A DYNAMIC ECONOMY THAT MORE FOLKS WILL HAVE ACCESS TO. 9

DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. AND THEN FINALLY THESE CONVERSATIONS 11 RELATIVE TO CARB, HOW ARE THEY GOING -- IN TERMS OF THE 12 DIALOGUE, ARE THEY, SORT OF, UNDERSTANDING SOME OF THE 13 CHALLENGES OR HAVING -- YOU KNOW, I'M JUST CURIOUS. THERE IS 14 15 AMBITIOUS -- THEY'RE AMBITIOUS AND AUDACIOUS GOALS FROM CARB AND THE STATE, ARE THERE AREAS WHERE THEY HAVE, SORT OF, 16 LISTENED TO US AND SAID HEY THESE ARE AREAS WHERE WE MIGHT BE 17 A LITTLE BIT MORE FLEXIBLE? 18

19

20 DAVE VAUTIN: THAT'S A GREAT QUESTION. YOU KNOW, THE DIALOGUE 21 WITH CARB IS OBVIOUSLY AN ONGOING PROCESS THROUGH THE PLAN 22 DEVELOPMENT IN ADDITION TO THAT WE HAVE BEEN WORKING WITH A 23 WORKING GROUP CONVENED WITH CARB OTHER AND STATES AND MPS TO 24 LOOK AT SYSTEMATIC IMPROVEMENTS TO THE REGIONAL PLANNING 25 PROCESS AND SENATE BILL 375. WHAT I CAN SEE IS CARB AND THE

STATE AGENCIES HAVE BEEN LISTENING TO SOME OF OUR CONCERNS 1 BUT, YOU KNOW, HAVE NOT COMMITTED TO ANY, SORT OF, CHANGES 2 3 THROUGH THAT PROCESS AT THIS TIME. IT'S IN EARLY PHASES AND WE CONTINUE TO BE AT THE TABLE REPRESENTING THE BAY AREA'S NEEDS 4 5 AND INTEREST ALONG WITH OUR OTHER REGIONAL PARTNERS. WE'RE HOPEFUL THAT AS THE YEAR GOES ON THAT SOME POTENTIAL IDEAS TO 6 REFORM THE PROCESS EMERGE FROM IT, FROM WITH THROUGH 7 8 ADMINISTRATIVE OR LEGISLATIVE MEANS THAT COULD BE ADVANCED IN THE NEXT YEAR OR TWO BUT THERE IS A LONG ROAD AHEAD. 9 10 DAVID CANEPA: I WOULD SAY LET'S CONTINUE TO TRACK THAT, YOU 11 KNOW, I DON'T KNOW IF THERE IS ANY WAY IN WHICH A MATRIX COULD 12 BE CREATED BUT REALLY, SORT OF, UNDERSTAND WHERE OUR FEEDBACK 13

14 IS AND, SORT OF, LISTENING TO IT AND I THINK JUST15 UNDERSTANDING THOSE ADJUSTMENTS WOULD BE HELPFUL IN TERMS OF

16 FUTURE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

3 SPEAKER: GOOD MORNING, CHAIR SPERING AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS JOSHUA WITH THE NORTHERN CALIFORNIA LABORERS UNION AND 4 5 AFFILIATES AND MEMBERS OF THE CALIFORNIA ALLIANCE FOR JOBS ON BEHALF OF OUR 30,000 MEMBERS FROM THE CENTRAL VALLEY TO OREGON 6 BORDER JUST WANT TO SAY THANK YOU FOR YOUR WORK REALLY EXCITED 7 8 ABOUT THIS PLAN OUR ORGANIZATION HAS BEEN PART OF GROWING ADVOCACY AROUND THE REDWOOD CITY FERRY TERMINAL PROJECT YOU 9 HEARD FROM BUSINESS LEADERS COUNCIL COMMUNITY MEMBERS ELECTED 10 OFFICIALS RESIDENTS CERTAINLY ORGANIZATIONS ABOUT THE 11 IMPORTANCE OF THIS REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PROJECT WE'RE 12 REALLY APPROXIMATE DELIGHTED TO SEE IT BACK ON THE LIST IT'S A 13 TESTAMENT TO THE WORK OF EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANDY FREMIER AND 14 15 STAFF TO WORK DOWN THE ROAD TO GET THE PROJECT BACK IT'S 16 REALLY IMPORTANT IT MEETING THE VOTERS WHERE THEY'RE AT, SAN MATEO RESIDENTS HAVE ALREADY APPROVED AND FUNDED THIS PROJECT. 17 SO, I THINK IT'S PART OF WHAT WE WANT TO DO TO LISTEN TO ALL 18 THE RESIDENTS OF THE BAY AREA, WHAT'S IMPORTANT, WHAT IT'S 19 GOING TO TAKE FOR THEM TO GET BEHIND ALL OF THE WORK THAT WE 20 21 NEED TO DO AROUND THE FUTURE OF THE BAY AREA REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM. SO IT'S JUST A REALLY GREAT WIN. I WANT 22 TO THANK SUPERVISOR AND MTC COMMISSIONER DAVID CANEPA AND MTC 23 COMMISSIONER GINA PAPAN AND EVERYONE WHO WORKED AROUND THIS 24

AND ADVOCATED TO WORK TIRELESSLY WITH STAFF TO GET THE PROJECT 1 BACK IN. BIG WIN WE LOVE THE REDWOOD CITY FERRY TERMINAL. 2 3 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: THANK YOU. 4 5 CLERK OF THE BOARD: NEXT SPEAKER IS GOING TO BE BRIAN 6 COLBURTON, FOLLOWED BY ADINA LEVIN. BRIAN, GO AHEAD AND UNMUTE 7 8 YOURSELF. 9 SPEAKER: HI. GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS BRIAN CULBERTSON. I'M A 10 TRANSIT RIDER LIVING IN OAKLAND, AND I'M HERE TO COMMENT ABOUT 11 HOW THESE PLANS AFFECT CLIMATE CHANGE. YOU'RE RESPONSIBLE HERE 12 TODAY FOR ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT ACTIONS CALIFORNIA CAN DO 13 FOR THE CLIMATE. 39% OF CALIFORNIA'S GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS 14 15 COME FROM TRANSPORTATION. SO, THE WAY WE PLAN OUR 16 TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM HERE IN THE BAY AREA IS CRUCIAL FOR REDUCING THOSE EMISSIONS TO SAVE THE PLANET. AS WE SEE LA BURN 17 TO THE GROUND, WE REALLY NEED TO BE REDUCING OUR GREENHOUSE 18 GAS EMISSIONS RAPIDLY AND WE ALL KNOW THAT. ONE OF THE THINGS 19 WANTED TO BRING UP IS THAT WE HAVE A COUPLE OF HIGHWAY 20 21 WIDENING PROJECTS ON THIS LIST, ONE OF THE STRATEGIES, T7, IS TO WIDEN HIGHWAYS, WHICH WE KNOW INCREASES GREENHOUSE GAS 22 EMISSIONS. IT DOES SAY TO MITIGATE VMT IMPACTS. BUT I WOULD 23 LIKE TO POINT OUT THAT ONE OF THESE PROJECTS, THE INTERCHANGE 24 25 IMPROVEMENTS ON SR37 AT FAIRGROUNDS DRIVE IS ADDING A

DIVERGING DIAMOND INTERCHANGE WHICH SOLTRANS, THE TRANSIT 1 AGENCY HAS NOT HAD A CHANCE TO REVIEW AND IT DOES NOT MATCH 2 3 WITH THE -- DOES NOT ALLOW FOR TRANSIT. SO, IF YOU'RE -- IF WE'RE GOING TO EXPAND HIGHWAYS, AND THAT WE KNOW INCREASE 4 5 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS WE NEED TO AT LEAST MAKE IT COMPATIBLE WITH TRANSIT OPERATIONS IF WE COULD ADD IT TO THE 6 STRATEGY OF T7 TO SAY THAT ANY, SORT OF, HIGHWAY CHANGES ARE 7 8 COMPATIBLE WITH TRANSIT PLANS, THAT WOULD BE GREAT. THANK YOU. 9 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THANK YOU. NEXT UP IS ADINA LEVIN, 10

11 FOLLOWED BY JORDAN MOLDOW. ADINA GO AHEAD AND UNMUTE YOURSELF.
12 ADINA? DID YOU WANT TO SPEAK ON THIS ITEM? OKAY. WE'LL LOOP

SPEAKER: HI. JORDAN, I'M FROM THE CITY OF SAN JOSE AND SANTA 15 16 CLARA. I'M A TRANSIT RIDER, A CAR DRIVER, A BICYCLIST, A 17 PEDESTRIAN, BASICALLY MULTI-MODAL TRANSIT. AND I AM REALLY HOPING THAT WE CAN SEE AN IMPROVED PROJECT LIST THAT REALLY 18 PRIORITIZES OUR CLIMATE AND OUR PUBLIC TRANSIT SOLUTIONS. I 19 WAS DISAPPOINTED. SO, I HAVE BEEN FOLLOWING THE VTA2050 20 21 PLANNING GOING ON OVER THE LAST YEAR, AND A NUMBER OF MONTHS AGO, THEY HAD -- THEY HAD PRESENTED TO THEIR BOARD THEIR 22 PROPOSED 2050 LIST THAT HAD ABOUT 88 PROJECTS IN IT, OR SO, 23 YOU KNOW, A WHOLE MIX OF HIGHWAY PROJECTS, TRANSIT PROJECTS, 24 ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS. THE LIST BEING CONSIDERED NOW 25

SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN NARROWED FROM THAT 88 PROJECTS DOWN TO JUST 1 41. AND OF THOSE 41 PROJECTS, 33 OF THEM, SO, A VAST MAJORITY 2 ARE ABOUT EXPANDING ROADWAYS, WHICH WE KNOW TIME AND TIME 3 AGAIN, EXPANDING ROADWAYS DOESN'T SOLVE CONGESTION, AND IT 4 5 CERTAINLY DOESN'T SOLVE CLIMATE CHANGE. WE NEED REAL TRANSIT SOLUTIONS TO BE PRIORITIZED IN OUR 2050 PLAN. WE NEED REAL 6 SOLUTIONS SO THAT PEOPLE HAVE ALTERNATIVES TO DRIVING. THERE 7 8 IS LOTS OF PEOPLE WHO DRIVE CARS WHO WANT TO TAKE TRANSIT MORE OFTEN, AND THEY'RE LOOKING FOR THOSE OPTIONS. SO, TO, YOU 9 10 KNOW, LEADERS IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY, AND THE OTHER COUNTIES IN SIMILAR POSITIONS, I REALLY HOPE THAT YOU CAN TAKE ANOTHER 11 LOOK AT THIS LIST THAT'S BEEN SENT ON TO MTC AND REALLY THINK 12 ABOUT REDOING THIS LIST AND PUTTING A MUCH HIGHER EMPHASIS ON 13 CLIMATE POSITIVE PROJECTS FOR REAL PUBLIC TRANSIT SOLUTIONS. 14 15 THANK YOU.

20 SPEAKER: HI. YES, ADINA LEVIN WITH SEAMLESS BAY AREA. AT A
21 HIGH-LEVEL, I WANTED TO EXPRESS A LOT OF GRATITUDE ABOUT
22 TRANSIT 2050+ IN A WAY THIS HAS BEEN DONE WITH FOLLOWING THE
23 CONNECTED NETWORK PLAN STRATEGY FROM THE TRANSPORTATION ACTION
24 PLAN, LOOKING AT FROM A BASIS OF PROVIDING A NETWORK OF
25 TRANSIT SERVICE WITH IMPROVEMENTS TO TRANSIT SERVICE FREQUENCY

IN AREAS AROUND THE REGION, LOOKING AT PEAK AND OFF-PEAK 1 2 SERVICE, AND LOOKING AT IDENTIFYING SOME MISSING LINK 3 CONNECTIONS AND FILLING THEM IN. WE, ALONG THE LINES OF SOME CORRESPONDENCE THAT WE HAVE SENT OVER TIME, WE HAVE WORKED 4 5 WITH NUMEROUS COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AND GENERATED OVER 250 COMMENTS WITH PEOPLE COMMENTING, SPECIFICALLY, ABOUT THE NEEDS 6 IN THEIR COMMUNITIES, AND A NUMBER OF THOSE NEEDS HAVE BEEN 7 8 REPRESENTED IN THE MODIFICATION IN THE PLAN WITH IMPROVED NEW LOCAL SERVICE AND TRANSIT PRIORITY. ONE THING I DO WANT TO 9 10 LIFT UP AND EXPRESS ONE PIECE OF GRATITUDE AND ONE PIECE OF DISMAY ABOUT, IS I'M GLAD TO SEE THE INCLUSION OF THE REDWOOD 11 CITY FERRY, BUT, UNFORTUNATELY, THAT HAS BEEN DONE AS A 12 TRADEOFF AGAINST THE REMOVAL OF THE BUS ACROSS THE 92 BRIDGE. 13 THIS IS SOMETHING THAT TRANSIT DEPENDENT RIDERS HAVE COMMENTED 14 ON WANTING TO BRING BACK. THIS IS A MAJOR ROUTE THAT HAS NO 15 16 PUBLIC BUS SERVICE ON IT, WHATSOEVER. MTC IDENTIFYING THIS 17 LINK IN THE INITIAL PLAN WAS GOOD. AND REMOVING IT IS REALLY DISMAYING. AND I WONDER, AND I HOPE THAT IT'S POSSIBLE TO FIX 18 THAT BEFORE THE FINAL-FINAL. 19

REDWOOD CITY FERRY TERMINAL BACK IN THE PLAN. THIS IS A VERY 1 2 IMPORTANT PROJECT FOR OUR REGION AND WE LOOK FORWARD TO 3 WORKING TOGETHER TO HOPEFULLY DELIVER IT SOON. SO THANK YOU STAFF. ONE COMMENT ON THE DISCUSSION ABOUT THE REMOTE WORK 4 5 ASSUMPTION. WE HAVE HEARD FROM OUR MAJOR EMPLOYERS FROM AROUND THE REGION THAT THEY HAVE BEGUN TO INCREASE THEIR IN-OFFICE 6 WORK REQUIREMENTS AS OF THIS FALL. THANK YOU TO STAFF 4 5 AND EVERYONE ELSE FOR GETTING US THERE 6 CHAIR, JAMES P. TODAY I'M HERE TO PROVIDE 18 AN UPDATE ON A PROPOSAL TO INTEGRATE THE MTC POLICY ADVISORY 19 COUNCIL AND ABAG'S REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE INTO A SINGLE 20 21 ADVISORY BODY. THIS NEW BODY WILL SERVE BOTH THE MTC COMMISSION AND THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD HELPING TO BROADEN THE 22 RANGE OF ADVISORY INPUT INTO THE WORK OF BOTH AGENCIES AND 23 FURTHER IMPROVE OUR COORDINATION. TODAY WE'RE REQUESTING 24 APPROVAL OF THIS PROPOSAL FROM BOTH THE MTC PLANNING COMMITTEE 25

AND THE ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE. BACK ON NOVEMBER 8TH, 1 2 2024 STAFF PROVIDED BACKGROUND HAD TO BODY ON RECENT 3 INTEGRATION EFFORTS BETWEEN MTC AND ABAG COMMITTEES INCLUDING THIS CONCEPT TO INTEGRATE THE MTC COUNCIL AND ABAG PLANNING 4 5 COMMITTEE AFTER RECEIVING FEEDBACK AND PRESENTING THE CONCEPT TO THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 19TH RECEIVING 6 FURTHER GUIDANCE MTC ABAG AND THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL WE 7 8 DEVELOPED MORE SPECIFIC PROPOSAL BASED ON COLLECTIVE FEEDBACK THANKS TO THAT FEEDBACK THIS UPDATED DRAFT REPRESENTS BALANCED 9 APPROACH THAT REPRESENT BOTH INTERESTS OF AGENCIES. THE 10 PRIMARY GOALS OF THE PROPOSAL ARE TO ENSURE THAT ABAG AND MTC 11 ARE PARTNERS IN SELECTING NOMINEES TO MAINTAIN OPEN NOMINATION 12 PROCESS WITH ADDED CONSIDERATION FOR CANDIDATES ENDORSED BY 13 ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD AND MEMBERS OF MTC TO LIMIT MEMBERSHIP TO 14 15 27 MEMBERS TO RESERVE SEATS FOR NON-ELECTED BAY AREA RESIDENTS 16 TO BRING DIVERSE VIEWPOINTS TO MTC AND ABAG'S VISION. STAFF AIMS TO BRING NEW VOICES TO THE TABLE VIA EXPANSIVE OPEN 17 NOMINATION PROCESS. THANKS TO COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS 18 THROUGHOUT PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 AND 2050+. MTC HAS DEVELOPED 19 DEEPER COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS OVER THE YEARS. BY LEVERAGING 20 21 THESE RELATIONSHIPS AS WELL AS NETWORKS OF THE COMMISSIONERS AND ABAG BOARD MEMBERS, WE AIM TO ACHIEVE A ROBUST APPLICANT 22 POOL. THIS PROPOSED BODY WILL HAVE 27 MEMBERS, NINE EOUITY 23 REPRESENTATIVES, NINE MEMBERS, REPRESENTING SENIORS OR PERSONS 24 25 WITH DISABILITIES, AND NINE AT-LARGE MEMBERS REPRESENTING

VARIOUS REGIONAL INTERESTS LIKE LABOR, BUSINESS, ENVIRONMENT, 1 2 TRANSIT ADVOCACY, SOCIAL EQUITY, YOUTH, CIVIC, PUBLIC HEALTH, FAIR AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING. THE BODY'S BYLAWS ENSURE 3 GEOGRAPHIC DIVERSITY AND REPRESENTATION FROM THE NINE 4 5 COUNTIES, AND NOMINATIONS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC. THE FINAL SELECTION WILL BE MADE BY THE MTC CHAIR AND ABAG PRESIDENT 6 TOGETHER, SUBJECT TO APPROVAL BY THE COMMISSION AND THE ABAG 7 8 EXECUTIVE BOARD. FOLLOWING TODAY'S ACTION OUR NEXT STEP WILL BE TO DRAFT A RESOLUTION FOR CONSIDERATION BY BOTH THE MTC 9 10 COMMISSION AND ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD. WE AIM TO REQUEST ACTION ON THIS PROPOSED RESOLUTION AT MEETINGS IN FEBRUARY OR MARCH. 11 RECRUITMENT FOR THE NEW ADVISORY BODY WILL BEGIN IN THE SUMMER 12 OF 2025, WITH SELECTIONS FINALIZED THIS FALL, AND THE NEW BODY 13 WOULD START MEETINGS IN JANUARY OF NEXT YEAR. THIS INTEGRATION 14 15 WILL STRENGTHEN POLICY COORDINATION BETWEEN MTC AND ABAG, ALLOW MEMBERS TO ADDRESS A BROADER RANGE OF ISSUES, AND FOCUS 16 ON NON-ELECTED RESIDENT ADVISORS TO ENSURE DIVERSE COMMUNITY 17 REPRESENTATION. THE AT-LARGE MEMBERS WILL REPRESENT VARIOUS 18 REGIONAL INTERESTS BRINGING A WIDE ARRAY OF PERSPECTIVES TO 19 THE TABLE, AND WE ALSO CONSIDER FORMING SUBCOMMITTEES TO 20 ADDRESS SPECIFIC FOCUS AREAS ONCE THE NEW ADVISORY BODIES ARE 21 ESTABLISHED. IN CONCLUSION, THIS PROPOSAL ENSURES AN INCLUSIVE 22 PATHWAY FOR NOMINATIONS AND SELECTIONS ALIGNED WITH OUR 23 COMMITMENT TO EQUITY. AND POSITIONS MTC AND ABAG TO ACHIEVE 24 OUR REGIONAL PLANNING AND EQUITY GOALS AND FOSTER COMMUNITY 25

ENGAGEMENT. THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME AND CONSIDERATION, AND I
 AM OPEN TO QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE.

4 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: THANK YOU. THIS IS AN ACTION
5 ITEM. WE'LL TAKE DISCUSSION. START WITH PAT.

PAT ECKLUND: I DON'T HAVE ANY OUESTIONS AT ALL. I'M NOT GOING 7 8 TO SUPPORT THE RECOMMENDATION. AND ONE OF THE REASONS IS THAT THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE THAT ABAG HAD, THAT GROUP HAD 9 10 A FULL DISCUSSION SO THAT ELECTED OFFICIALS, CITY AND COUNTY, COULD HEAR AND ENGAGE WITH THOSE WHO WERE NOT ELECTED. AND THE 11 UNIOUENESS ABOUT THAT REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE WAS THAT 12 THERE WAS A BROAD REPRESENTATION WITH BUSINESS AND LABOR, 13 ENVIRONMENTAL, HOUSING, PUBLIC HEALTH, MINORITIES, OPEN SPACE, 14 15 EQUITY, AND THAT ALSO THERE WAS REPRESENTATION FROM SPECIAL 16 DISTRICTS AND SCHOOLS. SO, THERE IS ALL FACETS, ALL FACETS OF A COMMUNITY AS PART OF THE REGION, SO WE COULD HAVE THAT FULL 17 DISCUSSION. INTO THEN, ALSO, THE REGIONAL AGENCIES, THE 18 REGIONAL BOARD, WATER QUALITY CONTROL BOARD, THE BAY AREA AIR 19 QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT, BCDC, MTC, ABAG, WE HAVE ALL SAT 20 21 DOWN AND TALKED ABOUT ISSUES AND THAT -- AND I ATTENDED THE MTC ADVISORY COUNCIL MEETING AND THE DISCUSSION WAS NEVER AS 22 FULL AS WHAT WE HAD AT ABAG. AND SO, I'M NOT GOING TO SUPPORT 23 IT, BECAUSE IT'S TAKING -- IT'S JUST COMPLETELY ELIMINATING, 24 25 IN MY OPINION, THE DIVERSITY AND THE FULLNESS OF A DISCUSSION

BETWEEN ALL ELECTED OFFICIALS AND THE COMMUNITIES TOGETHER. 1 AND, SO, WHAT -- AGAIN, I KEEP SAYING MTC'S TOP DOWN, ABAG IS 2 BOTTOM-UP. AS AN ELECTED OFFICIAL, I VALUE THAT DISCUSSION IF 3 A MEETING FORMAT. AND, BUT NOT HAVING THAT DISCUSSION WITH 4 THEM, I THINK, LOSES THE VALUE. SO, I'M NOT GOING TO BE 5 SUPPORTING THE RECOMMENDATION. I MADE THIS COMMENT BEFORE. AND 6 NOT MUCH HAS REALLY CHANGED FROM MY OPINION. SO, THANK YOU 7 8 VERY MUCH FOR YOUR PRESENTATION AND YOUR WORK. 9 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. ANY OTHER COMMENTS FROM 10 COMMITTEE MEMBERS. 11 12 WANDA WILLIAMS: QUESTION. 13 14 15 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: WANDA. 16 WANDA WILLIAMS: HI. AGAIN I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR ALL OF THE 17 HARD WORK AND DEDICATION ON THIS. I KNOW IT TOOK A LOT OF TIME 18 AND EFFORT TO PUTTING IT. I HAD A QUESTION ON THE AGENDA ON 19 PAGE TWO, LISTED UNDER PROPOSED NOMINATIONS AND SELECTION 20 PROCESS. AND WHEN I WAS READING THE INFORMATION, UNDER THE 21 NINE AT-LARGE MEMBERS REPRESENTING INSTITUTIONS, IT INDICATED 22 THAT STAFF WOULD STRIVE TO ENSURE THAT THE OVERALL MEMBERSHIP 23 OF THIS CATEGORY WAS GEOGRAPHICALLY DIVERSE AND REPRESENTATIVE 24 OF THE NINE COUNTIES. AND, SO, MY QUESTION WAS, HOW DID YOU 25

MAKE THAT DETERMINATION OR HAS THERE BEEN SOME THOUGHTS ON HOW
 TO ACCOMPLISH THAT FEAT OR THAT DESIRE? AND I WAS A LITTLE
 CONCERNED WITH THE WORD WOULD STRIVE VERSUS SHALL STRIVE,
 WORDS CARRY WEIGHT, RIGHT? AND I JUST WANTED SOME CLARITY ON
 THAT.

KY-NAM MILLER: SURE THING, I THINK STAFF WOULD BE HAPPY FIRST 7 8 OF ALL JUST SUBSTITUTE SHOULD AND WOULD I THINK WOULD BE MORE DIRECT ABOUT WHAT WE INTEND TO DO IT'S KIND OF RECRUITING FOR 9 A TEAM OF PEOPLE DEPENDING ON THE POOL YOU GET DIFFERENT 10 GEOGRAPHIC REPRESENTATIONS, DIFFERENT STRENGTHS EXPERIENCES SO 11 YOU'RE TRYING TO FORM A GLOBAL WHOLE THAT CAPTURES THE 12 INTEREST OF ALL GROUPS GEOGRAPHIES, INTEREST OF GROUPS HERE IN 13 THE BAY AREA IT'S A PROCESS INVOLVED THAT INCLUDES INTERVIEWS 14 15 REFERENCE CHECKS AND CHECKING THROUGH ABAG MEMBERS AND MTC 16 COMMISSIONERS AND LEADERSHIP AND THE PUBLIC SO EVERYONE CAN WEIGH IN. THAT'S OUR APPROACH IN TERMS OF HOW WE DEVELOPED THE 17 APPLICANT POOL. 18

20 WANDA WILLIAMS: I WAS DOING MY THIRD YEAR SO I HAVEN'T HAD THE 21 OPPORTUNITY TO SEE HOW THIS WORKS IT WAS GOOD TO HEAR HOW THE 22 PROCESS WOULD TAKE PLACE AND THAT THERE IS ACTUALLY LIKE THE 23 APPLICATION PROCESS. SO WHEN IT GOES OUT FOR -- WHEN WE GET TO 24 THE POINT WHERE WE'RE ADVERTISING FOR APPLICANTS, IS THIS 25 INFORMATION SENT TO ALL THE DIFFERENT REGIONS? AND I GUESS MY

QUESTION IS, WHERE IN THE REGION IS IT SENT TO. LINE, IN OUR
 COUNTY WE HAVE OUR STA. SO, I DON'T KNOW ABOUT THE OTHER
 AREAS. HOW WOULD THAT WORK?

5 **KY-NAM MILLER:** SO, THE RECRUITMENT PERIOD LASTS TYPICALLY 6 TO 6 8 WEEKS AND WE WILL ADVERTISE SOMETIMES IN PRINT MEDIA, ON SOCIAL MEDIA, WE'LL DEFINITELY LEVERAGE THE RELATIONSHIPS YOU 7 8 ALL HAVE IN YOUR COMMUNITIES, WE PUSH IT OUT TO, WE HAVE NOW 400 ALUMNI FROM OUR HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE PROGRAMS THAT WE 9 WANT OUR YOUTH TO BE APPLYING TO FOR THIS PROGRAM. WE HAVE 10 GOOD READERSHIP IN OUR NEWS LETTERS IT REALLY DEPENDS ON 11 COMMUNITY PARTNERS. IN SOLANO COUNTY SAYING HEY WE NEED YOU TO 12 STEP UP YOU HAVE CANDIDATES WHO MIGHT NOT WANT TO BE ELECTED 13 BUT WANT TO PARTICIPATE MIGHT BE A GOOD WAY TO GET PEOPLE 14 15 INVOLVED.

17 WANDA WILLIAMS: ALL RIGHT. THAT'S ALL. THANK YOU FOR TAKING18 THE TIME TO ANSWER ALL MY QUESTIONS. AGAIN, THANK YOU.

20 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: CARLOS?

21

22 CARLOS ROMERO: I'M CAUTIOUSLY IN SUPPORT OF THE PROPOSAL. I 23 THINK, IDEALLY, AND I WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE SOME OF THE COMMENTS 24 THAT MY COLLEAGUE HAS MADE REGARDING THE OLD REGIONAL PLANNING 25 COMMISSION. -- COMMITTEE, THAT WE WERE BOTH ON, AT ONE POINT,

AND I WAS PRESIDENT -- VICE CHAIR OF THAT COMMITTEE. WE HAD 1 2 DISCUSSION AND THERE ARE REASONS WHY WE DIDN'T DO IT, BUT AN 3 INTERESTING THOUGHT THAT I KICKED AROUND THAT NEVER MADE IT INTO THIS, THAT IF WE HAD 31 MEMBERS WE COULD POTENTIALLY HAVE 4 5 PERHAPS SOME NON-VOTED ELECTED'S SITTING ON THE BODY. THERE HAVE BEEN CONVERSATIONS -- I HAVE SAT ON BOTH THE ADVISORY 6 COMMITTEES OF MTC, AS WELL AS ON THE REGIONAL PLANNING 7 8 COMMITTEE. THE CONVERSATIONS CAN BE DIFFERENT. HOWEVER THE CHARGE OF THIS NEW COMMITTEE HAS BEEN EXPANDED. AND I THINK 9 THE DISCUSSIONS WILL PROBABLY BE MORE IN LINE WITH THOSE 10 DISCUSSIONS THAT WE HAD AT THE RPC. I THINK THAT'S WHAT THE 11 GOAL IS, I THINK WE SHOULD TRY THIS. IT MAKES SENSE TO DO THIS 12 CONSOLIDATION, WE ARE MTC ABAG, WE EVENTUALLY WANT TO MOVE TO 13 THIS FULL CONSOLIDATION. LET'S TRY THIS. YOU KNOW, I THOUGHT 14 15 ADDING FOUR MEMBERS WOULD HAVE BEEN GREAT. STAFF HEARD THAT 16 AND, LIKE, NO, ANOTHER FOUR MEMBERS, I CAN UNDERSTAND 27 IS REALLY UNRULY. LET'S SEE HOW THIS GOES. I'M IN SUPPORT OF IT 17 AGAIN LET'S NOT TRY TO STRIVE FOR THE PERFECT AT THIS POINT 18 BUT MOVE FORWARD WITH WHAT WE HAVE BUT I DO WANT TO 19 ACKNOWLEDGE SOME OF MY COLLEAGUE'S CONCERNS RELATED TO WHAT WE 20 21 HAVE BEFORE US. SO, THANK YOU.

23 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: STEPHANIE?

STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: YEAH, THANK YOU. I WANT TO THANK MY 1 ABAG COLLEAGUES FOR YOUR COMMENTS HAVING SERVED ON ABAG, AND 2 3 THEN CITY COUNCIL MEMBER, I KNOW THESE ARE VERY DIFFERENT CULTURALLY ORGANIZATIONS, AND SO COMMISSIONER I APPRECIATE YOU 4 5 WALKING THE LINE BETWEEN THE TWO I'LL BE INTERESTED IN OUR PROCESSES INCLUSIVE THE WAY THE ABAG PROCESSES WERE. I THINK 6 TO YOUR POINT, PAT AND WAND A BECAUSE I DO THINK WE NEED TO 7 8 FORGE AND INTEGRATE THESE COMMITTEES IN A WAY THAT'S REFLECTIVE OF BOTH VALUES BOTH OF THEM SO THAT'S WHAT I'M 9 HOPEFUL IS THAT WE SEE IN THE DISCUSSIONS AND FORMAT PROCESS. 10 SO I'M WILLING TO SUPPORT THIS IT'S A START. 11

CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. I JUST WANT TO COMMENT, 13 YOU KNOW, I HAVE THE SAME CONCERNS THAT BOARD MEMBER ECKLUND 14 15 HAS. I AM SUPPORTING IT, BUT AS I SAID BEFORE, AND I'LL SAY IT 16 AGAIN, YOU HAVE GOT TO GOT TO GET NEW FACES NEW PEOPLE 17 INVOLVED IN THIS WE SEE THE SAME PEOPLE, SAME AGENDA, THEY HAVE A MISSION AND GOAL AND IT'S VERY IMPORTANT DIVERSITY IS 18 FROM A NEW GROUP PEOPLE THAT SEE THINGS DIFFERENTLY THAN WE DO 19 AND I THINK IT'S HEALTHY AND PERSONALITY FOR THE ORGANIZATION. 20 I HOPE THE PRESIDENT OF ABAG AND MTC CHAIR REALLY LOOKS AT THE 21 ASPECT OF GETTING NEW PERSPECTIVE, NEW INDIVIDUALS INVOLVED. 22 AND FROM THE ORGANIZATION IT SEEMS LIKE WE GET THE SAME PEOPLE 23 FROM THOSE ORGANIZATIONS. I THINK WE OUGHT TO STRIVE TO GET 24 DIFFERENT PEOPLE FROM THOSE ORGANIZATIONS. SO I HOPE STAFF CAN 25

HELP STEER IT IN THAT DIRECTION. I THINK DIVERSITY IS
 ABSOLUTELY NEEDED AT THIS TIME OF THIS PROCESS. AND, SO, IS
 THERE ANY PUBLIC COMMENTS? I SEE MARTHA IS NOT HERE. OKAY.
 YEAH, COME ON FORWARD AND WE'LL LET THE AUDIENCE TAKE CHARGE.
 HOW MANY MINUTES DO YOU WANT? [LAUGHTER] WE'RE GOING TO GIVE
 YOU TWO

8 SPEAKER: GOOD MORNING CHAIR SPERING. THANKS FOR YOUR PUBLIC SERVICE. I JUST WANTED TO REPORT THAT I WAS, YOU KNOW, PART OF 9 10 THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL DISCUSSION ON THIS ITEM, ALSO ON THE FOCUS GROUP. AND WE HAD, YOU KNOW, A LENGTHY QUESTION 11 SESSION. WE WERE KIND OF REASSURED BY STAFF. AND I WANT TO 12 THANK STAFF FOR THEIR ETHICS ON THIS. I MEAN, I LIKE THE 13 ABSENCE OF ELECTED OFFICIALS. I THINK THIS'S HELPFUL. I THINK 14 15 THERE WAS A LOT OF CONCERN ABOUT THE CHANGE. YOU KNOW, IT'S A 16 NEW -- IT'S A NEW THING, BUT THE LIGHT -- THE OUESTIONS KIND OF SHINE A LIGHT ON THE FACT THAT WE'RE STAYING WITH PRETTY 17 MUCH THE SAME PROCESSES. AND I THINK IT'S JUST A STREAMLINING 18 MEASURE. IT MAKES EVERY SENSE, WE HAVE A LOT OF COMMITTEE 19 MEETINGS IN THIS ROOM, ONE LESS, AND ONE LESS REPORT TO GIVE 20 21 FOR STAFF, I THINK MAKES A LOT OF SENSE. SO, I THINK THE STRATEGIES, THE NEXT STEPS, AND THE PROCESSES OUTLINED IN THE 22 REPORT ARE NOT IN CONFLICT WITH THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL OR 23 THE FOCUS GROUP. THANK YOU. 24

CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. THANK YOU. ANY OTHER 1 2 MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC WANT TO SPEAK? IS THERE -- I HAVEN'T 3 RECEIVED ANY WRITTEN COMMENTS. HAS STAFF RECEIVED ANYTHING? 4 5 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THROUGH THE CHAIR? 6 7 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: YES. 8 CLERK OF THE BOARD: WE HAVE TWO PUBLIC COMMENTS. FIRST WILL BE 9 10 ADINA LEVIN FOLLOWED BY RANDI KINMAN. GO AHEAD ADINA. 11 SPEAKER: ADINA LEVIN, I SERVE ON THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL, 12 AND I'M SPEAKING FOR MYSELF HERE. I THINK THAT THE 13 RECOMMENDATION MOVING FORWARD IS A REASONABLE MIX IN TERMS OF 14 15 WANTING TO GET MORE COMMUNITY INPUT ON THE HOUSING ISSUES THAT 16 HAVE TRADITIONALLY BEEN COVERED UNDER ABAG, AND HAVING REPRESENTATION FROM PEOPLE REPRESENTING DIFFERENT SECTORS OF 17 THE COMMUNITY ALL AROUND THE REGION. YOU KNOW, I HEAR THE 18 REMARK FROM COMMISSIONERS SAYING, HEY, WE COULD BE EVEN MORE 19 REPRESENTATIVE IF WE HAD EVEN MORE PEOPLE ON THE BODY. I CAN 20 SAY AS SOMEONE SERVING ON THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL THAT 21 COVERS REALLY DIFFERENT AND WEIGHTY TOPICS, THAT OUR MEETINGS 22 OFTEN RUN VERY, VERY, VERY LONG IN A WAY THAT IS A LITTLE BIT 23 OF A CHALLENGE FOR PEOPLE THAT ARE COMMUNITY MEMBERS THAT DO 24 25 NOT DO THIS FULL-TIME, AND THAT HAVE JOBS OTHER AND

OBLIGATIONS. SO, I'LL APPRECIATE STAFF FROM KEEPING THE NUMBER 1 2 OF PARTICIPANTS AT THE CURRENT LEVEL IN ORDER TO, YOU KNOW, 3 MAKE THE PROCESS OF SERVING ON THIS COMMUNITY ADVISORY BOARD MANAGEABLE FOR THE PARTICIPANTS AND STAFF. AND I THINK IT'S A 4 5 REASONABLE MIX. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. 6 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THANK YOU. NEXT WE'LL HAVE RANDY KINMAN 7 8 FOLLOWED BY VINAY PIMPLE. 9 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. RANDI KINMAN FROM THE POLICY ADVISORY 10 COUNCIL. AND I'M PROBABLY RIGHT NOW THE LONGEST SERVING MEMBER 11 OF THAT. I JUST WANTED TO POINT OUT THAT MTC HAS NEVER HAD A 12 PROBLEM WITH REACHING OUT AND MAINTAINING A BODY FOR THE 13 ADVISORY COUNCIL THAT IS INCLUSIVE, THAT IS DYNAMIC, AND THAT 14 15 HAS COUNTY REPRESENTATION ACROSS THE BOARD. EVERYBODY IS 16 REPRESENTED TO THE BEST OF OUR ABILITY. AND SOMETIMES WE HAVE OVER REPRESENTATION IN THAT YOU HAVE PEOPLE WORKING IN ONE 17 COUNTY AND LIVING IN ANOTHER COUNTY, AND THAT'S A GOOD THING 18 FOR US, IT CROSS POLLINATES. WHAT I WANT TO SAY IS IT'S 19 IMPORTANT FOR YOU TO HAVE A BODY THAT REMAINS -- THAT REMAINS 20 21 NEUTRAL AND IS NOT PART OF THE ELECTED BODY SYSTEM. BECAUSE THAT MEANS THAT AT THE ADVICE THAT WE ARE GETTING AND THE 22 INFORMATION THAT WE ARE GETTING IS FROM THE STAFF AND FROM THE 23 MEMBERS OF OTHER GROUPS THAT ARE PRESENTING INFORMATION, AND 24 THAT THERE IS NEVER ANY DOUBT THAT WE ARE BEING INFLUENCED BY 25

AN ELECTIVE REPRESENTATIVE. I FEEL VERY, VERY STRONGLY ABOUT 1 2 THAT. THERE IS ALSO THE ABILITY FOR US TO, AS ADINA SAID, OUR MEETINGS GO LONG, BUT I FORESEE US HAVING THE ABILITY TO DO 3 MORE SUBCOMMITTEES, JUST AS YOU ARE DOING RIGHT NOW. THIS 4 5 CONVERSATION IS NOT TAKING PLACE AT THE JOINT MEETING, IT'S TAKING PLACE AT THE COMMITTEE LEVEL. AND I THINK THAT'S WHERE 6 WE WILL BE MORE EFFECTIVE AND SERVE BOTH BODIES EQUALLY. THANK 7 8 YOU.

10 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THANK YOU, RANDI. AND OUR LAST RAISED HAND11 IS VINAY PIMPLE. GO AHEAD AND UNMUTE YOURSELF.

SPEAKER: HI. I ALSO SERVE ON THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL. I 13 AGREE 100% WITH EVERYTHING THAT RANDI SAID ABOUT WHY ELECTED'S 14 15 SHOULD MAYBE STAY AWAY, BUT ALSO THE OTHER POINT SHE MAKES HOW 16 THINGS CAN BE HANDLED THROUGH SUBCOMMITTEES AND SO FORTH. THE THING I WANTED TO SAY IS WE SEE OUR ROLE AS LARGELY HELPING 17 STAFF. AND HAVING BEEN AN ELECTED OFFICIAL MYSELF IN THE PAST, 18 I MEAN, MY EXPERIENCE WAS THAT MOST ELECTED OFFICIALS, WHEN 19 PUSH COMES TO SHOVE, THEY'RE NOT REALLY GOING TO LISTEN TO 20 21 WHAT WE SAY. AND, SO, SOME PEOPLE DO HAVE THE SENSE THAT WE ARE HERE TO, YOU KNOW, GUIDE THE ELECTED OFFICIALS. AND THAT'S 22 REALLY NOT THE CASE. WE ARE HERE TO HELP STAFF OUT TO MAKE 23 SURE THAT STAFF GIVE YOU THE BEST REPORTS THAT THEY CAN GIVE 24 YOU, RATHER THAN TO ACTUALLY INFLUENCE YOU FOLKS DIRECTLY. 25

AND, SO, I'M A LITTLE SURPRISED THAT WE DON'T HAVE MORE INPUT 1 2 FROM STAFF. LIKE, WHAT DO STAFF ACTUALLY THINK? AND NOT JUST 3 STAFF LIKE KY-NAM WHO IS SUPER, BUT STAFF WHO CAN GIVE REPORTS, WHAT THE SENSE IS OF THE BETTER OPTION IN TERMS OF 4 5 GETTING USEFUL INPUT. THANK YOU. 6 7 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THAT CONCLUDES PUBLIC COMMENT FOR THIS 8 ITEM. 9 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: OKAY. I APPRECIATE THE NON-10 ELECTED OFFICIAL COMMENTS. BEING THAT I'M NOT ELECTED, SO I 11 DON'T FALL INTO THAT CATEGORY. [LAUGHTER] 12 13 CHAIR, BELIA RAMOS, ABAG AC: EMERITUS. 14 15 16 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: THEY DIDN'T SAY FORMER. OUR NEXT ITEM AGENDA 10A PRIORITY CONSERVATION 24 25 AREA AMENDMENT PROGRESS AND CALL FOR NEW NOMINATIONS AND WE'RE

GOING TO RECEIVE A REPORT BY MICHAEL GERMERAAD. DID I SAY THAT

I'LL KEEP REMARKS BRIEF THE PRIORITY 4 5 CONSERVATION AREAS IDENTIFY KEY NATURAL HABITATS FARMLAND RECREATION SPACES URBAN DEGREE SPACE TO ADDRESS CLIMATE 6 RESILIENCE LAST MAY ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD APPROVED UPDATED 7 8 FRAMEWORK INCORPORATING NEW DATA TO SUPPORT MAPPING TO CHANGE THE FRAMEWORK RESULTING IN THE NEED TO UPDATE THE EXISTING 9 PCAS OVER THE PAST SIX MONTHS WE HAVE WORKED WITH LOCAL 10 GOVERNMENTS TO AMEND THE 60% OF 180 PLUS EXISTING PCAS 11 ATTACHMENT B LISTS JURISDICTIONS WE'LL COLLABORATE WITH THIS 12 WINTER AND SPRING TO ADDRESS THE REMAINING 40%. ATTACHMENT B 13 WALNUT CREEK WAS MISTAKENLY INCLUDED CITY STAFF HAVE ADDRESSED 14 15 THE SINGLE PCA SO NO FURTHER ACTION NEEDED THERE. FINALLY 16 WE'RE EXCITED TO ANNOUNCE THAT WE WILL RELEASE CALL FOR NEW PCA NOMINATIONS IN THE COMING MONTHS THIS WILL ALLOW LOCAL 17 GOVERNMENTS TO NOMINATE NEW PCAS ALIGNED WITH OF THE UPDATED 18 FRAMEWORK ANNOUNCEMENTS AND DETAILED GUIDANCE AND NOMINATIONS 19 WILL BE SHARED SOON. 20

CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: EXISTING PCA YOU SAY ARE
 INCONSISTENT? HOW DO YOU DETERMINE THE THAT? CAN THEY REAPPLY
 OR ARE JUST DISQUALIFIED.

5 MICHAEL GERMERAAD: WE'RE WORKING WITH JURISDICTIONS TO COME UP WITH AMENDMENTS TO THE EXISTING PCAS SO WE HAVE 180 OVER 110 6 THAT HAVE ALREADY GONE THROUGH THE AMENDMENT PROCESS WE'RE 7 8 WORKING WITH A LITTLE OVER A DOZEN JURISDICTIONS TO WORK THROUGH AMENDMENTS. THE GOAL IS TO BRING ALL EXISTING PCAS 9 10 INTO THE FRAMEWORK IT JUST REQUIRES ADJUSTMENTS TO EITHER THE TYPE IT WAS DESIGNATED AS ADJUSTMENTS TO BOUNDARY AND 11 POTENTIALLY SPLITTING AN EXISTING PCA, AND DIFFERENT PIECES 12 REFLECTING TWO DIFFERENT TYPES. 13

15 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: SOLANO COUNTY THAT HAVE
16 PROJECTS THE WAY I UNDERSTAND IT THAT WOULD BE DISQUALIFIED.
17 EXPLAIN TO ME HOW THAT WORKS. AND WHAT DISQUALIFIES?

18

MICHAEL GERMERAAD: WE'RE TALKING SPECIFICALLY ABOUT PCA DESIGNATIONS WHERE PCAS ARE MAPPED. AND ANY PROJECTS, THROUGH THE PCA GRANT PROGRAM THAT ARE CURRENTLY FUNDED CONTINUE TO MOVE THROUGH THAT PROCESS AS IS. WHAT WE'RE WORKING TO DO IS TO UPDATE THOSE DESIGNATIONS, THOSE GEOGRAPHIES OF PCAS SO WE'LL BE WORKING WITH SOLANO COUNTY AND A FEW OF THE JURISDICTIONS THAT REMAIN ON OUR LIST OF PCAS THAT NEED TO GO

THROUGH THE AMENDMENT PROCESS. THERE ARE PATHS TO KEEP THOSE
 GEOGRAPHIES, IN MANY CASES, EXACTLY AS THEY ARE, JUST CHANGING
 TYPES. IN SOME CASES A FEW SMALL TWEAKS TO BOUNDARIES. WE'RE
 WORKING ONE-ON-ONE WITH JURISDICTIONS TO SUPPORT IN THOSE
 EFFORTS.

7 CHAIR, JAMES P. SPERING, MTC PC: THAT'S WHAT I WANT TO HEAR
8 BECAUSE WHILE I WAS READING IT IT LOOKED LIKE THEY WERE JUST
9 DISQUALIFIED. THANK YOU TO STAFF FOR WORKING WITH THOSE
10 JURISDICTIONS.

12 CHAIR, BELIA RAMOS, ABAG AC: THANK YOU. BOARD MEMBER ECKLUND? 13

PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. SO, IT LOOKING AT MARIN, 14 TOWN OF ROSS, AND CITY OF NOVATO, ARE BOTH BLANK. SO WHAT DOES 15 16 THAT MEAN? ARE YOU WORKING WITH US TO BRING US UP TO WHERE WE 17 NEED TO BE IN ORDER TO -- BECAUSE NOVATO, WE -- WE PROPOSED SEVERAL OF THEM. AND I THINK THAT THEY WERE APPROVED. SO, I WOULD 19 APPRECIATE IT IF STAFF WOULD CONTACT ME SO THAT I CAN ALSO 20 21 WORK WITH THE TOWN OF ROSS AND SO THAT I MAKE SURE THAT THE CITIES, OR THE MUNICIPALITIES ARE REPRESENTED. BECAUSE I'M NOT 22 SURE WHERE ROSS IS, OR NOVATO, AT THIS POINT, BECAUSE I 23 HAVEN'T HEARD ANYTHING. SO, I WOULD HATE TO HAVE SOMETHING GET 24 OFF THE LIST. SO, THAT'S A COMMENT. BUT THEN DO WE HAVE A LIST 25

OF WHAT THE NON-CONFORMING PCAS ARE? AND CAN WE GET A COPY OF 1 THAT? BECAUSE IT'S -- IT -- LIKE, WHEN I LOOK AT THE MAP ON 2 ATTACHMENT C, THERE IS LITTLE RED DOTS THAT IT LOOKS LIKE 3 THAT'S IN NOVATO, BUT I'M NOT SURE IF IT'S IN NOVATO OR NOT. 4 5 AND THEN WHERE IS ROSS. SO, IT'S HARD FOR ME TO TELL, BECAUSE THE LEGEND IS NOT -- DOESN'T PROVIDE THAT DISTINCTION. SO, CAN 6 7 YOU GET US A LIST? 8 MICHAEL GERMERAAD: YEAH. WE CAN PRODUCE A LIST OF THE PCA 9 NAMES AND THE JURISDICTIONS THAT HAVE NOT YET AMENDED. AND 10 THEN TO YOUR FIRST QUESTION ABOUT NOVATO AND ROSS, HAPPY TO 11 FOLLOW UP WITH YOU. WE ARE IN CONTACT WITH PLANNING DIRECTORS 12 IN BOTH JURISDICTIONS. 13 14 PAT ECKLUND: OKAY GREAT. IT WOULD HELP IF WE -- ALSO HAVE THAT 15 16 INFORMATION. THANK YOU. 17 CHAIR, BELIA RAMOS, ABAG AC: COMMISSIONER NOACK. 18 19 SUE NOACK: JUST A QUESTION ON THE NOMINATION PROCESS. I DON'T 20 21 KNOW HOW -- SOMEBODY CAME UP TO ME AT THE MAYOR'S CONFERENCE LAST NIGHT, AND I WANTED TO KNOW -- IT WAS THE CITY OF 22 MARTINEZ, AND I DON'T KNOW -- YOU CAN GIVE ME MORE DETAIL ON 23 HOW THAT PROCESS FOR NOMINATIONS CAN BE MADE? 24 25

MICHAEL GERMERAAD: YEAH WE'RE WORKING ON FINAL DETAILS AND 1 WE'LL GET THE INFORMATION OUT LIKELY IN THE NEXT MONTH. WE'RE 2 3 ALSO DEVELOPING RESOURCES THAT WILL MAKE IT EASY FOR JURISDICTIONS TO NOMINATE NEW PCAS SO IT WILL BE EASY FOR 4 5 FOLKS TO DRAW NEW PCA BOUNDARIES IN AN ONLINE DASHBOARD. THE PROCESS WILL BE FOR A LOCAL JURISDICTION TO NOMINATE AN AREA 6 AS PCA, AND ABAG AND MTC STAFF THEN WILL VERIFY THAT IT 7 8 CONFORMS TO THE UPDATED PCA PLANNING FRAMEWORK THEN IT GOES BACK TO THE LOCALS FOR APPROVAL. SO IT HAS TO GO TO THE LOCAL 9 CITY OR TOWN COUNCIL OR BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OR PARK BOARD FOR 10 APPROVAL BEFORE COMING BACK TO ABAG FOR DESIGNATION. SO, IT'S 11 FOUR STEPS. WE'RE WORKING ON A DIAGRAM TO TALK THROUGH THE 12 TIMELINES OF EACH OF THOSE FACES. AND WE ANTICIPATE THAT FIRST 13 PHASE OF NOMINATING A PCA, THROUGH THIS SPRING. 14

16 SUE NOACK: TO THE BEGINNING PART, HOW DO THOSE JURISDICTIONS 17 FIND OUT ABOUT THE APPLICATION PROCESS TO MAKE THEIR 18 NOMINATION?

19

MICHAEL GERMERAAD: YEAH, SO, WE WILL REACH OUT TO PLANNING
DIRECTORS IN EVERY JURISDICTION. WE ALSO HAVE A FAIRLY
EXTENSIVE EXISTING PCA MAILING LIST. WE PLAN ON HOSTING A
WEBINAR PROVIDING DETAILS ON THE PROCESS. THOSE ARE THE MAIN
WAYS THAT WE'LL BE REACHING OUT TO JURISDICTIONS.

1 SUE NOACK: OKAY. OKAY. THANK YOU.

3 CHAIR, BELIA RAMOS, ABAG AC: THANK YOU. BOARD MEMBER WILLIAMS?

5 WANDA WILLIAMS: THANK YOU, PRESIDENT. I JUST WANT TO CIRCLE BACK TO BOARD MEMBER SPERING'S REMARK IN REFERENCE TO SOLANO 6 COUNTY. AND I WAS JUST LOOKING AT THE ATTACHMENT B SHOWING 7 8 THAT JURISDICTIONS WITH EXISTING PCAS THAT STILL NEED TO BE AN AMENDMENT P ARE THEY IN THE BEGINNING STAGES OF AMENDMENT? OR 9 10 ARE WE STILL WAITING TO HEAR BACK FROM THESE PARTICULAR CITIES? AND THEN, MY SECOND QUESTION THAT I HAVE TWO, THE 11 SECOND OUESTION IS REFERENCE TO NEXT STEPS IT INDICATES THAT 12 STAFF WILL PROACTIVELY ENGAGE WITH JURISDICTIONS AND THAT WITH 13 EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES. AND SUISUN CITY FALLS UNDER THAT 14 15 CATEGORY BUT I DID NOT SEE THEM LISTED. SO I CAN ASSUME 16 THEY'RE WITHOUT A PCA? I THINK THEY'RE ON THE PREVIOUS MAP 17 THAT WANT FOR THIS. IT WAS A DIFFERENT MAP. SO THAT MEANS THEY'RE NOT, RIGHT? OR THEY DON'T HAVE ONE? 18

MICHAEL GERMERAAD: I BELIEVE THAT SUISUN CITY DOES NOT
CURRENTLY HAVE A PCA, SO AS PART OF THE NEW NOMINATION
PROCESS, WE WOULD LIKE TO PROVIDE AN EXTRA DEGREE OF
ENGAGEMENT TO JURISDICTIONS THAT DON'T HAVE A PCA, BUT HAVE AN
EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITY. AND SO, THOSE ARE INSTANCE WHERE IS
WE PLAN ON SENDING A KIND OF INDIVIDUAL E-MAIL TO THE

JURISDICTION AS OPPOSED TO A KIND OF NEWS LETTER STYLE E-MAIL. 1 AND THE QUESTION REGARDING WHAT IS THE STATUTES OF DIFFERENT 2 3 JURISDICTIONS, IT'S A BIT OF A MIX. ALL JURISDICTIONS HAVE BEEN CONTACTED THIS PAST SUMMER AND FALL. A NUMBER OF 4 5 JURISDICTIONS MADE A STRATEGIC DECISION THAT THEY DIDN'T HAVE THE TIME AND RESOURCES TO PURSUE THE AMENDMENT AS PART OF WORK 6 THIS PAST SUMMER AND FALL. SO, WE'LL BE REENGAGING THEM IN 7 8 THIS WINTER AND SPRING TO GET THOSE STARTED. AND THEN IN A LOT OF CASES, JURISDICTIONS MADE THE DECISION THAT THEY WANTED 9 MORE TIME TO DECIDE WHAT TO DO WITH THE AMENDMENTS AND WANTED 10 TO ALSO HAVE IT COINCIDE WITH THE OPPORTUNITY FOR NEW 11 NOMINATIONS. BECAUSE THEY WOULD LIKE TO THINK ABOUT 12 POTENTIALLY ADJUSTING THOSE BOUNDARIES MORE SIGNIFICANTLY. SO 13 THEY'RE PLANNING TO DO THEIR AMENDMENT AT THE SAME TIME THEY 14 15 MIGHT NOMINATE AN ADDITIONAL PCA. 16

17 WANDA WILLIAMS: OKAY. I JUST -- I WAS CONCERNED.

18

19 MICHAEL GERMERAAD: SURE.

20

21 WANDA WILLIAMS: ABOUT SOLANO COUNTY. I KNOW CAPACITY, A LOT OF
22 TIMES, HAS TO DO WITH SOLANO COUNTY NOT BEING ABLE TO ALWAYS
23 SUPPLY WHAT'S NEEDED. BUT WE'LL WORK ON IT. WE'LL GET THERE.
24 [LAUGHTER] ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU SO MUCH.
