DAVID HAS A 11 TREMENDOUS TRACK RECORD, GOOD PERSON IN THIS POSITION AND WE 12 ALL LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH HIM. WITH THAT, WE'LL MOVE TO 13 AGENDA ITEM 7A PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREA GRANT PROGRAM, 2024 14 15 GRANT AWARDS RECOMMENDATIONS, VARIOUS APPLICANTS FOR A TOTAL 16 AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED 8.5 MILLION. WITH THAT, DAVID, I'LL TURN IT OVER TO YOU. 17

DAVE VAUTIN: THANK YOU CHAIR SPERING AND THANK YOU
COMMISSIONERS AND BOARD MEMBERS LOOKING FORWARD TO WORKING
WITH YOU ALL IN THIS ROLE. I'M GOING TO TURN IT OVER TO BEN
BOTKIN OUR SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP STAFF WHO IS
PRESENTING VIA ZOOM THIS MORNING. BEN?

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SPEAKER: THANK YOU, DAVE. GOOD MORNING CHAIR SPERING AND CHAIR 1 RAMOS AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS. I'M BEN BOTKIN PRIORITY 2 3 CONSERVATION AREA GRANTS MANAGER I APOLOGIZE FOR NOT BEING ABLE TO BE THERE IN-PERSON TODAY. I HAD TO TRAVEL FOR A 4 5 WEDDING. TODAY WE'RE EXCITED TO SHARE OUR RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE THIRD ROUND OF PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREA GRANTS PCA GRANT 6 7 PROGRAM ONE OF MTC'S PRIMARY TOOLS SUPPORTING PLANNED BAY 8 AREA. URBAN DEGREE AND BAY AREA COMMUNITIES PROJECTS EMBODY SO MUCH OF WHAT MAKES OUR REGION AN INCREDIBLE PLACE TO LIVE AND 9 WORK AND PLAY. YOU AUTHORIZED SPLITTING OBAG PCA FUNDS INTO 10 TWO PHASES AND RELEASING FIRST PHASE IN AN EIGHT YEAR AND A 11 HALF MILLION DOLLARS CALL FOR PROJECTS SECOND PHASE \$8 MILLION 12 PLANNED FOR RELEASE IN SPRING OR SUMMER FOLLOWING NEW ROUND OF 13 PCA DESIGNATIONS BY ABAG BOARD. FOR THIS FIRST PHASE GUIDANCE 14 15 WE DEVELOPED A GRANT PROGRAM GUIDELINES AND RELEASED CALL FOR 16 PROPOSALS IN MARSH GRANT GUIDELINES WERE LARGELY CONSISTENT WITH PRIOR PCA GRANT PROGRAM ROUNDS AND INCLUDED GRANTS 17 SCORING CRITERIA APPLICATION PROCESS GUIDELINES NOTED 18 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS FUNDING TARGETS REGARDING PROJECT 19 LOCATION AND TYPES INCLUDING MINIMUM 50% FUNDS TO BE AWARDED 20 21 PROJECTS IN THE FOUR NORTH BAY COUNTIES FIRST STEP APPLICANTS HAD TWO MONTHS TO SUBMIT, OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED PROJECT 22 23 ALIGNMENT WITH GOALS BUDGET SCHEDULE AND BENEFITS IN THE PROCESS WE RECEIVED 24 LETTERS OF INTEREST FOR OVER \$21 24 MILLION SIGNIFICANT INTEREST IN THIS GRANT PROGRAM STRONG NEED 25

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FOR THIS TYPE OF FUNDING. EVALUATED BASED ON SCORING CRITERIA 1 15 PROPOSALS ADVANCED PREPARATION APPLICATIONS FULL AWARD 2 3 REQUEST OF \$12 MILLION APPLICATIONS PROVIDED ADDITIONAL DETAILS ABOUT PROPOSED PROJECTS PARTNERSHIPS EQUITY BENEFITS 4 5 AND ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION. TODAY WE'LL PRESENT THE 13 PROJECTS THAT WE ARE RECOMMENDING FOR AWARD. NEXT SLIDE. I 6 WANT TO PROVIDE DETAIL ON THE EVALUATION AND STAFF 7 8 RECOMMENDATION PROCESS DETAILED IN THE GRANT GUIDELINES. THE EVALUATION COMMITTEE WAS COMPRISED OF STAFF FROM MTC, SAN 9 FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP, STAFFED OF MTC AND CALIFORNIA 10 STATE COASTAL CONSERVANCY KEY PARTNER IN THIS GRANT PROGRAM 11 PROJECTS WERE SCORED BASED ON KEY FACTORS, GOALS INCLUDE 12 RESTORE HABITATS OPEN SPACE PROTECTING AGRICULTURAL LANDS 13 SUPPORTING AGRICULTURAL ECONOMY ENHANCED BIKE AND PEDESTRIAN 14 INFRASTRUCTURE AND REGIONAL TRAILS AND PROVIDING ENHANCED 15 16 GREEN SPACES IN URBAN AREAS WE INCLUDED PARTNERSHIPS AND EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITY BENEFITS REGIONAL SIGNIFICANCE, 17 LIKELIHOOD OF SUCCESS, MULTIPLE BENEFITS, ABILITY OF THE 18 PROJECT TO SUPPORT MULTIPLE BENEFITS AS WELL AS OPERATIONS AND 19 MAINTENANCE ENSURING BENEFITS ARE MAINTAINED OVER TIME. BASED 20 ON THE CRITERIA PROJECTS WERE SCORED OUT OF 100 POINTS. AGAIN 21 WE RECEIVED A LOT OF QUALITY PROPOSALS AND MADE THIS 22 RECOMMENDATION PROCESS CHALLENGING. DUE TO THE HIGH NUMBER OF 23 QUALITY APPLICATIONS WE RECOMMENDED SEVERAL PROJECTS FOR 24 PARTIAL AWARDS TO ALLOW FOR FUNDING OF A BROADER SUITE AND 25

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NUMBER OF ELIGIBLE PROJECTS. AS A RESULT, THE TOP SCORING 1 SEVEN PROJECTS RECOMMENDED FOR FULL AWARDS ONES RECEIVED OVER 2 3 85 POINTS NEXT SIX PROJECTS APPROXIMATELY 75% OF AWARDS LOWEST SCORING PROJECTS NOT RECOMMENDED FOR AWARD FOR A TOTAL OF 13 4 5 PROJECT RECOMMENDATIONS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. NEXT TWO SLIDES WILL INCLUDE RECOMMENDED PROJECTS. WE'RE REALLY EXCITED ABOUT 6 THESE SUITE OF PROJECTS REALLY JUST AN EXCELLENT -- A RANGE OF 7 8 PROJECT TYPES AND ACROSS THE REGION. SO, WE DID HIT THAT FUNDING TARGET OF OVER 50% OF FUNDS IN NORTH BAY COUNTIES. IT 9 ENDED UP ABOUT BEING 53% OF FUNDS AND THEY ARE SHOWN HERE. 10 PROJECTS ARE LISTED HERE ACCORDING TO THE PROPOSED AWARD 11 AMOUNT. SO, AGAIN, THE BROAD VARIETY. I WON'T GET INTO A LOT 12 OF DETAIL ON EACH ONE OF THESE PROJECTS, THOSE ARE INCLUDED IN 13 14 ATTACHMENT B, BUT JUST TO NOTE SOME HIGHLIGHTS, THE TIDE WATER 15 PROJECT WILL BRING URBAN GREENING TO EOUITY PRIORITY 16 COMMUNITIES IN OAKLAND, AND FEE ACQUISITION IN NAPA COUNTY WILL CONNECT 9,000 ACRES OF ALREADY PROTECTED OPEN SPACE 17 18 INCLUDING SENSITIVE HABITATS AND INCLUDE SEGMENT OF THE RICHMOND TRAIL SOLANO COUNTY FARM TO MARKET PROJECT WILL 19 CONTINUE TO ENHANCE MULTI-MODAL ACCESS AT THE SUISUN VALLEY 20 21 UGH CULTURAL ECONOMY NEXT SLIDE. EVOLVING SHORELINES PROJECT, MARSH SUPPORT NATURE-BASED CLIMATE RESILIENCE BAY TRAIL 22 ALIGNMENT MULTIPLE WILL REGIONAL TRAIL PROJECTS INCLUDE BAY 23 TRAIL, RIDGE TRAIL, KEY CONNECTOR TRAILS THEN PLANNING STUDY 24 IN COYOTE VALLEY TO ENHANCE WILDLIFE TO NAH GAVE THE 25

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INFRASTRUCTURE BARRIERS AS THEY MOVE BETWEEN SANTA CRUZ 1 MOUNTAINS AND DIABLO RANGE IN THIS WILDLIFE CORRIDOR. NEXT 2 3 SLIDE. IN CONCLUSION I WANT TO THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF THIS IMPORTANT PROGRAM AND REQUEST APPROVAL OF EIGHT AND A 4 5 HALF MILLION DOLLARS FOR THESE RECOMMENDED GRANTS TO ADVANCE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 STRATEGIES. UPON APPROVAL WORK WITH 6 SELECTED ATTENDEES TO FINALIZE SCOPES OF WORK, BUDGETS AND 7 8 TIMELINES THROUGH THE THIS WINTER THEN PRESENTATION IN SPRING WE'RE ANTICIPATING MOVING FORWARD WITH PHASE TWO OF OUR OBAG 9 3PCA GRANTS UPON CONCLUSION PCA CALL FOR NEW DESIGNATIONS AND 10 ADOPTION BY THE ABAG BOARD. NEXT SLIDE. WITH THAT THANK YOU 11 FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF THIS IMPORTANT GRANT PROGRAM. I WOULD BE 12 HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE. OF THE 13

PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU, AGAIN, FOR A GREAT PRESENTATION. IT'S 18 19 ALWAYS DIFFICULT, YOU KNOW, YOU HAVE SO MANY GOOD APPLICATIONS. IT WAS HARD TO FIGURE OUT WHICH ONES ARE THE 20 BEST. I JUST KIND OF WOULD LIKE TO GET A SUMMARY OF WHY YOU 21 22 DIDN'T CHOOSE FOR PARTIAL FUNDING THE TIBURON RIDGE 23 ACOUISITION OR EVEN THE MILL VALLEY BAYLANDS PUBLIC ACCESS PROJECT. I'M KIND OF CURIOUS WHY THOSE TWO WEREN'T PARTIALLY 24 25 FUNDED.

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SPEAKER: YEAH, YOU BET. AND, AGAIN, A LOT OF GREAT PROJECTS. I 2 3 WISH WE HAD MORE FUNDING TO SUPPORT THESE TYPES OF PROGRAMS. BUT FOR THOSE TWO SPECIFICALLY, OF THE TIBURON RIDGE WAS ONE 4 5 WHERE THEY HAD LARGELY IDENTIFIED A LOT OF FUNDING ALREADY. SO THIS WAS ALMOST, SORT OF, A BACKUP PLAN FOR FUNDING FOR SOME 6 OF THAT ACOUISITION, AS WE UNDERSTOOD IT FROM THEIR PROPOSAL. 7 8 AND THEY ALSO MADE A REQUEST FOR \$3 MILLION. WE HAD PUT A CAP OF \$1 MILLION AS THE TOP END, JUST GIVEN THE LIMITED AMOUNT OF 9 FUNDING. WE DID SAY, YOU KNOW, FOR PROJECTS OF EXTRAORDINARY 10 REGIONAL SIGNIFICANCE WE WOULD CONSIDER A SLIGHTLY HIGHER 11 AMOUNT. BUT THAT WAS THE REASON BEHIND TIBURON RIDGE. AND FOR 12 THE MILL VALLEY PROJECT, IT WAS NOT WITHIN A DESIGNATED PCA. 13 IT DID HAVE BENEFITS TO AN ADJACENT PCA WHICH IS ALLOWED 14 WITHIN THE CRITERIA BUT GIVEN THE COMPETITIVE OF THIS GRANT 15 16 PROGRAM CYCLE WE DECIDED TO MOVE FORWARD WITH PROJECTS THAT WERE, SORT OF, MORE DIRECTLY BENEFICIAL TO EXISTING DESIGNATED 17 18 PCAS.

SPERING, CHAIR: OKAY. THANK YOU. YOU KNOW, I JUST 14 WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR THE COMMITMENT YOU MADE OF THE NORTH 15 16 BAY COUNTIES. AS MOST PEOPLE KNOW, A LOT OF PEOPLE FROM THE BAY AREA COME TO THOSE COUNTIES FOR RECREATION, AND A PARK 17 THAT'S BOTH IN WANDA AND MY OLD DISTRICT, ROCKVILLE PARK, 18

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19 THERE ARE A LARGE NUMBER OF PEOPLE THAT USE THAT PARK ARE FROM 20 THE BAY AREA. APPRECIATE IT. AND SO STAFF SAID THEY WOULD PUT 21 EMPHASIS ON THE NORTH BAY MEETING THAT DEMAND AND IT LOOKS 22 LIKE THEY HAVE DONE THAT. SO, THANK YOU. SO, WITH THAT, MOVE 23 ON TO AGENDA ITEM 8A, DID YOU WANT TO TAKE THIS ONE?

SPERING, CHAIR: I WOULD YOU CAN COUNT ON THAT. THIS 7 8 IS PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, ENGAGEMENT FINDING. AND I JUST WANT TO COMMENT, IF YOU READ THROUGH ALL THE STAFF HANDOUTS, STAFF 9 HAS DONE AN OUTSTANDING JOB WITH THIS. AND I DON'T THINK I 10 HAVE SEEN THIS EXTENSIVE OUTREACH ALL THE YEARS I HAVE BEEN 11 SERVING ON THE COMMISSION. SO, I THINK THERE IS, BOTH FOR ABAG 12 AND MTC, I THINK THIS IS A TREMENDOUS ACCOMPLISHMENT THE WAY 13 THIS WAS HANDLED. WITH THAT, DAVID, WHO IS GOING TO KICK THIS 14 15 OFF? 16 DAVE VAUTIN: VERONICA CUMMINGS FROM OUR PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT TEAM 17 WILL PRESENT THIS ITEM AND CHIRAG RABARI WHO IS PROJECT 18 MANAGER FOR PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ IS ALSO HERE TO TAKE 19 20 OUESTIONS. 21 22 VERONICA CUMMINGS: GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS VERONICA CUMMINGS RECENTLY JOINED MTC AS THE PRINCIPLE PUBLIC INFORMATION 23 OFFICER TO LEAD PLANNED BAY AREA ENGAGEMENT. SALUDE. TODAY 24 I'LL BE PRESENTING OUTCOMES OF THE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT STAFF 25

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CONDUCTED OVER THE SUMMER FOR PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ AND 1 TRANSIT 2050+. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THIS PAST SUMMER STAFF 2 ENGAGED IN ROBUST DIALOGUE WITH RESIDENTS AND PARTNERS ACROSS 3 THE NINE BAY AREA COUNTIES TO SEEK INPUT THAT WILL HELP 4 5 ADDRESS THE REMAINING CHALLENGES STAFF NEED TO TACKLE AND COMPLETE THE PLAN'S FINAL BLUEPRINT OUR EXTENSIVE SUMMER 6 ENGAGEMENT EXCEEDED 50ED PLUS EVENTS INCLUDED 18 POP-UP 7 8 WORKSHOPS ONLINE SURVEY THAT WAS AVAILABLE IN CHINESE ENGLISH SPANISH AND VIETNAMESE OUR ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS INCLUDED 9 10 PARTNERSHIPS WITH 17 COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS OR CBOS THAT WERE CRUCIAL. I WOULD LIKE TO HIGHLIGHT HOW BENEFICIAL IT 11 WAS TO PARTNER WITH CBOS. BECAUSE OF OUR WONDERFUL CBO 12 PARTNERS, WE WERE ABLE TO EXPAND OUR OUTREACH AND INCLUSIVITY 13 BY COLLABORATING, OUR ENGAGEMENT REACHED OVER 21,000 14 15 INDIVIDUALS DIRECTLY AND MORE THAN 31,000 THROUGH THEIR 16 NETWORKS. THIS EXTENSIVE OUTREACH ENSURED THAT DIVERSE VOICES, INCLUDING LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS, TRIBAL COMMUNITIES, NON-17 ENGLISH SPEAKING POPULATIONS, SENIORS, YOUTH, PEOPLE WITH 18 DISABILITIES, COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, AND INDIVIDUALS 19 EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS ARE INCLUDED IN OUR PLANNING 20 21 PROCESS. AND, FINALLY, WE ENGAGED IN DIGITAL PRODUCTION -- I'M SORRY -- DIGITAL PROMOTION THAT WE PAID FOR. AND SO IN SHORT, 22 THIS SUMMER WAS SOME OF THE MOST EXTENSIVE ENGAGEMENT THAT WE 23 HAVE CONDUCTED TO DATE FOR THE PLAN. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. WE 24 ENGAGED WITH OUR TECHNICAL PARTNERS AND HOSTED A WEBINAR TO 25

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INTRODUCE THE DRAFT BLUEPRINT OUTCOMES AND DRAFT 2050+ 1 NETWORK. WE ALSO CONDUCTED TWO ALL DAY TECHNICAL WORKSHOPS ON 2 3 SEPTEMBER 12TH AND 18th AT THE BAY AREA METRO CENTER, AND THESE FULL DAY IN-PERSON WORKSHOPS BROUGHT TOGETHER OVER 115 4 5 OF OUR PARTNERS AND STAKEHOLDERS, INCLUDING LOCAL JURISDICTION AND AGENCY STAFF, CTAS, ADVOCATES, AND NON-PROFITS. LOOKING 6 AHEAD, OUR STAFF PLANS TO HOST OFFICE HOURS THIS FALL TO OFFER 7 8 FURTHER OPPORTUNITY FOR ENGAGEMENT AND DISCUSSION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. OUR ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS WERE DRIVEN BY THREE GOALS. 9 FIRST, WE WANTED TO SHARE THE OUTCOMES FROM THE DRAFT 10 BLUEPRINT ANALYSIS AND THE DRAFT TRANSIT 2050+ NETWORK SO THAT 11 BAY AREA RESIDENTS COULD MAKE INFORMED CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE 12 PLANNING PROCESS. SECOND, WE SOUGHT FEEDBACK ON THE CHALLENGES 13 IDENTIFIED THROUGH THE DRAFT BLUEPRINT ANALYSIS AND GATHERED 14 15 INPUT ON THE INITIAL TRANSIT 2050+ RECOMMENDATIONS. AND, 16 LASTLY, WE WANTED BAY AREA RESIDENTS TO IDENTIFY EARLY PRIORITIES FOR IMPLEMENTATION TO INFORM THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE 17 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ IMPLEMENTATION PLAN. NEXT SLIDE, 18 PLEASE. THE FOLLOWING SLIDES INTEGRATE THE RESULTS FROM OUR 19 EXTENSIVE SUMMER ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS. AND THROUGH THAT, 20 21 PARTICIPANTS PROVIDED INPUT ON PROPOSED SOLUTIONS TO MEET THE PLAN'S CLIMATE TARGET, PROPOSE TRANSIT FREQUENCY AND SAFETY 22 IMPROVEMENTS, POTENTIAL TRANSIT FUNDING PRIORITIES, AND, 23 FINALLY, EARLY PRIORITIES FOR IMPLEMENTING THE FULL SUITE OF 24 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050+ STRATEGIES. NOW, LET'S LOOK AT THE 25

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RESULTS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. RESPONDENTS WERE ASKED TO RATE 1 THEIR LEVELS OF SUPPORT FOR EACH OPTION TO REACH OUR CLIMATE 2 3 EMISSIONS REDUCTION GOAL. AND YOU CAN SEE AT THE BOTTOM WHAT THE FIVE OPTIONS WERE THAT PARTICIPANTS CHOSE FROM. INVESTING 4 5 IN TRANSIT IMPROVEMENTS RECEIVED THE HIGHEST LEVEL OF SUPPORT, AND THERE WAS SIGNIFICANT SUPPORT FOR TRANSIT EXPANSION, AND, 6 LASTLY E INVESTMENTS IN EV INFRASTRUCTURE ALSO GARNERED 7 8 CONSIDERABLE SUPPORT. WHEN IT CAME TO PRICING STRATEGIES, OPINIONS WERE MORE DIVIDED. WHILE THERE WAS SOME SUPPORT, 9 10 OPPOSITION WAS SLIGHTLY HIGHER, WHICH SUGGESTS THAT SOME RESPONDENTS DO SEE PRICING AS A NECESSARY TOOL FOR MANAGING 11 DEMAND AND FUNDING IMPROVEMENTS, BUT, UNSURPRISINGLY, THIS 12 YIELDED THE HIGHEST OPPOSITION. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. ASKING 13 PARTICIPANTS TO CHOOSE WHICH IMPROVEMENTS THEY LIKED, RELATED 14 15 TO TRANSIT FREQUENCY, HIGHLIGHTED DISTINCT PRIORITIES AMONG 16 THE DIFFERENT GROUPS OF TRANSIT USERS. AGAIN, YOU CAN SEE THE OPTIONS THAT PARTICIPANTS WERE GIVEN ON THE X-AXIS. AMONG ALL 17 RIDERS, THE TOP PRIORITY WAS ACHIEVING 15-EMPTY FREQUENCIES, 18 AND ON THE OTHER HAND, OCCASIONAL RIDERS AND THOSE WHO NEVER 19 RIDE PRIORITIZED NEW AND/OR IMPROVED EXPRESS BUS SERVICE 20 21 BETWEEN SUBURBS, COMPARED TO FREQUENT RIDERS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. RELATED TO TRANSIT SAFETY AND SECURITY, PARTICIPANTS 22 WERE ASKED WHAT WOULD MAKE THEM FEEL SAFER WHILE TAKING 23 TRANSIT AND HAD TO SELECT NO MORE THAN THREE OUT OF THE SIX 24 OPTIONS. IMPROVING CLEANLINESS BOTH ON BOARD AND AT TRANSIT 25

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STATIONS AND STOPS, WAS THE TOP PRIORITY FOR ALL TYPES OF 1 2 RIDERS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. AND, REALLY, WITH REGARD TO 3 TRANSIT INVESTMENTS, PARTICIPANTS WERE ASKED TO CHOOSE FROM TWO OPTIONS, EXPANDING REGIONAL TRANSIT NETWORKS OR UPGRADING 4 5 EXISTING TRANSIT SERVICE. THERE WAS A CLEAR PREFERENCE AMONG ALL TRANSIT RIDERS FOR INVESTMENTS THAT EXPAND, RATHER THAN 6 MERELY OPTIMIZING THE EXISTING TRANSIT NETWORK. HOWEVER IT'S 7 8 IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT PARTICIPANTS OFTEN DEFINED EXPANSION AS ENHANCING SERVICE WITHIN THEIR OWN COMMUNITIES RATHER THAN 9 10 FUNDING LARGE-SCALE TRANSIT MEGA PROJECTS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. WITH REGARD TO NEAR-TERM IMPLEMENTATION, WE ASKED PARTICIPANTS 11 TO SELECT THEIR TOP THREE BIG-PICTURE PRIORITIES FROM 11 12 OPTIONS. AND WHEN WE ZOOM OUT TO THE BROADER PLANNED BAY AREA 13 2050+, THE TOP PRIORITY FOR IMPLEMENTATION IN THE NEXT FOUR 14 YEARS CONTINUES TO BE HOUSING PRODUCTION AT ALL INCOME LEVELS. 15 16 THIS REFLECTS A STRONG DEMAND FOR ADDRESSING HOUSING AFFORDABILITY AND AVAILABILITY ACROSS THE REGION. CLOSELY 17 FOLLOWING HOUSING, PARTICIPANTS PRIORITIZED TRANSIT EXPANSION, 18 WHICH ALIGNS WITH OUR EARLIER FINDING. AND, FINALLY, ROAD 19 SAFETY FOR ALL MODES EMERGED AS THE THIRD PRIORITY. NEXT 20 21 SLIDE, PLEASE. PARTICIPANTS WERE ABLE TO OFFER COMMENTS BOTH AT THE POP-UPS AND THROUGH THE SURVEY, AND THE OVERARCHING 22 THEMES THAT EMERGED WERE TRANSIT. RESPONDENTS DON'T WANT 23 TRAVEL TIME TO TAKE TWICE AS LONG AS THAT OF DRIVING. HOUSING 24 AND LAND USE, BUILD MORE HOUSING AND IMPROVE TRANSIT TO REDUCE 25

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LONG COMMUTES AND POLLUTION. BIKE/PEDESTRIAN INFRASTRUCTURE, 1 2 INVEST IN COMPLETE STREETS, AND SAFER BIKE ROUTES FOR ALL 3 AGES, ROADS AND PRICING FIX IT FIRST, AND LASTLY, EQUITY, STOP SUPPORTING PROJECTS THAT ONLY BENEFIT THE RICH. HELP THE POOR 4 5 AND MIDDLE CLASS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. GOING BACK TO OUR CBO ENGAGEMENT FINDINGS. THE KEY ISSUES THAT EMERGED WERE CLIMATE 6 EMISSIONS. RESPONDENTS WANTED TO PRIORITIZE MAINTAINING 7 8 HIGHWAYS, INVEST IN TRANSIT AND EVS, AND ENSURE THAT ENVIRONMENTAL GOALS DON'T HARM MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES. 9 SECOND, TRANSIT IMPROVEMENTS, IMPROVE TRANSIT FREQUENCY AND 10 RELIABLE, EXPAND TO UNDERSERVED AREAS, AND ENHANCE SAFETY WITH 11 BETTER CLEANLINESS, LIGHTING, AND SECURITY. YOUTH, YOUTH SAID 12 THAT THEY NEED CLEARER AND SAFER TRANSIT OPTIONS. AND, LASTLY 13 E IMPLEMENTATION. INTEGRATE SUSTAINABLE TRANSIT AFFORDABLE 14 HOUSING AND JOB CREATION. PRIORITIZE UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES 15 16 AND ENSURE RURAL HIGH SPEED INTERNET ACCESS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. NEXT STEPS INCLUDE MTC ABAG PLANNING STAFF WILL 17 CONSIDER ALL FEEDBACK THAT WE RECEIVED TO INFORM REFINEMENTS 18 TO THE FINAL BLUEPRINT. AND MTC PLANNING COMMITTEE AND ABAG 19 ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEES ARE ANTICIPATED TO CONSIDER APPROVAL 20 21 OF FINAL BLUEPRINT STRATEGIES IN JANUARY 2025. A THIRD ROUND OF ENGAGEMENT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN WITH PARTNERS AND 22 STAKEHOLDERS IS IMPLEMENTED IN EARLY 2025, AND, LASTLY, FINAL 23 ROUND OF ENGAGEMENT ON THE DRAFT PLAN, DRAFT EIR AND DRAFT 24 SUPPLEMENTAL REPORTS ARE ANTICIPATED IN THE SUMMER OF 2025. IN 25

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CONCLUSION, OUR COMPREHENSIVE ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS HAVE PROVIDED 1 INVALUABLE INSIGHTS THAT WILL SHAPE THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2 3 2050+. AS WE MOVE FORWARD, THESE INSIGHTS WILL HELP US AS WE WORK TOWARDS A MORE AFFORDABLE, CONNECTED, DIVERSE, HEALTHY, 4 5 AND VIBRANT BAY AREA. STAFF WILL PROVIDE MORE SPECIFIC INFORMATION AS TO HOW THESE FINDINGS HAVE INFORMED FINAL 6 REVISIONS TO THE BLUEPRINT STRATEGIES AT THEIR JANUARY 7 8 PRESENTATION ON THE FINAL BLUEPRINT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR ATTENTION. I'M HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY OUESTIONS YOU MAY 9 10 HAVE.

THANK YOU, DAVID. 10 11 SEE. THAT'S WHY HE'S THE NEW PLANNING DIRECTOR. I MEAN A LARGE NUMBER OF PEOPLE COMING FROM SAN JOAOUIN. IS THAT CORRECT? IF 12 WE COULD DO OUTREACH IN THAT CORRIDOR I THINK IT WOULD SERVE 13 14 US WELL SO WE GET BETTER INFORMATION. VERY GOOD WORK, VERONICA. VERY EXTENSIVE. THANK YOU. 15 16 VERONICA CUMMINGS: THANK YOU. 17 18 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: THIS WAS AN INFORMATION ITEM. OH, I 19 LOOKED AND DIDN'T SEE ANY LIGHTS ON. WAN WANDA, GO FIRST. 20 21 WANDA WILLIAMS: THANK YOU, CHAIR. WHEN YOU WERE DOING THIS 22 WORK AND DOING THE POP-UPS, AND THINGS IN SOLANO COUNTY, I 23 WANTED TO ASK WERE THERE OPPORTUNITIES TO HAVE THOSE POP-UPS 24 AT LEAST ONE IN THE CITY OF VALLEJO? 25

> 1 VERONICA CUMMINGS: THE CITY OF VALLEJO WAS INCLUDED AS 2 3 RESEARCH WAS DONE ON THE POTENTIAL POP-UP LOCATION, ULTIMATELY, THE POP-UP DID NOT OCCUR IN VALLEJO. AND THIS --4 5 IT WAS NOT. 6 7 WANDA WILLIAMS: OKAY. THAT'S ONE OF OUR CITIES THAT HAS HIGH 8 POPULATION OF LOW-INCOME, OF NEED. 9 WANDA WILLIAMS: IN THE FUTURE F WEEKEND MAKE SURE THAT WE HAVE 10 ONE IN THOSE LOCATION, AS WELL, IT IS REALLY BENEFICIAL AND 11 HELPFUL IN OUR WORK. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. 12 13 DAVE VAUTIN: IF I MAY, THROUGH THE CHAIR. SO, MTC AND ABAG 14 15 HOSTED A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT POP-UPS, WE ALSO PARTNERED WITH 16 COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS. I WANT TO MENTION THAT WE REFER TO PAGE SEVEN OF THE PACKET, WE PARTNERED WITH COMMUNITY-BASED 17 ORGANIZATION WHICH HELD ONE AT THE VALLEJO FARMERS MARKET ON 18 AUGUST 24TH. SO, WE REALLY TRIED TO KIND OF HOLD EVENTS 19 OURSELVES, BUT ALSO PARTNER WITH CBOS TO FILL IN THE GAPS 20 21 THROUGHOUT THE REGION. SO JUST WANTED TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT. 22 23 WANDA WILLIAMS: THANK YOU FOR THAT ACKNOWLEDGMENT. I APPRECIATE IT. THANK YOU.

CARLOS ROMERO: OKAY. YOU HAD YOUR LIGHT ON. BUT I'LL MAKE IT 1 REALLY QUICKLY. I WANTED TO THANK STAFF ON THE EXECUTIVE SIDE 2 3 FOR REALLY ENGAGING THE CBOS AS THOUGHTFULLY AS DID YOU. I KNOW WHEN I ASKED, AND YOU PROVIDED US ALL WITH THE NUMBER OF 4 5 CBOS AROUND THE BAY AREA THAT PARTICIPATED IN THIS PROCESS, I THINK THAT IS KIND OF THE NEXT LEVEL OF ENGAGEMENT REALLY 6 NEEDED TO CONTINUE FORWARD WITH. IT'S REALLY HARD TO GET SOME 7 8 OF THESE EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES AND THE CBOS KNOW HOW TO DO THAT SO WHATEVER WE CAN DO IN THE FUTURE TO IMPROVE -- NOT 9 ACTUALLY IMPROVE -- BUT ENHANCE ON WHAT YOU GUYS HAVE ALREADY 10 DONE, THAT WOULD BE GREAT. AND I WANT TO SAY THE LIST OF ITEMS 11 THAT THOSE CBOS AND THOSE THAT CAME OUT OF THE EOUITY PRIORITY 12 COMMUNITIES IS VERY INTERESTING AND I HOPE THAT IT WILL HELP 13 US INFORM THIS PLAN GOING FORWARD. BECAUSE ACTUALLY SOME OF 14 15 THESE THINGS AREN'T REFLECTED NECESSARILY IN SOME OF THE 16 TRANSIT DISCUSSION. VERY MUCH APPRECIATED THIS INFORMATION. I'M GOING TO KEEP THIS ONE SHEET BECAUSE IT DOES SHOW STRONG 17 SUPPORT FOR CERTAIN THINGS THAT PERHAPS WE MIGHT WANT TO THINK 18 ABOUT HOW WE INTEGRATE INTO THE NEXT PLAN. THANK YOU ALL VERY 19 MUCH FOR TREMENDOUS WORK. THANKS TO YOU, ANDY, FOR YOUR STAFF 20 21 WORKING ON THIS AND GLAD TO HAVE YOU HERE AND LOOK FORWARD TO GREATER ENGAGEMENT. THANK YOU. 22

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PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, CHAIR SPERING. I WANT TO 1 2 FOLLOW UP ON COMMISSIONER MOULTON PETER'S QUESTIONS ABOUT THE 3 DEMOGRAPHICS. MARIN IS AN AGING -- OR IS AN AGE -- WE HAVE A LOT OF SENIORS, BASICALLY, AND, SO, SENIORS MAY NOT 4 5 NECESSARILY GO TO POP-UPS. OR THERE IS NOT TOO MANY CBOS THAT I KNOW THAT REALLY FOCUS ON REACHING OUT TO SENIORS. SO, I 6 WOULD REALLY LIKE TO HAVE A LITTLE BIT MORE INFORMATION. WHAT 7 8 DID YOU DO IN MARIN? 9 VERONICA CUMMINGS: FIRST, I WOULD LIKE TO CLARIFY THAT THE --10 IN MARIN COUNTY, THE EVENT THAT WAS DONE WAS THE EMBER STOMP 11 EVENT. AND AT THE TOP OF MY HEAD, I CAN'T RECALL THE SECOND --12 13 STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: DOWNTOWN SAN RAFAEL FARMERS MARKET. 14 15 16 SPEAKER: VERONICA CUMMINGS: THANK YOU. 17 PAT ECKLUND: SENIORS DON'T REALLY GO TO. WAS THERE ANY OTHER 18 OUTREACH BY MAIL OR OTHER -- LIKE, SENIOR ORGANIZATIONS? 19 20 DAVE VAUTIN: HAPPY TO TAKE THAT QUESTION. MAYBE I SHOULD 21 ACKNOWLEDGE, I PERSONALLY WAS ASKED AT MAT RIDDEN POP-UP, 22 EMBER STOMP FESTIVAL, WE DEFINITELY HEARD FROM A LOT OF OLDER 23 ADULTS AT THAT EVENT TALKED TO A LOT OF RETIREES ABOUT HOW 24 TRANSPORTATION NEEDS ARE SOMETIMES DIFFERENT WHEN YOU'RE NO 25

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LONGER COMMUTING. SO WE ACTUALLY HAD ROBUST ENGAGEMENT AT THAT 1 EVENT. THE DOTS FILLED THE BOARD. IT WAS VERY SUCCESSFUL. AND 2 3 AS VERONICA CUMMINGS MENTIONED WE ALSO HAD THE EVENT AT THE FARMERS MARKET. WE PAIRED THAT -- OUR ENGAGEMENT IS PAIRED 4 5 WITH ONLINE SURVEYS, DIGITAL, YOU KNOW, PROMOTIONS, WHERE WE CAPTURE PEOPLE WHO AREN'T MAYBE SEIZE THOSE ADVERTISEMENTS ON 6 SOCIAL MEDIA, WE POLLED THEM TO FILL OUT THOSE SURVEYS. TAKEN 7 8 A COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH TRYING TO GET FEEDBACK AS YOU MENTIONED FROM THOUSANDS OF RESPONDENTS IN THIS ROUND OF 9 OUTREACH. THERE IS MORE ENGAGEMENT ROUNDS NEXT YEAR WE WELCOME 10 FEEDBACK FOR OUR 2025 ENGAGEMENT AS WELL. I HEARD FROM A 11 NUMBER OF FOLKS IN MARIN ABOUT THE UNIQUE NEED. 12 13 PAT ECKLUND: OKAY. I'LL GIVE YOU SOME NAMES OF SENIOR 14 ORGANIZATIONS THAT YOU MIGHT WANT TO REACH OUT TO BECAUSE 15 16 THEIR NEEDS ARE DEFINITELY DIFFERENT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I'M GLAD YOU GOT SOME SENIORS ENGAGED. THANK YOU. 17 18 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: OKAY. COMING AROUND. SEEING NO LIGHTS 19 OVER. THERE IS THERE PUBLIC COMMENTS OR ANY WRITTEN? 20 21 22 CLERK OF THE BOARD: YES. HOW MUCH TIME WOULD YOU LIKE TO GIVE? 23 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: HOW MANY DO YOU HAVE? 24 25

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CLERK OF THE BOARD: ONE ONLINE, AND ONE IN THE BOARDROOM. 1 2 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: TWO MINUTES. 3 4 5 CLERK OF THE BOARD: OKAY. 6 7 SPEAKER: HELLO MEMBERS OF THE PLANNING COMMITTEE, THIS IS 8 WARREN CUSHMAN COMMUNITY RESOURCES FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING IN HAYWARD. I WANT TO TALK ABOUT SETTING EXPECTATIONS OF THINGS. 9 I'M SURE MTC IS FULLY ADJUSTED TO THE REALITY OF THE PANDEMIC 10 FOUR YEARS AGO. THE PANDEMIC WAS SUCH A POWERFUL MESSAGE TO 11 ALL OF US IN THE BAY AREA, AND WE ALWAYS HAVE TO KEEP IN MIND 12 THAT THINGS ARE DIFFERENT NOW THAN THEY WERE FOUR YEARS AGO. 13 ALSO AS OF TUESDAY WE'RE GOING TO HAVE ANOTHER ADJUSTMENT IN 14 THIS REGION AND WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO DO IT FAST. IT'S 15 16 IMPORTANT AS WE MOVE FORWARD TO 2025 AND WE THINK ABOUT PLANNED BAY AREA, TO HAVE THOSE EXPECTATIONS GROUNDED IN WHAT 17 IS ACTUALLY HAPPENING. NOT ONLY IN 2050, BUT RIGHT NOW. AND I 18 JUST HOPE THAT STAFF, AND EVEN THE COMMISSION THINK ABOUT HOW 19 FOLKS ARE GOING TO HAVE TO PIVOT TO NEW WAYS OF THINKING. 20 21 THANK YOU.

I'LL MOVE ON TO ITEM 8E, THIS IS THE MTC ABAG ADVISORY COUNCIL
8 STRATEGY. AND KY-NAM MILLER, IS HE GOING TO PRESENT THIS?

10 SPEAKER: KY-NAM.

ANDREW FREMIER: CHAIR SPERING, I'M STEPPING IN FOR MY RIGHT 12 HAND TODAY WHO IS UNFORTUNATELY WITH HER FATHER WHO IS HAVING 13 SOME SIGNIFICANT HEALTH ISSUES. I'M GOING TO STAND IN FOR 14 15 ALIX. AS OPENING OVER THE PAST DECADE MTC AND ABAG HAVE 16 SUCCESSFULLY CONSOLIDATED STAFF AND CERTAIN COMMITTEES FOSTERING A COHESIVE EFFICIENT APPROACH TO THE REGIONAL 17 PLANNING GOVERNANCE. THE COLLABORATION HAS STRENGTHENED OUR 18 ABILITY TO ADDRESS THE COMPLEX CHALLENGES OF THE BAY AREA AND 19 TODAY WE'RE EXCITE TO RECOMMEND THE NEXT STEP IN THE JOURNEY 20 21 THROUGH THE INTEGRATION OF ABAG REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE AND MTC'S POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL. INTEGRATION AIMS TO ENHANCE 22 OUR COMMITMENT TO PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND EQUITY ENSURING 23 THAT WE CONTINUE TO PROVIDE MEANINGFUL ENGAGEMENT POINTS THAT 24 POLICY DECISIONS REALLY REFLECT INPUT FROM DIVERSE VOICES AND 25



PERSPECTIVES OF BAY AREA RESIDENTS. WITH THAT I WOULD LIKE TO
 HAND IT OVER TO MY COLLEAGUE KY-NAM MILLER TO WALL THROUGH THE
 KEY CONSIDERATIONS AND IMPORTANT INITIATIVES.

5 KY-NAM MILLER: THANK YOU ANDY. GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS KY-NAM 6 MILLER, ASSISTANT DIRECTOR FOR ACCESSIBILITY CULTURE AND 7 RACIAL EOUITY AT THE ACRE OFFICE AT ABAG AND MTC ALSO STAFF 8 LIAISON FOR MTC POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL AND HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF PREVIOUSLY SERVING ON THE COUNCIL WHICH GIVES ME UNIQUE 9 PERSPECTIVE ON THE VALUE AND IMPACT OF OUR ADVISORY BODIES. 10 TODAY'S INFORMATIONAL ITEM IS A PROPOSED INTEGRATION OF THE 11 MTC POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL AND ABAG REGIONAL PLANNING 12 COMMITTEE. TOWARDS GREATER COORDINATION SHARED DECISION-MAKING 13 STRUCTURES LIKE STAFF CONSOLIDATION AND INTEGRATION 14 PROGRESSION OF EFFORTS STRIDES IN INTEGRATING COMMITTEES 15 16 FOSTERING GREATER COORDINATION AND COMMUNICATION. THIS HISTORICAL CONTEXT HIGHLIGHTS OUR ONGOING COMMITMENT WITH 17 COHESIVE APPROACH IN REGIONAL POLICY AND DECISION-MAKING 18 19 SETTING STRONG FOUNDATION FOR THE PROPOSED ADVISORY COUNCIL, INTEGRATION. BOTH ABAG REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE AND MTC 20 21 POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL BRING STRENGTHS TO REGIONAL PLANNING 22 POLICY EFFORTS ARE. MTC COUNCIL 27 MEMBER BODY FOCUSES ON 23 TRANSPORTATION RELATED ISSUES DRAWING ON EXPERTISE OF ITS MEMBERS FROM VARIOUS SECTORS MEANWHILE ABAG RPC INCLUDES 24 ELECTED NON-ELECTED MEMBERS PROVIDING DIRECTION ON BROADER 25

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PLANNING TOPICS CREATING COMPREHENSIVE INCLUSIVE FRAMEWORK. 1 THIS INTEGRATION WILL STRENGTHEN POLICY COORDINATION BETWEEN 2 3 MTC ABAG ALLOWING MEMBERS TO ADDRESS COMPREHENSIVE ISSUES INCLUDING TRANSPORTATION HOUSING AND ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNING. 4 5 BY CREATING A SINGLE INCLUSIVE ADVISORY COUNCIL WE CAN IMPROVE PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT MAKING IT EASIER FOR RESIDENTS TO UNDERSTAND 6 7 AND PARTICIPATE IN REGIONAL PLANNING PROCESSES. MAKING A 8 HOLISTIC APPROACH TO ADDRESSING INTERCONNECTED REGIONAL 9 CHALLENGES AND ENHANCING ABILITY TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT POLICIES THAT ARE EOUITABLE, INCLUSIVE AND RESPONSIVE TO NEEDS 10 11 OF ALL BAY AREA RESIDENTS ENSURING BROAD AND DIVERSE REPRESENTATION FROM ACROSS THE REGION WILL BE CRUCIAL STAFF 12 WILL WORK DILIGENTLY TO MAINTAIN GEOGRAPHICAL DIVERSITY 13 INCLUDING AT-LARGE APPOINTMENTS FROM VARIOUS SECTORS. THE 14 REFASHIONED ADVISORY BODY IS PROPOSED TO MAINTAIN GEOGRAPHIC 15 16 UNIVERSITY COUNTY APPOINTED REPRESENT TIFS INCLUDING AT-LARGE APPOINTMENTS FROM BUSINESS LABOR ENVIRONMENTAL GROUPS THE BODY 17 18 IS SIMILAR AS THE CURRENT POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL AT 27 19 MEMBERS STRUCTURE AIMS TO BALANCE DIVERSE REPRESENTATION. IT WOULD NOT INCLUDES ELECTED OFFICIALS MAXIMIZING COMMUNITY 20 VIEWPOINTS AND THOSE VIEWPOINTS ARE LIFTED UP AS ABAG AND MTC 21 22 POLICY MAKERS AS CONSIDERATION OF POLICIES AND INVESTMENT 23 DECISIONS IN CONCLUSION STAFF IS SEEKING INPUT ALONG WITH INTERESTED PARTIES TO THE PROPOSAL IN COORDINATION WITH THE 24 ABAG MTC LEADERSHIP AHEAD OF FORMAL ADOPTION IN 2025 TIME FOR 25



THE NEXT TERM'S RECRUITMENT PERIOD. THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME
 AND CONSIDERATION. I LOOK FORWARD TO YOUR QUESTIONS WORKING
 WITH YOU ALL TO MAKE THIS INTEGRATION A SUCCESS.

5 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: PAT?

6

7 WENDY WATANABE: WHY ARE YOU NOT INCLUDING ELECTED OFFICIALS TO
8 SERVE ON THAT COMMITTEE? BECAUSE I THINK THERE IS A GOOD
9 DISCUSSION THAT YOU HAVE WITH ELECTED AS WELL AS NON-ELECTED'S
10 AND THAT'S ONE OF THE REASONS WHY WE HAVE THE REGIONAL
11 PLANNING COMMITTEE FOR ABAG. SO I'M CURE WHY.

12

KY-NAM MILLER: THERE IS DEFINITELY PROS AND CONS OF INCLUDING 13 ELECTED'S, AND WE CONSIDERED THE TRAIT OFFS AND THIS IS THE 14 15 PROPOSAL. I THINK THE FIRST BASIC TRADEOFF, YOU ARE AWARE THAT 16 WHEN AN ELECTED PERSON ENTERS THE SPACE THEY HAVE A CERTAIN GRAVITAS AND IT IMPACTS THE CONVERSATION AND CONTRAST OF TWO 17 BODIES ON THE COUNCIL ALLOWING FOR FREER KIND OF ORGANIC 18 DISCUSSIONS THAT EMERGE IN POLICY CONVERSATIONS. I WOULD TO 19 BRING MY COLLEAGUE REBECCA LONG LEGISLATURE WHO HAS SHAPED 20 21 THIS RECOMMENDATION AS WELL.

23 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU KY-NAM. CONSIDERATIONS ARE THAT WE
24 HAVE A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT POLICY COMMITTEE THAT IS THE BOARD
25 MEMBERS SIT ON AND THEY RECEIVE PRESENTATIONS FROM THE STAFF

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THAT ARE ALSO PRESENTATIONS THAT GO TO THE POLICY ADVISORY 1 COUNCIL SO THERE'S A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT OF REPETITION THAT 2 3 WOULD BE OCCURRING FOR THE ELECTED OFFICIALS THEMSELVES BY SERVING ON THE RPC, OR THE RECONSTITUTED MERGED ADVISORY BODY. 4 5 BUT I THINK KY-NAM'S KEY POINT THEREABOUT THE PURPOSE REALLY OF THESE ADVISORY BODIES -- THESE ADVISORY BODIES IN OUR MIND 6 IS TO BRING NEW VOICES OF THE BAY AREA BOTH JUST GENERAL 7 8 RESIDENTS AS WELL AS WHAT WE THINK ARE SOME OF THE FEATURES OF THE RPC THAT WE WOULD LIKE TO BRING INTO THIS NEW BODY ARE 9 PEOPLE WHO ARE ACTUALLY ON STAFF TO ORGANIZATIONS THAT HAVE A 10 REGIONAL VIEW. FOR EXAMPLE, EFFECTIVE TO HAVE LEAGUE OF WOMEN 11 VOTERS, BAY AREA COUNCIL, OTHER ORGANIZATIONS, GREENBELT SO WE 12 WOULD LIKE FOR SOME PORTION OF THE NEWLY CONSTITUTED BODY TO 13 HAVE THOSE BE FROM ORGANIZATIONS LIKE THAT THAT ARE ENGAGED IN 14 OUR WORK. WE HEARD FROM OUR POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL THEY 15 16 REALLY APPRECIATE COMMISSIONERS THAT COME AND SPEAK WITH THEM THEY APPRECIATE HAVING THE DIALOGUE AND OPPORTUNITY TO ENGAGE 17 WITH MTC LEADERSHIP, AND ON THE FLIP SIDE WE HAVE HAD A NUMBER 18 OF CONVERSATIONS WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE RPC WHO HAVE SAID 19 THEY VALUE THE HAVING THE OPPORTUNITY TO MEET INFORMALLY WITH 20 21 ELECTED OFFICIALS. SO IF THIS PROPOSAL DOES MOVE FORWARD WE 22 THINK IT WOULD BE GREAT SOMETIMES TO HAVE ABAG AND MTC COMMISSIONERS WHO WANT TO COME AND BE PART OF THAT 23 CONVERSATION BUT IN TERMS OF OFFICIAL MEMBERSHIP WE DO THINK 24 IT WOULD BE MORE SUCCESSFUL IN THIS NEW FORMAT. 25

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2 PAT ECKLUND: MY OTHER QUESTION IS HOW WOULD MEMBERS BE 3 SELECTED? WOULD ABAG SELECT HALF AND MTC SELECT HALF? 4 5 **KY-NAM MILLER:** TO BE DETERMINED. IT DEPENDS ON FEEDBACK THAT WE GET FROM YOU ALL AND VARIOUS CONSTITUENCIES. THE COUNCIL 6 PRACTICE IS TO HAVE THE COUNTY BASED COMMISSIONERS MAKE 7 8 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THOSE, 2/3 OF THE REPRESENTATIVES ON THAT BODY ARE FROM COUNTIES AND THEN THE OTHER 1/3, THE CHAIR NAMED 9 AT-LARGES. SO I THINK THAT'S ONE POINT BUT I THINK AS THE TWO 10 BODIES REPRESENT MTC AND ABAG THERE WOULD NEEDS TO BE 11 DISCUSSION ABOUT HOW THAT'S DOLED OUT. 12 13 PAT ECKLUND: I'M GOING TO TELL YOU HOW I FEEL. I FEEL AS 14 15 THOUGH ABAG IS A STEP CHILD NOW. EVEN, LIKE, ON THE EARLIER ITEM, ABOUT THE PRIORITY CONVERSATION AREAS, I DIDN'T 16 UNDERSTAND WHY ABAG DIDN'T VOTE ON THAT. ONLY THE MTC 17 COMMISSIONERS. SO, I FEEL THAT ABAG IS BEING PUSHED OUT. SO, I 18 DON'T THINK THE COMMISSIONERS SHOULD BE DOING ALL THE 19 APPOINTMENTS. I THINK IT NEEDS TO BE SHARED BETWEEN THE ABAG 20 21 EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS, AS WELL AS THE MTC. SO, I REALLY 22 THINK THAT THE CONCEPT OF ABAG HAS BEEN LOST. 23

24 **REBECCA LONG:** THROUGH THE CHAIR?



1 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: YEAH. GO AHEAD.

2

3 REBECCA LONG: I JUST WANT TO REALLY ACKNOWLEDGE THOSE COMMENTS, DIRECTOR ECKLUND. AS KY-NAM MENTIONED, WE DON'T HAVE 4 5 A PROPOSAL TODAY FOR WHAT THAT EXACT APPROVAL PROCESS SHOULD BE, BUT WE TOTALLY AGREE IF IT'S GOING TO BE A MERGED BODY 6 THAT ABAG SHOULD BE HAVING A SAY ON ALL OF THE APPOINTMENTS. I 7 8 THINK ONE OF THE CHALLENGES WITH USING THE GEOGRAPHIC MODEL THAT WE HAVE BEEN USING FOR APPOINTMENTS IS THAT ABAG IS SUCH 9 10 A LARGER BODY AND IT'S DIFFICULT TO HAVE APPROVAL FROM, LET'S SAY, EVERY REPRESENTATIVE OF CONTRA COSTA COUNTY ON ABAG. SO 11 ONE IDEA WOULD BE TO CONSIDER HAVING ABAG LEADERSHIP REVIEW 12 AND VET ALL OF THE APPOINTMENTS, AS OPPOSED TO INDIVIDUAL ABAG 13 DIRECTORS. BUT WE AGREE WITH YOU. WE ARE NOT, BY ANY STRETCH, 14 15 TRYING TO MARGINALIZE ABAG IN THIS PROPOSAL.

16

17 PAT ECKLUND: I THINK THAT AS STAFF DEVELOP SOME OF THESE 18 RECOMMENDATIONS, IT WOULD BE HELPFUL TO TALK TO PEOPLE WHO ARE 19 SERVING ON THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD. I DO NOT FEEL THAT WE'RE 20 GETTING QUITE THE IMPACT, OR THE ABILITY TO PROVIDE FEEDBACK 21 ON SOME OF THE PROPOSALS.

23 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: CARLOS?

25 CARLOS ROMERO: YEAH --

BELIA RAMOS: I WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE THOSE COMMENTS, DIRECTOR 6 ECKLUND. I HAVE BEEN SPEAKING WITH STAFF ABOUT THIS. I WILL 7 8 SAY THAT ON BEHALF OF ABAG, I AM HAVING COGNIZANT OF THE FACT THAT OUR REPRESENTATION, ALTHOUGH GEOGRAPHICALLY, IT IS 9 10 EXACTLY THE SAME AS MTC MEMBERSHIP, IT IS DIFFERENT. AND SO ACKNOWLEDGING THAT RPC HASN'T WORKED AS EFFECTIVELY FOR ABAG 11 AS WE REALLY CAN IN THE FUTURE. LOOKING AT THE INTEGRATION 12 HERE, CERTAINLY FROM -- THROUGH THE ABAG LENS, WE NEED TO 13 ACKNOWLEDGE WHERE WE'RE AT WITH MTC AS A PARTNER AT THIS 14 15 POINT, HAVING GONE THROUGH THE CONSOLIDATION, THESE 16 COMMITTEES, SOME EXISTED BEFOREHAND, AND THEN WE HAVE JUST BEEN ADDING COMMITTEE -- I DON'T KNOW ABOUT YOU GUYS, BUT I 17 FEEL LIKE I'M HERE OUITE A LOT, AND I RESIDE IN NAPA COUNTY. 18 AND I THINK THAT'S AN IMPORTANT ACKNOWLEDGMENT AS WE LOOK AT 19 THE WORK AND HOW WE WRAP OUR ARMS AROUND THE ENTIRETY OF THE 20 WORK AND OUR WORK PORTFOLIO, THAT IT BE EFFECTIVE. WHILE WE 21 ARE GOING TO WORK THROUGH, YOU KNOW, PLANNING MONEYS, I HEAR 22 THE PCA PART. RIGHT? WE HAVE HAD THOSE PRESENTATIONS. IT'S 23 COME BEFORE US, BUT THE PLANNING DOLLARS ARE RUNNING THROUGH 24 25 MTC. AND, SO, WE ARE IN A -- IN A PLACE WHERE POLICY-WISE, WE

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HAVE A SAY. AND PERHAPS MONEY WISE, WE DON'T, WHICH IS EXACTLY 1 WHY THE TIME IS NOW TO HAVE THESE DISCUSSIONS OF HOW WE MERGE 2 3 THOSE TWO SO THAT WE'RE NOT FEELING ON THE OUTS OF THE COMMITTEE WORK THAT WE DO. AND, SO, THAT -- THAT REALLY IS, NO 4 5 DECISIONS HAVE BEEN MADE. THIS IS AN INFORMATIVE WAY TO TELL ALL OF US, ABAG AND MTC, WE'RE GOING TO BE LOOKING AT A MORE 6 INTEGRATED PATH OF POLICY THAT CAN BE MORE EFFECTIVE FOR 7 8 EVERYONE. AND, SO, I THINK THOSE TYPES -- THAT TYPE OF FEEDBACK IS INSTRUCTIVE. AND, ALSO, ILLUSTRATIVE OF THE 9 10 AWKWARDNESS THAT IS TRYING TO BE ADDRESSED THROUGH THIS VERY NEXT STEP. 11

MEETING FOR A LONG TIME. AND -- BUT I WANT TO REEMPHASIZE,
AGAIN, I THINK THAT SOME OF THE VALUE OF ABAG HAS BEEN LOST.
BUT -- SO I JUST -- IF SOMEONE WANTS TO TALK OFFLINE, THIS'S
GREAT.

20 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: CARLOS?

CARLOS ROMERO: SO, AT THE PRESENT VICE CHAIR OF THE RPC,
POSSIBLY TALKING MY WAY OUT OF A JOB [LAUGHTER] WHICH MIGHT BE
FINE -- AND SOMEONE WHO ACTUALLY SERVED ON THE MINORITY
ADVISORY COMMITTEE SOME 15 -- MAYBE 17 YEARS AGO, FOR THREE

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YEARS -- I HAVE KIND OF MIXED EMOTIONS, A NUMBER OF CONCERNS 1 2 ABOUT WHAT IS PRESENTLY AN EMBRYONIC PROPOSAL. I MEAN, LET'S 3 BE CLEAR, THIS IS NOT FULLY BAKED. RIGHT? STAFF IS THINKING ABOUT THE INTEGRATION OF THE MEMBERS FROM ONE GROUP TO THE 4 5 OTHER. I WOULD CONCUR WITH MISS ECKLUND THAT THERE WERE INDEED SOME VERY ROBUST AND INSTRUCTIVE DISCUSSIONS THAT OCCURRED AT 6 THE RPC. I ALSO THINK THOSE SAME DISCUSSIONS WHEN I WAS ON THE 7 8 POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL, WHICH WAS CALLED THE MINORITY POLICY ADVISORY COMMITTEE, WERE JUST AS ENGAGING AND ROBUST AND 9 PROVIDED THE MTC ON THE TRANSPORTATION SIDE A LOT OF 10 INFORMATION THAT I THINK EVENTUALLY WAS TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT. 11 THE INTEGRATION OF THOSE TWO BODIES -- AND I WANT TO MAKE SURE 12 THAT THE BAY AREA COUNCIL IS THERE. I DON'T ALWAYS GET ALONG 13 WITH THEM OR AGREE WITH THEM BUT HAVING THEM IN THE ROOM AND 14 15 CREATING THAT ROBUST DISCUSSION WHICH SOMETIMES GETS HEATED, 16 IS IMPORTANT. HAVING LABOR THERE IS VERY IMPORTANT. HAVING THE ENVIRONMENTAL GROUPS AND THOSE KIND OF FOLKS WHO REPRESENT 17 SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, RIGHT? FIGURING OUT WHAT 18 THAT MIX IS -- AND HAVE SAID THIS TO STAFF, PERHAPS YOU GO TO 19 AN UNRULY 31 MEMBERS FROM 27. I DON'T KNOW HOW YOU GET THERE -20 21 - BUT I CERTAINLY WILL BE LOOKING AT THAT INTEGRATION BECAUSE I ASSUME YOU'RE GOING TO COME BACK TO US. WE'RE GOING TO 22 INTEGRATE THIS GROUP. I HAVE SOME CONCERNS ABOUT HOW THE RHNA 23 PROCESS WAS GOING, BECAUSE OBVIOUSLY WE'RE USING THE RPC AS A 24 SOUNDING BOARD MAKING SURE WE UNDERSTAND HOW THAT'S GOING TO 25

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WORK PRIOR TO MOVING IN AND MOVING ON WITH THIS PROPOSAL. 1 STAFF SAID THEY THOUGHT IT WAS POSSIBLE TO ACCOMMODATE BUT 2 3 LET'S JUST MAKE SURE WE DON'T SOMEHOW BREAK THAT LINK. AND MISS ECKLUND, PAT, I THINK YOU'RE RIGHT ABOUT THE APPOINTMENTS 4 5 PIECE, I HADN'T THOUGHT OF THAT. AND I DO THINK ABAG PLAY SOME ROLE. I THINK THAT'S VITALLY IMPORTANT. SO I WOULD SAY STAFF 6 CONTINUE TO DEVELOP THIS PROPOSAL AND BRING IT BACK TO US. WE 7 8 HAVE BEEN WORKING TOWARDS INTEGRATION AS ABAG AND MTC FOR SOME SEVEN YEARS AND THERE WAS A LOT OF BAD BLOOD WHEN THIS 9 10 INITIALLY HAPPENED AND TO DATE, WE HAVE MADE INCREDIBLE STRIDE IN BRINGING THE TWO ORGANIZATIONS TOGETHER IN A WAY WHERE WE 11 TRUST EACH OTHER. AND BECAUSE OF THAT TRUST, I THINK I CAN SAY 12 AT THIS POINT, WE'RE GOING TO GET TO A POINT WHERE THIS 13 14 INTEGRATION COULD WORK. THANK YOU.

16 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: OKAY. YOU KNOW, I -- I CERTAINLY DISAGREE WITH YOU ON THE STEP CHILD. YOU KNOW, WHEN I LOOK AT 17 THE WORK THAT MAYOR ARREGUIN MADE, YOU KNOW, BRINGING MTC ABAG 18 TOGETHER, I THINK IT'S JUST BEEN A TREMENDOUS ACCOMPLISHMENT. 19 AND I SEE THE TWO ORGANIZATIONS WORKING CLOSER TOGETHER THAN 20 EVER. THE VERY FACT THAT YOU'RE SITTING AT THIS TABLE MAKING 21 THE COMMENT THAT YOU'RE MAKING AND MAKING THE RECOMMENDATIONS 22 THAT STAFF IS SAYING YES, THEY WILL CONSIDER, IS AN EXAMPLE OF 23 THAT. SO, I DON'T WANT TO DIMINISH THE STRIDES IN EFFORTS THAT 24 25 WE MAKE. ONE THING THAT WOULD BE HELPFUL, MTC IS THE MPO FOR

THE REGION, AND WE HAVE STATUTORY, AND WE HAVE, YOU KNOW, 1 FEDERAL LEGISLATION THAT MTC CAN ONLY VOTE ON, NOT ABAG. AND, 2 3 SO, I THINK IT WOULD BE GOOD IF WE CLARIFY THAT. BECAUSE SOME OF THESE VOTES, YOU KNOW, ABAG, LEGALLY CAN'T BE VOTING ON. 4 5 AND SO HAVE TO -- I THINK IT WOULD BE GOOD TO MAKE THAT SEPARATION. IF THERE IS AREAS OF DISCRETION ON THE MONEY, I 6 THINK BOTH SHOULD VOTE ON IT. AND I THINK STAFF AGREES WITH 7 8 THAT. MY MEETING WITH STAFF IS I FELT WE SHOULDN'T HAVE ELECTED OFFICIALS ON IT, THAT WAS MY INPUT. AND ANY OTHER 9 COMMENT THAT I HAD IS I WOULD LIKE TO SEE A WHOLE LOT OF NEW 10 FACES. WE SEEM TO HAVE THE SAME PEOPLE ROTATING THROUGH THESE 11 COMMITTEES ALL THE TIME AND I THINK IT WOULD BE GOOD TO REALLY 12 TRY TO GET PEOPLE WITH FRESH IDEAS AND SEE THIS A LITTLE BIT 13 DIFFERENTLY THAN WE DO. AND THAT'S VERY IMPORTANT. I HOPE 14 15 THAT'S A STRIDE THAT STAFF CAN MAKE TOO. BUT I AGREE WITH 16 BOARD MEMBER ECKLUND, I THINK ABAG DEFINITELY PLAY A ROLE WHO GETS APPOINTED TO THESE COMMITTEES. THEY PLAY A MUCH DIFFERENT 17 ROLE IN THE REGION. I SAW WHEN I WAS AN ABAG MEMBER THAT'S THE 18 ONLY ORGANIZATION THAT TALKS TO ALL THE CITIES AND COUNTIES, 19 AND THAT'S A FORUM THAT'S VALUABLE. I WOULD HATE TO SEE THAT 20 FORUM LOST. I MEAN THAT WOULD BE LOSS TO THE REGION. COUNCIL 21 MEMBERS AND SUPERVISOR ALL HAVE OPPORTUNITY TO VOICE THEIR 22 OPINION UNDER THESE IMPORTANT ISSUES. THIS WAS AN INFORMATION 23 ITEM. STAFF IS GOING TO TAKE COMMENTS. OH. WANDA? 24

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WANDA WILLIAMS: YOU HAVE TO START LOOKING MY WAY, JIM. THANK 1 YOU FOR ACKNOWLEDGING ME. FIRST AND FOREMOST -- I DIDN'T GET 2 3 TO DO THIS AT THE LAST, I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR THE WORK THAT YOU'RE DOING IN BRINGING THIS FORWARD. AND OF COURSE, 4 5 INTEGRATION IS VERY IMPORTANT. I BELIEVE IN THAT. AND I DON'T WANT TO IN ANY WAY DISCREDIT BOARD MEMBER ECKLUND'S COMMENTS. 6 HOWEVER, I WANT TO EMPHASIZE THAT IT'S IMPORTANT THAT ABAG 7 8 HAVE AT LEAST SOMEONE AT THE TABLE. AND I KNOW THIS IS IN INFANCY AND YOU'RE DEVELOPING THIS OUT, SO IT GIVES 9 OPPORTUNITIES TO GIVE YOU SOME SUGGESTIONS AND IDEAS THAT WE 10 WOULD LIKE TO SEE AS PART OF THIS PROCESS. BUT I DID GET AN 11 OPPORTUNITY TO LISTEN INTO MY OTHER COLLEAGUES BEING A NEWER 12 MEMBER HERE, I HAVE TO TAKE THOSE THINGS INTO CONSIDERATION AS 13 I PUT TOGETHER MY THOUGHTS ON THIS, BUT I WANTED TO MAKE SURE 14 15 AS WE GO THROUGH THIS PROCESS THAT WE'RE USING AN EQUITABLE 16 LENS SO THAT THOSE WHO ARE SITTING ON ABAG WHO DOESN'T AGREE WITH THIS INTEGRATION, FEEL THAT THEY ARE A PART OF IT, WE 17 DON'T WANT TO MAKE THOSE INDIVIDUALS ON ABAG WHO HAVE GIVEN 18 THEIR TIME AND EFFORT FEEL DEVALUED. AND SO THAT'S ALL I 19 REALLY WANTED TO SHARE ON THIS. BUT I'M LOOKING FORWARD TO 20 THIS WORK. AND AS WE LOOK FORWARD TO BRINGING ON THE NEW CBOS 21 AND THE DIFFERENT ORGANIZATIONS THAT WILL BRING A DIVERSE 22 VOICE TO THIS PARTICULAR BOARD, I -- BECAUSE I HAVEN'T SEEN 23 THIS PROCESS BEFORE, HOW DO THE MEMBERS -- HOW ARE THE MEMBERS 24

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SELECTED? WHAT PROCESS -- WHAT IS THE PROCESSES THAT WE
 UTILIZE TO MAKE THOSE DETERMINATIONS?

KY-NAM MILLER: THROUGH THE CHAIR, I COULD BRIEFLY RESPOND TO 4 5 DIRECTOR WILLIAMS. THE PROCESS IS EARLY NEXT YEAR WE WOULD HAVE AN OPEN NOMINATION, WHICH, IF IT PASSES PRELUDE TO THIS 6 NEW BODY, IT WOULD BE SPREAD THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA, THROUGH 7 8 COMMISSIONERS AND ABAG BOARD MEMBERS, TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE. WE ALSO DO SPECIFIC OUTREACH ACROSS GEOGRAPHIES AND 9 WITH COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS. WE AIM TO GET HUNDREDS OF 10 APPLICATIONS SO THAT WE HAVE A REAL DIVERSITY OF ALL TYPES, 11 FROM ACROSS THE REGION, AND THE END RESULT IS WE HAVE TWO 12 MEMBERS FROM EVERY COUNTY. AND THEN, SO THAT'S 18 OF THOSE AND 13 THEN I'M SPEAKING ONLY ABOUT THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL. I'M 14 15 NOT DEEPLY FAMILIAR WITH THE RPC APPOINTMENT PROCESS. BUT, 16 ESSENTIALLY, WE WOULD DO AN OPEN CALL FOR NOMINATIONS NEXT SPRING AND AIM TO HAVE INTERVIEWS AND SELECTIONS IN THE FALL. 17 AND THEN APPROVAL BY THESE BODIES BY THIS TIME NEXT YEAR. THE 18 NEXT TERM ENDS DECEMBER 2025 SO THE NEW BODY IS DUE TO BE 19 SWORN IN, IN JANUARY 2026. 20

WANDA WILLIAMS: ALL RIGHT. SO THAT GIVES US TIME TO DO A
THOROUGH RECRUITMENT PROCESS. ALL RIGHT. I WANT TO THANK YOU

JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: JESSE, THEN YOU. > JESSE ARREGUIN: I 4 5 DON'T WANT TO BELABOR THIS, BUT I AGREE WHOLEHEARTEDLY WITH COUNCIL MEMBER ROMERO'S COMMENTS. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT I 6 CONVEYED TO STAFF WHEN WE TALKED ABOUT THIS CONCEPTUALLY, AND 7 8 I DO SUPPORT EXPLORING, THIS I THINK IT MAKES SENSE, IS MAKING SURE THAT WE HAVE DIVERSITY OF STAKEHOLDER PERSPECTIVE, AND 9 THAT INCLUDES BUSINESS, THAT INCLUDES LABOR, ALSO INCLUDES THE 10 EQUITY GROUPS, AS WELL. THAT'S ONE OF THE BENEFITS OF THE 11 REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE IS THAT IT'S -- IT WAS MORE 12 FOCUSED, MORE BROADLY REPRESENTATIVE OF THE REGION'S 13 STAKEHOLDERS, INCLUDING LABOR AND BUSINESS. AND I THINK HAVING 14 THEM AT CBIA WITH THE COUNCIL, THIS COULD PROVIDE OPPORTUNITY 15 16 LOOK AT THE CURRENT COMPENSATION WHERE CERTAIN VOICES THAT AREN'T REPRESENTS THAT SHOULD BE REPRESENTED. I WANT TO 17 EMPHASIZE THE PURPOSES OF, YES WE NEED TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE --18 WE CENTER EOUITY IN HOW WE APPOINT REPRESENTATIVES BUT ALSO 19 MAKE SURE WE HAVE CERTAIN INSTITUTIONAL STAKEHOLDERS AT THE 20 21 TABLE. I THINK THAT MAKES FOR GOOD CONVERSATION AND GOOD OUTCOMES. AND WOULD ALSO SECOND THE REQUEST THAT ABAG 22 LEADERSHIP HAVE A ROLE IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS ON THE 23 APPOINTMENT OF SOME OF THESE SEATS AS WELL. THANK YOU. 24



JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: OKAY. GINA? 1 2 3 GINA PAPAN: REAL QUICK. AND THIS IS AN AMAZING ADVISORY GROUP, FIRST AND FOREMOST. THEY REALLY PUT IN THE TIME AND EFFORT. 4 5 WHAT ARE -- I KNOW THERE HAS BEEN ISSUES WITH THE BROWN ACT --DON'T HAVE TO ADDRESS THEM NOW AS TO HOW -- WELL, NOT BROWN 6 ACT, BUT ACTUALLY RECEIVING OUORUM, BECAUSE IT'S SUCH A LARGE 7 8 BODY PRESENTLY. AND THEN SECONDARILY, THE EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION OF APPOINTMENTS EVEN AT THE MTC LEVEL IS LIMITED. 9 YOU WILL NOTICE THERE ARE DIFFERENT CATEGORIES OF PEOPLE THAT 10 CAN BE ASSIGNED. SO, I DON'T KNOW HOW YOU WOULD APPROACH THAT, 11 IF IT'S THIS BODY IS EXPANDED. BECAUSE SOMETIMES THERE ARE 12 THREE JURISDICTIONS THAT HAVE AN EXTRA VOTE. AND THEN THE 13 CHAIR GETS MAJORITY OF THESE APPOINTMENTS HERE. SO HOW DO YOU 14 -- BECAUSE YOU HAVE OLDER ADULTS, PEOPLE OF COLOR, LOW-INCOME, 15 16 ARE THOSE RESTRICTION SAYS STILL GOING TO APPLY? OR YOU'RE GOING TO EXPAND ON THAT? AND, AGAIN, WE AT THE MTC LEVEL, 17 SOMETIMES OUR APPOINTMENTS ARE JUST LIMITED TO CERTAIN 18 CATEGORIES, BECAUSE OF THE WAY THIS IS CURRENTLY SET UP. SO, 19 AS THIS PROGRESSES, AND IN THE INFANT I'LL STAGE, OR WHATEVER 20 21 [LAUGHTER] MY COLLEAGUE SAID HERE, THAT NEEDS TO BE ADDRESSED IN ORDER TO MAINTAIN EQUITY, AND TO BUILD ON THIS GROUP TO 22 MAKE IT STRONGER. AGAIN, THIS IS A FABULOUS GROUP, AND THE 23 WORK THAT THEY PUT THIS IS, I THINK, IMMEASURABLE HERE. IT 24 REALLY HELPS US ALL. SO, I HOPE THE PROCESS INCLUDES ALL OF 25



THAT. BECAUSE WE ADOPT THEM TO BE PRODUCTIVE AND THE MOST 1 2 BENEFICIAL TO THE REGION. THANK YOU. 3 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: THANK YOU COMMISSIONERS AND BOARD 4 5 MEMBERS THIS IS WHAT STAFF WAS LOOKING FOR WITH THIS TYPE OF INPUT. SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR ALL THOSE COMMENTS. WARREN 6 7 CUSHMAN DO YOU WANT TO COME FORWARD FOR PUBLIC COMMENT? 8 CLERK OF THE BOARD: [INDISCERNIBLE] 9 10 SPEAKER: OKAY. SO, WARREN CUSHMAN. COMMUNITY RESOURCES FOR 11

INDEPENDENT LIVING. I ATTEND THESE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL 12 MEETINGS AS OFTEN AS POSSIBLE. FIRST OF ALL, THERE ARE, 13 ESSENTIALLY, NINE SPOTS FOR PEOPLE OF COLOR AND NINE SLOTS FOR 14 15 SENIORS AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES. SO, THOUGH 18 SLOTS, A 16 BIG OUESTION IS WHETHER OR NOT SOME OF THOSE SLOTS ARE GOING TO GO AWAY. OBVIOUSLY IF SENIORS AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES 17 ARE GOING TO GO AWAY, YOU KNOW I'M GOING TO BE RIGHT BACK 18 HERE. SO WE HAVE GOT TO BE CAREFUL WITH THIS, BECAUSE THERE 19 ARE EXPECTATIONS IN THE COMMUNITY, ESPECIALLY FROM THE EOUITY 20 21 COMMUNITIES AND THE SENIOR AND DISABILITY COMMUNITIES THAT WE'RE GOING TO CONTINUE TO WEIGH IN AT THE LEVEL WE HAVE 22 ALWAYS BEEN WEIGHING N I MEAN, THIS IS HISTORICAL. THIS HAS 23 BEEN GOING ON FOR QUITE A WHILE. SO, THE MESSAGE HAS TO BE 24 CLEAR IF WE'RE GOING TO ADD THE BAY AREA COUNCIL AND SOME OF 25



THESE OTHER FOLKS AND TAKE SLOTS AWAY FROM PEOPLE WITH 1 DISABILITIES THAT'S NOT GOING TO WORK FOR ME P THANK YOU VERY 2 3 MUCH. 4 5 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: OKAY. THANK YOU. IS THERE ANY OTHER 6 SPEAKERS, MARTHA? 7 8 CLERK OF THE BOARD: YES. YES. WE HAVE THREE PEOPLE IN ZOOM WISHING TO SPEAK. FIRST UP IS GOING TO BE PAMELA CAMPOS. 9 10 PAMELA CAMPOS: HELLO. GOOD MORNING. THANK YOU FOR THE 11 OPPORTUNITY TO COMMENT ON THIS ITEM. MY NAME IS PAMELA CAMPOS. 12 I AM A MEMBER OF THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL AND AM CURRENTLY 13 REPRESENTING AS CHAIR ON THAT COUNCIL. I HAVE HAD THE 14 15 OPPORTUNITY TO HEAR FROM STAFF WITH OUR COUNCIL MEMBER 16 LEADERSHIP ABOUT THIS POTENTIAL CHANGE. AND IT'S DEFINITELY SOMETHING THAT WE'RE VERY INTERESTED IN. WE LOOK FORWARD TO 17 HEARING THIS ITEM WITH THE FULL POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL SOON. 18 AND I JUST WANT TO SHARE MY SUPPORT FOR THIS CHANGE, BECAUSE 19 IN MANY OF OUR POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL MEETINGS, WE HAVE HEARD 20 21 OVER AND OVER AGAIN FROM COUNCIL MEMBERS ABOUT THE DESIRE TO 22 LEARN MORE AND PROVIDE INPUT ABOUT HOUSING, ECONOMICS, CLIMATE, AND OTHER ISSUES THAT ARISE IN RELATION TO PUBLIC 23 TRANSPORTATION PLANNING. AND, SO, TO ME, THAT DEMONSTRATES A 24 NEED FOR STRONGER UNITY TO, HOPEFULLY, LEAD TO A STRONGER 25

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IMPACT ON BEHALF OF THESE OF COMMUNITY VOICES. AND, SO, I JUST 1 WANT TO, AGAIN, SHOW THAT I AM IN SUPPORT OF LEARNING MORE 2 3 ABOUT HOW WE CAN CREATE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR THIS CHANGE TO HAPPEN AND ENSURING THAT WE CONTINUE TO HAVE STRONG 4 5 GEOGRAPHICAL REPRESENTATION FROM THE NEXT BAY AREA COUNTIES MAKING SURE THAT WE ARE HEARING, ALWAYS, FROM FOLKS IN THE 6 NORTH BAY, SOUTH BAY, PENINSULA, EAST BAY, AND EVERYWHERE IN 7 8 BETWEEN. AND THAT WE ALSO AS COUNCIL MEMBERS HAVE OPPORTUNITIES TO ENGAGE WITH ELECTED LEADERS ON MTC AND ABAG 9 10 OUTSIDE OF THESE MEETINGS. BECAUSE I BELIEVE THAT THAT IS ALSO EQUALLY AS IMPORTANT. SO, THANK YOU. 11

SPEAKER: I'M ROMA DAWSON, COPRESIDENT OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN 16 VOTERS BAY AREA. UNFORTUNATELY WE DIDN'T REALIZE THIS WAS ON 17 THE AGENDA TODAY OR WE WOULD HAVE PREPARED A LETTER. HOWEVER, 18 I WOULD VERY MUCH LIKE TO OFFER SOME PERSONAL COMMENTS. I HAVE 19 HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF WORKING FOR A NUMBER OF ELECTED OFFICIALS 20 21 BASED HERE IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY, GOING ALL THE WAY BACK TO THE 1980s. ONE, A FORMER PRESIDENT OF ABAG IN THE MID-1990S, 22 AND SEVERAL MEMBERS OF MTC. SO I JUST WANT TO PICK UP ON 23 SOMETHING THAT STAFF COMMENTED ON, I BELIEVE IT WAS KAI, THAT 24 COMMENTED THAT THE SPACE CHANGES WHEN AN ELECTED OFFICIAL IS 25

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PRESENT, PARTICULARLY IF THAT ELECTED OFFICIAL HAS A POWERFUL 1 ROLE. AND NOW JUST TO QUICKLY GO BACK AND PUT ON MY 6 LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTER'S HAT, I DO WANT TO SAY THAT LEAGUE OF 7 8 WOMEN VOTERS VERY MUCH WANT TO WORK WITH THIS BODY, WITH MTC AND ABAG, IN TERMS OF DEVELOPING THIS JOINT COMMITTEE AS IT 9 MOVES FORWARD. AND I LOOK FORWARD TO HEARING FROM STAFF ON 10 THAT. AND, AGAIN, TO CHAIR SPERING, I WANT TO THANK YOU SO 11 MUCH FOR YOUR TIRELESS HOURS. AND THE OTHER THING THAT HAS BEEN A CONCERN OF 9 OUR COMMITTEE FOR A LONG TIME IS HOW CAN WE COMMUNICATE WITH 10 THE ELECTED OFFICIALS ABOUT WHAT OUR ADVISORY IS. AND SO I'M URGING YOU ON THE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT FLOOR, FOR 22 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, TO REACH OUT TO THE PORT OF REDWOOD CITY 23 TO TALK ABOUT THAT PROJECT, BECAUSE WE HAVEN'T SEEN HOW STAFF 24 IS CONSIDERING IT OR RECEIVED ANY FEEDBACK. SPERING, CHAIR: THANK YOU. PUBLIC COMMENTS. ALETA 10 DUPREE AND THEN ADINA LEVIN. 11 12 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. GOOD MORNING, CHAIR JIM SPERING AND 13 MEMBERS. ALETA DUPREE FOR THE RECORD, SHE AND HER WITH TEAM 14 15 FOLDS. I'M A LITTLE TIRED BUT I MADE IT IN-PERSON. I'M GOING 16 TO SPEAK ABOUT PLANNING. WHY IS PLANNING IMPORTANT? I FOUND 21 MYSELF ON MARKET AND POWELL, AND I WAS GOING TO GO DOWNSTAIRS, 22 AND TAKE BART FOR TWO STOPS, TO EMBARCADERO. BUT I SAW A MUNI 23 F, HISTORIC STREETCAR, L IT CHANGED MY PLAN, GOT ON IT AND IT 24 25 GOT ME OVER HERE A LITTLE QUICKER. BECAUSE I HAVE ISSUES, AND

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SOMETIMES IT'S HARD FOR ME TO PLAN. AND, 6 SO, PART OF WHAT I DO IS NOT JUST SHARE, PERHAPS, ABOUT 7 8 TECHNICAL ASPECTS, AND ACADEMIC EXPOSITIONS BUT MORE SO I CAN ONLY RELATE TO MY EXPERIENCES AND I CAN DESCRIBE THEM TO YOU 9 10 THROUGH MY MANY SERMONS AND LETTERS BECAUSE YOU'RE OFTEN NOT THERE TO SEE THEM. IT'S HARD FOR ME TO PLAN SOMETIMES, BUT 11 THANKS FOR HELPING BY DOING IT FOR ME. APPRECIATE IT. 12

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14 JAMES P. SPERING, CHAIR: THANK YOU ALETA. ADINA THIS IS OUR15 LAST SPEAKER.

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ADINA LEVIN: THANK YOU VERY MUCH TO THE CHAIR FOR ALLOWING ME 17 TO SPEAK FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING WHEN I WAS ON ZOOM. ADINA 18 LEVIN WITH SEAMLESS BAY AREA, WANTED TO EXPRESS THANKS TO 19 STAFF FOR ALL THE OUTREACH ON PLANNED BAY AREA AND TRANSIT 20 21 2050+, AND WANTED TO SHARE THAT SEAMLESS BAY AREA WORKS WITH MANY PARTNERS TO DO SOME OUTREACH THAT WAS COMPLEMENTARY TO 22 OUTREACH THAT MTC DID, ASKED SOME OUESTIONS AND PROVIDED 23 MATERIALS AT A HIGH-LEVEL, BUT IT DIDN'T GIVE THE INFORMATION 24 IN A WAY THAT PEOPLE COULD REALLY ZOOM IN AND DRILL DOWN ABOUT 25

WHATEVER BEING PROPOSED FOR THEIR AREA WHERE THEY LIVE. SO 1 WHAT WE DID WAS TOOK MTC'S MATERIAL AND ZOOMED IT OUT AND 2 3 ALLOWED PEOPLE TO LOOK AT THOSE PARTS OF THE MAP AND LISTED PROJECTS ORGANIZED SO THAT SOMEONE CAN SEE HOW DOES THIS 4 5 AFFECT ME. WE REACHED ABOUT 240 PEOPLE. WE HELD SIX WORKSHOPS TWO, IN ZOOM, THE REST IN-PERSON. SEVERAL OF THEM WERE UNTIL 6 ENGLISH AND SPANISH, AND ONE SIGNIFICANT SET OF PEOPLE WHO 7 8 SPEAK KHMER AND IMMIGRANTS AND REFUGEES IN SEVEN OF THE NINE AREAS, AND WHAT PEOPLE SHARED AND PEOPLE WHO DEPEND ON TRANSIT 9 SUPPORT, REALLY WANT THE ENHANCED LOCAL SERVICE FROM TRANSIT 10 2050+ FREQUENCY AND RELIABILITY AND IMPROVED CONNECTIONS TO 11 HELP PEOPLE HAVE FASTER TRAIL OF TRAVEL TIMES AND MAKE THOSE 12 FIRST AND LAST MILE CONNECTIONS. THE MISSING LINKS THAT WERE 13 IDENTIFIED IN THE TRANSIT 2050+ AND INTEGRATED AFFORDABLE 14 15 FARES, PEOPLE DIDN'T KNOW BUT TALKED TO IN ADVANCE ABOUT THE 16 FREE TRANSFERS THEY WERE ABOUT TO GET AND THE FARE CAPPING, ALTHOUGH THEY DIDN'T USE THAT TERM, AS WELL AS CLEANLINESS, 17 BUS STOP IMPROVEMENTS FOR SAFETY AND RELIABILITY. SO, THE 18 POPULATION WANTS NOT ONLY TO SOLVE THE FISCAL CLIFF AND KEEP 19 THINGS FROM GETTING WORSE, BUT TO GET THINGS BETTER WHICH I 20 21 THINK SHOULD BE HELPFUL FOR OUR NEXT TOPIC TODAY.
