- 9 SHARED NEW HOUSING LAWS MIGHT HURT LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES BY
- 10 PUSHING THEM OUT OF THEIR NEIGHBORHOODS AND PLANS SHOULD DO
- 11 MORE TO PROTECT AND PRESERVE THOSE COMMUNITIES SEA LEVEL RISE
- 12 WAS ANOTHER CONCERN ESPECIALLY PLACES LIKE SAN FRANCISCO THERE
- 13 WERE QUESTIONS ABOUT HOW THE PLAN MEASURES RISK WHERE THE
- 14 MONEY COMES FROM ONE COUNCIL MEMBER SAID THE JOB IN POPULATION

- 19 TUNNELS PROTECTING RENTERS WHILE STILL ENCOURAGING HOUSING
- 20 DEVELOPMENT CONCERNS WERE RAISED ABOUT PLAN'S FOCUS ON
- 21 BUILDING AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN NEW GROWTH AREAS WITH ONE
- 22 COUNCIL MEMBER ASKING HOW THAT DOESN'T CREATE NEW GHETTOS AND
- 23 FORCE PEOPLE TO BE FARTHER FROM JOBS, GIVING PEOPLE MORE
- 24 OPTIONS, PROTECTING THOSE WHO WANT TO STAY CLOSER TO
- 25 OPPORTUNITY QUESTIONS ABOUT REBATE PLANS, HOW THE PLANS WORK,

2	HOW THE PLAN WOULD REDUCE EMISSIONS AND WHETHER CONSIDERATIONS
3	ARE REALISTIC FOR CAR USAGE, COUNCIL MEMBERS PROMISED WE NEED
4	BETTER TO DEFINE OPEN SPACE ESPECIALLY WHEN IT'S PRIVATE LAND
5	OR SCHOOL PROPERTY THAT THE PUBLIC CAN'T USE FINALLY COUNCIL
6	MEMBERS WANT TO KNOW HOW THEIR FEEDBACK WILL BE USED ON THE
7	PLANNING PROCESS, TRAFFIC REPORTS WILL COME OUT IN SEPTEMBER
8	AND PROMISE TO KEEP WORKING WITH THE COUNCIL AND PROVIDE
9	WRITTEN ANSWERS ESPECIALLY ON BIG ISSUES ALSO YESTERDAY THE
10	COUNCIL MEMBERS WANTED TO PROVIDE SUGGESTIONS TO THE GUIDING
11	FRAMEWORK FOR SB63. SO I WOULD LIKE TO SUMMARIZE THAT
12	DISCUSSION AND ACTION. THE COUNCIL WAS DISAPPOINTED TO SEE
13	REDUCTION IN PROPOSED FUNDING FOR RIDER FOCUSED IMPROVEMENTS
14	BUT APPRECIATES INCREASED FUNDING FOR ACCESSIBILITY AND
15	SUPPORTS THE STAFF RECOMMENDATION WITH AN AMENDMENT TO MODIFY
16	THE EFFICIENCY STUDY PROVISIONS IN THE BILL TO REQUIRE THAT
17	THE STUDY BE INTER-AGENCY WITH FOCUS ON REDUCING DUPLICATION,
18	IMPROVING CONNECTIONS AND MASK SERVICE TO DEMAND TO INCREASE
19	RIDERSHIP. THANK YOU.

- 21 CONCERNED ABOUT THE FACT THAT WE DON'T DIFFERENT BETWEEN
- 22 FARMLAND, WHICH IS CONSIDERED OPEN SPACE, INSTEAD OF FARMLAND,
- 23 AND/OR RANGE LAND, OR ANYTHING ELSE THIS'S BEING COMMERCIALLY
- 24 USED THAT WAY, OR SCHOOL PLAY GROUNDS WHICH WE'RE LOCKED OUT

3	COMMISSIONER ANDREW F, COUPLE ITEMS SENATOR WIENER THE STATE
4	SENATE BUDGET FISCAL REVIEW COMMITTEE ANNOUNCED THE GOVERNOR
5	HAS AGREED TO RETAIN PUBLIC TRANSIT FUNDING THAT HAVE BEEN
6	PROPOSED FOR THE ELIMINATION IN THE MAY REVISE AS WELL AS
7	SUPPORTING A LOAN OF \$750 MILLION TO BAY AREA TRANSIT AREAS,
8	ESPECIALLY SB63. AS A REMINDER, THAT LOAN IS INTENDED TO SERVE
9	AS BRIDGE FUNDING SO THAT CAN COVER THE GAP BETWEEN WE
10	ANTICIPATE A SUCCESSFUL BALLOT BRINGING IN REVENUE TO SPEND ON
11	TRANSIT OPERATIONS. THE SECOND ITEM, AND MAYBE THAT'S WHY
12	COMMISSIONER EL-TAWANSY IS NOT HERE, SHE'S PROBABLY WORKING ON
13	HER NEW JOB. BUT WE WANT TO CONGRATULATE COMMISSIONER EL-
14	TAWANSY WHO HAS BEEN A COMMISSIONER SINCE 2020. FOR THOSE THAT
15	DON'T KNOW SHE IS NOW THE NEW DIRECTOR FOR CALTRANS. AND WE
16	DID HAVE STATEWIDE DIRECTOR FOR CALTRANS AND WE DID HAVE
17	A DEBATE ABOUT HOW MANY WOMEN HAVE BEEN THERE; SHE MIGHT BE
18	THE FOURTH. THERE MAY BE MORE THAN WE REMEMBER AT TIMES. BUT
19	WE WISH HER WELL. IT WAS, SORT OF, A TRADE, THE PREVIOUS
20	DIRECTOR TONY TAVARES WHO WAS OF THE PREVIOUS COMMISSIONER HAS
21	COME DOWN TO WORK AS THE NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR THE
22	ALAMEDA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION. SO WE SHOULD HAVE
23	GOOD STATEWIDE INPUT FOR A WHILE NOW. I WANT TO MENTION WHAT
24	WAS A SUCCESSFUL TWO-DAY CONFERENCE THAT MTC AND ABAG, HOSTED
25	HERE IN THE BUILDING, CALLED "ACCESSIBLE FUTURES" SHARING



- LISTENING AND LEARNING THE EVENT BROUGHT TOGETHER ALL KINDS OF 1 RESIDENTS WITH DISABILITIES FROM THE NINE COUNTIES AND PROVIDE 2 3 OPPORTUNITY FOR THEM TO NETWORK, TO HEAR ABOUT WHAT WE'RE DOING, BUT PRIMARILY TO SHARE THEIR LIVED EXPERIENCE WITH THE 4 5 POLICY MAKERS AND HELP US REALLY DEVELOP OPPORTUNITIES AND PARTNERSHIPS FOR COLLABORATION. I HAVE UPDATED NUMBERS FROM 6 WHAT I PUT IN MY WRITTEN REPORT. IT WAS ATTENDED BY 182 PEOPLE 7 8 IN-PERSON AND 229 REMOTE PARTICIPANTS, CHAIR NOACK AND COMMISSIONER GIACOPINI OPENED THE EVENT AND WE ALSO HAD A NICE 9 OPENING KEYNOTE ADDRESS FROM EAST BAY CONGRESSWOMAN LATEEFAH 10 SIMON WHO IS LEGALLY BLIND AND REALLY, I THINK, PROVIDED SOME 11 REALLY VERY IMPORTANT OPENING COMMENTS. THE NEXT ITEM IS JUST, 12 SORT OF, A RECOGNITION OF OUR WAYFINDING, AND HOW WE'RE MOVING 13 INTO SOME OF THE MORE COMPLICATED STATIONS. CAN I --13 THERE IS A SLIDE DECK, CAN I HAVE THAT PULLED UP? A LITTLE BIT 14 15 OF HISTORY. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. AS A REGION, WE HAVE HAD A 16 LONG HISTORY OF WORKING TOGETHER ON TRANSIT CONNECTIVITY SINCE 1970S, AND THIS HAS NEVER BEEN AN EASY UNDERTAKING AND IN PART 17 18 IT'S DUE TO HOW WE HAVE HISTORICALLY FUNDED AND PRIORITIZED TRANSIT IN THE REGION AND HOW AGENCIES WERE CREATED. - 17 RIDERSHIP DROPPED OVERNIGHT IT WAS CREATED FOR INDUSTRIES AND
- 18 RECOVERY IDENTIFY ACTIONS TO SHAPE TRANSIT MORE CONNECTED

- 22 CAPITAL PROJECTS AND EXTEND THEM IN THE CASE OF OPERATIONAL
- 23 PROJECTS THAT WE HAVE LISTED IN THE PROGRAM. OVER THE PAST
- 24 FIVE YEARS CUSTOMER FOCUSED IMPROVEMENTS HAVE BEEN PRIORITIZED

- 15 ENABLES MTC TO IMPLEMENT ITS TRANSIT COORDINATION
- 16 RESPONSIBILITIES IN PARTNERSHIP WITH TRANSIT AGENCY WHO IS
- 17 HAVE TECHNICAL EXPERTISE ON THE PROGRAMS OPPORTUNITY TO

COMMISSIONER PAPAN? 6 GINA PAPAN: REAL OUICK DO WE HAVE A SET TIME FRAME ON HOW LONG 7 8 IT TAKES THESE PILOTS AND HOW WE GET BEYOND THEM? 9 MELANIE CHOY: IN PARTICULAR THERE ARE PILOTS IN MANY OF THE 10 FARE PROGRAMS CATEGORY SO FOR THAT WE HAVE DONE A TWO YEAR 11 PILOT PERIOD 1 TO 2 YEARS WE'RE PILOTING IT THEN ASSESSING AT 12 THE END OF TWO YEARS THE CHOICE TO CONTINUE ADDITIONAL PILOTS 13 OR TO SWITCH TO AN ONGOING PROGRAM IN TERMS OF THE MAPPING AND 14 15 WAYFINDING PROGRAM WE'RE ALSO DOING PILOTS AND THE PILOTS IN 16 THAT AREA ARE SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT IN THE WAY WE'RE REFINING STANDARDS, GETTING THE SIGN AM AGE OUT THERE AND SHE HOW WE 17 FUNCTION HOW WE SCALE MOBILIZE WITH THE TRANSIT AGENCIES SO 18 THE PILOTS FOR THE MAPPING AND WAYFINDING PROGRAM IS SET TO 19 TAKES 2026 AND INTO 2027 BECAUSE WE'RE ROLLING OUT INTO SOME 20 21 OF THE OTHER COUNTIES ABOVE AND BEYOND PILOTS FOR THE NINE 22 COUNTIES. 23 GINA PAPAN: SO IT DEFINITELY DEPENDS ON WHICH AREA YOU'RE 24

- 24 CAN MAKE SURE WE'RE FINANCIALLY SET IN TERMS OF THIS AND AT

- 22 THINK THAT FROM -- FROM THE -- LOOKING AT THIS FROM A -- FROM
- 23 A GOAL STANDPOINT, BEST CASE SCENARIO, 45 SOUNDS GOOD. BUT WE
- 24 NEED TO BE MINDFUL OF THE FLEXIBILITY FOR THE NEED OF THAT TO
- 25 CHANGE. ADDITIONALLY, I THINK WE NEED TO STRIVE TOWARDS



- 1 UNDERSTANDING THAT IF SOMETHING WERE TO CATASTROPHICALLY
- 2 HAPPEN, YET AGAIN, THAT WOULD AFFECT OF THE TRANSIT OPERATORS,
- 3 THAT THAT IS THE CUSHION MONEY. AND -- AND I THINK WE NEED TO
- 4 HAVE FLEXIBILITY IN THAT. WE HAVE BEEN IN THIS POSITION MANY
- 5 TIMES BEFORE, AND WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT TRANSIT OPERATIONS

- 1 THAT WE ARE ABLE TO PRIORITIZE OUR OPERATORS AND THE BAY
- 2 AREA'S MOVEMENT OF PEOPLE GOING FORWARD, AND IT'S -- THAT IS
