2	ABAG AND MTC SUPPORTING CONS VACATION PARKS AND RESILIENCE.
3	THIS IS A TWO-PART ACTION ITEM. THE ABAG ADMIN COMMITTEE AND
4	THE MTC PLANNING COMMITTEE OFTEN GRAPPLE WITH OUR REGION'S
5	MAJOR CHALLENGES RELATED TO OUR ONGOING HOUSING AFFORDABILITY
6	CRISIS AS WELL AS AMBITIOUS GOAL TO SHIFT MORE FOLKS INTO
7	WALKING BIKING AND TAKING PUBLIC TRANSIT AS IMPORTANT IS
8	CREATION OF COMPLETE COMMUNITIES THAT WRAP AROUND OUR HOUSING

1 ADMIN COMMITTEE'S CONSIDERATION. 2 SPEAKER: THANK YOU MY NAME IS KATE LIE ONES RESILIENCE PLANNER 3 ABAG MTC. PCAS CONTINUE THE BAY AREA'S COMMITMENT TO RESIMIENT 4 5 PARKS AGRICULTURE FARM TO MARKET ECOSYSTEMS AND ELEVATE LOCAL CONSERVATION. THE PCA PROGRAM IDENTIFIES LOCALLY NOMINATED 6 7 REGIONAL SIGNIFICANT AREAS FOR PROTECTION OR IMPROVEMENT. EACH PCA IS DEFINED BY A MAP GEOGRAPHY AND ONE OR MORE OF THE FIVE 8 9 TYPES, NATURAL LANDS, WORKING LANDS, RECREATION P URBAN GREENING AND CLIMATE A DAPATION. YOU CAN SEE THE CATEGORIES 10 DEPICTED ON THE SLIDE. THE PROGRAM WAS ESTABLISHED IN 2007 11 12 ALONGSIDE PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREAS LIKE PDAS, PCAS ARE NOMINATED EVERY FEW YEARS, CITIES COUNTIES, AND PARK OR OPEN 13 SPACE DISTRICTS VOLUNTARILY NOMINATE PCAS WHICH ARE THEN 14 FORMALLY DESIGNATED BY THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD. NEXT SLIDE 15 PLEASE. FLUSH. BETWEEN 2022 AND 2024 WE COMPLETED THE FIRST 16 17 MAJOR UPDATE TO THE PLANNING FRAMEWORK SINCE IT BEGAN IN 2007. THIS EFFORT WAS CALLED THE PCA REFRESH. AND IT WAS FUNDED BY A 18 19 SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURAL LANDS CONSERVATION OR SALT GRANT. THE PURPOSE OF THE REFRESH WAS TO ADDRESS DATA AND POLICY 20 DEFICIENCIES IN THE FRAMEWORK IN ORDER TO IMPROVE ITS 21 22 CONSISTENCY AND USEFULNESS. THE KEY IMPROVEMENTS INCLUDED NEW 23 DATA FOR REGIONAL CONSISTENCY, UPDATED VISION AND GOALS THAT 24 ARE ALIGNED WITH PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, AND A STRONGER FOCUS

ON EQUITY AND CLIMATE RESILIENCE AS DAVE MENTIONED. THE



1	REFRESH ALSO REFINED ELIGIBILITY MAPS TO PROVIDE CLEAR
2	NOMINATION GUIDANCE WHILE MAINTAINING FLEXIBILITY TO REFLECT A
3	WIDE VARIETY OF OPEN SPACE CONSERVATION RECREATION AND
4	RESILIENCE GOALS ACROSS THE REGION. IT ESTABLISH CLEAR
5	DISTINCTION BETWEEN PCA TYPES IDENTIFYING URBAN GREEN FOR
6	EXAMPLE, AS APPROPRIATE INSIDE COMMUNITY LIMITS WHEREAS
7	NATURAL LANDS AND WORKING LANDS WERE LARGELY RESERVED FOR
8	AREAS OUTSIDE OF COMMUNITY LIMITS. CLIMATE ADAPTEDATION AND
9	RECREATION PCA TYPES SPAN BOTH INSIDE AND OUTSIDE COMMUNITY
10	LIMITS. THE REFRESH CREATED A NEW FRAMEWORK ELEMENT CALLED THE

15	PRESERVATION AND IMPROVEMENT PRIORITIES AT THE REGIONAL SCALE
16	AND MAY INFORM FUTURE PLANNING EFFORTS SUCH AS PLANNED BAY
17	AREA 2060 ONCE THE PCA REFRESH WAS COMPLETED WITH NEW
18	ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA APPROVED EXISTING PCAS NEEDED TO BE
19	AMENDED TO MATCH UPDATED FRAMEWORK. NEXT SLIDE. SO, THIS SLIDE
20	SHOWS THE REFRESH IN CONTEXT ALONGSIDE THE AMENDMENT AND
21	NOMINATION PHASES OF THE PCA PLANNING FRAMEWORK THROUGH ABAG,
22	AND THE PCA GRANTS FUNDING PROGRAM THROUGH MTC. STARTING IN
23	2020 STAFF INITIATED THE PCA REFRESH PROJECT WHICH CONCLUDED
24	IN 2024 FOLLOWING REFRESH EXISTING PCAS WERE AMENDED BY LOCAL

- 11 CHANGES, CHANGES TO PCA TYPE, OR BOTH. SOME PCA'S WERE ALSO
- 12 SPLIT TO ACCOMMODATE MULTIPLE TYPES WITHIN A GIVEN LARGER
- 13 AREA. BEFORE REFRESH SOME PCA WERE LED BY NON-GOVERNMENTAL
- 14 ORGANIZATIONS OR NGOS. THE REFRESH SPECIFIED THAT PCA SHOULD
- 15 BE LED BY LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO IMPROVE CONSISTENCY IN THEIR
- 16 MANAGEMENT SO NGO LED PCA WERE REASSIGNED TO HOST
- 17 JURISDICTIONS IN SUPPORT JURISDICTIONS MTC AND ABAG STAFF
- 18 EVALUATED PCA AND DEVELOPED EXAMPLE AMENDMENT OPTIONS WE
- 19 OFFERED MAPPING SUPPORT AND PROVIDED ONE-ON-ONE OFFICE HOURS
- 20 PROVIDED A BRIEF OUTLINE KEY CHANGES NEEDED FOR COMPLIES
- 21 IMPACT OF THESE EFFORTS WAS IMPROVED DATA CONSISTENCY GREATER
- 22 CLARITY AND STRONGER ELIGIBILITY FOR PCA FUNDING. NEXT SLIDE.

- 6 AMONG AMENDED AREAS WERE NATURAL LANDS, RECREATION, AND

- 11 INTERSECT WITH EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES ABOUT A QUARTER OF
- 12 EXISTING PCA'S REFLECTS CONCERTED EFFORTS TO ENGAGE
- 13 JURISDICTIONS. COMMON PCA TYPE REFLECTING BROAD ELIGIBILITY

- 22 ONE-ON-ONE SUPPORT AND TEMPLATE MATERIALS FOR JURISDICTION.
