- 23 ON STATE ROUTE 37 SPECIFICALLY COORDINATED WITH THE CALIFORNIA
- 24 NATIONAL RESOURCE AGENCY AND CALTRANS TO SUBMIT A LETTER OF
- 25 INTENT TO IMPLY FOR \$75 MILLION FOR A NEW CLIMATE RESILIENCE



- 1 REGIONAL CHALLENGE THROUGH NATIONAL OCEANIC ATMOSPHERIC
- 2 ADMINISTRATION NOAA FUNDING WOULD ALLOW ADVANCEMENT OF LONG-
- 3 TERM RESILIENCE WORK WE'RE COMMITTING TO AND ALLOW US TO DO
- 4 PLANNING EFFORTS THAT FOCUS ON WHAT'S AFTER THE FIRST SERIES
- 5 OF PROJECTS THAT ARE STARTING TO GET UNDERWAY. WE LOOK FORWARD

- 7 TRYING TO LOOK AT BETTER PARTNERSHIP TO INCORPORATE A LOT OF
- 8 RESILIENCY IMPROVEMENTS ALONG WITH SOME TRANSPORTATION
- 9 IMPROVEMENTS AT THE SAME TIME. I DO LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUE
- 10 INFORMATION ON IMPROVEMENTS THERE. I WANT TO THANK
- 11 COMMISSIONER EKLUND. SHE JOINED THE STATE ROUTE 37 TOUR LAST
- 12 WEEK WITH THE POLICY FOLKS, AND FROM ALL INFORMATION IT SOUNDS
- 13 LIKE IT WENT WELL. GETTING PEOPLE OUT THERE SEEING WHAT WE'RE
- 14 TRYING TO DO IS GOING GO A LONG WAYS TO IMPROVE OUR ABILITY TO
- 15 COMMUNICATE WITH ONE VOICE ON HOW ALL IMPROVEMENTS ARE PLANNED
- 16 GOING TO BE EFFECTIVE IN MOVING THAT PROJECT FORWARD. THAT'S

- 3 WAS THINKING SPECIFICALLY ABOUT BCDC, AND THE REGIONAL BOARD
- 4 AND THE OTHER ORGANIZATION THAT IS ACTUALLY PART OF THIS
- 5 GROUP. HAVING WORKED FOR THE U.S. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION
- 6 AGENCY FOR OVER 36 YEARS, IT'S IMPORTANT TO GET THE REGULATORY
- 7 AGENCIES ENGAGED. BUT I THOUGHT IT WAS AN OUTSTANDING TOUR.
- 8 AND YOU'RE RIGHT, IT'S NOT REALLY A HIGHWAY PROJECT OR FREEWAY
- 9 PROJECT. IT'S REALLY A RESILIENCY PROJECT. AND THAT'S HOW IT'S
- 10 BEING PRESENTED. AND I THINK THAT'S BRILLIANT, AND REALLY
- 11 APPRECIATE YOUR LEADERSHIP, ANDY, AND REALLY LOOKING FORWARD
- 12 TO WORKING WITH YOU AND OTHER REGULATORY AGENCIES TO TRY TO
- 13 STREAMLINE THE PERMITTING, WHICH IS SOMETHING THAT I'M VERY
- 14 CONCERNED ABOUT.

- 1 TO BE BEING PRESENTED WITH. I RECOGNIZE THAT THE STAFF IS
- 2 REALLY WORKING CLOSELY, WHICH IS ESSENTIAL. BUT I THINK IT'S
- 3 IMPORTANT FOR THE BCDC COMMISSIONERS AND COMMISSIONERS OF
- 4 OTHER ORGANIZATIONS TO GET THAT PREVIEW. ONLY BECAUSE IT WILL
- 5 HELP US LEGISLATIVELY, AS WELL. THIS SHOULD BE THE PRIORITY, I
- 6 THINK, FOR THE REGION. BECAUSE IT'S REALLY GOING TO AFFECT ALL
- 7 OF THE COUNTIES IN THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA.

- 22 AUTHORITY MEASURE AA FUNDING. AND THEN THE STATE COASTAL
- 23 CONSERVANCY, WE HAD OUR BOARD MEETING YESTERDAY IN HEALDSBURG,
- 24 WHICH WAS LOVELY, AND AUTHORIZED ALMOST \$84 MILLION IN GRANTS,
- 25 UP-AND-DOWN THE COAST, AND IN THE BAY AREA. SO, IT WAS AN



- 1 EXCITING BOARD MEETING. SOME OF THE PROJECTS IN THE BAY AREA
- 2 THAT WOULD BE OF INTEREST INCLUDE 1.23 MILLION TO THE CITY OF
- 3 OAKLAND FOR THE 66th AVENUE BART TO BAY TRAIL DESIGN, WHICH IS
- 4 FUNDING -- ITS MITIGATION FUNDS THROUGH BCDC FROM CALTRANS
- 5 FROM OUITE A WHILE AGO, AND WE'RE REALLY HAPPY TO BE PUTTING
- 6 THESE TOWARDS A PROJECT THAT WILL BENEFIT THE OAKLAND
- 7 COMMUNITY. WE'RE ALSO MOVING FORWARD WITH THE THIRD PHASE OF
- 8 THE SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO BAY SHORELINE FEASIBILITY STUDY, WHICH
- 9 IS MOUNTAIN VIEW, AND SUNNYVALE. SO, WE'RE GOING TO BE -- THE
- 10 BOARD AUTHORIZED ENTERING INTO THE COST SHARE AGREEMENT WITH
- 11 VALLEY WATER AND THE CORP OF ENGINEERS TO GET THAT STUDY
- 12 MOVING ALONG. THERE WAS A \$5.1 MILLION GRANT FOR INDIA BASIN,
- 13 THE 900 INNISS, THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE PARK BY SAN FRANCISCO
- 14 REC AND PARK DEPARTMENT AND 1.78 MILLION TO LITERACY FOR
- 15 ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE FOR WORK AT HERON'S HEAD PARK, REALLY
- 16 ECO APPRENTICES AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT EFFORTS LEAD 8.99
- 17 MILLION TO THE CITY OF BERKELEY FOR BERKELEY MARINA WORK
- 18 REPLACING DOCKS, AND DREDGING THE MARINA WHICH IS ONE PART OF
- 19 IMPROVING THE OVERALL MARINA INCREASING REVENUE SUPPORT THE
- 20 WORK AT THE MARINA. 4.35 MILLION TO SAN FRANCISCO STATE
- 21 UNIVERSITY FOR SOME ON GROUND SEA LEVEL RISE NATURE-BASED
- 22 ADAPTATION PROJECTS IN MARIN COUNTY ALONG WITH WORKFORCE
- 23 DEVELOPMENT EFFORTS WITH COMMUNITY COLLEGES IN THE BAY AREA
- 24 THAT WAS EXCITING TO SEE THE COMBINATION OF SAN FRANCISCO
- 25 STATE UNIVERSITY WORKING WITH UMM SEVERAL OF THE COMMUNITY



- 1 COLLEGES AND THEN STARTING IN OYSTER SHELL RECYCLING PROGRAM
- 2 WHICH HAPPENS A LOT ON THE EAST COAST. WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE
- 3 THAT TAKE OFF IN THE BAY AREA SO WE CAN USE THAT OYSTER SHELL
- 4 NON-NATIVE OYSTERS THAT WE'RE EATING, BUT WE CAN USE THE
- 5 OYSTER SHELL ONCE THEY'RE CURED, THEY JUST SIT IN THE SUN FOR
- 6 A YEAR WE CAN USE THAT FOR RESTORATION PROJECTS AND JUST A
- 7 GREAT WAY TO ENGAGE PEOPLE IN THE LIVING SHORELINE WORK, THE

- 5 LEADING THE SCIENCE PROGRAM AND THE 37 WASTEWATER AGENCIES
- 6 HAVE CONTRIBUTED OVER \$15 MILLION TO FUNDING THE MONITORING IN
- 7 SAN FRANCISCO BAY, MODELING AND RESEARCH STUDIES AND WE
- 8 REQUIRE THEM AS PART OF THE SECOND WATER SHED PERMIT ISSUED IN
- 9 2019 FOR THEM TO DO A STUDY TO LOOK AT WAYS TO REDUCE NUTRIENT
- 10 LEVELS BY NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS AND ALSO REQUIRED THEM TO DO
- 11 A STUDY THAT WAS DUE BY JUNE 30TH OF THIS YEAR ON LOOKING AT
- 12 OPPORTUNITIES TO REDUCE NUTRIENT LEVELS IN WASTEWATER BY
- 13 LOOKING AT WATER RECYCLING OPPORTUNITIES. GOOD NEWS IS WHEN
- 14 THE WATER BOARD ISSUES THIRD NUTRIENT WATER SHED PERMIT IN THE
- 15 SPRING OF NEXT YEAR WE HAVE INFORMATION AS FAR AS
- 16 OPPORTUNITIES LOOKING AT NATURE BASED AND WATER RECYCLING AND
- 17 WATER TREATMENT WHICH CAN GET EXPENSIVE AND COST THE BAY AREA
- 18 OVER \$10 BILLION. WE'RE WORKING AND LETTING THE SCIENCE LEAD
- 19 REGULATIONS BUT THIS IS SOMETHING YOU MAY HEAR MORE B I'M GLAD
- 20 TO SEE A FOG ONE DAY HERE IN THE BAY AREA BECAUSE WE'RE NOT
- 21 CLEAR WHAT TRIGGERED THE ALGAE BLOOM LAST SUMMER OR THIS
- 22 SUMMER BUT WE THINK SOME COMBINATION OF SUNNY DAYS, LESS WIND
- 23 ACTION, LESS SEDIMENT AND THIS PARTICULAR SPECIES HAVING A
- 24 TAIL AND BEING ABLE TO SWIM ALLOWED IT TO SPREAD THROUGHOUT
- 25 THE BAY AREA. NOT READY TO DECLARE VICTORY FOR THIS YEAR BUT



- 1 HOPEFULLY WE DON'T GET A BAD ALGAE BLOOM AS BAD AS LAST YEAR
- 2 JUST WANTED TO UPDATE YOU BECAUSE SAN FRANCISCO BAY IS SO
- 3 SPECIAL TO US LIVING HERE IN THE BAY AREA. THAT CONCLUDES MY
- 4 COMMENTS JUST TO SAY MYSELF AND OUR BOARD REALLY APPRECIATE
- 5 THE COLLABORATION WITH THE BAY AREA AGENCIES.

- 5 THIS. IT'S BEEN A VERY STAFF INTENSIVE EXERCISE TO DEVELOP
- 6 THIS INFORMATION THAT'S REALLY, YOU KNOW, IT'S BEEN AN EIGHT
- 7 MONTH PROJECT THAT WE SEE WILL SERVE AS A FOUNDATION FOR
- 8 ADVANCING BOTH INITIATIVES 1 AND 2 IN OUR WORK PLAN. AND THEN
- 9 A PART OF THAT WAS REALLY TO UNDERSTAND THE STATE OF TECHNICAL
- 10 ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE IN THE REGION CURRENTLY. SO, THE KINDS OF

- 4 PLAN? YOU KNOW, HOW DO WE CAPTURE WHAT'S NEEDED AROUND THESE
- 5 DIFFERENT HAZARDS AND WHAT'S THE REGIONAL ROLE IN SUPPORTING
- 6 COMMUNITIES AND MITIGATING THEIR RISK. SO, THERE IS A LOT OF
- 7 WORK THERE TO KIND OF FIGURE OUT AND WORK ON TOGETHER TO THINK
- 8 ABOUT WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE. AND, SO, THAT'S THE PROGRESS
- 9 THERE. HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS YOU HAVE. THERE WAS A LOT
- 10 OF INFORMATION TO THROW AT YOU THERE. AND YOU'RE GOING TO HEAR
- 11 ABOUT SOME PROGRESS ON INITIATIVE THREE AFTER ME TODAY. SO
- 12 WE'LL DELVE INTO THAT A LITTLE BIT. BUT I'M HAPPY TO ANSWER
- 13 ANY QUESTIONS. THANK YOU.
- 15 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU, ALLISON. ANY QUESTIONS FROM
- 16 BOARD MEMBERS? COMMISSIONER AHN?
- 18 EDDIE AHN: YES. THANKS FOR THIS PRESENTATION, ALLISON. I
- 19 NOTICED THERE WERE ESSENTIALLY TWO DEFINITIONS THAT WERE USED

- 21 AND THEN, OF COURSE, EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES WHICH I
- 22 PERCEIVE AS MORE OF AN MTC DEFINITION. ARE YOU TRYING TO BLEND

- 1 ALLISON BROOKS: FAIR QUESTION. BECAUSE I THINK WE TOGGLE
- 2 BETWEEN, YOU KNOW, THERE, IN THE PROPOSAL, THEY USE THE TERM
- 3 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. AND, SO, I THINK WE'RE ALSO TRYING
- 4 TO TIE IN THE FACT THAT, AS A REGION, WE HAVE BEEN THINKING

- 10 REFERRING TO CALENVIROSCREEN? A SPECIFIC PERCENTILE WAS MADE
- 11 BY THE STATE?

- 13 ALLISON BROOKS: YES. AND I WANT TO THANK JOSH AND I WERE
- 14 ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN THIS. THEY HAD THEIR OWN MAPS THAT WERE
- 15 REFERENCED IN THEIR COMMUNITIES THAT THEY SAW AS PART -- AS
- 16 BEING DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, IN REGIONS. AND I THINK, YOU
- 17 KNOW, WITH OUR EXPERIENCE WITH CALENVIROSCREEN, WE ALSO KNOW
- 18 THERE IS A LOT OF DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES IN THE BAY AREA
- 19 THAT EARLY ON WERE NOT ACKNOWLEDGED THROUGH THE -- THAT
- 20 CALENVIROSCREEN PROCESS. BUT I THINK THEY HAVE IMPROVED THAT
- 21 SOME.

- 23 EDDIE AHN: IT HAS IMPROVED. I THINK MY OWN PERSONAL
- 24 PERSPECTIVE, AND I HAVE COMMUNICATED THIS BOTH AT BCDC AND
- 25 MTC, IT STILL HAS A WAYS TO GO PARTICULARLY FOR THE CITY AND



- 1 COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO. IF YOU LOOK AT PARTS OF THE
- 2 SOUTHEAST, MISSION DISTRICT, CHINATOWN IS ENTIRELY LEFT OUT OF
- 3 CALENVIROSCREEN ITSELF. I THINK IT'S PROBLEMATIC. SO I WOULD
- 4 JUST BE CURIOUS, YOU KNOW, IT'S HARD TO SEE ON THIS MAP,
- 5 RIGHT, THE FONT IS SO SMALL, IF YOU CAN WEAVE THAT NEEDLE. I
- 6 TO LIKE MTC'S EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES DEFINITION MORE. SO
- 7 IF THERE IS OPPORTUNITY IF AND WHEN YOU GET THIS PROPOSAL TO
- 8 USE THAT DEFINITION. THAT WOULD BE BETTER.

- 10 ALLISON BROOKS: EARLY ON WE HAD A JOINT LETTER FROM AGENCIES
- 11 FROM ALL AGENCIES IN CALENVIROSCREEN AND KNOW HOW IT DIDN'T
- 12 REPRESENT A LOT OF THE COMMUNITIES AS WE KNOW ARE VULNERABLE
- 13 IN THE BAY AREA REGION. SO DEFINITELY THAT'S SOMETHING WE NEED
- 14 TO BE ON TOP OF.

16 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: VICE CHAIR WASSERMAN?

- 18 V. CHAIR, ZACK WASSERMAN: I WOULD ECHO COMMISSIONER AHN'S
- 19 REMARKS BUT MAYBE MAKE THEM EVEN MORE STRONGLY AND THIS IS AN
- 20 ISSUE MANY OF US HAVE DEALT WITH IN OUR RESPECTIVE BODIES,

- 8 EDDIE AHN: AND I APPRECIATE CHAIR WASSERMAN'S COMMENT. THE
- 9 ADDITIONAL COMMUNITIES I WOULD SHOUT OUT IN THE BCDC FRAMEWORK
- 10 ARE UNDER THE ART MAPPING TOOL, ADAPTING TO RISING TODAYS
- 11 TOOL, ALVISO, MARIN, NORTH BAY I MEAN THERE ARE SO MANY
- 12 COMPANIES THROUGHOUT THE BAY AREA THAT ARE NOT CAPTURED BY
- 13 CALENVIROSCREEN. SO I UNDERSTAND THE BUREAUCRATIC AROUND THAT
- 14 MAPPING TODAY I DON'T WANT TO SUCCUMB TO IT EITHER. THANK YOU.

- 16 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: JUST A QUESTION ON THE \$3 MILLION
- 17 REGIONAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM WHICH IS GREAT I MEAN
- 18 IT'S REFERENCED IN THE SLIDE THERE WILL BE FOCUS ON RESOURCING
- 19 COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS WILL THERE BE AN ELEMENT FOR
- 20 GOVERNMENT AGENCIES AS WELL?

- 22 ALLISON BROOKS: THE WAY WE RECOGNIZED IT IS OVER 3 MILLION OF
- 23 THE GRANT WOULD GO TO COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS. WE HAVE
- 24 OUTLINED THE OTHER PARTNERS HOW THE KINDS OF RESOURCES THAT



- 1 THEY WOULD GET. BUT WE DON'T HAVE A LOT GOING TO GOVERNMENT
- 2 AGENCIES.

- 6 ALLISON BROOKS: AND PART OF THIS IS, YOU KNOW, WE HAVE HEARD A
- 7 LOT FROM COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS OF THEIR NEED FOR
- 8 CAPACITY BUILDING AND GROWING THEIR CAPACITY. AND WE HOPE THE
- 9 STATE ACTUALLY SEES IN THIS PROPOSAL OUR COMMITMENT TO DOING
- 10 THAT. AND A LOT OF PROPOSAL WE DIDN'T GO INTO THE GREAT DETAIL
- 11 OF HOW THIS IS GOING TO WORK IN SPECIFIC COMMUNITIES. BECAUSE
- 12 THE OTHER THING WE HEAR FROM OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERS REGULARLY
- 13 IS THEY NEED TO BE AT THE ABLE TO DESIGN THE APPROACH AND THE
- 14 WORK IN THE COMMUNITIES THAT WE'RE WORKING IN, AND WITH THEM,

- 19 THESE STRATEGIES. THAT COULD INFORM OUR REGIONAL, KIND OF, WAY
- 20 AND APPROACH OF PROVIDING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.

- 23 OUESTION. I SEE THE LIST OF PARTNERS ON SLIDE FOUR.

- 1 ALLISON BROOKS: WELL, FIRST UP IS CRAIG BOSMAN FROM MTC WHO
- 2 HAS REALLY BEEN LEADING THE EFFORT ON THE MTC'S MEGA PROJECT,
- 3 ZERO-EMISSIONS BUS, PROJECT DELIVERY AND INFRASTRUCTURE AND
- 4 THIS IS A DIRECTIVE THROUGH CARB TO 35 THIS. SO, THANKS,
- 5 CRAIG, FOR BEING HERE. BECAUSE THIS IS A COMPLICATED PROJECT.
- 6 SO THANKS FOR GIVING US AN UPDATE.

- 8 CRAIG BOSMAN: THAT IT IS GOOD MORNING BOARD MEMBERS CRAIG
- 9 BOSMAN MTC FUNDING POLICY PROGRAM SECTION. THIS IS AN UPDATE
- 10 ON OUR ZERO EMISSION TRANSIT TRANSITION STRATEGY. WHICH IS IN
- 11 PROGRESS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AS A REMINDER, THE CALIFORNIA AIR
- 12 RESOURCES BOARD HAS SOMETHING CALLED THE INNOVATIVE CLEAN
- 13 TRANSIT RULE OR ICT WHICH REQUIRES TRANSIT AGENCIES TO
- 14 TRANSITION TO 100% ZERO EMISSION BUS FLEET BY 2040. AND THAT
- 15 IS IMPLEMENTED THROUGH PURCHASING REQUIREMENTS WHICH ARE NOW
- 16 UNDERWAY. SO, LARGE OPERATORS, CURRENTLY, 25% OF THE BUSES
- 17 THAT THEY BUY HAVE TO BE ZERO-EMISSIONS. AND THAT WILL RAMP UP
- 18 TO 100% BY 2029. FOR SMALL OPERATORS, THE REQUIREMENTS KICK IN
- 19 2026, AND ALSO RAMP UP TO 100% AT 2029. OPERATORS HAVE TO
- 20 SUBMIT ROLL-OUT PLANS FOR HOW THEY'RE GOING TO ACCOMPLISH THIS
- 21 TO CARB. THE SMALL OPERATORS SUBMITTED THOSE A COUPLE OF YEARS
- 22 AGO -- SORRY -- LARGE OPERATORS SUBMITTED A COUPLE OF YEARS
- 23 AGO, SMALL OPERATORS BY THIS SUMMER. AND THE MAJORITY OF
- 24 OPERATORS IN THE REGION HAVE INITIAL 0 EMISSION BUS
- 25 DEPLOYMENTS OUT IN SERVICE. THIS STRATEGY IS ALSO LOOKING AT



- 1 FERRIES. CARB ALSO HAS A COMMERCIAL HARBOR CRAFT REGULATION
- 2 WHICH WAS RECENTLY UPDATED TO LOWER EMISSION FERRY FLEETS. I'M
- 3 NOT GOING TO TOUCH ON THAT TOO MUCH IN THIS PRESENTATION BUT
- 4 THE GOLDEN GATE FERRY FLEET PLAN TO COMPLY WITH THIS BY
- 5 REPLACING THEIR FERRY FLEET OVER THE NEXT SEVERAL YEARS WITH
- 6 LOWER EMISSION FERRIES THAT MEETS THE REQUIREMENT AND WETA
- 7 PLAN TO DO SO THROUGH THE COMBINATION OF BATTERY ELECTRIC
- 8 FERRIES AND FERRIES THAT TOTAL WILL MEET THE REQUIREMENT. NEXT
- 9 SLIDE. THE STRATEGY SURRENDER WAY IN PARTNERSHIP WITH MTC,
- 10 BARC, AND TRANSIT OPERATORS TO DEVELOP A STRATEGY FOR VEHICLES
- 11 AND INFRASTRUCTURE THAT FOCUSES ON IDENTIFYING THE CHALLENGES
- 12 AND THE OPPORTUNITIES WE HAVE AT THE REGIONAL AND LOCAL
- 13 LEVELS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SOME OF THE PRINCIPLES THAT ARE
- 14 GUIDING THIS STRATEGY ARE TOO TRANSITION IN PARTNERSHIP NOT
- 15 ONLY WITH THOSE THAT I JUST MENTIONED WITH THE COUNTIES, THE
- 16 STATE, AND THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO ACCELERATE THE ELEMENTS,
- 17 TO FOCUS OUR FACILITY INVESTMENTS ON INFRASTRUCTURE THAT'S
- 18 READY FOR ZERO-EMISSIONS, TO MAKE SURE THAT WE KEEP IN MIND
- 19 SUPPORTING A DYNAMIC BUS SYSTEM THAT SERVES LOCAL ROUTES, KEY
- 20 TRUNK CORRIDORS AND THE EXPRESS LANE NETWORK AND TO EVALUATE
- 21 AND MANAGE RISK THROUGH THE THIS WHOLE TRANSITION. NEXT SLIDE,
- 22 PLEASE. RIGHT NOW THERE ARE OVER 450 ZERO-EMISSIONS BUSES
- 23 DEPLOYED THROUGHOUT THE REGION ACROSS 12 AGENCIES THAT'S 10%
- 24 OF THE REGION'S FLEET. A LARGE PORTION OF THAT ARE ELECTRIC
- 25 TROLLEYS THAT MUNI RUNS, HAS BEEN RUNNING FOR A LONG TIME. BUT



- 1 WE ALSO HAVE 130 BATTERY ELECTRIC BUSES AND 40 HYDROGEN
- 2 FUELCELL ELECTRIC BUSES. THESE BUSES MOSTLY CHARGE UP OR FUEL
- 3 UP AT THE BUS DEPOT, THE YARD THEY'RE STORED AT, AND THERE IS
- 4 A LIMITED NUMBER OF ON ROUTE CHARGING FOR EXAMPLE, CAN'T
- 5 CONNECTION AT WALNUT CREEK BART STATION. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.
- 6 THE FIRST -- I'M GOING TO GET INTO SOME OF THE EARLY KEY
- 7 FINDINGS FROM OUR INITIAL DELIVERABLE WHICH IS THE
- 8 SUMMARIZATION OF THE CURRENT AGENCY PLANS, WE HAVE BEEN
- 9 REVIEWING THOSE ROLL OUT PLANS, TALKING TO ALL THE OPERATORS.
- 10 THESE ROLL OUT PLANS ARE CONSTANTLY INFLUX AS THE MARKET
- 11 CHANGES, AND AS OPERATORS REALLY FINE TUNE THEIR
- 12 IMPLEMENTATION PLANS. WE SEE THAT, IN THE FUTURE, WE'LL HAVE
- 13 SIGNIFICANT NUMBERS OF BOTH BATTERY ELECTRIC AND FUELCELL
- 14 BUSES. A MAJORITY, IN THE REGION, ARE BATTERY ELECTRIC, BUT A
- 15 SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF FUELCELL. SOME AGENCIES ARE COMMITTED TO
- 16 ONE OR BOTH TECHNOLOGIES AND OTHERS ARE STILL ASSESSING WHAT
- 17 THEIR FLEET IS GOING TO LOOK LIKE IN TEN OR SO YEARS. THERE IS
- 18 A PRIMARY FOCUS ON CONTINUING THE DEPOT BASED CHARGING AND
- 19 FUELING WITH SOME STRONG INTEREST IN STRATEGIC ON ROUTE
- 20 CHARGING, OPPORTUNITY CHARGING ALONG THE ROUTE, AND NECESSARY
- 21 POP-UPS TO GET BACK TO THE DEPOT. THE OVERALL COST IS BEING
- 22 REFINED. THERE IS A LOT OF MOVING PARTS. BUT IT'S GOING TO BE
- 23 IN THE HIGH SINGLE DIGIT BILLIONS OF DOLLARS. AS ALLISON
- 24 MENTIONED IT'S A MEGA PROJECT, VERY EXPENSIVE TO MAKE THIS
- 25 TRANSITION. A COUPLE OF KEY FACTORS ARE VEHICLES THEMSELVES,



- 1 WE HAVE SEEN SIGNIFICANT COST INFLATION IN THE VEHICLE MARKET.
- 2 DELTA BETWEEN DIESEL OR DIESEL HYBRID BUSES AND ZERO-EMISSIONS
- 3 BUSES IS NOT SHRINKING. IN FACT IT'S MAYBE GETTING WORSE.
- 4 BATTERY ELECTRIC BUSES ARE EASILY OVER \$1 MILLION NOW AND
- 5 FUELCELL BUSES APPROACHING A MILLION AND A HALF DOLLARS. THERE
- 6 ARE COMPLEX FACILITY PROJECTS AS THE FLEET GETS CLOSER TO
- 7 100%. WHEN YOU ARE ADDING ONE OR TWO BUSES AS A PILOT, AND YOU
- 8 CAN ADD IN ONE OR TWO CHARGERS, IT'S NOT SO SIGNIFICANT. BUT
- 9 AS YOU LOOK AT FULLY REBUILDING YOUR FACILITIES, AND ADDING
- 10 ALL THE POWER, ALL THE CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE, PERHAPS ADDING
- 11 HYDROGEN FUELING LOCATIONS, THE COST RISES AND GETS VERY
- 12 COMPLEX. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. WE'RE LOOKING AT RISKS IN THIS
- 13 STUDY AND THERE IS A LOT. I THINK THE TWO TO HIGHLIGHT RIGHT
- 14 NOW ARE SCHEDULE AND BUDGET. SO, ON THE SCHEDULE, YOU KNOW,
- 15 THERE IS A RISK THAT THE TIMELINE OF THE FACILITY
- 16 INFRASTRUCTURE GETS DELAYED. AND THAT IMPACTS AN OPERATOR'S
- 17 ABILITY TO PURCHASE THE BUSES IF THEY DON'T HAVE THE PROPER
- 18 PLACE TO STORE THEM AND RECHARGE OR FUEL THEM. ONE ELEMENT OF
- 19 THIS IS THE UTILITY CAPACITY. IF THERE IS, YOU KNOW,
- 20 INSUFFICIENT GRID POWER AVAILABLE ON THE REQUIRED TIME FRAME,
- 21 YOU KNOW, THE FACILITY, EVEN IF THEY'RE ABLE TO COMPLETE THE
- 22 CIVIL ELEMENTS, THE CHARGING ELEMENTS, GETTING THAT POWER IN
- 23 COULD BE A RISK TO THE SCHEDULE. AND THEN WE KNOW THAT THERE
- 24 IS A BUDGETARY RISK. RIGHT NOW, WE PROJECT A GAP IN THE
- 25 BILLIONS OF DOLLARS. AGAIN, THIS WILL BE FURTHER FINE TUNED AS



- 1 THE STUDY GOES ON. BUT WE KNOW THEY'RE ALREADY INEFFICIENT AND
- 2 AS THE CAPITAL AND OPERATING COSTS GROW THAT GAP COULD GET
- 3 WIDER AS FUNDING SOURCES MAY NOT FOLLOW. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.
- 4 ANOTHER THING THAT THE STUDY IS LOOKING AT IS COLLABORATION

- 8 DEPLOYING ZERO-EMISSIONS BUSES. COLLABORATION ON VEHICLE
- 9 PURCHASES, THIS IS SOMETHING OPERATORS HAVE BEEN ABLE DO FOR A
- 10 LONG TIME BUT AS THEY LEARN ABOUT NEW TECHNOLOGY SUPERVISOR
- 11 TALK TO EACH OTHER, WE ANTICIPATE SOME OPPORTUNITIES FOR JOINT
- 12 PROCUREMENTS AND, YOU KNOW, FINDINGS EFFICIENCIES THERE. ALSO
- 13 COLLABORATION ON HYDROGEN FUEL PROCUREMENT AS HYDROGEN BUSES
- 14 ROLL OUT MORE WIDELY THERE IS GOING TO BE A NEED TO FIND
- 15 FUELING LOCATIONS PERHAPS ON-SITE IN CERTAIN LOCATIONS AND
- 16 COLLABORATION ON THE PROCUREMENT OF THOSE. AND DEFINITELY
- 17 INTER-AGENCY COORDINATION ON INTERAGENCY COORDINATION ON
- 18 SHARED ROUTE CHARGES SO THERE COULD BE TRANSIT HUBS OTHER
- 19 PLACES THAT MULTIPLE BUS SERVICE COME TOGETHER THERE IS A LOT
- 20 OF WORK TO BE DONE TO FIGURE OUT HOW THE SCHEDULE IS GOING TO
- 21 WORK, WHEN ONE OPERATOR OR ANOTHER GOES OUT ALL OF THOSE
- 22 FACTOR TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT. NEXT SLIDE. I WANT TO TALK ABOUT
- 23 FUNDING. SO MTC TYPICALLY FUNDS THE MAJORITY OF REPLACEMENT
- 24 VEHICLE COSTS THROUGH FTA FORMULA FUNDS, TRANSIT RAPID COST
- 25 ESCALATION EARLIER IS GOING TO START HAVING SOME STRAIN ON



- 1 THAT VEHICLES AS PART OF THE PERCENTAGE OF OVERALL TRANSITION
- 2 ARE HIGHEST COST. THERE IS ALSO SIGNIFICANT NEEDS FOR
- 3 FACILITIES AND CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE. LOOKING OUTSIDE OUR
- 4 TYPICAL FORMULA FUNDING. THE RECENT PERFORMANCE IN THE REGION
- 5 AND FTA DISCRETIONARY BUS FUNDING WAS STRONG WE GOT 7% OF THE
- 6 NATION-WIDE TOTAL BUT THAT'S 110 MILLION AND IF WE HAVE A
- 7 FUNDING GAP IN THE BILLIONS WE'RE GOING TO NEED TO CONTINUE

- 15 THOSE WAYS WE CAN COLLABORATE TO FUND VARIOUS ELEMENTS OF THIS
- 16 TRANSITION. NEXT SLIDE. AS WE GET FURTHER INTO THE STUDY WE'LL
- 17 REFINE THE COST ESTIMATE AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE FUNDING
- 18 STRATEGY FURTHER ANALYZING TECHNICAL APPROACHES AND
- 19 COMPATIBLE, LOOKING AT FEASIBILITY OF SHARED INFRASTRUCTURE
- 20 THROUGHOUT THE REGION. WE'LL BE ANALYZING CONSIDERATIONS ABOUT
- 21 INTEROPERABILITY AND EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS. WE'LL BE
- 22 DEVELOPING MAPS OF EXISTING AND PLANNED FALLACIES, HUBS, AND
- 23 CHARGING AND FUELING LOCATIONS, AND FURTHER ANALYZING THE
- 24 REGIONAL TUNES AND CHALLENGES. SO, I THINK I'M HAPPY TO TAKE



- 1 ANY QUESTIONS NOW, OR PASS IT ON TO MY COLLEAGUES, WHO WILL BE
- 2 GETTING FURTHER INTO ZERO-EMISSIONS STUFF.

- 5 PARATRANSIT FOR VANS, AND, ALSO, AS OTHER REGULATIONS COME
- 6 INTO PLAY ON SMALLER VEHICLES, TEA WILL BRING SOME OF THEIR
- 7 OWN CHALLENGES WITH THE ELECTRIFICATION. SO, I THINK IT'S --
- 8 IT'S KIND OF BOTH SIDES. IT'S LOOKING AT THE RIGHT SIZE AND

THE MAIN GOAL OF THIS SOLICITATION IS TO FUND THE INSTALLATION OR EXPANSION OF 17 PERMANENT ELECTRIC CHANGING INFRASTRUCTURE THAT WAS SPURRED, 18 THE DEPLOYMENT OF ZERO EMISSION VEHICLES AND EQUIPMENT IN THE 19 BAY AREA. THE FOCUS OF THIS SOLICITATION IS ON HEAVY-DUTY 20 21 VEHICLE EQUIPMENT SECTOR. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. ELIGIBLE 22 PROJECTS ARE ELECTRIC CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE THAT SUPPORTS 23 ALL CATEGORIES OF HEAVY-DUTY ELECTRIC VEHICLES AND EQUIPMENT FOR EXAMPLE, ON ROAD VEHICLES WITH GROSS VEHICLE WEIGHT RATING 24

- 11 PROJECTS THROUGH A SEPARATE PROGRAM CALLED CHARGE. AND CHARGE
- 12 TYPICALLY OPENS ANNUALLY IN THE FALL. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. HERE
- 13 IS A HIGH-LEVEL SUMMARY OF FUNDING THAT'S AVAILABLE. THE AIR
- 14 DISTRICT MAY AWARD FUNDING FROM ANY OF THIS AVAILABLE GRANT
- 15 REVENUE SOURCES SUCH AS CARL MOYER AND THE TRANSPORTATION FUND
- 16 FOR CLEAN AIR. A TOTAL OF \$30 MILLION IS AVAILABLE 80% OF THE
- 17 FUNDS WILL BE AWARDED TO PROJECTS THAT REDUCE EMISSIONS IN THE
- 18 AIR DISTRICT'S PRIORITY COMMUNITIES TO SOLICITATION FUND AT
- 19 LEAST SEVEN SITES. THE MAXIMUM AWARD PER SITE IS \$5 MILLION
- 20 AND MINIMUM AWARD PER SITE IS \$50 MILLION. MAXIMUM AWARD TO A
- 21 SINGLE APPLICANT IS \$15 MILLION, HOWEVER THERE IS NO CAP ON
- 22 THE NUMBER OF SITES APPLICANTS CAN APPLY FOR AND COFUNDING
- 23 WITH OTHER SOURCES IS TO ALLOW AS LONG AS REQUIREMENTS OF ALL
- 24 PROGRAMS ARE MET. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THIS TABLE SHOWS THE
- 25 MAXIMUM FUNDING PERCENTAGES BASED ON WEATHER THE PROJECT IS IN



- 1 A DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITY AND OTHER ATTRIBUTES. I WON'T GO
- 2 INTO TOO MUCH DETAIL ON THIS SLIDE, BUT YOU CAN SEE THAT THE
- 3 MAXIMUM FUNDING PERCENTAGES RANGES FROM 50% TO 100%. NEXT
- 4 SLIDE, PLEASE. THIS IS OUR TENTATIVE PROGRAM SCHEDULE. THE
- 5 SOLICITATION OPENED IN JULY AND CLOSED THIS PAST TUESDAY. SO,
- 6 WE'RE CURRENTLY EVALUATING. BY JANUARY OF NEXT YEAR WE'RE
- 7 HOPING TO HAVE OUR INITIAL EVALUATIONS AND RANKING COMPLETED
- 8 TO BE ABLE TO BRING TO THE AIR DISTRICT BOARD DIRECTORS. AND
- 9 IDEALLY WE WANT TO BE CONTRACTING BY THE END OF FEBRUARY. ALL
- 10 CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE MUST BE INSTALLED AND IN PLACED INTO
- 11 SERVICE WITHIN TWO YEARS FROM WINDOW OF NOTICED AWARD ISSUED.
- 12 AND GRANTEES MUST MEET THEIR USAGE REQUIREMENT AND SUBMIT
- 13 THEIR FINAL REPORT IN SPRING OF 2029. SO THAT CONCLUDES MY
- 14 PRESENTATION. HAPPY TO ANSWER QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE.

- 3 COMMUNITIES WE'RE ACTUALLY REFERRING TO THE AIR DISTRICT'S

- 5 COMMUNITIES. YOU KNOW, THEY INCLUDE WEST OAKLAND, EAST

- 11 EDDIE AHN: IT'S SB535. THIS IS EDDIE AHN AGAIN. I KNOW MORE

- 13 THEY'RE USING WHAT'S TERMED AT THE CALIFORNIA AIR RESOURCES
- 14 LEVEL, THE PRIORITY POPULATION DEFINITION THAT'S A CAPITAL P,
- 15 CAPITAL PRIORITY, CAPITAL POPULATIONS. THAT IS, ACTUALLY, A
- 16 MUCH MORE COMPREHENSIVE DEFINITION. AND I THINK THE CHALLENGE,

- 17 JAMES P. SPERING: YEAH, JUST -- I MEAN, SOME OF THOSE
- 18 EXAMPLES, I DON'T THINK REALLY APPLY IN A LOT OF THE
- 19 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. YOU KNOW, IT SEEMS TO ME THAT WE'RE
- 20 LOSING SITE OF THE VERY PEOPLE WE'RE TRYING TO SERVE. AND I

- 2 DEPENDING ON COMING TO FRUITION IN 20 -- ALL OF A SUDDEN
- 3 WEREN'T THERE ANYMORE. AND THAT MEANT THAT ONE THAT WAS REALLY
- 4 AN UPHILL BATTLE TO SECURE GENERAL FUND RESOURCES IN THIS

- 17 RESOURCES SO WE WERE ABLE TO SECURE BOTH THOSE PRIOR YEAR
- 18 COMMITMENTS TO TRANSIT CAPITAL RESOURCES THE STATE WAS ABLE TO
- 19 DO THAT WHICH IS GOING ENABLE THE BAY AREA TO LEVERAGE
- 20 BILLIONS AND BILLIONS OF FEDERAL INFRASTRUCTURE DOLLARS FOR
- 21 MAJOR TRANSIT PROJECTS ACROSS THE REGION. THE LEGISLATURE ALSO
- 22 PROVIDED ABOUT A BILLION DOLLARS IN NEW MONEY FOR TRANSIT
- 23 OPERATIONS. THAT MONEY CAME OVER A PERIOD OF YEARS. SORT OF,
- 24 THE SAME SITUATION WE SAW IN PREVIOUS BUDGET CYCLES WHERE THEY
- 25 SAID WE'RE GOING TO GIVE YOU A BILLION DOLLARS, BUT ONLY A



- 1 TINY BIT THIS YEAR AND YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE TO COME BACK TO US
- 2 IN FUTURE YEARS AND ASK FOR IT AGAIN. SO IT'S PRETTY SOLID BUT
- 3 IT'S DEFINITELY GOING TO BE AN AREA OF FOCUS IN FUTURE YEARS.
- 4 WHAT THAT ALSO MEAN IS THAT IN THE NEAR-TERM, MTC HAS BEEN
- 5 GIVEN THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR DIVVYING UP THOSE OPERATIONS
- 6 RESOURCES AND, ALSO, THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR IMPLEMENTING AN
- 7 OVERSIGHT OF SOME ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES THAT THE LEGISLATURE
- 8 PUT INTO THOSE RESOURCES. SO, THERE IS GOING TO BE A LOT OF
- 9 BACK AND FORTH AT THE LEGISLATURE OVER THE NEXT COUPLE OF
- 10 YEARS TO MAINTAIN THIS LIFELINE. LET'S SEE. I CAN MOVE ON
- 11 QUICKLY. I THINK THE OTHER PIECE THAT OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR
- 12 BROUGHT UP WAS, REALLY, THERE IS ALSO AN EFFORT IN LOOKING
- 13 INTO SACRAMENTO AROUND WHAT'S THE LONG-TERM PLAN FOR FINANCIAL
- 14 SUSTAINABILITY IT'S GOING TO BE A BIG FOCUS OVER THE NEXT
- 15 SEVERAL YEARS AS WELL. MOVING ON TO CLIMATE IT'S A PRETTY BIG
- 16 CONTRAST THE STATE THIS YEAR DID NOT FUND CLIMATE PROGRAMS
- 17 ANYTHING CLOSE TO THE LEVELS WERE COMMITTED IN PRIOR YEAR
- 18 BUDGETS THE BUDGET ACTUALLY RESCINDED HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS OF
- 19 DOLLARS IN CLIMATE FUNDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE HAD
- 20 APPROPRIATED LAST YEAR BUT HADN'T BEEN SPENT YET SO THEY
- 21 CLAWED THAT BACK AND THEN THE IDEA WAS LEGISLATURE AND
- 22 GOVERNOR WERE COLLECTIVELY SUPPORTING GOING TO THE VOTERS AND
- 23 BRINGING A STATEWIDE GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND TO HELP BACKFILL
- 24 SOME OF THOSE COMMITMENTS THAT LEADS US TO THE SECOND TAKE
- 25 AWAY WHICH IS PART OF THE BIGGER TREND THAT WE SAW IN



- 1 SACRAMENTO THIS YEAR WITH THE STATE LOOKING AT GO BONDS THEY
- 2 PUT OUT \$200 BILLION WORTH OF PROPOSED BONDS THIS YEAR AND
- 3 LOCAL MEASURES TO FUND SOME OF THE PRIORITIES THEY PREVIOUSLY
- 4 HAD BEEN ABLE TO FUND THROUGH THE GENERAL FUND HOW DID THAT
- 5 PLAY OUT? WELL FIRST THE LEGISLATURE DID TAKE A BIG STEP
- 6 FORWARD TO EMPOWER LOCAL, OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR WALKED
- 7 THROUGH THAT WITH MEMBER AGUIAR-CURRY'S ASSEMBLY
- 8 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. SO, THAT MEANS THE GOVERNOR HAVE TO
- 9 SIGN THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SO WITH SENATE PASSAGE
- 10 YESTERDAY, YEAH, LAST DAY, IT'S GOING TO GO TO VOTERS IN
- 11 NOVEMBER 2024. SO, THAT COULD POTENTIALLY BE VERY BIG STEP
- 12 TOWARDS SUPPORTING SELF-HELP. ON THE STATE BONDS PIECE, THEY
- 13 ENDED UP WITH A TWO PART DEAL TO NARROW DOWN THOSE \$200
- 14 BILLION WORTH OF BONDS THAT THEY HAVE BEEN CONSIDERING. AND SO
- 15 THE GOVERNOR'S TOP PRIORITY IN THIS SPACE WAS TO GO TO MARCH
- 16 2024 BALLOT WITH A MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE SUPPORT
- 17 MEASURE THAT WOULD CREATE 10,000 BEDS FOR INDIVIDUALS
- 18 EXPERIENCING SEVERE MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES AND STRUGGLING WITH
- 19 SUBSTANCE ABUSE CHALLENGES. LEADERS IN THE LEGISLATURE HAD
- 20 ALSO ENDED UP COALESCING BEHIND THE TENS OF BILLIONS OF
- 21 DOLLARS IN BONDS FOR CLIMATE BONDS THAT WOULD REPLACE SOME OF
- 22 THE PRIOR YEAR COMMITMENTS, HOUSING AND SCHOOLS, THOSE ENDED
- 23 UP COALESCING AS THE TOP PRIORITIES. AND WHAT'S INTERESTING
- 24 AND DIFFERENT THIS YEAR IS THAT MARCH 2024 IS, SORT OF, THE
- 25 IDEAL TIMING THAT FOLKS ARE LOOKING AT BRINGING BOND MEASURES



- 1 TO THE BALLOT. BECAUSE THE TURN-OUT IS EXPECTED TO BE LARGE
- 2 WITH THE SENATE -- U.S. SENATE PRIMARY HAPPENING IN MARCH.
- 3 WHAT ENDED UP, BACK IN-ROOM NEGOTIATIONS, THEY DECIDED TO MOVE
- 4 FORWARD THE GOVERNOR MENTAL HEALTH BONDS TO GET PLACED ON THE
- 5 MARCH 2024 BALLOT AND PULL BACK ALL OF THE OTHER STATEWIDE
- 6 BOND MEASURES THAT ARE GOING TO BE CONTINUOUSLY NEGOTIATED
- 7 OVER THIS WINTER AND EARLY SPRING, THOSE BOND MEASURES MIGHT
- 8 GO TO THE NOVEMBER 2024 BALLOT. SO, THERE WILL BE MORE WORK IN
- 9 THAT SPACE AND MORE TO BRING BACK TO YOU ALL TO DISCUSS AND
- 10 SHARE UPDATES. SO THAT'S REALLY WHAT HAPPENED ON THE MONEY
- 11 SIDE. [LAUGHTER] IT'S AN INTERESTING SPACE TO BE IN WITH THE
- 12 LEGISLATURE FEELING A TIGHT SQUEEZE WHILE WE'RE ALL HERE STILL
- 13 SEEING SUCH AN UNPRECEDENTED AMOUNT OF RESOURCES COMING OUT
- 14 THAT ARE AVAILABLE THROUGH THE FEDS AND STATE THAT WERE
- 15 COMMITTED IN PRIOR YEARS. SO I THINK IT'S REALLY STRATEGIC
- 16 THAT EVERYONE IS BEING VERY AGGRESSIVE AND GOING AFTER GRANT
- 17 RESOURCES AND, YOU KNOW, MAKING SURE WE CAN BRING AS MUCH AS
- 18 WE CAN BACK TO THE BAY AREA NOW. BECAUSE NOW IS THE TIME.

- 2 FOR THAT BILL AND URGE SIGNATURE. AND, OBVIOUSLY, THE
- 3 CONVERSATION ON TRANSIT FUNDING IS ONGOING. ARE THERE ANY
- 4 OTHER QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS? ANY QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS FROM
- 5 MEMBERS ON ZOOM? I DON'T SEE ANY HAND RAISED. THANK YOU VERY
- 6 MUCH, GEORGIA. THANKS FOR ALL YOUR WORK THIS LEGISLATIVE
- 7 SESSION. I GUESS IT'S NOT OVER, NOW THAT WE HAVE TO FOCUS ON
- 8 THE BILLS BEING SIGNED. BUT REALLY APPRECIATE ALL YOUR
