I ABSOLUTELY 6 LOVE SEEING YOU ALL USE YOUR DELAY IN A PRODUCTIVE WAY, 7 8 GETTING TO KNOW EACH OTHER. I REALLY, REALLY -- I JUST LOVE IT. IT'S GREAT. SO, I'M GOING TO GET THROUGH SOME 9 TECHNICALITIES AS WE'RE GETTING PEOPLE IN FROM THE OUTSIDE. A 10 LOT OF THEM ARE JUST BORING TO START WITH, AND THAT IS THIS 11 MEETING IS BEING WEBCAST ON THE ABAG WEB SITE. MEMBERS OF THE 12 PUBLIC PARTICIPATING BY ZOOM WHO WOULD LIKE TO GIVE PUBLIC 13 COMMENT ON ANY AGENDA ITEM CAN RAISE THEIR HAND OR USE -- OR 14 15 DIAL STAR NINE. MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC IN THE BOARDROOM SHOULD 16 FORM A LINE RIGHT OVER HERE BY THE MICS, AND THE CLERK WILL CALL UPON YOU TO SPEAK. SO, NOW WE CAN GET TO THE ORDER OF 17 BUSINESS TODAY. AND GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS BELIA RAMOS, AND 18 I HAVE THE HONOR OF SERVING AS YOUR PRESIDENT OF THE 19 ASSOCIATION OF BAY AREA GOVERNMENTS, AND I WANT TO WELCOME YOU 20 TO THIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY FOR 2025. WHEN I -- [APPLAUSE] WHEN I 21 THINK ABOUT WHAT BRINGS US HERE, AND WE, THIS MORNING THROUGH 22 THIS VERY DIFFICULT OUORUM CALL, ACTUALLY ARE EXPERIENCING THE 23 HISTORY OF ABAG. ABAG WAS FORMED IN 1961, ITS ORIGINAL 24 HEADQUARTERS WERE NOT THIS GOVERNMENT STUFFY, THEY WERE THE 25

SWANKY CLAREMONT HOTEL AND THE REASON WHY ALL HERE IS BECAUSE 1 OUR PREDECESSORS IN 1961 FELT THAT AS REGIONS WE ALL HAVE SO 2 3 MUCH IN COMMON AND DRAW UPON EACH OTHER AND LEARN FROM EACH OTHER AND TO FACE OUR CHALLENGES TOGETHER. SO I WANT TO 4 5 ACKNOWLEDGE YOU, YOU ARE BUSY, YOU HAVE JOBS, YOU HAVE YOUR ELECTED APPOINTMENT AND CAPACITIES AND YOU ARE HERE ON THIS 6 BEAUTIFUL FRIDAY MORNING IN SAN FRANCISCO TO DO THE WORK OF 7 8 THE REGION. I ALWAYS LIKE TO SAY YOU KNOW, WE IN THE BAY AREA LEAD, WHEN PEOPLE SAY CAM CAL LEADS, GUESS WHAT? IT'S RIGHT 9 HERE IN CALIFORNIA, THE BAY AREA, SOME INCREDIBLE DECISIONS 10 HERE AT THE ASSOCIATION OF BAY AREA GOVERNMENTS WHEN IT COMES 11 TO THE ENVIRONMENT STEWARDS OF OUR OPEN SPACE AND HOUSING AND 12 POLICIES AND WE ARE PUSHING THE ENVELOPE AND WE'RE BEING 13 PROGRESSIVE AND WE ARE OWNING OUR HISTORY OF WHAT WE HAVE NOT 14 DONE WELL IN THE PAST, AND FORGING FORWARD. I WANT TO JUST 15 16 TAKE A MOMENT AND ACKNOWLEDGE ALL OF YOU, ACKNOWLEDGE ALL OF YOU 101 CITIES IN NINE BAY AREA COUNTIES THAT'S NOT GOING TO 17 GET CONSENSUS ON BUT YET WE HAVE DONE IT TIME AND TIME AGAIN 18 HERE AT THE ASSOCIATION OF BAY AREA GOVERNMENTS. NOW BEFORE I 19 GET IN TROUBLE, I'M GOING TO GO BACK TO THE SCRIPT, BECAUSE, 20 21 YOU KNOW, STAFF SPENT TIME ON IT. I WOULD INVITE YOU ALL TO PLEASE JOIN ME IN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE. [ PLEDGE OF 22 ALLEGIANCE ] "I PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG OF THE UNITED 23 STATES OF AMERICA, AND TO THE REPUBLIC FOR WHICH IT STANDS, 24 ONE NATION UNDER GOD, INDIVISIBLE, WITH LIBERTY AND JUSTICE 25

FOR ALL." THANK YOU. YOU MIGHT RECALL THAT LAST YEAR WE WERE, 1 2 FOR THOSE OF YOU THAT WERE ABLE TO JOIN US, AND BY SHOW OF HANDS, DO WE HAVE NEW ABAG REPS HERE IN THE ROOM? NEW PEOPLE? 3 LOOK AT THAT. WELCOME, CLASS OF 2025, TO ABAG. UPGRADED THIS 4 5 YEAR. LAST YEAR WE WERE AT THE OAKLAND MUSEUM WE WERE ABOUT TO DO THE PLEDGE AND I HAD TO BRING IT UP ON MY PHONE I HAD TO 6 SHOW YOU ALL THE FLAG SO WE CAN PLEDGE, AND AT OUR HOME TURF, 7 8 I APPRECIATE STAFF HAS TWO FLAGS IN THE ROOM I BROUGHT MY BACKUPS JUST IN CASE THEY'RE ON MY FEET, AND JUST SO MY 9 CHILDREN TOLD ME TO REMIND ALL OF YOU JUST IN CASE WE DON'T 10 HAVE A FLAG I CAN ALWAYS WEAR ONE DAZZLED ON MY FEET. COOL 11 THINGS WE'RE GOING TO GO THROUGH TODAY WE'RE GOING TO GO 12 THROUGH OUR ANNUAL BUDGET AND WORK PROGRAM RIGHT THIS IS LIKE 13 YOUR COUNTY AND CITY BUDGET THIS IS WHAT SETS THE PACE FOR 14 15 EVERYTHING WE'RE GOING TO DO AT ASSOCIATION OF BAY AREA 16 GOVERNMENTS AND I'M GOING TO INVITE OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANDREW FREMIER TO GIVE A REPORT THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S 17 REPORT IN A MOMENT. I WANT TO WELCOME OUR CLERK EXTRAORDINARY, 18 FRED CASTRO, WE HAVE OUR ABAG COUNSEL, KATHLEEN KANE, AND WE 19 HAVE OUR FINANCE DIRECTOR DEREK HANSEL. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH MOVING TO AGENDA ITEM 15 16 4A PLY PLEASURE TO WELCOME YOU HERE TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AT 17 YOUR HOME THE BAY AREA METRO CENTER HERE AT 375 BEALE STREET I APPRECIATE ALL OF YOU ACKNOWLEDGE HERE TODAY AND I'VE GOING TO 18 GIVE A RUN DOWN ABOUT WHAT'S GOING TO HAPPEN, WE HAVE LAST 19 YEAR'S MINUTES THAT WE ARE GOING TO APPROVE IF YOU WERE NOT 20 21 PART OF THE ASSEMBLY LAST YEAR YOU CAN STILL VOTE ON THEM AS LONG AS YOU HAVE READ THEM AND BELIEVE THEM TO BE TRUE BASED 22 UPON INFORMATION THAT YOU KNOW. SO, WE NEED TO CHANGE THAT AND A FEW OTHER THINGS THAT ARE INCLUDED, AND WE HAVE OUR COUNSEL WHOLE HELP US WALK 4 5 THROUGH THAT, I WANTED TO FLAG THAT FOR YOU AS AN IMPORTANT ITEM TO BRING ABAG FORWARD IN 2025 AND BE ABLE TO CONDUCT 6 BUSINESS IN AN ORDERLY AND TRANSPARENT FASHION. I HOPE YOU 7 8 TOOK A LOOK AT ALL THE BOARDS OUTSIDE BY THE FOOD, THEY WERE IN ANOTHER ROOM. WE LOOK AT THE BOARDS THEY DISPLAY THE WORK 9 WE DO IT'S INCREDIBLE, THE WORK THAT ABAG DOES STARTED WITH 10 INTEREST AND EXPANDED TO THINGS LIKE ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP AND 11 MANAGEMENT OF TRAILS AND OPEN SPACE AND MAKING SURE THAT WE'RE 12 SUPPORTING OUR JURISDICTIONS THROUGH THEIR HOUSING ELEMENTS SO 13 PLEASE DO GO AND LOOK AT ALL THE WORK THAT ABAG DOES IT'S 14 15 REALLY KIND OF INCREDIBLE AFTER LUNCH WE'RE GOING TO HAVE AN 16 EXCITING SESSION ON, I THINK THE BEST WAY TO EXPLAIN IT, IT'S GOT THIS VERY, VERY GOVERNMENT TITLE OF REGIONAL TOOLS TO 17 POWER LOCAL SOLUTIONS. LIKE, THAT'S WHAT IT'S CALLED BUT WHAT 18 IT REALLY MEANS IS HOW DO YOUR ABAG DUES TURN INTO MORE MONEY 19 FOR YOU AND YOUR JURISDICTIONS WHEN YOU ARE A SMALL 20 JURISDICTION YOU ONLY HAVE SO MUCH STAFF CAPACITY BUT THERE IS 21 SO MUCH WE CAN UNLOCK AND THERE ARE SO MANY OPPORTUNITIES FOR 22 US WHETHER IN THE SPACE OF HOUSING, WHETHER IT'S 23 INFRASTRUCTURE, WHETHER IT'S ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS THAT ARE 24 GOING FORWARD AND REALLY WE'RE GOING TO TALK IN THE LUNCHTIME 25

SEGMENT ABOUT HOW OTHER JURISDICTIONS HAVE DONE THAT AND HOW 1 YOU CAN BRING THAT HOME AND I THINK WHEN YOU LOOK AT, YOU 2 3 KNOW, WHEN YOU CONTRIBUTE TO ONE OF THESE REGIONAL AGENCIES, YOU KNOW, WHAT'S IN IT FOR YOU, RIGHT? YOU HAVE GOT TO BE ABLE 4 5 TO JUSTIFY THE DUES. YOU HAVE GOT TO BE ABLE TO JUSTIFY THE PARTICIPATION. MOTION PASSES UNANIMOUSLY 9 BY ALL MEMBERS PRESENT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. MOVING ON TO 10 AGENDA ITEM SEVEN. THIS IS YOUR 2025, 2026 OPERATING BUDGET 11 AND WORK PROGRAM. AND BEFORE I HAND IT OVER TO OUR CHIEF 12 FINANCIAL OFFICER, DEREK HANSEL, I'M GOING TO SAY A COUPLE 13 WORDS AND THEN HAND IT OVER TO MY VICE PRESIDENT. 5 V. PRES. CARLOS ROMERO: I THINK THE PRESIDENT, AND THANK YOU ALL FOR COMING, GOOD MORNING. I THINK THE PRESIDENT HAS 6 SUMMARIZED IT WELL. WE KNEW AND WE KNOW THAT THE FINANCES OF 7 8 THIS ORGANIZATION ARE IMPORTANT TO ALL OF US. BECAUSE WE DON'T WANT TO BURDEN CITIES WITH ADDITIONAL COSTS. AS YOU WILL 9 NOTICE THIS YEAR, THERE IS ONLY A 3% INCREASE IN DUES, IN THE 10 PAST WE HAVE HAD TO INCREASE DUES 10% EVERY YEAR, SO WE ARE 11 TRYING TO CONTROL COSTS AND AT THE SAME TIME FIND OUT WAYS TO 12 COVER THOSE PENSION OBLIGATIONS THAT WE HAVE WORKING WITH OUR 13 DIRECTOR OF FINANCE WE HAVE IDENTIFIED OPTIONS THAT HAVE BEEN 14 15 DESCRIBED VERY WELL, I THINK BY THE PRESIDENT, WE DO HAVE A 16 SUBCOMMITTEE OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE WHICH IS COMPRISED OF COUNCILMEMBER ECKLUND, MOTOYAMA, AND THERE IS EVEN A 17 SUBCOMMITTEE OF THAT GROUP LOOKING AT THE OWNERSHIP STRUCTURE 18 OF THIS BUILDING AND TYING TO FIGURE OUT IF WE CAN MONETIZE A 19 PIECE OF THAT SO WE CAN INDEED REDUCE THIS DEBT AND NOT HAVE 20 21 TO BURDEN THE CITIES AND THE COUNTIES. WE ALL KNOW THAT WE'RE ALL IN SOMETIMES PRECARIOUS FINANCIAL SITUATIONS THAT WE'LL BE 22 ABLE TO REDUCE SOME OF THAT DEBT. AND OUR STAFF HAS COME UP 23 WITH SOME CREATIVE WAYS THAT WE'LL BE REVIEWING AT THE 24 25 SUBCOMMITTEE, FINANCE COMMITTEE, AND EXECUTIVE BOARD, AND

ULTIMATELY BACK TO THIS BODY WE'RE LOOKING AT SEPTEMBER 1 OCTOBER DATE TO HAVE SOME OF THESE OPTIONS PUT DOWN ON PAPER 2 3 AND ANALYZED BY OUR OUTSIDE CONSULTANT WE WANT TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE A GOOD SET OF AYES THAT'S NOT NECESSARILY ASSOCIATED WITH 4 5 THE MTC SIDE OF THE HOUSE WHICH WE WORK WITH CLOSELY, WE WANT TO MAKE SURE WE PROTECT THIS ASSET, AND IF WE'RE GOING TO SELL 6 IT OR DO SOMETHING TO MONETIZE IT, WE THE NINE CANDIDATES AND 7 8 101 CITIES ARE GETTING THE MOST EFFECTIVE USE OF THE BUILDING. SO, STAY TUNED. BUT WE'RE ON TOP OF THIS. WE PROMISED TO DO 9 THIS WHEN PRESIDENT ARREGUIN WAS HERE. IT WAS A VERY DIFFICULT 10 TIME AT THAT TIME, AND WE HAVE FULL AGENDAIZED IT AND I'M 11 HAPPY TO SAY THAT OUR DIRECTOR OF FINANCE HAS BEEN PUTTING 12 FORWARD A NUMBER OF OPTIONS THAT WE COULD PURSUE TO REDUCE 13 THAT DEBT AND MAKE SURE THOSE LIABILITIES ARE NOT TRANSFERRED 14 TO ALL OF US, I SHOULDN'T SAY YOU -- ALL OF US. SO THANK YOU 15 16 WITH THAT AND I'LL HAND IT BACK TO THE PRESIDENT.

18 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: HAND IT OVER TO MR. HANSEL FOR THE WORKPLAN19 AND BUDGET PRESENTATION.

21 DEREK HANSEL: THANK YOU PRESIDENT RAMOS AND VICE PRESIDENT 22 ROMERO. GOOD MORNING DELEGATES IF WE CAN PULL UP THE NEXT 23 SLIDE PLEASE. BOTH PRESIDENT RAMOS AND VICE PRESIDENT ROMERO 24 LAID OUT THE CHALLENGES THAT WE SEE AND BEFORE WE DIG INTO THE 25 BUDGET AND WORK PROGRAM JUST WANT TO HIGHLIGHT SOME OF THE

ADMINISTRATIVE FINANCIAL CHALLENGES THAT WE DO HAVE ASSOCIATED 1 WITH ABAG THIS WILL SOUND FAMILIAR TO A FEW FOR THOSE FOLKS 2 WHO ARE NEW WELCOME TO A SIGNIFICANT PENSION LIABILITY. 3 ACCORDING TO CALPERS 2023, ACTUARIAL EVALUATION AND IF YOU SEE 4 5 THESE IN YOUR CITIES OR COUNTIES, YOU WILL KNOW THERE IS KIND OF THIS WEIRD EVERY OTHER YEAR PROCESS THAT CALPERS DOES. BUT 6 AT THAT TIME CALPERS CALCULATED OUR UNFUNDED ACCRUED LIABILITY 7 8 FOR THE PENSION COST OF ABOUT \$18 MILLION. SO, FOR AN AGENCY OF THIS SIZE, WITH THE BUDGET THAT WE HAVE, TO PRESIDENT 9 10 RAMOS'S POINT, WHEN YOU DON'T HAVE EMPLOYEES AND YOU DON'T HAVE PAYROLL, AND YOU HAVE GOT AN UNFUNDED PENSION LIABILITY 11 OF \$18 MILLION, YOU HAVE GOT A PROBLEM. AND SO IT IS A REAL 12 PROBLEM. IT'S ONE THAT WE HAVE BEEN LOOKING AT ADDRESSING, 13 FRANKLY, FOR SOME LONG TIME. IT'S GOT SUBSTANTIAL CHALLENGES 14 15 ASSOCIATED WITH IT. AGAIN, TO PRESIDENT RAMOS'S POINT, THIS IS 16 ALL FOUR FOLKS WHO HAVE RETIRED FROM ABAG. AND I WOULD JUST 17 NOTE, ALL OF THEM RETIRED NO LATER THAN 2017. SO, THESE ARE EMPLOYEES WHO ARE EMPLOYEES OF ABAG A LONG TIME AGO. THIS IS 18 NOT ASSOCIATED WITH ANY CURRENT WORK BEING DONE BY MTC STAFF 19 WHO ARE STAFFING THE VARIOUS PROGRAMS FOR ABAG. THIS IS ALL 20 FOR FOLKS WHO WERE WITH THE AGENCY, BACK, MANY YEARS BEFORE 21 2017, WHOSE SERVICE CONCLUDED BY 2017 BACK WHEN ABAG WAS AN 22 INDEPENDENT AGENCY OF ITS OWN. SO, IT IS A REAL CHALLENGE. 23 THAT PENSION PLAN REQUIRES MINIMUM ANNUAL CONTRIBUTIONS OF 24 \$2.3 MILLION THROUGH 2034. AGAIN, THOSE OF YOU WHO ARE SEEING 25

THESE IN YOUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES KNOW THAT THERE IS A 1 REASONABLE AMOUNT OF VOLATILITY IN CALPERS RESULTS AND, AGAIN, 2 3 THE PROBLEM FOR US IS WHEN WE DON'T HAVE OTHER LARGE COMPONENTS OF A BUDGET TO MUTE THAT VOLATILITY, IT CAN LEAD TO 4 5 VERY WILD SWINGS IN THE BUDGET REQUIREMENTS. TODAY, FOR FISCAL ' 26, THE PROPOSED BUDGET HAS A PAYMENT TO CALPERS WHICH 6 REQUIRES 72% OF ALL OF THE MEMBERSHIP DUES. SO, MORE THAN 70% 7 8 OF THE DUES WE'RE PROPOSING TO HAVE YOU PAY GO TO WORK THAT WAS DONE PRIOR TO 2017. STRAIGHT UP. THAT'S JUST, 9 UNFORTUNATELY, THE WAY IT IS. IT IS ALSO THE CASE THAT MTC IS 10 CURRENTLY SUBSIDIZING SHARED SERVICES COST FOR ABAG IN EXCESS 11 OF THOSE REOUIREMENTS UNDER THE CONTRACT FOR SERVICES. THAT 12 WAS REVVED TO BY PRESIDENT RAMOS, A CONTRACT FOR SERVICES, 13 THAT WAS ASSOCIATED WITH A STAFF MERGER, AND AS PART OF THAT, 14 15 THERE WAS AN AGREEMENT AS TO HOW CERTAIN SHARED SERVICES WOULD 16 BE ALLOCATED AMONG MTC AND ABAG, THINGS LIKE TECHNOLOGY, OTHER KIND OF OVERHEAD. AND MTC IS ACTUALLY SHARING THAT IN EXCESS 17 OF THAT. AND, FINALLY, THE ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET STILL DOESN'T 18 FACTOR IN STAFFING COSTS WHICH ARE ASSOCIATED WITH PROVIDING 19 ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES. SO, WHEN YOU LOOK AT THE BUDGETS YOU 20 21 WILL SEE STAFFING COSTS ALLOCATE TO THE PROGRAM BAYREN HAS STAFFING CONTRA COSTA ASSOCIATED TO IT IS FTP HAS ABAG POWER, 22 ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET DOES NOT ABAG ADMIN IS NOT PAYING FOR 23 INSTANCE FOR ME OR MR. CASTRO OR FREMIER WE DON'T ALLOCATE ANY 24 OF THOSE EXPENSES THAT WAY. THERE ARE SERVICES THAT ARE COMING 25

THROUGH THAT WAY BUT THEY ARE NOT CHARGED TO THE 1 2 ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, WHAT DOES THAT 3 BUDGET LOOK LIKE? AS VICE PRESIDENT ROMERO NOTED WE DO HAVE A BUDGET WHERE WE'RE PROPOSING MEMBERSHIP DUES INCREASE OF 3%, 4 5 THAT DOES FOLLOW A COUPLE YEARS OF 10% INCREASES WHERE WE'RE TRYING TO KIND OF GET CAUGHT UP A LITTLE BIT. I'LL EXPLAIN HOW 6 WE WERE ABLE TO HOLD IT AT 3% THIS YEAR. THAT'S PROBABLY NOT -7 8 - THERE IS NOT A PERMANENT SOLUTION TO THAT PROBLEM IN THE WAY THAT WE ADDRESSED IT THIS YEAR. BUT, AGAIN, WE CAN TALK ABOUT 9 THAT A LITTLE BIT. NOTE THAT THE PENSION OBLIGATIONS INCREASED 10 BY 8%. AGAIN, THERE IS GOING TO BE A HIGH DEGREE OF VOLATILITY 11 WITH THAT. THIS PAST YEAR, SO FISCAL YEAR '24'S CALPERS 12 RESULTS WERE PRETTY DECENT. THAT GETS ANY ASSESS OVER THEIR 13 EXPECTED RESULTS GET FLOWED IN OVER KIND OF A LEVELLING 14 15 PROCESS. WE'LL SEE HOW FISCAL '25 ENDS UP. I THINK THERE'S, 16 EVEN IN THIS, ESSENTIALLY, WEEK AND A HALF, THERE IS STILL PROBABLY SOME RECKONING YET TO DO. SO, WE'LL SEE. WHAT WE HAVE 17 DONE TO BE ABLE TO ESSENTIALLY BRING THAT BUDGET TOGETHER WAS 18 WE TOOK \$160,000 FROM ABAG FAN. SO, AGAIN, FOLKS WHO MAY BE 19 AWARE, THERE'S -- ABAG, LONG AGO, SET UP A CONDUIT BOND 20 21 ISSUER, AND COLLECTS EXCESS REVENUE -- COLLECTS REVENUES ASSOCIATED WITH THE MAINTENANCE OF THAT CONDUIT ON PORTFOLIO, 22 THERE HAVE BEEN KIND OF ESSENTIALLY RETAINED EARNINGS IN FAN. 23 AND, SO, THE BOARD AGREED TO TRANSFER \$160,000 OF THOSE 24 RETAINED EARNINGS OVER TO ABAG FOR THE PURPOSES OF KIND OF 25

KEEPING THIS BUDGET WHOLE. THERE IS, AFTER ALL OF THAT, A 1 2 \$291,000 DEFICIT. THAT IS GOING TO BE FUNDED BY ANTICIPATED 3 SAVINGS IN THE BUDGET EXPENSES FOR FISCAL '24/'25. SO, GOOD NEWS. FISCAL '25 IS GOING TO COME IN BETTER THAN WE THOUGHT IT 4 5 WOULD. SO WE'RE ESSENTIALLY KIND OF ROLLING THAT OVER THAT BETTER INTO THE BUDGET FOR NEXT YEAR. THAT SAID THERE 6 CONTINUES TO BE A REALLY CHALLENGING FINANCIAL POSITION IN THE 7 8 UPCOMING YEARS. YOU HAVE HEARD ABOUT THE CHALLENGING POSITION THIS YEAR, IT'S KIND OF THE SAME. FRANKLY, AS LONG AS THE 9 PENSION EXPENSE RUNS ALONG THIS LINE, AND THAT'S GOING TO BE 10 FOR MANY YEARS YET TO COME, WE'RE IN THE SAME BOAT. AND THE 11 PROBLEM IS THEN, GEE, AND, AGAIN, I THINK TO PRESIDENT RAMOS'S 12 POINT, YOU KNOW, ARE YOU GETTING VALUE FOR MONEY? IT MAY NOT 13 FEEL LIKE IT WHEN 70% OF YOUR DUES ARE GOING FOR THIS PENSION 14 15 PROBLEM. WE'RE REALLY TRYING TO, FIRST, MAKE SURE THAT 16 EVERYBODY IS FULLY EDUCATED ON WHERE ARE YOUR DUES GOING, AND SECOND HOPEFULLY LOOK AT THAT BALANCE OF THE 28% AND YOU SAY, 17 OH, OKAY, YEAH, I REALLY AM GETTING VALUE FOR MONEY ON THAT 18 28%, AND THE OTHER 70 IS GOING FOR STUFF I SPENT MANY, MANY 19 YEARS AGO. SO, THAT IS THE ABAG ADMINISTRATION BUDGET. AND IF 20 21 WE CAN GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE? SO, LET'S TALK ABOUT THE PROGRAMS. THESE ARE THE FUN ONES. MUCH HAPPIER NEWS. SO, BAY 22 AREA REGIONAL ENERGY NETWORK, BAYREN. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO, 23 YOU CAN SEE SOME OF THOSE SIGNS OUTSIDE. WE'RE TALKING ABOUT 24 25 WHAT BAYREN DOES, AND WE HAVE GOT STAFF HERE WHO CAN TALK

ABOUT IT MUCH MORE FLUENTLY THAN I CAN. SO I'LL JUST TALK 1 ABOUT THE NUMBERS. FIRST OF ALL, BAYREN, LIKE SFEP, IS A SELF-2 3 BALANCING PROGRAM THAT IS, RUN SURPLUS RUN DEFICIT IT'S ALL GRANT FUNDED MAIN SOURCE OF REVENUE IS A GRANT FROM CPUC. WE 4 5 PARTNER WITH A VARIETY OF FOLKS ACROSS THE REGION. YOU WILL SEE IN THIS BUDGET THAT IT'S A VERY SUBSTANTIAL JUMP FROM 6 FISCAL '25. THAT DIDN'T MEAN WE HAVE GOT A WHOLE LOT MORE 7 8 REVENUE. IT MEANS WE DIDN'T SPEND AS MUCH AS WE ANTICIPATED IN FISCAL '25 SO IT ESSENTIALLY JUST ROLLS OUT, ESSENTIALLY IT'S 9 A REBUDGET. SO THERE WAS SLOWER THAN ANTICIPATED EXPENDITURE 10 IN FISCAL '25. THAT WILL ROLLOVER AND GO INTO THAT. THE 11 SIGNIFICANT INCREASE TO CONSULTANT INCENTIVES EXPENSES, AGAIN, 12 THAT'S KIND OF UNENCUMBERED CARRYOVER, NOTHING TO WORRY ABOUT 13 THAT'S KIND OF NORMAL IN THIS KIND OF PROGRAM AND AGAIN THE 14 15 WHOLE THING IS SELF-BALANCING. WE DO HAVE, AS I SAID, STAFF 16 COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS PROGRAM AND THAT'S WHERE WE DO REPRESENT THE VARIOUS STAFF THAT ARE SUPPORTING THIS AND YOU 17 WILL SEE THEN IN THE NEXT ONE, SFEP. SO, NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. 18 AND SFEP, AGAIN, VARIOUS STANDS OUT THERE DESCRIBING ALL THE 19 GOOD WORK THAT THE ESTUARY AREAE PARTNERSHIP DOES. AND GRANT 20 21 FUNDING ON THE REVENUE SIDE COMING IN FROM THE STATE AND FEDERAL EPA SOURCES CERTAINLY THAT IS AN AREA OF NOTE, AND WE 22 HAVE TALKED ABOUT IT A LOT FRANKLY ON THE MTC SIDE, IN THE 23 CURRENT FEDERAL ENVIRONMENT THERE IS ALWAYS CONCERN ABOUT 24 WHAT'S GOING ON. THAT IS AN AREA THAT WE'RE MONITORING VERY, 25

VERY CLOSELY, FRANKLY, ON AN AGENCY-WIDE BASIS, NOT JUST SFEP 1 2 STAFF, BUT WE HAVE GOT AN EXECUTIVE TEAM WHO IS CONTINUING TO 3 MONITOR THAT AND MEET ON A BIWEEKLY BASIS TO ENSURE THAT WE KNOW WHAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS DOING, HOW THIS COULD 4 5 POTENTIALLY AFFECT US, AND THAT'S WHETHER IT'S EPA GRANTS OR TRANSPORTATION GRANTS, PLANNING GRANTS, YOU NAME IT SO REALLY 6 WATCHING OUT FOR THAT AND NOT JUST, FRANKLY, ARE THE DIRECT 7 8 FUNDING THAT'S COMING TO OUR AGENCIES BUT ALSO WHAT MAY HAPPEN REGION-WIDE AND MAKING SURE THAT AGAIN WE'RE ON TOP OF THAT 9 AND EDUCATING AS APPROPRIATE. AGAIN, SELF-BALANCING BUDGET. 10 THERE ARE ADDITIONAL STAFF COSTS THAT ARE INTENDED TO SUPPORT 11 NEW PROGRAMS, ESPECIALLY ON THE WETLANDS REGIONAL MONITORING 12 AND WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENT FUND GRANTS. AND I WOULD NOTE 13 THERE IS A SEPARATE \$450,000 SFEP CONFERENCE BUDGET THAT IS 14 15 INCLUDED IN ALL THE ATTACHMENTS. AND THAT IS FUNDED BY 16 DONATIONS AND CONFERENCE REGISTRATIONS. SO, NEXT SLIDE. I THINK WE WENT BACK ONE. THERE WE GO. WITH THAT, WE DO 17 RECOMMEND TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND REOUEST THAT YOU 18 APPROVAL ABAG RESOLUTION NUMBER 7-2025 APPROVING THIS FISCAL 19 '26 OPERATING BUDGET AND THE WORK PROGRAM. AND WITH THAT, I'M 20 21 AVAILABLE TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS.

THIS NOT ONLY AFFECTS ABAG BUT ALL OF OUR 1 COUNTIES AND CITIES AND I WANT TO ASK A QUESTION REGARDING 2 3 PENSION OBLIGATIONS AND I UNDERSTAND THE FORMULA IS THEY USE, THEY HAVE TO DEAL WITH THE ACTUARIAL CHARTS AND THEIR 4 5 LIABILITIES, BUT IS THERE ANY PUSH IN REVIEWING THOSE 6 FORMULAS, THIS IS BECOMING AN INCREASINGLY BIGGER AND BIGGER OBLIGATION OF LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES. I'M GOING TO SAY I DON'T THINK 7 8 THAT'S COOL ANYMORE. GOT YOUR QUORUM IN BEFORE 10:00 A.M., AND THE COUNTIES, WE 1 WERE WAITING ON ONE PERSON, AND WE ACTUALLY COULD NOT EVEN 2 3 INVOKE EMERGENCY PROCEDURES THROUGH AB2449 BECAUSE WE DIDN'T HAVE MAJORITY, BECAUSE COUNSEL, IF I'M CORRECT, THE LANGUAGE 4 5 FOR OUORUM OF THIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY SAYS OUORUM IS A MAJORITY OF THE TOWNS AND CITIES AND A MAJORITY OF THE COUNTIES, AS 6 OPPOSED TO A MAJORITY OF THE CITIES, TOWNS, AND COUNTIES. YOU 7 8 SEE THE DIFFERENCE? SO, THE CITIES ALL HAD TO SHOW UP, AND THE COUNTIES ALL HAD TO SHOW UP, AND NO ONE CAN INVOKE EMERGENCY 9 PROCEDURES THAT ARE NOW ALLOWED TO US THROUGH AB2449 BECAUSE 10 WE HAVE ONE TOO MANY MAJORITY WORDS IN THERE. IT'S EVERY SINGLE ELECTED OFFICIAL IN THE BAY AREA. YOU CAN IMAGINE THE 4 5 ADMINISTRATIVE PROBLEM THAT THAT CREATES. AND THEN IT'S ALSO A COMPLETE LACK OF TRANSPARENCY, WHICH IS NOT CONSISTENT WITH 6 MODERN STANDARDS. I'LL ALSO NOTE THAT MY OFFICE HAS RECEIVED 7 8 COMMUNICATIONS ABOUT THE PROBLEMS WITH THIS FORMAT FROM COUNTY COUNSEL AND YOUR CITY ATTORNEYS. SO WE DO NEED TO TAKE ACTION 9 ON THIS. THERE ARE OTHER THINGS WHERE I'M A LITTLE MORE 10 AGNOSTIC JUST BECAUSE MY ROLE AS STAFF BUT ON THAT ONE I 11 IMPLORE YOU TO MAKE CHANGE AND TRANSPARENT MORE CONSISTENT 12 WITH THE BROWN ACT. THE TIME HAS COME. ALSO NOTE THE SECRET 13 BALLOT ELECTION PROCEDURES HAVE NOT HAD TO BE INVOKED FOR THE 14 LAST COUPLE ELECTIONS SINCE I HAVE BEEN IN THIS ROLE BECAUSE 15 16 WHEN YOU DON'T HAVE A CONTESTED ELECTION YOU DON'T NEED TO DO SECRET BALLOT SO IT'S BEEN SOME YEARS SINCE WE HAVE HAD TO DO 17 THAT BUT WANT TO MAKE SURE IN ANTICIPATION OF FUTURE STATES 18 THAT WE ADDRESS IT. WITH YOUR INDULGENCE I'M GOING TO WALK US 19 THROUGH KIND OF IN ORDER AS THEY APPEAR IN THE BYLAWS THE 20 21 CHANGES WE WANT TO MAKE. FIRST ONE IN THE DEFINITION SECTION WE WANT TO BROADEN THE DEFINITION OF THE IMMEDIATE PAST 22 PRESIDENT. IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT IS A DESIGNATED ROLE THAT 23 DOES THINGS UNDER THE BYLAWS IT'S AN AUTOMATIC SEAT ON CERTAIN 24 25 COMMITTEES AND HAS CERTAIN POWERS. RIGHT NOW WE DON'T HAVE

ANYBODY WHO IF IT'S THAT DEFINITION. OUR IMMEDIATE PAST 1 PRESIDENT IS NOW SERVING US IN SACRAMENTO IN THE LEGISLATURE. 2 3 SO, WITH THAT, WE HAVE A PAST PRESIDENT WHO IS STILL SERVING ON ABAG BUT NOT THE IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT. SO, WE WANT TO 4 5 BROADEN THE DEFINITION SUCH THAT IF WE'RE IN A SITUATION, AS WE ARE NOW, SUPERVISOR RABBITT, WHO IS THE MOST RECENT SITTING 6 PAST -- YOU KNOW, AVAILABLE PAST PRESIDENT, CAN SERVE THAT 7 8 ROLE. OTHERWISE WE FIND OURSELVES WITH KIND OF A CONUNDRUM WHERE THERE ARE DUTIES FOR THIS PERSON BUT THEY MAY NOT EXIST. 9 YOU WILL FIND THAT CHANGE IT'S ADDING ITEM G TO THE 10 DEFINITIONS AND IT'S JUST IDENTIFYING THAT WE LOOK BACK FOR A 11 PAST PRESIDENT AND IF ONE IS NOT AVAILABLE, SOMEONE MAY BE 12 PROMOTED INTO THAT ROLE JUST DURING THE TERM NECESSARY, SO 13 THAT THAT -- THE POWERS OF THAT -- OF THAT POSITION ARE NOT 14 15 VACANT. AND THEN SCROLLING FORWARD HERE. OUR NEXT CHANGE IS TO 16 ARTICLE SIX GENERAL ASSEMBLY MEMBERSHIP. IT'S ADDING A 17 PARAGRAPH FIVE, AS PRESIDENT RAMOS JUST DISCUSSED, SAYING THAT IF YOU'RE A JURISDICTION WHO HAS A MEMBER OF THE EXECUTIVE 18 DIRECTOR THAT PERSON SHOULD SERVE AS THE DELEGATE TO THE 19 GENERAL ASSEMBLY, ALTHOUGH YOU CAN STILL APPOINT ALTERNATES SO 20 21 IF THAT PERSON CAN'T COME OR DECIDES NOT TO COME, ANOTHER MEMBER OF YOUR POINTING BODY CAN ATTEND IN THEIR STEAD. THE 22 POINT OF THAT AS DISCUSSED AT THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IS TO MAKE 23 SURE THERE IS SOME CONTINUITY OF UNDERSTANDING FROM THE, SORT 24 OF, DAY-TO-DAY WORK THAT THE EXECUTIVE BOARD UNDER TAKES WITH 25

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY IT'S A LOT TO DIGEST THERE WILL STILL BE 1 A NUMBER OF JURISDICTIONS WHO AREN'T REPRESENTED DIRECTLY ON 2 3 THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, AND SO THERE WILL BE A MIXTURE OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE MORE DAY-TO-DAY EXPERIENCE OF THE WORK OF ABAG AND 4 5 PEOPLE WHO ARE, YOU KNOW, ONE TIME A YEAR ATTENDEES AT THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. SO I'M GOING TO RUN THROUGH THESE AND THEN 6 WE CAN TAKE OUESTIONS AND DISCUSSION AT THE END. THE NEXT 7 8 CHANGE IS THE ONE TO VOTING THAT WAS JUST DISCUSSED. SO, CURRENTLY IT SAYS IN ARTICLE EIGHT, VOTING, PARAGRAPH A, 9 10 SUBSECTION ONE, A QUORUM OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL CONSIST OF A MAJORITY OF THE CITY DELEGATES AND A MAJORITY OF THE 11 COUNTY DELEGATES. SO, IN ORDER TO ADDRESS THE PROBLEM THAT WE 12 NARROWLY MISSED HAVING THIS MORNING OF NOT BEING ABLE TO 13 14 CONVENE THE MEETING AT ALL BECAUSE SOMEONE WAS DELAYED IN 15 TRAFFIC OR WHATEVER THE SITUATION IS FROM ONE OR THE OTHER 16 GROUP OF PEOPLE, THE SUGGESTION IS TO TAKE OUT THAT SECOND MAJORITY OF AND HAVE IT READ, INSTEAD, A QUORUM OF THE GENERAL 17 ASSEMBLY SHALL CONSIST OF A MAJORITY OF THE CITY AND COUNTY 18 DELEGATES SO PUT THOSE TOGETHER SO THAT IF WE HAVE A MAJORITY 19 OF THE REQUIRED CORPUS, ALL OF YOU, WE CAN AT LEAST CONVENE 20 21 THE MEETING. NOW NOTE THAT THE VOTING PROCEDURE STILL REQUIRE COUNTIES AND CITIES TO VOTE SEPARATELY ON ITEMS. SO, THIS WILL 22 NOT CHANGE THAT. IT MEANS THAT WE CAN STILL CONVENE A MEETING 23 AND HAVE A DISCUSSION ABOUT THE ITEMS THAT WERE AGENDAIZED. IT 24 DOES NOT AGGREGATE THE NEED FOR SEPARATE VOTES OF THE COUNTIES 25

AND OF THE CITIES TO PASS AN ITEM SO WE WILL STILL NEED TO DO 1 THAT. SO DO WE HAVE A QUESTION -- DO YOU WANT TO HOLD UNTIL 2 3 THE END? OKAY I JUST WANT TO GET THEM ALL TOGETHER. SO THAT IS THE SUGGESTION EDIT AND THAT IS NOT IN YOUR PAPERS THAT 4 5 INSPIRED REAL EVENTS THIS MORNING, I WANT TO CAPTURE IS BECAUSE WE HAVE EVERYBODY HERE AND NOT ABLE TO CONVENE THE 6 MEETING BECAUSE SOMEBODY GOT STUCK BEHIND A CAR WRECK OR 7 8 SOMETHING LIKE THAT. PROCEEDING DOWNWARD, THE BIG CHANGE HERE AS DISCUSSED IS TO ARTICLE NINE, OFFICERS, ELECTIONS, AND 9 VACANCIES. B. THESE CHANGES PROPOSE A WHOLE NEW WAY OF 10 ELECTING THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT. AND WHAT THEY 11 SUGGEST IS THAT THE PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT BE SELECTED 12 FROM AMONG THE MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, SUBJECT TO 13 RATIFICATION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. IF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY 14 DOES NOT -- CANNOT CONVENE, THEN THE PEOPLE WHO WERE ELECTED 15 16 BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD CAN KIND OF SERVE UNTIL THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY CAN BE CONVENED AND RATIFIED. IF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY 17 SAYS NO, WE'RE HERE, WE'RE CONVENED WE DON'T WANT TO RATIFY, 18 WE DON'T LIKE WHO YOU ELECTED. THEN THE EXECUTIVE BOARD HAS TO 19 SUBSTITUTE TWO OTHER PEOPLE FOR THOSE ROLES SUBJECT TO 20 21 RATIFICATION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY WHEN THAT CAN HAPPEN. THE POINT OF THAT IS TO MAKE THE RATIFICATION BY THE GENERAL 22 ASSEMBLY A MEANINGFUL VOTE, IT IS NOT JUST A RUBBER STAMP. IT 23 DOES -- THERE ARE CONSEQUENCES IF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY VOTES 24 AGAINST THE PEOPLE SELECTED BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD. BUT IT 25

DOES ALLOW THE EXECUTIVE BOARD TO KIND OF UNDERSTAND WHO IS 1 MOST, YOU KNOW, CURRENTLY INVOLVED IN THE ONGOING BUSINESS OF 2 3 ABAG, SELECT AMONG THOSE PEOPLE MOVE FORWARD AND KEEP THE BUSINESS OF THE AGENCY MOVING. ONE OF THE VULNERABILITIES WE 4 5 HAVE IS THAT THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY IS DIFFICULT TO GET TOGETHER, RIGHT? I MEAN, IT'S HARD ON ALL OF YOU TO COME FROM 6 EVERYWHERE ACROSS THE NINE COUNTIES HERE, IT'S DIFFICULT TO 7 8 GET THOSE QUORUMS SO WE NEED TO BE ABLE TO DO SOMETHING TO ENSURE THAT THESE POSITIONS CAN BE FILLED AND OPERATING, YOU 9 KNOW, IN THE INTERIM, IF WE'RE NOT ABLE TO GET THE GENERAL 10 ASSEMBLY TOGETHER. SO, THAT IS THE BIG CHANGE FROM THE PRIOR 11 12 SECRET BALLOT FORMAT THAT WAS WELL DEBATED BY MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD WHEN THIS CAME UP IN MAY. THERE ARE ALSO 13 PROCEDURAL CHANGES ABOUT TIMING. SO, ONE OF THE PROBLEMS WE 14 HAD UNDER THE PRIOR FORMAT WAS THAT THE ELECTION OF THE 15 16 PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT WERE OFF CENTER FROM THE GENERAL 17 ASSEMBLY. SO, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY HAPPENS IN JUNE, AND THE TERMS WERE STARTING IN JANUARY AND THERE WAS THIS MISMATCH. 18 NOW IT IS BEING REALIGNED WITH THE SUGGESTION THAT THE 19 EXECUTIVE BOARD DO ITS ELECTION, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY RATIFY, 20 AND THEN THE TERMS START JULY 1ST SO THAT THE PEOPLE YOU JUST 21 RATIFIED ARE THE ONES WHO ARE LEADING THE AGENCY WITHIN WEEKS 22 OF YOUR ACTION AS OPPOSED TO WAITING SIX MONTHS. IT WAS KIND 23 OF AN ODD FORMAT IN THAT REGARD. SO, THAT'S THE INTENT BEHIND 24

THOSE. AND THOSE ELECTIONS WOULD HAPPEN IN EVEN NUMBERED
 YEARS.

COUNSEL, KATHLEEN KANE: THAT'S RIGHT IN ORDER TO SYNC UP WITH 12 THAT SUGGESTION IS TO EXTEND THIS CURRENT TERM UNTIL WE CAN 13 PICK UP THAT JULY 1ST DATE. THE LAST CHANGE IS TO THE TIMING 14 OF THE BUDGET. RIGHT NOW THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IS SUPPOSED TO 15 TAKE ACTION 45 DAYS BEFORE THIS MEETING ON ITS BUDGET, WHICH 16 PUTS IT OUT OF SYNC WITH MTC'S BUDGET CYCLE. AND, OF COURSE, 17 AS WE KNOW THE CONTRACT FOR SERVICES IT'S ALL THE SAME STAFF, 18 AND THEY DO RELATE. THE OTHER PROBLEM THAT IT HAS IS IT 19 REQUIRES, OFTENTIMES, A SPECIAL MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD 20 21 IN ORDER TO HIT THAT 45 DAY SET BACK THIS IS MINOR CHANGE TAKING IT TO 20 DAYS HOPE IS THAT THAT'S SUFFICIENT TIME FOR 22 GENERAL ASSEMBLY DELEGATES TO READ THE BUDGET AND THINK ABOUT 23 IT BUT IT DOESN'T CREATE AN ADMINISTRATIVE BURDEN AND MORE 24 IMPORTANTLY KEEPING IT IN SYNC WITH THE MTC BUDGET CYCLE MEANS 25

MAYOR SOL RUBIO FROM CITY OF SAN RAMON, 21 JUST WITH ITEMS 3 AND 4 HERE IT SAYS ENSURE CONTINUITY OF 22 KNOWLEDGE BETWEEN THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IN AND THE GENERAL 23 ASSEMBLY. MY CONCERN ON THIS IS HOW INFORMATION -- I BELIEVE 24

THANK YOU. 18

20 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU. SO, I'LL DO THE FIRST ONE AND 21 SAY AND SAY WHEN IT COMES TO NUMBER THREE REGARDING DELEGATES 22 SERVING AT -- EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS SERVING AS THE 23 DELEGATES, THIS IS RESTRICTED TO 35 PEOPLE. ONLY THOSE PEOPLE 24 THAT ARE ON THE EXECUTIVE BOARD. SO, I WOULD SAY TO YOU, I --25 I WAS IN THAT SCENARIO. I AM YOUR PRESIDENT, AND I WASN'T MY

COUNTY'S DELEGATE UNTIL THIS YEAR BECAUSE IT WAS TREATED AS A 1 SEPARATE PROCESS. SO LAST YEAR, I WAS NOT A VOTING MEMBER AT 2 3 THIS BODY. NOW THAT JUST DOESN'T SEEM RIGHT. I LEAD THIS BODY AND I WASN'T A VOTING MEMBER HERE AT THE GENERAL ASSEMBLE 4 5 ASSEMBLY, AND THAT GOES THE SAME FOR EVERY ONE OF YOUR REPRESENTATIVE JURISDICTIONS WHERE YOU ARE THE EXECUTIVE BOARD 6 MEMBER SO IT DOESN'T PRECLUDE ANY NON-EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER 7 8 JURISDICTION IT'S JUST FOR THOSE COUNTY AND CITY DELEGATES THAT ARE PRESCRIBED WITHIN THE BYLAWS OF SECTION ON MEMBERSHIP 9 ARTICLE SEVEN ON THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, IT APPLIES TO THE TWO 10 REPRESENTATIVES FROM ALAMEDA AND THE TWO REPRESENTATIVES FROM 11 THE MEMBER CITIES AND SO ON AND SO FORTH. SO, THAT'S WHAT IT'S 12 REALLY GEARED TOWARDS. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU COUNCILMEMBER SILVA IN THE BACK. 9 CINDY SILVA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH I DO SERVE ON THE EXECUTIVE 10 BOARD AND FOR A FEW YEARS. I'M ACTUALLY GOING TO ASK A SLIDE 11 WORDING MODIFICATION ITEM NUMBER THREE, SOMEHOW WHEN YOU 12 TRANSLATED IT INTO THE MEMBERSHIP STATEMENT THERE IS 13 CONFUSION, THE WAY IT'S TRANSLATED INTO THE BYLAWS IT SAYS 14 15 REPRESENTATIVE SHALL SERVE AS THAT JURISDICTION'S DELEGATE TO 16 THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ALTERNATES TO THE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPRESENTATIVE MAY BE APPOINTED EVERY TIME I HAVE READ IT 17 THROUGH IT WAS SAYING MY JURISDICTION COULD APPOINT SOMEONE 18 ELSE TO SIT IN MY SEAT AT THE EXECUTIVE BOARD IT'S YOU JUST A 19 MINOR BUT SOMETIMES WORDS REALLY MATTER I THINK IT NEEDS TO 20 SAY ALTERNATES TO THE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPRESENTED GENERAL 21 ASSEMBLY ALTERNATES MAY BE APPOINTED BY THE JURISDICTION WHICH 22 IS REALLY CLOSE TO WHAT IT SAYS IN THE MEMO, COVER MEMO, AND 23 KATHLEEN I'M SURE YOU CAN FIGURE THIS OUT UNLESS EVERYBODY 24 25 SAYS ABOVE SILVA SIT DOWN.

NOW, WITH THAT SAID, YOU REMEMBER THIS IDEA OF 24 FORECAST ABOUT TO HAPPEN THAT SHOWS UP IN THE NEWS EVERY TWO 25

YEARS. HAS ANYBODY STARTED TO NOTICE THIS? BACK IN 2019 WE 1 WERE GOING TO HAVE A RECESSION, BASED ON A MASSIVE COLLAPSE IN 2 3 REAL ESTATE, BECAUSE IT WAS SO OVERPRICED IN 2019. YEAH, WELL, YOU KNOW WHAT'S HAPPENED SINCE 2019 AND IN 2020 REMEMBER THE 4 5 PANDEMIC WAS SUPPOSED TO CAUSE A DEPRESSION. WHEN 13 WE'RE THINKING ABOUT FORECAST, THIS FORECAST. LAST NOVEMBER 14 15 FORECAST MIGHTY NATE SILVER 538 TOTALS THAT WAS CLOSE, HE 16 GIVES 58 AND 100 CHANCE OF HARRIS PULLING OUT AND OF COURSE IT WASN'T EVEN CLOSE. IT WAS A TOTAL WIPE OUT TRUMP WON BY LARGE 17 MARGIN SIGNIFICANTLY, AND HE DID BACK IN 2016 AND OF COURSE 18 THAT LEADS ME TO MY NEW EXPRESSION, WHICH IS THE ONLY FUNCTION 19 OF ACTUAL ELECTION POLLING IS TO MAKE ECONOMIC FORECASTING 20 21 LOOK RESPECTABLE AGAIN. NEEDLESS TO SAY FORECASTS AREN'T EXACTLY WHAT YOU THINK THEY ARE AND FOR THE MOST PART YOU CAN 22 IGNORE MOST OF THE SCREAMING HYSTERIA WE SEE IN HEADLINES. 23 WALL STREET JOURNAL, PROBABLY 30% OVER THE COURSE OF NEXT 12 24 25 MONTHS, EVERYBODY SCREAMING ABOUT RECESSION, AT BEGINNING OF

IT ALL 12 STARTED BACK IN 2020, THAT IS TO SAY WITH THE PANDEMIC AND THE 13 TRUE ORIGINAL SIN, AND THAT OF COURSE ALL HAD ON DO WITH THE 14 15 NARRATIVE REGARDING THE PANDEMIC. NOW, AMAZINGLY, IN 2020, AND I GET IT, THE PANDEMIC WAS A SCARY TIME, IT WAS A HORRIBLE 16 TIME, IT WAS A HUMANITARIAN DISASTER, M MILLIONS OF PEOPLE 17 18 PASSED WE WERE STUCK INSIDE KIDS LOST VALUABLE EDUCATION BUT YOU KNOW WHAT IT WASN'T GOING TO DO? THE PANDEMIC WASN'T GOING 19 TO CAUSE A DEPRESSION, BECAUSE PANDEMICS DON'T CAUSE 20 21 DEPRESSIONS NEVER HAS NEVER WILL. I'M A STUDENT OF BUSINESS CYCLES THAT'S MY JOB AND THERE HAS NEVER BEEN A PANDEMIC 22 DRIVEN DEPRESSION. DEPRESSIONS ARE CAUSED BY BAD RECESSIONS 23 COMBINED WITH DEFLATION, WHICH IS A MONETARY SITUATION, NOT A 24 DISEASE. GO BACK 100 YEARS AGO TO THE SPANISH FLU. NO 25

DEPRESSION. THE DEPRESSION DIDN'T COME IN 1929 WITH THE 1 2 COLLAPSE OF THE FINANCIAL MARKETS AND THE BANKING SYSTEM. 3 THAT'S NOT HOW IT WORKS. ALL THOSE IN WASHINGTON, CONGRESS, ALL THOSE AT FEDERAL RESERVE JUST BOUGHT INTO THE IDEA IT WAS 4 5 GOING TO CAUSE DEPRESSION AND THEY WENT TO TOWN LIKE THEY HAVE NEVER SEEN IT HAPPEN BEFORE. THE PANDEMIC AND OUR ECONOMY. THE 6 PANDEMIC WAS THE DEEPEST RECESSION IN U.S. ECONOMIC HISTORY 7 8 OUR ECONOMY CONTRACTED BY 9% IN REAL TERMS. WE HAVE NEVER SEEN ANYTHING LIKE THAT. IT WAS ALSO THE SHORTEST RECESSION EVER. 9 IT LASTED EIGHT WEEKS FROM THE MIDDLE OF APRIL TO THE 10 BEGINNING OF JUNE. THAT'S IT. AMERICAN HOUSEHOLD TO SEE A \$250,000 INCREASE IN THEIR NET 1 WORTH. 26%. AND IT HASN'T STOPPED. SAN JOSE HAS THE SAME NUMBER OF JOBS 6 THEY HAD PRIOR TO THE PANDEMIC AND SAN FRANCISCO IS DOWN 5 TO 7 8 6%, OF COURSE OAKLAND IS ALSO DOWN A FEW PERCENT. NOT A GOOD IMAGE. SO, YEAH, THIS IS STILL THE RITZIEST ZIP CODE ON THE MAP, IF YOU WILL. NO DOUBT ABOUT IT. EVEN WHEN IT COMES TO 7 8 CONVERSATIONS ABOUT INEQUALITY CALIFORNIA'S POVERTY RATE HAS COME DOWN JUST AS MUCH AS THE NATION'S AND THIS IS BASED ON 9 GROSS INCOME IT DOESN'T INCLUDE ALL BENEFITS PEOPLE ARE 10 RECEIVING AND YOU WANT TO THINK ABOUT INEQUALITY, ETHNIC BASIS 11 OVER THE LAST FIVE YEARS FROM 2019 TO 2023 RECENT DATA SHOWS 12 HISPANIC AND AFRICAN AMERICANS HAVE SEEN HOUSEHOLD GROWTH, I 13 DON'T WANT TO SAY FOR A SECOND THAT THE BATTLE AGAINST INE 14 OUALITIES IS OVER BUT TAKE A STEP BACK AND APPRECIATE THE 15 16 TREND AND POSITIVE TRENDS IN MACE. WHEN YOU THINK ABOUT AI ENHANCING 10 PRODUCTIVITY, WELL, WHAT COMPANIES ARE GOING TO BE INTEGRATING 11 AI FASTER THAN ANYONE ELSE? AND OF COURSE THE ANSWER IS THE 12 VERY INDUSTRIES THAT ARE MAKING IT, THAT'S THE TECH COMPANIES 13 THEMSELVES. WHAT'S REALLY HAPPENING? IS TECH FAILING? ARE 14 THERE LOTS OF BANKRUPTCIES? HEALTH CARE, EDUCATION, 7 8 GOVERNMENT, OTHER SERVICES HAVE LEAPED TO THE FOREFRONT THE SLACKNESS THAT HAS BEEN LEFT BECAUSE TECH IS NOT HIRING OR 9 GETTING RID OF PEOPLE HAS IMMEDIATELY BEEN ABSORBED ELSEWHERE 10 IN THE ECONOMY PAUSE THE REST OF THE ECONOMY HAS BEEN 11 CONSTRAINED PIE LACK OF PEOPLE. ULTIMATELY IF YOU KNOW WHAT'S 12 HOLD THE BAY AREA ECONOMY BACK IT'S SIMPLY LACK OF WORKERS 13 LACK OF TECH JOBS EVEN WITH THE DECLINE IN TECH JOBS OVER THE 14 LAST COUPLE OF YEARS, THE BAY AREA TECH JOBS IS ABOUT 13% 15 16 WHICH PRIOR TO THE PANDEMIC HAS NEVER BEEN HIGHER. CONCEPT IN ECONOMICS CALLED DUTCH DISEASE, GOES BACK TO THE NEVER LANDS 17 WHEN THEY DISCOVERED OIL, ALL THESE DUTCH GUYS WENT OUT ON 18 BOATS AND WENT TO WORK WHEN THEY DID THE ECONOMY LEFT BEHIND 19 COULDN'T HIRE PEOPLE AND THE ECONOMY LEFT BEHIND ENDED UP 20 21 STRUGGLING TO GROW JUST BECAUSE OIL WAS THERE. THAT'S WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU HAVE ONE SECTOR THAT'S GROWING DRAMATICALLY 22 IN CONTEXT OF AN ECONOMY WITH FIXED LABOR MARKET AND SUCCESS 23 OF ONE LEADS TO LOSSES OF OTHERS BY THE WAY THOSE PLATFORM 24 STARTED SLOWING DOWN WHEN OIL PRICES FELL ALL THOSE PEOPLE 25

WENT BACK -- ULTIMATELY THE REAL PROBLEMS HERE AND IN 1 CALIFORNIA IS NOT THE BUSINESS CLIMATE, NOT TAXES IT'S THE 2 3 FACT WE DON'T HAVE ENOUGH WORKERS. IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS THE STATE HAS ADDED 400,000 PAYROLL JOBS WE HAVE EXPANDED OUR 4 5 LABOR FORCE BY 120,000 PEOPLE. IT'S KIND OF A NEAT TRICK, TEXAS GROWS FASTER THAN US, TEXAS BUILDS HOUSING AND WE DON'T. 6 WHAT DOES THAT MEAN? IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS TEXAS HAS ADDED 7 8 1.7 MILLION PEOPLE TO THEIR LABOR FORCE, WE HAVE ADDED 120,000. VERY SIMPLE. IF YOU DON'T BUILD HOUSING PEOPLE CAN'T 9 MOVE HERE. PEOPLE CAN'T MOVE HERE. THEY CAN'T FILL JOBS. WE'RE 10 HOLDING OUR ECONOMY BACK BY OUR RESISTANCE TO BUILDING 11 HOUSING. SIMPLE AS THAT. YOU CAN SEE IT ACROSS THE STATE, 12 INLAND EMPIRE CENTRAL VALLEY THESE TWO REGIONS HAVE BEEN 13 ACCOUNTED FOR 2/3 OF ALL JOB GROWTH IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS. 14 WHY THESE TWO REGIONS? BECAUSE THEY HAVE HOUSING AND LABOR 15 16 FORCE GROWTH IT'S NOT COMPLICATED. BUT WAIT PEOPLE ARE FLEEING CALIFORNIA WE KNOW THAT BECAUSE THE POPULATION IS DROPPING. 17 RIGHT? PEOPLE ARE FLEEING. WHAT ARE THEY FLEEING? DEPENDS WHO 18 YOU ASK, HIGH TAXES HIGH HOUSING COST INEQUALITY OF, 19 REGULATIONS. PEOPLE ARE NOT FLEEING. THE VERB FLEEING HAS A 20 21 VERY DISTINCT, WELL, CAUSAL CHAIN. IF PEOPLE ARE FLEEING, 22 THEY'RE LEAVING EMPTY HOMES BEHIND THEM. FLEEING PEOPLE MEAN HIGHER HOUSING VACANCY RATES. HAS ANYBODY SEEN ANY VACANT 23 HOUSING IN THE BAY AREA? THERE IS NO VACANT HOUSING IN THE 24 ENTIRE STATE. IN FACT HERE'S AN INTERESTING FACTOID CALIFORNIA 25

HAS FEWER PEOPLE WE HAVE MORE HOUSEHOLDS. REPEAT, FEWER PEOPLE 1 MORE HOUSEHOLDS. WHAT'S GOING ON? THE ANSWER IS OVER THE LAST 2 3 FEW YEARS THERE HAS BEEN A BIG DECLINE IN PEOPLE PER HOUSEHOLD PEOPLE ARE SPREADING OUT AND THAT'S THE REAL ISSUE, PEOPLE ARE 4 5 DOING SO WELL IN CALIFORNIA THEY'RE SPREADING OUT. I KNOW THAT SOUND LIKE AN ODD THING TO SAY AND I'LL COME BACK TO IT IN A 6 SECOND, CLEARLY WHEN IT COMES TO THIS KIND OF CONVERSATION THE 7 8 ANSWER IS YOU HAVE GOT TO BUILD MORE HOUSING. THE STATE CONTINUES TO UNDER MINE ANY COMMON SENSE EFFORT TO TRULY 9 EXPAND THE HOUSING SUPPLY YES YOU SEE THAT IN THE BAY AREA THE 10 BAY AREA PEAKED AT 6.7 MILLION PEOPLE NOW DOWN TO 6.5 MILLION 11 PEOPLE, PEOPLE ARE FLEEING. LOOK AT THE RIGHT SIDE SANTA CLARA 12 COUNTY, HOUSEHOLDS GREW BY 8%, TEN-YEAR GROWTH PER HOUSEHOLD 13 WENT DOWN BY 7% THAT MEANS VAST MAJORITY OF NEW HOUSING IN 14 15 SANTA CLARA COUNTY, PEOPLE SIMPLY EXPANDING OUT OF THEIR 16 CURRENT HOUSEHOLD IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY, BUILT ENOUGH HOUSING JUST TO MEET DEMAND. YOU DON'T WANT ROOMMATES YOU DON'T WANT 17 TO LIVE WITH YOUR FAMILY, YOU MOVE OUT. AND BY THE WAY YOU SEE 18 JUST AS MUCH DECLINE IN PEOPLE PER HOUSEHOLD IN YOUR OWN HOMES 19 AS DO YOU IN RENTAL MARKETS. I DID A SIMPLE SIMULATION LOOKED 20 21 AT THE NUMBER OF NEW HOUSING UNITS IN THE LAST TEN YEARS, ONCE YOU ACCOUNT FOR THE INCREASE IN HOLE DEMAND DICTATED BY 22 DECLINE OF PEOPLE PER HOUSEHOLD WHAT WAS LEFT OVER? 13,000 23 LEFT OVER AFTER LOCAL DEMAND SONOMA INCREASED BY 6,000 BUT 24 THEY NEEDED 14,000 TO MEET LOCAL DEMAND THIS IS WHAT DROVE 25

PRICES UP. THIS IS EXACTLY WHAT CAUSED SOME PEOPLE TO LEAVE. 1 AND 15 THAT'S TRUE EVEN FOR RENTERS. UNDERSTAND THE IMPORTANCE 2 3 OF THIS, THE STANDARD STORY IN SACRAMENTO IS THAT WE HAVE RISING HOMELESSNESS BECAUSE RENTERS ARE DOING SO BADLY IN FACT 4 5 OUITE THE OPPOSITE WE HAVE RISING HOMELESSNESS BECAUSE RENTERS ARE DOING SO WELL. WHEN THEY'RE DOING WELL, THEY'RE SPREADING 6 OUT. WHEN THEY'RE SPREADING OUT THEY'RE PUSHING UP RENTS. WHEN 7 8 THEY'RE PUSHING UP RENTS SOMEONE HAS TO CHIEF. THEY HAVE TO LEAVE THE STATE, THEY HAVE TO LEAVE THE CANYON, OR WORST-CASE 9 10 SCENARIO THEY END UP IN THE ALLEY. AND BY THE WAY, RESIDENT CONTROL THAT ENCOURAGES PEOPLE TO SPREAD OUT WHICH MEANS MORE 11 HOMELESSNESS, AFFORDABLE HOUSING MANDATES DON'T REALLY SOLVE 12 THE PROBLEM. EVICTION MORATORIUMS. AGAIN MORE SPREADING OUT 13 MORE HOMELESSNESS. YOU HAVE TO EXPAND THE HOUSING STOCK. AND 14 THAT'S JUST NOT HAPPENING. AND OF COURSE THERE IS A WHOLE 15 16 OTHER SET OF CONVERSATION WHEN IT COMES TO HOUSING. TALK, FOR EXAMPLE, ABOUT SAN FRANCISCO WHICH OBVIOUSLY HAS SEEN SOME OF 17 THE BIGGEST LOSSES OF PAYROLL JOBS AND SOME OF THE BIGGEST 18 ISSUES IF THE DO YOU WANT REGION. WHY? THINK OF THIS, SAN 19 FRANCISCO, THERE IS ABOUT HALF A MILLION HOUSEHOLD WORKERS 20 21 THAT, IS TO SAY PEOPLE WHO HAVE JOBS LIVING THERE, AND THERE IS 700,000 PAYROLL JOBS THE GAP IS MADE UP OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE 22 BEEN COMMUTING IN. GUESS WHAT? PEOPLE AREN'T COMMUTING IN, IN 23 FACT I WOULD ARGUE OF THOSE 700,000 PAYROLL JOBS, THOSE JOBS 24 ARE NOT ACTUALLY BEING FILLED BY SOMEBODY WHOSE IN THAT OFFICE 25

ON THAT PARTICULAR DAY REMEMBER WE COUNTY PAYROLL JOBS ON THE 1 2 ZIP CODE OF WHERE YOUR EMPLOYER IS IF YOU HAPPENED TO BE 3 WORKING THEE DAYS A WEEK OUT OF YOUR HOUSE IN ALAMEDA WELL YOU'RE NOT ACTUALLY IN THE CITY. TAKE FOR EXAMPLE, MARIN 4 5 COUNTY USED TO BE 15% WORK-FROM-HOME NOW IT'S 26%. THESE ARE PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT COMMUTE BEING IN ON A DAY-TO-DAY BASIS AND 6 THEREIN LIES ONE OF THE BIG PROBLEMS IN SAN FRANCISCO IT'S NOT 7 8 OF COURSE THE FACT THAT TOURISTS AREN'T GOING THERE OWE BUSINESSES DON'T WANT TO BE THERE, IT'S THE WORKERS IN THAT 9 YOU THINK ARE IN SAN FRANCISCO, ARE NOT COMING IN NOT GOING TO 10 RESTAURANTS, RETAIL STATIONS AND THAT'S WHAT THESE ISSUES ARE 11 AND YOU SEE THAT IN THE BART DATA WHICH IS INCREDIBLY LOW AT 12 THIS POINT IN TIME. OVER AND OVER AGAIN ALL ABOUT HOUSING AND 13 MORE IMPORTANTLY GETTING HOUSING CLOSE TO WHERE THOSE OFFICE 14 BUILDINGS ARE. IT'S VERY SIMPLE. THERE HAS BEEN A DECLINE IN 15 16 DEMAND FOR OFFICERS SPACE PER OFFICE EMPLOYEE THERE HAS BEEN 17 INCREASE IN HOUSING DEMAND PER RESIDENT AND WHAT MEANS IS DESPITE THE PACKET THAT OFFICE HAS BEEN AND WILL CONTINUE TO 18 BE THE CROWN JEWEL OF ANY URBAN AREA'S COMMERCIAL REAL ESTATE 19 PORTFOLIO, NEVERTHELESS YOU NEED A LOT LESS OFFICE SPACE 20 21 RELATIVE TO HOUSING. AND THAT'S THE PROBLEM HERE. DALLAS HAS AS MUCH EMPTY OFFICE SPACE, DENVER HAS AS MUCH EMPTY OFFICE 22 SPACE PER OFFICE EMPLOYEES SAN FRANCISCO DOES THEY'RE NOT 23 WORRIED WHY THEY'RE BUILDING LOTS OF HOUSING AND THEY WILL 24 BACK FILL BAY AREA IS NOT BUILDING HOUSING IT'S GOING TO BE 25

HARD TO FILL UP THAT OFFICE SPACE THE ANSWER IS OBVIOUSLY 1 CHANGE THE OFFICE SPACE AND HOUSING. IN THE MEANTIME WHEN'S 2 3 HAPPENING WITH THESE OFFICE BUILDINGS, THEY'RE BEING SOLD AT ROCK BOTTOM PRICES AND KEEPING IT 20% FULL. WHO CARES? I MAKE 4 5 ENOUGH TO MONEY TO PAY MY MORTGAGE. SAN FRANCISCO WAS LOSING ITS URBAN EDGE BY LEAVING OFFICE BUILDINGS 20% UNOCCUPIED 6 LAYING AROUND YOU NEED TO BE GOING OUT AND RED TAGGING 7 8 BUILDINGS, TELLING INVESTORS, YOU KNOW WHAT, TEAR THAT DOWN I'LL LET YOU PUT UP WHATEVER YOU WANT, IT'S HOUSING AND I'M 9 NOT GOING TO CHARGE YOU ANY PERMIT FEES. THAT'S HARD TO DO 10 RIGHT NOW RELYING ON PERMIT FEES. BUT IN THE HONG RUN YOU GET 11 HOUSING NEXT TO UNION SCARE GET HOUSING NEXT TO THOSE EMPTY 12 OFFICE BUILDINGS AND YOU WILL SEE SAN FRANCISCO COME BACK LIKE 13 NOBODY'S BUSINESS, IT SHOULD BE AS IT SHOULD BE. HOME PRICES 14 ARE GOING UP IN THE BAY AREA. THAT'S THE SINGLE REASON YOU CAN 15 16 BE MOST CONFIDENT YOUR ECONOMY IS STILL GROWING, HOME PRICES ARE GOING UP NOT DOWN. LET ME SHOW YOU THIS. EVERYBODY FREAKS 17 OUT ABOUT HOUSING DATA, A PERCENT OF NEW BUYERS INCOME HOUSING 18 COSTS ARE A SHARE OF NEW OWNER'S ECONOMIC THAT THAT MAKES 19 SENSE GOT IT OUT OF MY MOUTH OVER HERE ON THE RIGHT-HAND SIDE 20 UNITED STATES WENT IN 2018, 25%, 2023, 27%, SANTA CLARA 26 TO 21 27% IT'S LOWER, DESPITE THOSE INSANE HIGH PRICES DESPITE THE 22 FACT THAT MEDIAN HOUSE IN SAN JOSE COSTS \$2 MILLION, YOU CAN 23 SEE THAT IN TENANT OCCUPIED HOUSING SAN FRANCISCO SANTA CLARA 24 SAN MATEO HAVE SOME OF THE SMALLEST SHARE OF RENTAL 25

CONSTRAINED HOUSEHOLDS IN THE ENTIRE STATE. I'M ALREADY TAKING 1 2 TOO MUCH TIME. BUT THINKING FAST AND SLOW BY DANIEL, IT'S 3 ANIMATION BOOK BEING AND RIGHTEOUS MIND BY JONATHON, WE GET THE IDEA THAT WE TEND TO ACT EMOTIONALLY TO INFORMATION. WE 4 5 THINK WE'RE ACTING SMART AND DEDUCTIVE, BUT WE'RE NOT. WE'RE REACTING EMOTIONALLY. WE DON'T THINK AS MUCH AS WE THINK WE 6 THINK. I CAN TELL YOU ANYWHERE BETTER THAN PAYING ATTENTION TO 7 8 THIS SURVEY FROM THE FEDERAL RESERVE. I LOVE IT TO DEATH. NOW WE 2 3 HAVE OF COURSE MORE DEFICIT SPENDING WITH THE BIG BEAUTIFUL BILL WHICH IS GOING TO COST \$2.8 TRILLION MORE. AND DON'T 4 5 FORGET OUR STATE IS AT RISK BECAUSE OF THE BILLBOARD. AND NOW WE HAVE 12 PENSIONS THAT ARE A BIG PROBLEM FOR THE STATE AND ARE GOING TO 13 GET WORSE WHEN ASSET PRICES START TO FALL AGAIN AND RIGHT NOW 14 15 STATE LAWMAKERS ARE TRYING TO SPIKE PENSIONS AND MAKE THEM 16 LARGER. WHAT ARE WE DOING? WE'RE RUNNING TOWARDS THE EDGE OF 17 THE CLIFF AS FAST AS OUR LITTLE LEGS WILL TAKE US, WHAT ARE THE FEDS DOING ABOUT ALL OF THIS? NOTHING. BETWEEN A ROCK AND 18 HARD PLACE IF THEY CUT RATES MAKES THE MARKET GO HOTTER AND 19 CAUSES INTEREST RATES TO GO UP. TRUMP INHERITED THE HEALTHIEST 20 21 SET OF AMERICAN HOUSEHOLDS EVER AND EVERYBODY'S ANGRY HE ALSO INHERITED ONE OF THE MOST OVERHEATED OUT OF BALANCE MACRO 22 ECONOMICS WE HAVE EVER SEEN AND ONE THAT SHOULD BE TERRIFYING 23 FINANCIAL MARKS, THOSE MACRO IMBALANCES ARE GOING TO COME BACK 24 25 AND HAUNT US, YOU THINK PEOPLE ARE UPSET NOW, WAIT UNTIL THEY

YES, THE ECONOMY IS GOING TO SLOW, TARIFFS ARE 2 3 GOING TO HIT, BUT WITH THAT SAID PLENTY OF MOMENTUM HERE IF YOU WANT TO KNOW WHEN THIS THING SLOWS DOWN PARTICULARLY WHEN 4 5 THE U.S. DOLLAR STARTS GOING DOWN RATS GOING UP. IN CALIFORNIA FOCUSED ON WRONG ISSUES IT'S HOUSING SUPPLY NOT AFFORDABILITY 6 IT'S NOT HARD. BUILD HOUSING. DO IT NOW. GET OUT OF THE WAY. 7 8 [LAUGHTER] GET RID OF PERMITS, GET RID OF FEES. JUST DO IT IT'S A SOLUTION FOR SO MANY PROBLEMS AND THAT IS PARTICULARLY 9 TRUE HERE IN THE BAY AREA. TECH IS BACKING OFF BUT THEY'RE 10 DOING FINE BUT IF YOU WANT TO FIX HOUSING, YOU WANT TO --11 [INDISCERNIBLE] YOU HAVE TO ADD HOUSING TO IT BUT THE REAL IS 12 OUT THERE IS OUR FALSE NARRATIVES THAT KEEP YANKING US DOWN 13 THE WRONG PATHWAYS AND UNTIL WE ACKNOWLEDGE THE TRUTH IT'S 14 HARD TO GET BACK ON THE RIGHT TRACK. THE PROBLEM WE REALLY 15 16 HAVE RIGHT NOW IS THAT OUR NATION, OUR STATE, HAS BEEN VERY MUCH FOOLED BY A BUNCH OF NARRATIVES THAT SIMPLE HE AREN'T 17 TRUE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH EVERYBODY. I TALKED A LITTLE LONG 18 THERE. YOU GOT YOUR PANEL GOING HERE? G AND A. 19

21 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: GIVEN TIME, IF YOU HAVE OF ALL, I DON'T 22 EVEN KNOW WHERE THE OTHER MIC IS. IT DOESN'T MATTER OF THE I 23 JUST WANT TO THANK YOU. EVERYONE PLEASE JOIN ME IN THANKING 24 DR. THORNBERG AGAIN. THAT WAS INCREDIBLE. I PROMISE YOU, I 25 DIDN'T TELL HIM THAT WE JUST NEED TO BUILD MORE HOUSING. BUT

IT'S KIND OF ON POINT FOR EVERYTHING I ALWAYS SAY. BECAUSE 1 HOUSING IS OUR SOLUTION TO EVERYTHING, AND I ALWAYS SAY OUR 2 3 TRANSIT SYSTEMS GO FAR AND WIDE BECAUSE THEY'RE JUST A BAND-AID FOR FAILED HOUSING POLICIES OF THE PAST. SO, WE ARE OF 4 5 LIKE MIND. I'M GOING TO BE JUDICIOUS HERE AND TAKE THREE QUESTIONS. THREE QUESTIONS FOR DR. THORNBERG AND THEN WE'RE 6 GOING TO MOVE ON TO OUR NEXT PANEL AND I'M GOING TO ASK OUR 7 8 PANEL TO GET READY.

10 SPEAKER: I HAVE BEEN IN MANHATTAN A COUPLE OF TIMES IN THE 11 LAST FOUR MONTHS AND THERE ARE MORE PEOPLE WALKING AROUND THE 12 STREET AND FEWER VACANCIES, I HAVE BEEN TOLD THEY WENT ALL OUT 13 TO CONVINCE PEOPLE TO EITHER CONVERT BUILDINGS TO HOUSING, IS 14 THAT YOUR SENSE OF WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING?

16 SPEAKER: ABSOLUTELY IF YOU LOOK ACROSS AND ASK WHAT DOWNTOWNS ARE COMING BACK IT'S DOWNTOWNS THAT HAVE EXTENSIVE SUPPLY OF 17 HOUSING AND DON'TS THAT DON'T YOU DON'T, YOU SEE IT OVER AND 18 OVER, BRING PEOPLE DOWNTOWN, IT'S GOING TO BRING BACK TO LIFE. 19 INFILL DEVELOPMENT IS EXPENSIVE AND IT'S PARTICULARLY 20 21 EXPENSIVE NOW GIVEN CAPITAL COSTS ALL THAT BEING SAID CITIES NEED CASH SO IT BECOMES A SHORT ONE VERSUS LONG RUN SITUATION, 22 THERE ARE FUNDING MECHANISMS TO MAKE IT WORK CITIES HAVE TO BE 23 COMMITTED TO MAKING THIS HAPPEN. 24

1 **PRES. BELIA RAMOS:** THANK YOU AND TO OUR VICE PRESIDENT ROMERO.

3 V. PRES. CARLOS ROMERO: JUST REALM HAD A STUDY ON, THEY RELEASED A STUDY ON HOUSING PRODUCTION IN DALLAS AND IT IS ON 4 5 FIRE, AND INDEED HOUSING PRICES AND RENTAL PRICES DID NOT GO DOWN DESPITE THIS INCREASE IN HOUSING. SO JUST FROM THE 6 AFFORDABLE PERSPECTIVE, PERHAPS I DISAGREE DIAL WITH YOU, 7 8 PARTICULARLY IN A STATE THAT HAS SUCH HIGH HOUSING DEVELOPMENT COSTS THAT THE WAY WE GET OUT OF SOME OF OUR AFFORDABILITY 9 10 CRISIS IS TO JUST BUILD, BUILD, BUILD.

CHRISTOPHER THORNBERG: EXCEPT FOR THE FACT THAT THE AVERAGE 12 PRICE OF A HOUSE IN DALLAS IS 1/3 WHAT IT IS IN THE BAY AREA, 13 AND AVERAGE APARTMENT RENT IS ONE HALF WHAT IT IS HERE. THE 14 FACT THAT IT HASN'T FALLEN THERE IS SIMPLY A SIGN OF THE 15 16 OVERHEATED ECONOMY LIKE EVERYWHERE BUT ULTIMATE DALLAS AND 17 HOUSTON ARE VASTLY MORE AFFORDABLE FROM A HOUSING PERSPECTIVE THAN THE BAY AREA IS RIGHT NOW AND THAT'S CLEARLY A FUNCTION 18 OF SUPPLY THE IDEA THAT YOU CAN'T BUILD YOUR WAY OUT OF THIS 19 COMPLETELY BELIES ANY BASIC KNOWLEDGE, STUD OF THE DATA. I'M 20 21 NOT SURE WHAT THE FEDS SAY BUT I HAVE TO HUMBLY DISAGREE.

23 **PRES. BELIA RAMOS:** OVER THERE.

SPEAKER: MY EXPERIENCE I HAVE LIVED IN THE BAY AREA FOR ALMOST 1 2 45 YEARS BUILDING IS NECESSARY HOWEVER THIS ONGOING 3 GENTRIFICATION YOU'RE GOING TO PUSH OUT MORE INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE GOING TO MOVE FARTHER AWAY FROM WORK OR MOVE OUT OF THE 4 5 STATE I AGREE WITH THE PREVIOUS SPEAKER I'M NOT SURE THAT JUST BUILDING, CHEERILY WE SHOULD DO THAT BUT WHAT CAN THE STATE DO 6 WITH REGARDS TO TAX LAWS AND OTHER LAWS THAT CAN HELP PEOPLE 7 8 STAY IN THEIR APARTMENTS OR THEIR HOUSING, IF AFFORDABILITY IS 9

CHRISTOPHER THORNBERG: FOR SOME FOLKS IT'S REAL. I SHOWED YOU 11 THE DATA THE MEDIAN -- OVERALL THE VAST MAJORITY OF RENTERS 12 ARE DOING BETTER HERE THAN RELATIVE TO THE REST OF THE STATE 13 BUT THERE IS A SMALL COMPONENT OF FOLKS WHO ARE GETTING 14 15 PRESSURED BY THIS YOU ALWAYS HAVE TO ACKNOWLEDGE. THERE IS ALWAYS PEOPLE BEING SQUEEZED BUT REMEMBER NOT BUILDING MARKET 16 RATE HOUSING CAUSE -- IF YOU DON'T BUILD ENOUGH MARKET RATE 17 HOUSING, WHAT HAPPENS, HIGH END FOLKS COME HERE, WANT TO LIVE 18 IN THIS AMAZING PLACE CALLED THE BAY AREA. THEY'RE GOING TO 19 FIND A PLACE TO LIVE, THAT MEANS MORE PRESSURE ON THE LOW-20 21 INCOME NEIGHBORS THAT ARE THE PLACES YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT RIGHT NOW. THE WAY TO TAKE THE PRESSURE OFF THOSE 22 NEIGHBORHOODS IS TO ALLOW MORE CONSTRUCTION TO TAKE PLACE THAT 23 IS THE SOLUTION HOW YOU TAKE THE PRESSURE OFF. LOOK, WE DID A 24 STUDY ON THIS A COUPLE YEARS AGO, AND I CAN'T REMEMBER THE 25

NUMBERS TO BE KIND OF CLEAR ON THIS, IF YOU LOOK AT FOR 1 2 EXAMPLE, DALLAS, WHERE YOU HAVE AN ACTIVE NEW HOME MARKET AND 3 YOU CONSTANTLY SEE PEOPLE MOVING INTO NICER NEIGHBORHOODS AND THEY'RE LEAVING OLDER NEIGHBORS BEHIND SO THERE IS PLENTY OF 4 5 HOUSING AVAILABLE FOR LOW-INCOME FAMILIES YOU CAN SEE THAT WE LOOKED AT -- AND I'M NOT GOING TO QUITE GET THIS NUMBER RIGHT, 6 BUT WE LOOKED AT FOR EXAMPLE, THE MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOME AND 7 8 OLD HOUSING STOCK AND WHAT YOU FIND HERE IN SAN FRANCISCO IS THAT THE OLD HOUSING STOCK IS 75% OCCUPIED BY HIGHER INCOME 9 HOUSEHOLDS BECAUSE THERE IS NO NEW HOUSING STOCK WHEREAS IN 10 DALLAS IT'S LIKE 20% I'M NOT GETTING THOSE NUMBERS EXACTLY 11 RIGHT BUT IF YOU SEND ME AN E-MAIL I'LL SEND IT OVER TO YOU 12 AND YOU CAN SEE WHAT I'M TALKING ABOUT YOU SEE LOW-INCOME 13 HOUSES BECAUSE OF FAILURE TO BUILD ENOUGH AND YOU TRY TO 14 15 PRESERVE THOSE LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS AND YOU END UP CHASING 16 YOUR OWN TAIL AND DON'T SUCCEED YOU SEE THAT IN THE BAY AREA ALL THESE EFFORTS TO -- HELP THESE HOUSEHOLDS HAVE FAILED AND 17 THAT'S BECAUSE THEY'RE NOT MASK THOSE EFFORTS WITH A 18 SIGNIFICANT PLAN TO TRULY INCREASE THE HOUSING STOCK. 19

21 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU AGAIN DR. THORNBERG I THINK WE 22 HAVE DEFINITELY BEEN LEFT WITH A HIGH CHARGE OF HOW WE LOOK AT 23 THE INTERSECTION BETWEEN OUR ACTIONS BEHIND THE DAIS AND WHAT 24 GOES FORWARD FOR OUR ECONOMY. THANK YOU, ONCE AGAIN, FOR 25 JOINING US FOR OUR GENERAL ASSEMBLY. AT THIS TIME I'M GOING TO

WELCOME UP OUR MODERATOR FOR OUR NEXT SEGMENT BILL HIGGINS. 1 2 BILL HIGGINS SERVES AS THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, WE'RE GOING TO 3 GET THROUGH THIS REALLY FAST, WE'RE GOING TO KEEP YOU A LITTLE BIT LONGER I THINK PROBABLY 2:15ISH. THIS IS A REALLY GREAT 4 5 PART BECAUSE IT'S HOW YOU'RE GOING TO GET THE MOST OUT OF YOUR ABAG DUES DUE TO TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE, WE HAVE SOMEONE WHO IS 6 AWARE OF REAP AND EVERYTHING THAT GOES WITH IT. TO GUIDE US 7 8 THROUGH THIS. OVER TO BILL.

SO, AND I HAD TO ANSWER TO MISS ECKLUND AS 18 MY BOARD MEMBER WAY BACK IN 2,000 -- NO, I WORKED AT THE 19 LEAGUE AT THE TURN OF THE INDUSTRY, I'M JUST SAYING -- ANYWAY, 20 21 WE'RE GOING TO TALK BASH I HAVE ALWAYS SAID ABOUT THE BALANCE BETWEEN LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND REGIONAL GOVERNMENT IS THIS, I 22 HAVE ALWAYS SAID THAT LOCAL -- THE EFFECTIVE REGIONAL 23 GOVERNANCE IS ESSENTIAL FOR THE PRINCIPLE OF LOCAL CONTROL. 24 25 THAT DOESN'T MAKE SENSE TO A LOT OF PEOPLE BECAUSE THEY SAY,

WHY, YOU KNOW, REGION IS JUST ANOTHER LAYER OF GOVERNMENT OR 1 SOMETHING LIKE THAT, BUT HERE IS THE TRUTH, YOU ALL HAVE 2 3 TRANSBOUNDARY PROBLEMS, WHETHER IT'S TRAFFIC, IT'S WATER DRAINAGE, OR IT'S COYOTES, YOU HAVE TRANSBOUNDARY PROBLEMS, 4 5 AND IF YOU DON'T HAVE AN EFFECTIVE FORUM TO SOLVE THOSE PROBLEMS, WHO FILLS THE VOID FOR YOU? THE STATE. PART OF LOCAL 6 CONTROL IS HAVING A REGIONAL ENTITY TO SOLVE YOUR 7 8 TRANSBOUNDARY PROBLEMS. AND REGIONS MAKE SENSE IN THIS STATE AND I DID THE NUMBERS LOOKED UP AT LEAST ACCORDING TO THE 9 10 WIKIPEDIA NUMBERS, YOU ALL HAVE ABOUT 7.5 MILLION PEOPLE IN THE BAY AREA, WHICH IS ABOUT THE SIZE OF ARIZONA. AND ABOUT 35 11 OTHER STATES THAT GET TWO VOTES IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE. 12 SO, IT MAKES SENSE THAT YOU ALL HAVE A REGION WHERE YOU CAN 13 MAKE YOUR OWN DECISION ABOUT THE BOUNDARY PROBLEMS THAT YOU 14 HAVE. I HAVE TWO MINUTES LEFT. SO, WHAT I'M GOING TO DO NOW IS 15 16 INTRODUCE THE PANEL THAT'S GOING TO TALK TO YOU ABOUT FOUR AMAZING PROGRAMS THAT ABAG IS DOING TO SERVE AND FURTHER THEIR 17 LOCAL COMMUNITIES. AND I'M GOING TO INTRODUCE THEM AS THEY 18 SPEAK, BECAUSE OF TIME, AND WE'RE GOING TO GO WITH ANGELA 19 ANDREWS WHO IS GOING TO SPEAK FIRST AND I'M JUST GOING TO LET 20 21 YOU TALK.

AUTHORITY BUT I ALSO AM THE CAPITAL PORTFOLIO MANAGER FOR WEST 1 2 COUNTY WASTEWATER AND MY GENERAL MANAGER HERE IN THE BACK OF 3 THE ROOM IS ANDREW CLOU, AND HE CAN GIVE YOU MORE INFORMATION ABOUT THE NORTH RICHMOND BUT I AM ACTUALLY HERE FOR EAST BAY 4 5 DISCHARGES AUTHORITY AND YES I DID TAKE PTO GENERAL MANAGER I TOOK PTO TODAY SO I'M NOT HERE. I WANT TO THANK YOU ALL FOR 6 VEHICLE ME HERE TODAY, BACKGROUND INFORMATION ABOUT EAST BAY 7 8 DISCHARGERS AUTHORITY WE ARE JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY WHICH INCLUDES THE CITY OF HAYWARD CASTRO VALLEY UNION CITY AND 9 10 UNION CITY, SAN LEANDRO WE SHARE CONCRETE PIPE SO THIS IS SHARED OUTFALL THAT WE ALL MEET AND COLLABORATE ON PROJECTS 11 AND ONE OF THE PROJECTS THAT WE ARE WORKING ON THERE IS FOR A 12 LIVING LEVEE PROJECT. TO FRAME THE CONVERSATION, WE TALK ABOUT 13 DATA AND SCIENCE SORRY FOR THIS AWKWARDLY CROPPED PHOTO, I HAD 14 TO CROP MYSELF OUT. THIS IS MY AUNT BARBARA. AND I DON'T KNOW 15 16 IF ANYONE KNOWS THE PARK SHIRT SHE'S WEARING IT'S A PONTCHARTRAIN PARK. THIS IS A PARK IN NEW ORLEANS. WE TOOK 17 THIS PHOTO NINE YEARS AFTER KATRINA AFTER SHE WAS DISPLACED. 18 SHE WAS LIVING IN BATON ROUGE, VISITING FLORIDA BECAUSE HER 19 HOUSE WAS FLOODED IN BATON ROUGE. SO WHEN WE HAVE THESE 20 21 CONVERSATIONS, I WANT TO GIFT FACE OF HUMANITY THESE ARE MY FAMILIES MEMBERS THAT ARE IMPACTED BY CLIMATE CHANGE AND SEA 22 LEVEL RISE. NEXT SLIDE. SO HERE IS THE SCIENCE PART. RIGHT? 23 SO, THIS IS OUR FIRST MILE PROJECT THE PURPOSE OF THIS PROJECT 24 IS TO PROTECT HABITAT WE'RE LOOKING AT NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS 25

TO PROTECT THAT HABITAT. WE ARE ALSO LOOKING AT WAYS TO DO 1 NUTRIENT REMOVAL BEFORE IT DISCHARGES TO THE BAY. AND THIS 2 3 PROJECT WOULD ALSO LOOK AT PUBLIC ACCESS TO THE SHORELINE. SO, PART OF THIS PROJECT IS AN OVERALL STRATEGY WE'RE ALL LOOKING 4 5 AT ACROSS THE BAY IS HOW DO WE RESPOND TO SEA LEVEL RISE ACROSS THE BAY. THIS AREA IS IN THE LOMA MARSH NEAR THE 6 HAYWARD SHORELINE. SO WE'RE JUST ONE PIECE OF THE PUZZLE. THE 7 8 FIRST MILE LIVING LEVEE PROJECT IS SPONSORED BY THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP, AND WITHOUT THAT FUNDING WE 9 WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO DO OUR DEMONSTRATION PROJECT WHICH IS AT 10 LORA LOMA WHERE THERE ARE STUDENTS STUDYING THIS AREA LOOKING 11 FOR NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS. NEXT SLIDE. SO WHO KNOWS THIS 12 CARTOON? THAT'S RIGHT. I DON'T HAVE A PRIZE. BUT I THINK THERE 13 IS COOKIES OUT IN THE BACK, SO, YOU CAN GRAB A COOKIE. SO, A 14 15 LOT OF MILLENNIALS, GERIATRIC MILLENNIALS, LIKE MYSELF, KNOW 16 THIS CARTOON. AND BEFORE YOU ALL THINK THIS IS A SILLY CARTOON, I WANT TO REMIND YOU THIS IS A VERY IMPORTANT TOOL TO 17 TALK ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE FOR CHILDREN SOME OF THE ACTORS --18 MY FRIENDS KNOW I HAVE AN UNHEALTHY AMOUNT OF KNOWLEDGE OF POP 19 CULTURE, BUT I THINK THE IMD PAGE OF CAPTAIN PLANET IS 20 21 FASCINATING. THEY HAD WHOOPIE GOLDBERG, JEFF GOLDBLUM, ED ASNER, MARTIN SHEEN, DANI GLOVER, AND THE CHARACTER MRS. 22 ANDREWS WAS PLAYED BY ELIZABETH TAYLOR. THE REASON I BRING 23 THIS UP IT'S GOING TO TAKE EVERYTHING ALL INDUSTRIES TO SOLVE 24 THIS PROBLEM SO PART OF THE COMBINATION OF THESE DIFFERENT 25

ENTITIES IS BROUGHT CAPTAIN PLANET TO COME AND SAVE OUR 1 PLANET. THEY WERE SUMMONED TO COME TOGETHER TO ADDRESS CLIMATE 2 3 CHANGE SO WE NEED THE COMMUNITY, ADVOCACY GROUPS, SAFETY BAY IS OUT HERE THANK YOU FOR JOINING US. JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY, 4 5 BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENT WE ALL NEED TO COME TOGETHER IN ORDER TO SOLVE THESE CHALLENGES INCLUDING SEA LEVEL RISE. NEXT 6 SLIDE. SO, THIS IS MY LITTLE GIRL. IT 7 8 DOESN'T QUITE FIT HERE, BUT YOU CAN SEE IT'S EXPANDED, EXPONENTIALLY HERE. RIGHT? AND HOLD ON TO YOUR SEAT, LET'S GO 9 TO 2025. THIS IS MIDDLE OF THE YEAR 2025. ONE MORE SLIDE. I AM 10 HERE TO TELL YOU THAT THE GENTLEMAN THAT IS DR. THORNBERG WHO 11 JUST SPOKE, HE SAID THE ONLY WAY OUT OF THIS PROBLEM IS TO 12 BUILD OUR WAY OUT OF THIS PROBLEM AND THE ONLY WAY FOR YOU TO 13 DO THAT IS TO ACCESS A COUPLE OF PROGRAMS THAT ARE CELEBRATED 14 15 AND PUT FORWARD BY THE ASSOCIATION OF BAY AREA GOVERNMENTS. 16 ONE OF THEM IS CALLED REAP, REAP ONE AND REAP TWO. AND JUST TO 17 GIVE YOU A LITTLE BIT OF AN INTRODUCTION, A REAP IS A STATE FUNDED GRANT PROGRAM, REGIONAL PROGRAM THAT HELPS CITIES AND 18 CANS, LARGELY WITH THESE STATE-MANDATED PROGRAMS. WHEN MY 19 FATHER WAS A COUNCILMEMBER UMP TEEN YEARS AGO, I SAID TO HIM 20 21 ONE DAY WHAT'S THE BIGGEST PROBLEM BEING A MEMBER OF CITY COUNCIL AND HE SAID UNFUNDED MANDATES I NEVER KNEW WHAT THAT 22 REALLY MEANT, BUT IT'S STILL A PROBLEM TODAY, TONIGHT FUND US 23 HERE I'M PROUD TO TELL YOU THAT ABAG RECEIVES THESE FUND AND 24 THE DISTRIBUTION TO THE CITIES AND IN ROHNERT PARK LET ME JUST 25

GO ONE MORE SLIDE, THE STATE USED TO USE THE STICK, WE'RE 1 GOING TO BEAT YOU INTO SUBMISSION, WE'RE GOING TO MAKE YOU 2 BUILD OR ELSE. AND THERE IS MORE OF A CARROT INVOLVED NOW, IF 3 YOU LOOK AT ROHNERT PARK, OUR ABAG DUES THIS YEAR ARE \$14,379 4 5 IT HELPED US GET OUR UP-TO-DATE HOUSING ELEMENT, WHICH WE DID IN 2023, OUR PRO HOUSING DESIGNATION IN 2023, AND ALSO OUR PRO 6 HOUSING DESIGNATION CAN BASICALLY GIVES YOU A LEG UP ON SOME 7 8 OF THESE GRANT APPLICATIONS, BECAUSE OF THAT WE WERE ABLE TO WORK WITH OUR SUBREGIONAL GROUP FOUR LEAF THEY WERE OUR 9 CONSULTANTS AND WERE ABLE TO APPLY FOR HOMEKEY ROUND FUNDING 10 IN 2023, WE RECEIVED \$14.7 MILLION FROM LANDING WHICH HOUSED 11 60 INTERIM HOUSING UNITS IN 2024 WE HAVE GOT PRO HOUSING 12 INCENTIVE PROGRAM \$670 MILLION SET ASIDE FOR AFFORDABLE 13 HOUSING PROJECT AND FOR NEW DOWNTOWN WE HAVE APPLIED AND 14 15 HOMEKEY APPLICATION FOR \$28.7 MILLION TO ACOUIRE AND CONVERT 16 TO PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, THAT WILL BE A BEST WESTERN AND WE'RE GOING TO REHAB TO SEVEN UNITS. THANK YOU VERY MUCH 17 FOR YOUR TIME. I'M TURN IT OVER TO DREW. 18

BILL HIGGINS: BEFORE YOU GO SINCE 2017 THERE HAVE BEEN OVER
400 STATUTORY AMENDMENTS TO HOUSING LAW IN ONE RHNA PERIOD 400
NEW LAWS. I'M MAYOR OF MENLO PARK, SAN MATEO COUNTY 19 SQUARE
MILES 32,000 RESIDENTS HOME TO A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF TECH
COMPANIES, META, SNOW FLAKE, ROBIN HOOD, HEADQUARTERS ALL HAVE
A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF VENTURE CAPITAL FIRMS IN MENLO PARK

SETTING THE SCENE, MENLO PARK IS A SMALL BUT LINEAR CITY WE 1 STRETCH FROM BAY TO HIGHWAY 280 AND ACROSS THAT CAN BE A SMALL 2 3 COMMUNITY BUT A COMMUNITY OF A GREAT DEAL OF DIVERSITY, A GREAT DEAL OF DIVERSITY AND DISPARATE OUTCOMES AND DISPARATE 4 5 ENVIRONMENTS. ONE THING WE WANTED TO DO WITH OUR ENGAGEMENT AS IT RELATES TO BAYREN'S DECARBONIZATION SHOWCASE WAS TO ADDRESS 6 AND RESPOND TO OUR EFFORTS TO DEAL WITH THAT INEQUITY. SO, 7 8 NEXT SLIDE. SO THIS, IS THE BELL HAVEN CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER IT'S ACTUALLY 1 OF 2 EARLY CHILD EDUCATION CENTERS THAT 9 THE CITY RUNS. THIS ONE IS LOCATED IN THE BELL HAVEN COMMUNITY 10 THAT HAS TRADITIONALLY BEEN UNDERSERVED IN MENLO PARK IT IS ON 11 THE BAYSIDE EAST OF HIGHWAY 101. THIS CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER 12 SERVICES 96 PRESCHOOLERS AND SPECIFICALLY TARGETED TO FAMILY 13 WHO FIT WITHIN CERTAIN INCOME PARAMETERS, IT'S A BUILDING FROM 14 15 THE MID 90S AND ALL YOU WOULD EXACTLY FROM A BUILDING FROM THE 16 MID-'90S IT LACKS SOME OF WHAT WE WOULD CONSIDER STANDARD AND UP TO DET SYSTEMS SO BAYREN, DECARBONIZATION SHOWCASE HAS 17 HELPED US LOOK TO ELECTRIFYING BOTH THE HVAC, ELECTRIFYING 18 COOKING AND SOME OTHER SYSTEMS. IT'S BEEN A PAR OF A LARGER 19 PROGRAM AS IT RELATES TO THE BELL HAVEN CHILD DEVELOPMENT 20 21 CENTER THAT HAS ALSO INCLUDED SOLAR TO REALLY LIKE IMPROVE THE ENVIRONMENT FOR THE CHILDREN IN THIS SPACE. AND NEXT SLIDE. SO 22 THESE ARE SOME SLIDES THAT SHOW THE WALK THROUGH, THE 23 ASSESSMENT THAT WAS A KEY PART OF OUR ENGAGEMENT IN THIS 24 PROGRAM. THE PROGRAM PROVIDES STANDARDS AND REGULAR ENGAGEMENT 25

WITH CITY STAFF IN SOME CASES, FUNDING AS IS NEEDED TO GET 1 THESE PROGRAMS IMPLEMENTED. SO FOR US, THE INVOLVEMENT HAS 2 3 TRULY BEEN A SUCCESS. AND THEN JUST THE NEXT SIDE IS THAT THIS IS PART OF -- NEXT SLIDE -- YEAH, AND THIS IS PART OF A LARGER 4 EFFORT FOR US, AGAIN, TO ADDRESS SOME OF THE HISTORIC INEQUITY 5 IN MENLO PARK AND PART AND PARCEL WITH THE UPDATE AND 6 RENOVATION TO THE CHILD COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CENTER, WE 7 8 OPENED UP THE BELL HAVEN COMMUNITY CAMPUS RECENTLY, AND THEN RIGHT ACROSS THE STREET FROM THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER 9 RAVENSWOOD CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT IS ALSO DOING SUBSTANTIAL 10 RENOVATION TO BELL HAVEN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL. THANK YOU. 11

I COUNTY 20 REMEMBER HOW MUCH IT IS BUT IT'S A LOT OF MONEY THAT YOU GUYS 21 GET AS THE REGION TO INVEST FROM PROJECTS. IT'S, WHAT? 39 22 MILLION A YEAR. SO THAT WOULD OTHERWISE BE GOING THROUGH PUC 23 DOING WHATEVER AND YOU GUYS ARE ABLE TO CHANNEL IT AND GET IT 24 TO CITIES. THAT'S JUSTICE A VALUABLE MACRO PIECE ON THAT. SO, 25

NOW LAST AND CERTAINLY NOT LEAST, SHALI FROM THE CITIES OF
 SANTA CLARA COUNTY.

MY NAME IS SHALI S, AND I AM 7 8 THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR THE CITY'S ASSOCIATION OF SANTA CLARA COUNTY WE ARE A JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY OUR BOARD IS 9 10 COMPRISED OF, COUNCILMEMBER OR MAYOR, FROM EACH OF THE 15 CITIES IN SANTA CHAIR COUNTY WE HAVE BEEN COME TOGETHER SUNS 11 1990 TO WORK ON ISSUES OF MUTUAL INTEREST, SO REGIONAL 12 COLLABORATION CROSS JURISDICTIONAL COLLABORATION IS INHERENTLY 13 IN OUR DNA. WE ARE BASED ON THE ONE CITY ONE VOTE MODEL, WHICH 14 15 IS REALLY TRULY ASTONISHING WHEN YOU THINK THAT OUR SMALLEST 16 CITY OF MONTE SERENO HAS 3400 RESIDENTS HAS EQUAL VOTE AS THE 10TH LARGEST CITY IN AMERICA SAN JOSE. I'M PROUD OF THAT. BUT 17 YOU CAN IMAGINE THE ISSUES AFFECTING OUR CITIES ARE DIVERSE 18 CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES ARE DIFFERENT WHEN YOU COMPARE 19 DIFFERENT OPPORTUNITIES, AND COMPARE SAN JOSE CITIES AND IN 20 21 BETWEEN. I WANT TO TALK TO YOU TODAY ABOUT SANTA CLARA PLANNING COLLABORATIVE. WE'RE A NATURAL HOME FOR REGIONAL 22 COLLABORATION. THE COLLABORATIVE AND ALL CITIES COME TOGETHER 23 TO JOIN THE COLLABORATIVE TO WORK ON REGIONAL HOUSING ISSUES. 24 25 THE COLLABORATIVE FORMED SEVERAL YEARS AGO EACH OF THE CITIES

PUT IN SOME AMOUNT OF MONEY SO THAT WE CAN HIRE A TECHNICAL 1 ASSISTANCE CONSULTANT AND I WANT TO GIVE A THANK YOU TO 2 3 COUNCILMEMBER ADAMS FOR THE SHOUT OUT TO REAP FUNDING BECAUSE OF REAP 1 AND 2 OUR COLLABORATIVE HAS BEEN ABLE TO DO SO MUCH 4 5 WORK, AND IT'S SOME IT'S RELEASED SOME OF THE FINANCIAL PROJECT ON OUR CITIES FROM HAVING TO CONTRIBUTE MONEY INTO THE 6 COLLABORATIVE OVER THE LAST SELF YEARS. NICE OVERVIEW OF SANTA 7 8 CHAIR COUNTY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. I WANT TO POINT OUT A COUPLE OF THINGS WE HAVE DONE. WE CAME TOGETHER WORKING ON THE 9 HOUSING ELEMENTS AND THE HCD RESPONSE LETTERS. THIS PLANNING 10 COLLABORATIVE IS REALLY DRIVEN BY CITY STAFF AND WHAT THE 11 NEEDS ARE IN OUR INDIVIDUAL CITIES AND IN OUR REGION. SO ONE 12 OF THE PROJECTS THAT HAS COME OUT OF THIS IS AN ADU WEB SITE 13 WHICH IS OUTWARD FACING IT'S TO HELP HOMEOWNERS WHO WANT TO 14 PUT IN AN ADU, PREAPPROVED PLANS. IT'S VERY COOL AND VERY NEW 15 16 IT'S VERY COOL. I WANT TO INVITE YOU ALL TO TAKE A LOOK AT IT. AND THEN AS I SAID, THE PLANNING COLLABORATIVE IS REALLY 17 DRIVEN BY THE NEEDS OF OUR CITIES VIA THE CITY STAFF THAT 18 PARTICIPATE. SO THERE IS -- SORRY. WE DO TRAININGS AND 19 RESOURCES SO YOU CAN SEE THIS IS A TRAINING ON AFFORDABLE 20 21 HOUSING FINANCE, WHICH IS GEARED TOWARDS CITY STAFF. WE HAVE ALSO CREATED THE QUICK GUIDE TO CREATING ANTI-DISPLACEMENT 22 STRATEGIES SO ALL OF THESE THINGS ARE REALLY DRIVEN BY THE 23 NEEDS OF OUR CITIES. I'LL SAVE THE REST FOR QUESTIONS. 24

BILL HIGGINS: THANK YOU. AND I'M GOING TO DO SOME -- A QUICK 1 ROUND OF QUESTIONS RIGHT NOW. BUT I'M GOING TO JUST TAKE --2 3 ACTUALLY, I'M GOING TO ASK THE PANEL. I SAW THE PERSON COMING FOR MY MICROPHONE. BUT I'LL JUST SAY IN THE SAME WAY THAT 4 5 YOU'RE DUES GOES TO ABAG AND ABAG CAN POOL IT AND USE THE ECONOMIES OF SCALE TO DO MORE FOR YOUR COMMUNITIES THE SAME IS 6 TRUE FOR THE 49 REGIONS IN THE STATE THAT PAY DUES TO CALCOG 7 8 AND I'M GOING TO TALK A VICTORY LAP HERE YOUR DUES HELPED US ACTUALLY WRITE THE FIRST REAP ONE AMENDMENT THAT BROUGHT \$20 9 MILLION TO THIS REGION. AND THEN REAP TWO BROUGHT \$105 MILLION 10 TO THIS REGION. SO, WE'RE PRETTY HAPPY WITH THAT. SO, JUST 11 GOING BACK, AND I'M GOING TO START WITH REAP AND THEN GO TO 12 YOU ANGELA. BUT YOU KNOW, IF TERMS OF, MAYBE YOU COULD TALK A 13 LITTLE BIT, SHEELA, ABOUT HOW THE -- HOW YOU SAVE THE 14 15 COMMUNITY FROM, LIKE, FOR PLANNING STAFF, OR ACHIEVING 16 ECONOMIES OF SCALE. BECAUSE YOU'RE DOING IT ONCE INSTEAD OF 14 OR 15 TIMES. 17

19 SHALI SIRKAY: THANK YOU. I DON'T WANT TO HARP ON THE DIFFERENT 20 SIZE OF OUR CITIES BUT SMALLER CITIES CAN'T AFFORD THE LEVEL 21 OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE THAT WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO LEVERAGE 22 WITH REAP FUNDING AND UNLESS YOU THINK SAN JOSE DOESN'T TAKE 23 ADVANTAGE OF IT AS MUCH AS FOR EXAMPLE, MONTE SERENO OR 24 SARATOGA DO, THEY ALL TAKE ADVANTAGE OF IT EQUALLY AND THEY'RE 25 ALL WORKING TOGETHER TO COME UP WITH A COHERENT STRATEGY. SO

YOU SAVE TIME, MONEY, RESOURCES, AS YOU SAW FROM THE ADU WEB
 SITE YOU'RE ALSO CREATING SHARED LEARNING AND SHARD RESOURCES
 THAT BENEFIT ALL OF US IN SANTA CHAIR COUNTY. SO, YEAH, IT'S A
 TREMENDOUS VALUE. I CAN GO INTO HOW MUCH MONEY SOME OF OUR
 CITIES HAVE SAVED, BUT WE'LL SAVE THAT.

7 BILL HIGGINS: I'M GOING TO SWITCH TO YOU ANGELA IN TERMS, A 8 LOT OF TIMES LOCALS ARE FACING CHARGES IN PARTICULARLY WITH 9 THESE MEGA PROJECTS WITH THE BAY AND SEA LEVEL RISE HOW IS 10 YOUR ENTITY HELPING ADDRESS THOSE ISSUES?

ANGELA ANDREWS: SUPERVISOR MAROUEZ WAS HERE EARLIER I WANTED 12 TO EFFECTIVE A SHOUT OUT TO HER, SHE WAS INSTRUMENTAL IN 13 MAKING SURE AGENCIES WERE COMING TOGETHER FOR THE HAYWARD 14 15 SHORELINE AND IMPLEMENTATION PLAN ADDED EAST BAY DISCHARGES 16 AUTHORITY I WOULD SAY RIGHT NOW THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE IS FUNDING AND GROUPS LIKE ABAG HELP WITH OBTAINING FUNDING 17 THAT'S HOW WE WERE ABLE TO GET THAT GRANT TO DO THAT 18 DEMONSTRATION PROJECT AT LOMA FOR US TO STUDY WHAT NEEDS TO BE 19 DONE THERE BUT FUNDING CHALLENGES ALSO ADVOCACY WE DEPEND ON 20 21 GROUPS LIKE ABAG TO DO ADVOCACY WORK FOR US, AS A LOT OF THE JURISDICTIONS ARE INUNDATED WITH OTHER CHALLENGES THAT IMPACTS 22 LOCAL JURISDICTIONS SO THIS IS ONE BIG PROBLEM THAT OUR STAFF 23 MAY NOT HAVE THE TIME TO FOCUS ON, SO IF WE HAVE SOMEONE 24 THAT'S FOCUSED ON THOSE DIFFERENT OPPORTUNITIES OF GETTING 25

GRANTS, WRITING LETTERS, AND HAVING MEETINGS, IT'S REALLY 1 HELPFUL FOR OUR STAFF. AS WELL AS LOOKING AT WHAT OTHER 2 3 JURISDICTIONS ARE DOING IN TERMS OF PERMITTING, POLICY CHANGES, TO KEEP THE FOCUS ON THE MISSION FOR SEA LEVEL RISE 4 5 ADAPTATION AND MAKING SURE THAT WE'RE LOOKING AT WHAT OTHER JURISDICTIONS ARE DOING, SO WE CAN ALSO COLLABORATE. 6 7 8 BILL HIGGINS: AND IN THIS LIGHTENING ROUND OF QUESTIONS, MAYOR COMBS, I MIGHT ASK YOU ABOUT WHAT -- YOU KNOW, IF BAYREN 9 10 WASN'T AVAILABLE, AND YOU WANTED TO ACHIEVE THESE GOALS ON

11 YOUR OWN, WHAT OPTION -- WHAT WOULD IT HAVE BEEN LIKE IF YOU
12 HAD TO GO IT ALONE?

DREW COMBS: YEAH, IT'S REALLY INTERESTING WHENEVER STAFF IS 14 PROPOSING SOMETHING TO ME, LIKE MY FIRST QUESTION IS, HOW MUCH 15 16 DOES IT COST? HAS SOMEONE DONE IT BEFORE, AND DO THEY HAVE PICTURES. RIGHT? IN THOSE INSTANCES WHERE IS THERE IS, AGAIN, 17 ESPECIALLY FOR SMALLER COMMUNITIES WHERE THERE IS CLEAR 18 EXAMPLES AND CLEAR TECHNICAL EXPERTISE THAT DOESN'T EXIST 19 WITHIN YOUR CITIES BECAUSE ECONOMIES OF SCALE DON'T ALLOW IT, 20 21 THEN IT REALLY BECOMES FOR US AN AMAZING VALUE-ADD AND REALLY THE THING THAT ALLOWS US TO DO SOME OF THESE PROJECTS. WITH 22 SOMETHING LIKE THE BAYREN SHOWCASE IT'S LIKE PUTTING TOGETHER, 23 PROVIDING THE TECHNICAL EXPERTISE, SHOWING US EXAMPLES OF HOW 24 25 IT'S BEEN DONE BEFORE, AND ALMOST PROVIDING TO SOME DEGREE, A

BUFFET, LIKE YOU CAN DO IT THIS WAY, GET THIS BENEFIT, AND 1 THIS COST, AND YEAH WE HAVE DONE THIS WITH CHILD CARE CENTERS 2 3 THAT WAS BUILT IN THE 1980S AND 1980S STANDARDS BEFORE SO THOSE ARE FOR US MENLO PARK WERE ENORMOUS VALUES AS WE LOOKED 4 5 AT THE SPECIFIC PROJECT OF COURSE WE HAVE HAD TO GO PROJECTS WE HAVE AS THE COMMUNITY CAMPUS, A MUCH LARGER PROJECT, OVER 6 \$50 MILLION. WE ALSO HAD MAJOR CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE PROJECT 7 8 FROM META, WHICH WE DIDN'T HAVE IN THIS SITUATION. AND THERE WAS FUNDS TO HIRE CONSULTANTS, NOT AVAILABLE HERE, BUT WE WERE 9 10 ABLE TO RELY ON THAT CONSULTANT FOR TECHNICAL EXPERTISE.

SPEAKER: JUST WATCHING THE COLLABORATIVE WORK ALL OF OUR 6 CITIES AND CITY STAFF KIND OF WORK IN SILOS, WHAT'S HAPPENING 7 8 IN PALO ALTO AND STAFF ARE WORKING ON THEIR ISSUES AND THE SAME FOR MOUNTAIN VIEW, AND CAMPBELL, I CALL OUT THESE CITIES 9 BECAUSE MY COUNCILMEMBERS ARE HERE, AND EVEN OUTSIDE PLANNING 10 COLLABORATIVE MEETINGS CITY STAFF ARE STILL WORKING TOGETHER 11 AND LEARNING, THE ART OFFICIAL BOUNDARIES OF OUR JURISDICTIONS 12 ARE ARBITRARY, IT'S HOMELESSNESS, HOUSING, CROSS CITY CROSS 13 JURISDICTIONAL ISSUES WORKING TOGETHER.
