- 11 PROJECT FOR, FOR THE 2026 SHOP. TO ADDRESS SEA LEVEL RISE. OUR
- 12 OTHER NEAR-TERM PROJECT IS ON U.S. 101 IN MARIN CITY AT
- 13 DONAHUE EXIT INTERCHANGE FOR 20 MILLION TO ADDRESS FLOODING
- 14 INCARNATION WITH MARIN COUNTY AS WELL AS INTERIM SEA LEVEL
- 15 RISE. WHAT'S NEW FOR US AT CALTRANS IS WE NOW HAVE PERFORMANCE
- 16 MEASURES IN OUR STATEWIDE -- STATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM MANAGEMENT
- 17 PLAN FOR THE 2023 CYCLE. FOR DISTRICT FOUR, WE'RE TAKING THE
- 18 OPPORTUNITY TO NOMINATE PROJECTS IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS OF OUR
- 19 10-YEAR SHOP. FOR A TOTAL OF 1.4 BILLION. MOST OF IT IS GOING
- 20 TO BE LONG LEAD OR LONG-TERM. BUT SOME OF IT WE'RE HOPING TO
- 21 PHASE AND BE SHORTER. SO, WE'RE TAKING A LOOK, AS MENTIONED,

- 23 U.S. 101 AND MARIN CITY. WE'RE ALSO LOOKING AT SALINAS LAGOON,
- 24 U.S. 101 IN SANTA CLARA, ALONG THE SOUTH BAY SHORELINE, ROUTE
- 25 ONE IN BOLINAS ASSUMING WE GET OUR ADAPTATION STUDY COMPLETED

- 4 VERY FAMILIAR WITH THE WORK THAT'S BEEN DONE IN THE PAST BUT
- 5 HORIZONTAL LEVEES SEEM TO BE WORKING. I'M JUST KIND OF CURIOUS
- 6 WHAT YOUR POSITION IS ON THAT.

- 9 TOGETHER, WITH SAN FRANCISCO BAY ESTUARY GROUP AND WE AT OUR
- 10 BURMA ROAD SO WE ARE TRYING TO WORK WITH ALL OUR PARTNERS IN
- 11 EXPLORING HORIZONTAL LEVEES OR LIVING LEVEES, AS ONE OF THE
- 12 STRATEGIES THAT, YOU KNOW, CAN ADDRESS SEA LEVEL RISE.
- 13 OBVIOUSLY WE'RE LOOKING AT ALL THE STRATEGIES. WE'RE
- 14 FOLLOWING, YOU KNOW, OCEAN PROTECTION COUNCIL GUIDELINES AND
- 15 TAKING A LOOK AT THE BROADER STRATEGIES OF --

- 6 HAD A NICE BOARD RETREAT. AND OUR BOARD IS VERY SUPPORTIVE OF
- 7 THE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING THAT BARC IS WORKING ON
- 8 PUTTING TOGETHER FOR THE AGENCIES COMING TOGETHER THAT WORK
- 9 JOINTLY TO ADDRESS SEA LEVEL RISE THREAT AND FLOODING HERE IN
- 10 THE BAY AREA. SO I WANT TO REPORT-OUT ON THAT, THAT WE'RE VERY
- 11 SUPPORTIVE AND LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH ALLISON AND THE
- 12 TEAM TO GET AN MOU, WHEN YOU WORK WITH THIS MANY AGENCIES
- 13 THAT, WE CAN ALWAYS AGREE TO AND MOVE FORWARD. AND IN NEWS
- 14 ABOUT THE GREENACTION COMMUNITY GROUP IN BAYVIEW-HUNTERS
- 15 POINT, THEIR NOTICE OF INTENT TO SUE EPA AND THE NAVY FOR THE
- 16 NAVAL SHIPYARD, WE'LL CONTINUE TO WORK WITH GREENACTION, WE
- 17 MEET ON MONDAY AND CONTINUE TO MEET, TO DISCUSS TOXIC
- 18 SUBSTANCES AND DISCUSS HOW WE'RE DEALING WITH ADDRESSING SEA
- 19 LEVEL RISE AND CLEAN UP SITES. THIS FIVE-YEAR REVIEW REPORT
- 20 FOR HUNTERS POINT HAS BEEN GOING ON FOR A LONG TIME, FOR
- 21 PEOPLE LIVING THERE, SOME MULTI-GENERATIONAL AND WE WILL
- 22 CONTINUE TO MAKE PROGRESS ON THAT. IT'S BEEN IN THE NEWS AND I
- 23 WANT TO BE SURE THEY'RE AWARE OF OUR ROLE AND CONTINUE WITH
- 24 THE GROUPS THERE. AND SOMETHING THAT IMPACTS THE ENTIRE SAN
- 25 FRANCISCO BAY REGION IS THAT WE'LL BE ISSUING THE THIRD WEEK



- 1 WATERSHED PERMIT WE'LL REQUIRE NUTRIENT REDUCTION FROM THE BAY
- 2 AREA WASTEWATER UTILITIES AND PART OF THAT WE'LL BE
- 3 ENCOURAGING MULTI-BENEFIT SOLUTIONS LOOKING AT HORIZONTAL
- 4 LEVEES, LOOKING AT RECYCLED WATER AS PART OF THE PORTFOLIO FOR
- 5 REDUCING NUTRIENTS. THOSE ARE THE HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE WATER.

- 16 STATE GRANT FOR HIGHWAY 37 UPGRADES. THE CALIFORNIA
- 17 TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION RECENTLY APPROVED A \$50 MILLION
- 18 GRANT TO HELP MTC, CALTRANS, AND OUR PARTNERS ADVANCED
- 19 TRANSPORTATION AT ECOLOGICAL RESILIENCE ALONG THE STATE ROUTE
- 20 37 THIS INCLUDES RESTORATION OF TIDAL MARSH IN SOLANO COUNTY

- 14 PARKS WE'RE GOING TO DO SOME IMPROVEMENTS FOR PUBLIC ACCESS

- 16 PLANNING WHICH I'M SURE ARE COORDINATING WITH MTC CALTRANS IS

- 5 POINT, BUT WE HAVE NOT BEEN TOLD EXACTLY WHEN. I HAVE SEEN A
- 6 LITTLE BIT OF IT, AND IF I WERE TO TELL YOU ANYTHING ABOUT IT,
- 7 NOT ONLY WOULD I LOSE MY JOB, BUT I WOULD HAVE TO KILL YOU
- 8 ALL. AND IT IS BEING VERY CLOSELY GUARDED. BUT WE WILL HAVE A

- 10 WAS FACING A \$68 BILLION DEFICIT, GIVE OR TAKE A FEW. IT'S NOW
- 11 DOWN TO 40. BUT AS THE LATE EVERETT DIRK SON SAID, A BILLION
- 12 HERE AND A BILLION THERE ADS UP TO REAL MONEY. WITH REGARDS TO
- 13 BCDC, I CAN TELL YOU THAT THE BIGGEST DISAPPOINTMENT WITH

- 20 LARRY GOLDZBAND: THERE ARE 101 CITIES, BUT THERE ARE 46 THAT
- 21 TOUCH THE BAY. FROM OUR PERSPECTIVE, THE WAY I TEND TO SEE IT,
- 22 BENEFICIAL REUSE IS, SORT OF, A WHOLESALE ISSUE AS OPPOSED TO

12 PAT ECKLUND: NO, IT'S NOT EMBARRASSING.

- 14 AMY HUTZEL: THIS YEAR, THE CORP OF ENGINEERS DOES MOST OF THE
- 15 DREDGING IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY. 2 MILLION CUBIC YARDS.

16

- 17 PAT ECKLUND: I SPENT A LOT OF TIME ON THE [INDISCERNIBLE]
- 18 DREDGE. [LAUGHTER]

- 20 AMY HUTZEL: YEAH. AND THIS YEAR, THE CORP WAS ABLE TO
- 21 BENEFICIALLY USE 80% OF THE DREDGE SEDIMENT, WHICH IS DOUBLE
- 22 WHAT THEY HAVE DONE HISTORICALLY AND IT'S BECAUSE OF FEDERAL
- 23 APPROPRIATIONS OF FEDERAL INFRASTRUCTURE ACT FUNDING. I THINK

- 22 US. THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP IS A PLACE-BASED
- 23 NON-REGULATORY PROGRAM OF THE U.S. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION
- 24 AGENCY. WE'RE 1 OF 28 MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM
- 25 WHICH WAS ESTABLISHED BY CONGRESS IN 1988 TO PROTECT AND



- 1 RESTORE ESTUARIES OF NATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE. THE NATIONAL
- 2 ESTUARY PROGRAM MODEL FOCUSES ON LOCAL PARTNERSHIP,
- 3 COLLABORATION, AND CONSENSUS BUILDING. WE LEVERAGE FUNDING AND
- 4 PARTNERSHIPS TO SUPPORT EFFORTS TO PROTECT, ENHANCE, AND

- 1 ADVANCING NBS ON THE SHORELINE ARE INCREASING, MULTIPLE
- 2 DRIVERS OF SEA LEVEL RISE, FLOODING, WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENT
- 3 NEEDS AND OTHER PRESSURES ON THE SHORELINE INCREASE OUR
- 4 URGENCY TO ADVANCE INNOVATIVE APPROACHES AND SUPPORT MULTI-
- 5 BENEFIT PROJECTS IN PARTICULAR. WE HAVE A NUMBER OF REGIONAL
- 6 GUIDING DOCUMENTS THAT REALLY ELEVATE THE IMPORTANCE OF NBS,
- 7 INCLUDING PLANNED BAY AREA, THE ESTUARY BLUEPRINT, WHICH I
- 8 MENTIONED, AND THE BAY ADAPT JOINT PLATFORM, AS WELL AS STATE
- 9 AND FEDERAL EXECUTIVE ORDERS, INCLUDING ONE FROM THE BIDEN

- 1 WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANTS AND IN THIS IMAGE, ANGELA ZIEGLER
- 2 EPA DEVELOPED I WANT TO CREDIT HER ON THE LEFT YOU SEE AN
- 3 EXAMPLE OF THE TRADITIONAL FLOOD PROTECTION SYSTEM WASTEWATER
- 4 TREATMENT PLANT IN THIS CASE BEHIND THE WALL. THIS
- 5 CONVENTIONAL APPROACH IS SUSCEPTIBLE TO FAILURE AS THEY DON'T
- 6 DISSIPATE WAVE ACTION AND AS THE WAVES OVER THE TOP OF THAT
- 7 SYSTEM THE SEA WILL REACH ITS LIMIT IN TERMS OF PROTECTION.
- 8 THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE SOLUTION ALTERNATIVE ON THE RIGHT IS HARD
- 9 LANDSCAPE IT LINES EXISTING STORM CONTROL LEVEES IN SOME CASES
- 10 GRADUALLY SLOPED MARSH PLANTED WITH NATIVE VEGETATION IN
- 11 ADDITION USES TREATED WASTEWATER REVERSE OSMOSIS CONCENTRATE
- 12 WE'RE BEGINNING TO EXPLORE PROVIDING SIGNIFICANT BENEFITS FOR

- 23 BENEFITS WITH THE REMOVAL OF NUTRIENTS AND CONTAMINANTS OF

- 4 IMPETUS OF CALTRANS ASKING AS FP TO CONVENE INITIATING

- 14 USING SOME OF THE CREATIVE FUNDING TO BUILD THIS CONCEPT WE
- 15 HAVE BEEN MONITORING EVER SINCE CURRENTLY STUDYING
- 16 MICROPLASTICS AND PFAS FOREVER CHEMICALS. ANOTHER PROJECT,
- 17 PALO ALTO HORIZONTAL LEVEE A PROJECT THAT'S BEGINNING
- 18 CONSTRUCTION THIS YEAR AND THIS WILL BE THE FIRST TIME WE'RE
- 19 SEEING HORIZONTAL LEVEE THAT'S RIGHT ON THE SHORELINE DIRECTLY
- 20 DISCHARGING WASTEWATER RIGHT THROUGH THE WETLAND AND OUT INTO
- 21 THE BAY. SO, IT'S A HUGE STEP FOR THE REGION. IMPLEMENTS

- 7 PROCESSES. NEXT SLIDE. WITH THAT, THANK YOU VERY MUCH.
- 8 WONDERFUL TO PRESENT TO YOU ALL THIS MORNING. THANK YOU.

- 10 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU SO VERY MUCH. OPEN UP FOR
- 11 QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS. YES, DIRECTOR ECKLUND.

- 13 PAT ECKLUND: YOUR PRESENTATION IS EVEN BETTER TODAY THAN IT
- 14 WAS YESTERDAY. [LAUGHTER] NO QUESTION ABOUT IT. AND YOU KNOW,
- 15 FOR SOMEONE -- I HAVE TO HAVE A RIP REPLACEMENT. I'M IN A LOT
- 16 OF PAIN, BUT I'M NOT FOCUSING ON THE PAIN. I'M FOCUSING ON
- 17 THIS GREAT PROJECT. I HAVE A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS. ONE IS
- 18 PROBABLY A LITTLE -- I'M NOT SURE YOU HAVE HAD ANY THOUGHTS
- 19 ABOUT THIS, BUT WHEN I WENT BACK TO DC, WE DID THAT POLICY ON
- 20 REUSE OF MUNICIPAL SLUDGE. HAVE YOU THOUGHT OF THE POSSIBILITY
- 21 OF REUSING MUNICIPAL SLUDGE ALONG WITH DREDGE MATERIAL FOR
- 22 APPLICATION IN MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION THESE AREAS? BECAUSE
- 23 ONE OF THE THINGS THAT THE -- WHEN I WAS WORKING FOR EPA, EPA
- 24 WAS PROMOTING REINJECTION, AND USE OF WASTEWATER TREATED
- 25 WASTEWATER, WHETHER REINJECTING INTO THE GROUNDS OR REUSING



- 1 IT, AND FOR APPLICATION ON AG-LAND, ALONG WITH DREDGE MATERIAL
- 2 IN AG-LAND SO THERE IS REUSE COMPONENT THERE. HAVE YOU HAD ANY
- 3 DISCUSSION ABOUT POSSIBLY THINKING ABOUT COMBINING MUNICIPAL
- 4 SLUDGE WITH DREDGE MATERIAL? SEE FIGURE THERE'S A WAY WE CAN
- 5 USE BOTH. BECAUSE THOSE ARE TWO AREAS WHERE GOVERNMENTS AND
- 6 COUNTIES, WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITIES ARE HAVING
- 7 CHALLENGES NOT ONLY REUSE OF TREATED WATER BUT ALSO MUNICIPAL
- 8 SLUDGE AND WHAT TO DO WITH IT? JUST A QUESTION.

- 10 SPEAKER: THANK YOU FOR THAT. TO CLARIFY, BY MUNICIPAL SLUDGE
- 11 DO YOU MEAN BIOSOLIDS?

13 PAT ECKLUND: YES.

14

- 15 SPEAKER: YES WE DEFINITELY HAVE LOOKED AT THAT AND WE HAVE
- 16 BEEN WORKING WITH SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY SUBSTITUTE, I THINK
- 17 THERE IS SOME CONCERN WITHIN BIO SOLIDS CONTAMINANTS. I'M ALL
- 18 EARS PASSING SOME STUDIES ALONG TO THE RIGHT FOLKS TO HELP
- 19 ADVANCE THAT BUT SOME SITES WHERE WE HAVE BEEN DISCUSSING IT
- 20 DEFINITELY TRYING TO OVERCOME THAT QUESTION OF CONTAMINATION.

- 22 PAT ECKLUND: I WOULD LOVE TO HAVE SOME DISCUSSION AT SOME
- 23 POINT. THANK YOU.

2	SUE NOACK: I HAVE NEVER HEARD OF HORIZONTAL LEVEES BEFORE BUT
3	I LOVE THE CONCEPT OF COMING FROM THE EAST COAST THAT GETS HIT

5	ME AN IDEA, I'M NOT THE FINANCE PERSON, AN IDEA OF THE COST

7	\$105 BILLION COST, I THINK IT'S GOING TO BE IMPORTANT FOR US

10	SPEAKER: YEAH. WE GOT THIS QUESTION YESTERDAY FROM THE
11	EXECUTIVE BOARD. ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD.
12	
13	SUE NOACK: I DIDN'T KNOW THAT.
14	
15	SPEAKER: THIS IS A REALLY IMPORTANT QUESTION AND IT'S ON MY
16	LIST OF STUDIES TO DO A COST BENEFIT ANALYSIS OF THE
17	HORIZONTAL LEVEE NATURE-BASED SOLUTION COMPARED TO TRADITIONAL
18	FLOOD PROTECTION. I DON'T HAVE A GOOD APPLES TO APPLES
19	COMPARISON TO GIVE YOU BUT I KNOW THEY'RE EXPECTED TO BE AT
20	LOWER COST THAN THE TRADITIONAL ENGINEERED APPROACH. AND I
21	WOULD LOVE TO INVESTIGATE THAT FURTHER. SORRY.
22	
23	CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: OKAY WE'RE GOING TO GO NEXT TO
24	SUPERVISOR GIOIA.



- 1 JOHN GIOIA: YEAH. I APPRECIATE THE PRESENTATION. I WANT TO
- 2 HIGHLIGHT ON THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE, BECAUSE OUR OFFICE IS
- 3 INVOLVED WITH THE NORTH RICHMOND PROJECT. I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT
- 4 WHAT IS REALLY UNIQUE ABOUT THE PROJECT ALONG THE NORTH
- 5 RICHMOND SHORELINE IS THAT THE COMMUNITY WAS INVOLVED IN
- 6 REALLY HELPING DEVELOP THAT RECOMMENDATION, WORKING WITH
- 7 EXPERTS. IT CAME OUT OF THE RESILIENT BY DESIGN COMPETITION A
- 8 FEW YEARS AGO SPONSORED BY BCDC. AND THE HORIZONTAL LEVEE,
- 9 THIS NATURE-BASED SOLUTION, IT'S ALSO INVOLVING WETLAND
- 10 RESTORATION. WHICH IS WHY IT'S GETTING SOME FUNDING FROM THE
- 11 SAN FRANCISCO BAY RESTORATION AUTHORITY, AND IN PROVIDING
- 12 COBENEFITS TO THE NEIGHBORING COMMUNITY OF NORTH RICHMOND. SO,
- 13 IT'S -- AND I HOLD THAT UP AS A MODEL BECAUSE THE COMMUNITY
- 14 HAS REALLY BEEN INTIMATELY INVOLVED WITH THIS PROJECT AS IT'S
- 15 GONE ALONG. SO IT'S MORE OF THOSE PROJECTS WHERE WE ENGAGE AND
- 16 INVOLVE COMMUNITY. I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT THAT. THANK YOU, JOSH
- 17 FOR YOUR WORK FROM THE BEGINNING WORKING WITH US ON THIS. JOSH
- 18 BRADT, SO LOOKING FORWARD TO GETTING THAT PROJECT FUNDED.
- 20 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. ANY OTHER QUESTIONS OR
- 21 COMMENTS FROM BOARD MEMBERS? EITHER HERE IN THE BOARDROOM OR
- 22 ON ZOOM? ANY QUESTIONS FROM ANY BOARD MEMBERS ON ZOOM? IF SO
- 23 PLEASE RAISE YOUR HANDS. ALLISON? YES?

- 1 ALLISON BROOKS: I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT, AND THANK YOU SO MUCH.
- 2 THAT WAS A WONDERFUL PRESENTATION -- AS I HAVE BEEN LEARNING
- 3 ABOUT NATURE-BASED STRATEGIES, AS WELL, JUST HOW THEY COULD BE
- 4 USED FOR OTHER HAZARDS, NOT JUST FOR FLOODING AND SEA LEVEL
- 5 RISE, BUT FOR HEAT AND HOW WE CAN CREATE MORE -- I KNOW IN NEW
- 6 YORK CITY FOR EXAMPLE, THEY'RE MOVING FORWARD WITH AN EFFORT
- 7 TO MAKE NEW YORK A SPONGE. SO, WHEREVER THEY CAN, CREATE
- 8 PLACES WHERE, FOR WATER TO GO AND BE ABSORBED. AND THE SAME
- 9 IDEA HERE AND HOW IT CAN BE APPLIED TO MORE THAN JUST SEA
- 10 LEVEL RISE ISSUES, AS WELL.

- 18 IT'S SET UP, YOU SEE COBENEFITS AND ALL THE THINGS THAT IT'S
- 19 DOING, AND YOU SEE HOW BEAUTIFUL IT IS AS A RECREATION AREA
- 20 FOR PEOPLE TO WALK OUT WITH THEIR FAMILIES, THE WILDLIFE IT
- 21 ATTRACTS. AND GOING BACK TO THE EARLIER CONVERSATION ABOUT
- 22 BENEFICIAL REUSE OF DREDGE, I BELIEVE, IF I REMEMBER
- 23 CORRECTLY, OVER THE FIRST TEN YEARS OR SO, THE LEVEE HEIGHT
- 24 WENT UP TWO OR THREE FEET. AND IT'S FROM THE NATURAL TIDAL
- 25 ACTION OF THE SILT IN THE WATER DROPPING OUT AS IT GETS CAUGHT



- 1 IN THE LEVEE. SO, ALL THESE DIFFERENT BENEFITS GOING ON SO
- 2 THAT WHEN YOU TRY TO DO THE COST BENEFIT ANALYSIS, YOU HAVE TO
- 3 WEIGH ALL OF THAT IN. IT'S NOT LIKE YOU BUILD THIS AND THAT
- 4 WALL THAT EVERYBODY HATES, BECAUSE IT'S UGLY, AND YOU HAVE TO
- 5 REPLACE IT IN 10 OR 15 YEARS. IT'S A VERY DIFFERENT APPROACH
- 6 THAT HAS ALL THESE OTHER BENEFITS. TO GO OUT THERE AND LOOK AT
- 7 IT IN Oro LOMA IT'S A REALLY PRODUCTIVE USE OF OUR TIME.

- 9 LARRY GOLDZBAND: CAN I -- AND ONLY BECAUSE SUPERVISOR GIOIA IS
- 10 BCDC COMMISSIONER, AND HAPPENS TO BE THE CHAIR OF LOCAL
- 11 ELECTED TASK FORCE, WE TOOK THE LOCAL ELECTED TASK FORCE OUT
- 12 TO NORTH RICHMOND AREA, AND IT'S A REALLY TREMENDOUSLY
- 13 VISUALLY EFFECTIVE WAY TO UNDERSTAND HOW THE PROCESS WORKS.
- 14 IT'S TRULY BUILDING A BETTER MOUSE TRAP IF YOU CAN FIGURE OUT
- 15 THE RIGHT VENUE -- AND THAT'S REALLY VERY MUCH THE ISSUE --
- 16 AND, SORT OF, JUST START OFF THE PROCESS.

- 18 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: OKAY. I'LL ASK ARE THERE ANY OTHER
- 19 QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS? THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THE
