HOW IT MIGHT AFFECT PROGRAMS ANY FUNDING FOR THE PROGRAMS I 1 DID WANT TO HIGHLIGHT AND SOME OF THE WORK THAT'S BEING DONE 2 HERE RECOGNIZED IN A UCLA REPORT IN TERMS OF BEING INNOVATIVE 3 AND PLANNING SO THAT'S ALWAYS NICE TO SEE AND EVEN IF IT'S IN 4 5 OUR SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA COLLEAGUES UCLA, AND THE WEB SITE HIGHLIGHTING SOME ASSISTANCE WORK THAT'S BEING DONE BY ABAG I 6 THINK THAT'S REALLY SOMETHING THAT CAN BE LOOKED AT THROUGHOUT 7 8 THE STATE AS GOOD WORK. THERE WAS ONE OTHER THING I WANTED TO SAY BUT I THINK YOU COVERED IT ALSO JUST TO NOTE THAT FORMER 9 ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER JIM SPERING WAS HONORED ON THE 10 SENATE FLOOR ON FEBRUARY 14TH VALENTINE'S DAY. SO, AS MY COMMUNITY LOOKS TO, FOR AREAS FOR 22 NOMINATION, I KNOW ONE OF THE THOUGHT PROCESSES WAS TRYING TO 23 SEE IF WE WOULD QUALIFY OR SHOULD APPLY FOR FORUM TO MARKET 24 25 ROUTES.

1 ALIX BOCKELMAN: I THINK WHEN WE'RE TRYING TO DO IS GET 2 3 NOMINATIONS FOR PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS AND WHAT YOU'RE BRINGING UP IS, SORT OF, AN IMPORTANT LINK, THE MTC COMMISSION 4 5 IS ACTUALLY SETTING ASIDE MONEY FOR PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS IN EACH OF ITS MOST RECENT ONE BAY AREA GRANT PROGRAMS. 6 AND IN THE PAST, FARM TO MARKET PROJECTS HAVE BEEN AMONG THE 7 8 ELIGIBLE TYPES OF PROJECTS. SO, AND IF THERE IS ANYTHING THAT 9 MATT MALONEY WANTS TO ADD, HE CAN. 10 WANDA WILLIAMS: SO DOES THAT MEAN YES? OR? 11 12 ALIX BOCKELMAN: SO, AGAIN, I THINK YOU'RE ASKING ABOUT THE 13 FUNDING AND THIS IS REALLY ABOUT NOMINATING AREAS. SO, IN THE 14 15 PAST, THE FUNDING PROGRAM HAS ALLOWED THE PCA FUNDING PROGRAM 16 HAS ALLOWED FOR FARM TO MARKET PROJECT ELIGIBILITY. 17 WANDA WILLIAMS: OKAY. NORRIS, TOLLING AND OPERABILITY, WE RECEIVED LEGISLATIVE 1 HISTORY OF ALL BILLS WE'RE TRACKING AND RECEIVED UPDATE ON 2 3 SB63 THIS IS THE WIENER ARREGUIN TRANSPORTATION REVENUE MEASURE TO DEAL WITH THE FISCAL CLIFF FACED BY OUR PUBLIC 4 5 TRANSIT AGENCIES WE RECOMMENDED THAT THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD APPROVE A SUPPORT POSITION ON CAP-AND-TRADE WHICH YOU WILL 6 HEAR IN JUST A LITTLE BIT. AND THOSE ARE SHOWN IN UNDERLINE. SO, 9 10 BASICALLY, CAP-AND-TRADE, AS YOU PROBABLY KNOW, IS NOT GOING TO CONTINUE WITHOUT AN EXTENSION AND OTHERWISE WILL SUNSET IN 11 2030. AND SO THERE IS A LOT OF ACTIVITY TO EXTEND THE PROGRAM 12 AND THAT CREATES AN OPPORTUNITY TO REVISIT HOW THE FUNDS ARE 13 USED. AGAIN, THIS IS THE STATE'S MARKET BASED MECHANISM FOR 14 15 REDUCING GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS. AND, SO, I'LL JUST WALK 16 REALLY OUICKLY THROUGH THESE NINE PRINCIPLES. AND HIGHLIGHT THE CHANGES. SO, THE FIRST IS TO SUPPORT A LONG-TERM 17 EXTENSION. WE HAVEN'T SPECIFIED A DATE, BECAUSE THAT'S 18 DEFINITELY SUBJECT TO NEGOTIATION. BUT WE WOULD LIKE IT TO BE 19 AS LONG AS POSSIBLE. WE OBVIOUSLY WANT TO SEE SUSTAINED 20 21 INVESTMENT IN TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING. RIGHT NOW, 60% OF THE CAP-AND-TRADE FUNDS DO GO TO TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING. 22 SO, WE WANT TO, YOU KNOW, AT LEAST KEEP THAT LEVEL. WE WANT TO 23 ENSURE A FAIR SHARE OF FUNDS FOR THE BAY AREA. WE HAVE DONE 24 25 VERY WELL THROUGH THE COMPETITIVE PROGRAMS AND WE WANT TO MAKE

SURE THAT THE CRITERIA, OR ANY CHANGES TO IT CONTINUE TO 1 2 ENSURE THAT THE BAY AREA DOES WELL. AND ONE OF THE CHANGES 3 THAT WE'RE RECOMMEND SUGGEST WITH RESPECT TO HIGH SPEED RAIL, WHICH RECEIVES 25% OF THE FUNDS TO ENSURE ONGOING INVESTMENT 4 5 IN THE CONNECTION TO THE BAY AREA FROM THAT FUNDING, AND PROVIDE ELIGIBILITY FOR JOINT BENEFIT PROJECTS. SO, THE REGION 6 HAS A NUMBER OF PROJECTS THAT, YOU KNOW, ARE CRITICAL TO HIGH 7 8 SPEED RAIL BUT ALSO PROVIDE NEAR-TERM DISCRETE BENEFITS TO DIRIDON STATION SAN JOSE PORTAL EXTENSION OF CALTRAIN TO THE 9 SALESFORCE TRANSIT CENTER FOR EXAMPLE, AND MAKE SURE THOSE 10 FUNDS ARE ELIGIBLE WITHIN THAT AND ENSURE FUND ARE DISTRIBUTED 11 EOUITABLY TO THOSE COMMUNITIES THAT ARE DISPROPORTIONATELY 12 IMPACTED AND BY EMISSIONS AND BENEFIT THE BAY AREA'S EQUITY 13 PRIORITY COMMUNITIES AND THIS IS OFTEN A FIGHT IN 14

16 MARY SACKETT: TO DEFINE ANY KINDS OF EQUITY COMMUNITIES SO WE WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT THE THE WAY THE BAY AREA DEFINES THEM 17 IS REFLECTED IN ANY AT THE STATE LEVEL. I'LL HEIGHT ONE OF THE 18 ADDITIONS IS TO PROTECT AFFORDABLE HOUSING -- FUNDING LEVELS 19 AND ANY CHANGES TO THE PROGRAMS. THIS DOES CURRENTLY PROVIDE A 20 21 SIGNIFICANT FUNDING THROUGH THE AHSC PROGRAM, AFFORDABLE HOUSING SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES PROGRAM. AND WHETHER THAT 22 PROGRAM HAS ANY CHANGES OR NOT, WE JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT 23 HOUSING PRODUCTION CONTINUES TO RECEIVE A SIGNIFICANT SHARE OF 24 CAP-AND-TRADE FUNDS. WITH THAT I'LL CLOSE AND SEE IF THERE IS 25

ANY QUESTIONS AND WE'RE LOOKING FOR YOUR ENDORSEMENT OF THIS
 TONIGHT.

REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU. SO, THIS BILL -- THESE TWO BILLS, WE 1 HAVE COMPANION LEGISLATION, AB736, AND SB 417, BOTH PROPOSE A 2 3 \$10 BILLION GO BONDS FOR THE JUNE 2026 BALLOT. OF COURSE, IN THE ABSENCE OF REGIONAL MEASURE FOUR, OUR OWN HOPED FOR \$20 4 5 BILLION BOND, THIS IS A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO AT LEAST GET SOME 6 SIGNIFICANT FUNDING GOING FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE STATE, AND CERTAINLY THE BAY AREA WOULD SEE SOME OF THIS. SO WE'RE 7 8 RECOMMENDING, WE ENDORSE THIS LEGISLATION WITH A FRIENDLY AMENDMENT, SO A SUPPORT AND SEEK AMENDMENT THAT WOULD ALLOW 9 CONSIDERATION OF SOME OF THE FUNDS ACTUALLY SUPPORTING BAHFA 10 THROUGH POTENTIALLY A \$15 MILLION, KIND OF, COLLATERAL 11 APPROPRIATION THAT THEN BAHFA COULD USE TO DEVELOP A LOAN 12 PROGRAM THAT WOULD ULTIMATELY ENABLE BAHFA TO BE SELF-13 FINANCING MODELED ON THE NEW YORK HOUSING DEVELOPMENT 14 15 CORPORATION. SO THIS IS SOMETHING THAT WE TALKED ABOUT IN SACRAMENTO QUITE A BIT. AND IT WOULD REALLY HELP PAVE THE WAY, 16 AGAIN, FOR BAHFA TO BE SELF-FUNDED THROUGH THE ISSUANCE OF 17 FEES AND INTEREST RATE SPREAD THROUGH THE LOAN PROGRAM. SO, WE 18 DID TALK ABOUT THIS WITH A NUMBER OF MEMBERS. THEY SEEMED, YOU 19 KNOW, RECEPTIVE. I THINK ANY KIND OF A CARVE-OUT FROM THE 20 21 BOND, YOU KNOW, IT'S CERTAINLY NOT A SLAM DUNK BUT IT'S WORTH TALKING ABOUT SO, THAT'S THE NATURE OF THE RECOMMENDATION. 22 23

WE HAVE BEEN HEARING THAT SAN DIEGO IS INTERESTED IN STANDING UP SOMETHING 11 LIKE THIS. SO, THEY MIGHT BE INTERESTED. LACASA AS YOU 12 PROBABLY HAVE HEARD OF, KIND OF MODELED ON OUR OWN CASA EFFORT 13 IN LA THEY RECENTLY DID SUCCEED AT CREATING A FUNDING 14 MECHANISM FOR THAT AGENCY THROUGH A SALES TAX THROUGH 15 16 CITIZEN'S INITIATIVE. SO THAT HAVE MONEY. I THINK SAN DIEGO AND OTHERS POTENTIALLY COULD BE INTERESTED IN THIS MODEL TOO. 17 18

ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNER WITH THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY
PARTNERSHIP TWO SECTIONS AT THE AGENCY WORK TOGETHER ON
REGIONAL LOCAL RESILIENCE PLANNING INITIATIVES AND I WOULD

LIKE TO HIGHLIGHT OUR PAST AND CURRENT WORK WHERE WE COULD GO 1 IN THE FUTURE. OUR REGION AND STATE HAVE BEEN SHAPED BY THE 2 3 ENVIRONMENT. IN 1906, A SEVEN ARE.8 EARTHQUAKE RESHAPED THE REGION IN DEVELOPMENT ON THE PENINSULA EAST BAY LOMA PRIETA 4 5 EARTHOUAKE IN '94 NORTHRIDGE EARTHOUAKE LED TO MASSIVE INVESTMENTS IN OUR TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM HIGHLIGHTED BY THE 6 EASTERN SPAN OF THE BAY BRIDGE CLIMATE CHANGE IS INCREASING IN 7 8 FREQUENCY AND IMPACT OF EVENTS AND WILDFIRES HAVE IMPACTS ON MANY BAY AREA RESIDENTS, WHIPLASH LEADING TO FREOUENT STORMS 9 THAT ARE TACKING ON TO THE CONSTANT RISE IN SEA LEVEL. HAZARDS 10 PRESENT INCREASING STRAINS ON LOCAL GOVERNMENTS THAT ARE 11 WORKING TO DEVELOP THE PLANS AND POLICIES THAT ARE NEEDED TO 12 ENHANCE RESILIENCE AND THEN IMPLEMENT THE RISK REDUCING 13 PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS. THE ABAG TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE 14 15 PROGRAMMING WORKS TO PROVIDE LOCAL GOVERNMENTS WITH REGIONAL 16 COORDINATION AND SHARING OF RESILIENCE BEST PRACTICES, AS WELL AS TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO SUPPORT DECISION-MAKING. NEXT 17 SLIDE. 18

20 SPEAKER: ABAG IS UNIQUELY POSITIONS TO HELP, LEAD, COORDINATED
21 RESPONSE AND SUPPORT LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACTION ON THESE

AND IN MANY WAYS, AMONGST THE REGIONAL AGENCIES, 4 5 WE HAVE THE MOST DIRECT LINE TO THOSE LOCAL GOVERNMENT THAT HELPS POSITION US TO DO THIS WORK. NEXT SLIDE. SO, GOING A 6 LITTLE BIT INTO SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION PLANNING, IN 7 8 PARTICULAR, AND THEN WE'LL TALK ABOUT SOME OTHER HAZARDS. OUR OWN ESTUARY BLUEPRINT FROM 14 15 SFEP, WHICH I'LL TALK MORE ABOUT SFEP, IF YOU ARE A NEW 16 EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER PROVIDES A ROADMAP FOR ADVANCING NATURE-BASED SHORELINE ADAPTATION SOLUTIONS IS BCDC'S REGIONAL 17 SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLAN PROVIDES A REOPEN MAP FOR LOCALLY 18 COORDINATED SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATIONS AND PLANNED BAY AREA 19 2050+ AS WE ALL KNOW IDENTIFIED A \$95 BILLION NEED TO ADDRESS 20 21 THESE CHALLENGES. JUST TO ALSO EMPHASIZE THAT SIGNIFICANT COORDINATION IS HAPPENING AMONGST THESE AGENCIES. BUT 22 LEADERSHIP IS NEEDED TO SUPPORT THAT LOCAL RESPONSE AND REALLY 23 HELP BOLSTER LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO DO THE GOOD WORK THAT THEY 24 DO UNDER CIRCUMSTANCES WHERE THEY'RE ALREADY LIMITED IN THEIR 25

CAPACITY TO MAINTAIN BASIC OPERATIONS. NEXT SLIDE. SO, THE BAY 1 -- I THINK THIS IS IS AN OLDER SLIDE DECK? YEAH. BUT THAT'S 2 3 OKAY. I'LL KEEP GOING. SO, THE BAY CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION, IN DECEMBER OF 2024 ADOPTED THE 4 5 REGIONAL SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLAN. THIS PLAN WAS DRIVEN BY SB272, WHICH REQUIRES LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO DEVELOP SUBREGIONAL 6 ADAPTATION PLANS BOTH WITHIN THE BAY AREA AND THE OUTER COAST. 7 8 DO YOU WANT ME TO KEEP GOING ON -- WITH THIS? OKAY. IT'S ROUGHLY THE SAME. SO, SB272 WILL REOUIRE LOCAL GOVERNMENTS 9 10 HERE WITHIN THE BAY AREA AND ON THE OUTER COAST TO DEVELOP THESE SUBREGIONAL ADAPTATION PLANS. BCDC IS REALLY LEADING ON 11 THE PLANNING SPACE FOR SEA LEVEL RISE BY ADOPTING THIS 12 REGIONAL SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLAN AND THE RESPONSE FROM LOCAL 13 GOVERNMENT IS SIGNIFICANT. THIS IS GOING TO BE A VERY HEAVY 14 15 LIFT FOR OUR LOCAL GOVERNMENT PARTNERS IN ORDER TO DEVELOP 16 THESE PLANS. WE ARE WORKING VERY CLOSELY WITH BCDC. THEY WILL BE ESTABLISHING THEIR OWN TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM TO 17 SUPPORT JURISDICTIONS THROUGH THAT PROCESS. BARC IS ACTING AS 18 A COORDINATING ENTITY FOR THIS. AND WE SEE SIGNIFICANT 19 OPPORTUNITY TO EXPAND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE, GIVEN THE CONTEXT 20 21 OF THE R SAP. NEXT SLIDE. I'M GOING TO TALK MORE ABOUT THE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING. JUST TO EMPHASIZE THERE WERE 22 MULTIPLE ROLES IDENTIFIED FOR REGIONAL AGENCIES WITHIN THE 23 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDINGED INCLUDING WHAT'S HERE PLANNING 24 FUND MANAGEMENT TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE REGULATORY ALIGNMENT 25

COORDINATION JUST TO EMPHASIZE ABAG/SFEP WAS IDENTIFIED AND 1 PRIMED TO HELP COORDINATE AND LEAD AND DELIVER TECHNICAL 2 3 ASSISTANCE THROUGH THE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING. AND WHAT DO WE MEAN WHEN WE SAY TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE? THIS REPRESENTS A 4 5 RANGE OF ACTIONS ANYTHING FROM WEB PORTALS OR WEB SITES THAT MIGHT BE A PORT OF ENTRY FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT PARTNERS TO FIND 6 OUT ABOUT FUNDING OR PLANNING SOLUTIONS TO DIRECT PLANNING 7 8 ASSISTANCE, WORKSHOPS, CONVENINGS, OR EVEN DELIVERY OF PROJECTS ON THE GROUND. SO WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THAT WHOLE 9 10 RANGE OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE HERE. AND AS I SAID, ABAG SFEP IS IDENTIFIED AS THE PRIME FOR THAT WITHIN THIS MEMORANDUM OF 11 UNDERSTANDING. NEXT SLIDE. SO, AGAIN, THIS IS THIS, SORT OF, 12 SPECTRUM OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE THAT I JUST SPOKE TO, REALLY 13 EMPHASIZING THAT THERE ARE LOW TOUCH FORMS OF TECHNICAL 14 ASSISTANCE AS WELL AS ALL THE WAY TO HIGH TOUCH WHERE YOU'RE 15 16 DIRECTLY PARTNERS WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. AND THE ACROSS OUR ABAG PROGRAMS WE'RE DOING ALL OF THAT. NEXT SLIDE. 17

MICHAEL GERMERAAD: SOME OTHER WORK THAT ABAG HAS LED IN THE PAST IS IN THE SPACE OF RESILIENT HOUSING AND IN THIS SPACE IT'S FOCUSED ON ADDRESSING THE CHALLENGES OF SEISMIC AND WILDFIRE RISKS. IN RECENT YEARS THE AGENCY HAS PUT ODD MODEL ORDINANCES AND GUIDE BOOKS FOR SEISMIC RETROFIT PROGRAMS WITH SPECIFIC MODEL ORDINANCES FOR MULTI-FAMILY BUILDINGS AS WELL AS MODEL RETROFIT PLANS FOR BRACE AND BOLT CRAWLSPACE

RETROFITS. WE ALSO PARTNERED WITH THE REGIONAL HOUSING 1 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM THAT VICE PRESIDENT ROMERO HAD 2 3 MENTIONED, AND PROVIDED THE LATEST WILDFIRE SCIENCE AND GUIDANCE ON HOW TO INCORPORATE THOSE ISSUES INTO THE HOUSING 4 5 ELEMENT UPDATE. OUR TEAM CONTINUES TO WORK ON THESE ISSUES AND PLAN TO LAUNCH NEW INITIATIVES IN THE NEXT YEAR. NEXT SLIDE. 6 7 8 HEIDI: TALKING MORE ABOUT THE ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP, IN PARTICULAR, AND JUST, BECAUSE THERE ARE SOME NEW EXECUTIVE 9 10 BOARD MEMBERS, I'LL JUST START BY EXPLAINING THE ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP, WHICH IS A PROGRAM OF ABAG. THE ESTUARY 11 PARTNERSHIP IS A PLACE-BASED NON-REGULATORY PROGRAM OF THE 12 U.S. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY. WE ARE 1 OF 28 ESTUARIES 13 OF NATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE ACROSS THE UNITED STATES THROUGH THE 14 15 NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM WHICH WAS ESTABLISHED BY CONGRESS IN 16 1988 TO PROTECT AND RESTORE THOSE ESTUARY. OUR PROGRAM IS 17 COLLABORATIVE AND NON-REGULATORY. WE WORK ACROSS OUR PARTNERSHIP TO ADVANCE SEA LEVEL RISE -- SOLUTIONS TO SEA 18 LEVEL RISE, AND A NUMBER OF OTHER ISSUES. SOME OF THE WAYS IN 19 WHICH WE'RE DELIVERING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TODAY INCLUDES 20 DRKT PLANNING ASSISTANCE, SUPPORTING PROJECT DELIVERY, AND 21 REGIONAL TECHNICAL SUPPORT, CONVENINGS AND WORKSHOPS. NEXT 22 SLIDE. THIS MAP SHOWS SOME OF THE PLACE WHERE IS WE'RE DOING 23 THAT WORK ACROSS OUR REGION. AND I JUST WANT TO, SORT OF, 24 POINT TO THE DIVERSITY OF PROJECTS AND THE WAYS THAT WE'RE 25

PROVIDING THAT SUPPORT. SO, THAT CAN LOOK LIKE ANYTHING FROM 1 2 THE WORK THAT WE'RE DOING UP IN THE NORTH RICHMOND, WITH THE 3 LIVING LEVEE WHERE WE'RE PROVIDING DIRECT ENGAGEMENT AND WORKING WITH THE PARTNERS ON THE GROUND TO CONVENE PARTNERS, 4 5 BRINGING FUNDING TO THE TABLE, BRINGING LOCAL GOVERNMENT TOGETHER WITH CBOS AND TRIBES, TO THE PALO ALTO HORIZONTAL 6 LEVEE WHICH WAS ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR. YOU ALL APPROVED 7 8 EARLIER TODAY WITH THE CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT, WHERE WE'RE ACTUALLY SUPPORTING DIRECT DELIVERY OF THOSE PROJECTS ON THE 9 GROUND. AGAIN IN PART DUE TO CAPACITY OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT 10 WHERE THEY WANT TO UPLIFT THESE KINDS OF PROJECTS BUT HAVE 11 LIMITED STAFFING IN ORDER TO DO SO. WE ALSO PROVIDE DIRECT 12 FUNDING SUPPORT OR FUNDING THROUGH SUBAWARDS IN OUR GRANTS. 13 SO, IT'S A RANGE OF DIFFERENT KINDS OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE 14 15 THAT WE'RE PROVIDING. I'LL JUST ALSO MENTION THAT OUR ONLY 16 LIMITATION IS FUNDING. WE'RE FULLY GRANT FUNDED SO OUR ABILITY TO DO THIS IS LIMITED BY OUR GRANT FUNDING WE HAVE AVAILABLE. 17 NEXT SLIDE. I WANT TO TALK ABOUT ONE PLACE IN PARTICULAR TO, 18 SORT OF, SPEAK TO HOW THIS TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE LOOKS ON THE 19 GROUND AND FOR EACH ONE OF THESE GEOGRAPHIES WE CAN TELL A 20 21 WHOLE STORY ABOUT WHAT IT LOOKS LIKE, SO WE CHOSE ONE FOR YOU, AND THAT'S EAST BAY CRESCENT ALSO CALLED THE EMERYVILLE 22 CRESCENT THIS WORK BEGAN WITH CALTRANS APPROACHING THE ESTUARY 23 PARTNERSHIP TO HELP SUPPORT BRINGING TOGETHER AND FORMING A 24 WORKING GROUP TO ADDRESS SOLUTIONS ON THE FUTURE OF THE 25

SHORELINE LOOKING AT VULNERABILITY OF THE BAY BRIDGE AND AS 1 2 WELL AS THE CRESCENT ITSELF AND UNDERSTANDING WHAT KIND OF 3 ADAPTATION SOLUTIONS WERE POSSIBLE THERE. WE PARTNERS WITH THE CITIES OF OAKLAND, EMERY INVOLVE, BERKELEY, ALBANY, PLUS 4 5 CALTRANS AND OTHER EAST BAY MUD EAST BAY PARKS AND LOOK AT SOLUTIONS SO THE WORK WE'RE DOING THERE INCLUDES CONVENING 6 PARTNERS INTO A WORKING GROUP COORDINATING WORK TOGETHER 7 8 LEADING FUND-RAISING EFFORTS TO HELP SUPPORT ADAPTATION PLANNING WITHIN THESE, AMONGST THESE CITIES RESOURCES THAT ARE 9 10 SUBJECT MATTER EXPERTS AND OUR RELATIONSHIPS TO THE TABLE I MENTIONED RSAP EARLIER WE'RE HELPING TO BRING THESE CITIES TO 11 A STATE OF READINESS TO TAKE ON THE RSAP TO BEGIN 12 VULNERABILITY ASSESSMENT AND ADAPTATION AND PLANNING AND ALSO 13 HAVE EARLY STAGE INNOVATIVE PROJECTS THAT WE'RE SEEKING TO 14 15 ADVANCE. NEXT SLIDE. I'M GOING TO HAND IT BACK TO MICHAEL AT 16 THIS POINT.

24 SUPPORTED NEW STAFF POSITION THAT PUSHED FORWARD A WIDE RANGE
25 OF SERVICES INCLUDING LOCAL GRANTS DIRECTLY TO LOCAL

GOVERNMENT, DATA TOOLS, REGIONAL TRAININGS AND WORKING GROUPS, 1 AS WELL AS TEMPLATE RESOURCES. IMPORTANTLY THIS WORK WAS 2 3 EXTENDED THROUGH REAP TWO BY PROVIDING AN ADDITIONAL 4 MILLION TO CONTINUE SOME ASSIST MOST POPULAR LEFT ELEMENTS OF IT 4 5 INCLUDING ADDITIONAL RESOURCES AS WELL AS STAFFING FOR THE COUNTY PLANNING COLLABORATIVES WHICH IS WHERE EACH COUNTY ON A 6 MONTHLY BASIS BRIDGES PLANNERS TOGETHER TO TACKLE JOINT 7 8 PLANNING CHALLENGES. AS I MENTIONED, IT HAS RECEIVED AN AWARD FROM THE AMERICAN PLANNING ASSOCIATION, AND MORE IMPORTANTLY, 9 HAS BEEN USED BY 87% OF CITIES AND HAS BEEN RATED AS EASY TO 10 USE BY 84%. NEXT SLIDE. NEXT SLIDE. WHICH WE HIT EARLIER SO WE 11 CAN KEEP GOING TO THE NEXT SLIDE. THIS IS REALLY OUR 12 CONCLUSION. AND WHAT WE HAVE DONE IN THE PRESENTATION TODAY IS 13 REALLY HIGHLIGHT THE WAYS THAT WE PREVIOUSLY AND CURRENTLY 14 15 HAVE WORKED WITH JURISDICTIONS ON RESILIENCE TECHNICAL 16 ASSISTANCE. AND REALLY WANT TO PIVOT NOW TO THINKING ABOUT THE 17 FUTURE. SO, IT'S BEEN A PLACE WHERE WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO WORK WITH PLANNERS AND BUILDING OFFICIALS TO ADVANCE RESILIENCE. 18 AND WE WANT TO THINK ABOUT WHAT MORE FUNDING, DIVERSIFIED 19 FUNDING AND CONSISTENT FUNDING COULD PROVIDE FOR US. AND THE 20 21 FIRST IS ENABLE US TO PROVIDE IN DIRECT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO JURISDICTIONS WORKING TO ADDRESS SEA LEVEL RISE, EXPAND 22 HIGH TOUCH STAFFING ASSISTANCE TO HELP ACCELERATE LOCAL WORK 23 FROM PLANNING TO IMPLEMENTATION AND SUPPORT LOCAL GOVERNMENTS 24 IN SECURING LARGE GRANTS TO EXPAND SEISMIC AND WILDFIRE 25

RETROFIT PROGRAMS. GIVEN RANGE OF PRIORITIES IN THE REGION
 WE'RE SEEKING DIRECTION FROM THE BOARD ON WHETHER TO
 ACCELERATE EFFORTS TO SECURE MORE RELIABLE FUNDING SOURCES FOR

I HAVE SAID RSAP FOUR TIMES THIS WEEK. 16 AND IT'S BECAUSE I, MYSELF, ALTHOUGH I AM ONE OF THE PARTICIPANTS IN THE APPROVAL OF THE RSAP, STILL CANNOT WRAP MY 17 MIND AROUND THE ENORMITY OF THAT. SO, I DO THINK THE NEED FOR 18 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IS INCREDIBLY IMPORTANT. YOU KNOW, WE 19 KIND OF LOOK AT, OF COURSE, FROM -- I'LL ADD MY TWO CENTS -- I 20 DO THINK THAT STABILIZED FUNDING IS INCREDIBLY IMPORTANT AS WE 21 GO FORWARD. I KNOW THAT AT BCDC WE HAD TALKED ABOUT STUDENTS 22 THROUGH THE CLIMATE BOND OF BEING ABLE TO TAP INTO -- TO THOSE 23 FUNDS. I THINK THAT WE NEED TO LOOK AT THOSE TYPES OF EXISTING 24 25 SOURCES THAT WE CAN UTILIZE FOR RESILIENCY WORK. AND THOSE

COMPETITIVE OPPORTUNITIES FOR US, I THINK, WOULD BE FRUITFUL. 1 YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE THINGS I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE DO, 2 3 CERTAINLY PROVIDING -- (SNEEZING) -- PROVIDING A GREATER LEVEL OF SERVICE TO OUR MEMBER JURISDICTIONS IS IMPORTANT SO THAT WE 4 5 CAN ALL SEEK COMPLIANCE IN THIS SPACE. AND TO BE ASPIRATIONAL TO THE BEST WAY POSSIBLE. I WOULD REALLY LIKE US TO, 6 CERTAINLY, REAP FUNDING WAS AMAZING WHEN MONEY WAS AVAILABLE. 7 8 THAT IS NOT THE STATE THAT WE ARE IN RIGHT NOW. SO, I THINK IT WOULD BE, BEHOOVE US TO LOOK AT THOSE OPPORTUNITIES THAT COULD 9 10 BE GRANT BASED THROUGH THE CLIMATE BOND BUT ALSO TO LOOK AT HOW WE LOOK AT MAXIMIZING OPPORTUNITIES WHEN WE FIND OURSELVES 11 IN ROBUST BUDGET YEARS. ESPECIALLY HOW WE POSITION OURSELVES 12 TO ENSURE THAT SHOULD WE ENTER A GLORIOUS TIME OF GAN LIMIT 13 BUDGETS AT THE STATE THEY'RE POSITIONED READY WITH A BIG ASK 14 TO HAVE THIS READY TO GO SO I THINK WE NEED TO LOOK AT LEAN 15 16 AND DIRECT MODEL RIGHT NOW THEN BEST CASE SCENARIO MODEL AS 17 WELL. ANY EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS? I WON'T CALL YOU SEBASTOPOL ANYMORE. MAYOR. [LAUGHTER] 18

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20 STEPHEN ZOLLMAN: THANK YOU MADAM PRESIDENT. YES TO ALL OF THAT 21 COMING FROM A SMALL CITY, TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE GETTING US UP 22 TO SPEAK TO COMPLY WITH OUR HOUSING ELEMENT WAS EVERYTHING WE 23 NEEDED. SO YES. YES TO ALL OF THAT. THANK YOU.)

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25 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: VICE PRESIDENT ROMERO?

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V. PRES., CARLOS ROMERO: FIRST OF ALL I WANT TO CORRECT MYSELF. 2 3 IT WAS 100 JURISDICTIONS OUT OF 109 IN THE NINE-COUNTY BAY AREA THAT ARE COMPLIANT WITH RHNA. SO, DANIEL SAVER PROVIDED 4 5 ME THAT STAMP. I DID WANT TO GO BACK TO SLIDE SIX AND SAY HOW IMPORTANT, YOU KNOW, THE COORDINATION IS BETWEEN ALL OF THESE 6 ENTITIES, TO DO, AT LEAST, THE -- YOU KNOW, SEA LEVEL RISE 7 8 ESTUARY WORK. AND ABAG IS PLAYING A KEY ROLE IN THAT, AS WELL AS BARC. SO, IT'S A HUGE 90, \$100 BILLION ENDEAVOR. I THINK, 9 AND THAT'S MAYBE TO ADDRESS THE 50 PHASE OF SEA LEVEL RISE. I 10 THINK THIS TYPE OF COORDINATION IS WHERE ABAG BRIDGES 11 SOMETHING TO THE TABLE. AND CERTAINLY WITH OUR PARTNERS MAKES 12 A HUGE DIFFERENCE. WE TALKED ABOUT THIS I WANT TO SAY MAYBE 18 13 MONTHS AGO, TWO YEARS AGO, TRYING TO GET THIS TOGETHER AND 14 15 MOVING FORWARD. I LOOK TO ALLISON WHO IS IN THE AUDIENCE HERE 16 FROM BARC, AND ALL HER STAFF, AND MTC, AND I THINK THIS IS REALLY IS A VALUE-ADD, THAT I THINK WITHOUT IT IT WOULD BE 17 REALLY HARD TO BEGIN THIS COORDINATION AND ULTIMATELY TO TRY 18 TO FIND THE MONEY THAT'S NECESSARY TO PROTECT OUR COMMUNITIES 19 AND ALSO TO SUSTAIN THE ENVIRONMENT. THANK YOU FOR THIS GREAT 20 21 WORK.

8 MICHAEL GERMERAAD: I THINK THERE IS A LOT OF ANGLES THAT WE COULD ANSWER THAT OUESTION AS SFEP WORKS KIND OF AT A LOCAL 9 SCALE ON INDIVIDUAL LOCATIONS AND SITES I THINK WHEN WE THINK 10 ABOUT THE REGION AS A WHOLE PLANNED BAY AREA TO REALLY HAVE 11 THOSE CONVERSATIONS AND TALK ABOUT TRADE-OFFS. I DO THINK THE 12 272 RSAP PLANS THAT ARE GOING TO BE DEVELOPED OVER THE COMING 13 YEARS ARE GOING TO BE A PLACE WHERE WE FURTHER STITCH TOGETHER 14 15 AND TRY AND REDUCE MAL ADAPTATION AND TAKE A STRATEGIC 16 APPROACH AS A REGION. ON A REGIONAL SCALE, I THINK PLANNED BAY AREA AND GOING FORWARD, THE RSAP IS WHERE THAT IS HAPPENING. 17 AND I THINK THERE IS A LOT OF STORIES TO BE TOLD, YOU KNOW, ON 18 A CASE BY CASE BASIS. 19

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21 LISA MOTOYAMA: THANK YOU.

PRES., BELIA RAMOS: ANY OTHER QUESTIONS FROM BOARD MEMBERS? I
THINK, CERTAINLY, I MEAN, WE ARE FANS OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.
YOU KNOW, AND THAT COSTS MONEY. AND WE GET THAT. AND, SO, I

THINK REALLY LOOKING AT THE PRIORITIES OF WHAT THAT SHORT-TERM 1 AND LONG-TERM, HOW YOU'RE GOING TO COORDINATE THE TECHNICAL 2 3 ASSISTANCE THAT COMES FOR RSAP VERSUS THE NEXT HOUSING ELEMENT, AND REALLY HOW WE UPLIFT, ESPECIALLY THOSE SMALLER 4 5 JURISDICTIONS THAT ARE WANTING TO DO ALL THE THINGS, RIGHT, AT HOW WE CAN HAVE AN RSAP INTEGRATED WITH THE NEXT HOUSING 6 ELEMENT. BECAUSE THE TIMING OF THOSE ACTUALLY ALIGNS REALLY 7 8 BEAUTIFULLY. AND SO I THINK THAT GOES, A DEFINITELY, TO COUNCILMEMBER MOTOYAMA'S POINT OF HOW DO THEY INTERSECT. I 9 THINK IT'S REALLY INCUMBENT UPON US TO BE ABLE TO FIND, AND 10 ENABLE THOSE POINTS OF INTERSECTIONALITY BETWEEN THESE VARIOUS 11 REGULATORY MANDATES AND HOW WE CAN ACHIEVE ALL THINGS. I DON'T 12 WANT TO SAY, YOU KNOW, THE -- YOU KNOW, THE -- YOU KNOW --13 [LAUGHTER] WE DON'T WANT TO RISE THE TIDE HERE. THAT'S THE 14 15 WRONG PUN [LAUGHTER] WRONG. BUT I DO -- I DO THINK THAT WE 16 NEED TO FOCUS ON THAT. RIGHT? WHEN WE LOOK AT THE NEXT RHNA ALLOCATION -- THE NEXT RHNA CYCLE, AND WE LOOK AT THE RSAP 17 DEADLINES, RIGHT? THE IMPOSED DEADLINE OF TEN YEARS, BUT THE 18 REALITY IS THE SOONER THE BETTER SO THAT YOU CAN ACTUALLY 19 ENGAGE AND BE OUALIFIED TO RECEIVE RESILIENCE MONEY TO DO THE 20 21 WORK IS IMPORTANT. SO LOOKING AT THOSE OPPORTUNITIES FOR INNUENDOING THAT CAN REALLY MAXIMIZE BOTH WOULD BE 22 OUTSTANDING. SEEING NO OTHER COMMENTS FROM THE BOARD I'LL ASK 23 FOR COMMENT. 24

CLERK OF THE BOARD: SUPERVISOR GAUTHIER HAS HER HAND RAISED.
 LISA GAUTHIER: I WANT TO SAY THANK YOU FOR THE REPORT IT MAKES

A HUGE DIFFERENCE TO LOOK AT THIS FROM A REGIONAL APPROACH. I
SIT ON ONE SHORELINE SO WE'RE ADDRESSING SEA LEVEL RISE ON
THIS SIDE AND ALSO BCDC. SO WHENEVER WE CAN COORDINATE I THINK
IT MAKES A HUGE DIFFERENCE AND WHENEVER WE CAN LEARN FROM EACH
OTHER. SO, AGAIN, THANK YOU TO THOSE WHO PUT THIS PRESENTATION
TOGETHER. APPRECIATE IT.

11 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO MUCH.

13 CLERK OF THE BOARD: NO WRITTEN COMMENTS NO MEMBERS IN THE 14 BOARDROOM FOR PUBLIC COMMENT AND NONE AT THE TO THE LOCATIONS. 15

16 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: EXCELLENT. THANK YOU SO MUCH TO STAFF AND WE REALLY APPRECIATE THIS REPORT AND WE LOOK FORWARD TO YOU 17 FINDING MONEY. AND COME ON BACK AND REPORT HOW MUCH. OUR NEXT 18 ITEM FOR OUR CONSIDERATION IS AGENDA ITEM 12 A. AND THIS IS A 19 REPORT ON OUR ABAG FINANCIAL OUTLOOK. AND BEFORE I GO LED AND 20 HAND IT THIS OVER TO DEREK HANSEL, OUR CFO TO TAKE THIS ON, I 21 WILL SAY THAT WITHIN YOUR AGENDA ITEM, YOU WILL SEE THAT WE 22 HAVE SOME DISCUSSION ITEMS FOR US, AND I WANTED TO GO AHEAD 23 AND ADD AN ADDITIONAL INSIGHT FOR YOU AND THAT IS THE -- THE 24 25 TWO POTENTIAL ITEMS OF WHERE WE LOOK AT THE OPPORTUNITIES THAT

MAY EXIST WITH THE ABAG CONDOMINIUM INTEREST HERE AT BAY METRO 1 2 CENTER, AS WELL AS THE CREATION OF THE SECTION 115 TRUST FOR 3 PURPOSES OF STABILIZING OUR CALPERS PAYMENT, THIS IS A HIGH-LEVEL DISCUSSION AT THIS POINT, WHEN IT COMES TO THE 4 5 CONDOMINIUM INTEREST, CAN I TELL YOU THAT WITH YOUR -- WITH THIS BOARD'S APPROVAL, VICE PRESIDENT ROMERO AND I WILL BE 6 MEETING WITH COUNSEL TO LOOK OVER WHAT THOSE OPPORTUNITIES, IN 7 8 FACT, ARE, FOR THE SALE OF THE CONDOMINIUM FOR THOSE THAT ARE JOINING US NOW RECENTLY. THE CONDOMINIUM IS TO HOUSING PEOPLE. 9 WE AT ABAG DO NOT HAVE PEOPLE, BECAUSE WE HAVE HAD A 10 CONSOLIDATION OF ABAG MTC STAFF, AND THROUGH A CONTRACT FOR 11 SERVICES, IT IS MTC'S OBLIGATION TO HOUSE THE PEOPLE. SO, WE 12 ARE STILL PART OWNERS IN THIS BUILDING, AND SO TO REALLY 13 UNDERSTAND OUR FINANCIAL INTEREST AND OUR OPPORTUNITIES, WE 14 15 WILL BE LOOKING AT THE POSSIBILITY OF EXERCISING A BUYOUT 16 OPTION ON THE CONDOMINIUM INTEREST. WE WILL RETURN TO YOU WITH GREATER DETAIL OF THAT. I WILL SAY THERE WAS CHANGE LEADERSHIP 17 AT MTC. THEY HAVE A NEW CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR. AND THOSE PEOPLE 18 WE WERE SPEAKING WITH IN LEADERSHIP PREVIOUSLY ARE NO LONGER 19 AT MTC. SO, WE ARE STARTING FROM -- FROM THE BEGINNING AGAIN. 20 AND, SO FAR, THE INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS HAVE BEEN POSITIVE. SO, 21 WE LOOK FORWARD TO BEING ABLE TO BRING MORE TO YOU. THE SAME 22 GOES FOR THE SECTION 115 TRUST. THAT OPTION WOULD BE A LOAN 23 FROM MTC TO DEPOSIT MONEY IN AND STABILIZE OUR PENSION 24 25 OBLIGATIONS FOR OUR FORMER EMPLOYEES. AGAIN, CHANGE

LEADERSHIP. WE NEED TO HAVE THOSE DISCUSSIONS AND ALLOW THEM 1 THE OPPORTUNITY. THEY'RE ON MEETING -- THEY HAVE ONLY HAD ONE 2 MEETING AS LEADERSHIP OF THE COMMISSION [LAUGHTER] SO, WE'LL 3 GIVE THEM A MOMENT TO GET ACQUAINTED, AND THEN WE'LL START 4 5 THAT, AND THEN WE'LL REPORT BACK TO THIS BOARD. SO I'M GOING TO TURN IT OVER TO DEREK HANSEL TO GIVE US A WIDE OVERVIEW 6 REPORT OF WHAT WE'RE LOOKING AT. AND HAPPY TO RECEIVE SOME 7 8 COMMENT. BUT KNOW THAT THIS WILL BE COMING BACK TO US FOR MORE 9 DISCUSSION.

DEREK HANSEL: THANK YOU MADAM PRINCIPLE PRESIDENT. I HAVEN'T 11 ARE OUITE LOST MY VOICE I'M SURE YOU WISH I WILL HAVE, SINCE 12 WE BROUGHT THIS INFORMATION TO THE BOARD, WE HAVE GOT A LOT OF 13 NEW MEMBERS AND AGAIN WANT TO LEVEL SET, NOTING NONE OF THIS 14 15 IS NEW INFORMATION, OTHER THAN SOME UPDATES ON NUMBERS, SOME 16 OF THIS IS WHAT WE DISCUSS HERE IS BASED ON PRIOR EXECUTIVE 17 BOARD DIRECTION. SO WITH THAT NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AGAIN TRYING TO SET THE LEVEL SET. ABAG HAS A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT. IT HAS 18 HAD A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT FOR MANY YEARS. AS PRESIDENT RAMOS 19 SAID, WITH THE MERGER OF THE ABAG AND MTC STAFF ABAG IS LEFT 20 WITH A CLOSED PENSION PLAN. THAT IS NO MORE MEMBERS COME IN, 21 BUT THE UNFUNDED LIABILITY STAYS WITH ABAG. SO, WHEN WE SAY 22 WHAT IS A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT. SOME OF YOU MAY HAVE SEEN THIS 23 IN SOME OF YOUR COMMUNITIES. IT'S A FUNDAMENTAL CONTINUING 24 25 MISMATCH BETWEEN YOUR REVENUES AND YOUR EXPENDITURES, AND THE

ABAG PENSION DOES CREATE THAT. IT'S ALSO TRUE THAT THE 1 BUDGETARY PRACTICES THAT WE HAVE TODAY WITH THE ABAG 2 3 ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGETS OBSCURE THE SIZE OF THE CHALLENGE. ABAG LACKS, ALSO, SUFFICIENT RESERVES TO REALLY PROVIDE ALL THE 4 5 OPERATIONAL FLEXIBILITY IT NEEDS OR TO ADDRESS THE FACT RALLY DEFICIT IN ANY MEANINGFUL WAY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, BEHIND 6 THE SCENES, WHEN I TALK ABOUT, HEY, THE PROBLEM IS OBSCURED BY 7 8 OUR BUDGETARY PRACTICES. NO STAFF OR OVERHEAD COST IS CURRENTLY BILLION DOLLAR TO THE ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET. 9 10 SO, ABAG -- THE ABAG ADMINISTRATION BUDGET DOESN'T COVER ANY COST OF ME OR ANDY, OR ALIX, OR EVEN FRED, RIGHT? ALL OF THOSE 11 COSTS ARE EITHER BORNE BY THE INDIVIDUAL PROGRAMS OR BY MTC 12 PROPER. SO, WE HAVE GOT A WHOLE LOT OF FOLKS WHO ARE PROVIDING 13 SUBSTANTIAL DIRECT SERVICE. AND THEY ARE, AGAIN, NOT DOING 14 THEM. AGAIN, PORTIONS OF THE MTC ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET CHARGES 15 16 HAVE ALSO OFFICIALLY BEEN RESERVED WITHIN ABAG TO BALANCE OTHER PARTS OF ABAG OVER THE YEARS, INCLUDING THE SFEP 17 CONFERENCE PROGRAM. WE ALSO DO NEED TO REVISIT THE SHARE OF 18 APPROPRIATE CHARGES FOR SHARED SERVICES NEEDS TO PRESIDENT 19 RAMOS'S POINT ON THE CONDO INTEREST, THERE ARE SHARED SERVICES 20 21 COSTS THAT ARE ASSESSED ASSOCIATED WITH THE CONDOMINIUM INTEREST. AND DEALING WITH THE CONDOMINIUM INTEREST COULD ALSO 22 RESOLVE THAT. SO, TODAY, IF WE WERE TO SAY WHAT IS THE TRUE 23 ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET DEFICIT, IT'S LIKELY AROUND \$400,000, 24 AND THAT DOES NOT ADDRESS THE ITEMS THAT WE HAVE DISCUSSED 25

BEFORE. NEXT PAGE. SO, AGAIN, WHEN I TALK ABOUT UNFUNDED 1 2 PENSIONS OF THE PRIMARY DRIVER OF THE STRUCTURAL DEFICIT, WHAT 3 DO I MEAN? TODAY, OVER 50% OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET IS ASSOCIATED WITH AMORTIZATION OF THE UNFUNDED PENSION 4 5 LIABILITY. AND IT TAKES APPROXIMATELY 60% OF THE DUES. NEXT SLIDE. SO, WHY IS THIS AN ISSUE? WE HAVE A CLOSED PLAN, IT'S 6 ALSO ASSOCIATED WITH FORMER EMPLOYEES WHO RETIRED PRIOR TO THE 7 8 MERGER. AS OF JUNE '24, IT WAS UNDERFUNDED BY OVER \$17 MILLION. YOU HAVE CONTINUED TO MAKE PAYMENTS, \$2.1 MILLION IN 9 JULY OF '24, AND YOU HAVE AN EXTRA 2.3 MILLION PLANNED FOR 10 2025. SO PART OF WHAT'S HAPPENING IS THE BUDGET IS GOING UP, 11 REGARDLESS OF WHAT HAPPENS OTHERWISE. THERE IS ANOTHER 12 \$200,000 WE HAVE TO PAY. AND WITH THAT VOLATILITY IS 13 ASSOCIATED WITH CALPERS PERFORMANCE FROM YEAR TO YEAR TO YEAR, 14 15 AND THE WAY THAT THEIR PRACTICES END UP AMORTIZING GAINS OR 16 LOSSES OVER THEIR DISCOUNT RATE OR AROUND THEIR DISCOUNT RATE. NOW, THE GOOD NEWS IS IN FISCAL '24, THEY DID EXCEED THE 17 ASSUMED DISCOUNT RATE. THEY GOT OVER 9%. THAT WILL HELP 18 MODERATE THE FUTURE YEAR PAYMENTS, BUT GIVEN RECENT 19 PERFORMANCE, WE'LL SEE WHAT ENDS UP, YOU KNOW, FOR FISCAL '25, 20 21 AND, AGAIN, THAT WILL HAVE ADJUSTMENTS GOING FORWARD. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, THERE HAVE BEEN SEVERAL OPTIONS THAT HAVE 22 BEEN PREVIOUSLY DISCUSSED WITH THE EXECUTIVE BOARD. ONE IS, 23 KIND OF, DO NOTHING. LEAST CURRENT CALPERS PLAN IN PLACE. IT'S 24 UNKNOWN VOLATILITY AND THE CORRESPONDING IMPACT ON THE ABAG 25

MEMBER DUES. ONE OPTION IS A TRADITIONAL PENSION OBLIGATION 1 FINANCING. THAT IS A TAXABLE LOAN, WHICH COULD BE USED TO 2 3 PREPAY SOME OR ALL OF THE CALPERS LIABILITY. I NOTE, I PUT THIS UP HERE BECAUSE IT'S AN OPTION. I DON'T PUT IT UP HERE 4 5 BECAUSE I THINK IT'S A GOOD OPTION. BUT IT'S SOMETHING THAT COULD BE DONE. ONE OPTION THAT WE DISCUSSED AT SOME LENGTH 6 OVER THE PAST FEW MEETINGS THAT HAVE TALKED ABOUT THIS TOPIC 7 8 IS THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SECTION 115 TRUST. THAT IS THE DEPOSIT OF PART OR ALL OF THE CURRENT UNFUNDED LIABILITY INTO 9 AN ABAG CONTROLLED TRUST THAT COULD BE USED TO MAKE THE 10 REQUIRED PAYMENTS TO CALPERS. ONE OF THE ADVANTAGES OF THE 115 11 TRUST IS YOU CAN USE IT TO MUTE THAT VOLATILITY. SO, YOU CAN 12 DRAW FROM THE TRUST WHEN YOU NEED TO, YOU CAN ADD TO THE TRUST 13 WHEN YOU'RE ABLE TO. SO, IT DOES ALLOW YOU TO MODERATE AND 14 15 KIND OF SMOOTH OUT, THAT IS, YOU KNOW, WHAT YOU WOULD DO. 16 ANOTHER OPTION THAT WE HAVE DISCUSSED, AND, AGAIN, DON'T KNOW THAT I WOULD RECOMMEND IT, BUT IT'S A THING THAT CAN BE DONE, 17 IS TERMINATION OF THE CALPERS PLAN. SO, MAKING A LUMP SUM 18 PAYMENT TO CALPERS AT A DISCOUNT RATE, WHICH IS SIGNIFICANTLY 19 LOWER THAN THEIR ASSUMED DISCOUNT RATE -- BECAUSE THEY WOULD 20 21 WANT TO PUT IT IN A -- YOU KNOW, THEY SOURBALLY USE A --ESSENTIALLY USE A RISK FREE RATE SO EQUIVALENT TREASURY 22 YIELDING THAT WOULD BE MUCH HIGHER THAN THE \$17 MILLION BUT 23 IT'S AN OPTION TO GIVE A LUMP SUM AND SAY DON'T DARKEN OUR 24 DOOR ANYMORE. NEXT SLIDE. THE PRESIDENT DID BRING UP THIS 375 25

BEALE CONDO INTEREST. ONE OF THE OPTIONS WOULD BE TO SELL THAT 1 CONDOMINIUM INTEREST. THE DETAILS ARE SHOWN ABOVE IT'S ABOUT 2 3 19,000 SQUARE FEET ALSO COULD PROVIDE A BASIS FOR REDUCING THE CONDOMINIUM ASSESSMENTS THAT ARE DONE ON A PROPORTIONAL BASIS, 4 5 AND SALE PROCEEDS COULD BE USED TO BOLSTER RESERVES. NEXT SLIDE. SO, WHAT ELSE ARE WE DOING? WELL, THERE IS CONTINUING 6 WORK ON ENSURING THAT THE FULL COST FOR PROVIDING SERVICES TO 7 8 ABAG IS COVERED. AGAIN, THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE REALLY CAN'T DO TODAY, GIVEN, YOU KNOW, WHERE MEMBER DUES ARE, AND AN 9 INTEREST IN KIND OF MODERATING DUES INCREASES OVER TIME. 10 TRYING TO PROPERLY ALLOCATE THE STAFF TO THOSE SUPPORT 11 ACTIVITIES, FULLY REIMBURSING MTC FOR ITS OVERHEAD COSTS, AND 12 APPROPRIATELY ADDRESSING THE COST OF SHARED SERVICES. SO, 13 FUNDAMENTALLY, WE DO NEED TO ADDRESS STRATEGIES TO CONSIDER 14 15 GREATER COST STABILITY WITH RESPECT TO THE PENSIONS 16 THEMSELVES. ADDRESS THOSE NEEDS FOR OPERATING RESERVES AND PROVIDE FUNDING FOR OTHER ABAG PRIORITIES AND OBJECTIVES. NEXT 17 SLIDE. FUNDING OF THE CHALLENGES WORTH NOTING: THE ABAG 18 EXECUTIVE BOARD AND THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY HAVE TAKEN IMPORTANT 19 STEPS IN TRYING TO ADDRESS THIS ALREADY. FISCAL '23, WE DID A 20 21 6% DUES INCREASE. 10% INCREASES IN BOTH FISCAL '24, AND FISCAL '25. STAFF ABSOLUTELY RECOGNIZES THAT THESE HAVE BEEN 22 SIGNIFICANT INTERESTS. THEY DO PRODUCE THEIR OWN SIGNIFICANT 23 CHALLENGES FOR THE MEMBER AGENCIES. BUT THEY HAVE ALLOWED ABAG 24 25 TO SATISFY ITS ANNUAL PENSION OBLIGATIONS. UNFORTUNATELY, THEY

CONTINUE TO BE INSUFFICIENT TO ADDRESS THE OTHER IDENTIFIED 1 FISCAL CHALLENGES. LOOKING AT THAT CONDO INTEREST, AGAIN, 2 3 WOULD HELP ADDRESS, BUT NOT SOLVE THOSE FISCAL NEEDS. THERE IS NO CURRENTLY IDENTIFIABLE SOURCE OF ONGOING FUNDING, OTHER 4 5 THAN MEMBER DUES. WE ANTICIPATE COMING BACK TO YOU IN THE FISCAL '26 BUDGET PROPOSING A SPECIFIC ITEMIZATION TO VERY 6 CLEARLY IDENTIFY WHICH PORTION OF THE DUES IS SPECIFICALLY 7 8 BEING USED TO ADDRESS THE AMORTIZATION OF THE UNFUNDED LIABILITY AND THE BALANCE THAT IS ASSOCIATED WITH THE OTHER 9 OPERATIONS OF ABAG. REALLY BEING ABLE TO SEE WHY THEY CALL THE 10 TRUE COST OF THOSE PENSION OBLIGATIONS, AND, FRANKLY, A CLOSE 11 TO TRUER COST OF THE VALUE OF ABAG'S OPERATIONS AND THE COST 12 OF SUPPORTING THEM THROUGH THAT NON-PENSION PORTION OF THE 13 DUES. NEXT SLIDE. I ALWAYS FORGET WHETHER THERE IS ANOTHER ONE 14 15 HERE. THAT'S IT.

PRES., BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU FOR THAT SOMBER NEWS. I THINK 17 18 THAT ONE OF THE THINGS I WILL JUST ADD, THAT I THINK IT IS IMPORTANT FOR US TO LOOK AT, AND AS I HAVE SAID FOR THOSE THAT 19 WERE PRESENT AT THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY LAST YEAR, THESE ARE 20 21 OBLIGATIONS WE OWE TO OUR PRIOR EMPLOYEES. WE WILL CONTINUE TO LOOK AT THOSE OPPORTUNITIES, WHETHER IT BE THROUGH THE CONDO 22 INTEREST, THROUGH THE 115 TRUST, THROUGH LOANS. WE ARE READY 23 TO DO THIS WORK AND REPORT-OUT TO THIS BODY WHEN WE HAVE ALL 24 25 THE DETAILS AND MAKE THAT AVAILABLE TO YOU. WE HAVE, IN FACT,

ALSO DISCUSSED THE OPPORTUNITIES TO REFER THIS MATTER, WHETHER 1 2 IT BE TO THE ADMIN COMMITTEE, OR EVEN THROUGH AN AD-HOC. SO I 3 JUST WANTED TO LAY THAT OUT THERE FIRST. ANY COMMENTS, OUESTIONS? SUPERVISOR RABBITT? 4 5 DAVID RABBIT: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THANK YOU DEREK FOR 6 REVISITING THE ISSUE. CAN YOU REMIND US HISTORICALLY, MEMBER 7 8 DUES PAY WHAT PERCENTAGE OF THE OVERALL ABAG BUDGET? 9 10 DEREK HANSEL: THE OVERALL -- THE ADMINISTRATION PORTION OF THE ABAG BUDGET IS ABOUT \$3 MILLION. BUT THEN ABAG ALSO HAS, AS 11 YOU KNOW, SEVERAL PROGRAMS UNDER IT WHICH HAVE THEIR 12 INDIVIDUAL BUDGETS. SO, THERE IS THE SFEP PROGRAM, THE SFEP 13 CONFERENCE, BAYREN, SEPARATELY, ABAG POWER. SO, THERE ARE 14 SEVERAL OTHER PROGRAMS. THIS IS, YOU KNOW, FRANKLY IS A 15 16 PORTION OF THE OVERALL BUDGET, RELATIVELY SMALL, BUT THIS IS THE PORTION THAT'S FUNDED BY THE MEMBER DUES. FLUSH. 17 18 DAVID RABBIT: THEORETICALLY THOSE OTHER ENTITIES ARE ALSO 19 BRINGING IN REVENUE? 20 21 DEREK HANSEL: THOSE OTHER PROGRAMS ARE, ESSENTIALLY, SELF-22 SUPPORTING AT THIS POINT. BUT THEY'RE NOT BRINGING IN REVENUE 23 TO THE ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET. 24 25

DEREK HANSEL: THE FISCAL '26 PAYMENT WHICH WE'LL MAKE IN JULY 11 OF '25 BECAUSE WE GET A DISCOUNT IF WE PAY EARLY, IS 12 APPROXIMATELY TWO. 3 MILLION AGAIN THAT'S AMORTIZING UNFUND 13 LIABILITY NORTH OF 17 MILLION. IF IT'S A HARD PILL TO SWALLOW, WE NEED TO FIGURE 3 OUT HOW WE'RE GOING TO DO T IT, BUT KICKING THIS DOWN THE LINE 4 5 IS NOT ACCEPTABLE. I WILL TAKE SOME RESPONSIBILITY. AS HAVING BEEN VICE CHAIR FOR SIX OR EIGHT MONTHS AND CERTAINLY HAVEN'T 6 BEEN ON THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, BUT WE NEED TO TAKE ACTION. AND 7 8 WE NEED TO HAVE FROM STAFF THAT ROADMAP TO DO SO. THANK YOU. 9 10 PRES., BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU VICE PRESIDENT. I THINK WHAT WE

11 WILL DO IS, WITH -- OH, I WILL LET SUPERVISOR RABBITT?

DAVID RABBIT: I APPRECIATE THAT AND I APPRECIATE THE 13 PRESENTATION AND THE DISCUSSION. AND I THINK IT IS TIME TO 14 15 TAKE ACTION. I THINK WHAT WAS TRUE, AND I HAVE BEEN AROUND 16 HERE FOR A LONG TIME, FOR SOMETIME, IT WASN'T TIME TO TAKE THAT ACTION. AND, ORIGINALLY, AND THE REASON THAT THE 17 LIABILITIES DIDN'T FLOW DIRECTLY INTO MTC, THIS IS NOT A 18 MERGER CONSOLIDATED -- IT WAS A MERGER OF NECESSITY THAT ABAG, 19 WAS BASICALLY GOING INSOLVENT AND COULDN'T OPERATE WITHOUT 20 REALLY COMING INTO THE FOLD OF MTC, AND I THINK YOU SEE THAT. 21 AND WITH THAT'S WHY I ASKED ABOUT THE MEMBER DUES. I MEAN, 22 PRIMARILY, I BELIEVE EARLY ON ABAG WAS PRIMARILY FINANCED 23 THROUGH MEMBER DUES AND WE PAID FOR ALL THOSE SERVICES, AND 24 THEN, I DON'T KNOW -- I DON'T KNOW THE HISTORY OF WHERE THE 25

GRANTS STARTED MAYBE ADDING TO AND THE MEMBER DUES BECAME 1 SOMETHING LESS THAN 100%, AND BEFORE YOU KNOW IT, NO ONE WANTS 2 3 TO INCREASE THEIR DUES, BUT YET THE COSTS ARE GOING UP AND HERE WE SIT. AND I DO -- THE DISCUSSIONS THAT WE HAD AT THE 4 5 TIME OF THE MERGER, HAD A LOT TO DO ABOUT EOUITY. IMAGINE SITTING WITH 30 ELECTED'S TRYING TO MAKE SURE THAT ALL 6 EMPLOYEES ARE MOVED INTO A UNIFIED [LAUGHTER] -- WORK 7 8 ENVIRONMENT WHERE EQUITY, ACROSS THE BOARD, WAS BROUGHT FORWARD FOR THE DIFFERENT TASKS BECAUSE IT WASN'T -- THERE WAS 9 LOTS OF DIFFERENT JOB CLASSIFICATIONS, SOME SIMILAR SOME NOT A 10 LOT THAT NEEDED TO TAKE PLACE AND THAT'S WHERE THE 11 CONCENTRATION AT THAT TIME HAD TO DO WITH TAKING CARE OF OUR 12 EMPLOYEES AT THE TIME. WE ALWAYS HAD THIS ALBATROSS OF 13 PENSIONS JUST LIKE MOST JURISDICTIONS REALLY DO. IT'S A KILLER 14 15 WHEN YOU HAVE NO CURRENT EMPLOYEES TO PAY ANYTHING INTO IT AND 16 ALL YOU'RE DOING IS PAYING DOWN THE UAL IN THAT WAY. SO, I LOOK FORWARD TO FIGURING THIS OUT AS WE GO FORWARD. WE DO HAVE 17 THE ASSET, UPSTAIRS, AND, APPARENTLY, SOMEWHERE DOWN HERE, AS 18 WELL. AND SO I LOOK FORWARD TO ALL THE OPTIONS THAT CAN COME 19 FORWARD. BUT THERE IS A LONG HISTORY. AND IT WASN'T -- THIS 20 WAS NOT MTC TAKING OVER ABAG. IT WAS ABAG ASKING MTC TO REALLY 21 HELP US OUT SO THAT WE CAN CONTINUE TO OPERATE, QUITE FRANKLY. 22 23 THANKS.

23	SPEAKER: HI. THIS IS IMPORTANT HISTORY THAT I THINK NEEDS TO
24	BE CONSIDERED. MTC WAS CREATED IN ORDER TO TAKE OVER THE
25	TRANSPORTATION MONEY. AT THAT TIME ABAG USED TO BE THE MPO.

AND THEN THERE WAS A PROBLEM, SOME -- [INDISCERNIBLE] MONEY 1 AND MTC WAS CREATED. SO WHEN MTC WAS CREATED THEY COOK CONTROL 2 3 OF THE MONEY THEN CONTRACTED WITH ABAG TO HANDLE ALL OF THE EXISTING SERVICES. SO, I THINK MTC SHOULD REALLY BE 4 5 RESPONSIBLE FOR THIS PENSION, NOT NECESSARILY ABAG BECAUSE ABAG WAS ACTUALLY CARRYING OUT THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR MTC. SO, 6 I THINK THAT'S SOMETHING THAT NEEDS TO BE LOOKED INTO. THANK 7 8 YOU.
