- 16 CAMPOS AND VICE CHAIR BALDINI WE SPENT A LOT OF TIME AROUND
- 17 WHAT ARE THOSE TOUCH POINTS, HOW DO WE MAKE SURE IT'S
- 18 MEANINGFUL ENGAGEMENT, NOT JUST A CHECK A BOX BUT REALLY
- 19 TOUCHING OUR COMMUNITY WHERE THEY FEEL HEARD AND VALIDATED
- 20 WHICH ALLOWS THE COMMISSION TO TAKE ON MORE REGIONAL
- 21 DECISIONS. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT WE SPENT SOME TIME TALKING
- 22 ABOUT WAS WE, FIRST OF ALL, WE ACKNOWLEDGED THE FISCAL CLIFF.
- 23 WE ACKNOWLEDGE THE CHALLENGES OUR REGION IS FACING. BUT WE CAN
- 24 DO MORE AND WE SHOULD DO MORE. AROUND THE AREA OF MOBILITY,
- 25 ACCESS, EQUITY, SUSTAINABILITY, YOU KNOW, THOSE ARE ALL



- 1 IMPORTANT THINGS. AND I WILL TALK ABOUT IT IN THE WORK PLAN. I
- 2 KNOW THE COST OF LIVING IS GETTING MORE EXPENSIVE IN OUR
- 3 REGION. OPERATORS ARE TRYING TO DO MORE WITH LESS. BUT I AM
- 4 VERY BULLISH ON MAKING SURE THAT WE HAVE A TRANSIT SYSTEM THAT
- 5 WORKS FOR ALL. AND I ACTUALLY AM OPTIMISTIC, MAYBE A LITTLE
- 6 BIT NAIVE, BUT I DO THINK IT CAN WORK. WE HAVE THE RIGHT
- 7 VARIABLES IN PLACE TO DO THAT. BUT WE HAVE TO MAKE SURE AS WE
- 8 CONTINUE TO TAKE ON SOME REGIONAL DECISIONS AND WE TALK ABOUT
- 9 SOME OF THE ISSUES THAT MIGHT MAKE SOME FOLKS UNCOMFORTABLE
- 10 AROUND MORE INTEGRATION, MORE COLLABORATION, THAT IT'S DONE
- 11 WITH COMMUNITIES, WITH ELECTIVES AT THE LOCAL LEVEL, WITH
- 12 LOCAL RESIDENTS WHERE THEY ABSOLUTELY FEEL LIKE THEY'RE PART
- 13 OF THE PROCESS, NOT THE PROCESS IS HAPPENING TO THEM. SO AS WE
- 14 GO FORWARD, I KNOW THERE ARE SOME DISCUSSION AROUND A REGIONAL
- 15 MEASURE AND WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE. SENSITIVE TO COST, BUT I DO
- 16 THINK WE NEED TO LOOK AT SUSTAINABLE FUNDING SOURCES FOR OUR
- 17 COMMUNITY IN A WAY IN A ALLOWS US TO BRING TRANSIT BACK
- 18 STRONGER AND BETTER. AND THEN, THE ONE THING I WILL JUST TELL
- 19 YOU IS I REALLY WANT TO MAKE SURE WE'RE FOCUSED. THERE ARE A
- 20 LOT OF THINGS WE CAN VENTURE INTO, AND QUITE HONESTLY, I DON'T
- 21 WANT TO WASTE YOUR TIME. I WANT TO MAKE SURE THE WORK YOU DO
- 22 IS REWARDED AND GRATIFYING AND YOU FEEL LIKE YOU'RE ADDING
- 23 VALUE. SO TO ME, THAT'S WHY I'M -- THAT'S WHY BEING FOCUSED IS

SO LET'S GO ON TO 14 15 THE NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THIS IS JUST AS A REMINDER, HERE'S THE 16 FRESHEST PICTURE OF YOU ALL FROM LAST MONTH. YOUR GENERAL ROLE IS TO ADVISE THE COMMISSION ON TRANSPORTATION POLICIES IN THE 17 BAY AREA, INCORPORATING THE DIVERSE PERSPECTIVES FROM THE 18 COMMUNITIES YOU REPRESENT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT, THE 19 ECONOMY, AND EOUITY. LET'S GO ON TO THE NEXT SLIDE. THE WORK 20 21 PLAN PIECE IS REALLY ABOUT THREE CONCURRENT GOALS. ONE OF THEM IS, YOU KNOW, YOU CAN'T QUITE DO EVERYTHING THAT THIS AGENCY 22 DOES. SO STRATEGICALLY FOCUSING YOUR LIMITED TIME AND 23 RESOURCES ON THE PRIORITIES AS ALIGNED WITH THE COMMISSION 24

- 21 SHOULD BE OUR PRIMARY FOCUS. I RECOGNIZE THAT EQUITY IS REALLY
- 22 IMPORTANT AND WE SHOULDN'T LEAVE ANYBODY OUT. BUT TODAY, WE'RE
- 23 LEAVING JUST ABOUT EVERYBODY OUT BECAUSE OUR TRANSIT SYSTEM
- 24 ISN'T WORKING. SO MY FOCUS HAS BEEN, MAKE TRANSIT WORK FOR
- 25 EVERYBODY. AND I THINK THAT SHOULD BE OUR FOCUS AND IT SHOULD



- 1 BE HIGHLIGHTED, NOT JUST NESTED IN SOMEPLACE IN TRANSIT 2050
- 2 AND NOT LEFT WITH A SUBCOMMITTEE THAT'S WORKING ON IT. THAT
- 3 SHOULD BE ON OUR AGENDA EVERY SINGLE MEETING. HOW DO WE GET 27
- 4 TRANSIT DISTRICTS TO EITHER WORK TOGETHER OR BECOME ONE, WHICH
- 5 YOU'LL FIND IN THE METROPOLITAN AREAS AND EUROPE THAT'S THE
- 6 CASE. RECENTLY I'VE BEEN SENDING TO ADINA SIGNS THAT I HAVE.
- 7 I'VE BEEN TAKING TRANSIT SYSTEMS SINCE I JOINED THIS GROUP
- 8 JUST SO I CAN FIND OUT ABOUT TRANSIT. I HAVE TO COME ONE HOUR
- 9 EARLY OR FIVE MINUTES LATE TO THIS MEETING AND DRIVE 20 MILES
- 10 TO GET TO TRANSIT IN THE FIRST PLACE IN ORDER TO MAKE IT HERE.
- I LEFT THE HOUSE AT 6:30 TO GET HERE AT 10:00. I WANT TO GO TO
- 12 THE SOUTH BAY, IT'S A LITTLE BIT WORSE. THAT HAS TO BE OUR
- 13 FOCUS. AS REPRESENTATIVES OF OUR COMMUNITIES, MAKE
- 14 TRANSPORTATION SOMETHING AND TRANSIT SOMETHING THAT THEY VALUE
- 15 AS SOMETHING THEY PUT UP. WE'RE NOT DOING THAT SO FAR. I WOULD
- 16 LOOK AT THE LIST AND SAY, WHAT IS IT WE'RE HERE FOR? AND
- 17 THAT'S WHAT WE'RE HERE FOR. AND THAT WILL ALSO SOLVE THE
- 18 GREENHOUSE GAS PROBLEMS BECAUSE IF WE GET PEOPLE OUT OF THE
- 19 CARS, INCLUDING ME, THEN WE'RE GOING TO SOLVE THE PROBLEM.
- 20 THANKS. BY THE WAY, I SPOKE MORE THIS TIME THAN USUAL AND I
- 21 REALIZE THE REASON RANDI DIDN'T WANT TO BE CHAIR ANYMORE, SHE
- 22 GETS TO TALK LONGER. [LAUGHTER]

24 CHAIR, PAMELA CAMPOS: THANK YOU. CHAIR RHOADS.

- 1 JEFFREY RHOADS: I HAVE A FEW THINGS. NOW, I'M A NEWBIE HERE SO
- 2 I GOT SOME THINGS TO LEARN. I GUESS, THE FIRST REALLY RELATES

- 9 SHOULD WE CARRY FORWARD IN THE FUTURE? IT SEEMS TO ME THAT

- 11 OTHER THING IS I ALSO WANT TO SUPPORT THE IDEA OF A SUMMER

- 3 SPECIFIC PROJECTS IN COMMUNITIES THAT MOTIVATES SUPPORT. WE'RE
- 4 GOING TO SEE THIS THING HAPPEN IF THIS INITIATIVE PASSES. SORT
- 5 OF A CHRISTMAS TREE APPROACH, I HATE TO SAY. WE'LL GIVE YOU
- 6 THIS ORNAMENT IF YOU VOTE FOR OUR INITIATIVE. BUT WE NEED TO
- 7 UNDERSTAND FROM A GRASSROOTS LEVEL WHAT ARE THE THINGS ARE

- 22 MORE EFFICIENT VEHICLES, TRANSITION TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES, THAT
- 23 KIND OF THING. AND THE OTHER THING THAT I THINK IS REALLY A
- 24 CONCERN IS THAT IT SEEMS ON A REGIONAL LEVEL WE'RE PRETTY
- 25 EFFECTIVE AT REQUIRING COMMUNITIES TO PROVIDE MORE HOUSING BUT



- 1 NOT VERY EFFECTIVE AT TYING LAND USE TO TRANSIT. AND AT THE
- 2 END OF THE DAY, TRANSIT IS ONLY SUCCESSFUL IF THERE'S
- 3 SUFFICIENT DENSITY TO SUPPORT IT. IS THERE MORE WE CAN DO TO
- 4 DRIVE LAND USE DECISIONS AND DENSITY TO SUPPORT TRANSIT? AND I
- 5 GUESS THAT'S -- THAT'S KIND OF MY, YOU KNOW, NEWBIE COMMENTS,
- 6 I GUESS. [LAUGHTER]

- 8 CHAIR, PAMELA CAMPOS: THANK YOU. SORRY. COUNCILMEMBER RHOADS,

- 10 CORRIDOR AND HOW THAT WILL WORK WITH ANY OTHER COMMUNITIES,
- 11 LOW-INCOME, PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES, WHOLE NINE YARDS, IS
- 12 THAT I THINK WE ALSO NEED TO ADD ONE OTHER PIECE IN ORDER TO
- 13 GET A BETTER PICTURE OF WHO ALL IS COVERED UNDER THIS. WHAT I

- 19 REALLY THE NUMBERS THAT ARE USING THESE DIFFERENT SYSTEMS AND
- 20 WHAT THE EVENTUAL COST TURNED OUT TO BE. AS WE ALL KNOW, SOME
- 21 OF US KNOW AND MAYBE ALL OF US SHOULD KNOW IS THAT WHEN YOU --
- 22 DISABILITY LOW INCOME, ON S.S.I., S.S. -- WELL, MORE S.S.I.

- 1 THAT REALLY HAS A SEVERE IMPACT ON HOW THEY'RE ABLE TO --
- 2 PARDON ME -- FULLY PARTICIPATE IN OUR COMMUNITY. WHEN YOU
- 3 DON'T HAVE THAT AVAILABLE CASH, IT REALLY AFFECTS YOU. SO I
- 4 THINK THAT'S SOMETHING WE REALLY DO NEED TO PAY ATTENTION TO.
- 5 THANK YOU.

- 7 CHAIR, PAMELA CAMPOS: THANK YOU. NEXT, WE HAVE COUNCILMEMBER
- 8 LIEU.

- 10 CARINA LIEU: I JUST REALLY QUICKLY WANTED TO COMMENT ON THE
- 11 WORK PLAN IN TERMS OF THE INTEGRATION OF THE SUBCOMMITTEES. I
- 12 WOULD LIKE TO SEE NEW THINKING HOW SUBCOMMITTEE WORK WOULD TIE
- 13 INTO THE PRIORITIES RAISED HERE. I THINK -- I THINK AS SOME

SO ONE OF THE OUESTIONS I HAVE AROUND THIS, 4 5 IF THIS IS A PRIORITY OR IF THIS IS A TOPIC PRIORITY WE NEED TO DEVELOP A LITTLE BIT FURTHER, WILL WE START TO SEE MORE 6 STAFF WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IT IS TO CARRY OUT ENGAGEMENT LIKE 7 8 THE DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AT M.T.C. OR WILL WE SEE STAFF PARTICIPATE IN OUR MEET EGGS MORE FREQUENTLY SO THEY'RE 9 LISTENING TO THE FEEDBACK THAT WE HAVE AND WE START TO 10 ESTABLISH MORE OF A RELATIONSHIP WITH THOSE FOLKS? I AM THE ASSISTANT 11 DIRECTOR FOR LEGISLATION ON PUBLIC AFFAIRS AT M.T.C. M.T.C. 12 ABAG STAFF. GOOD MORNING, EVERYONE. THAT WAS A REALLY ROBUST 13 DISCUSSION. I FEEL PRETTY PRIVILEGED TO HAVE BEEN ABLE TO SIT 14 15 THERE AND HEAR THAT. THANK YOU. AND I WILL REALLY KIND OF 16 CHANGE WHAT I WAS GOING TO SHARE BASED ON THAT DISCUSSION. AND SO I'M HERE -- THIS IS AN INFORMATION ITEM. IT IS A 17 PRESENTATION ON THE WORK THAT WE ARE DOING ON THE LEGISLATIVE 18 SIDE AROUND ASKING THE STATE TO GIVE M.T.C. THE AUTHORITY TO 19 PLACE ON THE BALLOT A REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION REVENUE MEASURE. 20 AND IT'S SOMETHING WE'D BE LOOKING TO PLACE ON THE BALLOT IN 21 SEVERAL YEARS, IN 2026 OR LATER. THE REASON WHY WE ARE DOING 22 ALL OF THIS -- SO ONE THING I WANT TO SAY, THE COUNCIL HAS 23 HEARD ABOUT THIS PROPOSAL AND INFORMED A LOT OF THE PROPOSAL 24

OVER THE LAST -- GOSH, IT MUST BE A YEAR AND A HALF NOW. I DO



- 1 RECOGNIZE OUITE A FEW OF YOU ARE NEW AND SO I JUST WANT TO
- 2 GIVE A LITTLE BIT OF THE HISTORY ON THE WHY AND HOW WE GOT TO
- 3 WHERE WE ARE TODAY AND THEN OUTLINE FOR YOU SOME OF THE REALLY
- 4 BIG POLICY ITEMS RELATED TO THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS IN
- 5 SACRAMENTO THAT ARE YET TO BE, LIKE, DETERMINED. THERE ARE A
- 6 COUPLE OF BIG OPEN POLICY ITEMS LIKE, WHAT TYPE OF HIGHWAY
- 7 PROJECTS SHOULD THE MEASURE BE ABLE TO FUND? HOW MUCH OF THE
- 8 MONEY SHOULD GO TOWARDS TRANSIT? SOME REALLY BIG ITEMS THAT I
- 9 WANT TO RAISE FOR YOU AND GET ALL OF YOUR FEEDBACK ON TODAY.
- 10 SO WHAT I WANT TO DO IS JUST START FROM THE -- SORT OF THE
- 11 WHY. WHY ARE WE HERE? YOU KNOW, THE BAY AREA HAS AN ENORMOUS
- 12 AMOUNT OF MONEY THAT GOES INTO TRANSPORTATION. IT'S JAW-
- 13 DROPPING. IT IS ALSO OF THE AMOUNT OF RESOURCES THAT WE HAVE
- 14 THAT ARE DEDICATED TO TRANSPORTATION THAT WE'RE ABLE TO BRING
- 15 INTO TRANSPORTATION AND TO IMPROVE MOBILITY IN THE REGION,
- 16 MOST OF THOSE RESOURCES ARE USED TO KEEP THE ROADS MAINTAINED.
- 17 YOU KNOW, SAFE. AND TO KEEP TRANSIT CARS UP TO DATE AND SAFE.
- 18 AND TO FUND TRANSIT OPERATIONS. SO THERE'S NOT A WHOLE LOT OF
- 19 EXTRA ROOM TO BREATHE TO INVEST IN IMPROVEMENTS THAT REALLY
- 20 ARE WHAT ARE NEEDED TO HELP BRING THE BAY AREA TOWARDS
- 21 ACHIEVING THE REALLY AMBITIOUS GOALS THAT WE AT M.T.C. AND
- 22 ABAG HAVE LAID OUT IN OUR LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION INVESTMENT
- 23 STRATEGY AND PLAN TO DELIVER ON A MORE AFFORDABLE, EQUITABLE,
- 24 DIVERSE, HEALTHY AND VIBRANT BAY AREA. AND SO A LOT OF WHAT
- 25 THOSE, LIKE, IMPROVEMENTS WOULD NEED TO BE ARE THINGS LIKE



- 1 REVAMPING TRANSIT SO IT DOESN'T -- SOMEBODY DOESN'T HAVE TO
- 2 WAKE UP AT 6:30 IN THE MORNING TO GET TO A 10:00 MEETING IN
- 3 SAN FRANCISCO. REALLY LOOKING AT MAKING SURE THAT TRANSIT CAN
- 4 SERVE RIDERS, NOT NECESSARILY -- A GOVERNMENT OFTEN HAS A
- 5 CHALLENGE, RIGHT, WHERE GOVERNMENT EXISTS AND CREATES A
- 6 FUNCTION AND PART OF THE FUNCTION ENDS UP BEING THE GOVERNMENT
- 7 THINKING MORE ABOUT THE AGENCY AND YOUR OWN GOVERNMENT INSTEAD
- 8 OF THE PEOPLE WE'RE TRYING TO SERVE AND SO A LOT OF THE WORK
- 9 AROUND THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN IS REALLY AROUND REALLY
- 10 FOCUS ON RIDERS AND MAKE SURE RIDERS COME FIRST. THAT TAKES
- 11 MONEY. SOME OF IT DOESN'T BUT A LOT OF IT TAKES MONEY. AND SO
- 12 THAT'S REALLY WHAT WE'RE THINKING ABOUT WITH THE IMPROVEMENTS.
- 13 THE OTHER ELEMENTS WE'RE THINKING ABOUT WITH IMPROVEMENTS ARE
- 14 THINGS LIKE, HEY, MOST ONLY 4% OF PEOPLE COMMUTE INTO WORK
- 15 RIDING TRANSIT TODAY. SO A LOT OF -- IT MEANS A LOT OF PEOPLE
- 16 ARE EITHER CHOOSING TO DRIVE OR NEED TO DRIVE. AND SO WE ALSO
- 17 NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT ROADS ARE SAFE AND IMPROVED FOR THOSE
- 18 PEOPLE WHO ARE CHOOSING TO DRIVE TODAY. SO THERE'S A LOT OF
- 19 NEEDS OUT THERE. AND MOST OF THE MONEY THAT WE HAVE COMING IN
- 20 IS GOING TO MAINTAINING OUR SYSTEM RIGHT NOW. WHICH IS REALLY,

- 23 REALLY SET THE STAGE FOR, LIKE, NOW EVERYBODY ELSE IN THE

- 25 MAINTAINING YOUR ASSETS. SO THAT'S GOOD, GREAT NEWS. THE



- 1 CHALLENGE IS THAT WE DON'T HAVE ENOUGH MONEY, AGAIN, TO INVEST
- 2 IN THOSE IMPROVEMENTS. AND SO EVEN IN OUR LAST LONG-RANGE PLAN
- 3 WHICH WAS ADOPTED, WHICH WAS DEVELOPED PRE-COVID, WE LOOKED AT
- 4 THE PLAN AND WE WERE LIKE, WE HAVE A HUGE FUNDING GAP TO BE
- 5 ABLE TO DELIVER ON THESE IMPROVEMENTS. ONE OF THE WAYS WE HAVE
- 6 IDENTIFIED CLOSING THAT FUNDING GAP IS ASKING BAY AREA VOTERS
- 7 TO PUT MORE OF THEIR OWN RESOURCES IN TO BE ABLE TO GENERATE
- 8 SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF REVENUES, LOOKING AT \$1 BILLION TO \$2
- 9 BILLION A YEAR. THEN, COVID HAPPENED, AND THE URGENCY SHIFTED

- 21 ABLE TO SECURE ADDITIONAL STATE AND FEDERAL MONEY. TRANSIT
- 22 OPERATING ISN'T THE MAIN THING WE NEED TO USE REGIONAL
- 23 RESOURCES FOR. MAYBE IT'S CLIMATE CHANGE. SO I THINK THAT'S
- 24 THE WHY ARE WE HERE. SOMEONE ELSE ASKED A QUESTION A LITTLE
- 25 BIT EARLIER ABOUT HOW ALL OF THE STATE AND FEDERAL MONEY COME



- 1 IN AND WHAT DOES M.T.C. DO WITH THAT. I'M SURE YOU GUYS WILL
- 2 GET A MORE DETAILED PRESENTATION ON IT SOON. BUT ONE THING I
- 3 WANT TO RAISE ABOUT THE REGIONAL MONEY IS, IT'S SO IMPORTANT
- 4 THAT IT IS FLEXIBLE BECAUSE THE STATE MONEY THAT COMES IN
- 5 COMES IN FOR A SPECIFIC PURPOSE. THE FEDERAL MONEY THAT COMES
- 6 IN COMES IN FOR A SPECIFIC PURPOSE. SO MONEY DOES COME TO THE
- 7 REGIONS BUT THE FED SAYS, YOU MAY ONLY USE THIS TO FIX A
- 8 BRIDGE. YOU MAY ONLY USE THIS FOR A CONGESTION REDUCTION PILOT
- 9 PROGRAM. SO WE NEED THAT SORT OF POT OF NEW REGIONAL MONEY TO
- 10 COME IN TO BE ABLE TO -- WE NEED ALL THE FEDERAL MONEY AND
- 11 STATE MONEY TO STAY. WE CAN'T AFFORD TO LOSE ANY OF IT. BUT WE
- 12 NEED THAT NEW REGIONAL MONEY TO COME IN TO BE ABLE TO FILL THE
- 13 GAPS AND TO RESPOND WHAT BAY AREA RESIDENTS SAY THEY WANT AND
- 14 NEED FOR THEIR TRANSPORTATION NETWORK. SO THAT IS WHY WE'RE
- 15 HERE. THE OTHER WHY WE'RE HERE IS THAT IN ORDER FOR US TO GO
- 16 TO THE BALLOT AND ASK VOTERS IN THE BAY AREA TO RAISE MONEY
- 17 FOR THEMSELVES, THE STATE HAS TO TELL US WE CAN DO IT. SO MY
- 18 JOB IS TO WORK THROUGH THE STATE LEGISLATURE THIS YEAR A BILL
- 19 THAT WOULD GIVE M.T.C. THE AUTHORIZATION TO GO ASK VOTERS FOR,
- 20 YOU KNOW, NEW REVENUES TO, AGAIN, SUPPORT TRANSIT OPERATIONS
- 21 AND OTHER TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES. AND THE CHARGE IS TO BE
- 22 AS -- GET OUT OF THE LEGISLATURE WITH SOMETHING THAT'S AS

- 4 VOTERS, AND IT'S CERTAINLY NOT THE RIGHT THING TO ASK FOR
- 5 PEOPLE WHO ARE PUTTING THEIR OWN RESOURCES IN TO HAVE A
- 6 PRESCRIBED PROJECT LIST FOR FILLING -- FOR CREATING -- YOU
- 7 KNOW, FOR INVESTING IN A BIKE LANE HERE AND THEN IN 20 YEARS
- 8 THAT'S -- THAT'S NOT NEEDED ANY MORE BUT WE'RE COMMITTING TO
- 9 INVESTING IN THOSE PROJECTS. SO THAT'S THE CHARGE. AND A
- 10 COUPLE OF REALLY IMPORTANT SORT OF UPDATES. WE ARE SO LUCKY
- 11 THAT WHO IS GOING TO BE AUTHORING THE BILL -- NOT -- WHO IS
- 12 AUTHORING THE BILL IS SENATOR SCOTT WEINER FROM SAN FRANCISCO.
- 13 THE BILL IS SB-925, AND AFTER GETTING INPUT FROM YOU ALL, THE
- 14 COMMISSION, AND A LOT OF OTHER STAKEHOLDERS, THE COMMISSION
- 15 TOOK ACTION IN JANUARY TO APPROVE A FRAMEWORK FOR THIS
- 16 REGIONAL MEASURE. I'M HAPPY TO DIG INTO THAT LATER. IT WILL
- 17 TAKE A LONG TIME SO I AM NOT GOING TO TALK ABOUT IT YET.
- 18 APPROVED A FRAMEWORK FOR THE MEASURE. AND SO WHAT WE ARE DOING
- 19 NOW IS WE'RE TURNING THAT FRAMEWORK INTO LEGISLATIVE LANGUAGE,
- 20 AND IT WILL BE AMENDED INTO THE -- INTO SB-925. HOPEFULLY AT
- 21 SOME POINT AT THE END OF THIS MONTH TO EARLY NEXT MONTH. THEN,
- 22 WE START GOING THROUGH POLICY COMMITTEES IN THE SENATE AND

- 1 WAS REALLY STRONG SUPPORT FOR TRANSIT SERVICE AND BETTER
- 2 CONNECTED, BETTER INTEGRATED TRANSIT SERVICE. EVEN IN THIS
- 3 CONVERSATION THIS MORNING, AND THAT IS SOMETHING THAT HAS
- 4 SHOWN UP IN POLLS WHERE PEOPLE, YOU KNOW, DON'T RESPOND AS
- 5 WELL TO A MESSAGE OF SAYING, YOU KNOW, PREVENT CUTS. THEY
- 6 REALLY WANT TO SEE THIS SYSTEM NOT ONLY MAINTAINED BUT
- 7 IMPROVED AS A BASELINE AND SO BEING ABLE TO DELIVER THAT IS
- 8 PART OF WHAT IS CORE TO VOTER EXPECTATIONS AS WELL AS OUR
- 9 NEEDS AS A REGION FOR OUR CLIMATE GOALS, FOR OUR EQUITY GOALS,
- 10 FOR OUR HOUSING GOALS TO BE THE REGION THAT WE WANT TO BE. YOU
- 11 MENTIONED THE COMMUTE MODE SHARE, THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO USE
- 12 TRANSIT SOME OF THE TIME IS SIGNIFICANTLY HIGHER THAN THAT.
- 13 AND THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO SAY THEY WOULD USE TRANSIT MORE
- 14 IF IT WERE BETTER FOR THEM IS ALSO HIGH. SO I THINK THAT IS A

- 16 CRISIS BUT TO GO IN THE DIRECTION WE WANT TO DO. SO YES. ON
- 17 THE DISCUSSION OF RETURN TO SOURCE I HAVE A KIND OF NUANCED
- 18 OPINION ABOUT THIS. ALSO, RELATING TO THE PREVIOUS TOPIC. SO
- 19 WHERE THERE IS FUNDING FOR THINGS LIKE BIKE AND PED
- 20 IMPROVEMENTS AND LOCAL STREETS AND ROADS, YOU KNOW, REPAIRING
- 21 A POTHOLE, LIKE, EVERY POTHOLE ISN'T IN ONE EXACT LOCATION. SO
- 22 SAYING THAT THERE SHOULD BE, YOU KNOW, ROAD REPAIR MONEY AND
- 23 LOCAL STREET SAFETY MONEY, PROPORTIONAL TO THE POPULATION
- 24 PAYING IN, SEEMS COMPLETELY REASONABLE. ACCOMPANIED BY
- 25 POLICIES THAT ENSURE THAT IT IS SPENT, FOR EXAMPLE, ALONG THE



- 1 LINES OF COMPLETE STREETS AND, YOU KNOW, A NUMBER OF OUR
- 2 COUNTY-BASED MEASURES HAVE POLICIES THAT HOPEFULLY WHEN WE GET
- 3 TO THE CREATION OF THE MEASURE, EXPENDITURE PLAN AND THE
- 4 POLICY ITSELF, WE WILL HAVE NOT JUST UNCONSTRAINED, YOU CAN DO
- 5 A COMPLETELY UNSAFE BIKE LANE BUT, YOU KNOW, RETURN TO SOURCE,
- 6 BUT WITH SOME POLICY GUIDANCE, THAT MAKES A TON OF SENSE. WHEN

- 15 TO PARTICIPATE. IT'S 100% MY MONEY, I CAN SAY NO. AND THAT'S
- 16 WHAT WE DON'T WANT TO HAVE. SO, LIKE, THAT'S NOT -- LIKE,
- 17 THAT'S INCOMPATIBLE WITH THE GOALS THAT WE HAVE JUST BEEN
- 18 EXPRESSING. THE OTHER THING THAT IS A CHALLENGE IS THAT, OUR
- 19 REGIONAL SERVICES SERVE MULTIPLE COUNTIES, AND IF YOU SAY, FOR
- 20 EXAMPLE, YOU KNOW, WITH THE SANTA CLARA COUNTY, ON THE ONE
- 21 HAND, IT'S A LARGE PERCENT OF THE POPULATION, AND V.T.A., THE
- 22 LOCAL AGENCY, IS NOT FACING A FISCAL CLIFF SO WHY PUT IN THE
- 23 MONEY, V.T.A. IS ALSO SPONSORING A \$12 MILLION EXTENSION
- 24 PROJECT TO BRING BART TO SILICON VALLEY AND IF BART DOES NOT
- 25 HAVE SERVICE, YOU KNOW, THAT'S ALSO CLEARLY CONTRARY TO WHAT



- 1 EVEN SANTA CLARA COUNTY WANTS AND SAYING, OKAY, WELL, SANTA
- 2 CLARA COUNTY HAS ENOUGH MONEY TO RUN BART SERVICE BUT THERE'S
- 3 NOT ENOUGH MONEY TO RUN THE REST OF THE BART SERVICE, THAT'S
- 4 ILLOGICAL. THAT'S NOT WHAT ANYONE WANTS. IT MUST BE SOMETHING
- 5 THAT VOTERS BELIEVE IS FAIR SO THAT'S REALLY IMPORTANT, BUT
- 6 THE WAY TO HANDLE THE TRANSIT HAVE THESE CAVEATS AT THAT IT
- 7 MUST SUPPORT THE REGIONAL SERVICES WHERE YOU CAN'T, YOU KNOW,
- 8 YOU CAN'T FULLY MAKE FUNDING FOR REGIONAL SERVICES LOCAL AND
- 9 THEN EXPECT TO HAVE A REGIONAL SERVICE AND YOU CAN'T MAKE
- 10 SYSTEM INTEGRATION LOCAL AND EXPECT TO HAVE AN INTEGRATED
- 11 SERVICE. SO I DO NOT HAVE AN EXACT FORMULA, UNFORTUNATELY,
- 12 GEORGIA, TO RECOMMEND. AND THIS IS NOT -- EVEN IF I DID THIS
- 13 IT WOULD NOT BE THE FORUM TO DO THIS. THAT REALLY NEEDS A
- 14 NUANCED APPROACH. ON THE HIGHWAY EXPANSION, THIS IS A -- WE
- 15 NEED TO HAVE OUR FUNDING TO BE SUPPORTING THE CLIMATE GOALS.
- 16 I'M HERE AS AN INDIVIDUAL BUT WITH NONPROFIT HATS AND ALSO AS
- 17 AN INDIVIDUAL DO NOT SUPPORT HIGHWAY EXPANSION. AND LOOK AT
- 18 EVEN IN THE COUNTY WHERE I LIVE IN, WE HAD A MANAGED LANE
- 19 PROJECT THAT DID DO EXPANSION AND WE'RE ALSO SEEING HOW
- 20 CALTRAIN RECOVERING RIDERSHIP -- THAT WAS A CORRIDOR THAT HAD
- 21 REALLY ROBUST TRANSIT. AND BY MAKING IT EASIER TO DRIVE,
- 22 CALTRAIN RIDERSHIP IS GROWING GRADUALLY. DID WE INVEST IN A

- 4 OF THE DAY, OUITE POSSIBLY. BUT THE PRINCIPLE SHOULD BE
- 5 CLIMATE-FRIENDLY. LET'S NOT HAVE COUNTERPRODUCTIVE
- 6 INVESTMENTS. THANKS.

- 17 GERRY GLASER: WE'LL GET THERE. PREVIOUS LIFE, 10 YEARS AGO, I
- 18 WORKED ON A CLIMATE ACTION PLAN IN SUNNYVALE, AND 70% OF
- 19 GREENHOUSE CAME. WHERE I LIVE NOW 70% COMES FROM
- 20 TRANSPORTATION. COINCIDENTALLY, RECENTLY, STARTED SITTING ON
- 21 THE ADVISORY COUNTY FOR SONOMA TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY AND
- 22 MEASURE M IS WHAT WE MONITOR. IT IS A QUARTER CENT TAX THAT
- 23 GOES TO TRANSPORTATION AND IT WAS VERY SPECIFIC AS TO WHERE IT
- 24 WAS SPENT. MORE THAN HALF OF IT WAS SPENT ON HIGHWAY 101 SO
- 25 WE'D GET MUCH BETTER HIGHWAYS. NOW IT'S SIX LANES WIDE AND

- 14 THAT'S NOT SO IT'S -- SO IT'S PUBLIC TRANSIT SO THOSE LANES
- 15 RUN AT SPEED. THAT WILL IMPROVE OUR SITUATION AND WE'LL HAVE
- 16 PUBLIC TRANSIT WHICH WILL THEN BE ATTRACTED BECAUSE IT WILL DO
- 17 BETTER THAN RIDING IN A CAR. ONE OF THE REASONS I TAKE THE
- 18 FERRY AND THE TRAIN WHEN I CAN WHEN THEY HAVE SCHEDULES THAT
- 19 WORK IS BECAUSE I DON'T GET STUCK IN THE TRAFFIC BECAUSE THEY
- 20 HAVE THEIR OWN ROADWAY. THOSE ARE THE MAJOR THINGS THAT I'M
- 21 LOOKING AT. YOU BROUGHT UP THE FLEXIBILITY. FOCUS ON THE
- 22 FLEXIBILITY. THAT'S WHERE IT SHOULD BE. DOES THE MONEY GO BACK
- 23 TO WHOEVER GAVE YOU THE MONEY? YEARS AGO WE VOTED ON SOMETHING
- 24 IN CALIFORNIA WHICH IS A STUPID IDEA. WE TAXED PEOPLE AND
- 25 THEIR CARS AND SAID, OH, YEAH, WE HAVE TO SPEND IT ON

4 CHAIR, PAMELA CAMPOS: THANK YOU. COUNCILMEMBER SCOTT.

- 6 TERRY SCOTT: MY COMMENTS WILL BE RELATIVELY BRIEF. I THINK
- 7 IT'S IMPORTANT WE SPEND THE HIGHEST -- WE SPEND THE DOLLARS
- 8 THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT IN SB-925 SO HAVE THE HIGHEST NUMBER
- 9 OF RIDERS AND USERS AND UNFORTUNATELY, THAT IS THE HIGHWAY
- 10 SYSTEM. AND WE DO NEED TO AVOID PROBLEMS WITH THE
- 11 DISINTEGRATION, IF YOU WILL, OF THE EXISTING SYSTEMS. THEY
- 12 NEED TO BE MAINTAINED PROPERLY PRIMARILY FOR SAFETY USES, NOT
- 13 NECESSARILY FOR DECREASE TIME AND TRAVEL. BUT HIGHWAY
- 14 MAINTENANCE SHOULD BE FOR SAFETY, NOT NECESSARILY FOR
- 15 EXPANSION. AND I AGREE THAT EXPANSION IS -- SHOULD BE
- 16 SECONDARY IN OUR THINKING. I WOULD ALSO -- OBVIOUSLY, I'D LIKE
- 17 TO ENCOURAGE THOSE OPPORTUNITIES FOR -- TO INCREASE BICYCLE
- 18 WALKING LANES, THINGS LIKE THAT, THAT DON'T REQUIRE MOTORIZED
- 19 VEHICLES AND OBVIOUSLY DON'T GENERATE THE -- HOW I GUESS IS
- 20 WHAT WE WANT TO AVOID. THE IMPORTANT THING IS WE NEED TO
- 21 BENEFIT THE VAST MAJORITY OF USERS AS MUCH AS WE WANT TO
- 22 INCREASE OTHER FORMS AND I AGREE WITH THE PREVIOUS SPEAKER
- 23 THAT I ENJOY TAKING THE FERRY. I FIND THE BENEFITS ARE MANY.
- 24 NUMBER ONE, YOU'RE NOT DEALING WITH THE TRAFFIC. NUMBER TWO,
- 25 YOU'RE NOT DEALING WITH EXPENSIVE OR NONAVAILABLE PARKING WHEN



YOU ARRIVE, PARTICULARLY IN SAN FRANCISCO AND OTHER LARGE 1 METROPOLITAN AREAS. BUT IT'S RELAXING. IT'S -- YOU CAN CLEAR 2 3 YOUR MIND. YOU CAN WORK, ETC. AND SO FORTH. AND IT DOES TAKE A LITTLE LONGER, BOTTOM LINE. - 19 HOME, SHOULD WE REALLY BE FUNDING TRANSIT? THAT CAME UP WHEN
- 20 THE SANTA FE TRANSIT SYSTEM WAS BEING DISCUSSED. THIS IS
- 21 COMING FROM THE SAN RAFAEL CITY COUNCIL. SHOULD WE REALLY BE
- 22 DOING THAT? THE ANSWER IS, OF COURSE, YOU'RE SUPPOSED TO BE
- 23 DOING THAT. AGAIN, THAT GETS BACK TO BECAUSE WE NEED TO
- 24 TRANSFORM THE SYSTEM TO BEING JUST A PURELY PUTTING ALL OUR
