ABAG Executive Board May 19, 2022

KEY HIGHLIGHTS FOR MAY 2022:

The **BayREN Business Plan and Budget** request was filed at the CA Public Utilities Commission in early March. The Plan includes an expansion of the portfolio to include a new workforce program designed for low-income youth that provides training, paid internships and job placements in the clean economy, new public sector programs focused on support for decarbonizing municipal buildings, and a refrigerant replacement program for small food service establishments. The portfolio has a greater emphasis on equity programs. The budget request has increased to approximately \$38 – 45 mil during the Plan years of 2024-2031.

The General Assembly will be held on June 17, with the conference starting at 9 a.m. and the business meeting at 11:00am. A quorum is needed for the business meeting. Registration is available at https://abag2022ga.eventbrite.com

The **2022 Bay Area Summer Academy** received 109 applicants, compared to around 50 last year. MTC, ABAG, the Air District, and BCDC will put on a paid remote learning experience to encourage youth, particularly those from underrepresented backgrounds, to learn about regional governments and consider a career in public service.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency, as defined under the California Emergency Services Act, due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the State of Emergency remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, beginning in March 2020, the Governor's Executive Order N-29-20 suspended Brown Act requirements related to teleconferencing during the COVID-19 pandemic provided that notice, accessibility, and other requirements were met, and the public was allowed to observe and address the legislative body at the meeting; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order N-08-21 extended the previous order until September 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG or Association) and its related entities and committees have conducted their meetings virtually, as authorized by the Executive Order, since March 17, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021, the Governor signed into law Assembly Bill 361, an urgency measure effective upon adoption, that provides flexibility to government bodies, allowing them to meet virtually without conforming to the Brown Act teleconferencing rules if: (i) the legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing; (ii) the legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; or (iii) the legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote, that, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the San Francisco Public Health Department continues to recommend and/or require measures to promote social distancing in combination with other safety precautions when activities occur in shared indoor spaces to mitigate the risk of COVID-19 transmission; and

WHEREAS, given the heightened risks of the predominant variant of COVID-19 in the community, holding meetings with all members of the legislative body, staff, and the public in attendance in person in a shared indoor meeting space would pose an unnecessary and immediate risk to the attendees.

Background:

Since 2013, the Bay Area Regional Energy Network (BayREN) has implemented a portfolio of energy efficiency programs across the region. The Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) serves as the program administrator and lead agency for a 10-member unincorporated association of local government entities.

On May 31, 2018, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) issued Decision 18-05-041¹ which, among other things, authorized funding for BayREN through 2025, allowed for modifications to the existing portfolio, and increased the portfolio's total and annualized budget.

ABAG has contracts with BayREN member agencies² and third-party consultants that were selected through a competitive process to assist in the implementation of the programs.

Since 2016, BluePoint Planning LLC has provided assistance with communications, branding, and overall strategy. Most recently, the organization assisted with the development of BayREN's 2025 Strategic Plan³, communications which promote decarbonization pathways within BayREN's residential programs, and information that emphasizes the public health co-benefits of energy efficiency. This request provides funding to develop targeted communications to various audiences regarding the release of BayREN's 2021 annual report, and to extend to the contract term with BluePoint an additional six months, from June to December 2022. Anticipated routine activities include collateral (newsletters, reports, and branding) development, serving as a liaison between BayREN's regional or programmatic leads and county representatives, and managing and/or staffing various events.

During late-2022, staff anticipate the hiring of a BayREN Communications Coordinator who will fulfill many of the same functions currently performed by BluePoint Planning.

Background:

Since 2013, the Bay Area Regional Energy Network (BayREN) has implemented a portfolio of energy efficiency programs across the region. The Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) serves as the program administrator and lead agency for a 10-member unincorporated association of local government entities.

On May 31, 2018, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) issued Decision 18-05-041¹ which, among other things, authorized funding for BayREN through 2025, allowed for modifications to the existing portfolio, and increased the portfolio's total and annualized budget.

ABAG has contracts with BayREN member agencies² and third-party consultants that were selected through a competitive process to assist in the implementation of the programs.

Since 2013, Frontier Energy, Inc. (Frontier) has provided BayREN with consulting services for the BayREN Codes & Standards program, and portfolio-wide technical assistance, consisting of overseeing regulatory reporting; evaluation, measurement, and verification, and assistance with strategy. Most recently, this work has included the joint development of statewide workpapers that standardize energy savings calculations for participants switching from natural gas to electricity, coordination and technical support for energy savings projections through 2031 for BayREN's residential and commercial programs, and participation in various statewide reporting subgroups. During 2020, several of BayREN's programs developed "Clean Heating" and "Electrification" pathways which encourage adoption of electric heat pumps, appliances, and heat pump water heaters as a means of decarbonizing existing buildings while improving indoor air quality and occupant comfort – Frontier was a significant contributor to these efforts.

This request provides funding to support technical and regulatory actions required for the issuance of BayREN's 2021 annual report, to subsequently develop refinements to reported metrics, and to provide for sufficient funding to extend the contract term with Frontier an additional six months, from June to December 2022.

Assembly Constitutional Amendment 14 (Wicks): Housing Opportunities for Everyone Act

Subject:

Assembly Constitutional Amendment (ACA) 14 would dedicate five percent each year from the state's General Fund over a ten-year period to address California's affordable housing and homelessness crisis.

Overview:

For ten years starting with the 2024–25 fiscal year (FY), ACA 14 would appropriate a sum equal to five percent of estimated General Fund revenues for that fiscal year to the California Business, Consumer Services, and Housing Agency (BCSH) to invest in solutions to address homelessness and to support affordable housing production. This amendment explicitly protects existing constitutional budget commitments including funding for schools and the state's Rainy Day Fund; the bill would provide that those existing General Fund commitments come "off the top" and the BCSH appropriation would equal five percent of the remaining estimated General Fund revenues. Based on the Governor's January budget proposal's estimated FY 2022 revenues of roughly \$200 billion less existing funding commitments, ACA 14 would provide approximately \$9 billion annually to combat the affordable housing and homelessness crises. Funds would be reserved for the following uses:

- 1. Housing and services to prevent and end homelessness;
- 2. Development, acquisition, rehabilitation, and preservation of rental housing affordable to extremely low, very low, and low-income households; and
- 3. Affordable home ownership opportunities for low- and moderate-income households.

With input from stakeholders, BCSH would be required to develop a 10-year investment strategy with specific performance measures and benchmarks to demonstrate how the funding will be used to reduced homelessness and expand affordable housing options. ACA 14 would also require BCSH submit an annual report to the Legislature on its progress in meeting the performance measures and benchmarks.

California is facing an affordable housing and homelessness crisis. As of January 2020, approximately 161,000 Californians were experiencing homelessness on any given day and 71 percent of homeless Californians—the highest rate in the nation—were unsheltered, meaning they were living in streets, parks, or other locations not meant for human habitation. According to the Bay Area Equity Atlas, one in four Bay Area residents is a renter and nearly half of those renters are rent-burdened, paying over 30 percent of their income toward housing costs. One small financial setback can push these individuals and families into homelessness. Recent data from the National Low Income Housing Association found the statewide housing shortage for extremely low-income renters exceeds one million homes. Meeting this demand will require substantial new investment and an ongoing financial commitment to doing so by the state, as proposed by ACA 14, would provide a significant contribution towards addressing this need. Although the state has in recent years significantly increased funding for affordable housing and homelessness assistance, the state does not have a multiyear funding strategy. ACA 14 would enable the state to develop and implement a long-term strategy of investments to move people off the streets and into housing and prevent future homelessness by creating more affordable housing. The author's office estimates that ACA 14 would house at least 50,000 people who are homeless and build an additional 40,000 affordable housing units each year.

For these reasons, staff recommends a "support" position on ACA 14.

Background

Staff have historically provided an array of technical assistance (TA) products and support to local jurisdictions across the topics of energy, housing, land use, resilience and transportation. Enhancing ABAG/MTC technical assistance offerings has the potential to augment local resources and enable Bay Area jurisdictions to address the region's goals. To that end, in 2019 staff conducted an assessment of ABAG/MTC TA offerings with the direction to 1) evaluate the suite of existing TA programs, 2) identify opportunities to adapt programs to best meet the needs of local jurisdictions, and 3) ensure continued alignment with Plan Bay Area 2050.

The assessment identified the following goals for ABAG/MTC TA programs:

- Build institutional capacity for jurisdictions and agencies
- Address local challenges that may inhibit jurisdictions from pursuing regional goals
- Achieve greater regional consistency in planning and implementation outcomes
- Foster alignment between local outcomes and the regional vision set forth in Plan Bay Area 2050

The assessment also identified two models through which ABAG/MTC TA is delivered:

- <u>Direct Assistance</u>: a focused intervention that provides specific services to an agency. Support is tailored to address a discrete goal and to fulfill specific tasks. Intended to bridge gaps in staffing and/or technical expertise, this model is typically delivered on a temporary basis. Examples include the Priority Development Area (PDA) Technical Assistance and Regional Housing Technical Assistance (RHTA) programs.
- 2. <u>Capacity Building</u>: strategies to enhance an agency's technical expertise and strengthen institutional knowledge. The goal is to equip agency leadership and staff with specific skillsets that allow them to address complex issues and/or improve processes. This model can help agencies launch new programs, strategies, or policies that are aligned with regional goals. An example includes the Bay Area Regional Energy Network's (BayREN) energy code compliance and enforcement training for local governments.

The assessment concluded with recommendations to maximize the effectiveness of TA programs. The recommendations were informed by the project's Technical Advisory Committee, as well as national best practices, surveys and interviews with local jurisdictions, ABAG/MTC staff, and other metropolitan planning organizations (MPO) with technical assistance programs. The recommendations included the following:

- Build on the strengths of existing TA offerings
- Create a more cohesive and well-coordinated TA delivery system
- Improve the ability of local jurisdictions to access MTC's TA offerings
- Consistently align existing TA offerings to better meet evolving regional goals and metrics, including those defined in Plan Bay Area

As a first step to implement the assessment recommendations, the TA Portal was developed to improve jurisdictions' access to the wide variety of ABAG/MTC TA program offerings.

Technical Assistance Portal

Historically, ABAG/MTC's many technical assistance programs have been scattered throughout the ABAG and MTC websites. The most repeated comment local agencies provided through the TA assessment survey is that the ABAG/MTC programs are hard to find. The Portal provides an opportunity to bring the TA programs together and provide more visibility so that local partners can more easily utilize the available resources.

The Portal launched in September 2021 and is located on the ABAG website - abag.ca.gov/technical-assistance. The TA programs found on the Portal reflect the diversity and range of ABAG/MTC offerings in the categories of energy, housing, land use, resilience and transportation and infrastructure.

A key Portal feature to highlight is a filter tool for easy searching by program name, topic area (e.g., housing elements, wildfires, transit) or type (e.g., data set, guide, presentation, training, webinar). While the primary audience for the Portal is local jurisdiction staff who work in the category areas, the Portal also serves as a resource for county transportation agencies (CTAs) and other regional agency staff.


Technical Assistance Goals



- Build institutional capacity for jurisdictions and agencies

Technical Assistance Definition

- Direct Assistance
- Provides specific services to an agency
- Addresses a discrete goal and fulfills specific tasks
- Bridges gaps in staffing and/or technical expertise, delivered on a temporary basis
- I.E.: Priority Development Area (PDA) Staffing Assistance and Regional Housing Technical Assistance (RHTA) programs
- Capacity Building
 - Enhances an agency's technical expertise and strengthens institutional knowledge to address complex issues and/or improve processes
- I.E.: Bay Area Regional Energy Network (BayREN) local government training and resources



Technical Assistance Assessment Findings



- ABAG/MTC offers many technical assistance programs that are valued by local jurisdictions
 - Provides needed additional assistance in compliance with state laws, particularly housing



- Information on programs scattered throughout the ABAG and MTC websites
 - Hard to find and access information

Update on BayREN programs and impacts and overview of new Business Plan (2024-2031) and approach to a just and equitable transition to electrification of buildings

Background:

Since 2013, the Bay Area Regional Energy Network has implemented a portfolio of energy efficiency programs across the region. BayREN's annual budget is approximately \$24 million, with much of that going to contractors, property owners and renters, as well as to local government staff that work on the programs. Staff will present on program outcomes to date. Additionally, as directed in California Public Utilities Commission Decision 21-05-031, BayREN filed a new Business Plan for programs and budget for 2024-2031. BayREN seeks to expand the existing portfolio and has requested \$325,052,365 for the Business Plan period.

BayREN has incorporated electrification throughout the portfolio and works to support the state goals of carbon neutrality. BayREN programs seek to overcome many of the existing barriers to electrification and help to support a just and equitable transition.







- ABAG POWER is committed to supporting the goals of the customers and communities we serve.
- Increasingly, municipal natural gas use is identified as a significant contributor to greenhouse gas emissions within member jurisdictions.
- In response, the program in 2021 adopted a Strategic Implementation Roadmap that encourages (among other things):
 - > a default product bundled with offsets
 - voluntary electrification incentives
 - > transparent and socially responsible supply
 - > SB 1383 assistance
