Executive Summary

This item has been placed on the agenda at the request of Chair Scott Haggerty.

According to the ABAG Bylaws, Article IX, F.:

The President, subject to the advice and consent of the Executive Board, shall appoint committees and determine the committees' structure, charge, size and membership. Committees may be established to consider any matter within the jurisdiction of the Association. Committees shall operate according to the policies adopted by the Executive Board, and shall submit their reports and recommendations to the Executive Board. Committees shall meet on the call of their chairpersons, who shall be (1) an elected official or the elective or appointive officer of the City and County of San Francisco appointed by the Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco to the Executive Board or General Assembly, and (2) a member of such committee; and who shall be elected by the members of each committee. 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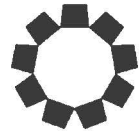

Subject: **Report on Governor Newsom's Housing Trailer Bill**

This item is presented as an information item to provide an update on Governor Newsom's proposed legislation to implement various components of his state budget proposal.

On Monday, March 11, Governor Newsom released a draft trailer bill language to the Fiscal Year 2020-21 budget that provides details related to his housing proposal. The proposal would allocate \$250 million towards housing planning which would be split evenly between regional agencies and local government. Of this amount, approximately \$46 million would be provided to the Bay Area, including \$23 million which would come directly to ABAG for housing-related planning activities such as technical assistance to local governments for improving permitting processes, infrastructure planning including water, sewer, etc., developing an affordable housing trust fund, etc. The other \$23 million would be distributed directly to cities and counties using a three-tier formula of \$150,000 for jurisdictions below 50,000; \$275,000 between 60,000 to 200,000 and \$750,000 to cities over 200,000.

In addition to the \$250 million in funding for planning, the trailer bill also includes details on the \$500 million in incentive funding which local governments may use for any purpose. Funds would be distributed in proportion to each region's share of affordable housing. Regional agencies, in our case, ABAG, would be in charge of determining the methodology for distributing the funds, consistent with a regional action plan, which the bill would establish as a new requirement.

The bill also requires the Department of Transportation (Caltrans), in consultation with the California State Transportation Agency and the Office of Planning and Research to propose by December 31, 2022, after convening a process for stakeholder input, opportunities to link transportation and other non-housing funding with statewide housing goals. After July 1, 2023, the bill allows SB 1 funding for local streets and roads to be withheld from any jurisdiction that does not have a compliant housing element and zoning and entitling consistent with its annual housing goals. As a budget trailer bill, this bill will not go through the normal policy committee process but will be negotiated by leadership and ultimately resolved through the budget process.

AB 10 Chiu	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Income taxes: credits low-income housing: farmworker housing. Would, under the law governing the taxation of insurers, the Personal Income Tax Law, and the Corporation Tax Law, for calendar years beginning in 2020, increase the aggregate housing credit dollar amount that may be allocated among low-income housing projects by an additional \$500,000,000, as specified, and would allocate to farmworker housing projects \$25,000,000 per year of that amount. The bill, under those laws, would modify the definition of applicable percentage relating to qualified low-income buildings to depend on whether the building is a new or existing building and federally subsidized, or a building that is, among other things, at least 15 years old, serving households of very low income or extremely low income, and will complete substantial rehabilitation, as specified.	
AB 11 Chiu	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Community Redevelopment Law of 2019. Current law dissolved redevelopment agencies as of February 1, 2012, and designates successor agencies to act as successor entities to the dissolved redevelopment agencies. This bill, the Community Redevelopment Law of 2019, would authorize a city or county, or two or more cities acting jointly, to propose the formation of an affordable housing and infrastructure agency by adoption of a resolution of intention that meets specified requirements, including that the resolution of intention include a passthrough provision and an override passthrough provision, as defined.	
AB 36 Bloom	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Print	Affordable housing: rental prices. Would state the findings and declarations of the Legislature that, among other things, affordable housing has reached a crisis stage that threatens the quality of life of millions of Californians as well as the state economic outlook. This bill also would express the Legislature's intent to enact legislation in order to stabilize rental prices and increase the availability of affordable rental housing.	
AB 38 Wood	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Governmental Organization	Fire safety. Would require, no later than July 1, 2020, the State Fire Marshall to develop, and the California Building Standards Commission to review, building standards for buildings in very high fire hazard severity zones. The bill would require, beginning on July 1, 2020, all newly constructed buildings and all transferred buildings in very high fire hazard severity zones to comply with the building standards. By requiring new building standards for buildings in very high fire hazard severity zones, this bill would expand the definition of a crime and impose a state-mandated local program.	

AB 40 Ting	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Transportation	Zero-emission vehicles: comprehensive strategy. Would, no later than January 1, 2021, require the State Air Resources Board to develop a comprehensive strategy to ensure that the sales of new motor vehicles and new light-duty trucks in the state have transitioned fully to zero-emission vehicles, as defined, by 2040, as specified.	
AB 53 Jones-Sawyer	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Rental housing discrimination: applications: criminal records. Would make it unlawful for the owner of any rental housing accommodation to deny the rental or lease of a housing accommodation without first satisfying specified requirements relating to the application process. The bill would prohibit the owner of a rental housing accommodation from inquiring about, or requiring an applicant for rental housing accommodation to disclose, a criminal record during the initial application assessment phase, as defined, unless otherwise required by state or federal law.	
AB 65 Petrie-Norris	Amended 3/18/2019	Assembly Natural Resources	Coastal protection: climate adaption: project prioritization. Would require specified things of the State Coastal Conservancy when it allocates any funding appropriated pursuant to the The California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018, including that it prioritize projects that use natural infrastructure, as defined, to help adapt to climate change. The bill would require the conservancy to provide information to the Office of Planning and Research on any projects funded pursuant to the above provision to be considered for inclusion into the clearinghouse for climate adaption information. The bill would authorize the conservancy to provide technical assistance to coastal communities to better assist them with their projects that use natural infrastructure.	
AB 68 Ting	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Land use: accessory dwelling units. The Planning and Zoning Law authorizes a local agency to provide, by ordinance, for the creation of accessory dwelling units in single-family and multifamily residential zones and sets forth required ordinance standards, including, among others, maximum unit size, parking, and height standards. This bill would prohibit an ordinance from imposing requirements on minimum lot size, lot coverage, or floor area ratio, and would prohibit an ordinance from establishing size requirements for accessory dwelling units that do not permit at least an 800 square foot unit of at least 16 feet in height to be constructed.	
AB 69 Ting	Introduced 12/3/2018	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Land use: accessory dwelling units. Would authorize the Department of Housing and Community Development to submit written findings to a local agency as to whether the local ordinance complies with state law, and to notify the Attorney General if the ordinance violates state law. The bill would require a local agency to consider the department's findings and would authorize the local agency to amend its ordinance to comply with state law or adopt a resolution with findings explaining why the ordinance complies with state law, and addressing the department's findings.	

AB 139 Quirk-Silva	Introduced 12/11/2018	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Emergency and Transitional Housing Act of 2019. The The Planning and Zoning Law requires, after the legislative body of the city or county has adopted all or part of a general plan, the planning agency to investigate and make recommendations to the legislative body of the city or county regarding reasonable and practical means to implement the general plan or element and to provide by April 1 of each year an annual report to the legislative body, the Office of Planning and Research, and the Department of Housing and Community Development that includes specified information pertaining to the implementation of the general plan, including, among other things, a listing of sites rezoned to accommodate that portion of the city's or county's share of the regional housing need for each income level that could not be accommodated on specified sites. This bill would additionally require the report to include the number of emergency shelter beds currently available within the jurisdiction and the number of shelter beds that the jurisdiction has contracted for that are located within another jurisdiction, as specified.	
AB 143 Quirk-Silva	Amended 3/11/2019	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Shelter crisis: homeless shelters: County of Orange. Current law, upon a declaration of a shelter crisis by the City of Berkeley, Emeryville, Los Angeles, Oakland, or San Diego, the County of Santa Clara, or the City and County of San Francisco, specifies additional provisions applicable to a shelter crisis declared by one of those jurisdictions. Among other things, current law exempts from the California Environmental Quality Act specified actions by a state agency or a city, county, or city and county relating to land owned by a local government to be used for, or to provide financial assistance to, a homeless shelter constructed pursuant to these provisions. Current law requires a city, county, or city and county that declares a shelter crisis pursuant to these provisions to develop a plan to address the shelter crisis on or before July 1, 2019, and to annually report to specified committees of the Legislature on or before January 1, 2019, and annually thereafter until January 1, 2021. Current law repeals these additional provisions as of January 1, 2021. This bill would apply these additional provisions to a shelter crisis declared by the County of Orange, any city located within the County of Orange, and the City of San Jose and extend the repeal date of these provisions to January 1, 2023.	
AB 146 Quirk-Silva	Introduced 12/14/2018	Assembly Local Government	State highways: property leases: County of Orange. Would authorize the Department of Transportation to lease airspace under a freeway, or real property acquired for highway purposes, in the County of Orange, that is not excess property, to a city located in the County of Orange, the County of Orange, a political subdivision of the state whose jurisdiction is located in the County of Orange, or another state agency for purposes of an emergency shelter or feeding program, subject to certain conditions. The bill would specifically authorize the Orange County Housing Finance Trust to enter into these leases.	
AB 148 Quirk-Silva	Introduced 12/14/2018	Assembly Transportation	Regional transportation plans: sustainable communities strategies. Current law requires certain transportation planning agencies to prepare and adopt a regional transportation plan directed at achieving a coordinated and balanced regional transportation system. Current law requires the regional transportation plan to include, if the transportation planning agency is also a metropolitan planning organization, a sustainable communities strategy. This bill would require each sustainable communities strategy to identify areas within the region sufficient to house an 8-year projection of the emergency shelter needs for the region, as specified.	

AB 158 Voepel	Amended 2/26/2019	Assembly Appropriations	Roadside rest areas: commercial vehicles: parking. Would require the Department of Transportation, in consultation with the Department of the California Highway Patrol, to conduct a study evaluating the capacity of the state to provide adequate parking and rest facilities for commercial vehicles engaged in transportation. The bill would require the study to assess the volume of commercial motor vehicle traffic in the state and to develop a system of metrics to measure the adequacy of commercial motor vehicle parking facilities in the state.	
AB 168 Aguiar-Curry	Introduced 1/8/2019	Assembly Housing and Community Development	Housing: streamlined approvals. Current law, until January 1, 2026, authorizes a development proponent to submit an application for a multifamily housing development that is subject to a streamlined, ministerial approval process, as provided, and not subject to a conditional use permit, if the development satisfies specified objective planning standards. Under current law the objective planning standards include, among others, a requirement that the development not be located on specified sites. This bill would require the objective planning standards include a requirement that the development not be located on a site that is a tribal cultural resource.	
AB 176 Cervantes	Amended 2/25/2019	Assembly Natural Resources	California Alternative Energy and Advanced Transportation Financing Authority: sales and use taxes: exclusions.
