Subject:	Plan Bay Area 2050 and the Regional Housing Need Allocation (RHNA): Update
Summary:	This memo provides a high-level overview of the Plan Bay Area 2050 process and the Regional Housing Need Allocation (RHNA) process, both of which are getting underway this fall. While Plan Bay Area 2050 and RHNA are meant to inform each other, it is important to understand that they are distinct processes with differing state and/or federal requirements. Plan Bay Area 2050 is the region's next-generation long-range plan, tackling transportation, housing, the economy, and the environment, while at the same time integrating cross-cutting issues of equity and resilience. RHNA is the state-mandated process to identify the number of housing units (by affordability level) that each jurisdiction must accommodate in the Housing Element of its General Plan. Plan Bay Area 2050 and RHNA must both be finalized and approved by summer 2021.
Issues:	<u>Plan Bay Area 2050</u> . Building upon the predecessor Horizon initiative, Plan Bay Area 2050 will serve as the next-generation long-range plan for the San Francisco Bay Area. Under federal and state planning regulations, Plan Bay Area 2050 must meet or exceed key requirements related to climate change, housing, and fiscal constraint, among others. The first phase of the Plan Bay Area 2050 effort – which takes place this fall – will integrate the most resilient and equitable strategies from Horizon as MTC/ABAG works to build the Draft Blueprint. The Blueprint will detail strategies (e.g., public policies and investments) that could be considered by local, regional, and state agencies to address the significant challenges the Bay Area faces, both today and in the future. Additional information on Plan Bay Area 2050 can be found in <b>Attachment A</b> , as well as on the project website (planbayarea.org).
	<u>RHNA</u> . Focused specifically on needs through year 2030 for housing at all income levels, the RHNA process will advance in parallel with Plan Bay Area 2050. ABAG leads the RHNA allocation process – developing a methodology to identify the share of housing units by income level for each jurisdiction – but importantly the total level of housing need for the Bay Area will be identified by the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) in early 2020. The methodology for housing allocations will be developed in collaboration with the Housing

Methodology Committee (HMC) starting in October. Additional information on RHNA can be found in **Attachment A**.

<u>Process Going Forward</u>. Over the coming months, there will be a significant number of committee items, both for Plan Bay Area 2050 and for RHNA. As such, staff intend to focus the joint MTC Planning and ABAG Administrative Committees on Plan-related items, given that the Plan is a shared work product of both agencies. The ABAG Regional Planning Committee would then focus primarily on RHNA-related items, given that RHNA is a significant and important effort and a work product solely of ABAG. The Regional Planning Committee will also receive updates on Plan Bay Area 2050 focused on housing issues and the forecasted development pattern, given the nexus of that work with RHNA. Items requiring board action for both planning efforts would ultimately be forwarded to the ABAG Executive Board for final approval.



# What is Plan Bay Area?

- The regional plan is a blueprint for growth and infrastructure for the next 30 years.
- The regional plan is **updated every four years**, with this major update due in 2021.
- The regional plan is a reflection of the shared priorities of the diverse nine-county San Francisco Bay Area.
- The regional plan is **fiscally-constrained**, even as it aspires to tackle the Bay Area's big challenges with specific strategies.
- The regional plan is <u>not</u> an expenditure plan; it is focused on setting priorities and over the long term and looking holistically across "silos".





Similar to *Horizon*, *Plan Bay Area 2050* will address four core topic areas, as we work to create a longrange integrated regional vision for the next 30 years.

**Resilience.** The package of strategies from *Plan Bay Area 2040* generally struggled to be sufficiently resilient to technological, economic, political, and environmental uncertainties in the region's future.


**Equity.** Strategies included in past versions of *Plan Bay Area* have fallen short of key equity goals, such as addressing regional affordability. Bolder strategies may be required to effectively address this challenge.



Strategies necessary to address challenges across these topic areas will ultimately require partnership with local, regional, and state governments - as well as the non-profit and private sectors.



# What is RHNA?

- State law requires that all jurisdictions must plan to meet the housing needs of everyone in the community.
- **State's role:** identify total number of units, across all income groups, for which the region must plan
- **ABAG's role:** allocate a share of housing need, by income, to each jurisdiction
- Jurisdiction's role: update Housing Element of General Plan and zoning to show how it plans to accommodate its share of the regional need

# What are the statutory objectives of RHNA?


**Increase housing supply and mix** of housing types, tenure, and affordability in all cities and counties in an equitable manner

**Promote infill development and socioeconomic equity**, protect environmental and agricultural resources, encourage efficient development patterns, and achieve GHG reduction targets

**Promote improved intraregional jobs-housing relationship**, including balance between low-wage jobs and affordable housing

Balance disproportionate household income distributions (more high-income RHNA to lower-income areas and vice-versa)

Affirmatively further fair housing



summary of preliminary findings from the Futures Round 2 analysis. These findings are high-level, focusing on the "top 10" key takeaways from our work so far; the report will delve into the specifics in greater detail, serving as an initial staff recommendation for the Draft Blueprint phase of Plan Bay Area 2050.
As detailed in Attachment A, our work to date has generated ten high-level findings based on the strategies studied in Futures Round 2:
1. New growth areas enable more growth near transit and near

- New growth areas enable more growth near transit and near opportunity.
- A mix of strategies to retain and expand affordable housing made progress in addressing the current affordable housing gap.
- 3. New active transportation strategies proved the most effective in shifting modes.
- 4. Transit overcrowding was generally alleviated, with new BRT lines as well as a new Transbay Rail Crossing playing a key role. (based on preliminary data analysis)
- 5. Road pricing reduced roadway congestion, but equity concerns need to be addressed before advancing this strategy further. (based on preliminary data analysis)
- 6. Economic development strategies evaluated were insufficient to slow the decline of the middle class.
- 7. Adaptation and retrofit strategies boosted our region's resilience.
- 8. Urban growth boundaries led to minimal greenfield development in both Round 1 and Round 2.
- 9. A VMT-based fee on office development was effective in focusing office growth, but not in shifting jobs to the East and North Bay.
- 10. A large tax package focused on higher-income individuals and businesses did not have significant adverse impacts on the economy.

In addition to high-level findings, the final report will provide a breakdown of findings for each individual strategy, focusing on its resilience to a range of uncertain future conditions as well as its implications for social equity.

### Horizon—Futures Round 2: Preliminary Findings from Round 2 Analysis

and board members as key Plan Bay Area 2050 decisions must be made over the coming months. Through the Blueprint planning process, the subset of Horizon strategies that proved resilient and equitable under a wide range of future conditions can be refined, improved on, and when needed, supplemented.

Starting this month, staff will hold "pop-up" workshops across the region, highlighting the most effective strategies from the Futures Final Report; this will allow us to better understand which strategies resonate with the public. Staff will also host Plan Bay Area 2050 Blueprint half-day stakeholder workshops focused on the four topical areas of the plan: Transportation, Housing, the Environment, and the Economy. Feedback at these events will inform refinements to the strategies to study in the Blueprint phase. Dates for all these upcoming events will be posted to planbayarea.org on a rolling basis throughout the fall.

- Findings will be described in the Fall 2019 Futures Final Report.






# **Refresher:** Five Challenges from Round 1 Analysis

In the Futures Interim Report (March 2019), a set of key challenges were identified. The challenges focused on how Plan Bay Area 2040 strategies might fare under previously-unstudied external forces like sea level rise, autonomous vehicles, and federal policy shifts.



# Without new strategies in place, Bay Area housing affordability continued to get worse.






Public transit, walking, and bicycling saw limited gains in mode share compared to 2015 conditions.



In 2015, 77% of commuters use an automobile to get to work.


### DIVERSE

A significant share of lower-income households remained at risk of displacement in each Future.






Unmitigated impacts from sea level rise and natural disasters resulted in significant damage across the region.

# New growth areas enable more growth near transit and near opportunity.

#### Allow Diverse Housing Around Transit



Strategies

(Horizon<sub>s</sub>)


Allow more diverse housing growth around areas with high frequency transit. Expand the growth footprint beyond the current list of PDAs.

#### Allow Diverse Housing in High Resource Areas



Strategies (PBA 2040) Allow more diverse housing growth in areas of high opportunity that also have moderate transit service. Expand the growth footprint beyond the current list of PDAs.

#### Location of households added between 2015-2050 relative to growth geography



A mix of strategies to retain and expand affordable housing made progress in addressing the current affordable housing gap.



#### **Pass Inclusionary Zoning Policies**



All Bay Area jurisdictions pass a 10% to 20% inclusionary zoning policy, expanding off the Plan Bay Area 2040 inclusionary strategy.



Raise \$1.5 billion in new annual revenue to complement existing federal, state, and local affordable housing funds.

#### Implement Vision Zero Speed Reductions



Reduce speed limits to 25 mph on local roads within 3 miles of transit, in addition to reducing speeds on highways.




Complete regional bicycle trails and fund thousands of miles of dedicated micromobility networks like class IV and II bike lanes.

#### Invest in Free Short-Trip Service



Fund shared personal mobility, including scooters and electric bikes, within 3 miles of transit.

Active (walk & bike) mode share in 2015, and Futures round 1 and round 2 analysis



Build a Micromobility Network

The mode share is reflective of <u>commute</u> mode, The ratio is higher when accounting for <u>all</u> trips.

Additional transportation findings are still being finalized.

Transit overcrowding was generally alleviated, with new BRT lines as well as a new Transbay Rail Crossing playing a key role.

Road pricing reduced roadway congestion, but equity concerns need to be addressed before advancing this strategy further.

Data associated with two findings above are still being finalized; this will be presented in greater detail at the joint ABAG Administrative and MTC Planning Committee meeting.




Leverages existing and new revenues to fund a hybrid set of grey and green infrastructure systems to adapt the region.

#### **Retrofit Older Existing Buildings**



Provides 50% subsidies for older buildings built before current codes to support common earthquake, wildfire, energy, and water retrofit strategies.

#### Urban growth boundaries led to minimal greenfield development in both Round 1 and Round 2.


#### Maintain Urban Growth Boundaries

#### Apply a VMT-Based Fee on Office Development




#### **Raise New Revenues**




