#### Contract – Sacramento Legislative Representative: Carter, Wetch & Associates (\$618,243)

Subject: A request for approval of a contract for state legislative advocacy services with Carter, Wetch & Associates for four years at a cost not to exceed \$618,243 with an option to extend for another four years. **Background:** MTC has been represented in Sacramento by Carter, Wetch & Associates since January 2006. The most recent contract, initiated in November 2013 and extended three times, was a competitive procurement and expired on November 17, 2019. On November 1, MTC issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for state legislative advocacy services for an initial four-year contract with an option to extend for another four years. MTC budgeted for state advocacy services at a rate of \$150,000 for FY 2019-20; subsequent years include a 2 percent cost of living adjustment. The RFQ was distributed through MTC's online procurement system. Recipients included more than 270 known lobbying firms in Sacramento and nearly 150 public agency partners who work on legislative issues in order to ensure wide distribution to potential proposers. Though there appeared to be initial interest from a number of candidates—363 firms opened the consultant contact email and 16 downloaded the RFQ—we ultimately only received one Statement of Qualification (SOQ) from Carter, Wetch & Associates, with Mercury Public Affairs as a subcontractor (the Carter, Wetch & Associates team). This SOQ was reviewed by an evaluation panel of MTC staff based on the following factors: 1. Firm and team qualifications (50%) 2. Demonstrated knowledge of transportation policy and funding issues (20%)3. Potential conflicts of interest representing MTC and other clients (20%) 4. Annual rates and cost to MTC (10%) Based on the evaluation panel review, staff is confident that the Carter, Wetch & Associates team will provide the agency with top notch access to legislators and staff in the State Assembly and Senate as well as the Newsom Administration. With respect to the first criterion—firm and team qualifications—the evaluation panel members gave the proposer very high rankings. The five proposed team members-Scott Wetch, Mike Monagan, and Allison Ramsey with Carter, Wetch & Associates and Dustin McFetridge and Paul Bauer with Mercury Public

Affairs—collectively bring 128 years of experience to bear on behalf of MTC. Under MTC's current contract, Carter, Wetch & Associates along with Duncan McFetridge from Mercury Public Affairs has repeatedly demonstrated their ability to oppose adverse legislation as well as the ability to shepherd legislation sponsored or supported by MTC to the finish line. Key items of legislation

enacted since 2014 (the first year of the firm's most recent contract) include AB 516 (Mullin, 2016), establishing the new temporary license plate program; SB 1128 (Glazer, 2016), removing the sunset date on the Bay Area Commuter Benefit program; SB 595 (Beall, 2017), authorizing Regional Measure 3; and SB 1 (Beall, 2017), which raised significant new dedicated state funding for transportation. The Carter, Wetch & Associates team also helped secure passage of numerous MTC-supported housing bills in 2019.

The Carter Wetch & Associates team has experience in the specifics of transportation policy and funding and demonstrates an impressive track record with respect to political strategy as well as strong relationships in Sacramento among legislators and the Administration. The panel believes the firm is well positioned to continue to effectively implement MTC's legislative priorities.

Another major consideration of the panel was with respect to the conflict of interest criterion. The proposer has no other transportation-only clients, though Carter, Wetch & Associates do represent the Mayor's Office of the City & County of San Francisco.

With respect to the cost criteria, the team proposed funding at the level budgeted by MTC and indicated in the RFQ. Staff will negotiate with the firm on a final amount not to exceed \$618,241 over four years.

**Recommendation:** Staff recommends that the Committee authorize the Executive Director or designee to negotiate and enter into a contract with Carter, Wetch & Associates not to exceed \$618,241 for state legislative advocacy services, assuming the MTC Administration Committee approved this contract at its December 11, 2019 meeting, and subject to the agency's operating budget approval process, with an option to extend for another four years, subject to the parties' agreement on renewal terms.

#### **Another Short-Term Continuing Resolution (CR)**

As reported in October 2019, Congress and the Trump Administration avoided another government shutdown and agreed to another short-term CR through December 20, 2019.

This is the second CR for Fiscal Year 2019 which ended September 30, 2019.

#### **Highway Recession Repealed**

The CR also repealed the pending rescission of \$7.6 billion in the Federal-Aid Highway Program contract authority which would have taken effect next July 1, 2020.

### Coalition to Support Increased Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STP) Funding Launched

I attended a Surface Transportation Block Grant (STP) funding coalition meeting, which was hosted by the United States Conference of Mayors, National Association of Counties, and National Association of Regional Councils. Over 20 Washington local government representatives attended. The purpose of the coalition is to gauge support and consensus to advocate for increased STP formula funding shares to metropolitan areas in the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee's surface transportation authorization proposal. The next meeting is in early December at the County's offices.

#### Metro Gross Domestic Product (GDP) Report Released

The Mayor's released their "Metro Areas: Engines of the Nation's Economy" report in November 2019. U.S. metro account for 85.9% of the U.S. population, 88.1% of the nation employment, 89.3% of personal income, 91.8% of wage income and 91.1% of overall GDP.

The Bay Area's combined metro's regarding San Francisco-Oakland, San Jose, and Santa Rosa would put our region ahead of Chicago as the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest metro economy.

#### **Fuel Standards Split Auto Industry**

On October 29, 2019, I attended a House Oversight Committee hearing on the Trump Administration's ongoing effort to roll back Obama-era fuel economy standards and the ensuing fight with California over a voluntary deal with select auto manufacturers to achieve fuel efficiency targets. General Motors, Toyota, and Fiat Chrysler Automobiles have sided with the Administration. This is part of the larger Trump Administration SAFE Vehicles Rulemaking which would also revoke California's authority to set its own rules under the Clean Air Act, effective November 26, 2019.
