Subject: Contract Amendment – I-880 ICM North Segment Construction

Management Services: MNS Engineers, Inc. (\$456,000).

**Background:** The I-880 ICM North Segment Project is a collaborative effort led by MTC,

with California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) District 4, City of Oakland, City of San Leandro, and Alameda-Contra Costa Transit District (AC Transit). The project aims to minimize the burden on local streets of incidents occurring along I-880 by installing Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) equipment on key arterial streets to redirect motorists safely and efficiently back onto I-880. Stakeholders identified this project for initial deployment as part of an overall ICM approach to improve mobility,

accessibility, and safety along the I-880 corridor.

The project is currently under construction, which includes installation and integration of ITS infrastructure on arterial streets (e.g., closed circuit television cameras, electronic message signs) and traffic signal intersection upgrades such as curb ramps, detectors, signal coordination, and communications. The MTC Operations Committee approved the I-880 ICM North Segment Civil Construction Contract for installation of ITS infrastructure in December 2018 and the I-880 ICM North Segment System Integrator Contract in September 2019.

In November 2017, following a competitive Request for Qualifications (RFQ) process, this committee approved a contract with S&C Engineers, Inc. (now MNS Engineers, Inc.), in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 to provide overall project and construction management, oversee and facilitate the timely and efficient completion of work by both the civil construction contractor and system integrator, and proactively lead stakeholder coordination. Following committee approval, staff entered into cost negotiations with the top ranked consultant, S&C Engineers, Inc., who proposed a budget of \$2,023,000. After negotiations, a contract was executed for \$1,698,639 using \$198,639 of executive director authority. MTC staff determined the new total to be fair and reasonable based on careful review of the rates, fee, and scope of work for the project. The new total was also found to be appropriate due to the complex nature of the project, which would require additional project management and coordination. The original period of performance for the contract was through June 30, 2020; the period of performance has since been extended through June 30, 2021 to align with construction and system integration schedules.

This amendment would add up to \$456,000 for continued construction management support during the remainder of the construction and system integration phases. Support provided by MNS Engineers, Inc. to date has been completed within budget; additional funds are needed because completion dates for both construction and system integration work have been extended. Continued support is critical for the timely and efficient completion of the I-880 ICM construction and system integration work. Currently, completion of construction is expected in December 2020 and completion of system integration is expected by mid to late 2021.

Attachment A includes a summary of MNS Engineers, Inc.'s and its project team's small business and disadvantaged business enterprise status.

Contract Amendment – IDEA Program: Automated Traffic Signal Performance Measures Evaluation Project – DKS Associates (\$235,000).

**Background:** 

In 2017, MTC launched the "IDEA" program to support cities, counties, and transit agencies to deploy advanced technologies along their arterials to enhance mobility, sustainability, and safety across all modes. Projects that qualify under the IDEA Program fall into two categories: Category 1 projects deploy mature, commercially-available technologies; and Category 2 projects deploy new, higher-risk connected and automated vehicle technologies.

In February 2018, MTC awarded a total of ten Category 1 projects and six Category 2 projects. Of the ten Category 1 projects, six include the deployment of Automated Traffic Signal Performance Measures (ATSPMs) – a "fitness tracker" for traffic signal systems that uses real-time big data to monitor system performance. The ATSPMs enable agencies to proactively make performance-based operations and maintenance decisions to increase safety or enhance operations.

The proposed ATSPM Evaluation Project seeks to evaluate ATSPM systems deployed through MTC's IDEA Program to assess their effectiveness in meeting the agency's goals/objectives and to justify MTC's investments. The City of San Jose, having the most extensive ATSPM system being deployed, will be the focus of a detailed evaluation. It is anticipated that a higher-level evaluation will be conducted for the other five ATSPM systems being deployed in the Cities of Hayward, Pleasanton, San Ramon, San Rafael, and South San Francisco.

In June 2016, the Operations Committee approved a competitively-procured, pre-qualified panel of consultants to provide on-call transportation engineering and planning services under the various service categories through June 30, 2019, subsequently extended through June 30, 2021.

On April 13, 2020, MTC issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) and invited all pre-qualified consultants under Service Category E: Arterial Operations to submit proposals for the Project Evaluation for the City of San Jose ATSPM Implementation Under IDEA Grant Program. The one proposal MTC received in response to the RFP was from DKS Associates, Inc.

A panel consisting of staff from MTC performed a review and evaluation of the proposals based on the qualifications and experiences of the team, the firm's approach to completing the project, cost, cost-effectiveness, and written communication. After consideration and evaluation, MTC staff recommends the award of the project to DKS Associates. DKS Associates and its subconsultants have demonstrated extensive experience in similar types of projects and knowledge of the evaluation of ATSPM systems. MTC and DKS Associates have an existing Professional Services Agreement via the 2016 On-Call Transportation Engineering and Planning Services Bench.

The scope of work to be completed under this contract amendment includes the development and execution of a plan to evaluate the benefits and costs of deploying, operating, and maintaining ATSPM systems. The evaluation will include a quantitative benefit/cost calculation and a narrative storytelling component. The level of effort required for this project is consistent with staff expectations for a project of this nature.

**Background:** 

MTC requires construction management and construction administration services to manage the construction contracts for the Bay Bridge Forward Commuter Parking Initiative. This project includes the construction of new commuter parking lots using Caltrans airspaces underneath freeways at Interstate-80/Buchanan Street in the City of Albany, and Interstate-880/Fruitvale Avenue and Interstate-880/High Street in the City of Oakland. These lots will provide opportunities for commuters to share a ride in a carpool, in a vanpool or on a bus.

The MTC Operations Committee approved the Commuter Parking Initiative construction contract in October 2018. The construction is nearing completion. All three lots now have new pavement, striping, lighting, perimeter fencing and gates, bus stops, passenger loading zones, pedestrian access, and carpool spaces. Through separate MTC contracts, each lot will be equipped with parking management technologies (i.e., vehicle sensors) and commuter amenities (i.e., bicycle lockers and electric vehicle charging stations). These amenities will be in place within a month prior to the opening of the commuter lots. However, challenges related to coordinating with PG&E have significantly delayed the construction schedule, particularly with the Buchanan lot. Despite ongoing coordination with PG&E, electrical services for the Buchanan lot remains outstanding. Staff is trouble-shooting this issue until we get resolution.

In February 2018, this Committee awarded a \$700,000 contract to WSP to provide construction management support to oversee and facilitate the timely and efficient completion of work by the construction contractor. WSP was selected from a 2017 prequalified list of consultants to provide on-call construction management and design services for BATA, MTC, and MTC SAFE projects.

The original contract with WSP has since been amended through approvals by this Committee and by Executive Director Authority. The proposed amendment would add \$130,000 to the contract to allow WSP to continue its construction management support during the remainder of the construction and provide oversight and inspection services for the installation of the vehicle sensors, bicycle lockers, and electric vehicle charging stations.

Attachment A includes a summary of WSP's and its project team's small business enterprise and disadvantaged business enterprise status.

**Background:** 

In March 2019, the Commission approved \$2,000,000 in funding to launch MTC SHIFT to help employers reduce single-occupancy vehicle (SOV) rates and encourage shared-use transportation modes. Through MTC SHIFT, MTC will partner directly with large employers to equip them with a commute management tool to manage their employees' commutes. A goal of the program is to understand whether equipping employers with a data-driven tool to administer commute benefits and manage parking will change SOV rates over the 36-month duration of the program. Additionally, this program will support the planned "ring around the Bay" occupancy policy change that will require three or more occupants in a vehicle in several express lane corridors such as Interstate-880, State Route 237, and San Mateo US 101.

In June 2019, MTC issued a Request for Qualifications for vendors that can offer commute management software to employers participating in the program. Minimum qualifications included software that provides integration with payroll platforms, parking systems, and third-party mobility providers; administration of parking management strategies; and data on SOV rates and other modes. Three proposers, Luum, RideAmigos, and RideShark, submitted statements of qualification, and an evaluation panel comprised of MTC, Bay Area Air Quality Management District, and Bay Area Council staff found all three proposers to meet the minimum qualifications. In October 2019, this committee approved the panel recommendation that all three vendors be pre-qualified to be available to employer participants of MTC SHIFT.

In February 2020, MTC issued a Request for Employer Partnerships (RFEP) to seek employers interested in implementing a commute management platform to administer commute benefits (including incentives) and assess data to track SOV rates. Evaluation criteria included a compelling use case, goals and commitment to reduce SOV rates, and program administrator information. Employers were required to request proposals from all three vendors to understand features and pricing and to identify in their application which platform they thought was the best fit for their organization. Six employers submitted letters of commitment, and an evaluation panel consisting of MTC and San Mateo County Transit District staff determined that all six should be recommended for funding. A table showing the employer, rank, selected platform, and amount of funding to be provided by MTC is shown below. Stanford Health Care and Lucile Salter Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford (LPCH) are separate but affiliated entities with co-located main campuses in Palo Alto that submitted one application for separate funding amounts as allowed by the RFEP.

MTC will fund 75% of the total setup, subscription, and user fees for 36 months for up to 3,000 users. Employers will contract directly with the vendor and fund the remaining 25% of costs as well as any additional costs if there are more than 3,000 users. Funding amounts differ based on platform, selected features, and number of users. Employers will be required to submit data on drive-alone and other commute rates by mode, with which MTC will evaluate and develop reports on the benefits and impact of using these platforms on reducing SOV rates.

MTC SHIFT supports the Bay Area Commuter Benefits Program, Senate Bill 1339 signed into law September 30, 2012, that was unanimously approved by the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) and MTC. A new rule (Regulation 14, Rule 1), developed by Air District staff in cooperation with MTC, was approved by the governing board of Air District on March 19, 2014 and fully approved by the MTC governing board on March 27, 2014. The intent of this legislation is to encourage employees to use some form of public transportation for commuting instead of driving alone. All six employers are registered with the Bay Area Commuter Benefits Program. Furthermore, MTC SHIFT is designed to support critical sequential elements of our on-going work to support HOV 3+ occupancy policy changes for I-880 and other express lane corridors. Notably, MTC SHIFT is not dependent on any subsequent phases in FY 20-21.


