FIRST I WANT TO TURN THE FIRST PART, MY REPORT, 14 15 INFORMATION, OVER TO ALLISON BROOKS WHO IS GOING TO GIVE US AN 16 UPDATE ON AN EVENT WHICH SHE JUST ATTENDED WHICH IS VERY CLOSE TO OUR HEARTS, AND SO CONNECTED WITH THE WORK WE'RE ALL TRYING 17 TO DO. ALLISON MAY I TURN IT OVER TO YOU. 18 19 ALLISON BROOKS: THANKS CHAIR WORTH. I THOUGHT I WOULD SHARE A 20 RECENT TRIP I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO GO ON. FIRST WAS IN 21 BALTIMORE AT THE NATIONAL ADAPTATION FORUM, AND THEN I WAS 22 INVITED TO ATTEND AN EVENT WITH THE 10th ANNIVERSARY OF SUPER 23 STORM SANDY IN NEW YORK CITY. AND PARTLY WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO 24

DO THIS -- I HAVE BEEN MAINTAINING RELATIONSHIPS WITH THE



- 1 FOLKS IN NEW YORK AND THE NEW YORK REGION FROM REBUILD BY
- 2 DESIGN. YOU MAY REMEMBER WE HOSTED A YEAR-LONG SIMILAR EVENT
- 3 HERE CALLED RESILIENT BY DESIGN, THE BAY AREA CHALLENGE, WHICH
- 4 BROUGHT DESIGNERS, LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS, AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS
- 5 TO CRAFT CONCEPTS FOR MAKING OUR COMMUNITIES MORE RESILIENT.
- 6 THIS WAS THE TEN YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF SUPERVISOR STORM SANDY
- 7 AND AN ORGANIZATION CALLED THE WATER ALLIANCE TOOK US ON TOUR
- 8 OF THE MOST HEAVILY HIT LOCATIONS AROUND NEW YORK HARBOR,
- 9 INCLUDING HOBOKEN, RED HOOK, THE LOWER EAST SIDE, BATTERY PARK
- 10 CITY, THE SEA PORT, STATEN ISLAND. AND I THOUGHT I WOULD
- 11 SHARE, IT'S TEN YEARS LATER, AT THE TIME, HUD, THE U.S.
- 12 DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT HAD DEDICATED A
- 13 BILLION DOLLARS TO THESE COMMUNITIES WHO ARE HEAVILY HIT FROM
- 14 THE STORM TO INVEST IN RISK MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES, AND,
- 15 REALLY, AT TEN YEARS LATER, SOME OF THEM ARE JUST GETTING
- 16 STARTED. AND I THINK IT WAS JUST A KIND OF TELLING FOR ME
- 17 HEARING THE STORIES FROM PEOPLE WHO WERE THERE AT THE TIME OF
- 18 THE FLOODING IN SOME OF THE MOST HEAVILY HIT AREAS, AND
- 19 BASICALLY SAYING IF THEY WERE HIT BY THE SAME STORM TODAY,
- 20 THEY ARE NO MORE PREPARED NOW THAN THEY WERE TEN YEARS AGO.
- 21 SOME OF THE THINGS THEY HAVE DONE, YOU KNOW, THE SUBWAY HAS
- 22 BEEN HARDENED, AND THEY HAVE RAISED IN CERTAIN AREAS, IN
- 23 BUILDINGS, THEY HAVE RAISED THE ELECTRICAL UP A COUPLE OF
- 24 FLOORS FOR THE FLOODING, BUT A LOT OF THE BIG PROJECTS, A LOT
- 25 OF THE KIND OF INVESTMENTS THAT THEY NEED TO START MAKING ARE,



- 1 YOU KNOW, REALLY HAVE BEEN HELD UP THROUGH A LOT OF PROCESS IN
- 2 TERMS OF DECIDING. AND I THINK THIS IS REALLY INTERESTING,
- 3 JUST DECIDING THE KINDS OF INTERVENTIONS EVERYBODY CAN AGREE
- 4 ON IN THESE LOCATIONS. HO BOKEN, FOR EXAMPLE, ONE OF THE IDEAS
- 5 THEY PUT FORWARD WAS TO BUILD A SEA WALL BUT A LOT OF PEOPLE
- 6 IN HOBOKEN LIVING NEAR THAT SHORELINE DIDN'T WANT A WALL
- 7 BLOCKING THEIR VIEW OF THE HARBOR AND THEIR EXPERIENCE IN
- 8 THEIR COMMUNITY. SO THEY HAD TO GO BACK TO THE DRAWING BOARD
- 9 AND COME UP WITH ANOTHER PLAN, AND SIMILAR STORIES OCCURRING
- 10 IN OTHER PLACES AS WELL. I DID HEAR A LOT OF GREAT STORIES
- 11 FROM COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND PEOPLE COMING TOGETHER, A LOT OF
- 12 RESILIENCY IN TERMS OF SOCIAL CONNECTIONS THAT WERE MADE AS A
- 13 RESULT OF THAT, BUT THEY'RE NOW RECOGNIZING THE CHALLENGES OF
- 14 GETTING THESE KINDS OF RISK MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES IN THE
- 15 GROUND OR IN PLACE, WITH THE ANTICIPATION THAT A STORM VERY
- 16 WELL MAY HIT AT ANY POINT. I THOUGHT AS WE'RE WORKING TOGETHER
- 17 TRYING TO THINK ABOUT THE STRATEGIES WE NEED TO PUT FORWARD IN
- 18 OUR OWN COMMUNITIES, YOU KNOW, I JUST THOUGHT I WOULD RAISE
- 19 THAT UP. SO, EVEN A PLACE THAT'S ALREADY EXPERIENCED A
- 20 DISASTER, IS HAVING A HARD TIME GETTING THINGS GOING. AND I
- 21 JUST HOPE WE CAN CONTINUE TO WORK TOGETHER TO KIND OF ADVANCE
- 22 THE STRATEGIES WE NEED TO PUT IN PLACE TO PROTECT OUR
- 23 COMMUNITIES. AND FIGURE OUT HOW TO INVEST THESE RESOURCES IN
- 24 SUCH A WAY THAT WE'RE NOT GOING TO SEE THE KIND OF IMPACTS
- 25 THAT THEY EXPERIENCE THERE. AND THEN ONE LAST POINT, I THOUGHT



- 1 IT WAS REALLY INTERESTING, THE LAST SPEAKER ON THIS, ON THIS
- 2 TOUR, WAS A GENTLEMAN FROM STATEN ISLAND IN A COMMUNITY, ONE
- 3 OF THE HARDEST HIT AND ONE THAT HAD PREVIOUS EXPERIENCES, HE
- 4 BROUGHT TOGETHER ALL THE RESIDENTS IN THIS COMMUNITY, ROUGHLY
- 5 200 HOMES, AND GOT THEM ALL TO GET BUY-OUTS FROM HUD. AND IT
- 6 TOOK THEM BANDING TOGETHER TO GET THE KIND OF INVESTMENT FROM
- 7 HUD WHERE THEY WERE ABLE TO GET THE WORTH OF THEIR PROPERTIES
- 8 AND MOVE AND FIND ANOTHER PLACE TO LIVE. AND IN THE MEANTIME,
- 9 THEY TOOK -- YOU KNOW, TORE DOWN ALL THE HOMES AND RETURNED
- 10 THAT PLACE TO MARSH, WETLANDS, WHAT IT WAS PROBABLY MEANT TO
- 11 BE. SO, I THOUGHT THAT WAS REALLY INSTRUCTIVE, BECAUSE YOU
- 12 DON'T HEAR ABOUT THESE BUYOUTS, NECESSARILY, I THINK IT'S HARD
- 13 FOR CITIES TO LOSE THOSE RESIDENTS AND THOSE PROPERTIES, BUT I
- 14 THOUGHT THAT WAS REALLY INTERESTING AND SOMETHING WE CAN LEARN
- 15 FROM. SO JUST WANTED TO SHARE THAT, AND HOPEFULLY, YOU KNOW,
- 16 HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS. BUT JUST WANT -- I THOUGHT THAT
- 17 WAS INSTRUCTIVE. SO, CHANGES CHAIR WORTH FOR GIVING ME THAT
- 18 TIME.

- 20 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: ALLISON, THANK YOU VERY, VERY MUCH FOR THAT
- 21 INSIGHT -- EXCUSE ME -- ON THE TRIP AND I THINK THIS POINTS
- 22 OUT THE VALUE OF OUR NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL CONNECTIONS IN
- 23 TERMS OF LOOKING AT BEST PRACTICES AND GAIN FROM THIS
- 24 EXPERIENCE OF OTHER COMMUNITIES THAT ARE FACING THESE
- 25 DISASTERS. AND, SO, THANK YOU FOR DOING THAT. LET ME JUST ASK

- 14 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: SHE'S RIGHT. WE'RE LOOKING AT WHAT'S
- 15 HAPPENING IN FLORIDA WITH THOSE STORMS. AND THIS IS SO
- 16 DRAMATIC AND THIS IS A COMMUNITY THAT FACED THE SAME THING TEN
- 17 YEARS AGO AND WHAT ARE THE LESSONS LEARNED AND WHAT ARE THE
- 18 LESSONS NOT LEARNED. THERESE, YOU WERE THERE?

- 20 THERESE MCMILLAN: I WAS IN THE MIDDLE. I WAS AT THE FTA, AND I
- 21 STILL REMEMBER, AS IF IT WAS YESTERDAY, THAT WHOLE DISASTER.
- 22 AND, YOU KNOW, FROM WORKING WITH THE FEDERAL TRANSIT
- 23 ADMINISTRATION, OF COURSE, WE HAD OUR LARGEST TRANSIT AGENCY
- 24 IN THE ENTIRE COUNTRY, A THIRD OF WHICH WAS UNDER WATER. IT
- 25 WAS CRAZY: THAT'S WHY, WHEN I WAS LISTENING TO ALLISON, AND WE



- 1 WERE CHATTING, AT THE TIME, YOU KNOW, YOU HAVE PREPAREDNESS,
- 2 YOU HAVE RESPONSE, AND YOU HAVE RECOVERY. AND AT THE TIME, IT
- 3 WAS REALLY INTERESTING BECAUSE FOLKS WERE SAYING AS MUCH AS
- 4 THE DISASTER WAS, OBVIOUSLY, YOU KNOW, A CRISIS OF GREAT
- 5 PROPORTIONS, THE THINKING AT THE TIME WAS, WELL, AT LEAST IT
- 6 WAS IN NEW YORK, WHICH, AS A REGION, WHICH WAS FAR BETTER
- 7 PREPARED IN TERMS OF THE RESPONSE LEVEL THAN NEW ORLEANS WAS
- 8 WITH HURRICANE KATRINA, WHICH RAPID, WHAT? I THINK, FIVE YEARS
- 9 BEFORE THAT. BUT THE RECOVERY PIECE, AS ALLISON JUST SAID,
- 10 PROVES THAT EVEN IN AN AREA THAT HAD PROBABLY BEEN AS
- 11 THOUGHTFUL AND PREPARED AS ANY PLACE, REALLY, IN THE COUNTRY,
- 12 TO DEAL WITH THIS, HAS STRUGGLED. HAS STRUGGLED TO ACTUALLY DO
- 13 THINGS DIFFERENTLY, HAVING EMERGED FROM A CRISIS EVEN A DECADE
- 14 LATER. SO, YEAH, I THINK IT SPEAKS A LOT TO JUST THE
- 15 CHALLENGES OF, YOU KNOW, FEDERAL, STATE, REGIONAL, LOCAL
- 16 RESPONSES, AND INTERDEPENDENCIES AND THE LIKE TO START
- 17 THINKING ABOUT.

- 19 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: ABSOLUTELY. AND THOSE PHOTOGRAPHS OF THE
- 20 WATER FALLS IN THE SUBWAY WERE JUST STAGGERING. YOU KNOW? IT'S
- 21 NOT -- IT'S JUST AMAZING, YOU'RE RIGHT THE COORDINATION OF
- 22 THOSE LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT AND I THINK THAT'S ONE OF THE
- 23 IMPORTANT ROLES WE IN OUR REGIONAL GOVERNMENT PLAY TOO IN
- 24 DOING THAT. JUST AN UPDATE ON THE INFORMATIONAL ITEM ON THE
- 25 NOMINATING PROCESS. TIME FLIES SO QUICKLY AND WE'RE ALREADY AT



- 1 THE POINT WHERE WE NEED TO NOMINATE AND SELECT NEW LEADERSHIP.
- 2 I AM -- SO, WHAT I WANTED TO DO -- IT'S A PRETTY INFORMAL
- 3 PROCESS, I HAVE ASKED SUPERVISOR SPERING AND SUPERVISOR RAMOS
- 4 TO SERVE AS A MEMBER OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, IS THEY WILL
- 5 BRING BACK FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION AT THE JANUARY MEETING. WE -
- 6 THE NOMINATIONS FOR CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR. ALTHOUGH WE DO
- 7 HAVE A WONDERFUL TRADITION OF THE VICE CHAIR ACCEDING TO THE
- 8 CHAIRMANSHIPS AND BEING ABLY SERVED BY OUR VICE CHAIR, AND
- 9 JESSE ARREOUIN AND I WANT TO THANK YOU AGAIN FOR FILLING IN

- 18 IN EGYPT FOR THE CLIMATE DISCUSSION. BUT WHAT WE DID THIS YEAR

- 7 BECAUSE THERE ARE TWO REFINERIES, P66, PHILLIPS 66, AND
- 8 MARATHON, THAT HAVE BEEN CONVERTING TO BIOFUELS. AND WE HAVE

- 2 HAPPENING IN THE FALL. SO, I WOULD LIKE TO TALK ABOUT THREE
- 3 MAJOR INITIATIVES OR FOCUS AREAS THAT MTC AND ABAG HAVE BEEN
- 4 INVOLVED WITH, AND LOOKING AT THE SCREEN, A NUMBER OF THANKS
- 5 TO THE POLICY MEMBERS WHO HELPED GET A NUMBER OF THESE OR ALL
- 6 OF THESE THINGS TO THE POINT OF EITHER CONCLUSION OR DESIGN,
- 7 BECAUSE THEY'RE VERY IMPORTANT. I'LL START FIRST WITH THE
- 8 TRANSIT ORIENTED COMMUNITIES TOC POLICY THAT WAS ADOPTED IN
- 9 OCTOBER, BY THE COMMISSION. THIS HAS BEEN SOMETHING WE HAD
- 10 BEEN WORKING ON FOR TWO YEARS. AND IT WAS A REALLY
- 11 FOUNDATIONAL CHANGE IN ADVANCEMENT, IN A POLICY THAT WE HAVE
- 12 HAD ON THE BOOKS FOR SOMETIME, WHICH REALLY FOCUSES ON
- 13 INCREASING DENSITIES OF HOUSING AND COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT IN

- 15 -- FIXED GUIDEWAY TRANSIT. YOU KNOW, THE -- NOT SURPRISING
- 16 CORE IDEA HERE, IS THAT MORE PEOPLE WILL USE TRANSIT AS
- 17 ALTERNATIVE TO SINGLE OCCUPANCY VEHICLE TRAVEL IF THEY CAN
- 18 LIVE AND/OR WORK CLOSER TO WHERE THE STATIONS ARE. AND THAT
- 19 ALSO PERMITS CONNECTING SERVICES AND OTHER THINGS THAT
- 20 FACILITATE, AGAIN, MOBILITY IN THAT SPACE. THIS WAS, AGAIN, A
- 21 FAR MORE DETAILED AND, I THINK, CUSTOM AND TAILORED APPROACH
- 22 UPDATE TO THE POLICY. IT WAS A TIERED APPROACH TO MATCH THE
- 23 TYPE AND FREOUENCY OF TRANSIT SERVICE THAT'S AVAILABLE, TO THE
- 24 EXPECTED DENSITIES THAT WOULD BE ASSOCIATED IN THE AREA AROUND
- 25 THE STATION. IT INTRODUCED A STRONG AND INTENTIONAL EQUITY



- 1 ELEMENT BY REQUIRING AFFORDABLE HOUSING, SUPPORTIVE POLICIES
- 2 FOR DEVELOPMENT IN THOSE CONSIDERED AREAS. AND THERE WAS
- 3 SUBSTANTIAL OUTREACH WITH OUR LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO REALLY
- 4 PULL THIS TOGETHER. SO IT REFLECTED IN MANY WAYS HOW WE TAKE
- 5 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 AND THE INTEGRATIVE GOALS OF THAT, YOU
- 6 KNOW, MASTER PLAN, NORTH STAR WE HAVE, AND START PUTTING IT ON
- 7 THE GROUND IN TERMS OF SPECIFIC INITIATIVES. SO, A LOT OF
- 8 GREAT WORK AND COORDINATED EFFORTS WITH OUR TRANSIT AGENCIES,
- 9 AND OUR JURISDICTIONS TO GET THAT DONE. THE OTHER THING I
- 10 WOULD LIKE TO MENTION -- AND THERE WAS A REPORT JUST LAST
- 11 NIGHT, AND, SO, ABAG PRESIDENT, JESSE ARREQUIN, MAY WANT TO
- 12 JUMP IN AND SUPPLEMENT THIS. BUT WE HAD A REPORT ON HOW OUR
- 13 JURISDICTIONS ARE DOING IN TERMS OF DEVELOPING THE REGIONAL
- 14 HOUSING NEEDS ASSESSMENTS. THOSE HAVE TO BE DONE AND BASICALLY
- 15 APPROVED BY HCD BY JANUARY 31ST OF 2023, WHICH IS RIGHT AROUND
- 16 THE CORNER. THE 101 JURISDICTIONS IN THE BAY AREA, TWO, CITY
- 17 OF ALAMEDA AND CITY OF EMERYVILLE, WOOHOO, HAVE ACTUALLY BEEN
- 18 APPROVED IN TERMS OF SUBSTANTIAL COMPLIANCE WITH THE REQUIRED
- 19 GUIDELINES SUBMITTED BY HCD BUT THERE IS A LOT OF WORK AND
- 20 INCREDIBLE RUSHED TO THE DEADLINE TIME FRAME THAT THE REST OF
- 21 OUR JURISDICTIONS ARE HAVING TO FACE. ONE OF THE THINGS WE
- 22 STRESS LAST NIGHT THAT WE HAVE PROVIDED AS STAFF UNPRECEDENTED
- 23 LEVEL OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR JURISDICTIONS IN ORDER TO
- 24 HELP THEM MEET THE MUCH MORE DETAILED REQUIREMENTS FOR THE
- 25 RHNA, THIS CYCLE, AND QUITE FRANKLY, THE MUCH MORE HEIGHTENED



- 1 STATE SCRUTINY ON HOW THOSE PLANS ARE BEING PUT TOGETHER. SO,
- 2 A LOT OF WORK I KNOW IN THE NEXT COUPLE OF MONTHS BUT ALSO A
- 3 LOT OF SUPPORT THAT WE'RE TRYING TO PROVIDE TO OUR LOCAL
- 4 JURISDICTIONS. THE THIRD THING I WOULD LIKE TO HIGHLIGHT IS
- 5 THAT AT THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE OF MTC AND ABAG, WE
- 6 PUT TOGETHER, AS WE ALWAYS DO, A VERY COMPREHENSIVE DRAFT
- 7 LEGISLATIVE AGENDA THAT WILL BE MOVING FORWARD FOR ADOPTION IN
- 8 DECEMBER, WITH AN EYE TOWARD THE 2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION.
- 9 IT'S A VERY -- BEFITTING OF THE TWO AGENCY PORTFOLIOS, IT'S A
- 10 VERY BROAD AGENDA COVERING TRANSPORTATION AND MOBILITY,
- 11 HOUSING, CLIMATE, YOU KNOW, IN PARTICULAR. BUT ONE LEADING
- 12 EFFORT I WOULD JUST LIKE TO LIFT UP IS PURSUING VERY
- 13 AGGRESSIVELY IS TRANSIT OPERATING GAP FUNDING STANCE FOR OUR
- 14 TRANSIT OPERATORS. AS I'M SURE YOU'RE ALL AWARE, OUR METRO
- 15 AREA HAS REBOUNDED FAR MORE SLOWLY THAN OTHER METRO AREAS IN
- 16 THE REST OF THE COUNTRY, AND CERTAINLY IN THE REST OF THE
- 17 STATE. AND OUR TRANSIT OPERATORS ARE FEELING THAT IN TERMS OF
- 18 SUBSTANTIALLY STILL SUPPRESSED RIDERSHIP GAINS FROM THE
- 19 PANDEMIC PARTICULARLY, FROM MAJOR RAIL OPERATORS WHOSE DESIGN,
- 20 YOU KNOW, BART, CALTRAIN, WHAT ARE THE FERRY SYSTEM IN
- 21 PARTICULAR, WHO ARE DESIGNED FOR SERVING COMMUTES INTO OUR JOB
- 22 SHEDS, AND THOSE HAVE FOUNDATIONALLY CHANGED IN I POST-
- 23 PANDEMIC WORLD, AND THE RESULTS OF THAT ARE THAT WE SEE
- 24 SUBSTANTIAL FINANCIAL CLIFFS EMERGING FOR THOSE OPERATORS AS
- 25 THE MASSIVE AND SIGNIFICANT FEDERAL ASSISTANCE THAT WAS



- 1 PROVIDED DURING COVID STARTS TO RUN OUT. AND SO WE ARE TAKING
- 2 A VERY INTENTIONAL LOOK AT WHAT TYPE OF BRIDGING STRATEGY
- 3 COULD BE PURSUED WITH AN EYE TOWARD A COMMITMENT TO PURSUING A
- 4 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION FUNDING MEASURE IN THE FUTURE. THERE
- 5 HAS BEEN A CLEAR DECISION IN THE REGION TO THROW OUR ENERGIES
- 6 BEHIND A REGIONAL REVENUE MEASURE FOR HOUSING IN 2024, BUT
- 7 THAT A TRANSPORTATION MEASURE, WHICH WOULD INCLUDE AN ELEMENT,
- 8 CERTAINLY, FOR PUBLIC TRANSIT OPERATING, WOULD BE IN A
- 9 SUBSEQUENT ELECTORAL CYCLE DOWN THE ROAD IN THE MEANTIME WE
- 10 NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT OUR TRANSIT AGENCIES CAN BE LIFTED UP
- 11 AND SUSTAINED UNTIL WHICH TIME WE WOULD BE PREPARED AND
- 12 HOPEFULLY CAN SEE SUCCESSFULLY ENACTED VOTER APPROVED REGIONAL
- 13 MEASURES. THAT'S A LOT BUT IT'S A HUGELY SIGNIFICANT OBJECTIVE
- 14 THAT WOULD REQUIRE A STRONG COALITION OF INTEREST ACROSS THE
- 15 REGION. PUBLIC TRANSIT AND ITS, BASICALLY SURVIVAL, IS
- 16 ESSENTIAL ON SO MANY LEVELS, WHETHER YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT
- 17 GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTIONS, BECAUSE OF MOVING PEOPLE OUT OF
- 18 THEIR CARS INTO A PUBLIC TRANSIT, OR REDUCTION OF VMT, WHICH
- 19 HAS ALL TYPES OF BENEFITS ASSOCIATED WITH THAT, FROM SAFETY ON
- 20 OUR ROADS TO PROVIDING MOBILITY OPTIONS FOR THOSE WHO NEED IT
- 21 MOST. EITHER WAY YOU CUT IT, A SUCCESSFUL HEALTHY REGION NEEDS
- 22 A SUCCESSFUL AND HEALTHY PUBLIC TRANSIT SYSTEM. SO, THAT'S
- 23 REALLY A FOCAL POINT THAT WE WILL BE SEEING IN OUR LEGISLATIVE
- 24 EFFORTS. SO, WITH THAT, I'LL CLOSE AND TURN IT BACK OVER TO
- 25 YOU MADAM CHAIR.

- 15 FELT THAT WAS AN IMPORTANT COMPONENT OF IT THAT CITIES SHOULD

- 17 OF THIS, DOESN'T ALWAYS SHOW THROUGH WHEN WE LOOKED AT OUR --
- 18 IT DIDN'T IN MY OPINION, WHEN WE THROUGH THE RHNA PROCESS, THE
- 19 GOVERNMENTAL PROCESS, THE VMT IS THE MAJOR COMPONENT OF THE
- 20 CLIMATE CHANGE, AND I THINK YOU EXPRESSED THAT VERY L SO WE'RE

- 16 AMY HUTZEL: THANK YOU CHAIR WORTH AND MEMBERS OF THE BARC
- 17 BOARD. THE FIRST THING THAT I WANTED TO TALK ABOUT IS
- 18 BENEFICIAL USE OF DREDGE SEDIMENT IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY, WHICH
- 19 WE HAVE MADE SOME MAJOR PROGRESS ON IN THE LAST FEW WEEKS.
- 20 FOUR YEARS AGO, WE TEAMED UP WITH BCDC TO SUBMIT A PROPOSAL TO
- 21 THE CORP OF ENGINEERS FOR BENEFICIAL USE PILOT PROGRAM, IT WAS
- 22 UNDER A PREVIOUS WATER RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT ACT. AND WE WERE
- 23 1 OF 10 SELECTED PROJECTS NATIONALLY, OUT OF 94 APPLICATIONS
- 24 NATION-WIDE. AND IT WAS A \$51 MILLION PROPOSAL FOR DIRECT
- 25 PLACEMENT OF BENEFICIAL USE -- DIRECT PLACEMENT OF DREDGE



- 1 SEDIMENT -- SORRY -- AT BENEFICIAL USE SITES IN SAN FRANCISCO
- 2 BAY, FROM THE FEDERAL NAVIGATION CHANNELS IN THE BAY, AS WELL
- 3 AS A STRATEGIC AQUATIC PLACEMENT TEST, WHICH IS BASICALLY
- 4 TAKING SOME DREDGE SEDIMENT AND TRYING SOME NEW IN-BAY
- 5 DISPOSAL SITES, WHERE YOU DON'T HAVE TO PIPE THE MATERIAL, YOU
- 6 CAN -- YOU KNOW, THE BARGE CAN GET THERE, AND SEEING WHETHER
- 7 THAT MATERIAL ACTUALLY IS FEEDING OUR MARSHES AND MUD FLATS.
- 8 SO, REALLY FOCUSED ON RESILIENCE. SAN FRANCISCO BAY
- 9 SHORELINES. THE CORP OF ENGINEERS ACCEPTED OUR PROJECT BUT
- 10 ONLY MOVED FORWARD ON THE STRATEGIC AQUATIC PLACEMENT TEST
- 11 WHICH WAS A \$3.6 MILLION PORTION OF THE OVERALL PROJECT. THEY
- 12 SHOULD BE DOING THAT TEST NEXT YEAR, AND WE ARE VERY
- 13 SUPPORTIVE OF THAT, BUT WE ALSO, OBVIOUSLY, WANTED THE REST OF
- 14 THE PROJECT, THE DIRECT PLACEMENT, TO MOVE FORWARD. SO, AFTER
- 15 FOUR YEARS OF EFFORT -- AND I COMPARE THIS TO THOSE GIANT
- 16 CONTAINER SHIPS COMING INTO SAN FRANCISCO BAY, AND WE ARE JUST
- 17 ONE OF THOSE LITTLE BOATS TRYING TO PUSH THAT CONTAINER SHIP A
- 18 LITTLE DEGREE TO THE LEFT, AND WE FINALLY SUCCEEDED, WITH CORP

- 21 IN THEIR LAST INFRASTRUCTURE ACT WORK PLAN, AND THE ASSISTANT
- 22 SECRETARY OF THE ARMY'S OFFICE HAS DIRECTED THE CORP TO
- 23 IMPLEMENT THE FULL PROJECT. SO, THE DOOR IS ALSO OPEN TO, YOU
- 24 KNOW, GETTING ADDITIONAL FUNDING UP TO THE 51 MILLION. SO I AM
- 25 -- SORRY. MY TEAMS IS CALLING ME. SO, WE'RE VERY EXCITED. AND



- 1 I'M HOPING THE CORP CAN PUT -- START PUTTING THIS MONEY TO USE
- 2 WITH NEXT YEAR'S DREDGING CYCLE, AND THAT THIS WILL -- I MEAN,
- 3 THE CORP IS SAYING, THIS IS NOT PRECEDENT SETTING. BUT I'M
- 4 HOPING THAT IT'S PRECEDENT SETTING AND IT CHANGES HOW THE CORP
- 5 IS DOING BUSINESS IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY. JUST SO YOU KNOW, MUCH
- 6 OF THE MATERIAL RIGHT NOW THAT'S DREDGED IN THE SAN FRANCISCO

- 9 THAT REALLY DON'T BENEFIT THE SHORELINE OF SAN FRANCISCO BAY.
- 10 THEY'RE NOT SITES THAT ARE, YOU KNOW, FEEDING OUR SHORE LINES.
- 11 SO, I FEEL LIKE WE MADE HUGE PROGRESS IN THE LAST FEW WEEKS,
- 12 AND WE NEED TO STAY DILIGENT WITH THE CORP TO MAKE SURE THIS
- 13 IS ACTUALLY IMPLEMENTED, BUT WE'RE GOING TO DO THAT. AND THEN,
- 14 I ALSO WANTED TO MENTION THE COASTAL CONSERVANCY, AS I HAVE
- 15 SAID BEFORE, WE RECEIVED SIGNIFICANT FUNDING, FY 2022, 2023
- 16 STATE BUDGET AS PART OF THE OVERALL CLIMATE PACKAGE ACTION. WE
- 17 ARE OPEN TO APPLICATIONS, GRANT APPLICATIONS, I'M GOING TO PUT
- 18 THE WEB SITE IN THE -- ACTUALLY THERE, IS NO CHAT -- I'M NOT
- 19 GOING TO PUT THE WEB SITE IN THE CHAT, BUT YOU CAN GO TO STATE
- 20 COASTAL CONSERVANCY GRANTS, IF YOU GOOGLE THAT, YOU SHOULD
- 21 FIND THE SITE, BUT WE ARE TAKING PREPROPOSALS AND THERE IS ALL
- 22 SORTS OF RESOURCES ON THE WEB SITE FOR THAT FUNDING. AND IT'S
- 23 VERY FOCUSED ON COASTAL RESILIENCE, SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION,
- 24 PARTICULARLY NATURE-BASED. AND THEN THERE IS SOME OTHER
- 25 SMALLER POTS OF FUNDING LIKE WILDFIRE RESILIENCE, AND SOME



- 1 FUNDING FOR SPECIFIC PROJECTS AND GEOGRAPHIC PROGRAMS WITHIN
- 2 OUR JURISDICTION ON THE COAST, AND IN THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY.
- 3 AND THEN, I REALLY APPRECIATED ALLISON'S DESCRIPTION OF THE
- 4 TRIP SHE TOOK. AND IT REALLY RESONATED WITH ME. WE HAVE BEEN
- 5 WORKING, FOR 20 YEARS, TO IMPLEMENT THE SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO
- 6 BAY SHORELINE PROJECT, BUILDING A FOUR-MILE LEVEE, AND 3,000
- 7 ACRES OF WETLANDS RESTORATION, AND THE HURDLES THAT GET FACED
- 8 IN THESE PROJECTS ARE IMMENSE. IT IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION NOW,
- 9 BUT WE HAVE SOME, YOU KNOW, MAJOR ISSUES THAT ARE, YOU KNOW,
- 10 THREATENING THE OVERALL ABILITY TO IMPLEMENT THAT PROJECT. AND
- 11 IT'S SUCH A GREAT PROJECT. IT KIND OF MAKES WONDER, LIKE, CAN
- 12 WE DO THIS. YOU KNOW, IN OTHER PARTS OF THE BAY AREA. BETWEEN
- 13 ISSUES WITH PG&E, AND THEIR POWER LINES THAT GO THROUGH THE

- 20 NOTHING IS EASY. SO, THANK YOU.

- 22 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: OH L AMY, THANK YOU FOR THAT REPORT. AND I
- 23 AM SO PLEASED TO HEAR ABOUT THE ARMY CORP PROGRESS WITH THE
- 24 SOILS. BECAUSE WE WANT TO BE ABLE TO USE THOSE TO DO OUR
- 25 RESILIENCY WORK ON THE SHORELINE, AND YOU WORK MIRACLES. SO



- 1 WE'RE HERE TO KEEP SUPPORTING THAT HAPPEN. THANK YOU VERY
- 2 MUCH. LET ME JUST SEE IF THERE ARE ANY QUESTIONS. I SEE MARK
- 3 ROSS HAS HIS HAND UP.

- 1 IN. ALLISON, I APPRECIATE YOU STANDING IN ON THAT TEN YEAR
- 2 ANNIVERSARY. I STARTED MY CAREER AS A WATERFRONT PLANNER IN
- 3 NEW YORK CITY, AND EARLY ON HURRICANE SANDY HIT AND I JUST
- 4 REMEMBER BIKING AROUND CONEY ISLAND, RED HOOK THE DAY AFTER
- 5 THE STORM, AND JUST SEEING FIRSTHAND THE DEVASTATING IMPACTS
- 6 THAT THE STORM CAUSED. THOSE ARE JUST SEARED IN MY MEMORY. AND
- 7 ONE OF THE THINGS I VALUE ABOUT THE BAY AREA IS WE DO HAVE THE
- 8 OPPORTUNITY TO REALLY PLAN AHEAD AND NOT HAVE THAT HAPPEN. AND
- 9 SO THAT ENCOURAGES ME THAT WE CAN NOT HAVE TO FACE THAT HERE
- 10 IF WE ARE BEING PROACTIVE. SO, HERE IN THE BAY, WE'RE
- 11 CONTINUING TO WORK, AND BCDC, CONTINUING TO ADVANCE OUR WORK
- 12 ON SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION. ONE OF THE PROJECTS THAT'S
- 13 ENGINEER COMPLETION IS A REALLY EXCITING INTER-AGENCY PROJECT
- 14 WITH MTC ABAG TO DEVELOP A FUNDING FRAMEWORK FOR SHORELINE
- 15 ADAPTATION. THIS WILL GIVE US BETTER COSTS FOR WHAT TYPES OF
- 16 REVENUES WE WILL NEED TO RAISE TO REALLY EQUITABLY FILL THAT
- 17 MAJOR FUNDING GAP. SO THAT'S BEEN A REALLY EXCITING INTER-

- 21 WHICH YOU ALL HELPED SUPPORT AND DEVELOP. SPECIFICALLY, THIS
- 22 FUNDING WILL SUPPORT THE DEVELOPMENT OF A REGIONAL SHORELINE
- 23 ADAPTING A PLAN IN CLOSE COLLABORATION WITH CITIES AND
- 24 COUNTIES. AND WE'RE REALLY EXCITED TO KICK THAT OFF IN EARLY
- 25 2023. AS WELL AS SUPPORTING ABOUT. CDC'S ROLE AS SERVING AS



- 1 BACK BONES AGENCY TO COORDINATE AROUND SEA LEVEL RISE,
- 2 COMMUNICATE, EDUCATE, WORKING WITH COMMUNITIES AND AGENCIES TO
- 3 ENSURE WE'RE ALL MOVING FORWARD IN ONE DIRECTION. WE HAVE TWO
- 4 REOUESTS FOR PROPOSALS THAT ARE CURRENTLY OPEN RELATED TO

- 16 USE DATA AND INCLUSIVE PRACTICES TO MORE EFFECTIVELY ADVANCE
- 17 EQUITY IN RESPONSE TO DISPARITIES AND ENGAGE WITH HISTORICALLY
- 18 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. SO, THAT GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE
- 19 ORDER, REALLY IS JUST THAT EXTRA PUSH, I THINK, THAT WE NEED
- 20 TO KIND OF CONTINUE ADVANCING THIS WORK. AND, THEN, LASTLY,
- 21 YOU MAY RECALL THAT THIS PAST SUMMER, A GROUP LED BY THE EAST
- 22 OAKLAND STADIUM ALLIANCE, AS WELL AS OTHER INDUSTRY GROUPS,

- 13 PARTNERSHIPS, THE DEBATE AT CONSERVATION DEVELOPMENT
- 14 COMMISSION, JESSICA FAIN CAME TO THE BOARD MEETING RECENTLY TO
- 15 PRESENT ON THAT, AND WE HAVE WORKED ON THE BAY AREA REGIONAL
- 16 COLLABORATIVE THESE PARTNERSHIPS HELP ADDRESS AND DEVELOPED
- 17 ROADMAP FOR HOW THE BAY AREA IS GOING TO ADAPT FASTER AND
- 18 BETTER AND MORE EQUITABLY FOR THE RISING BAY, AND WE'RE
- 19 LOOKING AT THROUGH THE LENS OF ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE
- 20 ADDRESSING DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, COMMUNITIES, BUSINESSES,
- 21 INFRASTRUCTURE, AND NATURAL HAD BEEN AT THAT AT THAT TIMES
- 22 THROUGHOUT THE BAY AREA PLANNING EFFORTS SUPPORT THE

- 4 COLLABORATION. WE ARE FORTUNATE TO BE ABLE TO PARTICIPATE WITH
- 5 THESE VERY PROGRESSIVE GROUPS IN THE BAY AREA, BCDC, BARC, AND
- 6 THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP AND OTHERS TO HELP
- 7 ADVANCE THE CLIMATE CHANGE EFFORTS OF THE BAY AREA. NEXT SLIDE
- 8 PLEASE. THE OTHERS THING THE REGIONAL BOARD HAS BEEN DOING IS
- 9 USING VARIOUS REGULATORY TOOLS TO REQUIRE VARIOUS FACILITIES

- 15 BY REQUIRING CONDUCT AND VULNERABILITY ASSESSMENTS AND MAKE
- 16 THEM AWARE OF TIME FRAME FOR 30 YEARS AS TIME TO START
- 17 PLANNING THE DESIGN, AND IMPROVEMENTS. THE BOARD IS REQUIRING
- 18 ALL THE WASTEWATER UTILITIES IN THE BAY AREA TO CONDUCT A
- 19 REGIONAL EVALUATION OF OPPORTUNITIES FOR RECYCLED WATER AND
- 20 INFORMING THE NEXT PLAN OF HOW MUCH RECYCLED WATER PROJECTS WE
- 21 CAN DEVELOP IN THE BAY AREA TO MEET THE NEEDS OF CALIFORNIA IN
- 22 THE BAY AREA WITH THE HOTTER DRYER CLIMATE BEGINNING TO THINK

- 2 RECOGNIZING SUCH PROJECTS CAN REQUIRE MORE COORDINATION AND
- 3 PLANNING. THE PERMIT ALSO HAS FLEXIBILITY TO SUPPORT THOSE
- 4 PROJECTS INCLUDING ALLOWING ADDITIONAL TIME FOR THOSE TO BE

- 18 TERM GREEN WATER STORM WATER INFRASTRUCTURE PLANNING REOUIRING
- 19 OUR PERMITTING TO FURTHER DEVELOP THE EXISTING GREEN STORM
- 20 WATER INFRASTRUCTURE PLAN AND DESCRIBES HOW THEY'RE SHIFTING
- 21 FROM DRAINAGE SYSTEMS FROM GRAY TO GREEN OVER THE COMING
- 22 DECADES AND OUR MRPP MUNICIPAL PERMIT THAT WE ISSUED INCLUDING
- 23 FLEXIBILITY FOR PERMITTEES TO COORDINATE WITH OTHER CLIMATE
- 24 RESILIENCE EFFORTS IN THE FIVE YEAR PERMIT TERM GOING TO BE
- 25 REQUIRED TO SUBMIT INFORMATION TO HELP ESTABLISH



- 1 IMPLEMENTATION REQUIREMENTS THAT WILL BE USED FOR FUTURE
- 2 IMPLEMENTATION PLANNING NOW IS THE TIME TO BE DOING THE
- 3 PLANNING AND ADDRESS FUNDING NEEDED TO ADDRESS THESE ISSUES.
- 4 NEXT SLIDE. KEY ASPECTS OF OUR REGION'S CREEK AND WETLAND FILL
- 5 PROGRAM CLEAN WATER ACT SECTION 401 WATER OUALITY PROGRAM
- 6 INCLUDING ADAPTATION, ESTUARY RISING TIDES, USING APPROPRIATE
- 7 INFRASTRUCTURE SUCH AS TIDAL MARSH, SHALLOW SLOPED ECO TERM
- 8 LEVEES AND RESTORATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SAN FRANCISCO BAY
- 9 AREA WETLAND HAPPEN AT THAT TIME, URBANIZED AREA EXPERIENCE
- 10 WITH CLIMATE CHANGE, WATER BOARDS CALIFORNIA FISH AND WILDLIFE
- 11 CORP OF ENGINEERS U.S. WILDLIFE SERVICES CDC, US EPA AND
- 12 OTHERS TO FACILITATE SAN FRANCISCO BAY SHORELINE WETLAND
- 13 RESTORATION TO ADAPT PROJECTED SEA LEVEL RISE AND COORDINATING
- 14 ON A REGIONAL BASIS WITH THE BAY AREA FLOOD PROTECTION
- 15 AGENCIES AND COASTAL HAZARDS ADAPTATION RESILIENCE,
- 16 COORDINATING BENEFICIAL REUSE OF SEDIMENT TO RESTORE THE BAY
- 17 WETLANDS AND ADDRESS RISING TIDES AND HELP ESTABLISH THE
- 18 WETLAND REGIONAL MONITORING PROGRAM SO WE CAN TRACK HOW WE AS
- 19 A REGION ARE ACHIEVING OUR TIDAL RESTORATION GOALS. THAT'S
- 20 SOMETHING WE'RE WORKING ON. AS YOU CAN SEE HERE ON THE SLIDE
- 21 ALL THE DIFFERENT GROUPS WE'RE WORKING WITH IT'S GREAT IN THE
- 22 BAY AREA TO HAVE SUCH ENGAGED AGENCIES WORKING COLLABORATIVELY
- 23 TOGETHER TO ADDRESS CLIMATE CHANGE, RISING SEA LEVELS. SO,
- 24 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AND NOW, I WANT TO SWITCH MORE TO HOW WE AT
- 25 THE REGIONAL BOARD ARE TRYING TO SUPPORT THE GOVERNOR'S WATER



- 1 SUPPLY STRATEGY WITH CLIMATE CHANGE. SO WE'RE DOING IT THROUGH
- 2 OUR WATER RECYCLING PROGRAM, SUPPORTED OFF-CAMPUS AND DISTRICT
- 3 SCALE WATER RECYCLE PROJECTS. JUST TO GIVE PERSPECTIVE, ABOUT
- 4 10% OF WASTEWATER FLOWS ARE RECYCLED IN THE BAY AREA AND WE
- 5 SEE THAT INCREASING WITH TIME, ESPECIALLY AS WE CONTINUE WITH
- 6 MORE DROUGHTS. AND THEN WE'RE COORDINATING WITH THE STATE
- 7 DIVISION DRINKING WATER TO AUTHORIZE PROJECTS SUCH AS
- 8 MICROSOFT, GOOGLE, FACEBOOK, AND OTHERS WHICH ARE CAPTURING
- 9 AND TREATING GRAY WATER RUNOFF FOR NON-POTABLE USE USING FOR
- 10 IRRIGATION AND TOILET FLUSHING WHICH REDUCES THE NEED FOR
- 11 POTABLE WATER. AND WE'RE TRYING TO DO A LOT OF OUTREACH AND
- 12 COORDINATION AS SB 966 SHIFTS THE PERMITTING AUTHORITY FROM
- 13 THE STATE TO THE LOCAL AGENCIES BUT ALL THE LOCAL AGENCIES
- 14 AREN'T EVEN AWARE OF IT AND SO WE'RE TRYING TO DO OUTREACH AND
- 15 COORDINATION SO THE NEW PERMITTING PROCESS DOES NOT DELAY
- 16 IMPLEMENTATION OF RECYCLED WATER PROJECTS. BECAUSE WITH THE
- 17 GOVERNOR'S PLAN WE'RE TRYING TO BRING RECYCLED WATER PROJECTS
- 18 ON AS OUICKLY AS POSSIBLE KNOWING THAT WE'RE DEALING WITH A
- 19 WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE IN CALIFORNIA. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO,
- 20 THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY REGION IS HOME AS YOU KNOW, TO OVER 7
- 21 MILLION RESIDENTS AND THEY USE ABOUT 1.5 MIL, AN ACRE FOOT PER
- 22 YEAR, IN NORMAL WATER YEARS, AND THE WATER SUPPLY ABOUT 20%
- 23 COMES FROM GROUNDWATER BUT INCREASES SIGNIFICANTLY DURING
- 24 DROUGHT YEARS AND THERE IS 35 DIFFERENT GROUNDWATER BASINS IN
- 25 THE BAY AREA AND THERE IS 1200 SUPPLY WELLS. IS SO WE'RE



- 1 MAKING SURE THOSE SUPPLY WELLS ARE BEING PROTECTED AND LOOKING
- 2 AT IMPACTS OF WHAT WE CAN DO TO CONTINUE TO PROTECT THEM WITH

- 4 POTENTIAL MOBILITY OF CONTAMINANTS. SO, NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.
- 5 SO, WHAT WE HAVE DONE IS WE HAVE DEVELOPED SUSTAINABLE
- 6 GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT TEAM WE'RE ENGAGING WITH THE LOCAL

- 8 OF THE GROUNDS WATER BASING AND DOCUMENTING THOSE FINDINGS AND

- 15 PRIORITIZATION, GROUNDWATER USE CONTINUING GROUNDWATER
- 16 DROUGHTS WORSENING ASSOCIATED WITH CLIMATE CHANGE
- 17 ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE AND FUTURE THREATS TO WATER SUPPLY
- 18 INFRASTRUCTURE ALL SUGGEST ADDITIONAL PRIORITIZATION LENS IS
- 19 NEEDED AND WE'RE CREATING FRAMEWORK TO SUPPORT LOOKING AT
- 20 EVERYTHING THROUGHOUT LENS OF ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE AND
- 21 FOCUSSING AND PRIORITIZING THE GROUNDWATER BASINS IN AREAS
- 22 THAT NEED WORK IN DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES AND WE'RE WORKING
- 23 WITH TEAMS TO LOOK AT WHICH ONES NEED TO BE PROTECTED AS FAR
- 24 AS WATER SUPPLY WELLS WHERE CHEMICAL CONTAMINANT HAS EXCEEDED
- 25 A DRINKING WATER STANDARD. SO WE'RE WORKING COLLABORATIVELY TO



- 1 PROTECT GROUNDWATER AS IT'S PART OF OUR SOLUTION AS MEETING
- 2 THE NEEDS OF WATER FOR CALIFORNIA IN THE FUTURE. AND THE OTHER
- 3 THING OUR TEAM IS DOING, MANAGING THE AQUIFER PERMITTING
- 4 PROJECTS, I'LL DISCUSS THAT IN THE NEXT SLIDE. AQUIFER
- 5 RECHARGE IS AN IMPORTANT COMPONENT SUSTAINABLE GROUNDWATER
- 6 MANAGEMENT AND TYPICALLY LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS USE PERCOLATION
- 7 PONDS SPREADING BASINS IN STREAM RECHARGE AND OCCASIONALLY
- 8 INJECTION WELLS TO RECHARGE, WE PERMIT THESE CHARGE PROJECTS
- 9 WHEN THE SOURCE WATER CONTAINS POTENTIAL CONTAMINANTS SUCH AS
- 10 TREATED WASTEWATER CAPTURED STORM WATER OR DISINFECTED TREATED
- 11 DRINKING WATER. AND THIS IS IMPORTANT PART OF OUR PORTFOLIO OF
- 12 DEMAND FOR WATER IN THE FUTURE MAKING SURE WE'RE PROTECTING
- 13 OUR GROUNDWATER BASINS AND PART OF A PLACE TO STORE WATER
- 14 [INDISCERNIBLE] MORE IN CALIFORNIA. AND AS WE LOOK IN THE
- 15 FUTURE FOR RECYCLED WATER, A LOT OF OPPORTUNITIES ARE TAKING
- 16 RECYCLED WATER, PUTTING IN [INDISCERNIBLE] AND SERVING IT AS
- 17 POTABLE WATER. NEXT SLIDE. I WANT TO TALK ABOUT A COUPLE OF
- 18 PROJECTS. PERMIT AOUIFER STORAGE RECOVERY PILOT PROJECT IN
- 19 SONOMA COUNTY A GREAT PILOT PROJECT ABLE TO DETERMINE FROM
- 20 THIS PILOT PROJECT ADEQUATE CAPACITY STORED WATER, CONFIRMING
- 21 WATER QUALITY NOW THEY'RE GOING TO EXPAND THIS GROUNDWATER
- 22 PROJECT WHICH WILL HELP PREPARE THEM TO BE BETTER AND MORE
- 23 RESILIENT TO DROUGHTS. AND ANOTHER PROJECT WE HAVE DONE IN THE
- 24 BAY AREA NEXT SLIDE PLEASE IS WITH EAST BAY MUNICIPAL UTILITY
- 25 DISTRICT AND IT'S A PERMANENT AQUIFER STORAGE AND RECOVERY



- 1 PROJECT WHERE THEY'RE GOING TO PUT EXTRA WATER INTO THE
- 2 GROUNDWATER BASIN IN WET YEARS AND IN THE DRY YEARS THEY'RE
- 3 GOING TO BE ABLE TO PULL THIS WATER OUT. RIGHT NOW PERMITTING
- 4 FOR EMERGENCY USE FOR DROUGHT SUPPLY GOAL IS TO EXPAND FROM 1
- 5 MILLION GALLONS PER DAY TO 10 MILLION GALLONS PER DAY WE'RE
- 6 WORKING WITH WATER UTILITIES TO HELP LOOK BEYOND TYPICAL WAYS
- 7 OF SERVING WATER AND LOOKING AT WHAT WE'RE DOING HERE IN THE
- 8 BAY AREA SO WE CAN HAVE A MORE RESILIENT WATER SUPPLY. I WANT
- 9 TO TALK ABOUT COLLABORATION, BEING KEY TO WHAT THIS MEETING IS
- 10 ABOUT. COLLABORATING, I ENJOYED HEARING UPDATES FROM THE
- 11 VARIOUS AGENCIES THIS MORNING AND REALLY AS WE ADDRESS CLIMATE
- 12 CHANGE PROTECTING SAN FRANCISCO BAY SHORELINES, DEALING WITH
- 13 RISING TIDES GROUNDWATER AND ALSO MAKING SURE CALIFORNIA HAS A
- 14 RESILIENT WATER SUPPLY FOR THE FUTURE IS REALLY COLLABORATION,
- 15 WORKING WITH THE SCIENTISTS, THE REGULATORS, THE NON-PROFITS
