13	HYBRID FORMAT WILL CONTINUE TO BE PROVIDED TO ALLOW MEMBERS OF
14	THE PUBLIC TO PARTICIPATE VIRTUALLY IF THEY SO CHOOSE. AS
15	BEFORE, YOU WILL BE COMPENSATED FOR YOUR TRAVEL COST AND
16	REFRESHMENTS WILL BE PROVIDED TO MEMBERS WHO PARTICIPATE IN-
17	PERSON. FOR THOSE CONSIDERING USING THE AUTHORITY PROVIDED IN
18	ASSEMBLY BILL 2449, MORE GUIDANCE WILL BE PROVIDED THAT
19	FEBRUARY'S MEETING KEY POINTS THE PUBLIC CAN PARTICIPATE AS WE
20	WILL BE USING A HYBRID FORMAT. THE PUBLIC WILL STILL BE ABLE

- 9 OPERATIONALIZE LAST YEAR WITH THE HELP OF A \$20 MILLION STATE
- 10 GRANT. SO WE HAVE BEEN WORKING HARD THESE LAST 12 MONTHS WE
- 11 HAVE HIRED SIX STAFF, INCLUDING MYSELF, WE HAVE PRESENTED OUR
- 12 DRAFT EOUITY FRAMEWORK AND A FUNDING PROGRAM IS PART OF OUR
- 13 BUSINESS PLAN TO THE BAHFA OVERSIGHT AND ABAG JOINT HOUSING
- 14 COMMITTEES YESTERDAY. WE HAVE A NINE MEMBER ADVISORY COMMITTEE
- 15 WORKING WITH US WHICH IS GREAT. THEY JUST MET THIS WEEK. WE
- 16 LAUNCHED A LOW AND MIDDLE INCOME AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- 17 PRESERVATION PROGRAM USING TAX ABATEMENTS AND HAVE CLOSED FOUR
- 18 DEALS WE HAVE DESIGNED DEVELOPMENT LENDING FOR HOUSING AND
- 19 PLANNING USING STATE FUNDS EXPECT TO LAUNCH SECOND QUARTER OF
- 20 THIS YEAR AND APPLIED FOR COMPETITIVE GRANTS FOR INNOVATION
- 21 LAB IN THE SAN FRANCISCO ACCELERATOR FUND TO CREATE BAY AREA
- 22 BUILDERS LAB THAT WILL ADVANCE NEW TECHNOLOGIES TO REDUCE
- 23 COSTS AND FUND INDUSTRIALIZED CONSTRUCTION. WE HAVE LAUNCHED
- 24 FIVE PILOTS IN ALL OUR DOORWAY AFFORDABLE HOUSING PORTAL JUST
- 25 LAUNCHED A GOOGLE FELLOWSHIP THIS WEEK. WE HAVE 13 AMAZING



- 1 GOOGLE ENGINEERS AND DESIGNERS AND PROJECT MANAGERS. THEY'RE
- 2 WORKING ON THE DESIGN OF OUR PORTAL THAT WILL SERVE ALL NINE
- 3 COUNTIES. WE WORKED WITH ENTERPRISE COMMUNITY PARTNERS TO
- 4 CREATE A BAY AREA AFFORDABLE HOUSING PIPELINE DATABASE. SO WE
- 5 KNOW NOW THAT THERE ARE CURRENTLY 33,000 AFFORDABLE UNITS IN
- 6 SOME STAGE OF PREDEVELOPMENT BUT WHICH HAVEN'T SECURED ALL
- 7 FUNDING THEY NEED TO GET TO CONSTRUCTION. AND WE ARE WORKING
- 8 ON CREATING RESEARCH, OUTREACH, AND COLLABORATIVE PARTNERSHIPS
- 9 TO SET THE STAGE FOR BETTER DELIVERY OF ASSISTANCE TO UNHOUSED
- 10 PEOPLE AND BETTER WAYS WE CAN PREVENT DISPLACEMENT ACROSS THE
- 11 REGION. NEXT SLIDE. AND OVER THE PAST YEAR WE HAVE ALSO BEEN
- 12 CONDUCTING EXTENSIVE OUTREACH AND MEETING WITH STAKEHOLDERS
- 13 ACROSS THE BAY AREA REGARDING BAHFA AND THE WORK THAT WE CAN
- 14 DO TOGETHER. THIS HAS INCLUDED CONVENING AN 11-MEMBER EQUITY
- 15 WORKING GROUP TO HELP US CREATE OUR BUSINESS PLAN AND EQUITY
- 16 FRAMEWORK. WE HAVE HAD MULTIPLE MEETINGS FROM HOUSING STAFF
- 17 FROM ALL NINE COUNTIES HAD DOZENS OF MEETINGS WITH
- 18 STAKEHOLDERS SUCH AS ADVOCATES AND HOUSING DEVELOPERS. WE HAVE
- 19 MADE MANY PRESENTATIONS AT CONVENINGS SUCH AS HOUSING -- SORRY
- 20 -- COUNTY HOUSING COLLABORATIVES AT HOUSING CONFERENCES, AND
- 21 JURISDICTION SPECIFIC MEETINGS SUCH AS THE ALAMEDA COUNTY
- 22 CONFERENCE OF MAYORS AND THE TRI-VALLEY AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- 23 COMMITTEE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AND BAHFA IS THE BENEFICIARY OF
- 24 A DEEP AND WIDE NETWORK OF SUPPORTERS, AS MANY OF YOU MAY
- 25 KNOW. WE ARE PRINCIPALLY ENGAGED WITH THE BAY AREA HOUSING FOR



- 1 ALL COALITION OR BAHA THAT IS WORKING ON STATE CONSTITUTIONAL
- 2 AMENDMENTS THAT WOULD LOWER THE VOTER THRESHOLD ON AFFORDABLE
- 3 HOUSING GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FROM 2/3 TO EXPAND ELIGIBLE
- 4 USES OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND PLANS TO ENABLE ASSISTANCE TO
- 5 UNHOUSED AND VULNERABLE. NEXT SLIDE. IN 2023 BAHFA WILL
- 6 CONTINUE AND EXPAND THIS OUTREACH INCLUDING PRESENTATIONS TO
- 7 ALL THE REGION'S BOARDS OF SUPERVISORS, ALL THE CONFERENCES OF
- 8 MAYORS, CITY COUNCILS, ESPECIALLY THOSE IDENTIFIED IN OUR
- 9 ENABLING LEGISLATION AS BEING ABLE TO RECEIVE THEIR OWN
- 10 FUNDING ALLOCATIONS, AND, IN ADDITION, WE WILL BE VERY
- 11 RESPONSIVE TO REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION THAT WE EXPECT TO GET
- 12 FROM A VARIETY OF DIFFERENTLY ORGANIZATIONS, SUCH AS THE
- 13 LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS, JUST TO NAME ONE, AND IN FACT WE HAVE
- 14 A PENDING PRESENTATION SCHEDULED WITH THE MARIN BRANCH OF THE
- 15 LEAGUE IN MARCH. WE LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH ALL OF YOU AS
- 16 WE CONTINUE THIS OUTREACH. NEXT SLIDE. AND, AGAIN, THIS
- 17 OUTREACH WILL TAKE PLACE OVER THE NEXT MANY MONTHS WHILE WE
- 18 ALSO FINALIZE OUR EQUITY FRAMEWORK AND OUR BUSINESS PLAN. AND
- 19 THE PILOT WORK AND ALL THE OTHER WORK THAT I DESCRIBED
- 20 EARLIER. AND WITH THAT, I WILL HAND IT BACK TO REBECCA LONG TO
- 21 SAY MORE ABOUT RELEVANT LEGISLATION. THANK YOU.

- 24 PROVIDE, FOR YOU, THE BIG PICTURE, SNAPSHOT OF BOTH THE
- 25 TIMELINE ON THE HOUSING SIDE, AS WELL AS THE TRANSPORTATION

- 10 DONE AND HOW THE PROCESS WOULD WORK. SO WE DO WANT TO SOLICIT
- 11 FEEDBACK. WE OBVIOUSLY CAN'T -- WE HAVE TO BE A PROVIDER OF
- 12 NEUTRAL INFORMATION ON THESE ISSUES. SO, BUT, YES, WE WOULD BE
- 13 PROVIDING VERY MUCH MORE DETAILED INFORMATION ABOUT THE
- 14 FUNDING, HOW IT WOULD WORK, WHAT THE FUNDING WOULD GO TO, AND
- 15 THEN WE WANT TO HEAR FROM PEOPLE ABOUT THEIR -- THE HOUSING

- 21 AGENCIES WILL ACT ON. SO, IF I MAY SUGGEST ONE THING TO
- 22 CONSIDER, PERHAPS IT WOULD BE A SPECIAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY THAT
- 23 COULD BE A WEBINAR FOR DELEGATES AND HOLE GOVERNMENT
- 24 OFFICIALS. MY RECOLLECTION FROM WHEN WE PRESENTED TO THE
- 25 GENERAL ASSEMBLY LAST SUMMER IS THERE WAS A DESIRE ON THE

- 2 THAT'S THE KIND OF INPUT THAT WE WANT TO HEAR FROM LOCAL

- 4 THAT'S ONE IDEA THEN WE HAVE A REGION FALL PLANNING COMMITTEE
- 5 MADE UP OF NOT JUST ELECTED OFFICIALS BUT ALSO STAKEHOLDERS,
- 6 SOME BUSINESS, LABOR, HOUSING, ENVIRONMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS.
- 7 THAT'S I THINK KIND OF A GOOD REPRESENTATIVE STAKEHOLDER GROUP
- 8 THAT IT MAY BE WORTH CONSIDERING PRESENTING TO YOU, AS WELL.
- 9 SO I JUST WANTED TO PUT OUT THOSE IDEAS FOR STAFF'S
- 10 CONSIDERATION. THANK YOU. AND I SUPPORT THE PROPOSED OUTREACH
- 11 PLAN. COMMISSIONER SPERING?

IT'S NOT A ONE SIZE FITS ALL, AT ALL. SO 17 WHAT WE WANT TO DO, WE DEFINITELY WANT TO BE WORKING WITH YOU 18 ALL AS OUR PARTNERS, AND AS MAYOR ARREGUIN SAID, AND 19 COMMISSIONER SPERING SAID, IN INTRODUCING US TO JURISDICTION 20 21 STAKEHOLDERS, THAT, YOU KNOW, COMING TO THE JURISDICTION, SORT OF, LAYING OUT THE RULES AND PARAMETERS, AND THEN WORKING WITH 22 PEOPLE TO HAVE -- LET THEM UNDERSTAND, LIKE, THERE IS A WIDE 23 VARIETY OF WAYS TO SPEND THE MONEY. SO, WE THINK THAT THERE IS 24

REGIONAL GOAL RETURN TO SOURCE AND EVERYTHING'S GOING TO BE 1 2 DEDICATED AFTER IT PASSES? 3 KATE HARTLEY: THROUGH THE CHAIR, WE ARE DEVELOPING FUNDING 4 5 GUIDELINES AND HAVE ESTABLISHED GOALS FOR BAHFA'S EXPENDITURES RULES THAT APPLY TO THE REGIONAL HOUSING BAHFA'S REGIONAL 6 HOUSING FUNDING ARE DIFFERENT THAN JURISDICTIONS FUNDING BUT 7 8 WE WANT TO PURSUE DENSITY, SCALE, AFFORDABILITY, RACIAL AND SOCIAL JUSTICE SO WHEN WE'RE DEVELOPING OUR FUNDING GUIDELINES 9 WE'RE GOING TO BE MOVING FORWARD PURSUING THOSE PRINCIPLES AND 10 GOALS THAT WE HAVE ARTICULATED IN OUR EQUITY FRAMEWORK AND IN 11 OUR BUSINESS PLANNING PROCESS. BUT 15 16 WE WILL BE WORKING WITH JURISDICTIONS.
