- 4 MS.

- 6 EILEEN WHITE: WHITE GREAT. THANK YOU. I WANT TO BEGIN BY
- 7 THANKING THE RETIRING BOARD MEMBERS FOR YOUR DEDICATED SERVICE
- 8 OVER THE LAST MANY YEARS AND REALLY MODELING WHAT BARC IS
- 9 ABOUT WORKING TOGETHER IS REALLY KEY TO DEVELOPING A BETTER
- 10 FUTURE IN THE BAY AREA AND I WANT TO THANK YOU AS A LIFE-LONG
- 11 BAY AREA RESIDENT FOR EVERYTHING YOU HAVE DONE TO MAKE THE BAY
- 12 AREA BETTER FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO HAVE LIVED HERE OUR ENTIRE
- 13 LIVES. SO I JUST WANT TO THANK YOU. AND I'LL BRIEFLY
- 14 HIGHLIGHT, BECAUSE IT'S GET A LOT OF MEDIA ATTENTION, A LOT OF
- 15 CALLS FROM SACRAMENTO AND THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE TO RESPOND TO
- 16 THE MEDIA IN THE LAST FEW WEEKS BECAUSE OF THE STORM IMPACTS.
- 17 SO I WANT TO BRIEFLY SUMMARIZE BECAUSE IT'S A REGIONAL PROBLEM
- 18 IN THE BAY AREA REQUIRES A REGIONAL SOLUTION AND THERE IS
- 19 SOLUTIONS IN THE WORKS. BUT I THINK YOU ALL KNOW THE
- 20 ATMOSPHERIC RIVER THAT STRUCK ON NEW YEARS EVE AND THE SERIES
- 21 OF STORMS AFTERWARDS CAUSED A LOT OF ISSUES IN THE BAY AREA,
- 22 AND I ALSO WANT TO THANK ALL THE PEOPLE WHO RESPONDED, THERE
- 23 WAS THE EMERGENCY RESPONSE PEOPLE, CALTRANS MAINTENANCE
- 24 WORKERS CLEARING THE ROADS, JUST A LOT OF PEOPLE, IT ENTAILED
- 25 TO BE WORKING NEW YEARS EVE, NEW YEARS DAY TO BE RESPONDING TO



- 1 ALL THESE STORM IMPACTS SINCE WE HAVEN'T HAD A WET YEAR IN
- 2 CALIFORNIA SINCE 2016, 2017. AND WHAT BARC HAS BEEN WORKING TO
- 3 ADDRESS OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS IS CLIMATE CHANGE AND IT'S
- 4 REALLY GREAT BECAUSE WHAT WE'RE GOING TO SEE WITH THE CLIMATE
- 5 CHANGE IS DROUGHTS LIKE WE HAVE SEEN OVER THE LAST SEVERAL
- 6 YEARS AND THEN FOLLOWED BY THESE INTENSE ATMOSPHERIC RIVERS
- 7 AND WE'RE GOING TO BE SEEING A LOT IN THE BAY AREA WE SAW
- 8 SEWER OVERFLOWS FROM DECEMBER 30TH THROUGH JANUARY 3RD WE HAD
- 9 OVER 90 CALLS INTO THE OFFICE OF EMERGENCY SERVICE OF SANITARY
- 10 SEWER OVERFLOW AND UNAUTHORIZED DISCHARGES TO SAN FRANCISCO
- 11 BAY. AND THROUGH JANUARY 4TH AND JANUARY 5TH WE HAD ANOTHER
- 12 SET OF OVER 30 CALLS AND SINCE THEN A COUPLE OF VERY
- 13 SIGNIFICANT UNAUTHORIZED DISCHARGES TO SAN FRANCISCO BAY. THE
- 14 GOOD NEWS IS A LOT OF IT IS STORMWATER MIXED WITH A SMALL
- 15 AMOUNT OF WASTEWATER AND THE REGIONAL BOARD HAS STRICT
- 16 CRITERIA AS FAR AS PUBLIC NOTICING AND CLEANING UP. THE GOOD
- 17 NEWS IS THAT THERE IS SO MUCH STATE AND FEDERAL MONEY BEING
- 18 INVESTED IN THE BAY AREA TO ADDRESS CLIMATE CHANGE IN VARIOUS
- 19 FACETS LOOKING AT SEA LEVEL RISE, WETLANDS RESTORATION AND
- 20 THERE IS A LOT OF MONEY BEING SPENT IN THE BAY AREA ON FIXING
- 21 AGING INFRASTRUCTURE. AND WHAT WE SAW IN THE FIRST THREE WEEKS
- 22 OF THE YEAR WAS A LOT STORMWATER INFILTRATING INTO THE STORM
- 23 WASTE PIPES. STORMWATER MADE ITS WAY INTO THE LITTLE HOLES IN
- 24 THE PIPE, SO A PLANT THAT NORMALLY SEES 50 MILLION GALLONS PER
- 25 DAY SUDDENLY SAW 600 THAT'S BEYOND THEIR STORAGE CAPACITY AND



- 1 MEANWHILE SANITARY SEWER OVERFLOWS INTO MANHOLES IN THE STREET
- 2 AND YOU HAD UNAUTHORIZED DISCHARGES INTO SAN FRANCISCO BAY.
- 3 THE GOOD NEWS IS A LOT OF WASTEWATER AGENCIES ARE INCREASING
- 4 THEIR CAPACITY BUILDING STORAGE BASINS AND THERE IS A BIG
- 5 EFFORT GOING ON IN THE BAY AREA TO FIX THE AGING SEWER PIPES
- 6 SO WHEN WE HAVE THESE BIG STORMS THE WASTEWATER STAYS IN THE
- 7 WASTEWATER PIPES, AND THE STORMWATER STAYS IN THE STORMWATER
- 8 SYSTEM. BUT IT'S AN ONGOING ISSUES IN THE BAY AREA ESPECIALLY
- 9 WITH OUR AGING STORMWATER SYSTEM. I LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING
- 10 WITH BARC AND ALL OF OUR BAY AREA STAKEHOLDERS TO CONTINUE TO
- 11 IMPROVE OUR INFRASTRUCTURE SO THAT WE CAN BE MORE RESILIENT TO
- 12 ADDRESS CLIMATE CHANGE IN THE FUTURE. SO I JUST WANT TO SAY
- 13 THANK YOU.

- 16 TIMELY AND IMPORTANT UPDATE. I WOULD LIKE TO ASK ARE THERE ANY

- 1 THERESE MCMILLAN: GREAT. THANK YOU SO MUCH, CHAIR ARREGUIN.
- 2 AND THANK YOU, BOARD MEMBERS, FOR BEING HERE. YOU KNOW, IT'S
- 3 OUR FIRST MEETING OF 2023, AND THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET CERTAINLY
- 4 KICKED THAT OFF TO A RATHER REMARKABLE START. AND I DON'T WANT
- 5 TO STEAL ANY OF ALLISON'S THUNDER, BECAUSE I'M SURE SHE IS
- 6 GOING TO BE DELVING INTO SOME AT LEAST INITIAL SENSES OF
- 7 WHAT'S HAPPENING ACROSS OUR SHARED SPACES HERE, BUT, YOU KNOW,
- 8 WHETHER IT WAS TRANSPORTATION OR HOUSING OR CLIMATE, THE
- 9 PROPOSALS COMING FROM THE ADMINISTRATION WERE PRETTY CLEAR
- 10 ABOUT THE FUNDING PRESSURES THAT THE STATE ARE FACING, AND,
- 11 YOU KNOW, A POTENTIALLY PAINFUL RESET THAT IS GOING TO HAVE TO
- 12 HAPPEN ACROSS MANY, MANY DIFFERENT DISCIPLINES. SO, YOU KNOW,
- 13 MY ONE MESSAGE -- MY PARTING MESSAGE. [LAUGHTER] -- YOU KNOW,
- 14 TO BARC, IS THAT WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO MAINTAIN A VOCAL AND
- 15 COORDINATED VOICE ABOUT THE CONTINUED INVESTMENTS IN
- 16 TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING AND REGIONAL ADAPTATION AND
- 17 RESILIENCE TO HELP THE PEOPLE OF THE BAY AREA. THAT'S JUST
- 18 GOING TO BE ESSENTIAL. BECAUSE, I THINK, THIS IS A REALLY
- 19 STRESSED TIME WHERE, YOU KNOW, THE TENDENCY IS TO JUMP INTO
- 20 OUR PROTECTIVE LITTLE SILOS, AND I THINK A MESSAGE OF, YOU
- 21 KNOW, OF A COORDINATED APPROACH TO HOW WE, YOU KNOW, GO
- 22 FORWARD IS REALLY GOING TO BE IMPORTANT. SO I THINK BARC WOULD
- 23 BE A CRITICAL SPACE TO HAVE THOSE TYPES OF CONVERSATIONS. ONE
- 24 THING THOUGH THAT'S CRITICALLY IMPORTANT, AND JIM SPERING IS
- 25 HERE TO OFFER COMMENTS ON AS WELL, TRANSIT OPERATIONS IS A



- 1 VERY HIGH FOCUS FOR US AND OUR LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM, BECAUSE
- 2 MANY -- NONE OF OUR OPERATORS HAVE FULLY RECOVERED FROM COVID,
- 3 BUT A NUMBER OF THEM ARE FACING VERY CRITICAL FISCAL CLIFFS,
- 4 BECAUSE THE SAN FRANCISCO REGIONAL ECONOMY HAS LAGGED,
- 5 COMPARED TO MANY MAJOR URBAN AREAS ACROSS THE COUNTRY IN TERMS
- 6 OF COMING BACK AND TRYING TO FIND, QUOTE "A NEW NORMAL" REMOTE
- 7 WORK IN PARTICULAR HAS HAD AN OUTSIZED IMPACT ON TRAVEL
- 8 PATTERNS THAT ARE STILL BEING SORTED OUT. WE DO NOT KNOW HOW
- 9 THAT'S GOING TO BE, YOU KNOW, FINALLY SETTLED. BUT IT'S GOING
- 10 TO BE DIFFERENT. AND OUR TRANSIT OPERATORS, PARTICULARLY THOSE
- 11 THAT SERVED A HEAVY-COMMUTE TRAVEL INTO OUR MAJOR ECONOMIC
- 12 CENTERS, LIKE DOWNTOWN SAN FRANCISCO, YOU KNOW, BART,
- 13 CALTRAIN, THE FERRIES, GOLDEN GATE TRANSIT, OTHERS, ARE BEING
- 14 LOOKING AT CRITICAL LEVELS OF DEFICITS IN THE NEXT 2 TO 3
- 15 YEARS THAT COULD MEAN DEVASTATING IMPACTS TO SERVICE, SERVICE
- 16 CUTS AND THE LIKE. AND AS WE HAVE CONTINUALLY POINTED OUT,
- 17 MANY OF OUR MOST VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES DEPEND ON PUBLIC
- 18 TRANSIT TO ACCESS, YOU KNOW, THEIR CRITICAL, CRITICAL NEEDS.
- 19 SO, YOU KNOW, WITH THAT FOCUS ON A FISCAL CLIFF, WE ARE
- 20 ACTIVELY TRYING -- YOU KNOW, GOING TO BE MAKING THE CASE THAT
- 21 STATE PARTNERSHIP, TO HELP WITH SOME TYPE OF BRIDGE OF
- 22 FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE BRIDGE TO KEEP OUR TRANSIT AGENCIES
- 23 AFLOAT IS A KEY PART OF RELATED TO WHAT WE'RE DOING. IN THIS
- 24 SPACE WE'RE GOING TO JUMP INTO THAT SPACE, PARTICULARLY WITH
- 25 THE VERY UNCERTAIN ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENTS THAT THE STATE OF



- 1 CALIFORNIA IS FACING, WE NEED TO BE PERSUASIVE AND COMPELLING
- 2 THAT WE'RE GOING TO BRING TRANSIT BACK BETTER AND MORE
- 3 RESPONSIVE TO ITS CUSTOMERS THAN, YOU KNOW, BEFORE THE
- 4 PANDEMIC. THIS HAS BEEN SOMETHING WE HAVE BEEN WORKING ON NOW,
- 5 WHAT IS IT GOING TO BE, JIM? LIKE, THREE YEARS, SINCE THE BLUE
- 6 RIBBON TRANSFORMATION TASK FORCE THAT THE COMMISSION PULLED
- 7 TOGETHER THAT JIM CHAIRED AND THAT, YOU KNOW, THAT OUR
- 8 COMMISSIONERS HAVE BEEN, YOU KNOW, REALLY COMMITTED TO FOR A
- 9 LONG TIME. AND PART OF THAT VERY BIG AGENDA OF HOW WE CAN COME
- 10 BACK IN A MUCH MORE CUSTOMER RESPONSIVE WAY, IS DEALING WITH
- 11 THE QUESTION OF BETTER GOVERNING PUBLIC TRANSIT IN THIS
- 12 REGION. WE HAVE 27 DIFFERENT TRANSIT OPERATORS. AND, QUITE
- 13 FRANKLY, LOOKING BACK, WE HAVE NOT DONE THE BEST JOB OF
- 14 COORDINATING SERVICES AND IN INVESTMENTS TO MAXIMIZE THE
- 15 OPPORTUNITY OF WHAT PUBLIC TRANSIT COULD BE. SO, THERE IS --
- 16 WE HAVE BEEN WORKING VERY HARD ON A CONCEPT CALLED REGIONAL
- 17 NETWORK MANAGEMENT, OUR TRANSIT OPERATORS HAVE PRESENTED AN
- 18 UNPRECEDENTED LEVEL OF COOPERATION AND DISCUSSING WHAT THAT
- 19 MIGHT LOOK LIKE AND WORKING WITH US. WE WILL BE TAKING UP --
- 20 WE TOOK UP, AT OUR EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AT MTC, SOME INITIAL
- 21 RECOMMENDATIONS OF, YOU KNOW, WHAT THAT STRUCTURE MIGHT LOOK
- 22 LIKE. IT WILL BE FURTHER DISCUSSED WITH THE COMMISSION INTO
- 23 FEBRUARY. I WON'T BE HERE TO SEE, YOU KNOW, THE END OF THOSE
- 24 DISCUSSIONS, BUT I'LL BE WATCHING, VERY MUCH SO, BECAUSE IT'S
- 25 BEEN SOMETHING PERSONALLY THAT I HAVE BEEN VERY INVOLVED IN



- 1 AND COMMITTED TO. BUT WE SEE IT AS A PACKAGE WITH CONTINUED
- 2 REQUESTS FOR FEDERAL OR STATE ASSISTANCE, IS ALSO A COMMITMENT
- 3 THAT DEMONSTRATES THAT WE'RE GOING TO DO GOOD BY PEOPLE WHO
- 4 NEED PUBLIC TRANSIT THE MOST. I DON'T KNOW, JIM, IF I WOULD
- 5 LIKE TO ADD ANYTHING TO THAT. BECAUSE YOU HAVE CLEARLY BEEN AT
- 6 THE FOREFRONT OF THOSE DISCUSSIONS.

- 8 JIM SPERING: NO, THERESE, I THINK YOU REALLY ILLUSTRATED THE
- 9 CHALLENGE THAT IS AHEAD OF US. BUT I DO WANT TO ADD THAT THE
- 10 FISCAL CLIFF THAT THE TRANSIT OPERATORS ARE FACING ISN'T JUST
- 11 A PROBLEM THEY HAVE. IF THEY DON'T BE ABLE TO ADDRESS THIS
- 12 SHORTFALL IT'S GOING TO HAVE AN IMPACT ON THE BAY AREA'S
- 13 ECONOMY, AND THE TRANSIT DEPENDENT RIDERS ARE GOING TO BE HURT
- 14 THE MOST OF THE JUST ABOUT EVERYBODY ON ZOOM YOU'RE GOING TO
- 15 BE ABLE TO GET THROUGH IT BUT THOSE TRANSIT DEPENDENT RIDERS
- 16 WILL IMPACT THEM IN A VERY STRONG DISADVANTAGED WAY. JESSE HAS
- 17 BEEN PART OF OUR LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY, AND WE HAVE TO REALLY
- 18 MAKE SURE THAT LEGISLATURE AND THE GOVERNOR UNDERSTANDS WHAT
- 19 IS AT STAKE HERE IF WE DON'T FIND THESE OPERATING FUNDS FOR
- 20 THESE OPERATORS AND IF DOESN'T GET RESOLVED IT'S GOING TO
- 21 IMPACT THE ECONOMY OF THE BAY AREA FOR PROBABLY THE NEXT TEN
- 22 YEARS. THERESE THANK YOU FOR LAYING IT OUT, THANK YOU FOR YOUR
- 23 LEADERSHIP. WE FINALLY STARTED PUTTING FOCUS ON THE RIDER AND
- 24 NOT THE OPERATORS BUT WE HAVE TO MAKE SURE THE OPERATORS ARE



- 1 HEALTHY. SO, THANK YOU, THERESE FOR YOUR COMMENTS AND
- 2 LEADERSHIP.

- 4 THERESE MCMILLAN: THANK YOU. JUST A COUPLE MORE THINGS TO
- 5 HIGHLIGHT FOR THIS GROUP. THE BAY AREA REGIONAL ENERGY NETWORK
- 6 KNOWN AS BAYREN IS CELEBRATING TEN YEARS OF HELPING TO CREATE
- 7 A SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES ACROSS THE BAY AREA. I BELIEVE THEY
- 8 HAVE A CELEBRATION AT 375 BEALE TODAY. JUST AMONG OTHER
- 9 REMARKABLE THINGS THAT THE GROUP HAS BEEN ABLE TO ACCOMPLISH
- 10 UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF JENNY BERG HAS BEEN UPGRADING ALMOST
- 11 61,000 HOUSING UNITS IN TERMS OF PROVIDING ENVIRONMENTALLY
- 12 FRIENDLY OPTIONS, AND PARTICULARLY FOR HOMEOWNERS AND RENTERS
- 13 IN ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED AREAS. AGAIN, BACK TO OUR
- 14 CENTRAL GUIDING EQUITY COMMITMENT. SO THAT'S REALLY, YOU KNOW,
- 15 IMPRESSIVE. AGAIN, MAYBE REFLECTING ON EILEEN WHITE'S
- 16 PRESENTATION EARLIER, WE NOTED LAST NIGHT AT THE ABAG MEETING,
- 17 THAT WITH ALL OF THE FLOODING AND ITS DEVASTATING EFFECTS, WE
- 18 WANTED TO NOTE THAT ABAG HAS ONLINE RESOURCES INCLUDING
- 19 FLOODING HAZARD MAPS THAT SHOWS FIVE HELPED YEAR FLOODPLAINS
- 20 AS DESIGNATED BY FEMA AS WELL AS POTENTIAL FLOOD PLANES
- 21 CURRENTLY PROTECTED BY LEVEES. THIS IS JUST CRUCIAL DATA THAT
- 22 OUR CITIES AND TOWNS AND OUR REGION NEED TO LEAN ON, AS AGAIN,
- 23 WE LOOK TO BETTER COORDINATED PLANNING TO PREPARE FOR THE
- 24 THINGS WE KNOW, AND UNFORTUNATELY THE THINGS WE DON'T KNOW IN
- 25 TERMS OF HOW OUR REGIONAL LANDSCAPE IS GOING TO BE IMPACTED



- 1 BY, YOU KNOW, SEVERE WEATHER AND THE RESULTING IMPACTS SUCH AS
- 2 FLOODING. ALWAYS ON THE HOUSING FRONT, IN MID-NOVEMBER, ALL
- 3 HOME, WHO HAS BEEN LEADING A REGIONAL APPROACH TO
- 4 HOMELESSNESS, AND HEAVEN KNOWS THAT IS A HUMAN TRAGEDY WE ALL
- 5 NEED TO COORDINATE AND WORK AROUND, BUT THEY RELEASED A REPORT
- 6 CALLED "BIG MOVES FOR HOUSING AND ECONOMIC SECURITY" WHICH IS
- 7 A SERIES OF PROPOSALS THAT ARE DESIGNED TO INCREASE HOUSING
- 8 AND ECONOMIC SECURITY FOR PEOPLE WITH EXTREMELY LOW-INCOMES IN
- 9 THE BAY AREA, AGAIN, OUR MOST VULNERABLE NEIGHBORS AND IT
- 10 INCLUDES SUPPORT FOR A REGIONAL BOND MEASURE PROPOSED BY THE
- 11 BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY IN CLOSE COLLABORATION WITH
- 12 ABAG, ANOTHER MAJOR PART OF OUR LEGISLATIVE AGENDA GOING
- 13 FORWARD. SO, LOTS OF REALLY IMPORTANT OPPORTUNITIES THAT ARE
- 14 OUTLINED IN THAT REPORT, BUT WILL REQUIRE INTENSE
- 15 COLLABORATION TO BRING TO BEAR. SO, WITH THAT, I WILL CONCLUDE
- 16 MY REMARKS, AND AGAIN, WISH YOU ALL WELL AND MUCH SUCCESS.

- 4 AND AM JEALOUS. SO I WANT TO START TO FOLLOW UP ON THE STORMS.
- 5 TOMORROW IS A KING TIDE. THE HIGHEST TIDE FOR 2023. AND WE
- 6 WERE REALLY FORTUNATE THAT THESE STORMS OCCURRED IN BETWEEN
- 7 THE TWO KING TIDES IN LATE DECEMBER AND IN LATE JANUARY, BUT
- 8 THOSE TWO THINGS COULD VERY EASILY COINCIDE AND CREATE EVEN
- 9 WORSE IMPACTS FOR THE COAST IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY. SO, IF YOU

- 22 OF 2022. SO THAT WAS A HUGE POSITIVE EVENT FOR SAN FRANCISCO
- 23 BAY. WE HAVE BEEN WORKING ON THAT FOR PROBABLY DECADES. SO NOW
- 24 WE HAVE AN OFFICIAL GEOGRAPHIC PROGRAM LIKE PUGET SOUND AND
- 25 THE GREAT LAKES, CHESAPEAKE BAY OTHER PLACES ACROSS THE



- 1 NATION. AND FUNDING FOR THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY PROGRAM AT EPA
- 2 HAS CONTINUED TO RISE, AND THERE WAS 54 MILLION IN FY 2023 FOR
- 3 THAT PROGRAM. HISTORICALLY IT'S BEEN FIVE OR 6 MILLION A YEAR.
- 4 SO, THIS IS GREAT. AND THE CONSERVANCY, WE JUST GOT A \$4
- 5 MILLION GRANT OUT OF THAT POT FOR EVEN LANDING IN HAYWARD. SO
- 6 IT'S ALREADY GOING TO ON THE GROUND PROJECTS, AND WILL
- 7 CONTINUE TO. IN OTHER FEDERAL NEWS, THE CORE OF ENGINEERS

- 14 AND WE CONTINUED TO WORK ON FEDERAL FUNDING FOR THE SOUTH SAN
- 15 FRANCISCO BAY SHORELINE PROJECT, WHICH IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION,
- 16 BUT NEEDS ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS, AND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF
- 17 BELL MARIN KEYS IN MARIN COUNTY, THE SECOND STAGE OF THE
- 18 HAMILTON RESTORATION. SO WE'RE IN -- WE'RE EXCITED ABOUT THE
- 19 FEDERAL FUNDING, THROUGH THE INFRASTRUCTURE ACT, THROUGH THE
- 20 INFLATION REDUCTION ACT, AND SEEING THAT GETTING PUT TO USE IN

- 18 CONTINUE TO MEET REGULARLY AND THEY'RE PREPARING FOR THE
- 19 EXPECTED DESIGNATION AS AN AB 617 COMMUNITY BY CARB ON
- 20 FEBRUARY 22ND. STAFF ARE WORKING WITH COLEADS TO CONDUCT
- 21 OUTREACH WITH COMMUNITY GROUPS IN BAYVIEW-HUNTERS POINT TO
- 22 PRESENT INFORMATION ON THE AB 617 COMMUNITY EMISSION REDUCTION
- 23 PROGRAM. SO BEGIN CONSIDERING MEMBERSHIP IN THAT STEERING
- 24 COMMITTEE AND TO INQUIRE ABOUT PRIORITY AIR POLLUTION
- 25 CONCERNS. SO, THE LAST THINGS I WANT TO REPORT ON RIGHT NOW



- 1 ARE OUR APPLIANCE RULES AND OUR LEGISLATIVE, WHAT WE SEE ON
- 2 THE LEGISLATIVE SIDE. STAFF HAS RELEASED PROPOSED AMENDMENTS
- 3 AND SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION FOR RULES 9-4, AND 9-6 WHICH
- 4 GOVERN NITROGEN OXIDE, NOX EMISSIONS FROM FURNACES AND WATER
- 5 HEATERS IN RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS. NOX EMISSIONS
- 6 IMPACT LOCAL AND REGIONAL AIR QUALITY, AND CONTRIBUTE TO THE

- 6 AGENCIES AS WE LOOK AT THESE REGIONAL AGENCIES, YOU NEED A
- 7 STEERING COMMITTEE I THINK THAT'S MADE UP OF FOLKS FROM THESE
- 8 AGENCIES BECAUSE THAT'S WHERE THE STATUTORY POWER LIES NOT
- 9 WITH BARC, RIGHT? AND THEY UNDERSTAND THAT. SO TELL ME MORE
- 10 ABOUT HOW YOU'RE GOING TO ENSURE THAT THAT HAPPENS, AND WHO IS
- 11 REALLY THE -- IS THERE A THOUGHT TO HAVING A STEERING

- 14 ALLISON BROOKS: I GUESS I'LL STEP IN ON THIS. THERE IS A
- 15 PROJECT MANAGEMENT TEAM WHICH INVOLVES STAFF FROM EVERY AGENCY
- 16 THAT'S A PART OF BARC, AND THEN, ALSO, A MEMBER OF SAN
- 17 FRANCISCO ESTUARY INSTITUTE IS ALSO PARTICIPATES. AND THIS IS

- 25 AGENCIES, BUT EVEN STAFF PEOPLE'S ROLES WITH AGENCIES



- 1 SOMETIMES ARE IN SILOS. THEY MAYBE -- LET'S JUST SAY I'LL TAKE
- 2 BCDC, YOU HAVE FOLKS ON THE PLANNING SIDE MAY BE LESS FAMILIAR
- 3 WITH THE REGULATORY SIDE. FROM THE AIR DISTRICT FOLKS IN
- 4 ENFORCEMENT DIFFERENT THAN FOLKS WHO ARE INVOLVED IN
- 5 RULEMAKING. I THINK YOU NEED TO GO TO THE TOP OF THESE
- 6 AGENCIES IN WORKING WITH THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS AND GENERAL
- 7 COUNSEL WHO ALSO UNDERSTAND, SORT OF, THE REGULATORY OR

- 14 IT'S NOT COMPREHENSIVE AND THOROUGH, THE MAPPING IS NOT GOING
- 15 TO BE ACCURATE, AND IT'S NOT GOING TO BE AS USEFUL. AND, YOU
- 16 KNOW, AND, AGAIN, I SAY IT'S A GREAT PROBLEM, I THINK, HAVING
- 17 MAPPING, BUT, YOU KNOW, I JUST WANT TO UNDERSCORE THAT ISSUE
- 18 AND MAYBE HEAR REPORTS BACK HERE AND TO SEE THE LIST, IF YOU
- 19 CAN -- AGAIN, WHO IS THE LIST OF THIS PROJECT TEAM? WHO ARE
- 20 ALL THOSE INDIVIDUALS? AND MAYBE, YOU KNOW, THOSE OF US WITHIN
- 21 AGENCIES CAN HELP GIVE INPUT INTO MAKING SURE YOU ARE GETTING
- 22 AND IDENTIFYING THE RIGHT FOLKS, BUT I THINK YOU SHOULD BE
- 23 TALKING TO THE LEADERSHIP OF EACH OF THE ORGANIZATIONS, AS
