- 13 NAME IS PHILIPPE FINE THIS IS THE END OF MY FOURTH WEEK IN THE
- 14 JOB AS THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER. I HAVE SPENT MY WHOLE CAREER IN
- 15 ENVIRONMENT AIR QUALITY SCIENCE POLICY STARTING AS AN
- 16 ACADEMIC, WAS A PROFESSOR AT USC FOR A WHILE AND SPENT 15
- 17 YEARS AT THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA VERSION OF THE BAY AREA AQMD
- 18 AND THE SOUTH COAST AOMD WHICH IS ABOUT OVER TWICE THE SIZE AS
- 19 THE BAY AREA AOMD. I GREW UP IN THE BAY AREA AND WORKED TWO
- 20 YEARS IN DC AS AN APPOINTEE FOR THE BIDEN ADMINISTRATION AT US
- 21 EPA AND WAS DOING MOST OF MY PORTFOLIO IN ENVIRONMENTAL
- 22 JUSTICE ISSUES. I'M HAPPY TO BE HERE, GETTING TO KNOW STAFF
- 23 AND BOARD MEMBERS, IT'S GOOD TO MEET YOU. I COULD SHARE MORE
- 24 BUT I DON'T WANT TO TAKE TOO MUCH TIME TODAY. YESTERDAY WAS A
- 25 BIG DAY FOR THE AIR DISTRICT. OUR BOARD PASSED 20 TO ZERO WITH



- 1 ONE ABSTENTION RULE BEGINNING TO PHASE OUT NITROGEN OXIDE
- 2 EMITTING WATER HEATERS AND FURNACES NOT UNTIL 2027 AND 2029
- 3 WITH DIFFERENT COMPLIANCE DATES UPON REPLACEMENT OF YOUR
- 4 EQUIPMENT NEW SALES AND INSTALLATION BENEFITS WILL BE FELT
- 5 OVER TIME. IT WAS A BIG DAY NOW THE HARD WORK BEGINS WE HAVE
- 6 AN IMPLEMENTATION WORKING GROUP TO ADDRESS A NUMBER OF ISSUES,
- 7 ONE OF THE BIGGEST ONES IS MAKING SURE THIS GETS IMPLEMENTED
- 8 EQUITABLY AND THE COST OF THIS UPGRADE WHICH COULD HAPPEN IN
- 9 MANY CASES IS WE'RE ABLE TO HELP WITH COSTS WITH INCENTIVE
- 10 PROGRAMS TAX CREDITS AND OTHER ESPECIALLY FOR LOW-INCOME
- 11 RESIDENTS ON FIXED INCOME RESIDENTS FIRST DEADLINES IN 20272
- 12 YEARS PRIOR TO THAT REPORTING BACK TO THE BOARD ON
- 13 IMPLEMENTATION TRYING TO POOL AND MAKE INCENTIVES EASIER TO
- 14 ACCESS MAKING SURE THEY'RE FOCUSED ON THE RESIDENTS WHO NEED

- 13 SNAPSHOT OF THE CURRENT MOMENT AND ADAPTATION EFFORTS WILL
- 14 CONTINUE TO DEVELOP ESPECIALLY FOR PROJECTS THAT ARE IN EARLY
- 15 PLANNING STAGES OR IN CONCEPTUAL STAGES AND ARE LIKELY TO
- 16 CHANGE AS MORE INFORMATION BECOMES AVAILABLE. STRATEGIES THAT
- 17 ARE NOT ESTIMATED OR ASSUMED WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK ANALYSIS
- 18 PLAY A ROLE IN THE FUTURE ADAPTATION WITHOUT PROTECTION
- 19 BUILDING CODE CHANGES AS WELL AS LOCAL POLICY ADJUSTMENTS IN
- 20 ADDITION THE FUTURE ANALYSIS WILL NEED TO INCLUDE RIVER INE
- 21 AND GROUNDWATER DATA WHEN IT BECOMES REGIONALLY AVAILABLE AND
- 22 WILL NEED TO INCLUDE ADAPTATION PLANS SUCH AS THOSE MADE BY
- 23 UTILITIES IN THE FUTURE. NEXT SLIDE. WE HAVE ADDITIONAL
- 24 FINDINGS AND ANALYSIS TO HIGHLIGHT THE DISTINCTION BETWEEN
- 25 COUNTIES AS WELL AS TO BREAK DOWN NUANCES IN TREMENDOUS OF



- 1 TYPES OF PROJECTS THAT ARE AVAILABLE HERE. THE ANALYSIS HAS
- 2 SHOWN THAT MOST OF THE PLANNED PROJECTS ARE HYBRID IN NATURE
- 3 REPRESENTING A REGIONAL FOCUS ON MULTI-BENEFIT ADAPTATION. AND
- 4 THIS INCLUDES LEVIES AS WELL AS MARSH RESTORATION AND OTHER
- 5 COMBINATIONS OF ADAPTATION FEATURES IN TERMS OF THE COUNTIES,
- 6 ALAMEDA AND MARIN COUNTIES HAVE THE HIGHEST COST ESTIMATES
- 7 WITH THE INFORMATION GATHERED ALIGNING WITH THE ANTICIPATED
- 8 SEA LEVEL RISE VULNERABILITY. NOTABLY ABOUT HALF OF THE
- 9 ESTIMATED VALUE COMES FROM PLACE HOLDERS WHICH WE CREATED TO
- 10 DEVELOP THE COST ESTIMATES WITH SIGNIFICANT IMPLEMENTATION
- 11 GAPS IDENTIFIED IN ALAMEDA, CONTRA COSTA AND MARIN COUNTIES.
- 12 HOWEVER, WHILE IDENTIFYING THIS IMPLEMENTATION GAP IS HELPFUL,
- 13 I WOULD LIKE TO POINT OUT THAT A KEY NUANCE IN THESE COUNTIES
- 14 IS OBSCURED. FOR EXAMPLE, IN MARIN COUNTY WHILE IDENTIFYING
- 15 PACIFIC PROJECTS FOR VULNERABLE LOCATIONS THE COUNTY HAS
- 16 ALMOST NO PLANNING GAPS IN FACT HAS VERY ROBUST AND
- 17 COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING EFFORT. BY CONTRAST IN CONTRA COSTA
- 18 COUNTY THE PLACE HOLDER VALUE REPRESENTS A SIGNIFICANT
- 19 IMPLEMENTATION AND PLANNING GAP. WE ANTICIPATE THAT THESE
- 20 DISTINCTIONS WILL BECOME CLEARER THROUGH FUTURE EFFORTS SUCH
- 21 AS THROUGH THE DEVELOPING SEA LEVEL RISE PLANNING GUIDELINES
- 22 AND BCDC'S REGIONAL SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLAN AS WELL AS
- 23 UPDATING PROJECT INFORMATION AND PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 PLUS AS
- 24 WELL AS EFFORTS BEYOND. NEXT SLIDE. WE HAVE ALSO DEVELOPED AN
- 25 EXISTING SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION REVENUE FORECAST TO



- 1 ESTIMATE HOW MUCH REVENUE THE REGION CAN ANTICIPATE THROUGH
- 2 2050 FROM PUBLIC SOURCES THAT ALREADY EXIST. THE FRAMEWORK IS
- 3 IDENTIFIED NEW PUBLIC FUNDING SOURCES TO ADD TO PREVIOUS
- 4 ESTIMATES IN THIS SPACE, SUCH AS THE ONES IN PLANNED BAY AREA
- 5 2050 AND BCDC'S FUNDING WHITE PAPER ADDING 30 NEW ADAPTATION
- 6 GRANT PROGRAMS THAT WERE IDENTIFIED JUST FROM THE PAST FEW
- 7 YEARS OF STATE AND FEDERAL FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES. HOWEVER,
- 8 DESPITE THE INFLUX OF NEW REVENUE OPPORTUNITIES, ONLY A MALL
- 9 SHARE OF THE BILLIONS IDENTIFIED IN NEW STATE AND FEDERAL
- 10 FUNDS ARE ESTIMATED TO BE AVAILABLE. WHAT THE BAY AREA IS
- 11 LIKELY TO RECEIVE WILL BE WHITTLED DOWN SIGNIFICANTLY WHEN WE
- 12 ASSUME A PORTION FOR STATEWIDE OR NATIONAL FUNDS. ADDITIONALLY
- 13 MOST OF THE NEW 30 FUNDING LINE ITEMS ARE NOT SPECIFIC TO SEA
- 14 LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION BUT MAY REPRESENT A SEA LEVEL RISE
- 15 ADAPTATION NEED SUCH AS WILDFIRE SO THE REGION REVENUE MOTHER
- 16 BE FURTHER FILTERED DOWN, WHEN THESE LIMITATIONS ARE ACCOUNTED
- 17 FOR THE REGION CAN EXPECT ONLY A FRACTION OF THE NEW STATE AND
- 18 FEDERAL FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES IN ADDITION CUTS THAT ARE
- 19 PROPOSED IN THE GOVERNOR'S 2023 BUDGET MAY REDUCE THE BUDGET
- 20 EVEN MORE WITH ESTIMATED OF \$200 MILLION OR EVEN FURTHER WITH
- 21 THE EFFECTS TO THE REGION WITH THIS SIGNIFICANT FINANCIAL
- 22 FUNDING GAP FOR CIVIL RIGHTS ADAPTATION THAT'S ANTICIPATED
- 23 MORE FUNDING WILL BE NEEDED TO COMPLEMENT THE NEAR-TERM
- 24 OPPORTUNITIES THAT WE HAVE SPOTLIGHTED AS WELL AS TO SUPPORT A
- 25 GROWING PIPELINE OF CIVIL RIGHTS ADAPTATION INVESTMENTS IN THE



- 1 FUTURE. AND I'LL PASS IT TO DANA BRECHWALD WHOLE INTRODUCE THE
- 2 NEXT PART OF THE PRESENTATION.

- 4 DANA BRECHWALD: PART OF CLOSING THE GAP WILL BE TO CONTINUE
- 5 INCREASING AVAILABLE REVENUE SOURCES WHILE WE CAN WORK TO
- 6 ADVOCATE FOR INCREASED SHARES OF STATE AND FEDERAL FUNDING
- 7 WE'LL NEED TO RAISE FUNDS LOCALLY AND REGIONALLY TO FUND
- 8 PROJECTS AND MEET MATCH REQUIREMENTS FOR STATE AND FEDERAL
- 9 OPPORTUNITIES. IN THIS CONTEXT WE LOOKED AT EXPLORING NEW
- 10 FUNDING SOURCES AS PART OF THE FRAMEWORK AND WE APPROACH THIS
- 11 AT A HIGH-LEVEL EXPLORATORY WAY INTENDED TO PROVIDE INITIAL
- 12 INSIGHTS TO HELP GUIDE FUTURE RESEARCH AND DISCUSSION IN THE
- 13 YEARS AHEAD. SO FAR WITH THIS MINDSET WE RESEARCHED THREE
- 14 POSSIBLE NEW REVENUE MEASURES AT THE LOCAL COUNTY AND REGIONAL
- 15 SCALES TO UNDERSTAND, FIRST, HOW MUCH FUNDING CAN BE RAISED
- 16 ANNUALLY, POTENTIALLY. WHAT IS THE BOND ISSUANCE POTENTIAL OR
- 17 HOW MUCH COULD DIFFERENTLY FUNDING MEASURES -- MEASURES
- 18 HYPOTHETICALLY RAISE FOR NEAR-TERM PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION.
- 19 AND, LASTLY, WHAT ARE THE INITIAL EQUITY -- IMPLICATIONS?
- 20 SPECIFICALLY, WHERE WOULD THE FINANCIAL BURDEN HIT MOST
- 21 HEAVILY. AND WHILE MANY FUNDING -- OPTIONS COULD POTENTIALLY
- 22 BE UTILIZED FOR SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION SUCH AS SALES TAXES,
- 23 BUSINESS TAXES, AND DEVELOPMENT FEES, MANY OPTIONS WERE
- 24 FILTERED FOR OVERALL FEASIBILITY IN REGIONAL PRECEDENCE AND
- 25 THIS RESULTED IN OUR FOCUS ON PARCEL TAXES, AD VALOREM



- 1 PROPERTY TAXES AND ASSESSMENT DISTRICTS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE.
- 2 SO, OUR HIGH-LEVEL FINDINGS SHOW THAT, SURPRISE THERE, IS NO
- 3 SILVER BULLET, NO SINGLE REVENUE MEASURE IS EXPECTED TO BE
- 4 CAPABLE OF ADDRESSING THE FUNDING GAP SO AS EXPECTED STACKED
- 5 FUNDING APPROACH WILL BE NECESSARY BUT OF THE THREE REVENUE
- 6 TYPES WE REVIEWED PARCEL TAXES AND ADD VALOREM PROPERTY TAXES
- 7 WERE VIEWED AT THE COUNTY AND REGIONAL SCALES LOOKED AT
- 8 ASSESSMENT DISTRICT ON A SUBLOCAL BASIS. FOR EACH WE LOOKED AT
- 9 HIGH-LEVEL FINDINGS AND USED REGIONAL PRECEDENT TO DETERMINE
- 10 CASE STUDIES. PARCEL TAX ARE TYPICALLY FLAT RATE TAX THAT DOES
- 11 NOT ACCOUNT FOR THE VALUE OR SIZE OF THE PROPERTY AND ADD THE
- 12 PROPERTY TAX PROGRESSIVE TAX AT HIGHER ASSESS THE PROPERTY THE
- 13 PAYING MORE HOWEVER PERSPECTIVE 13 LIMITS IN PROGRESSIVE TAXES
- 14 CAN BE AN ASSESSMENT IN DISTRICTS TYPICALLY SPECIFIED WITH
- 15 BENEFITS THAT TAYLOR OR ACCOUNT FOR EQUITY DISPARITIES. CASE
- 16 STUDIES REGIONAL ESTIMATES ASSESSED DISTRICTS WITH CONSULTANT
- 17 SUPPORT WE LOOKED AT EXAMPLE RATES FOR WHAT TAXES COULD
- 18 SUPPORT IF RAISED AND BONDED AT SCALES YOU SEE HERE. YOU WILL
- 19 NOTICE FROM PARCEL TAXES TO ADD VALOREM TAXES POTENTIAL IS
- 20 DIFFERENCE DUE TO AD VALOREM TAXES BEING ABLE TO HAVE HIGHER
- 21 RATE FOR HIGHLY ASSESSED PARCELS AS WELL AS REGIONAL
- 22 PRECEDENCE AGAIN POINTING OUT THE INITIAL REVIEW CASE FOR
- 23 FUTURE RESEARCH AND DISCUSSION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. WE REVIEWED
- 24 INITIAL EQUITY FINDINGS FOCUSED ON WHO PAYS VERSUS WHO
- 25 BENEFITS USING BOTH A GEOGRAPHIC LENS AND A SOCIAL EQUITY



- 1 LENS. THESE FINDINGS FOCUS ON AD VALOREM PARCEL TAXES AS
- 2 THEY'RE MORE LIKELY TO BE SCALED AT COUNTY AND REGIONAL LEVELS
- 3 WITH REGARDS TO GEOGRAPHIC EQUITY SANTA CLARA ALAMEDA AND SAN
- 4 FRANCISCO COUNTIES HAVE THE LARGEST PROPERTY TAX RATE MEANING
- 5 THEY WOULD CONTRIBUTE MOST SIGNIFICANTLY TO BOND REVENUES
- 6 WHILE SAN FRANCISCO AND MARIN COUNTIES HAVE A DISPROPORTIONATE
- 7 SHARE OF RISK OF SEA LEVEL RISE MEANING THEY WOULD BENEFIT
- 8 MOST GREATLY FROM REVENUES. HOWEVER THIS ASSESSMENT OBSCURED
- 9 ADDITIONAL NUANCES FOR EXAMPLE, IN THE CONTEXT OF A REGIONAL
- 10 MEASURE, THE PROTECTION OF KEY INFRASTRUCTURE SUCH AS US-101
- 11 AND SAN MATEO AND MARIN WOULD BENEFIT TRAVELERS REGION-WIDE
- 12 NOT JUST SAN MATEO AND MARIN COUNTIES TAKE AWAY HERE IS USING
- 13 FUNDING MEASURES THAT USE DIFFERENT MEANS OF ASSESSMENT SUCH
- 14 AS ADD AND PROPERTY TAXES WOULD HELP BALANCE THE OVERALL TAX
- 15 BURDEN FOR SOCIAL EQUITY WE IDENTIFIED SOCIALLY VULNERABLE
- 16 AREAS USING BCC'S COMMUNITY VULNERABILITY DATA USING SOCIO-
- 17 ECONOMIC VULNERABILITY INDICATOR, INCOME, RACE. WE FOUND AD
- 18 VALOREM AND PARCEL TAXES BOTH PROVIDE BENEFIT TO MORE SOCIALLY
- 19 VULNERABLE AREAS THAN A FINANCIAL BURDEN [INDISCERNIBLE]
- 20 POPULATIONS TAXES PROVIDE GREATER BENEFIT THAN PARCEL TAXES
- 21 HOWEVER AS PREVIOUSLY MENTIONED THESE ARE INITIAL HIGH-LEVEL
- 22 FINDINGS AND IF A COUNTY OR REGIONAL MEASURE WERE TO BE
- 23 CONSIDERED FOR SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS
- 24 STEPS WOULD NEED TO BE TAKEN FIRST FOR EXAMPLE, IN ADDITION TO
- 25 FURTHER RESEARCH WE WOULD ESTABLISH GUIDING PRINCIPLES TO



- 1 ENSURE MEASURES WOULD BE TRULY EQUITABLE FROM THE PERSPECTIVE
- 2 OF WHO PAYS AS WELL AS WHO PAYS AS WELL AS STRUCTURES AND
- 3 BENEFITS. FOR EXAMPLE, BAY ADAPT PLATFORM CREATING GUIDING
- 4 PRINCIPLES SUCH AS THESE THAT ALREADY HAVE SIGNIFICANT BUY-IN
- 5 FROM THE REGION COULD SERVE AS THE FOUNDATION FOR PRINCIPLES
- 6 LIKE THESE. NEXT SLIDE. SO AS WE CONCLUDE WE WOULD LIKE TO

- 16 DISPARATE IN TERMS OF BOTH ESTIMATED SEA LEVEL RISE COSTS AS
- 17 WELL AS THE LEVEL OF LOCAL PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION DUE TO
- 18 RESOURCE CONSTRAINTS. FINALLY TO FILL THE FUNDING GAP MULTIPLE
- 19 FUNDING SOURCES AND MULTIPLE SCALES WILL BE REQUIRED EVEN WITH
- 20 PRIORITIZING AND PHASING OF ADAPTATION PROJECTS. AND LASTLY
- 21 IT'S CRITICAL TO PRIORITIZE EQUITY AND FUNDING IN ADDITION TO
- 22 CONSIDERING FUNDING APPROACHES THAT REDUCE THE BURDEN ON
- 23 SOCIALLY VULNERABLE AREAS, WE CAN ALSO UTILIZE SHARED
- 24 PRINCIPLES TO ENSURE THAT OUR ADAPTATION DECISIONS ARE MADE
- 25 WITH EQUITY AT THE FOREFRONT. NEXT SLIDE. WHILE IT MAY IT MAY



- 1 SEEM LIKE THE JOURNEY IS AHEAD OF US WE HAVE TAKEN STEPS THE
- 2 SR37 CORRIDOR ADAPTATION IS CURRENTLY IN PLANNING STAGES EAST
- 3 WEST ROUTE CRITICAL FOR THE INTERCONNECTEDNESS OF THE REGION
- 4 CONNECTING NORTH BAY COUNTIES THIS ADAPTATION OF THE CORRIDOR
- 5 IS A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT LED BY LEADERSHIP WITH MTC ACROSS
- 6 THE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AGENCIES CALTRANS IN ADDITION TO
- 7 STAKEHOLDER NETWORK REPRESENTING INTEREST FROM TRANSPORTATION

- 15 NOW FOR ANY POTENTIAL QUESTIONS AND DISCUSSION.

16

- 17 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. AND I'LL LOOK TO
- 18 MY COLLEAGUES ON THE BARC GOVERNING BOARD FOR QUESTIONS OR
- 19 COMMENTS. YES, COMMISSIONER SPERING?

- 21 JAMES P. SPERING: JUST A COMMENT. YOU KNOW, I THINK IT'S
- 22 IMPORTANT THAT WE DO PRESENTATIONS IN EACH ONE OF THE NINE BAY
- 23 AREA COUNTIES AND REALLY TALK ABOUT WHAT THE IMPACT IS GOING
- 24 TO BE WITH SEA LEVEL RISE. YOU KNOW, DON'T -- I DON'T THINK
- 25 THE FUNDING SHOULD BE THE FIRST PART OF THE DISCUSSION. I

- 1 THINK WHAT'S AT RISK SHOULD BE THE EDUCATION PIECE. AND I
- 2 THINK WE NEED TO BUILD AN ADVOCACY FOR SOLVING A PROBLEM, OF
- 3 COURSE, AND THE FUNDING IS PART OF THAT. WE JUST HAVE ONE
- 4 MEASURE AFTER ANOTHER COMING IN FRONT OF US, TRANSPORTATION,
- 5 HOUSING, AND NOW SEA LEVEL RISE. AND I THINK THAT WE HAVE GOT
- 6 TO REALLY, CLEARLY IDENTIFY WHY THIS NEEDS TO BE DONE. AND THE
- 7 OTHER IS THAT, I WOULD HOPE THAT WE WOULD LOOK AT, YOU KNOW,
- 8 MAYBE BY COUNTY, OF COURSE YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE SOME PROJECTS
- 9 THAT ARE MULTI-JURISDICTIONS. BUT, YOU KNOW, THAT -- BUILD
- 10 THOSE ADVOCATES IN EACH COUNTY AND SAY THIS IS SOLANO COUNTY'S
- 11 PROJECT AND THESE ARE THE CITIES THAT ARE INVOLVED IN THIS
- 12 PROJECT INSTEAD OF SAYING WE HAVE 20 PROJECTS. I BELIEVE YOU
- 13 SHOULD DO IT ON A COUNTY-WIDE BASIS THEN THE COUNTY STARTS TO
- 14 UNDERSTAND WHAT'S AT STAKE. BUT I THINK WE REALLY HAVE TO
- 15 EDUCATE OUR LOCAL RESIDENTS AND ELECTED OFFICIALS AS TO WHAT
- 16 REALLY IS THE ECONOMIC IMPACT. AND WHY IT'S IMPORTANT. THE
- 17 OTHER PIECE I HAVE ALWAYS BEEN CONCERNED ABOUT IS THAT YOU CAN
- 18 HAVE ONE JURISDICTION THAT HAS RESOURCES THAT DEAL WITH SOME
- 19 OF THE NEIGHBORING OR CONTIGUOUS TO IT, DOESN'T, AND IF THEY
- 20 DON'T DO IT, THE WORK THAT THE OTHER ONE DID, REALLY IS FOR
- 21 NOT. THAT'S WHY I THINK WE HAVE TO HAVE A REGIONAL PLAN THAT
- 22 SHOWS HOW ALL THESE LINK TOGETHER. AND I THINK THAT'S WHAT
- 23 YOU'RE SAYING HERE IN THE PRESENTATION. SO, YOU KNOW, I JUST
- 24 THINK ABOUT MY COUNTY, THAT I WOULD REALLY LIKE TO SEE SOLANO
- 25 IDENTIFY WHAT AREAS ARE REALLY AT STAKE AND WHAT THE COST IS



- 1 AND, YOU KNOW, JUST MAKE SURE THAT WE GET THE SUPPORT AND
- 2 ADVOCACY. BUT IF WE DON'T MAKE THE CASE, I DON'T SEE YOU
- 3 PASSING ANY MEASURE. BECAUSE THIS -- THE PUBLIC JUST IS NOT IN
- 4 TUNE WITH THIS AS MOST OF US SITTING AROUND IN THE ROOM IS.
- 5 AND SO THOSE ARE MY -- THAT WAS A GREAT PRESENTATION. AND
- 6 THANK YOU. THIS IS VERY GOOD INFORMATION. VERY WELL PRESENTED.
- 7 THANK YOU BOTH OF YOU.

- 9 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. I HAVE A COUPLE OF COMMENTS,
- 10 QUESTIONS, AND I KNOW THERE MAY BE OTHERS. YOU KNOW, OBVIOUSLY
- 11 SOME COMMUNITIES ARE WAY MORE IMPACTED, LIKE, ALAMEDA, FOR
- 12 EXAMPLE. LITERALLY, IS AN ISLAND THAT WILL FACE SIGNIFICANT
- 13 FLOODING UNLESS THERE ARE GRAY OR GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE
- 14 PROJECTS. AND SOME MAY HAVE LESS INTENSIVE IMPACTS. SOME ARE
- 15 FURTHER ALONG IN TERMS OF THEIR PLANNING AND SOME HAVEN'T DONE
- 16 ANY PLANNING. SO WE ASSESS WHERE WE'RE AT REGIONALLY IN TERMS
- 17 OF HOW MANY COMMUNITIES HAVE REALLY UNDERSTOOD WHAT THE
- 18 IMPACTS WILL BE, AND BEGUN TO TAKE STEPS TO PLAN, YOU KNOW,
- 19 FROM A LAND USE PERSPECTIVE, OR MITIGATION PERSPECTIVE.

- 21 DANA BRECHWALD: I THINK THERE IS A NUMBER OF LENSES THAT WE
- 22 HAVE ON THIS. I WOULDN'T SAY WE HAVE A SUPER COHESIVE
- 23 INVENTORY AT THIS TIME. BUT ONE THING THAT WE HAVE LEARNED
- 24 THROUGH THE FRAMEWORK IS THE IMPLEMENTATION GAP AND WE DO HAVE
- 25 A SENSE OF THAT BY COUNTY. IN SOME CASES, WE CAN PARSE OUT



- 1 WEATHER THAT'S RELATED TO PLANNING OR NOT, FOR EXAMPLE, IN
- 2 MARIN BUT IN OTHER CASES, IT'S NOT CLEAR TO US EXACTLY HOW
- 3 MUCH PLANNING HAS BEEN DONE. JUST DUE TO THE METHODOLOGY THAT
- 4 WE USE AND THE RESOURCES THAT WE HAD. HOWEVER, SOME OF OUR
- 5 PREVIOUS WORK, I KNOW AT BCDC, STARTED TO INVENTORY WHO HAD
- 6 DONE ADAPTATION PLANNING, AND THIS EFFORT BUILT OFF OF PART OF
- 7 THAT. BUT, THERE WAS A LOT OF INFORMATION THAT CAME THROUGH
- 8 THAT PREVIOUS WORK THAT WAS HELPFUL. AND, SO, I THINK MORE
- 9 WORK LIKE THAT, I THINK, IN THE FUTURE, WILL BE NEEDED TO
- 10 REALLY GET A SENSE OF WHAT'S GOING ON AT THE FULL REGIONAL
- 11 SCALE.

- 13 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: I THINK THAT TIES INTO WHAT WE'RE DOING
- 14 IN TERMS OF THE GRANTS, THE PLANNING GRANTS THAT HOPEFULLY WE
- 15 CAN LEVERAGE STATE RESOURCES TO PROVIDE. AND I THINK THAT DOVE
- 16 TAILS WITH WHAT COMMISSIONER SPERING HAD SAID, WHICH IS REALLY
- 17 TALKING ABOUT THE PROBLEM AND, MEAN, THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF
- 18 DISCUSSION ABOUT STATE ROUTE 37 OBVIOUSLY, BUT THERE ARE
- 19 OTHER, YOU KNOW, MAJOR FREEWAYS, TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS THAT
- 20 WOULD BE DIRECTLY IMPACTED, AND OBVIOUSLY THAT'S PART OF THE
- 21 BROADER BAY ADAPT IMPLEMENTATION, BUT I DO THINK THAT'S REALLY
- 22 GOING TO BE KEY TO BUILDING THE AWARENESS AND SUPPORT FOR
- 23 SOME, SORT OF, FUTURE REGIONAL EFFORT IF WE HAVE TO PUT A
- 24 MEASURE TO THE BALLOT. I HAVE A QUESTION FOR MAYBE, IS KATE ON
- 25 THE CALL? KATE HARTLEY? AROUND HOW WE INTEGRATE THIS, OR



- 1 BROADER RESILIENCE INTO THE BAHFA MEASURE? I KNOW IF THERE IS
- 2 A TRANSPORTATION MEASURE IN THE FUTURE IT MAKES COMPLETE SENSE
- 3 BECAUSE HOW ARE WE GOING TO FUND STATE ROUTE 37 OR OTHER
- 4 PROJECTS ON THE PENINSULA, OR IN SOLANO COUNTY, BUT I'M
- 5 CURIOUS ABOUT WHAT WHERE THERE MIGHT BE A NEXT TO US THIS, A
- 6 BROADER RESILIENCE IN THE HOUSING CONVERSATION.

- 8 KATE HARTLEY: MAYOR ARREGUIN, I AM GOING TO PROVIDE A
- 9 PRESENTATION IN A MINUTE AND TALK ABOUT THAT. I THINK, AS
- 10 COMMISSIONER SPERING SAID, WE DO NEED TO THINK ABOUT HOUSING
- 11 AND LOCATION OF HOUSING. AS A RESILIENCE EFFORT, AS A CLIMATE
- 12 CHANGE EFFORT. BECAUSE AS HOUSING UNAFFORDABILITY DRIVES LOW-
- 13 INCOME HOUSEHOLDS FARTHER AND FARTHER AWAY FROM JOBS HUNTERS,
- 14 YOU ARE DOING DAMAGE TO THE ACHIEVEMENT OF OUR ENVIRONMENTAL
- 15 GOALS BECAUSE PEOPLE ARE IN THEIR CARS AND IT'S GENERATING
- 16 GREENHOUSE GASES. SO WITH RESPECT TO HOUSING, OUR INVESTMENTS
- 17 WILL BE VERY LOCATIONALLY SENSITIVE TO THE RESILIENCY GOALS.
- 18 WE WANT TO WORK WITH OUR COLLEAGUES TO ENSURE THAT WE
- 19 UNDERSTAND AREAS THAT ARE AT RISK, AND MAKE OUR INVESTMENTS
- 20 ACCORDINGLY. AND THEN ALL THE WORK THAT WE DO WILL BE TRANSIT
- 21 ORIENTED, AND WILL REQUIRE A CERTAIN ENVIRONMENTAL STANDARDS
- 22 IN THE BUILDING MATERIALS AND BUILDING DESIGN. SO, THERE IS
- 23 GREAT OVERLAP, BUT, ALSO, THE BULK OF OUR RESOURCES MUST GO TO
- 24 PROVIDING HOUSING THAT IS NEEDED, AS I'LL TALK ABOUT IN MY



- 1 PRESENTATION. BUT THERE IS GREAT OPPORTUNITY FOR COLLABORATION
- 2 IN TERMS OF LOCATION AND TYPES OF HOUSING THAT WE BUILD.

- 4 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: OKAY. I'M GOING TO STOP THERE.
- 5 COMMISSIONER EISEN?

- 7 REBECCA EISEN: THANK YOU. I HAD A QUESTION, DANA, ABOUT THE
- 8 PROJECTS THAT YOU LISTED THAT ARE ONGOING, TWO OF WHICH ARE
- 9 LEVIES, AND FOLLOWING UP ON JIM'S COMMENT ABOUT CONTIGUOUS
- 10 MUNICIPALITIES. IF ONE SOLUTION IS TO BUILD A LEVY HERE, DOES
- 11 NOT IMPACT THE SEA LEVEL RISE IMPACTS ELSEWHERE? AND, IF SO,
- 12 HOW DOES THAT GET ACCOUNTED IN, WHEN YOU'RE TRYING TO
- 13 DETERMINE WHERE THE NEEDS ARE FOR THE -- WHERE THE REVENUES
- 14 ARE, ET CETERA?

- 16 DANA BRECHWALD: IT CAN, YOU HAVE TO STUDY THE HYDRO DYNAMICS
- 17 OF THE LEVY AND HOW IT BASICALLY PUSHES WATER FROM ONE TO
- 18 ANOTHER. IT DEPENDS ON THE TYPE OF LEVY, IF IT'S A LIVING LEVY
- 19 AND IT REDUCED WAVE ACTION BECAUSE IT HAS ENOUGH OF A SLOPE
- 20 AND IT ATTENUATES THE WAVE ACTION THAT OBVIOUSLY HAS LESS OF
- 21 AN IMPACT THAN SOMETHING LIKE OBVIOUSLY, A SEA WALL. AND I
- 22 THINK THIS HAS TO DO, ALSO, WITH THE REGIONAL SHORELINE
- 23 ADAPTATION PLAN AND THE TYPES OF -- OF INTERVENTIONS THAT WE
- 24 WOULD LIKE TO ENCOURAGE PEOPLE TO TAKE TO ACCOUNT FOR IN THEIR
- 25 ADAPTATION PLANNING, AS WELL AS THE TYPES OF STUDIES THAT WE



- 1 THINK ARE BEST PRACTICES TO ACCOUNT FOR IMPACTS TO NEIGHBORS.
- 2 THE ULTIMATE GOAL IS THAT WE SOMEHOW USE THE GUIDELINES THAT
- 3 ARE BEING DEVELOPED IN THE REGIONAL SHORELINE ADAPTING A PLAN
- 4 IN CONJUNCTION WITH WHATEVER FUNDING MEASURES WE END UP USING
- 5 SO THAT WE HAVE A SET OF CRITERIA THAT WE KNOW THAT THEY HAVE
- 6 MET THAT ENSURE THAT, YOU KNOW, WHATEVER PLANNING, WHATEVER
- 7 PROJECTS PEOPLE HAVE PLANNED ARE IN ALIGNMENT WITH THIS SET OF
- 8 REGIONAL VALUES AND GOALS, AND THEY FOLLOW, SORT OF, THE BEST
- 9 PRACTICES THAT ENSURE THAT THE PROJECTS MEET BOTH LOCAL NEEDS
- 10 AS WELL AS THESE CONSIDERATIONS THAT WE HAVE FOR THE REGION.
- 11 SO, THAT'S -- YOU KNOW, WHEN I SPOKE ABOUT GUIDING PRINCIPLES
- 12 OR SOME, SORT OF, A VALUE SET THAT WE THINK SHOULD BE ALIGNED
- 13 WITH WHAT -- IF WE DO END UP PROPOSING SOME, SORT OF, REGIONAL
- 14 FUNDING MEASURE, IT IS -- THAT'S PART OF THE SET OF PRINCIPLES
- 15 OR GUIDING VALUES THAT WE NEED TO DETERMINE ALONG WITH THE
- 16 FUNDING MEASURE, WHICH HOPEFULLY WE -- WE HAVE A GET SET THAT
- 17 WE HAVE THROUGH BAY ADAPT AND WE CONTINUE TO DEVELOP THOSE
- 18 THROUGH THE REGIONAL SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLAN GUIDELINES SO
- 19 WE WOULD HAVE THAT READY-MADE AND BE ABLE TO ALIGN THAT WITH
- 20 WHERE WE DIRECT FUNDING FIRST.
- 22 REBECCA EISEN: THAT MAKES A LOT OF SENSE, AND OBVIOUSLY ARGUES
- 23 FAIR REGIONAL APPROACH TO THESE PROBLEMS WHICH IS WHAT YOU'RE
- 24 UNDERTAKING.

- 3 ZACK WASSERMAN: THANK YOU. EXCELLENT PRESENTATION. TO THE VERY
- 4 HONORABLE JIM SPERING'S COMMENTS, ABSOLUTELY IMPORTANT. WE
- 5 NEED TO CARRY THIS TO THE COUNTIES AND THE CITIES AND WE
- 6 ABSOLUTELY NEED TO FOCUS ON THE PROJECTS THAT ARE NEEDED. AND
- 7 THE DAMAGE THAT WILL OCCUR IF THOSE PROJECTS ARE NOT CREATED.
- 8 AND JUST TO DO A CONTRAST FROM THE SLIDES WE SAW, OR THAT
- 9 FLASHED ON OUR SCREEN, THERE IS AN ESTIMATED \$110 BILLION
- 10 COST. THERE IS AN ESTIMATED \$236 BILLION DAMAGE IF WE DON'T DO
- 11 THAT. IT'S OBVIOUSLY NOT ONE FOR ONE IN MANY WAYS, AND, OH, BY
- 12 THE WAY, THE 236 IS CLEARLY LOCAL, BECAUSE IT'S BASED ON
- 13 ASSESSED VALUES. AND AS WE ALL KNOW, IN A NUMBER OF
- 14 CIRCUMSTANCES, ASSESSED VALUES ARE MUCH LOWER THAN TRUE VALUES
- 15 AND REPLACEMENT VALUES. SO, THE -- AND THE ROLL OUT OF ALL
- 16 THIS, CONTINUING ROLL-OUT, IS OF CRITICAL IMPORTANCE, AND WE
- 17 HAVE ACTUALLY GOT A CALL LATER THIS AFTERNOON TO TALK ABOUT
- 18 HOW WE'RE GOING TO DO THAT AND AS DEMONSTRATION OF FURTHER,
- 19 VERY IMPORTANT COOPERATION AND COLLABORATION, MTC IS, IN
- 20 ADDITION TO WHAT YOU HAVE SEEN IN COOPERATION, ALSO IS HELPING
- 21 US WITH SOME OF THEIR PUBLIC INFORMATION OFFICER RESOURCES,
- 22 WHICH WE DO NOT HAVE. [LAUGHTER] SO, YOU'RE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT.
- 23 WE ARE WORKING ON IT. WE'RE MAKING PROGRESS. BUT WE HAVE GOT A
- 24 HUGE AMOUNT OF WORK TO DO. THANK YOU. AND THIS IS A VERY
- 25 IMPORTANT STEP FORWARD.

- 13 THE ABSENCE OF DOING SOMETHING REGIONALLY, HERE IS WHAT'S
- 14 GOING HAPPEN SUBREGIONALLY, THE INSURANCE COMPANIES ARE GOING
- 15 TO START SEEING, AT SOME POINT, THE RISK. ONCE THE INSURANCE
- 16 COMPANY STARTS SEEING THE RISK, MUCH LIKE WE'RE SEEING IN THE
- 17 FIRE INSURANCE, HIGH FIRE SEVERITY ZONES, THEY'RE GOING TO
- 18 REACT. AND THE REACTION WILL THEN BECOME, THROUGH INSURANCE
- 19 COMPANIES OF, WE'RE NOT GOING TO ENSURE THAT ANYMORE. ONCE
- 20 THAT HAPPENS YOU HAVE PEOPLE SCRAMBLING FOR THEIR FEMA
- 21 INSURANCE OR WHATEVER VERSION IS AVAILABLE, WITHOUT FLOOD
- 22 INSURANCE OR INSURANCE THAT COVERS YOUR PROPERTY, MORTGAGE
- 23 COMPANIES WON'T WIN. SO PEOPLE CAN'T BUY A NEW HOME, OR CAN'T
- 24 REFINANCE THEIR HOME. BUT EVEN MORE SCARY IS, WITHOUT
- 25 INSURANCE, IN THEY FIND OUT AN EXISTING MORTGAGE DOES NOT HAVE



- 1 INSURANCE, THEY CAN FORCE THE ISSUE AND TECHNICALLY RECLAIM,
- 2 FORE CLOSING THE PROPERTY. SO THIS IS NOT JUST AN ARCANE,
- 3 WELL, COULD THIS HAPPEN ISSUE, WHICH I KNOW NOBODY HERE THINKS
- 4 THAT, BUT THIS COULD HAPPEN SOONER THAN WE THINK. VERY SEVERE
- 5 FINANCIAL EFFECTS THAT I DON'T THINK HAVE BEEN MENTIONS OR
- 6 CONTEMPLATED YET. AND IT WILL HAPPEN SOONER RATHER THAN LATER.
- 7 AS WE'RE SEEING WITH THE FIRE INSURANCE ISSUES. THANK YOU. AND
- 8 THAT'S MY COMMENT.

- 11 QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS FROM GOVERNING BOARD MEMBERS ON THE

- 18 REPRESENTATIVES. ARE WE GOING TO GO WITH WALLS SUCH AS WHAT
- 19 FOSTER CITY DID OR TRY TO GO WITH AN ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY
- 20 ECO TONE WHICH IS WHAT THEY'RE WORKING ON IN NORTH RICHMOND AS
- 21 WE MOVE FORWARD. WHERE ARE WE GOING TO GET THE RAILROADS
- 22 INVOLVED IN THIS STUFF ONCE YOU TAKE THAT TRIP TO CAPITAL
- 23 CORRIDOR YOU REALIZE THE RAILROAD IS THE BARRIER FOR SEA LEVEL
- 24 RISE IN A LOT OF AREAS AND THEY'RE DISCOVERING SOUTHERN
- 25 CALIFORNIA RAILROADS HAVE SOME OF THE PROBLEMS IN TERMS OF



- 1 DOING THAT. AND FIGURING OUT EXACTLY WHAT IS THE PROBABILITY
- 2 OF PROJECTED HEIGHTS PRESENTED. OPC DID SOME PROBABILITIES SO
- 3 WE KNOW WHAT THE PERCENTAGE BASIS IS; IS IT A 5% CHANCE OF
- 4 THAT SEA LEVEL RISE OR 20% CHANCE OF THAT SEA LEVEL RISE
- 5 THAT'S WORTHWHILE TO SHOW TO THE POSSIBLE AT THE SAME TIME.
- 6 THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME AND THANKS FOR THE GREAT WORK.

- 8 CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. ARE THERE ANY OTHER MEMBERS
- 9 OF THE PUBLIC THAT WOULD LIKE TO SPEAK ON THIS ITEM, IF SO
- 10 PLEASE RAISE YOUR HAND. I DON'T SEE ANY OTHER ATTENDEES WITH A
- 11 HAND RAISED. THANK YOU FOR THE PUBLIC COMMENT. THANK YOU FOR
- 12 THE EXCELLENT WORK. THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT TO KIND OF QUANTIFY
- 13 WHAT THE NEED IS, AND I AGREE, I THINK THIS IS GOING TO BE KEY
- 14 TO MAKING THE CASE TO ELECTED OFFICIALS IN COMMUNITIES OF THE
- 15 BAY AREA ABOUT WHY WE NEED TO ADDRESS THIS PROBLEM: SO, THANK
- 16 YOU ALL FOR YOUR WORK. OKAY. WE'LL PROCEED TO THE NEXT AGENDA
- 17 ITEM WHICH IS ITEM EIGHT, THIS IS A PRESENTATION ON THE BAY
- 18 AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY. AND A POTENTIAL REGIONAL
- 19 HOUSING FUNDING MEASURE, AND I WOULD LIKE TO TURN THE FLOOR
- 20 OVER TO OUR BAHFA DIRECTOR, KATE HARTLEY TO PRESENT ON THIS
- 21 ITEM.

- 23 KATE HARTLEY: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. AND IF I COULD HAVE THE
- 24 PRESENTATION LOADED? GREAT. SO, THANK YOU FOR HAVING ME. IT IS
- 25 REALLY GREAT TO BE HERE TO TALK TO YOU ABOUT THE BAY AREA

- 1 HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, OR BAHFA, ESPECIALLY IN THE CONTEXT
- 2 OF PLANNING FOR OUR REGIONAL NEEDS HOLISTICALLY, INCLUDING
- 3 HOUSING, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND SEA LEVEL RISE. MANY BARC
- 4 BOARD MEMBERS WERE INSTRUMENTAL IN CREATING BAHFA. SO, I WANT
- 5 TO THANK YOU, AGAIN, FOR YOUR TREMENDOUS WORK. FOR THOSE OF
- 6 YOU WHO ARE NOT FAMILIAR WITH BAHFA, WE ARE THE STATE'S FIRST
- 7 REGIONAL HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY. WE WERE CREATED IN 2019 BY
- 8 STATE LEGISLATION, AND WE HAVE THE POWER TO RAISE MONEY FOR
- 9 THE ENTIRE NINE COUNTY BAY AREA. THIS IS AN ANTIDOTE TO THE
- 10 FRAGMENTED WAY THAT WE CURRENTLY RAISE HOUSING -- AFFORDABLE
- 11 HOUSING FUNDS. AND OUR PURPOSE IS TO BETTER DELIVER THE
- 12 AFFORDABLE HOUSING THAT THE BAY AREA NEEDS. NEXT SLIDE,
- 13 PLEASE. SO, WHAT EXACTLY IS AT ISSUE? FIRST OF ALL,
- 14 HOMELESSNESS. RIGHT NOW, THERE ARE, ON OUR STREETS AND IN OUR
- 15 SHELTERS, ALMOST 37,000 PEOPLE LIVING WITHOUT A HOME. AND
- 16 BETWEEN 2019 AND 2022, OUR HOMELESS COUNTS ROSE, ACROSS THE
- 17 REGION, APPROXIMATELY 10%. SOME COUNTIES SAW VERY DRAMATIC
- 18 INCREASES, AND ALAMEDA COUNTY IT WAS ABOUT 20%, CONTRA COSTA
- 19 COUNTY, ABOUT 35%. SECONDLY, WE HAVE DONE A VERY BAD JOB FOR A
- 20 VERY LONG TIME OF BUILDING THE HOUSING THAT OUR RESIDENTS NEED
- 21 IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA. THIS, OBVIOUSLY, HAS A DAMAGING
- 22 ECONOMIC EFFECT REGARDING WORKFORCE ATTRACTION AND RETENTION.
- 23 IT DAMAGES OUR COMMUNITIES, WHICH IS DEMONSTRATED VERY STARKLY
- 24 IN RECENT YEARS BY THE STRUGGLE THAT OUR SCHOOL DISTRICTS HAVE
- 25 IN RETAINING THEIR TEACHERS. AND IT HAS SIGNIFICANT

- 1 ENVIRONMENTAL CONSEQUENCES, AS WE HAVE TALKED ABOUT A LOT.
- 2 HOUSING UNAFFORDABILITY FORCES LOWER AND MODERATE INCOME
- 3 PEOPLE TO RELOCATE TO CITIES FARTHER AWAY FROM THEIR JOBS AND
- 4 THIS MEANS THEIR IN THEIR CARS. SO, THERE IS -- THERE IS GREAT
- 5 ENVIRONMENTAL INCENTIVE TO PROVIDE MORE AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- 6 NEAR JOB CENTERS. OUR CURRENT RHNA IS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- 7 ONLY, IT IS AT ABOUT 180,000 UNITS NEEDED OVER THE NEXT EIGHT
- 8 YEARS. AND WE DO HAVE A START ON THIS GOAL. BAHFA COMMISSIONED
- 9 A PIPELINE REPORT ON WHAT THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT
- 10 PIPELINE IS ACROSS THE REGION, AND THAT IS HOW MANY PROJECTS
- 11 ARE OUT THERE THAT ARE IN SOME STATE OF PREDEVELOPMENT, THAT
- 12 IS THEY HAVE MAYBE SECURED LAND STARTED THEIR ENTITLEMENTS BUT
- 13 HAVEN'T SECURED THEIR FUNDING YET AND THAT NUMBER STANDS AT
- 14 ABOUT 33,000 UNITS. IT'S A GOOD START. BUT OUR ABILITY TO
- 15 DELIVER THIS HOUSING WITHOUT FINANCIAL SYSTEMS CHANGED IS
- 16 SUSPECT GIVEN OUR LONG HISTORY OF UNDERPRODUCTION. NEXT SLIDE.
- 17 SO, BAHFA'S ROLE IS TO HELP FILL THAT FINANCING GAP AND TO
- 18 HELP CREATE SYSTEMS THAT CAN BUILD AND PRESERVE HOUSING FASTER
- 19 AND MORE COST EFFECTIVELY. WE CAN RAISE REVENUE ACROSS THE
- 20 NINE COUNTIES FOR THE THREE PS AS WE CALL THEM, PRODUCTION,
- 21 PRESERVATION, AND TENANT PROTECTIONS AND OUR MANDATE REQUIRES
- 22 US TO WORK COLLABORATIVELY WITH CITIES AND COUNTIES. PART OF
- 23 THE COLLABORATIVE EFFORT COMES IN OUR GOVERNING STRUCTURES,
- 24 THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD AND THE BAHFA BOARD, WHICH IS
- 25 COMPRISED OF THE SAME MEMBERS AS THE MTC COMMISSION, SHARE

- 1 GOVERNING RESPONSIBILITIES FOR BAHFA'S ACTIONS. NEXT SLIDE
- 2 PLEASE. WHILE THE PRINCIPLE BENEFITS WE CAN PROVIDE THE BAY
- 3 AREA RESIDE IN OUR FUNDING POWERS, I'LL TAKE A MINUTE TO TALK
- 4 ABOUT WHAT WE HAVE BEEN ENGAGED IN OVER THE LAST YEAR FOR THE
- 5 REGION'S IMMEDIATE HOUSING NEEDS AND BENEFITS. WE HAVE
- 6 LAUNCHED FIVE PILOT PROGRAMS USING FUNDING THAT WE GOT FROM
- 7 THE STATE AT THE END OF 2021. THESE INCLUDE THE DOORWAY
- 8 AFFORDABLE HOUSING PORTAL. IT'S AN ONLINE HOUSING APPLICATION
- 9 PORTAL WHICH WILL ENABLE PEOPLE LOOKING FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- 10 OPPORTUNITIES TO SEARCH FOR AND APPLY FOR HOUSING RIGHT FROM
- 11 THEIR PHONE OR THEIR PERSONAL COMPUTER. THIS IS -- THE HEART
- 12 OF THAT EFFORT IS REALLY TO MAKE LOOKING FOR HOUSING ACROSS
- 13 THE REGION A MORE EQUITABLE ACTIVITY. RIGHT NOW, IF YOU ARE
- 14 LOOKING FOR HOUSING, YOU BETTER HAVE TIME, PERSEVERANCE AND
- 15 ENERGY. AND NOT EVERYBODY HAS THAT TO SPARE. WE COMPLETED AN
- 16 AFFORDABLE HOUSING STUDY IT'S GREAT DATA WHICH WE ARE USING IN
- 17 OUR PLANNING ONE OF THE PS WE'RE PURSUING IS PRESERVATION AND
- 18 THIS IS THE PROCESS OF PROTECTING LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS IN
- 19 THEIR HOMES SO WE ASSIST COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS TO BUY
- 20 AND REHABILITATE EXISTING BUILDINGS AND THEN CONVERT THEM TO
- 21 AFFORDABLE HOUSING. AND AS ONE OF OUR FIRST EFFORTS, WE WILL
- 22 BE LAUNCHING A NOTICE OF FUNDING AVAILABILITY IN THE SUMMER
- 23 WITH MONEY FROM THE STATE REGIONAL EARLY ACTION PLANNING
- 24 GRANTS. AND, FINALLY, WE HAVE ANTI-DISPLACEMENT AND
- 25 HOMELESSNESS PILOTS WE'RE SEEKING TO COORDINATE RESOURCES



- 1 ACROSS THE REGION AND IDENTIFY INEFFICIENCIES AND GAPS AND TRY
- 2 TO HELP BRING THE JURISDICTIONS TOGETHER IN THIS EFFORT TO
- 3 PREVENT HOMELESSNESS AND ADDRESSES HOMELESSNESS. THIS IS A
- 4 PARTICULARLY DIFFICULT ISSUE BECAUSE OF A LACK OF READILY
- 5 AVAILABLE OPERATING SERVICES FUNDING THAT LOW-INCOME,
- 6 EXTREMELY LOW-INCOME, HOUSEHOLDS NEED. RIGHT NOW, WE'RE
- 7 LAUNCHING DATA COLLECTION EFFORTS INCLUDING EVICTION STUDIES.
- 8 SURPRISINGLY THERE IS A HUGE VOID OF INFORMATION ABOUT THE
- 9 PRINCIPLE CAUSES OF EVICTION, AND WITHOUT THAT INFORMATION WE
- 10 CAN'T CRAFT THE BEST SOLUTIONS. SO WE'LL BE WORKING WITH
- 11 CONSULTANTS TO GO INTO THE COURTS TO UNDERSTAND THE DATA SO WE
- 12 CAN WORK TOGETHER WITH THE JURISDICTIONS TO TRY TO TAKE THE
- 13 ACTIONS THAT WILL HELP PREVENT EVICTIONS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.
- 14 BUT BACK TO OUR PRINCIPLE EFFORT THAT IS SECURING THE
- 15 RESOURCES WE NEED TO BUILD THE HOUSING THAT BAY AREA RESIDENTS
- 16 NEED. WE ARE WORKING TO PUT A REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE ON THE
- 17 BALLOT IN 2024. NEXT SLIDE. THE PROJECTED VALUE OF THE
- 18 MEASURE, WHICH WOULD BE A GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND IS BETWEEN
- 19 10 AND 20 BILLION. AND WE ARE FORTUNATE THAT MUCH OF THE
- 20 GROUNDWORK FOR THIS EFFORT IS IN PLACE. WE HAVE OUR ENABLING
- 21 LEGISLATION, HOUSING ADVOCATES AND STAKEHOLDERS HAVE BEEN
- 22 WORKING ON THIS SENTENCE 2020. SO, THERE IS A STRONG CAMPAIGN
- 23 AND FUNDING RAISING EFFORT ALREADY UNDERWAY AND HOUSING
- 24 ADVOCATES ARE ALSO WORKING ON AN INSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT IN
- 25 PARALLEL WITH OUR REGIONAL FUNDING EFFORTS. THIS WOULD LOWER



- 1 THE VOTER THRESHOLD FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING GENERAL OBLIGATION
- 2 BONDS FROM 2/3 TO A MAJORITY. WE ALSO HOPE IT WOULD SLIGHTLY
- 3 INCREASE THE ELIGIBLE USE OF GO BONDS SO THAT WE CAN BETTER
- 4 ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS AND IF WE HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO PUT A
- 5 MEASURE ON THE BALLOT WITH A MAJORITY VOTER THRESHOLD, WE FEEL
- 6 THAT WE COULD DEFINITELY BE SUCCESSFUL. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THE
- 7 MEASURE WE'RE TALKING ABOUT WOULD BE TRANSFORMATIVE, EACH
- 8 JURISDICTION WOULD RECEIVE AN UNPRECEDENTED AMOUNT OF FUNDING
- 9 AGAIN THIS IS A FULL REGIONAL VIEW OF WHAT WE MUST DO TO MEET
- 10 THE HOUSING NEEDS OF OUR RESIDENTS SOME COUNTIES LIKE ALAMEDA
- 11 AND SAN FRANCISCO AND SANTA CLARA HAVE PASSED SUCCESSFUL BOND
- 12 MEASURES IN THE LAST FIVE OR SEVEN YEARS BUT TO PROVIDE THIS
- 13 NEW LEVEL OF RESOURCES FOR ALL NINE COUNTIES WOULD CREATE A
- 14 BRAND-NEW PATHWAY FOR BETTER HOUSING. THIS GRAPHIC SHOWS A WAY
- 15 IN WHICH OUR ENABLING LEGISLATION, WHICH IS ASSEMBLY BILL 1487
- 16 DEFINES THE EXPENDITURE REQUIREMENTS AS I MENTIONED THIS IS IN
- 17 COLLABORATION WITH CITIES AND COUNTIES. 80% OF ALL THE FUNDS
- 18 THAT WE WOULD RAISE GO BACK TO THE COUNTY OF ORIGIN, ACCORDING
- 19 TO ASSESSED VALUE, BAHFA WOULD RETAIN 20%. THE RULES ARE THAT
- 20 THE MAJORITY OF THE MONEY MUST BE SPENT ON NEW PRODUCTION, OR
- 21 AT LEAST 52%. THERE IS ALSO PRESCRIBED EXPENDITURE LEVELS FOR
- 22 AFFORDABLE HOUSING PRESERVATION AND PROTECTIONS. AND THEN,
- 23 FINALLY, A.B. 1487 SAYS THAT CITIES AND COUNTIES SHOULD
- 24 PRIORITIZE PROJECTS THAT ADDRESS THEIR EXTREMELY LOW, LOW-
- 25 INCOME, AND VERY LOW-INCOME RHNA OBLIGATIONS. AND SO WITHIN



- 1 THOSE PARAMETERS, CITIES AND COUNTIES ARE IN CHARGE OF THEIR
- 2 MONEY. THEY RETAIN CONTROL OF THEIR PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS AND
- 3 CAN PRIORITIZE ON THAT LOCAL LEVEL. NEXT SLIDE. OUR WORK WILL
- 4 BE GUIDED BY OUR BUSINESS PLAN AND EQUITY FRAMEWORK THAT IS
- 5 INFORMING OUR BUSINESS PLAN. WE HAVE BEEN AT WORK ON THAT FOR
- 6 THE LAST YEAR. THERE HAS BEEN EXTENSIVE OUTREACH THAT WE
- 7 CONDUCTED AS PART OF THAT, AND WE ARE TAKING THE FINAL
- 8 VERSIONS TO OUR GOVERNING BOARDS FOR APPROVAL IN APRIL AND
- 9 MAY. NEXT SLIDE. AND AN IMPORTANT PART OF OUR EQUITY FRAMEWORK
- 10 IS ADDRESSING CLIMATE CHANGE AND ADDRESSING CLIMATE JUSTICE
- 11 NEEDS. SO THAT THIS MEANS THAT WE WILL BE FOCUSING ON
- 12 INVESTMENTS THAT ARE TRANSIT ORIENTED. WE WANT TO BUILD
- 13 HOUSING THAT IS CLOSE TO TRANSIT THAT REDUCES VEHICLE MILES
- 14 TRAVELED, REDUCES GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS. WE WILL REQUIRE
- 15 THE DEVELOPERS WITH WHOM WE WORK TO USE ENVIRONMENTALLY
- 16 SUSTAINABLE BUILDING METHODS AND DESIGN AND BUILD BUILDINGS
- 17 THAT EXCEED STRONG GREEN BUILDING STANDARDS AND WE, AS I
- 18 MENTIONED EARLIER, WE WILL BE WORKING WITH OUR COLLEAGUES AT
- 19 MTC TO ENSURE THAT WE UNDERSTAND WHAT AREAS ARE AT RISK FROM
- 20 SEA LEVEL RISE, AND SO THAT WE CAN HELP TO MEET THE RESILIENCY
- 21 OBJECTIVES THAT BARC IS WORKING ON. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. OVER
- 22 THE NEXT YEAR AND A HALF WE'LL BE CONTINUING OUR OUTREACH TO
- 23 JURISDICTIONS, TO BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND CITY COUNCILS WE'LL
- 24 HAVE PUBLIC TOWN HALL MEETINGS, WE'LL BE WORKING IN
- 25 COLLABORATION WITH STAKEHOLDERS WE'LL BE PREPARING OUR



- 1 EXPENDITURE PLANS AND OTHER BALLOT REQUIREMENTS THAT WE'LL BE
- 2 TAKING TO OUR GOVERNING BOARDS FOR APPROVAL AND WE ALSO LOOK
- 3 FORWARD TO WORKING WITH BARC AND CREATING ENVIRONMENTALLY
- 4 SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENTS THAT ADDRESS BOTH CRITICAL HOUSING
- 5 NEEDS AS WELL AS CLIMATE CHANGE. NEXT SLIDE. THAT CONCLUDES MY

- 22 SUPERVISOR, WE PUT PEOPLE IN HOUSING THEY DON'T STAY THERE
- 23 BECAUSE MENTALLY THEY'RE NOT CAPABLE OF UNDERSTANDING THAT AND
- 24 INTO DRUG ADDICTION SO YOU KNOW I THINK IF WE'RE GOING TO GET
- 25 PUBLIC SUPPORT THE MENTALLY ILL AND DRUG ADDICTION IS



- 1 EVERYBODY EVERYBODY'S SEEING IT EVERY DAY IN OUR COMMUNITY
- 2 THERE HAS TO BE SOME LINKAGE THERE WITH THIS HOUSING AND
- 3 DEALING WITH THAT PROBLEM AT THE SAME TIME YOU KNOW WITHIN THE
- 4 COUNTIES IF YOU WOULD ADDRESS THAT PROBLEM AT THE SAME TIME.
- 5 BUT I HAVE A GREAT APPRECIATION FOR WHAT YOU'RE DOING, THE
- 6 APPROACH YOU'RE TAKING. AND I LIKE THE WAY YOU STARTED THE
- 7 PRESENTATION, YOU REALLY STARTED FOCUSING ON THE PROBLEM. AND
- 8 YOU KNOW, THIS GAP BETWEEN THE HAVES AND HAVE-NOTS IN
- 9 CALIFORNIA IS GROWING AT AN ACCELERATED RATE. AND IF WE DON'T
- 10 START ADDRESSING THAT, I DON'T THINK THERE IS GOING TO BE AN
- 11 EASY SOLUTION TO THIS. AND I THINK THIS IS A GOOD FIRST STEP
- 12 TOWARDS THAT. THAT SOCIAL SERVICE PIECE TO ME IS MISSING. AND
- 13 IT'S SOMETHING THAT WE HAVE TO PUT INTO THIS CONVERSATION. SO
- 14 THOSE ARE MY COMMENTS, MR. CHAIR. THANK YOU. AGAIN, THANKS
- 15 KATE, GOOD WORK.
