- 1 TEST SPEED SAFETY CAMERAS UNDER SPECIFIC CIRCUMSTANCES THIS IS
- 2 AN ACTION ITEM BROUGHT TO US BY GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN.

- 4 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: GOOD MORNING AGAIN. I WANT TO TAKE A
- 5 SECOND TO GIVE A QUICK OVERVIEW OF ON YOU IMPORTANT SAFETY IS
- 6 IN THE BAY AREA AND ACROSS THE COUNTRY AS IT RELATES TO
- 7 TRANSPORTATION. I WAS HAVING SOME FUN DIGGING INTO THE BAY
- 8 AREA'S PREVIOUS LONG RANGE PLANS ALL THE WAY BACK TO 2008 OR
- 9 BEFORE, AND IT'S BEEN FOR DECADES A TOP PRIORITY, A TOP
- 10 PRIORITY FOR BAY AREA RESIDENTS, AND FROM THE TRANSPORTATION
- 11 PLANNING PERSPECTIVE AND THE LAND USE PLANNING PERSPECTIVE
- 12 JUST SOMETHING THAT'S FUNDAMENTAL TO WHAT WE SHOULD BE
- 13 DELIVERING FOR PEOPLE IN THE REGION. THIS IS ALSO THE CASE AT
- 14 THE STATE AND THE NATIONAL LEVEL AND ALTHOUGH IT'S BEEN SUCH A
- 15 TOP PRIORITY FOR DECADES WE ARE SEEING THE TRAJECTORY OF
- 16 FATALITIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY RISING. I DID SEE SOMETHING
- 17 FROM THE CDC THAT REALLY UNFORTUNATELY TRAFFIC DEATHS ARE THE
- 18 TOP -- ONE OF THE TOP KILLERS OF PEOPLE FROM 1 TO 54 IN THE
- 19 UNITED STATES. SO, AGAIN, WE'RE NOT NECESSARILY GOING THE
- 20 DIRECTION THAT WE WOULD LIKE TO BE GOING. OVER THE LAST FIVE
- 21 YEARS THERE HAS BEEN A BIG NATIONAL PUSH TOWARDS VISION ZERO
- 22 WHICH MANY OF THE CITIES IN THE BAY AREA HAVE REALLY LED ON,
- 23 AND MTC IN 2020 TOOK SOME STEPS FORWARD TO SUPPORT THE REGION
- 24 AND THE EFFORTS TO ACHIEVE THE AMBITIOUS GOAL OF ZERO
- 25 FATALITIES ON OUR ROADS BY ADOPTING A REGIONAL SAFETY AND



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 - 1 VISION ZERO PLAN -- OR SORRY -- VISION ZERO STRATEGY AND
 - 2 POLICY. IN OUR ADVOCACY PROGRAM THIS YEAR, YOU ALL DIRECTED US
 - 3 TO DO WHAT WE CAN ON THE LEGISLATIVE SIDE TO SUPPORT THAT.
 - 4 WHAT WE HAVE IDENTIFIED IN CONCERT WITH OUR VISION ZERO
 - 5 EXPERTS AT MTC AND ABAG ARE THE TWO BILLS THAT YOU WILL SEE
 - 6 BEFORE YOU, THIS BILL AND THE NEXT BILL. THESE ARE REALLY,
 - 7 WHAT WE HAVE HEARD FROM OUR EXPERTS, THE PROBLEM IS HUGE AND
 - 8 HAS REALLY BIG IMPACTS TO LIFE AND SAFETY IF WE DON'T MAKE
 - 9 PROGRESS ON IT AND WHAT THE DIRECTION HAS BEEN FROM THEM IS TO
 - 10 FOCUS ON THOSE THINGS THAT CAN BE IMPLEMENTED FAST, THAT ARE
 - 11 PROVEN STRATEGIES AND THAT ARE COST EFFECTIVE BECAUSE WE NEVER
 - 12 HAVE ENOUGH RESOURCES TO GO AROUND. THE FIRST WE'RE BRINGING
 - 13 TO YOU ON THE VISION 0 SPACE IS ASSEMBLY BILL 645 FRIEDMAN
 - 14 SOMETHING THAT IS FAMILIAR GONE THROUGH THE LEGISLATURE BEEN
 - 15 INTRODUCED SEVERAL TIMES AND MTC AND ABAG HAVE TAKEN SUPPORT
 - 16 POSITIONS ON THIS BILL SEVERAL TIMES. IT ALLOWS FIVE CITIES
 - 17 THROUGHOUT THE STATE, INCLUDING THREE IN THE BAY AREA, TO
 - 18 ADOPT ON A TEMPORARY BASIS PILOTS TO GET SPEED SAFETY CAMERAS
 - 19 ON THE GROUND. THERE ARE QUITE A FEW RESTRICTIONS IN PLACE
 - 20 THAT ARE INTENDED TO MAKE SURE THAT, ONE, IT CAN REALLY
 - 21 DEMONSTRATE THAT -- SO, THE RESTRICTIONS ARE, ONE, THE SAFETY
 - 22 CAMERAS HAVE TO BE IN UNSAFE CORRIDORS. TWO, THEY CAN BE PUT
 - 23 IN SCHOOL ZONES AND THREE, THEY'RE NOT ALLOWED TO BE PUT
 - 24 ANYWHERE WHERE THE CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL HAS PRIMARY
 - 25 JURISDICTIONS OVER MANAGING THE ROADS SO WE'RE NOT GOING TO



- 1 HAVE ANY JOBS LOST ON THAT SIDE. BEYOND THAT ARE A COUPLE OF
- 2 OTHER IMPORTANT POLICY PIECES, THE BILL INCLUDES SAFEGUARDS
- 3 AROUND PRIVACY PROTECTIONS, INCLUDES SAFEGUARDS AROUND MAKING
- 4 SURE SPEED SAFETY CAMERAS AREN'T GOING TO BE USED AS A TOOL TO
- 5 RAISE REVENUES, KEEPING THE GOAL ON IMPROVING SAFETY, AND
- 6 EQUITY CONSIDERATIONS ARE BAKED IN THAT WE'RE NOT GOING TO
- 7 HAVE SIGNIFICANT DISPROPORTIONATE IMPACTS ON COMMUNITIES OF
- 8 COLOR AND LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES. IT'S SOMETHING THAT'S
- 9 PROVEN. WE KNOW THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF SUPPORT AT MTC AND
- 10 ABAG IN THE PAST AND WE URGE TO YOU TACK A SUPPORT POSITION
- 11 TODAY.

- 13 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. WE'LL GO TO MAYOR MAHAN AND THEN
- 14 WE'LL GO TO MISS EKLUND.

- 16 MATT MAHAN: I'LL BE QUICK. I APPRECIATE THE OVERVIEW. IT WAS
- 17 VERY WELL DESCRIBED AND JUST WANT TO EXPRESS MY VERY STRONG
- 18 SUPPORT FOR THIS BILL. WE, IN SAN JOSE, SADLY, AS WE HAVE SEEN
- 19 ACROSS THE STATE AND COUNTRY, HAD ONE OF OUR DEADLIEST LAST
- 20 YEAR 65 TRAFFIC DEATHS MOSTLY PEDESTRIAN AND CYCLISTS. THIS IS
- 21 A TOOL THAT WE NEED KNOW. WE KNOW IT WORKS, AND IF YOU CALL
- 22 OUT POTENTIAL RISKS THAT HAVE BEEN TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT WITH
- 23 THIS LEGISLATION INCLUDING DISPARATE IMPACTS IN THE COMMUNITY,
- 24 I DO NOT SEE THIS IN ANY WAY AS REDUCING OUR NEED FOR ADEQUATE
- 25 LAW-ENFORCEMENT STAFFING. I KNOW THAT HAS BEEN A CONCERN. BUT



- 1 WE ARE IN SAN JOSE HOPING TO DO BOTH. WE WANT TO DEPLOY THESE
- 2 CAMERAS AND ABSOLUTELY NEED ADEQUATE STAFFING IN OUR POLICE
- 3 DEPARTMENT. I WANT TO SAY FROM A CITY SEEING A RISE IN
- 4 FATALITIES ON OUR ROADS WE THINK THIS IS AN ESSENTIAL TOOL.

6 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. MISS EKLUND.

- 8 PAT EKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THE OPPORTUNITY. I SUPPORT
- 9 THIS, BUT MY CONCERN IS, WHY IS IT ONLY LIMITED TO THE BIG
- 10 CITIES IN BECAUSE IN THE CITY OF NOVATO, WE HAVE HAD,
- 11 UNFORTUNATELY, MORE DEATHS DUE TO SPEEDING THAN IN ANY OTHER
- 12 CITY IN MARIN COUNTY. AND, YOU KNOW, I THINK THAT THIS --
- 13 BECAUSE IT SOUND LIKE THIS IS GOING TO BE A PILOT FOR SEVERAL
- 14 YEARS. HOW CAN WE CAN'T GET THIS OUT TO THE OTHER CITIES? WHY
- 15 CAN WE HAVE, YOU KNOW, A BILL THAT INCLUDES OTHER CITIES THAT
- 16 ARE INTERESTED THEY CAN APPLY SO WHY CAN'T WE ADD THAT TO THE
- 17 BILL? I HAVE HAD TWO FRIENDS THAT WERE CROSSING CROSSWALKS, I
- 18 HAVE TO TELL YOU, THEY WERE ADULT KIDS, AND THEY WERE KILLED.
- 19 AND ONE DRIVER SPED AROUND ONE OTHER -- IT WAS A TWO LANE IN
- 20 EACH DIRECTION, AND HIT THE GUY IN THIS CROSSWALK. AND, SO,
- 21 DIFFERENT AREAS IN THE CITY OF NOVATO, AND RECENTLY. SO, WHY
- 22 CAN'T WE EXPAND THIS?

24 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU SO MUCH. GEORGIA?



- 1 GEORGIA GANN DOHRMANN: BOARD MEMBER EKLUND I WANT TO SAY YOU
- 2 HIT THE NAIL ON THE HEAD WITH POLITICAL VIABILITY. THIS HAS
- 3 BEEN SOMETHING HELD IN APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE FOR SEVERAL
- 4 CYCLES NOW, AND TO GET SOME PILOTS ON THE GROUND, ONCE WE SEE
- 5 THE DATA FROM THE PILOTS THERE IS OPPORTUNITY TO EXPAND
- 6 FURTHER.

- 8 PAT EKLUND: WHY CAN'T WE DO A PILOT -- [INDISCERNIBLE] WHY
- 9 CAN'T WE DO A PILOT OF CITIES OF DIFFERENT SIZES AS WELL?
- 10 BECAUSE IN BIG METROPOLITAN CITIES, THE DYNAMICS ARE
- 11 DEFINITELY DIFFERENT, RATHER THAN, LIKE, IN THE SUBURBS, WE
- 12 HAVE THE LONG STREETS WITH SEVERAL CROSSWALKS, AND,
- 13 UNFORTUNATELY IN NOVATO, A LOT OF FATALITIES. GREAT THANK YOU
- 14 SO MUCH. MISS NOACK?

- 16 SUE NOACK: I CONCUR WITH BOTH. WE HAVE HAD A SIGNIFICANT PUSH
- 17 TO GET KIDS WALKING AND RIDING TO SCHOOL, AND, YET, ON THE
- 18 OTHER SIDE, THE SAFETY HAS GOTTEN WORSE. ONCE THEY GET ROD OF
- 19 SCHOOL BUSES, CERTAINLY IN OUR AREA, THERE IS A LOT IN DRIVERS
- 20 AND A LOT MORE INSTANCES AS WELL. I BRING THIS UP A LOT AT
- 21 CCTA AND OTHER PLACES, THAT WE FOCUS SO MUCH ON THE COMMUTER
- 22 TRAFFIC, WE DON'T FOCUS ENOUGH ON THE SCHOOL TRAFFIC THAT
- 23 CAUSES ISSUES IN SO MANY JURISDICTIONS. AND I THINK PAT'S
- 24 POINT IS REALLY WELL TAKEN. THE SUBURBAN ISSUES ARE VERY
- 25 DIFFERENT THAN THE BIG CITY ISSUES ON TRAFFIC AND SAFETY. AND



I THINK, I CONCUR, THAT WE OUGHT TO BE LOOKING AT OTHER 1 2 CITIES, SMALLER SIZED CITIES THAT HAVE DIFFERENT ISSUES, IN 3 TRYING TO ADDRESS THAT. THANK YOU. 4 5 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: CHAIR PEDROZA? 6 ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU. I AGREE WITH THE COMMENTS. I THINK 7 8 THIS IS OPPORTUNITY TO MOVE FORWARD NOW WITH WHAT WE THINK IS VIABLE. THE OUESTION I HAVE, IS THERE ANYTHING THAT PROHIBITS 9 CITIES FROM DOING THIS ON THEIR OWN? I'M REMINDED IN THE CITY 10 OF NAPA WE DID RED LIGHT CAMERAS AND WE HAD ABILITY TO DO THAT 11 BUT I DON'T KNOW IF THAT'S BECAUSE YOU AIR CHARTER OR CITY 12 UNDER GENERAL LAW. 13 14 REBECCA LONG: CAMERAS ARE NOT ALLOWED AT THE LOCAL LEVEL. EVEN 15 16 RED LIGHT CAMERAS HAD BEEN AUTHORIZED THERE WAS LEGISLATION RELATED TO THIS OTHER YEAR AFTER YEAR DESPITE LOCALS WANTING 17 TO DO IT HE DIDN'T HAVE THE AUTHORITY. WE COULD ADOPT A 18 SUPPORT AND SEEK AMENDMENT POSITION JUST SAYING WE SUPPORT THE 19 BILL AS IS, WE LIKE IT EXPANDED. I THINK WITH WE DID LAST 20 21 YEAR, WE TOOK A SUPPORT POSITION ON A NARROW PILOT BUT WE COMMUNICATED IN OUR LETTERS THAT OUR BOARD MEMBERS WOULD LIKE 22 TO SEE THIS AVAILABLE STATEWIDE JUST REENFORCING THAT MESSAGE, 23 IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO GO WITH A SUPPORT AND SEEK AMENDMENT 24 LETTER OR ACTUALLY ADOPT TO SUPPORT SEEK AMENDMENT POSITION.



1 ALFREDO PEDROZA: THERE IS INTEREST, WE NEED TO WORK WITH THE 2 3 COALITIONS THAT MIGHT HAVE CONCERNS BECAUSE HAVING SOME GENERAL COMMENTS ABOUT SUPPORTING BROADLY MIGHT BE A GREAT 4 5 POSITION. THANK YOU. 6 PAT EKLUND: I AGREE WITH THAT. WE SHOULD TELL THE STATE 7 8 LEGISLATURE THAT THE CITIES REALLY NEED TO HAVE THIS OPTION. 9 SO, ANYWAY, THANKS. 10 V. CHAIR, JESSE ARREGUIN: IF I COULD JUMP IN CONVERSATION. WE 11 HAVE SENT OUR LETTER SAYING BERKELEY WANTS TO BE IN THE PILOT. 12 WE HAVE BEEN COMMUNICATING WITH SENATOR FRIEDMAN'S OFFICE THEY 13 ARE LIMITING THE NUMBER OF CITIES, SHE HAS IT IN HER DISTRICT, 14 AND THE LARGEST CITIES. IT'S THE QUESTION TO HAVING SOME 15 16 ADDITIONAL CITIES IN DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE STATE WHETHER THAT BUILDS MORE POLITICAL SUPPORT THAT AN A STRATEGIC QUESTION. 17 THE POSITION WE TOOK PREVIOUSLY WE SUPPORT THIS BUT WE WOULD 18 LIKE YOU TO CONSIDER EXPANDING APPLICABILITY STATEWIDE I THINK 19 IS THE RIGHT APPROACH BUT DEMONSTRATING OUR SUPPORT IS 20 21 CRITICAL. THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE WE HAVE SEEN IS LIKE WITH MANY 22 THINGS IS CONCERN OVER AUTOMATION BUT WHERE WE ARE WITH STAFFING IN OUR PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENTS TRAFFIC DIVISIONS 23 ARE THREE PEOPLE NOW DUE TO INJURIES, VACANCIES. HOW CAN WE 24

MAKE THE ARGUMENT THAT THIS IS ACTUALLY A TOOL THAT COULD BE



BENEFICIAL ALONG WITH TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT THAT OUR PUBLIC 1 SAFETY RESPONDERS ARE DOING, THAT'S NOT TAKING AWAY JOBS BUT 2 3 THAT COULD BE ADDITIVE TO MAKE THEIR JOBS EASIER. THAT'S THE ARGUMENT THAT HAS TO BE MADE SO PEOPLE DON'T FEEL LIKE THIS IS 4 5 A WAY TO TRY TO CUT POLICE POSITIONS. 6 7 CHAIR, DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. MR.
