SPEAKER: PAUL SOTO FROM THE BARRIO HORSESHOE IN SAN JOSE. 1 AGAIN, RACIAL EQUITY, IT'S NOT SOMETHING TO TALK ABOUT 2 3 SUBJECTIVELY OR VIA INTERPRETATION OR ASPIRATIONALLY. FOR RACIAL EOUITY TO BE BINDING WITHIN THE CONTEXT OF ANY 4 5 GOVERNMENT, IT MUST BE INSTITUTIONALIZED, AND IT MUST BE, ALSO, LEGALLY BINDING. AND WE HAVE AS A PROBLEM BOTH IN THE 6 CITY OF SAN JOSE AND THE COUNTIES OF SANTA CLARA, IS THE 7 8 DECLARATION IS ASPIRATIONAL NOT LEGALLY BINDING. IT'S VAGUE YOU CAN TELL A BUNCH OF LAWYERS WROTE IT BECAUSE THAT I WANTED 9 AS MUCH SPACE SO TEA KOONTZ BE NAILED DOWN TO AN EXACT 10 DEFINITION AND SECONDLY THE COUNTY OF SANTA CLARA IS OPERATING 11 AROUND NO DEFINITION. THEESHZ ALL LEGAL DOCUMENTS WHEN YOU 12 LOOK IT'S THE DOCUMENTS IT SAYS RACIAL EQUITY WAS APPLIED BUT 13 YET NO LEGALLY BINDING DEFINITION OF WHAT THAT MEANS THAT IS 14 15 FRAUD ON THE PUBLIC. WE CAN'T BE THINKING THAT RACIAL -- AND 16 THE REASON I'M PUSHING THIS IS BECAUSE I HAVE BEEN A VICTIM, A STRAIGHT VICTIM OF THE RED LINING POLICIES THAT HAPPENED IN 17 SAN JOSE IN 1939 AND ALL THE GENERATIONAL MACS OF IT AND SO 18 HAS THE ENTIRE REGION. YOU LOOK AT EVERY CITY IN THE NINE 19 COUNTY AREAS EVERY ONE EVER THESE CITIES AND COUNTIES HAS A 20 REDS LINE DISTRICT IN IT. WHEN YOU PUT THAT AND COMPARE THAT 21 WITH CRIME DATA, THE RED LINE DISTRICTS ARE THE ONES WITH THE 22 MOST CRIME. THAT'S NOT BY COINCIDENCE PEOPLE THAT IS BY 23 DESIGN, WE NEED TO GET TO THE POINT AND I'LL HELP YOU GET 24 25 THERE. I WILL HELP YOU GET THERE.

I JUST WANTED TO NOTE THAT ALL OF THE 9 10 CITIES WITHIN THE NINE COUNTY BAY AREA AND THE COUNTIES, ACTUALLY DID SUBMIT THEIR REQUESTS FOR UTILIZATION OF THAT 11 REAP FUNDING, WHICH IS IMPORTANT, BECAUSE IF WE'RE GOING TO GO 12 BACK TO THE STATE, EVENTUALLY AND GET MORE MONEY, WE NEED TO 13 SHOW THAT INDEED WE'RE USING IT. SO TO ALL OF THE CITIES IN 14 15 THE NINE COUNTY BAY AREA, CONGRATULATIONS ON ACTUALLY -- AND 16 TO OUR STAFF -- ON ACTUALLY GETTING ALL OF US TO SUBMIT A WORK PLAN FOR THAT MONEY SO GREAT WORK STAFF AND GREAT WORK CITIES. 17 18

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. OKAY. LET'S NOW MOVE TO ITEM 10B APPROVAL OF THE BAHFA BUSINESS PLAN EQUITY FRAMEWORK AND FUNDING PROGRAMS. AND JUST FIRST WANT TO NOTE THIS WAS LISTED AS AN ACTION ITEM BUT IN CONSULTATION WITH STAFF, I HAVE ASKED THAT WE TAKE COMMENTS THIS EVENING AND BRING THIS BACK FOR ACTION THIS SUMMER IN TANDEM WITH THE BUSINESS PLAN. SO, WHILE WE ORIGINAL INTENDED TO TAKE ACTION, WE WILL

POSTPONE TAKING ACTION TONIGHT. I KNOW STAFF WOULD VERY MUCH

 DIRECTOR IS PRESENT. MISS HARTLEY, WOULD YOU LIKE TO GIVE THE

KATE HARTLEY: 60 SECOND REPORT. TO STRESS AND REITERATE TO ALL 6 BOARD MEMBERS THAT THE DOCUMENTS YOU SEE BEFORE YOU, FIRST OF 7 8 ALL, ONLY APPLIES TO THE BAHFA'S REGIONAL FUNDING, THE 20% OF FUNDS THAT DOESN'T IMPACT THE COUNTIES AND CITIES FUNDING. THE 9 10 DOCS SET FORTH GUIDING PRINCIPLES. WHAT THE DOCUMENTS DO NOT DO IS DIRECT WHERE THE FUNDING SHOULD ACTUALLY GO ONCE WE HAVE 11 THE PROCEEDS, AND/OR -- CERTAINLY NOT INTO ANY SPECIFIC 12 PROJECTS. THE GUIDING PRINCIPLES THAT THE EQUITY FRAMEWORK LAY 13 OUT ARE THAT WE SHOULD SERVE PEOPLE WITH GREATEST NEED AND WE 14 15 SHOULD AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER FAIR HOUSING THAT WE SHOULD MEET 16 OUR CLIMATE GOALS BY BUILDING CLOSE TO TRANSIT. THE FUNDING PROGRAMS HAVE ESSENTIALLY ELEMENTS FOR OUR INVESTMENT 17 STRATEGIES INCLUDING BUILDING AT SCALE GIVEN THE NEED TO BE 18 FLEXIBLE AND CREATIVE SINCE WE KNOW OUR STATE FUNDING PROCEEDS 19 ARE SO OVERSUBSCRIBED TO FOCUS ON COST EFFECTIVENESS AND 20 21 STREAMLINING AND TO STRUCTURE OUR LOANS SO THAT WE CAN RECEIVE INCOME THAT WE REINVEST BACK INTO TENANT PROTECTIONS. SO WE 22 WILL BE BACK BEFORE YOU THIS SUMMER WITH THE PROPOSED 23 EXPENDITURE PLAN FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION. AND WE WILL BE GOING 24 25 THROUGH OUR ADVISORY COMMITTEE, ET CETERA. THERE IS LOTS OF

OPPORTUNITY TO DISCUSS THIS AND TALK ABOUT IT, AND WE WELCOME
 YOUR INPUT NOW. THANK YOU.

AND THAT'S THE 20% OF 19 PROCEEDS. SO WE'LL BRING TO YOU A RECOMMENDED PRIORITIES FOR 20 HOW WE SHOULD STRUCTURE OUR NOTICE OF FUNDING AVAILABILITIES, 21 WHAT PRIORITIES, FOR EXAMPLE, SUCH AS PRIORITIZING PERMANENT 22 SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR HOMELESS HOUSEHOLDS, AND HOW THAT --23 HOW OUR FUNDS, BAHFA'S FUNDS SHOULD BE DISTRIBUTED ACROSS THE 24 25 REGION TO PROMOTE EQUITY AND TO ENSURE THAT THERE IS FAIRNESS,

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THERE IS BROAD -- THERE IS BROAD APPLICABILITY, THERE IS BROAD

IMPACTS OF RACIAL INEOUITY, YOU MUST HAVE A LEGALLY BINDING 1 2 DEFINITION OF WHAT EQUITY MEANS. BECAUSE IF YOU DON'T, HERE IS 3 WHAT HAPPENS. IT BECOMES ASPIRATIONAL AND EXPLOITIVE. THE 1960s CHICAGO MOVEMENT CHALLENGED THIS, THEY ACT AS A MEMBER 4 5 OF THE COMMUNITY NON-PROFITS SAYING OH WE'LL HELP YOU DEAL WITH ISSUES IN THE COMMUNITY BUT YOU GIVE US THE MONEY YOU 6 LOOK AT HOUSING OF SOME OF THESE EXECUTIVES THAT ARE NON-7 8 PROFITS THAT ARE PROFITING FROM THE POVERTY THESE EXECS ARE GETTING \$200,000 A YEAR OFF OF POVERTY. THIS IS SICKENING HOW 9 DO YOU PROFIT OFF OF POVERTY. CITY GOVERNMENT DOES IT COUNTY 10 GOVERNMENT DOES IT AND IT NEEDS TO STOP WE HAVE TO HAVE A 11 LEGALLY BINDING DEFINITION AND METRIC NOT A GUIDING PRINCIPLE. 12 I DON'T TRUST MY GOVERNMENT. THEY MAKE SURE -- I DON'T SPEAK 13 SPANISH TODAY BECAUSE OF THE RACIAL SEGREGATION AND THE 14 15 TREATMENT MY PARENTS RECEIVED INSIDE THE SCHOOL DISTRICT THEY 16 TOOK LANGUAGE FROM THEM. I DON'T TRUST THEM. I NEED A LEGALLY BINDING DEFINITION AND IT'S GOING TO BE BECAUSE YOU'RE GOING 17 TO HEAR MY VOICE EVERY TIME YOU HAVE ONE OF THESE MEETINGS 18 YOU'RE GOING TO BE HEARING MY VOICE RACIAL EOUITY NEEDS TO BE 19 LEGALLY BINDING OR OUIT USING IT AS A DEFINITION TO PIT THE 20 21 POVERTY THAT'S INSIDE OF MY COMMUNITY. THANK YOU.

CAN YOU 12 BRING UP THE POWERPOINT, PLEASE? NEXT SLIDE A LITTLE BIT 13 BAYREN. I KNOW I'M HERE SEVERAL TIMES A YEAR TO PROVIDE AN 14 15 UPDATE BUT IT IS IN COLLABORATION WITH THE NINE BAY AREA 16 COUNTIES, IMPLEMENTING A PORTFOLIO OF ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROGRAMS ACROSS THE REGION. WE ARE ONE OF NOW FOUR REGIONAL 17 ENERGY NETWORKS WITH A FIFTH APPLICATION PENDING BEFORE THE 18 PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, THE VISION 19 20 OF BAYREN, AS WELL AS ALL REGIONAL ENERGY NETWORKS IS THAT WE 21 HELP JURISDICTIONS MEET LOCAL REGIONAL AND STATE CLIMATE RELATED GOALS BY HAVING A REGIONAL STRUCTURE, WE ARE ABLE TO 22 PROVIDE A MORE HOLISTIC OFFERING TO OUR JURISDICTIONS. THIS SLIDE WE HAVE BEEN RECOGNIZED BY NATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS 1 AS WELL AS FEDERAL AGENCIES FOR OUR PROGRAM DESIGN AND OUR 2 3 EFFECTIVENESS. SO, WE HAVE -- WE HAVE MADE A LOT OF IMPACT IN THE REGION AND ALSO HAVE A LOT OF ACKNOWLEDGMENT FOR OUR 4 5 PROGRAMS. NEXT SLIDE. THERE IS -- HERE IS A BREAK DOWN OF SOME OF OUR PROJECT IMPACTS, BROKEN DOWN BY COUNTY. SOME OF THE 6 NUMBERS VARY BASED ON THE CONTRACTOR AND WORKFORCE IN A COUNTY 7 8 AS WELL AS THE TARGETED BUILDING STOCK OF OUR PROGRAMS. I AM HAPPY TO PROVIDE A MORE DETAILED ANALYSIS OF PROJECTS IN ANY 9 10 OF YOUR JURISDICTIONS, IF YOU WOULD LIKE. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO, IN MARCH OF LAST YEAR, WE SUBMITTED AN EIGHT-YEAR BUSINESS 11 PLAN, AS DIRECTED BY THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION AND 12 CONCURRENTLY WE SUBMITTED A FOUR-YEAR PORTFOLIO APPLICATION 13 WHICH WAS A MORE DETAILED PROPOSAL, AND THE PORTFOLIO 14 APPLICATION IS THE BUDGET THAT I'M HERE BEFORE YOU THIS 15 16 EVENING. THE BUSINESS PLAN WAS REALLY GUIDED BY EXTENSIVE STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT THAT WE DID THROUGHOUT THE REGION AND 17 TAKING THAT INPUT, WE SUBMITTED OUR BUSINESS PLAN AND THERE IS 18 KIND OF THREE FOCUS AREAS. THE FIRST IS WE HAVE A GREATER 19 FOCUS ON EOUITY. THAT'S BOTH WITHIN OUR ORGANIZATIONAL 20 STRUCTURE, AS WELL AS IN OUR PROGRAMS. AND EQUITY TO BAYREN IS 21 CONSISTENT WITH THE CPUC DEFINITION, AS WELL AS ITS ESJ SOCIAL 22 ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTION PLAN AS WELL AS THE 23 ABAG AND MTC EQUITY DEFINITION. SECOND WE HAVE AN INCREASED 24 25 FOCUS ON SUPPORT FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS BASED ON LOCAL NEEDS.

WHAT WE HEARD IN A LOT OF OUR STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT WAS A LOT 1 2 OF NEED PARTICULARLY A NEED IN MUNICIPAL BUILDINGS. I'LL GET 3 INTO A SECOND, WE HAVE TWO NEW PROGRAMS THAT DIRECTLY WILL WORK WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO HELP WITH THE ENERGY NEEDS OF 4 5 THEIR FACILITIES AND FINALLY THE BUSINESS PLAN IS PROPOSE PROGRAMS THAT CAN TIMELY RESPOND TO EVOLVING STATE AND LOCAL 6 POLICY TRENDS. NEXT SLIDE. SO, OUR CURRENT PROGRAMS AND 7 8 BUDGET, CURRENT ANNUAL BUDGET IS ABOUT \$23 MILLION. WE WILL CONTINUE WITH ALL OF OUR EXISTING PROGRAMS. WE WILL BE MAKING 9 SOME TWEAKS TO SOME OF THE PROGRAMS TO BETTER ALIGN WITH THE 10 THEMES OF OUR BUSINESS PLAN. NEXT SLIDE. AND IF THERE IS -- I 11 THINK THERE IS SOME, IF YOU CAN KEEP GOING, THERE SHOULD BE 12 SOME MORE ON THIS SLIDE. OKAY. SO, WE HAVE PROPOSED TO MOVE 13 INTO TWO BRAND-NEW SECTORS, WORKFORCE AND THE PUBLIC SECTOR. 14 15 SO THE WORKFORCE PROGRAM IS AN EXPANSION OF OUR GREENHOUSE 16 CALLS PROGRAM, IT'S A PARTNERSHIP WITH RISING SUN CENTER FOR OPPORTUNITY. I ALWAYS GET SMILES FROM BOARD MEMBERS WHEN I 17 MENTION THAT. AND, SO, I ALWAYS WAS A LITTLE FRUSTRATED THAT 18 THE PROGRAM ENDED AT THE END OF THE SUMMER. SO WHAT THE 19 CLIMATE CAREERS PROGRAM IS GOING TO DO IS TO PROVIDE 20 21 ADDITIONAL TRAINING AND THEN PLACE THE YOUTH INTO GOOD PAYING JOBS IN A GREEN ECONOMY. SO THAT IS OUR NEW WORKFORCE PROGRAM. 22 IF YOU CAN JUST CLICK THROUGH. SO -- THANK YOU. AND AS I 23 MENTIONED WE'RE MOVING INTO THE PUBLIC SECTOR. THIS IS VERY 24 25 FOCUSED ON PROVIDING LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPPORT FOR INCREASING

BOTH ENERGY EFFICIENCY AND ELECTRIFICATION AND MUNICIPAL 1 FACILITIES AND FINALLY, NEXT SLIDE. OUR ANIMATION IS A 2 3 COMMERCIAL PROGRAM, WHICH IS GOING TO FOCUS ON SMALL, CORNER GROCERY STORES, REPLACING VERY HIGH GHG EMITTING REFRIGERANTS. 4 5 AS YOU CAN SEE OUR ANNUAL BUDGET REOUESTS IS INCREASED TO ABOUT \$28 MILLION PER YEAR. NEXT SLIDE. I WANTED TO DO A BREAK 6 DOWN OF WHERE ALL OF THIS MONEY GOES, AS I THINK YOU CAN SEE 7 8 THAT IT IS GOING DIRECTLY BACK INTO THE REGION IN THE FORM OF REBATES, WHICH REPRESENTS 43% OF OUR BUDGET. THAT'S MONEY THAT 9 GOES DIRECTLY TO CONTRACTORS, TO HOMEOWNERS, AND TO MULTI-10 FAMILY PROPERTY OWNERS, THE MAJORITY OF WHOM ARE AFFORDABLE 11 PROPERTY OWNERS. AND 27% IS THE ABAG REGIONAL BUDGET. SO, ALL 12 OF THE STAFF, TIME FOR EVERYBODY THAT WORKS ON MY TEAM BAYREN 13 IS 100% FUNDING, THROUGH OUR REGIONAL, WE HAVE CONSULTANTS 14 15 THAT WORK ON ACTIVITIES THAT ARE FOR THE OVERALL PORTFOLIO, 16 AND I WOULD NOTE THAT WE'RE VERY PROUD TO BE IN ALIGNMENT WITH THE EQUITY PLATFORM AND THAT THE MAJORITY OF OUR CONSULTANTS 17 ARE LOCAL, SMALL, MANY WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESSES. AND THEN 18 FINALLY, 30% OF OUR BUDGET GOES DIRECTLY TO THE COUNTY, BAYREN 19 MEMBER AGENCIES, AND WE HAVE FORMAL, AS YOU ALL KNOW -- FORMAL 20 21 CONTRACTS WITH THE BAYREN MEMBER AGENCIES. WE HAVE DEFINED SCOPES OF WORK, AND MOST IMPORTANTLY, IS THAT THEY ARE 22 CONTRACTUALLY OBLIGATED TO DO OUTREACH TO ALL JURISDICTIONS 23 WITHIN THE COUNTY SO THAT STAFF, AS WELL AS ALL CONSTITUENTS 24

ARE AWARE OF AND CAN PARTICIPATE IN BAYREN PROGRAMS. AND THAT 1 2 CONCLUDES MY PRESENTATION. ANY QUESTIONS? 3 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: L THANK YOU SO MUCH, JENNY FOR ALL 4 5 YOUR WORK, AND, SORT OF, HELPING LAUNCH AND GUIDE BAYREN OVER THE PAST 11 YEARS. 6 7 8 JENNY BERG: TEN. TEN AND COUNTING. 9 10 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: YEAH. AND WAS VERY HONORED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE CEREMONY RECENTLY RECOGNIZING THIS 11 IMPORTANT MILESTONE. AND COULD YOU MAYBE TALK ABOUT THE 12 INTEGRATION WITH BAHFA AND BAYREN? BECAUSE I KNOW THAT'S 13 SOMETHING THAT WE HAD TALKED ABOUT IN PLANNED BAY AREA, 14 15 LOOKING AT HOW WE CAN LEVERAGE THE WORK THAT BAYREN IS DOING 16 WITH MAKING OUR AFFORDABLE HOUSING THAT WE'RE FUNDING MORE GREEN AND MORE ENERGY EFFICIENT. 17 18 JENNY BERG: THANK YOU FOR THAT. WE HAVE HAD SEVERAL TALKS 19 WHICH ARE ONGOING GIVEN THAT WE WORK WITH MANY OF THE SAME 20 21 AFFORDABLE PROPERTY DEVELOPERS THAT BAHFA IS WORKING WITH AND WILL LIKELY WORK WITH IN THE FUTURE.  SOMETHING THAT THEY -- THERE IS A LOT GOING ON THERE, BUT THE
 CONVERSATIONS ARE ONGOING.

WHERE WE WILL INVITE BOARD MEMBERS WHO HAVE A LIBRARY IN THEIR
 JURISDICTION AND THE FIRST ONE IS IN NOVATO IN JUNE.

WHEN I SPEAK TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS IN 12 ALAMEDA COUNTY AND THROUGHOUT THE BAY AREA AND STAFF I THINK 13 EVERYONE IS GRATEFUL THAT BAYREN EXISTS AND I THINK IT'S A 14 CRITICAL PART OF THE WORK WE'RE DOING IN THIS REGION TO NOT 15 16 JUST MAKE OUR BUILDINGS ENERGY EFFICIENT BUT TO HELP GET OFF OF GAS IN ADVANCE OF OUR CLIMATE GOALS. THANK YOU FOR ALL YOUR 17 WORK. COUNCIL MEMBER ROMERO DO YOU WISH TO SPEAK? 18

AND THE MODEL IS THAT THE YOUTH WILL THEN GO INTO THEIR 11 OWN COMMUNITIES THAT THEY HAVE THAT TRUST, IF IT'S IN 12 LANGUAGE, OR THEY KNOW THE NEIGHBORS, OR THERE IS THAT TRUST 13 THAT PEOPLE WILL GO BACK INTO THEIR COMMUNITIES TO START 14 TEACHING THEM ABOUT ENERGY EFFICIENCY. SO THE WORKFORCE 15 16 COMPONENT IS TO CONTINUE TO WORK WITH THE OLDER YOUTH THAT ARE NOT IN HIGH SCHOOL WHERE THEY GET PROFESSIONAL AND TECHNICAL 17 TRAINING THAT WILL ALLOW THEM TO APPLY FOR JOBS IN THE 18 INDUSTRY AND TO HELP WITH THAT WHOLE PROCESS. JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: OUR LAST ITEM 12, CALIFORNIA'S 6 HOUSING FUTURE 2040 THE NEXT REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION 7 8 DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATED TO REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS DETERMINATION AND REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION PROCESSES 9 TO INFORM THE ANALYSIS BEING CONDUCTED BY THE STATE FOR THE 10 7TH RHNA CYCLE THIS IS AN INFORMATION ITEM BUT WE WANTED TO 11 CALENDAR THIS FOR A PRESENTATION DISCUSSION SO YOU CAN PROVIDE 12 SOME INPUT TO STAFF AND HCD. AND GILLIAN ADAMS BACK BEFORE US 13 AGAIN ON RHNA TO GIVE THE REPORT. 14

16 GILLIAN ADAMS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. GILLIAN ADAMS, I'M THE PRINCIPLE PLANNER HERE AT ABAG MTC AND WAS THE PROJECT MANAGER 17 OF THE SIXTH CYCLE RHNA. PULL UP THE SLIDES, PLEASE? NEXT 18 SLIDE. IN MY PRESENTATION TONIGHT, I'M GOING TO SET THE STAGE, 19 SPENDING A FEW MINUTES LOOKING AT ABAG'S RECENTLY COMPLETED 20 21 RHNA PROCESS SHARING WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT HCD'S RHNA EVALUATION PROCESS INCLUDING REVIEW OF THE PUBLIC SURVEY THEY HAD OUT AND 22 TO HIGHLIGHT TOPICS THEY'RE SEEKING FEEDBACK ABOUT, AND WE'LL 23 LEAVE TIME FOR DISCUSSION OR QUESTIONS AT THE END. NEXT SLIDE. 24 AS YOU KNOW STATES LAW REQUIRES ALL JURISDICTIONS TO PLAN TO 25

MEET THE HOUSING NEEDS OF EVERYONE IN THEIR COMMUNITY. AS PART 1 2 OF THE RHNA PROCESS, HCD PRODUCES THE REGIONAL HOUSING NEED 3 DETERMINATION THAT IDENTIFIES THE TOTAL NUMBER OF UNITS BY INCOME GROUP THAT EACH REGION MUST PLAN FOR. ABAG MUST THEN 4 5 DEVELOP A METHODOLOGY TO ALLOCATE A SHARE OF THAT REGION'S HOUSING NEED BY INCOME TO EACH JURISDICTION IN THE BAY AREA. 6 THEN EACH JURISDICTION MUST UPDATE THE HOUSING ELEMENT OF ITS 7 8 GENERAL PLAN AND ITS ZONING TO SHOW HOW IT CAN ACCOMMODATE ITS SHARE OF THE REGION'S HOUSING NEED. THERE WERE SIGNIFICANT 9 CHANGES MADE TO HOUSING ELEMENT LAW THAT IMPACTED THE RHNA 10 PROCESS FOR THIS RECENT CYCLE INCLUDING TOTAL NUMBER OF UNITS 11 IN THE SIGNED, WAS HIGHER THAN PREVIOUS CYCLES MORE FACTORS 12 THAT HAD TO BE CONSIDERED IN THE RHNA METHODOLOGY AS WELL AS 13 EXPANDED ROLE FOR HCD IN TERMS OF OVERSIGHT ON THE ALLOCATION 14 15 METHODOLOGY AND RESULTING ALLOCATIONS. AND NEW REQUIREMENTS 16 THAT MADE IT MORE CHALLENGING FOR JURISDICTIONS TO I'VE ELIGIBLE SITES IN THEIR HOUSING ELEMENTS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. 17 LOOKING SPECIFICALLY AT THE BAY AREA RHNA PROCESS, AT 441,000 18 UNITS THE NEED DETERMINATION FROM HCD WAS MORE THAN DOUBLE 19 WHAT IT WAS IN THE PREVIOUS CYCLE. AND AS IT HAS IN PREVIOUS 20 21 RHNA CYCLES, ABAG CONVENED THE HOUSING METHODOLOGY COMPLETED THAT MET ALMOST MONTHLY FOR A YEAR TO DEVELOP THE METHODOLOGY 22 FOR ALLOCATING A SHARE OF THE HOUSING NEED TO EACH 23 JURISDICTION. THE FINAL METHODOLOGY IDENTIFIED BY HMC 24 25 INCORPORATED THE TOTAL NUMBER OF HOUSEHOLDS IN THE YEAR 2050

FROM PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 THE REGION'S LONG RANGE LANDS USE 1 2 AND TRANSPORTATION PLAN AS WELL AS FACTORS THAT EMPHASIZE 3 ACCESS TO HIGH OPPORTUNITY AREAS AND PROXIMITY TO JOBS FOR THOSE TRAVELING BY BOTH AUTOMOBILE AND TRANSIT. IN THE LAST 4 5 PHASE OF THIS RHNA PROCESS, THERE WERE 28 APPEALS OF THE DRAFT ALLOCATIONS TO LOCAL JURISDICTIONS. AND ABAG PARTIALLY GRANTED 6 ONE OF THE APPEALS THAT RESULTED IN THE TRANSFER OF 35 UNITS 7 8 FROM CONTRA COSTA TO PITTSBURGH. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. REFLECTING ON EXPERIENCE WITH CYCLE SIX SOME THINGS WORKED 9 WELL ACTIVE ENGAGEMENT FROM ELECTED OFFICIALS AND STAKEHOLDERS 10 PARTICULARLY DURING THE HMC PROCESS ALSO IN ONGOING COMMITTEE 11 MEETINGS AND DURING THE APPEALS HEARING ONLINE VISUALIZATION 12 TOOL THAT STAFF DEVELOPED TO HELP MEMBERS AND OTHERS EXPLORE 13 IMPACTS AND DIFFERENT COMBINATION WAS FACTORS AND WEIGHTS 14 15 DURING THE METHODOLOGY DEVELOPMENT PROCESS. GREAT EVIDENT 16 CHALLENGES WERE HAVING TO CONDUCT RHNA DURING COVID ESPECIALLY WITH TIGHT STATUTORY DEADLINES PARTICULARLY TIMING BETWEEN 17 COMPLETING THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 FINAL BLUEPRINT AND THE 18 RHNA METHODOLOGY. TRYING TO NAVIGATE THE MANY NEW STATE 19 REOUIREMENTS SUCH AS AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING 20 21 WITHOUT PRECEDENCE OR GUIDANCE FROM HCD AND THE APPEALS PROCESS WAS RESOURCE INTENSIVE FOR BOTH ABAG STAFF AND LOCAL 22 JURISDICTION STAFF. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO TURNING NOW TO AN 23 OVERVIEW OF HCD'S PROCESS FURTHER INITIATIVE, CALIFORNIA'S 24 FUTURE 2040 THE NEXT RHNA. ASSEMBLY BILL 101 FROM 2019 DIRECTS 25

HCD AND THE OFFICE OF PLANNING AND RESEARCH TO DEVELOP 1 RECOMMENDATIONS RELATED TO THE RHNA PROCESS AND METHODOLOGY 2 3 THAT PROMOTE AND STREAMLINE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AND SUBSTANTIALLY ADDRESS CALIFORNIA'S HOUSING SHORTAGE. HCD MUST 4 5 REPORT ON ITS FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE LEGISLATURE BY THE END OF THIS CALENDAR YEAR. AND THE INITIATIVE IS 6 LIMITED TO RECOMMENDATIONS RELATED TO THE HOUSING NEED 7 8 DETERMINATION FROM HCD AND THE RHNA PROCESS. NOT THE GUIDELINES FOR DEVELOPMENT OR REVIEW OF HOUSING ELEMENTS. NEXT 9 10 SLIDE, PLEASE. HCD HAS IDENTIFIED THE FOLLOWING GUIDING PRINCIPLES FOR THE CALIFORNIA HOUSING FUTURE 2040 INITIATIVE. 11 ENSURE RHNA IS FAIR, TRANSPARENT, OBJECTIVE, AND STREAMLINED 12 PROCESS FOR IDENTIFYING HOUSING NEED. FAIR IN TERMS OF 13 ADVANCING EQUITY, RACIAL JUSTICE, AND INCLUSION, AND 14 ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE IN A MANNER THAT ENSURES ALL 15 16 JURISDICTIONS PLAN FOR THEIR FAIR SHARE OF THE REGION'S HOUSING NEED. TRANSPARENT IN TERMS OF OPEN AND ACCESSIBLE 17 PARTICIPATION, PROACTIVE ENGAGEMENT AND MAKING MATERIALS 18 AVAILABLE ONLINE. OBJECTIVE IN TERMS OF MAINTAINING A DATA-19 DRIVEN PROCESS AND ENSURING LOGICAL FLOW OF STEPS WITHIN 20 21 EFFICIENT PROCESS AVAILABLE TO ACCOMPLISH MEANINGFUL OUTCOMES STRATEGICALLY PLAN FOR NEEDS OF HOUSING HOUSEHOLDS AT ALL 22 INCOME LEVELS PROMOTING INFIELD DEVELOPMENT FOR PROTECTION OF 23 NATURAL RESOURCES EFFICIENT DEVELOPMENT PATTERNS ACCOUNTING 24 FOR FUTURE CLIMATE RISK WITH GOAL OF ENSURING COMMUNITIES AND 25

VULNERABLE POPULATIONS ARE NOT UNDULY EXPOSED TO CLIMATE RISK 1 INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO DROUGHT, FLOODING, SEA LEVEL 2 3 RISE, AND WILDFIRE. ENCOURAGED INCREASED DEVELOPMENT TO SUBSTANTIALLY ADDRESS CALIFORNIA'S HOUSING SHORTAGE AND 4 5 AFFORDABILITY ISSUES AND IMPROVE COMPLIANCE AND OUTCOMES THROUGH 95S AND ENFORCEMENT AND ENHANCE AND PROTECT RHNA'S 6 ROLE IN AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING SO ALL CITIES 7 8 PLAN FOR THEIR FAIR SHARE OF GROWTH AND FUTURE PLANNING DOES NOT FURTHER ENTRENCH SEGREGATED LIVING PATTERNS. NEXT SLIDE 9 PLEASE. AT ITS KICKOFF WEBINAR IN EARLY MARCH HCD IDENTIFIED 10 THE FOLLOWING KEY QUESTIONS AS A FOCUS FOR THE INITIATIVE: HOW 11 CAN RHNA CYCLE SEVEN BETTER CAPTURE EXISTING AND PROJECTED 12 HOUSING NEEDS. WHAT POTENTIAL PROCESS CHANGES TO SAVE STAFF 13 TIME AND RESOURCES, INCREASE TRANSPARENCY, AND INCREASE 14 ACCOUNTABILITY COULD BE IMPLEMENTED AS PART OF RHNA CYCLE 15 16 SEVEN? AND WHAT STRATEGIES COULD BE PURSUED TO BUILD ON THE IMPORTANT ADJUSTMENTS MADE FOR RHNA CYCLE SIX THAT CONTRIBUTED 17 TO A MORE EQUITABLE RHNA HCD IS CONDUCTING A VARIETY OF 18 ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES FOR THE INITIATIVE. INCLUDING A PUBLIC 19 SURVEY FOR A SOUNDING BOARD MEETINGS WITH TECHNICAL EXPERTS, 20 21 PARTNERING LISTENING SESSIONS AND STATEWIDE PRESENTATIONS. THERE ARE TWO REMAINING SOUNDING BOARD MEETINGS. HCD IS 22 POSTING THE AGENDAS FOR MEETINGS ABOUT A WEEK IN ADVANCE AND 23 ANYONE IS INVITED TO PROVIDE WRITTEN COMMENTS ON THE AGENDA 24 TOPICS. THE PUBLIC SURVEY HAS CLOSED BUT YOU CAN SEND COMMENTS 25

TO HCD'S DEDICATED E-MAIL ADDRESS, CA HOUSING FUTURE 2040 AT 1 HCD.CA.GOV THROUGHOUT THE INITIATIVE PROCESS. NEXT SLIDE, 2 3 PLEASE. SO TURNING NOW TO REVIEW OF HCD'S SURVEY. THERE ARE FIVE MAIN TOPIC AREAS. IN THE FIRST HCD IS EXPLORING WHETHER 4 5 TO INCLUDE POPULATIONS RESIDING IN GROUP CORRIDORS SUCH AS UNIVERSITY STUDENTS OR PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS AND 6 REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS DETERMINATION FOR CYCLE SEVEN IN 7 8 RESPONSE TO QUESTIONS STAFF IDENTIFIED KEY CONSIDERATIONS. TOTAL NEED FROM HCD ALREADY INCLUDES ADJUSTMENTS TO ADDRESS 9 THE SYMPTOMS OF OUR BROKEN HOUSING MARKET SUCH AS OVERCROWDING 10 COST BURDEN AND LOW VACANCY AND IT'S NOT CLEAR HOW THE NEEDS 11 OF PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS WOULD INTERACT WITH THESE 12 EXISTING ADJUSTMENT FACTORS. PEOPLE IN GROUP QUARTERS ARE 13 CURRENTLY EXCLUDED FROM THE NEED DETERMINATION SO A REGION'S 14 TOTAL HOUSING NEED FROM HCD WOULD INCREASE IF THEY ARE 15 16 INCLUDED. BUT THIS WOULD ALSO ENABLE JURISDICTIONS TO COINCIDENT SPACING GROUP QUARTERS ON THEIR ANNUAL PROGRESS 17 REPORTS TO HCD. IMPORTANTLY THERE ARE DATA GAPS FOR THESE 18 DEMOGRAPHIC GROUPS THAT WOULD MAKE ANY CHANGES CHALLENGING TO 19 IMPLEMENT. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. IN THE SECOND TOPIC IN THE 20 21 SURVEY HCD IS CONSIDERING OPPORTUNITIES TO IMPROVE A COGS RHNA PROCESS INCLUDING HCD OFFERING GUIDANCE ON HOW TO FURTHER THE 22 RHNA STATUTORY OBJECTIVES, WEATHER JURISDICTIONS SHOULD BE 23 ABLE TO PROVIDE SELF-REPORTED LAND USE DATA FOR USE IN THE 24 REGIONAL HOUSING NEED DETERMINATION AND THE RHNA PROCESSES AND 25

STRATEGIES FOR IMPROVING THE RHNA APPEALS PROCESS. THE KEY 1 CONSIDERATIONS IDENTIFIED BY ABAG STAFF INCLUDE HCD COULD 2 3 PROVIDE GUIDANCE ABOUT IDENTIFYING POSSIBLE METRICS FOR EACH RHNA OBJECTIVE, WHICH WOULD BUILD ON ABAG'S CYCLE SIX 4 5 APPROACH. RELYING ON PUBLICITY DATA SETS PROVIDES A LEVEL PLAYING FIELD FOR ALL JURISDICTIONS RECOGNIZING THAT 6 JURISDICTIONS WITH FEWER RESOURCES ARE OFTEN EIGHT 7 8 DISADVANTAGE WHEN ASKED TO GATHER SELF-REPORTED DATA. AND THE STATUTORY LANGUAGE FOR APPEALS COULD BE SIGNIFICANTLY CLEARERS 9 10 ABOUT THE NARROW GROUNDS FOR AN APPEAL PROVIDING MORE CLARITY TO THE INTERESTED JURISDICTIONS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. FOR THE 11 THIRD TOPIC, HCD ASKS FOR SUGGESTIONS ABOUT HOW TO STRENGTHEN 12 RHNA'S EFFECTIVENESS AT AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING 13 AND HOW RHNA CAN BE IMPROVED TO FURTHER COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT 14 15 AND ANTI-DISPLACEMENT GOALS. IN RESPONSE, ABAG STAFF PROPOSES 16 THAT IN ADDITION TO MORE CLARITY ABOUT POTENTIAL METRICS, HCD COULD PROVIDE BETTER GUIDANCE ON HOW TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER 17 FAIR HOUSING IN A CONTEXT OF RHNA. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. FOR THE 18 FOURTH SURVEY TOPIC, HCD IS EXPLORING IMPROVEMENT TO THE 19 REGIONAL HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROCESSES TO 20 21 BETTER ALIGN HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION PLANNING OUTCOMES. FOR THIS, ABAG STAFF SUGGESTED ADJUSTING THE HOUSING ELEMENT DUE 22 DATE SO IT'S AT LEAST 24 MONTHS AFTER THE ADOPTION OF THE 23 SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITY STRATEGY WHICH WOULD ALLOW THE TIME FOR 24 THE COMPLETION OF PLANNED BAY AREA TO USE IN THE RHNA 25

METHODOLOGY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. FOR THE LAST SURVEY TOPIC, HCD 1 IS SEEKING TO IDENTIFY WAYS THAT RHNA COULD BETTER CONSIDER 2 3 CLIMATE RELATED ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS, ASSESS WHICH AREAS HAVE THE HIGHEST RISK EXPOSURE, AND HOW COMMUNITIES DEVELOP IN WAYS 4 5 THAT REDUCE ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARD EXPOSURE FOR RESIDENTS, PARTICULARLY FOR DISADVANTAGED AND HISTORICALLY UNDERSERVED 6 FOR POPULATIONS. KEY CONSIDERATIONS ARE IDENTIFIED BY ABAG 7 8 STAFF ARE THAT HCD SHOULD RECOMMEND USE OF PUBLIC DATA SETS THAT ARE CONSISTENT FOR ALL JURISDICTIONS ARE WHEN IDENTIFYING 9 AREAS OF CLIMATE RISK. RECENT LEGISLATION HAS ALREADY ADDED 10 IMPACTS CAUSED BY CLIMATE CHANGE TO THE ALLOCATION FACTOR FOR 11 EVALUATING HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES AND CONSTRAINTS. AND, AS ALL 12 JURISDICTIONS FACE SOME LEVEL OF CLIMATE RELATED HAZARDS, HCD 13 SHOULD FOCUS ITS EFFORTS ON PROVIDING DATA, GUIDANCE, AND 14 15 FINANCIAL RESOURCES TO HELP JURISDICTIONS MINIMIZE RISK WHILE 16 INCREASING HOUSING SUPPLY AT ALL INCOME LEVELS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE SO IN ADDITION TO SHARING HIGH-LEVEL THOUGHTS FROM ABAG 17 STAFF ON HCD SURVEY OUESTIONS I WANTED TO HIGHLIGHT SOME OF 18 THE POTENTIAL CHANGES TO RHNA THAT WERE IDENTIFIED BY ABAG 19 EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS AT THE END OF RHNA CYCLE SIX DESCRIBED 20 MORE FULLY IN THE MEMO PACKET THAT STAFF DEVELOPED IN MARCH 21 2022 WHICH WAS THE LAST TIME THE BORT DISCUSSED, HIGHLIGHTING 22 IDEAS FROM PRIOR DISCUSSION THAT ALIGN WITH HCD'S FOCUS AND 23 NEED TO DETERMINATION ON RHNA CALIFORNIA FUTURE 2040 24 INITIATIVE, BOARD MEMBERS SUGGEST THAT POTENTIAL NEW 25

METHODOLOGY FACTORS COULD INCLUDE JURISDICTIONS WITH LOW 1 PROPERTY TAX RECEIPTS, HAZARDS OR IMPACTS FROM CLIMATE CHANGE, 2 3 AND WATER CAPACITY. THEY EXPRESSED CONCERN THAT THE STATE'S DEFINITION OF HIGH OPPORTUNITY AREAS WHICH WAS USED AS A 4 5 FACTOR IN ABAG BAG'S RHNA METHODOLOGY DOES NOT CONSIDER TRANSIT PROXIMITY REQUESTED GUIDANCE FROM THE STATE ABOUT THE 6 COGS ANALYSIS OF THE METHODOLOGY FACTOR RELATED TO AVAILABLE 7 8 LANDS SUITABLE FOR URBAN DEVELOPMENT. THEY WANTED TO ALLOW CITY TO CITY RHNA TRANSFERS IN ADDITION TO THE TRANSFERS THAT 9 ARE CURRENTLY ALLOWED FROM A COUNTY TO A CITY OR TOWN. THEY 10 REQUESTED MORE OPTIONS FOR JURISDICTIONS TO RECEIVE CREDIT 11 TOWARD RHNA GOALS, INCLUDING MAKING IT EASIER TO GET CREDIT 12 FOR PRESERVING AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AND ALLOWING CREDIT IN THE 13 CURRENT RHNA CYCLE FOR A JURISDICTION THAT ISSUED PERMITS IN 14 15 EXCESS OF ITS ALLOCATION FROM A PREVIOUS CYCLE. AND THEY 16 SUGGESTED THAT THE STATES SHOULD OFFER GREATER CLARITY ABOUT POTENTIAL REMEDIES IF IT BECAME IMPOSSIBLE FOR A JURISDICTION 17 TO ACCOMMODATE ITS RHNA AS A RESULT OF DROUGHT. NEXT SLIDE 18 PLEASE. SO, IN CLOSING, I WANT TO REVIEW SOME OF THE KEY 19 MILESTONES THAT HCDS PROCESS FOR THE CALIFORNIA'S FUTURE 2040 20 21 THE NEXT RHNA INITIATIVE. AS I MENTIONED THE SOUNDING BOARD HAS TWO MORE MEETINGS TAKING PLACE MAY 31ST AND JUNE 5TH. THE 22 SCHEDULED MEETINGS AND THE AGENDA TOPICS ARE AVAILABLE ON 23 HCD'S WEB SITE WITH A LINK THAT'S SHOWN HERE ON THE SLIDES. 24 25 THE MEETINGS ARE NOT OPEN TO THE PUBLIC, BUT YOU CAN SUBMIT

WRITTEN COMMENTS ON THE AGENDA ITEMS TO THE DEDICATED E-MAIL. 1 2 WHICH, AGAIN, IS CA HOUSING FUTURE 2040 AT HCD.CA.GOV. I 3 SHOULD NOTE THAT THE SOUNDING BOARD IS NOT A DECISION-MAKING BODY SO IT'S ONLY ADVISING HCD STAFF. THE USUAL PUSH YOU GET WHEN 18 BUILDING IN NEIGHBORHOOD SOCIAL SECURITY WE DON'T WANT THAT 19 AROUND SO I GET ONE OF THOSE IT'S BEEN OUITE A SUCCESS STORY. 20 I WOULD LIKE TO SEE MORE CITY TO CITY TYPE IF THAT'S POSSIBLE. 21 ONE THING THAT'S COME UP -- BY THE WAY, I THINK WE'RE AT ONE 22 HUNDRED 56% OF RHNA ALLOCATION FOR LOW-INCOME HOUSING. WE'RE 23 BUILDING A LOT BECAUSE WE HAVE THE ROOM TO BUILD IT IN. IN MY 24 25 APPROACH IS THAT I'M NOT OPPOSED TO BUILDING; BUILD IT RIGHT.

THESE ARE ALL BUILT FOLLOWING TERMS THAT COME FORWARD ON 1 2 CLIMATE CHANGE AND ELIMINATING GREENHOUSE GAS. ONE OF THE 3 ISSUES COMING UP IS COST OF BUILDING. ONE DEVELOPER CAME UP WITH A CREATIVE IDEA, UNITS ARE BUILT ROBOTICALLY, HALF THE 4 5 COST OF STANDARD CONSTRUCTION, 50 BY 75 FOOT MODULE ONE OF THEM IS A STUDIO APARTMENT COMES WITH ALL THE KITCHEN 6 AMENITIES, BATHROOM, JUST HAVE TO HOOK THEM UP, FIVE MINUTES 7 8 OFF LOADED, ABOUT AN HOUR TO HOOK UP, STACKED TOGETHER TWO OF THEM ARE TWO BEDROOM ONE BATH THREE OF THEM ARE THREE BEDROOM 9 10 TWO BATH SOMETIMES REFERRED TO AS LEGO HOUSES, QUITE AN IMPROVEMENT FOLLOWING AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND NEIGHBORHOODS IF 11 YOU HAVE NEW CONSTRUCTION BUILDING FIRST FOLKS DON'T WANT 12 THAT, WHETHER THEY WANT TO BUY A HOUSE ACROSS THE STREET OR 13 NOT WHEN THEY COME IN. I WANTED TO SHARE THAT PIECE OF 14 INFORMATION. CLIMATE ISSUES, WONDERING HOW WE LOOK AT 15 16 ADDRESSING THAT, HELPING CITIES NAPA COUNTY DEVASTATING FIRE. PRIOR YEAR SANTA ROSA AND SONOMA COUNTY. THERE'S A NEED TO 17 CLEAR UNDERBRUSH I'LL TURN IT THAT WAY AND IT WILL BE 18 INTERESTING IF THERE IS ANYTHING IN THIS PROCESS THAT ALLOWS 19 FOR FINANCING FOR THOSE TYPES OF ACTIVITY. THANK YOU. 20

THERE'S -- AS YOU KNOW, THE PANDEMIC REALLY HAS 13 CHANGED HOW PEOPLE WORK AND LIVE. AND, SO, I THINK THIS WHOLE 14 15 PROXIMITY TO JOBS AND THINGS LIKE THAT, ALL OF THAT HAS TO BE REEXAMINED IN LIGHT OF THE PANDEMIC, ESPECIALLY SINCE THERE 16 HAS BEEN A MASS EXODUS OF PEOPLE THAT ARE LIVING AND WORKING 17 IN SAN FRANCISCO. BECAUSE YOU CAN NOW LIVE IN SEATTLE AND WORK 18 IN SAN FRANCISCO REMOTELY. SO, I THINK THAT REALLY NEEDS TO 19 HAVE SOME DISCUSSION AT SOME POINT. BECAUSE THAT WOULD 20 DEFINITELY CHANGE THE ATTITUDE OF HOW MUCH HOUSING DO WE NEED. 21 AND SO THE NUMBER OF JOBS MAY NOT NECESSARILY BE A GOOD 22 INDICATIVE OF WHAT IS NEEDED IN THE BAY AREA. BECAUSE THEY MAY 23 BE LIVING IN SEATTLE IF THE JOB IS IN SAN FRANCISCO. AND THERE 24 IS A LOT OF PEOPLE THAT ARE DOING THAT. I THINK THERE ARE SOME 25

OTHER THINGS, TOO, THAT WE MIGHT WANT TO ADVOCATE FOR IS THAT 1 2 WE HAD SOME DISCUSSION ABOUT ELIMINATING THE HIGH FIRE RISK 3 AREAS FROM CONSIDERATION FOR GROWTH. SAME THING WITH SEA LEVEL RISE, BCDC AND OTHER AGENCIES ARE GETTING A BETTER AND MORE 4 5 ACCURATE ESTIMATE OF WHAT IMPACTS IT'S GOING TO HAVE AVAILABLE PROPERTY AND, ALSO, IMPACT ON EXISTING HOUSING, TOO. THAT 6 NEEDS TO BE CONSIDERED. AND FACTORED IN. AND I ALSO HAVE TO 7 8 URGE TO YOU BRING UP THE ISSUE OF WHAT DO YOU INTEND TO DO WHEN A CITY OR TOWN LIKE BELVEDERE IS AN ISLAND ACTUALLY TWO 9 10 ISLANDS AND THEY CAN'T BUILD ANY MORE LAND, BCDC IS NOT GOING TO ALLOW THEM TO FILL, AND SO YOU KNOW THERE ARE RULES ABOUT 11 GOING UP, YOU JUST CAN'T KEEP BUILDING UP. SO AT SOME POINT, I 12 THINK THERE ARE GOING TO BE SOME CITIES BUILT OUT 13 GEOGRAPHICALLY AND I THINK THAT NEEDS TO BE CONSIDERED AND 14 15 THERE IS PROBABLY NOT THAT MANY OF US, BUT I'M THINKING OF 16 TIBURON OR BELVEDERE, THEY'RE LAND LOCKED. AND I, ALSO, HAVE -- FILLED OUT THE SURVEY QUESTION. DID NOT FEEL THAT THEY WERE 17 GOOD QUESTIONS ABOUT THE PROCESS, AND THEY WERE REALLY FOCUSED 18 ON ISSUES THAT THEY WERE CONCERNED ABOUT, NOT NECESSARILY HOW 19 DO YOU FACTOR WHAT IS NEEDED IN CALIFORNIA OR IN THE REGION, 20 AND THEN WHAT IS ABLE TO BE BUILT. LASTLY, I THINK THAT CITIES 21 DO NOT HAVE CONTROL OVER DEVELOPERS THAT WILL ONLY DO THE 22 MINIMUM ON LOW-INCOME. SO, I THINK THAT WE REALLY DO NEED TO 23 MAKE SURE THAT ALL HOUSING, ESPECIALLY IF WE HAVE BUILT MORE 24 IN ONE HOUSING CYCLE, WE SHOULD GET CREDIT FOR THAT IN THE 25

FUTURE. BECAUSE THAT -- AND BECAUSE WE DON'T HAVE CONTROL OVER 1 WHAT THE DEVELOPERS NECESSARILY BUILD. AND BUILDERS HAVE TOLD 2 ME, AND I AM SURE ALL OF US HAVE HEARD THIS, THAT THERE IS 3 ONLY SO MUCH THAT THEY CAN DO IN TERMS OF BUILDING LOW-INCOME 4 5 UNITS AS PART OF THEIR DEVELOPMENT. WE'RE FIGHTING A DEVELOPER RIGHT NOW ON A MAJOR DEVELOPMENT THAT WAS COMMERCIAL. AND, SO, 6 I THINK THAT WE REALLY DO NEED TO GET MORE. AND THEN THIS 7 8 WHOLE ISSUE OF TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING, I THINK THAT WHOLE ISSUE NEEDS TO BE REALLY LOOKED AT. THOSE ARE SOME OF MY 9 COMMENTS. AND REALLY OPPOSED TO THE WAY THAT THEY'RE 10 CONDUCTING THESE BECAUSE THESE ARE NOT BEING DONE IN A PUBLIC 11 FASHION. AND JUST IS THE -- IT VIOLATES EVERY RULE IN OUR BOOK 12 IN CALIFORNIA. AND I DON'T KNOW HOW HCD IS GETTING BY THAT. 13 BUT, I HOPE, JESSE, PRESIDENT ARREGUIN, THAT WE CAN GET 14 UPDATES AS WE'RE GOING. BECAUSE I THINK THAT GETTING MORE 15 16 FEEDBACK FROM US ON SOME OF THE ISSUES THAT THEY'RE DEALING WITH, OUR OWN MECHANISM TO PROVIDE INPUT IS THROUGH GILLIAN. 17 SO I SUGGEST THAT WE KEEP THIS ON EVERY ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD 18 MEETING JUST SO WE CAN GET AN UPDATE AND PROVIDE INPUT ON 19 WHERE WE'RE GOING SO WE CAN MAKE SURE THAT OUR VOICE IS BEING 20 21 HEARD. SO, THANK YOU. AND DOING A GOOD JOB, GILLIAN.

SO IT'S NOT CLEAR TO ME YET 9 10 EXACTLY WHAT FORM THE JULY 4TH -- SORRY -- JULY 1ST UPDATE TO THE LEGISLATURE WILL TAKE. SO I THINK MY ROLE AS A SOUNDING 11 BOARD MEMBER IS DONE EARLY JUNE. 12 13 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: YEAH. BUT THERE WILL BE SUBSEQUENT 14 15 TO THAT, THERE WILL BE SOME REPORT ON SOME THINGS THAT WILL BE 16 ADMINISTRATIVE AND SOME THINGS THAT MIGHT BE LEGISLATIVE. AND I'LL GET TO THAT SHORTLY. OKAY. WE'LL GO TO THE SAN JOSE ROOM. 17 18 SPEAKER: THANKS SO MUCH. I APPRECIATE ALL THE HARD WORK, HERE, 19 BY ABAG STAFF AND BY MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. THERE 20 ARE A LOT OF GREAT SUGGESTIONS AND FEEDBACK. I 1 WON'T DOUBLE DOWN ON THAT, BUT I THINK IT'S VERY PROBLEMATIC. 2 3 AND I WANT TO VOICE AN EXTREME AMOUNT OF CONCERN WITH THE SUGGESTION TO HAVE -- TO POTENTIALLY ALLOW CITY TO CITY 4 5 TRANSFERS OF UNITS, INSTEAD OF JUST COUNTY TO CITY, IN A LIMITED NUMBER OF CASES. AND AS FOR THE REASON THAT THAT HAS 6 THE POTENTIAL TO CREATE TWO DIFFERENT SETS OF RULES FOR THOSE 7 8 WHO HAVE FUNDING AND FOR THOSE WHO DON'T. AND I JUST DON'T THINK WE CAN -- WITH THE SCOPE OF THE HOUSING CRISIS, WE CAN'T 9 ALLOW JURISDICTIONS TO BUY THEIR WAY OUT OF HAVING THE --10 BEING ABLE TO ACHIEVE HOUSING JUSTICE. SO EXTREME AMOUNT OF 11 CONCERN WITH THAT SUGGESTION. AND I THINK ALSO WE HAVE ANOTHER 12 MEMBER HERE WHO WISHES TO --13

15 NEYSA FLIGOR: THANK YOU COUNCIL MEMBER LOPEZ. NEYSA FLIGOR, 16 SANTA CLARA COUNTY. I WANT TO ECHO THE THANKS TO GILLIAN, MISS 17 ADAMS, GREAT PRESENTATION, EXCELLENT AS USUAL. AND THANK YOU FOR SERVING ON THE SOUNDING BOARD AND FOR COMING BACK TO THE 18 EXECUTIVE BOARD AND PROVIDING THIS UPDATE. VERY OF 19 APPRECIATED. A LOT OF WHAT I WANTED TO COMMENT ON HAS ALREADY 20 21 BEEN SAID, EXPANDING ON HOW WE IMPROVE ON OUTCOMES AND THE INCENTIVE PIECE, GILLIAN. I KNOW, AS SOMEONE WHO WORKED ON THE 22 METHODOLOGY COMMITTEE, A LOT OF THAT WAS DONE AT THAT LEVEL 23 WHERE WE TRY TO DETERMINE, FOR EXAMPLE, IF A PARTICULAR 24 25 JURISDICTION MET ITS RHNA FIFTH CYCLE, HOW DO WE GIVE CREDIT

TO THAT JURISDICTION WITH THE NUMBER OF DISTRIBUTION. I THINK 1 AS WE LOOK TO THE SEVENTH CYCLE, IF JURISDICTIONS HAVE MET 2 3 THEIR RHNA NUMBERS, THEY SHOULD BE CREDITED THAT WOULD BE A HUGE INCENTIVE TO REACH AND ACHIEVE THEIR RHNA NUMBERS IF THEY 4 5 WILL BE CREDITED IN THE 7TH CYCLE, IF THEY COME CLOSE TO MEETING THEIR FULL ALLOCATION NUMBERS. I HOPE HCD AND 6 SACRAMENTO GIVES CONSIDERATION TO HOW WE INCENTIVIZE AND GET 7 8 HOUSING BUILT IN THESE DIFFERENT JURISDICTIONS AND THE FUNDING PIECE I AGREE 100% WE'RE GOING TO GET HOUSING BUILT WE NEED 9 10 OUR COMMUNITIES WE NEED FUNDING, HCD NEEDS TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE A BIG PART OF THEIR REPORT BACK TO SACRAMENTO, AND 11 DEFINING UNITS. THERE IS THERE SHOULD BE A CLEAR DEFINITION 12 FOR UNITS, COULD BE ONE BEDROOM APARTMENT, WE NEED TO MAKE 13 SURE THERE IS FLEXIBILITY IN DEFINING A UNIT, ENCOURAGING TWO 14 15 OR THREE BEDROOM UNITS FOR FAMILIES WHATEVER WE CAN DO, TO 16 ENCOURAGE UNITS I THINK THAT WOULD HAVE MORE THAN ONE BEDROOM 17 I THINK THAT WILL SERVE OUR COMMUNITY AS WELL. AND LAST THING I ECHO OTHERS ON THE FLEXIBILITY TOWARD RHNA ALLOCATION, AND 18 THE STUDENT HOUSING, I KNOW THERE WERE RESTRICTIONS AND 19 CONFUSION AT THE BEGINNING OF THIS CYCLE AND COUNT TOWARDS 20 21 THAT NUMBER SO I THINK THAT CLARITY AND FLEXIBILITY ON THAT WOULD BE HELPFUL. THANK YOU. 22

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. NOT SEEING OTHER
SPEAKERS ON ZOOM. I'M GOING TO JUMP IN. I AGREE WITH MANY OF

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THE CONSIDERATIONS OF STAFF, FIRST STARTING WITH THE IDEA OF 1 2 GROUP HOUSING I THINK THIS IS AN ISSUE THAT WARRANTS MORE 3 CONSIDERATION, THE MAYOR, BERKELEY HOME OF THE FLAGSHIP UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA CAMPUS, FLAGSHIP UNIVERSITY OF 4 5 CALIFORNIA HOPEFULLY THE COURT WILL LET THEM BUILD ON PEOPLE'S PARK BUT THAT'S AN ENTIRELY DIFFERENT MATTER, AND HOPEFULLY 6 HOST CITIES FOR UC CAMPUSES THAT HAVE RAISED AS WELL, AND IT 7 8 MAY BE CHALLENGING TO HAVE ADEQUATE DATA TO COUNT GROUP LIVING ACCOMMODATIONS, THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WOULD HAVE TO BE LOOKED 9 10 AT IN THAT CONTEXT. THIS BECOMING MORE COMMON, STUDENT HOUSING, PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, PEOPLE LIVING IN GROUP 11 OR COMMUNAL SITUATIONS BECAUSE IT'S AFFORDABLE, I THINK IT'S 12 SOMETHING WE HAVE TO LOOK AT NOT JUST BY UNIT BUT DIFFERENT 13 TYPES OF HOUSING SITUATIONS. I WANT TO CALL ATTENTION TO THAT 14 15 AND I APPRECIATE YOU FLAGGING THAT WITH RESPECT TO THE 16 PROCESS. WE SHOULD EMPHASIZE AS A COG THAT WE THE STATE TO CREATE ANOTHER PROGRAM FOR THE 7th CYCLE THAT WAS EXTREMELY 17 IMPORTANT FOR THE STATE TO PROVIDE THE MONEY AGAIN THAT'S THE 18 ONLY WAY THIS IS GOING TO WORK EFFECTIVELY, CERTAINLY THE MORE 19 CLARITY THAT COULD BE PROVIDED ON AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING 20 FAIR HOUSING REQUIREMENTS, FOR PROVIDING DATA SETS I AGREE 21 WITH THE LANGUAGE REGARDING APPEALS THAT -- AND I'M JUST 22 TRYING TO FIND THAT HERE -- THAT WE SHOULD AMEND THE STATUTE 23 TO PROHIBIT JURISDICTIONS FROM APPEALING TO OVERALL 24 25 METHODOLOGY. THAT WAS AN ONGOING ISSUE THAT WE DEALT WITH.

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MANY OF US HAVE PTSD FROM THE APPEALS, THE 28 APPEALS THAT WE 1 HAD TO HEAR. PEOPLE WERE APPEALING THE UNDERLYING METHODOLOGY 2 WHEN THE REALITY, THEY'RE ABILITY TO APPEAL IS LIMITED TO 3 THREE CRITERIA. SO I THINK REALLY MAKING THAT CLEAR, EITHER 4 5 YOU ALLOW PEOPLE TO APPEAL THE METHODOLOGY, OR YOU DON'T. BUT I THINK THAT NEEDS TO BE CLEAR. AND I DO AGREE WITH THE 6 SUGGESTION OF MANY TO CLARIFY THE PROCEDURE IN THE CASE THAT 7 8 NO APPEALS WERE FILED, I DO NOT -- I DOUBT THAT'S GOING HAPPEN IN THE 7TH CYCLE, BUT IN THE CASE IT DOES THAT MIGHT BE 9 10 HELPFUL. I THINK MORE CLARITY ABOUT WHAT ARE THE CIRCUMSTANCES UNDER WHICH PEOPLE CAN APPEAL NEEDS TO BE CLARIFIED, 11 STATUTORILY, AND ALSO IN GUIDANCE FROM HCD AND THE GOINGS IS 12 EXTREMELY PERSONALITY BECAUSE THAT WILL SAVE EVERYONE LOTS OF 13 TIME. SOME PEOPLE APPEALED BECAUSE I THINK THEY THOUGHT THAT I 14 15 HAD THE OBLIGATION TO APPEAL KNOWING THEY WERE UNLIKELY TO BE 16 SUCCESSFUL IN APPEALING AND THEY CERTAINLY HAVE THE RIGHT TO DO SO IF SO INCLINED. LET ME SEE HERE. I AGREE WITH PROVIDING 17 A BUFFER AROUND THE SCS, AND THE RHNA. THIS WAS AN ISSUE WHEN 18 WE WERE DOING OUR RHNA METHODOLOGY. BECAUSE WE HADN'T ACTUALLY 19 FINALIZED THE SCS. AND WE ACTUALLY DIDN'T HAVE A FINAL 20 21 BLUEPRINT AND THOSE REPRESENT SAN FRANCISCO MAY REMEMBER ALL OF A SUDDEN THE NUMBERS CHANGED AND THAT WAS DIFFICULT. AND I 22 THINK IT UPSET A LOT OF CITIES. AND I THINK IF WE CAN ACTUALLY 23 HAVE A BUFFER BETWEEN WHEN THE SCS IS DONE, AND WHEN THE RHNA 24 25 IS DONE, THEN WE KNOW WHAT THE NUMBERS ARE, AND WE'RE NOT

GOING TO BE SURPRISED AND WE CAN ACTUALLY PLAN APPROPRIATELY. 1 SO, I THINK THAT'S -- I THINK THE SAN FRANCISCO SITUATION, AND 2 3 CONTRA COSTA'S WAS AFFECTED TOO, ARE PRIME EXAMPLES WE COULD CITE IN THAT CASE. CLIMATE HAZARDS I KNOW THAT CLIMATE HAZARDS 4 5 ARE A FACTOR. BUT I DO THINK THAT SEA LEVEL RISE AND FIRE RISK -- MAYBE IT'S SUSTAINABLE HIGH FIRE SEVERITY ZONE THAT NEEDS 6 TO BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION, WE NEED TO BE MORE SPECIFIC 7 8 RECOGNIZING DIFFERENTLY JURISDICTIONS HAVE DIFFERENT CLIMATE RISKS THERE ARE SOME CALIFORNIA CITIES SPECIFICALLY THAT EXIST 9 10 THAT NEED TO BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION, AND THERE ARE CITIES THAT ARE GOING TO BE FLOODED AND SOMETHING THAT BCDC IS HAVING 11 CONVERSATIONS AROUND IN TERMS OF BAY ADAPT AND PLANNING WE 12 WANT COMMUNITIES TO DO INTENTIONALLY IN TERMS OF HOW WE'RE 13 ADAPTING TO SEA LEVEL RISE. MANY OF US LIVE IN AREAS WHERE 14 15 WE'RE ON THE WILDLAND URBAN INTERFACE OR DIRECTLY IN THE 16 WILDLAND, AND THOSE SUPERVISOR REPRESENTED COUNTIES AND WE DON'T WANT TO PUT HOMES AND PLACES WHERE THEY'RE GOING TO 17 BURN. AND I THINK WE NEED TO BE INTENTIONAL AS A STATE 18 ENCOURAGING SUSTAINABLE TRANSIT ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT. AND I 19 THINK THIS DOES GET TO THE OUESTION OF FLEXIBILITY IN TERMS OF 20 UNIT TRANSFERS AND PEOPLE FORMING SUBREGIONS. AND I THINK WE 21 NEED TO ENCOURAGE MORE PEOPLE TO DO SUBREGIONS BECAUSE I THINK 22 T HAT PROVIDES MORE FLEXIBILITY FOR THE CITIES AND COUNTY TO 23 FIGURE HOW THEY WANT TO PLAN ALLOCATION OF THEIR UNITS IN 24 25 THEIR COUNTY. I HEAR THE CONCERN AROUND ENABLING CITY TO CITY

TRANSFERS BUT I WILL SAY THERE ARE CIRCUMSTANCES WHERE DUE TO 1 2 GEOGRAPHY AND LIMITED LAND IT ACTUALLY TECHNICALLY IS NOT 3 FEASIBLE FOR A CITY TO ACTUALLY MEET THEIR NUMBERS. SO HOW DO WE ALLOW FOR FLEXIBILITY IN THOSE CIRCUMSTANCES FOR CITIES TO 4 5 TRANSFER THEIR UNITS. I'D SAY ONLY IF THEY PAY A PRETTY SIGNIFICANT MONETARY PENALTY EITHER AT A REGIONAL FUND OR TO 6 THE STATE. I DON'T THINK YOU SHOULD ALLOW CITY TO CITY 7 8 TRANSFERRED WITHOUT BEING SOME CONTRIBUTION TOWARDS OF THE OVERALL AFFORDABLE HOUSING NEED OF THE REGION. THAT'S MY 9 10 PERSPECTIVE SOME OF IT IS LEGISLATIVE AND ADMINISTRATIVE. AT THE OUTCOME OF THE PROCESS, IDENTIFYING AND DISTINGUISHING 11 THOSE TYPES OF CHANGES. BUT SOME OF THIS, WE WOULD NEED TO, AS 12 AN AGENCY, INCLUDE IN OUR LEGISLATIVE PLATFORM, CORRECT, ABOUT 13 THINGS THAT WE WANT TO SEE CHANGED IN THE HOUSING ELEMENT 14 15 STATUTE.

17 GILLIAN ADAMS: I WOULD THINK SO, YEAH. IT'S UNCLEAR NOW WHICH18 DIRECTION THEY'RE GOING TO GO IN TERMS OF PROCEDURAL

19 CHALLENGES VERSUS LEGISLATIVE CHANGES.

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: YEAH AND WHO KNOWS WHEN THE LEGISLATIVE CHANGES WILL HAPPEN. WE DID RECOMMEND ONE CHANGE WHICH IS GIVING FLEXIBILITY IN THE CASE OF COMPLIANCE TO BE ABLE TO EXTEND THEIR TIMELINE EVEN IF PAST THE DEADLINE BECAUSE BUILDERS REMEDY KICKS IN. AND WE SUBMITTED OUR HOUSING

ELEMENT THOUGHT WE WERE DONE THEN THE DAY BEFORE THE DEADLINE 1 2 HCD PROVIDED A NEW SET OF COMMENTS SO WE HAD TO THEN MAKE 3 ADJUSTMENTS AND WE GOT CERTIFIED TWO OR THREE WEEKS LATER BUT THE WHOLE OUESTION OF BUILDERS REMEDY IT'S PROVIDED CONFUSION 4 5 BECAUSE OF STATUTE SAYS THAT THE CITY CAN'T MAKE DETERMINATION OF HCD COMPLIANCE SAID WE'RE THE ONLY ONES WHO CAN DETERMINE 6 COMPLIANCE SO THERE NEEDS TO BE CLARIFICATION LEGISLATIVELY 7 8 BECAUSE WE HAVE THE LAW SAYING ONE THING AND THE STATE SAYING ANOTHER THING AND THE STATE AGENCY IMPLEMENTING THE LAST THING 9 10 AND ANOTHER THING AND SOMEHOW WE NEED TO RECONCILE THAT. THE FACT THAT THE BAY 2 3 AREA HAS SO MANY HOUSING ELEMENTS CERTIFIED, AND AT SOME POINT WE COULD GET AN UPDATE ON THAT ACTUALLY HOW MANY HAVE BEEN 4 5 CERTIFIED COMPARED TO SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA OR SACRAMENTO'S COUNCIL OF REGIONAL GOVERNMENTS, ADMINISTERS WHAT WE DID HERE 6 IN THE BAY AREA WITH THE REAP PROGRAM, WORK YOU DID WITH STAFF 7 8 AND I THINK WE SHOULD HIGHLIGHT THAT WORK TO THE STATE AS AN EXAMPLE OF THE SUCCESS OF HOW WE SPENT THIS MONEY WHY THE 9 10 MONEY IS IMPORTANT AND HOW COULD THIS WORK REALLY WELL.
