- 19 CAROL IN 2014 WAS NAMED MTC'S FIRST-EVER DIRECTOR OF
- 20 ELECTRONIC PAYMENTS. WHERE SHE GUIDED A STAFF OF MORE THAN
- 21 THREE DOZEN TO DELIVER NEW TECHNICAL PROGRAMS SUCH AS MOBILE
- 22 CLIPPER CARD, TO COORDINATE, EXPAND, ADAPT, IMPROVE THE MYRIAD

- 4 PARTICIPATING IN THAT, A NUMBER OF THE TRANSIT AGENCIES THAT

- 5 AND CLEANLINESS ON BART WAS ALSO VERY HIGH PRIORITY AND

- 14 VISION. SO WE'VE DRAFTED SOMETHING HERE. I'LL READ IT THROUGH

- 16 AREA HAS A WORLD-CLASS, RELIABLE, AFFORDABLE, AND CONNECTED
- 17 TRANSPORTATION NETWORK THAT MEETS THE NEEDS OF BAY AREA
- 18 RESIDENTS, BUSINESSES AND VISITORS AND COMBATS THE CLIMATE
- 19 CRISIS. THAT THE PUBLIC TRANSIT NETWORK IS ACCESSIBLE, EASY TO
- 20 NAVIGATE, AFFORDABLE, AND GETS RIDERS WHERE THEY WANT AND NEED
- 21 TO GO. SERVICE, FARES, SCHEDULES, CUSTOMER INFORMATION AND
- 22 TRANSIT IDENTITY ARE COORDINATED AND CONSISTENT ACROSS TRANSIT
- 23 SYSTEMS. AND BEAR WITH ME, TRANSIT, BIKING AND WALKING ARE
- 24 RELIABLE AND SAFE ALTERNATIVES TO DRIVING, RESULTING IN
- 25 INCREASED RIDERSHIP, BIKING AND WALKING AND REP DEUCED GROWTH



- 1 IN VEHICLE MILES TRAVELED. THE BAY AREA HAS THE RESOURCES
- 2 NEEDED TO SUSTAIN AND ENHANCE MULTI-MODAL TRANSPORTATION
- 3 OPTIONS INCLUDING ASSOCIATED INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT AND TO
- 4 ENSURE THE REGION'S INFRASTRUCTURE AND SERVICES ARE
- 5 DEPENDABLE, EFFICIENT, AND SAFE. WE CAN PROBABLY WORK ON

- 20 OFTEN IN THE PAST, SUCH AS REGIONAL MEASURE 3 OR REGIONAL
- 21 MEASURE 2 WHICH IS A LONG LIST OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS
- 22 THAT WOULD RECEIVE, YOU KNOW, SOME PORTION OF FUNDING FOR A
- 23 SPECIFIC PROJECT, YOU KNOW, THAT HAS BEEN KIND OF THE APPROACH
- 24 THAT WE'VE TAKEN WITH BRIDGE TOLLS AND THE COUNTIES HAVE TAKEN
- 25 TO SOME EXTENT WITH SALES TAX MEASURES BUT THINKING IT MORE



- 1 PROGRAMMATICALLY BUT PART OF IT IS DRIVEN BY THE NEED. WE KNOW

- 6 PLAN, HOW YOU DISTRIBUTE ACROSS THESE DIFFERENT CATEGORIES,
- 7 YOU KNOW, WE DO THINK THE LEGISLATURE, STAKEHOLDERS ARE GOING

- 15 WOULD BE FLEXIBLE. AND SO JUST TO GIVE AN EXAMPLE HERE, YOU
- 16 KNOW, LET'S SAY THE SAFE STREETS CATEGORY IS 10%, RIGHT, THAT
- 17 WOULD PROVIDE THE OPPORTUNITY TO THE COMMISSION, YOU KNOW,
- 18 POTENTIALLY IT WOULD SAY EVERY FIVE YEARS YOU WOULD REVISIT
- 19 THESE SHARES TO ADJUST SO MAYBE THERE IS A PERIOD OF TIME
- 20 WHERE SAFE STREETS IS GETTING 30%, YOU KNOW, IF TRANSIT NEEDED
- 21 MORE FUNDING IN THE NEAR TERM, MAYBE IT WOULD BE GETTING
- 22 SOMETHING CLOSER TO 70% AND THAT MIGHT CHANGE OVER TIME. SO
- 23 THAT'S THE CONCEPT WE'RE THINKING ABOUT. AGAIN, IT'S IMPORTANT
- 24 TO DISTINGUISH WHAT THE ENABLING LEGISLATION SAYS AND HOW MUCH
- 25 KIND OF RIGIDITY IT HAS AND WHAT WE ARE PUTTING ON THE BALLOT



- 1 THAT MIGHT BE MORE SPECIFIC AND WE CAN PURSUE LANGUAGE IN THE
- 2 ENABLING LEGISLATION THAT GIVES THE COMMISSION THE DISCRETION
- 3 TO MAKE THOSE DECISIONS. NEXT SLIDE. SO ON THE FUNDING
- 4 SOURCES, WE HIRED A CONSULTANT TO HELP US THINK ABOUT A WIDE
- 5 RANGE OF DIFFERENT FUNDING MECHANISMS, SALES TAX HAS BEEN THE
- 6 TRIED AND TRUE MECHANISM IN THE BAY AREA AT THE LOCAL AREA. OF
- 7 COURSE, BRIDGE TOLLS HAS BEEN AT THE REGIONAL LEVEL. WE KNEW
- 8 THERE WERE CONCERNS ABOUT -- BOTH OF THOSE. WE DID KEEP SALES
- 9 TAX ON THE MENU AND WHAT WE ASK THE CONSULTANT TO DO WAS TO
- 10 BASICALLY LOOK AT -- WHAT WOULD THE RATE BE UNDER A FEW
- 11 DIFFERENT OPTIONS TO GENERATE \$1 BILLION A YEAR? AND GIVE US
- 12 SOME FEEDBACK ON THESE DIFFERENT CRITERIA. REVENUE VOLATILITY,
- 13 EQUITY, ECONOMIC IMPACTS, ADMINISTRATIVE BURDEN AND CO-
- 14 BENEFITS. THE MODEL HERE POTENTIALLY IS TO PURSUE A MENU
- 15 APPROACH AS WE DID IN AB 1487 WHERE THE REGION WOULD HAVE
- 16 SEVERAL DIFFERENT OPTIONS. WE CAN DO POLLING CLOSER TO AN
- 17 ELECTION AND ASSESS WHAT IS MOST SUPPORTABLE BY THE VOTERS, BY
- 18 STAKEHOLDERS, ETC. BECAUSE ULTIMATELY, WE'RE GOING TO NEED TO
- 19 PURSUE SOMETHING THAT WOULD BE PASSED BY THE VOTERS. NEXT
- 20 SLIDE. SO THESE ARE THE OPTIONS THAT WE HAVE ANALYZED AND THEN
- 21 THERE'S A COUPLE OR ONE MORE THAT I'LL TOUCH ON THAT CAME UP
- 22 THROUGH THE STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT. BUT FOR HALF CENT SALES
- 23 TAX, THAT RAISES APPROXIMATELY \$1 BILLION ACROSS THE NINE
- 24 COUNTIES. THAT IS ASSUMING THE NINE COUNTIES. WE LOOKED AT AN
- 25 INCOME TAX AND PAYROLL TAX WHICH ARE DEFINITELY NEW TERRAIN



- 1 FOR CALIFORNIA AND FOR THE BAY AREA WITH RESPECT TO
- 2 TRANSPORTATION. BUT THERE ARE A LOT OF SUBREGIONS, CITIES,
- 3 METROPOLITAN AREAS THAT DO HAVE INCOME TAXES. NEW YORK CITY
- 4 BEING A VERY NOTABLE ONE WITH A PRETTY SUBSTANTIAL TAX. IN THE
- 5 BAY AREA, A .17% INCOME TAX COULD GENERATE \$1 BILLION A YEAR.
- 6 FOR A PAYROLL TAX, THIS COULD BE JUST AT THE EMPLOYER LEVEL.
- 7 IT COULD BE PAID BY THE EMPLOYER AND THE EMPLOYEE. LIKE SOCIAL
- 8 SECURITY. AND THAT WOULD BE .36% TAX. CORPORATE HEAD TAX AND
- 9 PARCEL TAX YOU CAN SEE HERE ARE QUITE HIGH ON A PER UNIT
- 10 BASIS. AND SO WE'RE ACTUALLY RECOMMENDING TO PULL OFF THE
- 11 CORPORATE HEAD TAX. IN OUR CONVERSATIONS WITH THE BUSINESS
- 12 COMMUNITY, I THINK THIS WAS VIEWED AS MORE ONEROUS AND LET
- 13 EQUITABLE THAN A PAYROLL FAX. AND THEN A PARCEL TAX, YOU KNOW,
- 14 YOU CAN SEE THIS IS A VERY HIGH AMOUNT. \$467. WE DON'T THINK
- 15 THAT WOULD PASS. YOU KNOW, EVEN AT A MAJORITY THRESHOLD. AND
- 16 SO WHAT WE'RE PURSUING NOW IS SOME FURTHER ANALYSIS TO SEE
- 17 WHAT THE RATE WOULD BE AT A PER SQUARE FOOT BASIS. AND THEN
- 18 LASTLY, A ROAD USAGE CHARGE. THIS IS ONE THAT WE'RE NOT
- 19 PROPOSING THAT WE COULD DO IN 2026 BUT POTENTIALLY IF THE
- 20 LEGISLATURE AND THE COMMISSION WANTED TO PURSUE THE OPTION TO
- 21 DO MULTIPLE MEASURES OVER TIME. SO PURSUE SOMETHING IN 2026.
- 22 MAYBE 10 YEARS LATER PURSUE SOMETHING ELSE. IF THE STATE DOES
- 23 DEVELOP A ROAD USAGE CHARGE TO REPLACE THE GAS TAX, PERHAPS WE
- 24 COULD HAVE A REGIONAL ADD-ON. SO THAT'S THE IDEA THERE. NEXT
- 25 SLIDE. SO OUR RECOMMENDATION HERE, AGAIN, IS TO REVISE THE



- 1 PARCEL TAX TO PER SQUARE FOOT, REMOVE THE CORPORATE HEAD TAX,
- 2 AND THEN A NUMBER OF STAKEHOLDERS SUGGESTED LOOKING AT A
- 3 VEHICLE REGISTRATION SURCHARGE THAT WOULD BE ASSOCIATED WITH
- 4 THE VALUE OF THE VEHICLE WHICH IS SIMILAR TO WHAT WAS PASSED
- 5 IN SB 1 A FEW YEARS AGO WHERE FOR THE MOST HIGHEST COST
- 6 VEHICLES, IT'S A HIGH RATE. LOWEST COST, IT'S LOWER. SO IT'S
- 7 MORE EQUITABLE IN THAT SENSE. A CONCERN THERE, IT WOULD STILL
- 8 BE -- YOU COULD NOT LIKELY PASS THE MEASURE THAT WOULD
- 9 GENERATE \$1 BILLION A YEAR WITH A VEHICLE REGISTRATION
- 10 SURCHARGE. THE AMOUNT WOULD BE VERY HIGH. SO THIS COULD,
- 11 AGAIN, SIMILAR TO THE ROAD USAGE CHARGE, MAYBE IT'S SOMETHING
- 12 WE HAVE IN OUR TOOL KIT FOR DOWN THE LINE BUT IT WOULDN'T MEET
- 13 OUR NEEDS IN THE NEAR TERM. NEXT SLIDE. SO ONE OF THE PIECES
- 14 OF FEEDBACK WE GOT FROM THE LEG COMMITTEE OVER THE LAST FEW
- 15 MONTHS, YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT THE MONEY. WHAT ABOUT POLICIES?
- 16 HOW ARE WE GOING TO MAKE SURE WE'RE DRIVING TOWARDS THE
- 17 OUTCOMES THAT WE WANT TO SEE. AND SO NEXT, I'LL TALK A LITTLE
- 18 BIT MORE ABOUT THAT. UNDER THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE, THEY
- 19 IDENTIFIED FIVE TRANSFORMATIONAL OUTCOMES THAT WERE REALLY,
- 20 YOU KNOW, THE FOCUS OF THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN AND
- 21 THERE IS A GRAPHIC HERE THAT ILLUSTRATES THOSE. FARES AND
- 22 PAYMENT. CUSTOMER INFORMATION SO SIGNAGE, REAL-TIME SCHEDULE
- 23 INFORMATION. DELIVERING A BETTER AND FASTER NETWORK. SO
- 24 TRANSIT PRIORITY. ACCESSIBILITY. MAKING SURE THE TRANSIT
- 25 SYSTEM IS ACCESSIBLE FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES. AND THEN



- 1 LASTLY, FUNDING. NEXT SLIDE. WE DID POLL ON THIS AS WELL. SO
- 2 WE ASKED VOTERS, YOU KNOW, IF THERE WERE TRANSPORTATION
- 3 MEASURE, HOW IMPORTANT THAT IT INCLUDE THESE PROVISIONS? AND
- 4 THE MOST POPULAR POLICY PROVISION WAS THAT IT HAS STRONG
- 5 OVERSIGHT AND ACCOUNTABILITY TO ENSURE EFFECTIVE AND EFFICIENT
- 6 MANAGEMENT OF TRANSIT AT 80% FELT THAT WAS VERY IMPORTANT OR
- 7 IMPORTANT. NEXT, CREATING A SEAMLESS NETWORK WITH COORDINATED
- 8 FARES, ROUTES, AND SCHEDULES. 73% THOUGHT THAT WAS IMPORTANT.
- 9 AND LASTLY, 61% SUPPORT THE IDEA OF BEING ONE REGIONAL AGENCY
- 10 RESPONSIBLE FOR SETTING FARES, COORDINATING DIFFERENT SERVICE
- 11 SCHEDULES, AND CREATING CONSISTENT MAPS AND SIGNAGE, WHICH WAS
- 12 REALLY THE CHARGE OF THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN. NEXT
- 13 SLIDE. NOW WE COME TO THE STAFF RECOMMENDATION ON THE POLICY
- 14 SIDE AND THAT IS ENABLING LEGISLATION INCLUDES PROVISIONS TO
- 15 STRENGTHEN MTC'S ROLE AS A TRANSIT NETWORK MANAGER, INCLUDING
- 16 THROUGH STATUTORY CHANGE TO ACCELERATE IMPLEMENTATION OF KEY
- 17 TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN -- EXCUSE ME -- ITEMS. AND WE ARE
- 18 SEEKING COMMISSION DIRECTION ON THIS TODAY AS WE WORK TO
- 19 DEVELOP OUR JANUARY PROPOSAL. AND THEN NEXT, OTHER TOPIC
- 20 RELATED TO REFORM IS AROUND GOVERNANCE. IN OUR PRESENTATION TO
- 21 THE LEGISLATION COMMITTEE -- SORRY. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.
- 22 THANKS, ALEX. AT OUR PRESENTATION A COUPLE OF WEEKS AGO TO THE
- 23 LEG COMMITTEE, WE PROVIDED AN OVERVIEW OF STUDIES THAT THE
- 24 COMMISSION HAS DONE OVER THE LAST 15 YEARS OF GOVERNANCE.
- 25 LOOKING AT CONSOLIDATION AROUND POTENTIAL BUS OPERATORS.



- 1 CONSTITUTIONAL CONSOLIDATION OR FUNCTIONAL CONSOLIDATION OF
- 2 THE RAIL SYSTEM. WITH THE FOCUS OF BOTH CUSTOMER ENHANCEMENTS.
- 3 WHAT WE'VE BEEN FOCUSING ON IN THE TRANSFORMATION ACTION PLAN
- 4 AS WELL AS POTENTIAL COST SAVINGS WHICH WAS THE FOCUS OF THE
- 5 TRANSIT SUSTAINABILITY PROJECT. AND THEN MOST RECENTLY, THE
- 6 RAIL PARTNERSHIP STUDY WHICH LOOKED ALSO AT MEGA-PROJECTS
- 7 DELIVERY. WE HAVE I THINK IT'S OVER \$50 BILLION WORTH OF RAIL
- 8 CAPITAL INVESTMENT THAT'S INCLUDED IN THE PLAN. AND WE ALL
- 9 KNOW THAT DELIVERING MEGA-PROJECTS IS A SIGNIFICANT CHALLENGE.
- 10 AND SO IS THERE A WAY TO COORDINATE AND HAVE DIFFERENT TYPE OF
- 11 GOVERNANCE AND OVERSIGHT TO HELP WITH THAT CAPITAL PROJECT
- 12 DELIVERY? WE'RE NOT MAKING A RECOMMENDATION ON THESE ITEMS
- 13 HERE TODAY. WE REALLY WOULD LIKE YOUR FEEDBACK ON WHETHER

- 13 TO UNDERSCORE THE IMPORTANCE OF THIS COMMISSION. I THINK WE
- 14 HAD A VERY ROBUST CONVERSATION AT THE COMMITTEE LEVEL WHEN
- 15 THIS CAME BEFORE US WITH CHAIR CANEPA. I SUPPORT THIS
- 16 DIRECTION. I STILL REMAIN CONFIDENT THAT EVERYTHING HAS TO
- 17 STAY ON THE TABLE. I ALSO EX-KNOWLEDGE THERE ARE SOME PRESSING
- 18 CONCERNS AROUND THE BAY AREA AROUND THE FISCAL CLIFF BUT I
- 19 THINK THIS IS A MOMENT WHERE WE HAVE TO WALK AND CHEW GUM AT
- 20 THE SAME TIME AND PART IS LOOKING AT THIS REGIONAL MEASURE
- 21 HOLISTICALLY. WHAT OUTCOMES DO WE WANT TO ACHIEVE THAT ARE
- 22 MEANINGFUL THAT MAKE A REAL DIFFERENCE? AND PART OF IS GIVING
- 23 MTC THE AUTHORITY TO EFFECTUATE THOSE OUTCOMES. PART IS
- 24 LOOKING AT THE GOVERNANCE SYSTEM AND THE RIGHT NUMBER OF
- 25 OPERATORS THAT WE HAVE FOR THE BETTERMENT OF THE RIDERS. I



ACKNOWLEDGE THERE ARE CONCERNS AROUND THE FISCAL CLIFF AND 1 2 HAVING -- NEEDING TIME TO PLAN APPROPRIATELY. SO I THINK WE 3 HAVE TO LOOK AT WHAT REVENUE MEASURES, WHAT CAN WE DO NOW TO ADDRESS THAT CONCERN AROUND THE FISCAL CLIFF. THAT CAN INCLUDE 4 5 BRIDGE TOLLS. WE HAVE TO TALK ABOUT THE REHAB CONCERNS AROUND THE BRIDGE. FOR ME PERSONALLY, I THINK I'D LIKE TO SEE ALL OF 6 THE ABOVE. NOT TO PRIORITIZE ONE OR THE OTHER, BUT I THINK WE 7 8 HAVE TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT WE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY RIGHT NOW FOR THIS REGIONAL MEASURE AND THAT NEEDS OUR ATTENTION AND OUR 9 10 COMMITMENT TO EXPLORE. WE HAVE LEGISLATORS SUPPORTING THAT AS WELL. WE ALSO HAVE TO SAME TIME LOOK AT WHAT ARE THE OTHER 11 REVENUE MEASURES TO ADDRESS THE CONCERNS OUR REGION IS FACING 12 TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE THAT SEAMLESS TRANSIT NETWORK? THOSE ARE 13 SOME OF MY INITIAL COMMENTS. I'LL SEE IF ANY COMMISSIONERS 14 15 HAVE QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS RIGHT NOW. VICE CHAIR JOSEFOWITZ. 16 V. CHAIR, NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THANK YOU. A HUGE AMOUNT OF WORK 17 18 HAS GONE INTO THIS. I WANTED TO THANK THE CHAIR FOR HIS COMMENTS. THE POLLING ON THIS DOES NOT LOOK GOOD. WE NEED TO 19 ACKNOWLEDGE THAT. WHEN YOU HAVE A MORE THAN 10% GAP IN SORT OF 20 21 SUPPORT, TO BE ABLE TO PAR SOMETHING AND FUNDAMENTALS, CONCERNS ABOUT TRANSPORTATION AND THEY'RE FEELINGS OF THE BAY 22 AREA BEING ON THE WRONG TRACK AND THEY'RE FEELING OVERTAXED 23 AND THINGS LIKE THAT, THE FUNDAMENTALS FOR THIS MEASURE ARE 24

ALSO NOT GOOD. IT DOESN'T FEEL LIKE WE TAKE THE BALLOT



- 1 QUESTION AND GET A 10% POP OR IF WE ADDED OH, A LITTLE BIT OF,
- 2 YOU KNOW, POTHOLES WE WOULD SEE A 10% POP. IT FEELS LIKE THE
- 3 FUNDAMENTALS ARE BAD NOW. THE MEASURE IS COMING IN 2026 OR THE
- 4 PLAN WOULD BE TO PUT THE MEASURE ON IN 2026. AND OBVIOUSLY IF
- 5 WE LOOK BACK AT THREE YEARS, THE FUNDAMENTALS WOULD HAVE BEEN
- 6 REALLY DIFFERENT. LOOKING FORWARD THREE YEARS, THE
- 7 FUNDAMENTALS MAY CHANGE AS WELL. VOTER SENTIMENT MAY CHANGE.
- 8 BUT IN CONVERSATIONS I HAD WITH THE CHAIR AND WITH OUR
- 9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, I'VE BEEN REALLY, REALLY CONCERNED ABOUT
- 10 OUR REGION PUTTING ALL OUR EGGS IN THIS BASKET. WE KNOW THAT
- 11 THE FISCAL CLIFF IS GOING TO TURN IN 2026 MOST LIKELY FOR OUR
- 12 LARGEST OPERATORS AND WE'RE GOING TO BE FACED WITH THE SAME
- 13 CRISIS THAT WE WERE FACED WITH LAST YEAR WITH SORT OF THE
- 14 POTENTIAL FOR MASSIVE SERVICE CUTS THAT ARE REALLY
- 15 DEBILITATING, NOT ONLY FOR THE RIDERS BUT FOR THE WHOLE
- 16 REGION. AND SO I AM AS MUCH AS ANYBODY EXCITED IF WE COULD
- 17 PASS THIS MEASURE BUT I FEEL IT IS IRRESPONSIBLE FOR US TO
- 18 ONLY WORK ON THIS MEASURE. AND SO I REALLY APPRECIATE THE
- 19 COMMENTS THAT THE CHAIR MADE, WHILE WE ARE GOING TO MOVE
- 20 FORWARD TO SEE IF WE CAN GET THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORIZATION FOR
- 21 THIS, TRY AND PUT IT ON THE BALLOT, IF THE SITUATION DOES NOT
- 22 CHANGE WITH THE VOTERS THAT WE WILL AT THE SAME TIME BE
- 23 ENGAGING IN A DISCUSSION WITH THE COMMISSION AND OTHER
- 24 STAKEHOLDERS ABOUT WHAT WOULD BE -- LET'S CALL IT A PLAN B --
- 25 AND WHAT HAPPENS IF WE CAN'T GET THIS MEASURE ON THE BALLOT,



IF WE PUT THIS MEASURE ON THE BALLOT AND IT FAILS AND WHAT 1 WE'LL BE ABLE TO DO -- WE'RE NOT GOING TO BE SITTING THERE 2 3 NOVEMBER 7 OR WHENEVER IT'S GOING TO BE 2026 AND JUST SORT OF WITHOUT ANY OTHER OPTIONS AND OUR TRANSIT AGENCIES GOING 4 5 BANKRUPT LIKE THEY WERE BEFORE. SO IS THAT AN ACCURATE SORT OF 6 7 8 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: YEAH. WHAT I WOULD SAY, VICE CHAIR JOSEFOWITZ. WE SEE PROMISE. WE SEE HOPE. AND WE HAVE TO 9 CONTINUE TO EVALUATE THAT HOPE AND PROMISE AND WE'RE GOING TO 10 LET THE DATA MAKE DECISIONS AT THE SAME TIME. I THINK THE 11 LEGISLATION PROVIDING MTC AUTHORITY IS ALSO A CRITICAL 12 OBJECTIVE GOAL THAT WE WISH TO ACHIEVE. I THINK WHAT WE'RE 13 SAYING THE SAME THING. COMMISSIONER NOACK AND THEN GLOVER. 14 15 16 SUE NOACK: I WANT TO ADD ON TO THAT DISCUSSION ABOUT HOPE AND WHAT HAS TO HAPPEN IN ORDER TO GET A MEASURE PASSED BY 2026. 17 BECAUSE I THINK THERE IS SOME MOVEMENTS IN SMALL AREAS OF 18 IMPROVEMENTS. IN ORDER TO GET A MEASURE PASSED, I THINK PEOPLE 19 REALLY WANT TO SEE SOME OF THE IMPROVEMENTS BEFORE THE MEASURE 20 21 PASSES. NOT VOTING FOR A MEASURE AND THEN HOPING THE 22 TRANSFORMATION OCCURS. - 4 I WAS WITH IS IN THE GARBAGE BUSINESS, NOT IN THE TRANSIT

- 3 IMPORTANT, AS STARTED BY VICE CHAIR THAT THIS MEASURE ISN'T
- 4 LOOKING GOOD AND POLLING WELL. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT'S REALLY
- 5 GOING TO HAVE TO HAPPEN IS TO BE ABLE TO GO OUT TO THE
- 6 SUBREGIONS AND UNDERSTAND WHAT THE NEEDS ARE AND TRY TO MAKE
- 7 SURE THAT THOSE ARE ACCOMMODATED. AND PARTICULAR, I WOULD JUST
- 8 SAY WHEN WE TALK ABOUT CONSOLIDATION OF SERVICES, WE NEED TO
- 9 REALLY DEFINE WHAT THAT MEANS. AND HOW THAT'S GOING TO IMPACT
- 10 COMMUNITIES. SO I HOPE BEFORE THE 12TH, WE WOULD HAVE GONE OUT
- 11 AND DONE OUR HOMEWORK WITH THE SUBREGIONAL AUTHORITIES TO JUST
- 12 UNDERSTAND WHAT THE NEEDS ARE AND HOW WE'RE GOING TO BEST

- 16 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU, COMMISSIONER GLOVER.
- 17 COMMISSIONER ABE-KOGA AND THEN SPERING.

- 19 MARGARET ABE-KOGA: I AGREE. I AGREE, TOO, I DON'T THINK IT
- 20 REALLY LOOKS GOOD GOING OUT FOR A MEASURE, EVEN 2026 SEEMS A
- 21 LITTLE TOO SOON. AND I WOULD JUST ASK THAT WE DO REACH OUT TO
- 22 THE SUBREGION -- THE COUNTIES, THE TRANSIT AGENCIES. NOT TO BE
- 23 PAROCHIAL, BUT I WILL BE. I HAVE SOME GRAVE CONCERNS HOW THIS
- 24 WILL AFFECT SOUTH COUNTY. WE HAVE MEASURES OF OUR OWN. WE HAVE
- 25 SALES TAX THAT ARE HELPING TO FUND OUR TRANSIT SYSTEM AND SOME



- 1 OF THEM ARE SET TO EXPIRE IN THE NEAR TERM. AND SO THIS CAN
- 2 SEVERELY IMPACT WHAT WE CAN DO IN OUR COUNTY. AND SO I THINK
- 3 WE REALLY NEED TO HAVE THOSE DEEPER CONVERSATIONS. I DON'T
- 4 REALLY FEEL COMFORTABLE SAYING, YEAH, WE NEED TO MOVE FORWARD
- 5 ON THIS. AND I ALSO WILL SAY, I DON'T AGREE, I DON'T THINK
- 6 FRANKLY, EVERYTHING -- EVERYTHING COULD BE ON THE TABLE BUT
- 7 HONESTLY, I DON'T REALISTICALLY IT SHOULD BE BECAUSE FROM MY
- 8 UNDERSTANDING HOW THESE THINGS HAVE BEEN STUDIED IN THE PAST,
- 9 THERE HASN'T BEEN A LOT OF MOVEMENT, IF YOU ASK ME, ON SOME OF

- 13 ME, WHAT WE HAVE WITH THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE AND, YOU

- 15 ABOUT WHAT WE WOULD BE ABLE TO FUND, TO BE HONEST. SO I THINK
- 16 THAT WE SHOULD ACTUALLY FOCUS NARROWLY ON WHAT WE REALLY WANT
- 17 TO PRIORITIZE. AND I WILL JUST SAY THIS. I WILL PUT IT OUT ON
- 18 THE TABLE. I KNOW OTHERS WILL CHIME IN IT. BUT THE BART
- 19 CALTRAIN CONSOLIDATED IDEA, I DON'T KNOW WHERE IT CAME FROM.
- 20 IF YOU ASK ANYBODY IN MY NECK OF THE WOODS, NO ONE IS
- 21 SUPPORTING IF. YOU'VE SEEN ALL OF THE LETTERS THAT ARE AGAINST
- 22 IT. WHEN YOU HAVE OUR FEDERAL LEGISLATORS AND OUR STATE
- 23 LEGISLATORS SAYING THEY'RE AGAINST IT, I DON'T KNOW WHY WE'RE
- 24 DISCUSSING THIS. ALL WE'RE DOING IS FUELING THE FIRE OF
- 25 OPPOSITION FOR THE MEASURE SO I WOULD LIKE THAT TO BE TAKEN



- 1 OFF. FRANKLY, IT DIDN'T EVEN POLL VERY HIGH. IT WAS THE LAST
- 2 ITEM. IF YOU REALLY WANT TO GO INTO CONSOLIDATION, THEN I
- 3 THINK IT'S THE BUS OPERATOR CONSOLIDATION ITEM THAT POLLED
- 4 HIGHER. SO THAT SHOULD BE DISCUSSED FIRST. SO I THINK IF WE'RE
- 5 REALLY GOING TO GO DOWN THIS PATH, ONE, NARROW DOWN WHAT WE'RE
- 6 TALKING ABOUT. TWO, TAKE OUT THE ITEMS THAT ARE CATCHING
- 7 OPPOSITION. AND THREE, MAKE SURE THAT WE REALLY DISCUSS THIS
- 8 WITH THE AGENCIES TO SEE WHAT THE IMPLICATIONS WOULD BE. THANK
- 9 YOU.

- 11 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU. COMMISSIONER SPERING AND
- 12 THEN MOULTON-PETERS.

- 14 JAMES SPERING: WE'VE RECENTLY BEEN ACCUSED FOR NOT HAVING A
- 15 VISION. I THINK THAT'S A VERY FAIR CRITICISM. CHANGE IS VERY
- 16 DIFFICULT. AS A PAST ELECTED OFFICIAL, I KNOW HOW IT IS
- 17 DIFFICULT TO ADDRESS SOME OF THESE ISSUES. I THINK IT'S
- 18 SHORTSIGHTED IF WE JUST TAKE THINGS OFF THE TABLE. I THINK
- 19 MAYBE THE WORD ISN'T CONSOLIDATE. MAYBE THE WORD IS
- 20 COORDINATE. TO AT LEAST LOOK AT HOW YOU CAN MAKE THESE SYSTEMS
- 21 FUNCTION BETTER, I THINK WE HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO DO THAT.
- 22 I REALLY APPRECIATE STAFF BRINGING THIS FORWARD AND FINALLY
- 23 CHALLENGING THE COMMISSION. COMMISSION HAS TO START WEIGHING
- 24 IN ON THESE ISSUES. UNTIL WE PUT VERY SPECIFIC -- YOU KNOW, WE
- 25 HAD THE SKELETON IN HERE. WE NEED TO START PUTTING FLESH ON



- 1 IT. WE NEED TO BE SPECIFIC WHAT OUR EXPECTATIONS ARE OR WHAT
- 2 WE WANT. YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE EXAMPLES THAT SOMEONE USED IS
- 3 LIKE THE SENIOR DISCOUNT. IT SHOULD BE THE SAME THROUGHOUT THE
- 4 WHOLE REGION. WE SHOULD HAVE VERY SPECIFIC THINGS WE'RE
- 5 RECOMMENDING. WE'RE NOT DOING THAT. WE'RE NOT PRESENTING THE
- 6 VISION TO THE PUBLIC. AND THAT'S WHY THIS POLL IS AS BAD AS IT
- 7 IS. I DO THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE MOVE FORWARD ON THIS
- 8 ISSUE BECAUSE COME '26, THE CLIMATE MAY BE RIGHT. THE
- 9 REOUIREMENT MAY BE NEEDED. THERE'S A LOT OF THINGS THAT WILL
- 10 CHANGE OVER THE NEXT COUPLE OF YEARS AND I THINK WE GOT TO BE
- 11 FLEXIBLE ENOUGH TO DEAL WITH THAT. IT'S REALLY I THINK
- 12 SHORTSIGHTED TO THINK WE'RE GOING BACK TO PRE-COVID. I REALLY
- 13 BELIEVE IT'S A BAD CALCULATION BECAUSE IT'S NOT GOING BACK
- 14 THERE. AND SO WE HAVE GOT TO START LOOKING AT, YOU KNOW, WHAT
- 15 IS THIS NEW SYSTEM? I HAVE A LITTLE EXCEPTION WITH YOUR NORTH
- 16 STAR VISION STATEMENT WHERE YOU SAY THE BAY AREA HAS A WORLD-
- 17 CLASS RELIABLE. WELL, THE POLL SHOWS US THE PUBLIC DON'T THINK
- 18 WE HAVE A WORLD-CLASS SYSTEM. YOU KNOW, MAYBE THAT SHOULD SAY
- 19 THE BAY AREA REQUIRES, YOU KNOW, A WORLD-CLASS SYSTEM. BUT WE
- 20 HAVE A LOT OF WORK TO DO TO SHOW THE PUBLIC THIS VISION AND I
- 21 THINK WE HAVE A LOT OF WORK TO SHOW THE LEGISLATURE THIS
- 22 VISION WE HAVE AND BE VERY SPECIFIC ON WHAT IT IS. AND THEN
- 23 HAVE THE DEBATE ON THOSE ISSUES. TO ME, I'D LIKE TO SEE WHERE
- 24 WE SAY CONSOLIDATION, CONSOLIDATION/COORDINATE I THINK IS
- 25 GOING TO TAKE A LOT OF THE ANGST AWAY FROM MANY OF THESE



- 1 SMALLER OPERATORS. SOME OF THE SMALLER OPERATORS, YOU MAY WANT
- 2 TO KEEP THOSE BOARDS OR WHOEVER IS GOVERNING THOSE IN PLACE
- 3 BUT THEY'RE PART OF THIS COORDINATED SYSTEM. BUT I JUST WOULD
- 4 LIKE STAFF TO START REALLY ZOOMING IN MORE DETAILED. I CAN'T
- 5 THANK YOU ENOUGH FOR BRINGING THIS DOCUMENT FORWARD AND
- 6 ESPECIALLY THIS ITEM 9, THE ONE YOU PUT TOGETHER. IT'S ABOUT

- 9 WANT YOU TO BE. BUT IT WOULD BE SHORTSIGHTED FOR US NOT TO AT

- 11 THAT WORLD-CLASS SYSTEM THAT WE WANT.
- 13 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU, COMMISSIONER SPERING.
- 14 COMMISSIONER MOULTON-PETERS.
- 16 STEPHANIE MOULTON-PETERS: WE ARE AT THE BEGINNING OF AN
- 17 EXPLORATORY PROCESS RIGHT NOW. AS ONE OF MY COLLEAGUES,
- 18 THEY'RE FOND OF SAYING, YOU DON'T FINISH A RACE YOU DON'T
- 19 START. AND WE HAVE TO START. WE HAVE TO PUT THE FOCUS ON THIS.
- 20 THINGS ARE GOING TO EVOLVE OVER TIME. TWO YEARS IS NOT A VERY
- 21 LONG TIME. AND SO I THINK WE NEED TO BE COMPREHENSIVE IN OUR
- 22 LOOK AND THEN WE NEED TO BE REALISTIC, TOO. DIRECTOR SPERING,
- 23 IT'S RIGHT ON. TO ACCOMPLISH THAT IN TWO YEARS, WHETHER IT'S
- 24 SMALL AGENCIES OR THE LARGE ONES, SO I THINK COORDINATION IS
- 25 THE WAY TO LOOK AT IT. I ALSO THINK TAKING A SYSTEMS VIEW,

- 1 WHICH IS IN THE PROPOSED BUCKET OF FUNDING, IT'S NOT JUST
- 2 SOMETHING FOR EVERYBODY. I WANT TO SHARE A CONVERSATION I HAD
- 3 WITH ALLEN BURNETT THAT I HAD IN SAN RAFAEL WHO I SPOKE TO
- 4 RECENTLY. LOOK, WE OFFER TRANSIT BUT SOME OF OUR FOLKS WHO ARE
- 5 TRANSIT DEPENDENT WANT GET TO THE TRANSIT BECAUSE THEY DON'T
- 6 HAVE THE SIDEWALKS AND THE ABILITY TO GET THERE. SO IT'S NOT
- 7 JUST ABOUT DOING POTHOLES AND SOMETHING FOR ALL USERS. WE HAVE

- 11 BE DEFINED OVER TIME. SO WE NEED TO GO INTO IT THAT WE'RE
- 12 GOING TO GET CLARITY OVER TIME IF WE STAY ON THIS. AND SO THEN
- 13 I THINK I HAVE ALREADY COVERED. IN THE GOVERNANCE, I WOULD
- 14 CERTAINLY LOOK FOR FLEXIBLE -- FOR FUNCTIONAL CONSOLIDATE --
- 15 COORDINATION. BUT I THINK WHILE THESE AGENCIES ARE UNDER
- 16 DURESS FINANCIALLY IS NOT THE TIME TO TRY TO TAKE ON
- 17 STRUCTURAL CHANGE. THEY'LL CERTAINLY LOOK AT THAT, I'M SURE.
- 18 ANYWAY, I'M GLAD WE'RE MOVING INTO THIS AND HAVING A PLAN B IS
- 19 A GOOD IDEA. I AGREE WITH YOU. AND MORE SOURCES OF FUNDING. SO
- 20 IT IS EVERYTHING ON THE TABLE. I THINK WE HAVE TO START.
- 22 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU, MOULTON-PETERS.

- 2 DO THINK TWO YEARS, I BELIEVE WE NEED TO HAVE A FULL-COURT

- 8 HAVE TWO TRANSPORTATION MEASURES NOW. HOW DO YOU GO INTO A
- 9 COUNTY LIKE THAT OR ANY OTHER COUNTY IN THE BAY AREA AND SAY
- 10 THIS ADDITIONAL HALF CENT WILL BRING HOME OR GET YOU SOMETHING
- 11 BIGGER, BETTER, BRIGHTER? TO THE KIND OF GENERATIONAL CHANGE?
- 12 I TALK TO PEOPLE. WE SUFFERED THROUGH MASSIVE WILDFIRES. WE
- 13 WANT TO DO A HALF CENT FIRE TAX AND PEOPLE TELL ME, ISN'T THAT
- 14 A CORE GOVERNMENT SERVICE THAT SHOULD BE INCLUDED IN THE MONEY
- 15 THAT WE ALREADY SPENT? AND ONE COULD ACTUALLY SAY THE SAME
- 16 THING ABOUT TRANSIT. AND THE TRUTH OF THE MATTER IS IN THE BAY
- 17 AREA, AND TO THE CONSOLIDATION ISSUE, WE HAVE 27 AGENCIES
- 18 BECAUSE OF ALL THE DIFFERENT MECHANISMS THAT PUT THEM IN
- 19 PLACE, INCLUDING ALL THE DIFFERENT LOCAL SALES TAX MEASURES
- 20 AND MONEYS FROM DIFFERENT POTS BECAUSE IT WASN'T HAPPENING AT
- 21 THE STATE LEVEL AS IT WAS BACK EAST. AND SO THAT JUST CREATES
- 22 A -- I DON'T MEAN TO BE CYNICAL, ESPECIALLY THIS TIME OF THE

- 6 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: COMMISSIONER PAPAN AND THEN DUTRA-
- 7 VERNACI.

- 9 GINA PAPAN: AND I THINK WE'RE FORGETTING HERE WHAT THE POLLING
- 10 IS AND WHAT OUR ELECTED PEOPLE ARE SENDING THE MESSAGE TO. I
- 11 THINK MTC IS REALLY LOOKING AT A WAY -- WE HAVE A VISION.
- 12 WE'VE ALREADY PUT THE VISION OUT THERE. WE DID THE
- 13 TRANSFORMATION PLAN. THE PUBLIC WANTS THOSE RESULTS. WE'VE
- 14 KNOWN THAT FOREVER. I THINK WE'RE STRUGGLING TO BE PUT IN A
- 15 POSITION THAT WE HOLD THE OPERATORS ACCOUNTABLE. IT IS

- 24 HERE THIS CONSOLIDATION OF BART AND CALTRAIN, IT'S JUST NOT A

- 4 SAKES, WE HAVE SIMPLE RESULTS IN FRONT OF US THAT THE PUBLIC

- 14 REALITY? THAT'S WHAT THE PUBLIC WANTS FROM US. THAT'S WHAT THE
- 15 VOTERS WOULD LOOK FOR. REAL RESULTS, ACCOUNTABILITY,
- 16 OVERSIGHT. WHAT WAS IT, 80%. THAT NEEDS TO BE THE FOCUS OF

THAT'S 4 5 AN ALLIANCE THAT REPRESENTS OVER 2,000 HEAVY CONSTRUCTION EMPLOYERS PLUS 80,000 UNION CONSTRUCTION WORKERS. SO THE 6 LETTER THAT I SUBMITTED TO THE CLERK EXPRESSES THE ALLIANCE AS 7 8 CONSIDERED AT THE POLLING NUMBERS AND ALSO AROUND THE EXPENDITURE PRIORITIES. SO WITH THAT, IF YOU DISTRIBUTE THE LETTERS, THANK 14 15 YOU. 16 KIMBERLY WARD, CLERK: THANK YOU. NEXT UP IS SAM SERGEANT 17 FOLLOWED BY VAL. 18 19 SPEAKER: GOOD MORNING, COMMISSIONERS. SAM SURGE. I SERVE AS 20 21 DIRECTOR OF STRATEGY AT CALTRAIN. WE FIND OURSELVES AT AN INFLECTION POINT. FOR MOST OPERATORS, CALTRAIN IN PARTICULAR, 22 FUTURE NEEDS ARE VERY GREAT. WITH THAT WE LOOK FORWARD TO 9 10 WORKING MORE WITHIN THE RNM FRAMEWORK. 11 KIMBERLY WARD, CLERK: NEXT IS VAL FOLLOWED BY SEBASTIAN. 12 13 SPEAKER: GOOD MORNING AT BART. BART SUPPORTS THE 2026 REGIONAL 14 15 TRANSPORTATION MEASURE THAT WILL PROVIDE LONG-TERM, SUSTAIN, 16 OPERATING FUNDING FOR OPERATIONS AND TRANSFORM THE BAY AREA'S TRANSIT NETWORK. AT BART OUR EFFORTS TO IMPLEMENT A SAFE AND 17 CLEAN PLAN ARE BEGINNING TO SHOW POSITIVE RESULTS FOR RIDERS 18 AND WE CONTINUE TO DO MORE WITH OUR TRANSIT AGENCY PARTNERS TO 19 DELIVER A RIDER-FOCUSED INITIATIVES. WE ALSO SUPPORT AND TAKE VERY SERIOUSLY THE 6 COMMITMENT TO ENSURING ANY MEASURE IS CLIMATE FRIENDLY. 7 8 HOWEVER, WE SHARE MANY OF THE PRACTICAL QUESTIONS THAT SOME COMMISSIONERS HAVE RAISED TODAY. WE ARE HIGHLY SUPPORTIVE OF 17 STRENGTHENING REGIONAL NETWORK MANAGEMENT AND FOCUSING ON 18 OUICKLY DELIVERING TANGIBLE, NEAR-TERM CUSTOMER IMPROVEMENTS. 19 WE'RE STRUGGLING TO UNDERSTAND THE LINKING THE IMPORTANT BUT 20 21 ALSO COMPLEX CONCEPTS TO A CRITICAL REVENUE MEASURE. RIGHT NOW YOU 6 SHOULD BE FOCUSED ON BUILDING A COORDINATION FOR 2026, NOT 7 8 CREATING DIVISIVE OPPOSITION. - 1 KNOW IF THEY WERE INTENDED THAT WAY THAT IS PROBABLY, LIKELY,
- 2 MOSTLY, YOU KNOW, THESE PROJECTS WILL BE CARBON-NEUTRAL. AND I
- 3 JUST WANTED TO KNOW IF THAT WISHY-WASHINESS IS INTENTIONAL OR
- 4 A CLEAR STATEMENT, WE WILL NOT BE FUNDING PROJECTS THAT
- 5 INCREASE CARBON EMISSIONS OUT OF THIS MEASURE.

6

- 7 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU, VICE CHAIR JOSEFOWITZ. SO IN ONE OF
- 8 OUR PRINCIPLES WE DID NOT INCORPORATE IN THE PRESENTATION
- 9 TODAY, THAT WAS A PRINCIPLE WE WERE KIND OF PROPOSING FOR
- 10 FEEDBACK AS WE DEVELOP THE MEASURE, IT WAS, YOU KNOW, CLIMATE-
- 11 FRIENDLY AND WE SAID, THE MEASURE SHOULD NOT FUND ANY
- 12 CAPACITY, INCREASING PROJECTS. WE'VE ALREADY HEARD SOME
- 13 PUSHBACK ON IT. NOT SURPRISINGLY. IT'S SOMETHING THAT MAYBE WE
- 14 CAN HEAR A LITTLE BIT MORE ABOUT TODAY. AN EXAMPLE IF A
- 15 CAPACITY INCREASING PROJECT OF WHICH WE HAVE QUITE A LOT IN
- 16 OUR PLAN WOULD BE EXPRESS LANES. MANY OF OUR EXPRESS LANES DO
- 17 INCLUDE WIDENING, NOT JUST CONVERSIONS. THIS IS GOING TO BE A
- 18 PROCESS OF HAVING STAKEHOLDERS, YOU KNOW, ENGAGED AND HAVING A
- 19 STRONG COALITION. I THINK IF THE COMMISSION WANTS, WE CAN HAVE
- 20 THAT BE OUR RECOMMENDATION THAT WE BRING FORWARD TO SENATOR
- 21 WIENER. WE REALLY JUST SEEK YOUR DIRECTION ON THAT BUT I SHARE
- 22 WE HAVE GOTTEN SOME CONCERNS ABOUT THAT ALREADY.

- 24 V. CHAIR, NICK JOSEFOWITZ: I APPRECIATE THAT. I THINK FROM MY
- 25 PERSPECTIVE, WE NEED TO MAKE SURE WE ARE NOT FUNDING PROJECTS



- 1 WHICH MAKES THINGS WORSE. IT'S LIKE DO NO HARM. LET'S START
- 2 WITH THAT. WE CAN'T BE USING THIS MONEY TO FUND PROJECTS WHICH
- 3 MAKE CLIMATE CHANGE WORSE. AND I'VE SAID THIS BEFORE. I
- 4 WOULDN'T BE ABLE TO SUPPORT A MEASURE WHICH IS GOING TO FUND
- 5 PROJECTS WHICH MAKE CLIMATE CHANGE WORSE. OBVIOUSLY, MY
- 6 COLLEAGUES MIGHT FEEL DIFFERENTLY. AND THERE'S PLENTY OF MONEY
- 7 THAT EXISTS IN THE TRANSPORTATION WORLD FOR THOSE PROJECTS.
- 8 NOT TO SAY THOSE PROJECTS WON'T EVER GET BUILT IN THIS REGION
- 9 BUT WE GOT TO FOCUS THIS MEASURE ON WHAT IS REALLY IMPORTANT
- 10 AND WHAT REALLY KIND OF REPRESENTS THE REGION WHICH WE WANT TO
- 11 LIVE IN AND THE VALUES THAT WE HAVE AS A REGION. AND I DON'T
- 12 THINK FOR THIS MEASURE WE SHOULD BE FUNDING PROJECTS WHICH
- 13 MAKE CLIMATE CHANGE WORSE. I ALSO WANTED TO -- ONE OF THE
- 14 THINGS THAT I THINK I WOULD BE INTERESTED IN UNDERSTANDING
- 15 MORE OF IS THE OPPORTUNITY TO DO -- TO SORT OF USE A TDM
- 16 MEASURE TO ENCOURAGE TRANSIT RIDERSHIP. I THINK THAT'S
- 17 SOMETHING IN MANY COMMUNITIES HAVE BEEN INCREDIBLY SUCCESSFUL
- 18 IN GETTING PEOPLE TO TAKE SUSTAINABLE MODES. WHETHER IT'S ON
- 19 THE PENINSULA, IN SAN FRANCISCO, OR IN PARTICULAR, OFFICE
- 20 DEVELOPMENTS ELSEWHERE AS WELL, AT UC-BERKELEY. SORT OF ALL
- 21 AROUND THE REGION IT'S BEEN SUCCESSFUL. AND ONE OF THE THINGS
- 22 THAT HAS SORT OF COME UP IN CONVERSATIONS THAT I'VE HAD IS,
- 23 FOR INSTANCE, THE POSSIBILITY OF REOUIRING LARGE EMPLOYERS TO
- 24 PURCHASE BAY PASSES FOR THEIR EMPLOYEES AND CONTRACTORS. SO
- 25 THAT THE BENEFIT FROM THE WORK WE'VE DONE TO BE ABLE TO



- 1 PROVIDE FREE TRANSIT PASSES FOR ALL -- THE WHOLE REGION, IT
- 2 WOULD ALSO SERVE AS A WAY OF INCREASING -- BOTH INCREASE
- 3 RIDERSHIP AND REVENUE FOR TRANSIT OPERATORS. AND I WAS
- 4 WONDERING IF THAT'S SOMETHING YOU HAD CONSIDERED. AND I DON'T
- 5 KNOW HOW MY COLLEAGUES FEEL ABOUT IN, OBVIOUSLY.

- 7 REBECCA LONG: THROUGH THE CHAIR, WE HAVE BEEN RESEARCHING
- 8 THIS. IT'S SOMETHING THAT SENATOR WIENER'S OFFICE IS
- 9 INTERESTED IN. ONE THING I CAN SAY FOR A REQUIREMENT THAT
- 10 EMPLOYERS PROVIDE A SPECIFIC SUBSIDY FOR TRANSIT. LEGISLATIVE
- 11 COUNSEL HAVE OPINED THAT WOULD ESSENTIALLY CONSTITUTE A TAX.
- 12 SO THAT'S NOT TO SAY WE COULDN'T DO IT BUT IT WOULD HAVE TO BE
- 13 PART OF -- IT WOULD BE SUBJECT TO VOTER APPROVAL. SO THE
- 14 LEGISLATURE COULD MANDATE A THING STATEWIDE. IF IT'S A BAY
- 15 AREA MANDATE, IT NEEDS TO BE SUBJECT TO A LOCAL TAX APPROVAL.
- 16 SO I THINK THERE'S SOME THINGS TO SORT OUT THERE BECAUSE WITH
- 17 THE BALLOT QUESTION, HOW MANY DIFFERENT THINGS CAN YOU BE
- 18 INCLUDING, WE'RE DEFINITELY RESEARCHING THIS AND ANTICIPATE
- 19 BRINGING THIS INTO THE RECOMMENDATION NEXT MONTH.

- 21 V. CHAIR, NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THAT'S GREAT. WHAT GOOD FORTUNE IF
- 22 WE ARE TALKING ABOUT SOMETHING THAT NEEDS VOTER APPROVAL SINCE
- 23 WE'RE GOING OUT TO THE VOTERS TO APPROVE SOMETHING. I DON'T
- 24 KNOW -- I HAVE NO IDEA HOW IT WOULD POLL BUT I WONDER IF IT'S
- 25 SOMETHING -- YOU ALREADY POLLED IT AND HOW DID IT POLL?



1 REBECCA LONG: I HAVE TO CHECK EXACTLY. I THINK IT WAS AROUND 2 3 65%, 70% THOUGHT IT WAS A GOOD IDEA. IT WASN'T SPECIFIC TO A TRANSIT PASS BUT IT SAID, SHOULD EMPLOYERS BE REQUIRED TO, YOU 4 5 KNOW, BASICALLY TAKE ACTION TO REDUCE DRIVING? 6 V. CHAIR, NICK JOSEFOWITZ: OK. WELL, I APPRECIATE. SO THAT'S 7 8 SOMETHING WE'RE GOING TO GET MORE INFORMATION ON TO BE ABLE TO HAVE A DISCUSSION ABOUT. OK. I THINK THAT'S REALLY IMPORTANT 9 BECAUSE OTHERWISE I THINK THERE'S A RISK EVEN IF WE DO SUPPLY 10 FOR TRANSIT SERVICE THAT ALONE WON'T BE SUFFICIENT TO GET THE 11 KIND OF RIDERSHIP WE WOULD LIKE. WE KNOW IN OUR COMMUNITIES 12 THERE ARE -- DESPITE US INVESTING IN TRANSIT, THERE IS STILL 13 EMPTY BUSES RUNNING AROUND. IF WE CAN DO THE THINGS THAT ARE 14 15 GOING TO FILL THOSE BUSES, I THINK THAT WILL BE ABSOLUTELY 16 TERRIFIC. WELL, THANK YOU FOR YOUR WORK. AND THAT'S ALL. 17 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: COMMISSIONER CANEPA. 18 19 DAVID CANEPA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR 20 21 ALL YOUR EFFORTS. ESPECIALLY I SAW WITHIN THE REPORT OUR OUTREACH EFFORTS. THE NUMBER WE WERE ABLE TO HIT, NUMBER OF 22 PEOPLE WE WERE ABLE TO HIT IS PRETTY INCREDIBLE. YOU KNOW, WE 23 HEARD FROM -- I HEARD FROM SOME OF MY COLLEAGUES. AS WELL AS I 24 25 HEARD FROM THE PUBLIC, MY UNDERSTANDING ON THE DOLLAR FIGURE,



- 1 THE BILLION DOLLARS WE LANDED ON, THAT WAS SOMETHING THAT OUR
- 2 CONSULTANT CAME UP WITH. CAN YOU SPEAK TO A LITTLE -- LITTLE
- 3 BIT ABOUT THE \$1 BILLION? WHAT I'D LIKE TO DO IS SEE IF STAFF
- 4 COULD COME BACK. I DON'T KNOW WHAT THE RIGHT NUMBER IS. BUT I
- 5 JUST LIKE TO GET A LITTLE FLAVOR FROM YOU ON YOUR THINKING ON
- 6 THAT.

- 8 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU, COMMISSIONER CANEPA. WE ASKED US FOR
- 9 THE RATES FOR \$1 BILLION THAT'S NOT THE AMOUNT WE'RE
- 10 RECOMMENDING AT THIS TIME THAT THE MEASURE SHOULD FUND. WHAT
- 11 WE'LL BE BRINGING BACK IN JANUARY RIGHT NOW THE MEASURE SHOULD
- 12 FUND AT LEAST \$1 BILLION. I THINK IT'S PREMATURE IT SHOULD \$2
- 13 BILLION BUT I THINK WE'D LIKE TO GET MUCH FLEXIBILITY AS WE
- 14 CAN FROM THE LEGISLATURE. I THINK THEY WOULD PROBABLY WANT TO
- 15 PUT SOME KIND OF A CAP WHAT WE'RE AUTHORIZED TO ASK THE VOTERS
- 16 AND THEN, OF COURSE, WHAT WE'RE -- ASSUMING THE LEGISLATION
- 17 PASS, WHAT WE DO PUT BEFORE THE VOTERS. WE'RE IN AGREEMENT WE
- 18 SHOULDN'T GO OUT THE GATE LIMITING IT TO \$1 BILLION.

- 20 DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. SECONDLY, WE HEARD FROM PEOPLE IN THE
- 21 TRADES AND WE HEARD FROM SPEAKERS AROUND SCIU, WE'RE
- 22 CONTINUING TO COMMUNICATE LIKE WE HAVE BEEN WITH LABOR,
- 23 CORRECT?



REBECCA LONG: YES. WE WILL BE REACHING OUT TO VARIOUS LABOR 1 ORGANIZATIONS TO INVITE THEM INTO THE WORKING GROUP AS WELL. 2 3 DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. LET'S 14 FOCUS ON THE WORK THAT IS IMPORTANT. AND THAT'S STRENGTHENING 15 16 THE REGIONAL MANAGEMENT POSITION. I DON'T THINK -- I WILL PUSH BACK RESPECTFULLY. I DON'T THINK WE HAVE WORLD-CLASS 17 TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM OR SYSTEMS. I THINK WHAT WE REALLY NEED 18 TO DO AND WHY THIS WORK IS SO IMPORTANT. AND I REMEMBER VERY 19 VIVIDLY WHEN I HAVE GONE THROUGH SEVERAL FIRE CONSOLIDATIONS. 20 21 WE MAKE DECISIONS, DECISIONS THAT ARE SORT OF -- THEY MAKE PEOPLE FEEL UNCOMFORTABLE. PEOPLE GET PAROCHIAL BECAUSE THEY 22 WANT TO KEEP WHAT THEY HAVE IN PLACE. MY DECISION-MAKING 23 PROGRESS IS NOT REALLY ABOUT TODAY. IT'S PART OF IT. BUT WHAT 24

THE FUTURE OF ORGANIZATIONS LOOK LIKE. SO I WANT US TO



- 1 CONTINUE TO STAY FOCUSED. I THINK SOME COMMENTS WERE REALLY
- 2 HELPFUL. I WANT TO FOCUS WHAT'S BEST FOR THE END USER. THE
- 3 SECOND THING I WANT TO FOCUS ON IS, WHERE ARE THE
- 4 EFFICIENCIES? I THINK WE NEED TO REALLY UNDERSTAND WHERE THE
- 5 EFFICIENCIES ARE. WHEN YOU HAVE 27 OPERATORS IN A REGION,
- 6 THERE HAS TO BE SOME SYNERGY. THERE HAS TO BE SOME. I AM NOT A
- 7 TRANSPORTATION EXPERT. NOR DO I PRETEND TO BE ONE. BUT HERE'S
- 8 WHAT I DO KNOW. THAT THERE ARE OTHER PLACES IN THE UNITED
- 9 STATES, THERE ARE OTHER PLACES AROUND THE WORLD THAT HAVE BEEN
- 10 ABLE TO SORT OF BLEND AND WORK TOGETHER. AND TO WORK TOGETHER
- 11 IN WAYS WHERE THEY'RE EFFICIENT AND THE SYSTEM IS ABLE TO
- 12 WORK. I BELIEVE THAT WITH THE -- THAT WHAT THE POLL TAUGHT US,
- 13 ACCESSIBILITY. PEOPLE WANT A TRANSIT SYSTEM THAT WORKS AND IS
- 14 ACCESSIBLE. THEY WANT A SYSTEM THAT IS SAFE. ALL THESE THINGS
- 15 THEY WANT. AND WE'RE CURRENTLY NOT MEETING THE BENCHMARK. I
- 16 WOULD SAY THIS. POLLING IS ALWAYS SUBJECT TO CHANGE. THERE'S
- 17 DIFFERENT TIMES WHERE POLLING TAKES PLACE. THERE'S DIFFERENT
- 18 OTHER TIMES. SO LET'S NOT BASE ARGUMENTS JUST ON A POLL A
- 19 MOMENT OF TIME -- IN A MOMENT OF TIME. I WILL CONTINUE TO SAY,
- 20 LET'S ADVANCE THE WORK. I THINK STAFF IS MOVING IN THE RIGHT
- 21 DIRECTION. LOOK FORWARD TO SEEING IT AT THE LEGISLATIVE
- 22 COMMITTEE. ENCOURAGE MY COLLEAGUES. SOME OF THESE
- 23 CONVERSATIONS ARE SO UNCOMFORTABLE, RIGHT? WE ALWAYS WANT TO
- 24 SORT OF GET DEFENSIVE ABOUT CHANGE, RIGHT? I THINK WHAT WE
- 25 SHOULD DO IS REALLY FIND WAYS TO EMBRACE CHANGE. I WOULD JUST



- 1 ENCOURAGE US TO KEEP AN OPEN MIND AND TO REALLY SEE WHAT WE
- 2 CAN DO TO ADVANCE THIS WORK. AND WHAT'S AT STAKE? IF WE HAVE
- 3 MEMBERS WHO ARE, YOU KNOW, REALLY NOT ALIGNED OR NOT
- 4 SUPPORTIVE, I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE ABLE TO GO TO
- 5 SACRAMENTO WITH A COHERENT AND COHESIVE MESSAGE AND THAT'S
- 6 REALLY GOING TO BE IMPORTANT. BECAUSE IF THEY DON'T SEE THAT
- 7 FROM THIS BOARD, IT COULD BE EXTRAORDINARILY CHALLENGING. SO I
- 8 THANK YOU, MR. CHAIR.

- 10 CHAIR, ALFREDO PEDROZA: ALL RIGHT, THANK YOU, COMMISSIONER
- 11 CANEPA. I THINK YOU SUMMARIZED IT VERY WELL. COMMISSIONER

- 21 AND WHATEVER THAT PROCESS IS. AND I THINK THERE'S A LOT OF
- 22 WORK TAKING PLACE NOW IN TERMS OF COLLABORATION AND TRYING TO
- 23 MAKE SYSTEMS WORK TOGETHER. I AM VERY SUPPORTIVE FOR THE
- 24 LANGUAGE CHANGE BY COMMISSIONER SPERING. IF YOUR COMMENTS WERE
- 25 THAT OF A MOTION I WOULD SECOND THAT.

SO 19 ESSENTIALLY HAVE TWO FEWER YEARS TO COMPLETE THE REZONING 20 21 THAT'S ASSOCIATED WITH YOUR HOUSING ELEMENT IF YOU DIDN'T SUBMIT YOUR INITIAL DRAFT ON TIME. SO THAT COULD CREATE 22 DIFFERENT TIME FRAMES FOR DIFFERENT JURISDICTIONS BASED ON IF 23

THEY STARTED THE PROCESS ON TIME OR NOT.

SPEAKER: COULD I HELP YOU THERE, PLEASE? 1 2 3 V. CHAIR, NICK JOSEFOWITZ: SURE.
