SPEAKER: THANK YOU. I'M EXCITED TO BE HERE TODAY TO SHARE AN 4 5 IMPORTANT MILESTONE FOR PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS. WE HAVE A SLIDE DECK AS WELL. I'LL START WITH A QUICK INTRODUCTION WHAT 6 PCA AND REFRESH AND TIME TO DIG INTO RECOMMENDED REFORMS. THE 7 8 REFRESH WE'RE TALKING ABOUT TODAY IS FRAMEWORK FOR PCAS PARALLEL EFFORT WITH PCA GRANT PROGRAM ONGOING AND SPECIFIC 9 ACTION WE'RE REQUESTING IS FOR THE ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE 10 COMMITTEE TO APPROVE THE START OF A PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON 11 THE DRAFT FINAL REPORT AND TO FORWARD THE PCA REFRESH 12 RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD FOR CONSIDERATION 13 THIS SPRING. NEXT SLIDE. SO, IN TERMS OF WHERE WE HAVE BEEN, 14 15 WE CAME TO THIS COMMITTEE TO KICKOFF THE PCA REFRESH IN THE 16 SUMMER OF 2022. WE THEN DUG INTO THE STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES 17 OF THE EXISTING PCA PLANNING FRAMEWORK AND DEVELOPED A VISION, GOALS, AND OBJECTIVES FOR PCA'S 2.0. ALONG THE WAY, HOSTING WORKSHOPS, SURVEYS, HOLDING 22 OFFICE HOURS AS WELL AS RECEIVING INPUT FROM A TECHNICAL 23 ADVISORY COMMITTEE. NEXT SLIDE. DEVELOPMENT AREAS. JUST LIKE PDAS, PCAS HAVE BEEN LOCALLY 1 2 NOMINATED, AND OVER THE YEARS THERE HAVE BEEN FOUR NOMINATION 3 CYCLES THAT HAVE RESULTED IN 185PCAS. PCSS ARE DESIGNATED AS ONE OR MORE TYPES. WE HAVE NATURAL LAND, AGRICULTURAL LANDS, 4 5 URBAN GREENING AND REGIONAL RECREATION. SINCE 2013, WE HAVE APPROVED 30 MILLION IN GRANT SUPPORT. THAT'S A PROGRAM THROUGH 6 BOTH MTC AND THE STATE COASTAL CONSERVANCY. NEXT SLIDE. SO, AS 7 8 I MENTIONED, THE FOCUS OF THE CONVERSATION TODAY IS ON THE PCA PLANNING FRAMEWORK. ONE OF THE BEST SUCCESSES OF PCAS HAS BEEN 9 THE GRANT PROGRAM GETTING MONEY OUT THE DOOR TO SUPPORT THE 10 IMPLEMENTATION OF PCAS BUT REALLY SEEING BIG OPPORTUNITY TO 11 IMPROVE HOW WE USE PCAS FOR REGIONAL PLANNING AND POLICY WORK 12 AS WELL AS ADVOCACY AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WHEN WE LOOK AT 13 WEAKNESSES OF THE FRAMEWORK THERE WAS LIMITATIONS HOW WE COULD 14 USE THOSE PCA GEOGRAPHIES. THIS IS AN ATTEMPT TO INFORM WE 15 16 HAVE STRUCTURE IN PLACE TO ALLOW USE IN OUR REGIONAL PLANNING WORK FUNNELING INTO ADVOCACY AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE THEN WE 17 HOPE BY BRINGING THAT STRUCTURE WE'LL HAVE SOMETHING MORE TO 18 BRING TO STATE AND FEDERAL AGENCIES TO BRING IN ADDITIONAL 19 PARTNERS AND FUNDING. NEXT SLIDE. WE HAVE DONE OUR BEST TO 20 21 SYNTHESIZE THOSE CHALLENGES WITH THE EXISTING PLANNING FRAMEWORK THEN HAVE A RECOMMENDATION FOR REFORM FOR EACH OF 22 THOSE CHALLENGES. THE FIRST IS FAIRLY STRAIGHT FORWARD, JUST 23 ACKNOWLEDGING THAT THE EXISTING PCA DEFINITION WAS SOMEWHAT 24 25 INCONSISTENT WITH WHAT HAD BEEN NOMINATED IN THE REGION AS

WELL AS WHAT HAD BEEN FUNDED. IT'S REALLY ABOUT CLEANING THAT 1 UP ENSURING WE'RE CLEAR AND DIRECT WITH THE DEFINITIONS FOR 2 3 PCS AND WE'LL GET INTO THAT IF A FUTURE SLIDE. THE SECOND PIECE WAS REALLY SOMETHING THAT WAS PART OF THE VERY IMPETUS 4 5 FOR THE REFRESH, A DESIRE TO INCORPORATE CLIMATE ADAPTATION AND EQUITY MORE EXTENSIVELY INTO THE PCA PLANNING FRAMEWORK. 6 SO WE HAVE ADDED A FIFTH TYPE OF PCA WITH CLIMATE ADAPTATION 7 8 AND THEN WORKED TO INTEGRATE EQUITY INTO EACH PCA TYPE. 3 AND 4 GO TOGETHER. THREE IS ABOUT HOW WE'RE DRAWING PCA 9 BOUNDARIES. THERE ARE EXISTING PCAS THAT HAVE POORLY OR 10 VAGUELY DRAWN GEOGRAPHIES. SO WE WANT TO ENSURE GOING FORWARD 11 WE ADDRESS THOSE AND THAT I ENSURE FUTURE PCAS HAVE ACCURATE 12 BOUNDARIES. IN ADDITION TO WHERE WE DRAW PCAS ON THE MAP, WE 13 WANT TO BE MORE CONSISTENT WITH HOW WE ARE APPLYING TYPES TO 14 15 THOSE PCAS, AND THE WAY WE RECOMMEND DOING THAT IS BY BRINGING 16 IN DATA TO SUPPORT WHICH PCA TYPES ARE APPROPRIATE IN DIFFERENT AREAS. THE FIFTH CHALLENGE THAT WE SAW, SOMETHING 17 THAT WE HEARD FROM STAKEHOLDERS THEN WHEN WE WERE BRINGING IN 18 DATA TO LOOK WHERE THERE COULD BE VALUES OR OPPORTUNITIES FOR 19 PCAS IS THAT THERE ARE GAPS IN THE REGION OF WHERE PCAS COULD 20 21 EXIST. SO, IN ADDITION TO A PROCESS IN A LOCAL NOMINATION 22 PROCESS, WE'RE RECOMMENDING THE INCORPORATION OF REGIONAL IDENTIFIED PCAS TO COMPLEMENT THOSE LOCAL NOMINATIONS AND FILL 23 KEY GAPS. THE SIXTH CHALLENGE IS SOMETHING WE HEARD THROUGHOUT 24 THE PROCESS, ALL OF OUR MEETINGS, JUST AN ACKNOWLEDGMENT THAT 25

THE PCA FUNDING THAT WE HAVE, AT TIMES, IS TOO RESTRICTIVE IN 1 2 ACTIVITIES FOLKS ARE INTERESTED IN COMPETING AND SCALE OF 3 FUNDS ARE INSUFFICIENT TO MEET THE NEEDS. WE HAVEN'T IDENTIFIED SOME NEW FUNDING SOURCE THAT'S MAGICALLY GOING TO 4 5 FILL THOSE GAPS BUT WITH THE INFRASTRUCTURE AND INCORPORATION OF PCAS INTO PLANNING AND ADVOCACY WORK WE'LL HELP LIFT THEM 6 UP FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING. NEXT SLIDE. SO, THE PCAS, WHAT WE 7 8 HAVE DONE IS ADDED A VISION TO PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS WHERE WE HAVE REALLY TRIED TO ELEVATES SOME KEY TOPICS, 9 10 BIODIVERSITY, RESILIENCE, AND EQUITY, AND YOU CAN SEE HOW WE HAVE REFLECTED THOSE IN THE VISION. DEFINITION IS SIMILAR TO 11 WHAT EXISTED BEFORE BUT IT'S EXPANDED TO NOT ONLY BE FOCUSED 12 ON THE PROTECTION OF LANDS, BUT ALSO THE ENHANCEMENT THAT 13 GIVES US SPACE TO WORK IN FARM TO MARKET ACCESS, NATURAL 14 15 HABITAT RESTORATION ACTIVITIES, AS WELL AS PUBLIC ACCESS. ADDITIONALLY, WE HAVE ADDED THAT FIFTH TYPE IN CLIMATE 16 17 ADAPTATION TO THE FRAMEWORK. NEXT SLIDE. SO, WHILE WE HAVE BROADENED THE DEFINITION OF PCAS, WHERE WE ADD ADDITIONAL 18 STRUCTURE IS WITHIN EACH TYPE, WHERE WE'RE TRYING TO HAVE MORE 19 CONSISTENCY ACROSS THE REGION, WITH WHAT GETS NOMINATED WITHIN 20 21 EACH TYPE.
