AMONG THE THREE BAHFA AGENDA ITEMS IS THE 23 INITIATING RESOLUTION REQUIRED TO PLACE THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING 24 BOND MEASURE ON THE BALLOT. THIS IS AN INCREDIBLY IMPORTANT 25

MILESTONE FOR OUR REGION, AND I TRULY WANT TO EXPRESS MY 1 APPRECIATION FIRST TO OUR STAFF. THE AMOUNT OF WORK THAT HAS 2 3 GONE INTO GETTING TO THIS POINT HAS BEEN NOTHING SHORT OF INCREDIBLE. TO MY COLLEAGUES FOR ALL OF YOUR HOURS, YOUR 4 5 THOUGHTFUL DIALOGUE, THIS HAS BEEN YEARS IN THE MAKING, RIGHT? 24 DEREK HANSEL: THANK YOU, PRESIDENT RAMOS. IF STAFF WOULD BRING
25 UP THE PRESENTATION. I RECOGNIZE YOU HAVE A BIT TO CONSIDER

LATER ON, SO WE'LL BE SUPER OUICK, BUT HAPPY TO TAKE 1 OUESTIONS. JUST NOTE FOR THE RECORD THERE WAS AN UPDATED 2 3 UPDATE TO SLIDE 5, WHICH DOES REFLECT THE CORRECT BUDGET AMENDMENT VALUE, ONE VALUES FOR BAYREN. THERE ARE NO CHANGES 4 5 TO THE PROPOSED BUDGET FROM WHAT IS SHOWN IN THE PRESENTATION THAT WAS EARLIER CIRCULATED. THE BUDGET FOR 24-25 DOES INCLUDE 6 ALLOCATION OF REVENUE AND EXPENSES FOR ALL OF ABAG'S OPERATING 7 8 FUNDS, INCLUDING THE ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET, THE BAYREN BUDGET, AND THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP BUDGET. WE 9 10 WILL POWER, THE ABAG POWER BUDGET WAS DISCUSSED EARLIER TODAY, AND WE WILL BE BRINGING ABAG FAN, THE FINANCE AUTHORITY FOR 11 NON-PROFIT CORPORATIONS, AT A LATER TIME. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. 12 SORRY ABOUT THAT. IT SEEMS LIKE EVERY TIME WE TALK ABOUT THE 13 ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET UNFORTUNATELY WE ARE TALKING ABOUT 14 15 BUDGET CHALLENGES IN THE ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET. THAT 16 STRUCTURAL DEFICIT WHICH WE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT FOR SOME TIME NOW CONTINUES TO PERSIST. PENSION COSTS ARE UP THIS YEAR 17 BY \$1 MILLION, NEARLY DOUBLING FROM THE PREVIOUS YEAR. WE HAVE 18 IDENTIFIED PREVIOUSLY THAT THESE PENSION COSTS WERE GOING TO 19 BE HIGHLY VOLATILE. GUESS WHAT? THEY ARE HIGHLY VOLATILE, AND 20 21 YOU KNOW, WHILE WE THINK IT'S LIKELY TO BE ABOUT THIS SAME NUMBER NEXT YEAR, IT'S ALWAYS A FUNCTION OF THE MARKET 22 PERFORMANCE. IN THIS PARTICULAR CHANGE IT WAS A FUNCTION OF 23 BOTH MARKET PERFORMANCE AND SOME CHANGES IN ACTUARIAL 24 25 ASSUMPTIONS THAT HAD BEEN MADE, BUT IT'S NOTABLE THAT THIS

\$2.1 MILLION AMORTIZATION OF THE UNFUNDED LIABILITY REPRESENTS 1 ABOUT 70% OF THE DUES OF THE MEMBERS. IT JUST DOESN'T SEEM 2 3 LIKE A GOOD WAY TO CONTINUE TO PERSIST. CERTAINLY WHEN IT KIND OF BURIES THE HEADLINE OF WHAT ALL THE REALLY GOOD WORK THAT 4 5 THIS AGENCY IS DOING WITH THOSE DUES. WE NOTE THAT WE HAVE BEEN TALKING PREVIOUSLY ABOUT TRYING TO CHANGE AND FULLY 6 RECOVER THE COSTS THAT MTC PROVIDES TO SUPPORT THIS 7 8 ORGANIZATION. WE HAD MADE SOME STEPS TOWARD THAT LAST YEAR. FRANKLY, AS WE HAD DISCUSSED, WE WERE HOPING TO MAKE 9 10 ADDITIONAL STEPS IN THAT REGARD THIS YEAR. WE ARE UNABLE TO DO THAT, SO I JUST NOTE THAT THAT'S KIND OF LOCKED IN FROM LAST 11 YEAR. SO YOU KNOW, AS NOTED IN THAT LAST POINT, THE 12 ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET REALLY DOES NOT FACTOR IN ANY STAFFING 13 COSTS FOR THE PROVISION OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES THAT COME 14 15 FROM MTC STAFF NOW. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO WHAT DOES THE 16 BUDGET LOOK LIKE? WELL, WE ARE UP TO BUDGET OF ABOUT \$3.7 MILLION PROPOSED IN REVENUE AND \$4.1 MILLION, ALMOST \$4.2 17 MILLION IN EXPENSE. OBVIOUSLY THAT LEAVES US SHORT. THE GOOD 18 NEWS IS WE DO HAVE WHAT WE ANTICIPATE TO BE A REASONABLE 19 BUDGET SURPLUS FROM THIS CURRENT FISCAL YEAR THAT WE'RE 20 21 INTENDING ON PROPOSING TO BE ROLLED OVER. WE HAVE ALREADY COLLECTED THE REVENUE FROM THAT FROM THE MEMBERS. WE DO 22 ANTICIPATE THAT THERE WILL BE A SHORT -- A SMALL DEFICIT OF 23 AROUND \$50,000 AFTER THAT, AND WE WOULD PROPOSE TO DRAW THAT 24 FROM ABAG'S REASONABLY MODEST RESERVES. I WOULD NOTE THAT IN 25

ORDER TO -- YOU KNOW, TO DO SOME OF THE THINGS THAT MADE THIS 1 WORK, WE HAVE DEFERRED WEBSITE WORK INTO A FOLLOWING FISCAL 2 3 YEAR. IT'S ALSO NOTABLE THAT THERE ARE SOME COSTS THAT HAVE COME OUT OF THIS, SPECIFICALLY SOME AUDIT EXPENSES THAT WE 4 5 HAVE BEEN ABLE TO -- YOU KNOW, THAT WE ARE MOVING OFF OF THE ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET AND SHARING INTO THE BAYREN BUDGET. 6 THE AUDIT COSTS REALLY ARE ASSOCIATED MOSTLY WITH THE 7 8 PROGRAMS, AND SO WE'RE MOVING THAT AUDIT COST SPECIFICALLY TO THE BAYREN PROGRAM. I WOULD NOTE THAT THE AUDIT COSTS 9 ASSOCIATED WITH THE SFEP PROGRAM, WHICH HAS ITS OWN BUDGETARY 10 CHALLENGES FOR NON-GRANT-RELATED WORK, THAT IS BEING RETAINED 11 ON THE -- ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET AT THIS TIME. AND SO TALKING 12 QUICKLY ABOUT BAYREN. NEXT SLIDE. IN JULY OF 2023, THE CPUC 13 APPROVED BAYREN'S STRATEGIC BUSINESS PLAN THROUGH 2031. THAT 14 15 ADDED NEW EQUITY INITIATIVES AND EXPANDED PORTFOLIO THAT 16 INCLUDES PUBLIC SECTOR REFRIGERANT REPLACEMENT AND A VARIETY OF WORKFORCE PROGRAMS. SO THE PROPOSED BUDGET IS CONSISTENT 17 WITH THIS BUSINESS PLAN APPROVED BY ITS CPUC AND A FUNDING 18 AGREEMENT THAT RUNS THROUGH FISCAL 27. STAFFING AND OVERHEAD 19 COSTS ARE \$3.2 MILLION. THAT'S A \$600,000 INCREASE FROM THE 20 PRIOR YEAR, AND THAT HELPS US SUPPORT THE IMPLEMENTATION OF 21 THOSE NEW PROGRAMS AND EQUITY INITIATIVES. THERE ARE 22 CONSULTANT LINE ITEMS, INCLUDING COUNTY CONTRACTS, FOR JUST 23 UNDER \$12 MILLION, AND THE RISING SUN CENTER, A LITTLE UNDER 24 \$3 MILLION. THE OTHER LINE ITEM DOES THE INCREASES FOR SOME 25

SOFTWARE LICENSES FOR CLOUD DATA MANAGEMENT AND DATA 1 2 VISUALIZATION. NEXT SLIDE. THIS PARTNERSHIP CONTINUES TO SEE 3 VERY STRONG GRANT FUNDING, PRIMARILY NEW FEDERAL GRANTS FROM THE EPA, AND CONTINUED STATE GRANTS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF 4 5 WATER RESOURCES. LAST MONTH EPA ANNOUNCED \$43.5 MILLION FOR THE WATER IMPROVEMENT FUND AND GRANTS FOR SAN FRANCISCO BAY 6 AND ITS WATERSHED. THE EPA ALSO ANNOUNCED A NEW PROGRAM OFFICE 7 8 IN SAN FRANCISCO TO ADVANCE EPA'S WORK IN THE REGION. WE ARE PROPOSING STAFF AND OVERHEAD INCREASES OF ABOUT \$1.1 MILLION. 9 THAT INCREASES IT TO ABOUT \$3.8 MILLION, AND THAT WOULD 10 SUPPORT THE IMPLEMENTATION OF NEW PROGRAMS, SUCH AS THE 11 WETLANDS REGIONAL MONITORING PROGRAM AND NEW WATER OUALITY 12 IMPROVEMENT FUND GRANTS, AND ALSO REFLECTS AN INCREASE IN 13 OVERALL COST RECOVERIES. SO WITH THAT WE DO REQUEST THAT THIS 14 15 BOARD RECOMMEND THE APPROVAL OF THE RESOLUTION NO. 5-2024 16 APPROVING THE 24-25 OPERATING BUDGET AND THE WORK PROGRAM AND 17 TO SUBMIT THAT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FOR FINAL APPROVAL. WITH THAT, HAPPY TO TAKE ANY QUESTIONS. 18

V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: MADAM PRESIDENT, THIS IS THE VICE
PRESIDENT. I HAVE A QUESTION. THANK YOU FOR PRESENTING A
BALANCED BUDGET. I WILL BRING UP WHAT I THINK YOU THOUGHT I

WOULD BRING UP WHICH IS WE STILL HAVE A STRUCTURAL DEFICIT, 1 AND SO A COUPLE YEARS AGO WE MET TO -- IN A RETREAT TO EXPLORE 2 A COUPLE OF OPTIONS, INCLUDING A POTENTIAL LOAN FROM MFC, 3 PENSION BONDS, ALTHOUGH THOSE WERE SOUNDLY REJECTED BY THE 4 5 BOARD AT THE TIME. LOOKING AT SELLING PART OF OUR CONDOMINIUM 6 INTERESTS, SO WANTED TO JUST REQUEST THAT WE RENEW THOSE DISCUSSIONS AT THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. I'M ONLY HERE FOR 7 8 ANOTHER SEVEN MONTHS, SO I'D LIKE TO GET THIS DONE BEFORE I LEAVE THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, AND I EXPECT THIS WILL BE SOMETHING 9 10 THE DELEGATES WILL ASK IN JUNE, SO I THINK IF WE CAN BEGIN THOSE CONVERSATIONS, WE CAN MAKE IT VERY CLEAR THAT WE ARE 11 CONTINUING TO WORK ON THIS. 12

DEREK HANSEL: ABSOLUTELY. WE ACTUALLY DID MEET WITH THE 14 PRESIDENT UP IN NAPA COUNTY EARLIER THIS WEEK AND HAD 15 16 DISCUSSIONS ALONG THOSE LINES. CERTAINLY THESE ARE HUGELY SERIOUS ISSUES. WE TAKE THEM VERY SERIOUSLY, AND WE DO WANT TO 17 CONTINUE TO ADVANCE THAT DISCUSSION. AND CERTAINLY HOPE WE CAN 18 COME TO CLOSURE RELATIVELY SOON. AGAIN, WE RECOGNIZE THE 19 CHALLENGE THAT THIS VOLATILITY PRESENTS TO THE MEMBERS, BOTH 20 FROM A FINANCIAL PERSPECTIVE, BUT AGAIN, EQUALLY IMPORTANTLY 21 JUST IN TERMS OF KIND OF BURYING THE LEAD, WHICH IS ALL THE 22 GOOD WORK THAT THIS BOARD AND THE PROGRAM AS A WHOLE IS DOING. 23 24

PRES. BELIA RAMOS: I VERY MUCH APPRECIATE THAT FOR THE VICE 1 PRESIDENT, FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE ENTIRE BOARD, I HAVE GIVEN 2 3 DIRECTION TO STAFF TO BRING THOSE -- TO RENEW THOSE ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION AT THE GOVERNANCE AND FINANCE COMMITTEE LEVEL FOR 4 5 LATER CONSIDERATION AT THE EXECUTIVE BOARD LEVEL. CERTAINLY WHEN WE'RE LOOKING AT MORE THAN 50% OF OUR MEMBER DUES GOING 6 TO OUR PENSION OBLIGATIONS, THIS IS, ONE, NOT A SUSTAINABLE 7 8 MODEL BECAUSE WE HAVE A CLOSED SYSTEM. IT'S ALSO NOT A PREDICTABLE MODEL. AS WE KNOW, AN INCREASE IN \$1 MILLION FROM 9 10 LAST YEAR IS SIMPLY SOMETHING WE CANNOT CONTINUE TO STOMACH WHEN IT COMES TO BUDGETING. AT THE SAME TIME, I WILL SAY AS I 11 REITERATED IN THE PAST, THIS IS FOR SERVICES ALREADY RENDERED. 12 THIS IS FOR THE PENSION OBLIGATIONS OF THE EMPLOYEES THAT ABAG 13 HAD PRIOR TO THE MERGER OF THE CONSOLIDATED STAFF, AND MERGER 14 15 OF GOVERNANCE, AND IT'S MUCH AKIN TO SHOPPING ON A CREDIT 16 CARD. WE ALREADY DID THE SHOPPING. WE ALREADY HAVE THE STUFF IN OUR CLOSET, AND WE GOT TO MAKE THOSE CREDIT CARD PAYMENTS, 17 SO WE JUST GOT TO FIGURE OUT HOW TO MAKE THE MOST COST 18 EFFECTIVE AND STABLE CREDIT CARD PAYMENT. ARE THERE ANY OTHER 19 BOARD MEMBERS WITH QUESTIONS ON THE BUDGET? 20

WE'LL HAVE TO TACKLE THIS, AND I KNOW YOU HAD A NUMBER OF IDEAS WHEN WE TALKED ABOUT THIS LAST 4 5 TIME, SO I'M SURE THE CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR WHEN THEY AGENDAIZE THIS WILL BE ON THIS. ABSOLUTELY. 6 7 8 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: NEXT I WILL OPEN UP PUBLIC COMMENT. MR. CLERK, DO WE HAVE ANY PUBLIC COMMENT? AND ACTUALLY WE'LL TAKE THE NEXT SLIDE 23 TOO. WE HAVE THE LEGAL AUTHORITY TO DO THIS THROUGH OUR 24 25 REGIONAL HOUSING FINANCE ACT, AND WE HAVE THE -- HAD THE

ENTHUSIASTIC SUPPORT FOR THIS FROM OUR BAHFA ADVISORY 1 COMMITTEE, AS WELL AS THE SUPPORT OF THE JOINT HOUSING 2 3 COMMITTEES. YOUR ACTION TODAY IS A NECESSARY AND CRITICAL STEP FOR THE BALLOT MEASURE. THE BAHFA BOARD MUST HAVE YOUR PRIOR 4 5 APPROVAL IN ORDER TO MOVE THE MEASURE FORWARD. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THESE ARE LEGAL DOCUMENTS. WE WILL BE IN CONFORMANCE 6 WITH THE ACT, IN CONFORMANCE WITH THE CALIFORNIA CONSTITUTION, 7 8 AND NOW WE WILL BE IN CONFORMANCE WITH ASSEMBLY CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT MEASURE A 1, ACA1, IN ORDER TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE 9 POTENTIAL FOR A LOWER VOTER THRESHOLD AT 55% INSTEAD OF TWO 10 THIRDS, WHERE IT IS NOW. NEXT SLIDE. THE BALLOT MEASURE HAS 11 VERY SPECIFIC ELEMENTS. THEY ARE INCLUDED IN THE ACT. YOU SEE 12 THEM BEFORE YOU TODAY. AGAIN, A VERY LEGAL DOCUMENT. WE WILL 13 BE PROVIDING INFORMATION TO VOTERS REGARDING THE STATEMENT AND 14 15 PURPOSE OF THE ACT, HOW WE'RE SPENDING THE MONEY, WHO WE WILL 16 BE SERVING, AND HOW OUR DECISION MAKING WILL PROCEED, AND ACCOUNTABILITY. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THERE ARE TWO ISSUES TO 17 NOTE. WE WILL BE MAKING THE FINAL DECISION AT THE BAHFA BOARD 18 ON WHETHER THE MEASURE WILL BE 10 BILLION OR 20 BILLION. IT 19 WILL BE INFORMED BY THE FINAL ADDITIONAL VOTER RESEARCH THAT 20 WE'RE DOING, AND ACA1 IS CURRENTLY IN AN AMENDMENT PROCESS 21 RIGHT NOW. WE WANT TO MAKE SURE WE'RE IN CONFORMANCE WITH THAT 22 MEASURE. THOSE ARE THE ONLY TWO OUTSTANDING ITEMS TODAY, SO 23 AGAIN, WE ASK YOU TO APPROVE THE MEASURE UP TO 20 BILLION. 24 25 NEXT SLIDE. AGAIN, THIS IS SUCH A CRITICAL MOMENT, AND WE

THANK YOU FOR YOUR INCREDIBLE WORK, ALL THE WORK OF SO MANY
 PEOPLE OVER SO MANY YEARS. WITH YOUR APPROVAL TODAY, WE WILL
 MOVE TO A PUBLIC NOTICE HEARING AT THE BAHFA BOARD ON MAY 22
 AND THE FINAL VOTE ON JUNE 26, AND THAT CONCLUDES THE
 PRESENTATION.

THIS IS ADOPTION OF A RESOLUTION BY THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD AS THE EXECUTIVE BOARD TO THE BAY AREA HOUSING 11 FINANCE AUTHORITY TO MAKE CERTAIN FINDINGS IN SUPPORT OF TO 12 APPROVE THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCING AUTHORITY BOARD FOR A 13 MEASURE FOR A GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING 14 15 IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED 20 BILLION TO THE VOTERS OF THE 16 COUNTIES OF ALAMEDA, CONTRA COSTA, MARIN, NAPA, SAN MATEO, 17 SANTA CLARA, SOLANO AND SONOMA AND THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO, THE NINE BAY AREA COUNTIES, AT THE NOVEMBER 2024 18 GENERAL ELECTION, CONSISTENT WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE 19 FINAL VERSION OF ASSEMBLY CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 12023, 20 21 AND TO TAKE ACTIONS RELATED, NECESSARY OR INCIDENTAL TO CARRYING OUT THE INTENT OF THIS RESOLUTION. DO I HAVE A 22 MOTION? 23

25 SUSAN ADAMS: SO MOVED, ADAMS.

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1 2 CARLOS ROMERO: SECOND ROMERO. 3 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO VERY MUCH. I WOULD ASK IF 4 5 THERE IS ANY EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER DISCUSSION. 6 PAT EKLUND: I HAVE A QUESTION, BELIA. 7 8 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: WE'LL START WITH COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND. 9 10 PAT EKLUND: THANK YOU. WHY CAN'T WE HAVE AN ABAG MEETING IN 11 MAY OR JUNE ONCE WE KNOW WHAT THE FINAL AMOUNT IS? 12 13 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: I AM GOING TO DEFER TO STAFF ON THIS ONE. 14 15 16 SPEAKER: HELLO, BOARD, SENIOR COUNSEL AND OFFICE OF GENERAL COUNSEL AND LAWYER TO ALL THINGS BAHFA. WHEN WE WERE DOING THE 17 SCHEDULING, WE ASSUMED ALL REGULAR MEETINGS AND ALSO OUR USUAL 18 AGENDA PRACTICES. THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD WILL NEXT MEET ON 19 20 MAY 16. THE BAHFA NOTICING MEETING HAS TO OCCUR ON MAY 22, AND 21 ITS AGENDA PUBLISHES ON MAY 15. SO WE WOULD HAVE TO POTENTIALLY DELAY THE PUBLICATION OF THE BAHFA BOARD MEETING, 22 AND THAT WOULD CREATE SOME ISSUES IN MEETING THAT TIME FRAME. 23 THE NOTICED MEETING HAS TO BE ON THE 22ND BECAUSE THERE HAS TO 24 25 BE 30 DAYS BETWEEN THE TWO BAHFA BOARD MEETINGS, AND THERE'S

NOT 30 DAYS BETWEEN THE JUNE AND JULY, BUT THERE IS 30 DAYS 1 2 BETWEEN THE MAY AND THE JUNE MEETING. SO THERE WAS A LOT OF 3 COUNTING OF DAYS THAT WENT INTO THIS SCHEDULE. 4 5 PAT EKLUND: THANK YOU FOR EXPLAINING THAT TO ME. I GUESS I WAS HOPING THAT WE COULD HAVE A DISCUSSION ABOUT WHETHER IT'S THE 6 10 BILLION OR THE 20 BILLION, BUT IT SOUNDS LIKE THAT'S NOT 7 8 GOING TO HAPPEN, SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH. APPRECIATE IT. 9 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. 10 11 V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: MADAM PRESIDENT, IT'S THE VICE 12 PRESIDENT. CAN I BE ADDED TO THE QUEUE? 13 14 15 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: I'LL RECOGNIZE YOU. WE'RE JUST GOING TO 16 HAVE A FREE FOR ALL OF WHOEVER RAISES THEIR VOICE, SO VICE PRESIDENT ARREGUIN. 17 18 V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: WELL, I WOULD LIKE TO DISCUSS THE 10 19 TO 20 BILLION AMOUNT AND SAY I STRONGLY URGE MTC AND BAHFA TO 20 PUT A \$20 BILLION BOND ON THE BALLOT. AND THE POLLING HAS 21 SHOWN CONSISTENTLY THAT THE AMOUNT DOESN'T AFFECT VOTER 22 SUPPORT, AND WE KNOW THE NEED FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN OUR 23 REGION IS SIGNIFICANT. SO I'M JUST STATING MY PREFERENCE AND 24 25 MY RECOMMENDATION TO MTC BECAUSE, I MEAN, CASE IN POINT,

ALAMEDA COUNTY, 2 BILLION VERSUS 1 BILLION, AND THAT'S A LOT 1 MORE THAT WE CAN DO, A LOT MORE HOMES WE CAN BUILD, A LOT MORE 2 HOMES WE CAN PRESERVE, SO I'M SURE MANY OF US AGREE THAT IF 3 THERE IS A PATH TO WIN AT A HIGHER AMOUNT, WHY NOT PURSUE THE 4 5 HIGHER AMOUNT? I'LL JUST SAY HOW GRATEFUL I AM TO KATE AND YOUR ENTIRE TEAM AT BAHFA, AND DANIEL AND ALL OF OUR STAFF FOR 6 ALL THE WORK YOU'VE DONE OVER THE YEARS. WE LAUNCHED BAHFA 7 8 FIVE YEARS AGO, AND THERE WERE A NUMBER OF STARTS AND STOPS. WE WERE HOPING TO DO THIS IN 2020, THEN THE PANDEMIC HAPPENED. 9 THEN WE WANTED TO DO IT IN 2022, AND THEN IT DIDN'T LOOK LIKE 10 IT WAS THE RIGHT TIME TO DO IT, AND SO HERE WE ARE, AND THIS 11 IS I THINK A REALLY HISTORIC MOMENT NOT JUST FOR OUR AGENCY 12 BUT FOR THE BAY AREA, AND WE WOULDN'T BE IF IT WASN'T FOR ALL 13 YOUR EXCELLENT WORK, AND OBVIOUSLY THE LEADERSHIP OF NOT JUST 14 15 THIS BOARD AND MTC BUT OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERS, OUR LABOR 16 PARTNERS, THE BAY AREA HOUSING FOR ALL COALITION WHO HAVE WORKED WITH US EVERY STEP OF THE WAY TO HELP MOVE THIS 17 FORWARD, SO I WILL BE VOTING ENTHUSIASTICALLY YES AND LOOK 18 FORWARD AT GETTING STARTED TO HELP GETTING THIS THING PASSED 19 IN NOVEMBER. THANK YOU. 20

22 PETER ORTIZ: PETER ORTIZ, IF I COULD BE ADDED TO THE QUEUE.

24 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: OF COURSE, I'LL ADD YOU TO THE LIST. I'M 25 GOING TO MAYOR SILVA FIRST.

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1 SPEAKER: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. JUST FOR CLARIFICATION, WHO IS -2 3 - HAS THE AUTHORITY TO APPROVE THE 75-WORD BALLOT LANGUAGE? IS THAT THE BAHFA BOARD? I'M GETTING NODS IN THE ROOM. 4 5 SPEAKER: YES. 6 7 8 SPEAKER: THANK YOU, AND WITH REGARD TO THAT LANGUAGE, I KNOW WHAT WE ARE ADOPTING TONIGHT BASICALLY SAYS THE LANGUAGE WILL 9 ACCOMMODATE WHATEVER CHANGES THE LEGISLATURE MAY MAKE TO ACA 10 1. ARE WE GOING TO BE SURE THAT THE LANGUAGE IS IN COMPLIANCE 11 WITH WHAT THE POTENTIAL CALIFORNIA BUSINESS ROUND TABLE 12 MEASURE MIGHT REQUIRE? IS THAT A YES FROM THE LAWYER, PLEASE? 13 14 15 SPEAKER: SORRY, YES, WE HAVE BEEN TRACKING THAT AS WELL. 16 SPEAKER: OKAY, THANK YOU. 17 18 SPEAKER: AND SO WE ARE CAREFULLY DRAFTING THE MEASURE. 19 20 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. 21 22 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO MUCH. I THINK THE NEXT ONE I 23 HEARD WAS COUNCILMEMBER ORTIZ; WAS THAT CORRECT? 24 25

SPEAKER: YES. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I WANT TO ALSO SHARE MY 1 THANKS WITH BAHFA STAFF, ESPECIALLY KATE, FOR YOUR NUMEROUS 2 3 BRIEFINGS THAT YOU PROVIDE MYSELF AND MY STAFF LEADING UP TO TODAY, AND I UNDERSTAND IT'S A LARGE BODY OF WORK. AS MAYOR 4 ARREGUIN MENTIONED, FIVE YEARS IN THE MAKING, SO REALLY JUST 5 WANT TO SINCERELY THANK YOU AND ALL THE STAFF FOR WORKING ON 6 THIS WITH CARE. AS WE LOOK TOWARDS TODAY'S HISTORIC VOTE, I 7 8 JUST WANTED TO SHARE SOME REFLECTIONS FROM MY DISTRICT AND THE REGION I REPRESENT IN THE CITY OF SAN JOSE. AS A LIFELONG EAST 9 SAN JOSE RESIDENT AND ONE OF FEW RENTERS ON THE SAN JOSE CITY 10 COUNCIL, I PERSONALLY EXPERIENCED OUR CITY'S HOUSING CRISIS 11 AND THE TOLL IT TAKES ON A LOT OF OUR WORKING CLASS FAMILIES, 12 AND IN RECENT YEARS THE COST OF LIVING IN SAN JOSE, AS YOU CAN 13 IMAGINE, BUT REALLY THE ENTIRE BAY AREA, HAS SKYROCKETED, 14 15 FORCING MANY PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN BORN AND RAISED IN THE AREA 16 TO BE FORCED TO MOVE OUT OF THE REGION. IT'S A SAD REALITY OF 17 MANY OF MY OWN FRIENDS I GREW UP WITH, OUR FAMILY MEMBERS, OUR COLLEAGUES, AND THEY HAVE ALL HAD TO RELOCATE BECAUSE OF THIS 18 COST OF LIVING, AND ALTHOUGH SAD, IT DOESN'T COME AS A SHOCK 19 TO LEARN THAT RENTERS IN SAN JOSE HAVE TO EARN \$45 AN HOUR 20 21 JUST TO AFFORD AN AVERAGE MONTHLY RENT FOR ONLY A ONE-BEDROOM APARTMENT. AND A MINIMUM WAGE WORKER EARNING \$17.55 AN HOUR 22 WOULD HAVE TO WORK TWO AND A HALF FULL-TIME JOBS TO AFFORD 23 LIVING IN A ONE-BEDROOM APARTMENT IN SAN JOSE, THE EAST SIDE, 24 THE AREA I REPRESENT. CERTAINLY THE REALITY OF RENT BURDEN IS 25

PRESENT IN ALL OF OUR CITIES, IN ALL OF OUR DISTRICTS, AND 1 WHILE THE FOCUS OF THE BOND IS OBVIOUSLY THE PRODUCTION OF NEW 2 3 UNITS, I JUST WANTED TO HIGHLIGHT THE IMPORTANCE OF PRESERVATION AS A KEY STRATEGY AND A FOUNDATIONAL METHOD TO 4 5 COMBAT OUR HOUSING CRISES. AND IN THIS ECONOMIC CLIMATE, HIGH INTEREST RATES, INFLATION AND OTHER RISING COSTS OF MATERIALS 6 HAVE DIRECTLY AFFECTED OUR ABILITY TO PRODUCE THESE UNITS ON 7 8 THE LOCAL LEVEL. AND THE FACT IS WE'RE NOT BUILDING AFFORDABLE HOUSING FAST ENOUGH, AND ARE NOT MEETING OUR HOUSING GOALS, 9 10 SO, THEREFORE, I'M REALLY EXCITED TO VOTE TODAY ON THIS BOND, ESPECIALLY LOOKING FORWARD TO PRESERVATION STRATEGIES THAT 11 WILL BE MADE POSSIBLE DUE TO THESE FUNDS, AND I LOOK FORWARD 12 TO VOTING YES ALONGSIDE MY REGIONAL COLLEAGUES. THANK YOU. 13

15 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO MUCH, COUNCILMEMBER ORTIZ, FOR 16 SHARING YOUR PERSONAL EXPERIENCES. AS I'VE SAID BEFORE, THIS 17 IS CERTAINLY SOMETHING THAT HELPS THE ENTIRE REGION, EVERYONE, 18 ALL OF OUR NEIGHBORS, AND EVEN YOUR CURRENT NEIGHBORS IF YOU 19 DO HAVE A HOUSE. IT'S HOUSING STABILITY IS ESSENTIAL FOR A 20 COMMUNITY TO THRIVE, SO THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR ADDING THAT. DO 21 WE HAVE ANY OTHER EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS?

23 SPEAKER: MADAM PRESIDENT, I HAVE KAMEI, TIEDEMANN, AND OTHERS24 IN THE ROOM.

PRES. BELIA RAMOS: EXCELLENT. LET ME GO WITH SUPERVISOR
 RABBITT FIRST AND THEN BACK TO THE BOARDROOM. THANK YOU FOR
 THE ASSIST.

5 SPEAKER: I APPRECIATE THAT VERY MUCH, AND JUST IN TERMS OF THE AMOUNT, I WENT BACK AND LOOKED AT IT, AND FIVE YEARS, AS HAS 6 BEEN MENTIONED, IT'S ACTUALLY BEEN SEVEN BECAUSE I WAS THERE 7 8 SEVEN YEARS AGO IN 2017 WE MET WITH THE CASA COMPACT, AND THAT WAS THE LEADERS FROM THE PUBLIC, PRIVATE AND NON-PROFIT 9 SECTORS WHO WERE SUPPOSED TO GET TOGETHER AND COME UP WITH A 10 MAGIC PLAN TO SOLVE THE BAY AREA'S HOUSING CRISIS, WHICH LED 11 TO THE TEN KIND OF IDENTIFIABLE STEPS, ONE OF WHICH WAS THE 12 CREATION OF BAHFA. ANOTHER ONE WITHIN THAT WAS TO PUT TOGETHER 13 FUNDING TO FINANCE THE COMPACT. I CAN TELL YOU FROM MEMORY 14 15 THAT PARTICULAR ITEM, FUNDING TO FINANCE THE COMPACT, WAS THE 16 EASIEST AGREEMENT THAT WE MADE ALL TOGETHER. AND AT THE TIME IT WAS \$1.5 BILLION, BUT IF YOU CARRY THAT FORWARD OVER SEVEN 17 YEARS, IT'S CLOSE TO \$2 BILLION. IT'S 1.91 AND CHANGE WITH THE 18 CPI, SO EVEN THEN IT WAS IDENTIFIED THAT IT HAD TO MAKE A 19 SIGNIFICANT ENOUGH CHANGE TOWARD THE LARGER NUMBER, AND I 20 21 THINK THE VICE PRESIDENT IS ABSOLUTELY CORRECT IN TERMS OF THE VOTERS, AND IF YOU'RE GOING TO GO AND PUT IT DOWN ON THE LINE, 22 YOU MIGHT AS WELL GO FOR IT AND REALLY CONVINCE FOLKS THAT 23 THIS IS THE RIGHT THING TO DO, AND I DO SUPPORT IT MOVING 24 FORWARD. LOTS OF GOOD THINGS HAVE COME OUT OF THAT OVER THE 25

YEARS. THIS ONE IS KEY TO THE SUCCESS FOR MAKING A DIFFERENCE,
 AS WAS SAID EARLIER, AND GENERATIONAL DIFFERENCES WHERE WE CAN
 LEAVE ALL OF OUR.

5 SPEAKER: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I JUST HAD A PROCEDURAL QUESTION, AND FIRST OF ALL I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR ALL THE 6 WORK YOU'VE DONE. I WANT TO THANK EVERYONE. I FEEL LIKE I JUST 7 8 GOT HERE, SO EVERYONE HAS DONE SO MUCH WORK. THESE DAYS --I'VE BEEN INVOLVED IN OTHER BOND MEASURES IN THE PAST, AND 9 10 THESE THINGS ARE VERY, VERY HARD, AND TAKE A LOT OF TIME. SO THANK YOU FOR YOUR WORK ON THIS. I TOO AGREE GO BIG OR GO 11 HOME. IT IS -- I HAVEN'T BEEN PRIVY TO ALL OF THE DETAILS OF 12 THE POLLING OR ANYTHING LIKE THAT, BUT I DO THINK THAT IT'S 13 SIGNIFICANT, AND WE OUGHT TO THINK BIG. THESE THINGS DON'T 14 15 COME AROUND VERY OFTEN, AND SO I WOULD ENCOURAGE REALLY 16 LOOKING AT THE BIGGER NUMBER. MY QUESTION WAS MORE PROCEDURAL. 17 I WAS APPROACHED BY -- MY OFFICE WAS APPROACHED BY THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF THE BAY AREA IN TERMS OF REALLY LOOKING AT 18 WHAT ARE SOME OF THE TOOLS, SOME OF THE THINGS THAT WORK. IN 19 OUR EXPERIENCE IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY HAVING AN INDEPENDENT 20 CITIZENS OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE REALLY HELPS. I THINK THAT IT 21 GIVES CONFIDENCE TO THE PUBLIC THAT, IN FACT, YOU WILL HAVE 22 SOME TRANSPARENCY TO HELP IN THIS BOND MEASURE. I KNOW THAT 23 OUR BOND MEASURES AT THE CITY OF SAN JOSE ALSO HAVE AN 24 25 OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE, AND THAT SEEMS TO HAVE ALSO ENCOURAGED

1 THE PASSING OF THOSE MEASURES. I WOULD ENCOURAGE THE BAHFA 2 BOARD TO SERIOUSLY LOOK AT THAT BECAUSE I DO KNOW THAT THERE'S 3 A LOT OF VOTER FATIGUE, AND WE NEED TO SORT OF REACH IN AND 4 TRY TO DO AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE TO ENSURE THAT WE CAN TAKE IT 5 OVER TO THE WINNING SIDE. AGAIN, THANK YOU SO MUCH, AND I LOOK 6 FORWARD TO WHAT MAY COME OUT OF THIS. THANK YOU.

AS SOMEONE WHO 11 WORKED PROFESSIONALLY IN HOUSING, WHO'S A PROFESSIONAL HOUSING 12 WONK, THIS IS PROBABLY THE MOST EXCITING THING I'VE EVER BEEN 13 A PART OF, AND I JUST ESPECIALLY WANT TO CALL OUT THE 14 15 POTENTIAL OF THIS TO CREATE A PERMANENT PUBLIC BANK IN THE 16 FORM OF BAHFA THAT DOESN'T HAVE TO GO BACK TO THE VOTERS EVERY TIME WE NEED TO BUILD HOUSING, AND. I'M ESPECIALLY EXCITED 17 BECAUSE SUPERVISOR RABBITT SAYS THIS IS SOMETHING WE CAN ALL 18 LOOK BACK ON WHEN WE ARE IN OUR ROCKING CHAIRS. I WANT TO 19 THANK ALL THE STAFF WHO HAVE DONE JUST SO MUCH WORK TO GET US 20 HERE, BOTH THAT WE HAVE SEEN THAT'S BEEN OUT OF SIGHT THAT'S 21 BEEN GOING ON BEHIND THE SCENES, EVERYTHING ABOUT IT, AND ALSO 22 ECHO WHAT MAYOR ARREGUIN SAID ABOUT GOING FOR 20 BILLION HERE. 23 LIKE WE LOOKED AT ON THE POLLING AT THE LAST HOUSING 24 COMMITTEE, IT DOES NOT REALLY MAKE A DIFFERENCE IF THIS IS 10 25

BILLION OR 20, SO WE SHOULD GO BIG, AND PEOPLE KNOW WHAT BONDS
ARE. THEY KNOW THERE'S A BIG PROBLEM, AND SO I THINK IT WILL
ACTUALLY BE AN EASIER CAMPAIGN IF WE GO BIGGER AND SAY THIS
WILL MAKE A REAL IMPACT ON HOUSING. IT WILL BE THE BIGGEST
EFFORT WE CAN DO, AND IT WILL BUILD A LOT, SO I THINK WE HAVE
TO DO THAT. THANK YOU.

I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR ALL THEIR GREAT WORK ON THIS, AND THERE ARE 9 10 MOMENTS IN OUR POLITICAL CAREERS WHERE WE CAN LOOK BACK AND SAY WE MADE A REAL DIFFERENCE, AND THIS IS THAT MOMENT RIGHT 11 NOW. WHEN PEOPLE ASK WHAT DID YOU DO TO HELP IN AFFORDABLE 12 HOUSING, WE CAN POINT TO THIS MOMENT. I CAN THINK ABOUT MY OWN 13 PERSONAL SITUATION WHEN I WAS A RENTER AND WE HAD A -- MY SON 14 15 WAS JUST BORN AND I REMEMBER HAVING A CONVERSATION WITH MY 16 WIFE, LIVING IN SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, AND THE RENT WAS STARTING TO GET A LITTLE MORE EXPENSIVE, AND I SAID TO MY WIFE, I THINK 17 WE MIGHT NEED TO MOVE AWAY FROM SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, AND THIS 18 IS A CITY THAT I LOVE, THAT I LIVED IN SINCE I WAS FIVE YEARS 19 OLD. I WAS VERY LUCKY. I WAS ABLE TO GET A FIRST-TIME HOME 20 21 BUYERS LOAN, AND I WAS ABLE TO PURCHASE MY FIRST HOME. I AGREE WITH MY COLLEAGUES HERE, LET'S GO BIG AND GO FOR THE 20 22 BILLION, SO I LOOK FORWARD TO SUPPORTING THIS, AND I'M EXCITED 23 ABOUT THE OPPORTUNITY, SO THANK YOU. 24

3 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. I LIKEWISE WANTED TO THANK THE STAFF AND EVERYONE WHO HAS BEEN DOING THE WORK ON SEVEN YEARS. I HAVE 4 5 BEEN ON THIS BOARD FOR FIVE PLUS YEARS, BUT IT'S BEEN AMAZING TO GO ON THIS JOURNEY. I WANT TO. LET'S GO BIG AND REALLY 6 ENCOURAGE 20 BILLION. THOSE OF US ACROSS THE REGION KNOW THAT 7 8 WE ARE SEEING GROWING HOMELESSNESS. I THINK MANY OF US PARTICIPATED IN OUR COUNTY POINT IN TIME COUNTS. WE ARE 9 10 WORKING TO -- -- SO MANY OF US HAVE BEEN WORKING ON HOUSING AFFORDABILITY ISSUES, HOMELESSNESS FOR MANY, MANY YEARS, AND 11 AS STATE LAWS ARE CHANGING, WE ARE ABLE TO PUSH OUR HOUSING 12 PIPELINE THROUGH MUCH QUICKER -- -- MUCH MUCH SOONER THAN WE 13 HAVE IN THE PAST, AND THEN I ALSO WANTED TO SHARE I AGREE THAT 14 PRESERVATION IS REALLY IMPORTANT. IT'S SO EXCITING THAT WE CAN 15 16 USE THAT STRATEGY AND HAVE SOME FUNDS BEHIND IT. THE FLEXIBLE 17 FUNDS WILL HELP US ENHANCE HOME OWNERSHIP. I THINK THAT'S SOMETHING THAT'S REALLY IMPORTANT TO VOTERS AND WE HAVE TO 18 MAKE SURE THAT WE LIFT THAT UP TOO. SPEAKER: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I TOO AM REALLY MOVED TO HEAR 7 8 ALL THE COMMENTS TODAY, AND I'M SURE THAT WE WILL HEAR MANY MORE, BUT I TOO WOULD BE VERY MUCH SUPPORT OF THE 20 BILLION 9 LOOKING AT THE -- I'M AN URBAN PLANNER, AND ONE OF THE FIRST 10 THINGS THEY TALK ABOUT IS WHAT IS A HOME. A HOME IS A 11 DWELLING. WITHOUT ANY TYPE OF STABILITY OR HAVING SOMEWHERE TO 12 GO WHERE YOU'RE ABLE TO -- WHETHER IT'S REFRESH OR BE IN 13 PEACE, MAYBE YOU DON'T HAVE THAT SOMEWHERE ELSE, BUT THIS IS 14 15 SO CRITICAL FOR OUR FAMILY, SO I'M REALLY HAPPY THAT WE'RE 16 HERE, AND THANK YOU FOR ALL THE HARD WORK THAT'S COME TO THIS POINT. 20 BILLION IN THE BAY AREA, ABSOLUTELY -- I DON'T THINK 17 WE CAN DO 10 BILLION. I THINK I WOULD BE A LITTLE DISAPPOINTED 18 IF WE HAD SO, SO I HOPE THAT WE ARE ABLE TO GO WITH THE 20 19 BILLION TO JUST LOOK AT WHERE PEOPLE ARE AND I GREW UP MYSELF 20 21 IN AN OWNED HOME. MY PARENTS COULD NOT AFFORD ONE, SO THEY BUILT ONE. MY FATHER IS A CARPENTER AS HIS TRADE, AND HE 22 DECIDED THAT WOULD BE THEIR WAY TO HOME OWNERSHIP. AFTER 23 GROWING UP IN AN OWNED HOME, I AM NOW RAISING MY FAMILY AS A 24 25 RENTER, A FAMILY OF FIVE, AND I WILL TELL YOU THERE IS NOTHING

GLAMOROUS ABOUT BEING A RENTER WITH SMALL CHILDREN AND HAVING 1 2 PEOPLE COME AND DICTATE YOUR SPACE, ESPECIALLY WHEN YOU KNOW 3 WHAT IT'S LIKE TO LIVE IN A HOME OF YOUR OWN. SO I HOPE THAT FOR EVERYBODY AND I THINK THAT THIS IS A REALLY CRITICAL PIECE 4 5 FOR US TO PUT TOGETHER AS OUR LEGACY THAT WE LEAVE FOR OUR CHILDREN, IF ANYTHING ELSE. WE GIVE PEOPLE STABILITY. WE CAN 6 GIVE PEOPLE BETTER HEALTH, RELIEVING THEIR STRESS, THE STRESS 7 8 OF MOVING, THE STRESS OF HAVING PEOPLE COME IN AND SHIFTING YOU AROUND. AND FOR OUR COMMUNITY, LOSING -- AS ONE OF MY 9 COLLEAGUES, I THINK IT WAS MY COLLEAGUE COUNCILMEMBER ORTIZ 10 TALKING ABOUT YOUR -- NOT ONLY YOUR FRIENDS, BUT YOUR FAMILY 11 LEAVING WHERE YOU'RE AT, AND I KNOW THAT MY HUSBAND AND I HAVE 12 FOUGHT SO HARD -- I'M FROM MARIN HILL. FOUGHT SO HARD TO STAY 13 IN THIS AREA TO THE POINT WHERE WE ARE RENTING WITH A FAMILY. 14 15 THAT'S BECAUSE YOUR COMMUNITIES ARE STRONGER WHEN YOU'RE 16 CONNECTED AND YOU HAVE THOSE CONNECTIONS. SO WE HAVE TO THINK ABOUT THIS, ABOUT WHAT KIND OF ECONOMY DO WE WANT. WE NEED TO 17 HAVE A DIVERSITY OF ECONOMICS THAT ARE LIVING IN OUR 18 COMMUNITIES. I'M LOOKING FORWARD TO US PUTTING THIS INTO 19 PRACTICE AND WHAT THIS MIGHT MEAN FOR ALL OF OUR COMMUNITIES 20 21 AS WE HAVE BEEN FACING THE RHNA CHALLENGES AND SEEING MORE AND MORE AND MORE HOW REAL THIS CRISIS IS, SO THANK YOU. 22

SUSAN ADAMS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. FIRST I'D LIKE TO EXPRESS MY 1 2 THANKS TO KATE HARTLEY FOR HER PATIENCE IN ANSWERING MY MULTIPLE QUESTIONS TODAY. SHE DID SO THOROUGHLY TODAY THAT I 3 DON'T HAVE ANY. THEY WERE PRETTY WONKY AND SHE KNOCKED THEM 4 5 RIGHT OUT OF THE PARK. SECONDLY I JOIN MY COLLEAGUES IN JOINING THIS GENERATIONAL OPPORTUNITY TO BUILD AFFORDABLE 6 HOMES, PRESERVE THE AFFORDABILITY OF EXISTING HOMES, AND ALLOW 7 8 FLEXIBILITY USES TO MEET LOCAL HOUSING NEEDS. THE CITIES IN SONOMA COUNTY LOOK FORWARD TO THE SIGNIFICANT FINANCIAL BOOST 9 10 TO OUR ABILITY TO REACH OUR RHNA GOALS AND OUR GOAL TO PROVIDE HOUSING FOR THOSE WHO LIVE AND WORK IN THE BAY AREA. THANK 11 YOU. 12

14 V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: ANYONE ELSE HERE IN THE ROOM BEFORE
15 WE GO BACK TO SACRAMENTO? COUNCILLOR REID?

TREVA REID: THANK YOU. I APPRECIATE THE PERSONAL STORIES THAT 17 WERE SHARED. I THINK IT'S REALLY POWERFUL WHEN WE CAN REFLECT 18 ON OUR OWN LIFE JOURNEY, PARTICULARLY WHEN WE'RE IN SEATS OF 19 INFLUENCE TO REALLY IMPACT HOW WE'RE SHOWING UP FOR SO MANY 20 PEOPLE IN OUR LIVES RIGHT NOW, AND HEARING THE STORIES THAT 21 WERE SHARED, IT JUST LET ME REFLECT ON MY OWN EXPERIENCE AND 22 CHILDHOOD. I GREW UP WITH HOUSING INSTABILITY. I DIDN'T KNOW 23 IT WAS HOUSING INSTABILITY GROWING UP BECAUSE IT WAS JUST THE 24 25 REALITY THAT WAS THE NORM FOR US. I GREW UP LIVING IN 20 TO

30-DEEP IN A THREE-BEDROOM, ONE-BATHROOM. I WAS HOUSE HOPPING 1 FROM ONE FAMILY MEMBER'S HOUSE TO THE NEXT FROM A PALETTE TO A 2 3 COUCH TO A LAUNDRY ROOM BUNKING WITH THREE TO FOUR COUSINS IN A BED, AND THAT WAS OUR REALITY, AND YET THE REALITY OF THAT 4 5 WAS POWERFUL AND BEAUTIFUL, AND THAT WE ALWAYS HAD A ROOF OVER OUR HEAD. WE MAY NOT HAVE HAD THE ACCOMMODATIONS THAT WE 6 CERTAINLY WOULD HAVE DESIRED, BUT WE HAD THE POWER OF FAMILY 7 8 HELPING US TO ENSURE THAT WE HAD HOUSING STABILITY, AND WE ALWAYS LOOKED OUT FOR EACH OTHER. AND SO I DON'T TAKE IT 9 LIGHTLY IN THIS ROLE THAT I HAVE AND THAT WE HAVE IS TO DO 10 WHAT I GREW UP DOING, IS MAKING SURE THAT WE TAKE CARE OF ONE 11 ANOTHER, AND I BELIEVE THAT AS WE SHARE WITH THE BLACK HOUSING 12 ADVISORY TASK FORCE THAT I SERVE ON, WE'VE BEEN CALLING FOR 13 \$1.5 BILLION BUDGET IN THIS WHAT WE CALL CAN'T-WAIT MOMENT TO 14 15 DELIVER ACROSS THE STATE AND CERTAINLY IN OUR NINE COUNTIES 16 FOR OUR BLACK RESIDENTS WHO FACE THE HIGHEST DISPARITIES IN MIGRATION, OF GETTING PUSHED OUT, SHOVED OUT, LEFT OUT, AND 17 NOT BEING ABLE TO RETURN TO THEIR HOMES, IS THAT SEEKING THE 18 \$20 BILLION, THIS IS A CAN'T-WAIT MOMENT. I MEAN, \$20 BILLION 19 IS TRULY NOT ENOUGH. IT'S A DOWN PAYMENT. IT'S A DEPOSIT OF 20 21 WHAT WE TRULY NEED TO BRING IN THE LEVEL OF HOUSING STABILITY FOR OUR COMMUNITIES. I WAS ABLE TO PURCHASE MY FIRST HOME NOT 22 IN THIS STATE, HAVEN'T BEEN ABLE TO DO THAT YET, WOULD LOVE 23 TO, BUT I WAS ABLE TO BUY MY FIRST HOME AND BUILD MY FIRST 24 HOME IN OHIO, AND IT CAME THROUGH A DEEPLY AFFORDABLE HOME 25

OWNERSHIP PROGRAM WHERE GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE CAME IN. I GREW 1 UP ON GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE. I GREW UP WITH THE GOVERNMENT 2 3 PROVIDING OUR HOUSE, AND WHEN I HAD MY FIRST CHILD, WE LIVED IN LOW-INCOME HUD HOUSING. I WAS PAYING \$60 A MONTH RENT FOR 4 5 OUR HOUSE, AND HERE IN THAT SEASON OF MY LIFE I WAS ABLE TO BENEFIT GREATLY FROM DEEP INVESTMENTS FROM THE GOVERNMENT FOR 6 ME TO HAVE MY OWN HOME TO BUILD MY OWN HOME AND PROVIDE THAT 7 8 LEVEL OF HOUSING STABILITY AND GENERATIONAL WEALTH ACCESS AND OPPORTUNITY AS I NOW WATCH MY OWN DAUGHTER AND MY FAMILY WHO -9 10 - ON MY FATHER'S SIDE OF THE FAMILY, NONE OF US HAD OWNED HOMES BEFORE, AND THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THAT WHEN I TELL YOU 11 THAT I LIVED 20 TO 30 DEEP IS THAT I AM ONE OF THE OLDEST FIVE 12 OF 135 COUSINS, AND OF THOSE, MY COUSIN AND I IN 1999 WERE THE 13 TWO FIRST OF OUR COUSINS, OF OUR AUNTS AND UNCLES, OF OUR 14 15 GRANDPARENTS, OUR GREAT-GRANDPARENTS, TO COME INTO THAT LEVEL 16 OF HOME OWNERSHIP. WE BOTH BOUGHT AND BUILT HOMES IN THAT SEASON OF OUR LIFE, AND THE RIPPLE EFFECT OF THAT DECISION 17 WITH OUR COUSINS, OUR SIBLINGS, OUR AUNTS AND UNCLES, ALL OF 18 THEM NOW -- MANY OF THEM NOW OWN HOMES NOW. THEY WERE ABLE TO 19 SEE IT, TO TASTE IT, TO TOUCH IT, TO REALIZE THAT IN OUR 20 21 FAMILY, IN OUR BLOODLINE THAT HOME OWNERSHIP, GENERATIONAL WEALTH EQUITY, AND THIS STANDARD OF LIVING COULD BE POSSIBLE 22 FOR US AS A FAMILY. AND SO NOW WE HAVE THAT OPPORTUNITY TO 23 CREATE THIS LIVING LEGACY WHILE WE ARE ALIVE, TO SEE OUR 24 25 NEIGHBORS, OUR FAMILIES, OUR FRIENDS, OUR RESIDENTS COME INTO

THIS LEVEL OF ACCESS TO A RENTER, HAVING A RENTED HOME, A 1 2 QUALITY OF LIFE AS A RENTER, TO HAVING HOME OWNERSHIP, AND 3 HOPEFULLY TO PRODUCE OPPORTUNITIES FOR OTHER FAMILIES TO HAVE DEEPLY AFFORDABLE HOMES. HOMELESSNESS IS AT THE INTERSECTION 4 5 OF EVERY ISSUE THAT IS IMPACTING OUR CITY, THE DISPARITIES OF INCOME INEQUALITY, THE DISPARITIES OF FOOD INSECURITY, THE 6 EXPOSURE TO VIOLENCE AND TRAUMA. THOSE ARE ALL REAL ASPECTS OF 7 8 WHAT WE ARE EXPERIENCING THE WEIGHT OF CITIES ACROSS OUR COUNTIES, AND SO I'M GRATEFUL THAT WE HAVE THIS OPPORTUNITY. I 9 THANK YOU FOR THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN IN THIS FOR SEVEN AND FIVE 10 YEARS. I THANK YOU, KATE, FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO JUST HAVE 11 DEEPER CONVERSATIONS WITH YOU, AND BRAD, TO HAVE CONVERSATIONS 12 WITH YOU ABOUT SOME OF THE WORK THAT WE'RE LEADING OUT IN 13 OAKLAND, BUT WE KNOW IN OAKLAND WE WON'T HAVE ENOUGH MONEY TO 14 15 MEET THIS MOMENT. THE RHNA GOALS THAT WE HAVE BEFORE US, WE 16 WON'T MEET OUR 2030 GOALS WITH THE CITY'S FUNDING AND THE 17 FUNDING THAT'S AVAILABLE. WE ARE SIGNIFICANTLY OFF, AND SO WE WANT THE \$2 BILLION. MORE. IF SOMEONE DOESN'T WANT THEIRS, LET 18 US KNOW. WE'LL GLADLY RECEIVE THAT, BUT WE TRULY APPRECIATE 19 EVERY EFFORT THAT WE ARE PUTTING IN TO MAKE SURE THAT WE 20 21 MAXIMIZE THIS MOMENT FOR ALL OUR COUNTIES, AND I CAN CERTAINLY SAY CERTAINLY FOR THE DEEP NEED THAT WE HAVE IN OAKLAND WITH 22 THE DATA THAT YOU SEE AND THAT WE'RE LIVING THE REALITY OF 23 EVERY DAY. [ Applause ] 24

SPEAKER: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I WANT TO THANK OUR CURRENT 6 CHAIR AND PAST CHAIR FOR THEIR LEADERSHIP, STAFF, ALL OF THE 7 8 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT. I WHOLEHEARTEDLY SUPPORT THIS RESOLUTION AND HOPE THAT I CAN VOTE. I APOLOGIZE. I'M CO-HOSTING THE 9 EVENT IN THE OTHER ROOM AND HAVE TO STEP AWAY IN A FEW 10 MINUTES, BUT I JUST WANT TO EMPHASIZE THAT THIS IS A PRIORITY 11 FOR ALAMEDA COUNTY. WE WANT TO ENSURE THAT THEY ARE PRODUCING, 12 PRESERVING AND PROTECTING HOUSING UNITS SO WE CAN RETAIN THE 13 FABRIC OF OUR COMMUNITY. OUR COMMUNITY MEMBERS DEPEND ON 14 HAVING SECURE HOUSING SO THEY CAN CONTINUE TO THRIVE IN OUR 15 COMMUNITY, AND WE HAVE TO MAKE SURE THAT WE HAVE HOMES FOR OUR 16 RELATIVES, OUR CHILDREN AND OUR FAMILIES, SO I AM SUPPORTIVE 17 18 OF \$20 BILLION AND REALLY ENCOURAGE BY THE STRONG LABOR PROTECTIONS IN THIS AS WELL. SO IF I CAN VOTE AND COME BACK IN 19 TIME, IT WILL DEFINITELY BE A YES VOTE FOR ME. THANK YOU FOR 20 21 EVERYONE WHO WORKED SO HARD ON MAKING THIS A REALITY. 22

23 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: PRESIDENT RAMOS, WE HAVE COUNCILMEMBER
24 FIFE WHO WOULD LIKE TO SPEAK ALSO.

PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU. IF YOU ARE ABLE TO HANG ON WE
 COULD LOVE TO INCLUDE YOU IN THIS VOTE. COUNCILMEMBER FIFE?

SPEAKER: I WANTED TO SPEAK BRIEFLY. I WANTED TO ADD MY VOICE 4 5 AND SHARE THAT AS A FORMER WORKING HOMELESS PERSON IN OAKLAND, CALIFORNIA AND SOMEONE WHO HAS BEEN ON THE COMMUNITY SIDE OF 6 ORGANIZING WITH THE PROCESS, IT IS JUST AMAZING AT THIS POINT 7 8 TO BE ABLE TO VOTE WITH MY COLLEAGUES ON THIS HISTORIC, HISTORIC BILL. AS SOMEONE WHO HAS LED NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED 9 10 HOUSING MOVEMENTS AROUND THE HUMAN RIGHT TO HOUSING THROUGH MOMS FOR HOUSING AND A HOST OF OTHER COMMUNITY-BASED 11 ORGANIZATIONS, I AGREE WITH ALL OF MY COLLEAGUES WHO ARE 12 SAYING LET'S GO BIG, LET'S GO FOR 20 BILLION WITH STRONG LABOR 13 STANDARDS, AND THE ADDED WISDOM OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS 14 15 OF THE BAY AREA THAT ADDS THE INDEPENDENT OVERSIGHT FOR THIS 16 MEASURE. I THINK THE FATIGUE THAT OUR VOTERS ARE EXPERIENCING AND A LACK OF TRUST THAT THEY HAVE FOR ELECTED OFFICIALS AND 17 BALLOT MEASURES THAT WILL TAP THEIR POCKETS. I'M ALSO THE HEAD OF A MULTI-GENERATIONAL 17 HOUSEHOLD, AND MY TITLE HAS NOT PROTECTED ME FROM THE IMPACTS OF THIS ONGOING HOUSING CRISIS. THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN HIT 18 THE HARDEST BY THIS CRISIS RANGE FROM ELECTED OFFICIALS TO 19 CAREGIVERS TO HOUSE CLEANERS TO CONSTRUCTION WORKERS TO 20 21 TEACHERS TO DOCTORS AND THE LIST CAN GO ON AND ON. WE CONTRIBUTE TO OUR COMMUNITIES IN OUR REGIONS, AND WE DESERVE 22 AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AND WE NEED A \$20 BILLION BOND TO PASS, 23 AND I ALSO WANT TO ADD THAT, YOU KNOW, IN MY PERSPECTIVE THIS 24 BOND IS ABOUT RACIAL JUSTICE. IT'S ABOUT ECONOMIC JUSTICE. 25

I WOULD LAKE TO 7 8 EMPHASIZE TO BE AND STAY WELL BOTH PHYSICALLY AND MENTALLY AND FOR YOUR CHILDREN TO GROW AND FLOURISH WE NEED TO MAKE SURE 9 10 THAT WE ALL HAVE HOUSING TO COUNT ON. A STABLE HOME ANCHORS OUR HEALTH AND PROVIDES A LADDER FOR FUTURE SUCCESS. OUR 11 CHILDREN WON'T GET VERY FAR IF WE DON'T PLAN FOR THEIR HOUSING 12 NEEDS AND THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE IN OUR COMMUNITIES. THE REGIONAL 13 HOUSING BOND CAN BE A PART OF THESE PLANS, BUT ONLY IF YOU 14 15 HELP GET THIS MEASURE ACROSS THE FINISH LINE. 25 SUPPORT AND OUR ORGANIZATION'S SUPPORT FOR THE \$20 BILLION

BAHFA BOND. AS MAYOR ARREGUIN MENTIONED, THE POLLING IS MUCH 1 2 THE SAME BUT THE IMPACT WILL BE DOUBLE AND THE COMMUNITY WILL REMEMBER THAT IN THE FUTURE. THIS COULD BE TRANSFORMATIONAL 3 FOR THE BAYVIEW, FILLMORE, SAN FRANCISCO AND FOR THE BAY AREA. 4 5 WE'RE ESPECIAL EXCITED ABOUT THE PRESERVATION INCLUSION, 15 TO 24%. FARNSWORTH FOR A PARTICULARLY 22 EDUCATIONAL DISCUSSION, BUT WE ARE DISAPPOINTED TO SEE TODAY 23 THAT THE LANGUAGE IN THE MEASURE REFERS TO EXTREMELY LOW 24 INCOME. DON'T TALK TO US ABOUT HOMELESSNESS IF IT DOESN'T SAY 25

ACUTELY LOW INCOME. THAT'S WHERE THE NEED IS. OUR SENIORS ARE
 OUT CAMPAIGNING FOR THIS MEASURE ALREADY. WE SUPPORT IT 110%.
 GIVE US SOMETHING FOR FOLKS AT 20% AMI. THANK YOU.

WE FULLY SUPPORT THE ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION TO PLACE THIS AFFORDABLE HOUSING BOND MEASURE ON 11 THE NOVEMBER 2024 BALLOT. MPH IS ALSO A MEMBER OF BAHA, BAY 12 AREA HOUSING FOR ALL. WE AS A COALITION HAVE OVER 50 PLUS 13 ORGANIZATIONS IN THE COALITION IS PART OF THIS AND GROWING 14 15 EVERY SINGLE DAY. I'M NOT SURE IF SOMEONE FROM STAFF MIGHT ADDRESS WHAT WAS 7 8 JUST BROUGHT FORTH. I WANT TO THANK OUR CARPENTERS FOR BEING HERE. MY BONUS FATHER IS A LOCAL 2 CARPENTER, AND I APPRECIATE 9 10 THAT, AND THE FEEDBACK FROM THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS.

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING SERVES PEOPLE BETWEEN 0 17 AND 30% OF AREA MEDIAN INCOME, SO WE -- THE USE OF "ACUTELY 18 LOW INCOME" IS RELATIVELY NEW. IT'S SORT OF COME FORWARD WITH 19 THE HELP OF ADVOCATES OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS, BUT WE 20 21 ABSOLUTELY ARE PRIORITIZING HOUSING FOR ACUTELY LOW-INCOME PEOPLE, AND PEOPLE WITH ZERO INCOMES. 22

PLEASE PROCEED AT THIS TIME 15 16 WE'LL TAKE ON ITEM 10A AND THIS IS ADOPTION OF A RESOLUTION ON THE APPROVAL OF THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY AS THE 17 EXECUTIVE BOARD TO THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, 18 CEQA DETERMINATION EXEMPT PURSUANT TO PUBLIC RESOURCES CODE 19 21065 AND GOVERNMENT CODE 64523. PLEASE PROCEED. 20 21 DANIEL SAVER: THANK YOU, MY NAME IS DANIEL SAVER. I'M VERY 22 PLEASED TO PRESENT THIS ITEM. WE TOOK THE BIG ITEM FIRST, SO I 23 WILL TRY TO BE SWIFT WITH THIS PARTICULAR ITEM SO WE CAN KEEP 24 25 MOVING ALONG. SO IF WE CAN MOVE TO THE NEXT SLIDE, SO THIS IS

APPROVAL OF THE BUSINESS PLAN FOR BAHFA, SO THE NEXT ITEM THAT 1 DIRECTOR HARTLEY WILL PRESENT IS FOR THE REGIONAL EXPENDITURE 2 3 PLAN. SO HERE IN TERMS OF THE BUSINESS PLAN, BEFORE STARTING I WANTED TO JUST ACKNOWLEDGE THERE'S A LOT OF ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS 4 5 TONIGHT. IT HAS BEEN A LONG ROAD, AS MANY HAVE SAID. WE HAVE HAD A TREMENDOUS TEAM TO HELP BUILD THIS BUSINESS PLAN. WE 6 STARTED THE WORK BACK IN 2021, AN EXCELLENT CONSULTANT TEAM, 7 8 THE NAMES OF WHICH YOU SEE UP HERE. THERE WAS ALSO AN EQUITY WORKING GROUP, AN 11-MEMBER WORKING GROUP THAT MET MANY TIMES 9 TO HELP FORM THE CORE PARTS OF THIS DOCUMENT, INCLUDING THE 10 EQUITY FRAMEWORK. AS WELL AS MANY, MANY OTHER STAKEHOLDERS AND 11 ALL OF YOU OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS WHO HAVE PROVIDED 12 FEEDBACK ON VARIOUS DRAFTS, ITERATIONS AS WE HAVE BROUGHT THIS 13 FORWARD. SO THERE ARE FOUR SUBSTANTIVE CHAPTERS, AND I WILL 14 15 VERY QUICKLY GO ON THE SLIDE FOR EACH OF THEM, BUT IF WE CAN 16 TAKE THE NEXT SLIDE FIRST, PART OF WHY I THINK WE'RE ABLE TO GO RELATIVELY SWIFTLY HERE IS THIS SHOULD ALL BE EXTREMELY 17 FAMILIAR TO ALL OF YOU. WE HAVE BROUGHT THIS TO YOU IN VARIOUS 18 COMPONENT PARTS BEFORE OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS, AND 19 ACTUALLY AS AN EXECUTIVE BOARD, YOU HAVE ALREADY ADOPTED TWO 20 21 OF THE KEY COMPONENTS OF THIS BUSINESS PLAN AT THE END OF 2023, AND THAT INCLUDES THE EQUITY FRAMEWORK, AS WELL AS THE 22 FUNDING PROGRAMS CHAPTERS. ADDITIONALLY IN EARLY 2024, THE 23 BAHFA ADVISORY COMMITTEE, AS WELL AS THE ABAG HOUSING 24 COMMITTEE AND THE BAHFA OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE HAVE ALL 25

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UNANIMOUSLY RECOMMENDED APPROVAL OF THIS FULL BUSINESS PLAN, 1 WHICH ESSENTIALLY PACKAGES TOGETHER ALL OF THOSE DIFFERENT 2 3 COMPONENT PARTS THAT YOU HAVE VIEWED IN ISOLATION BEFORE. SO IF WE GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE, THE FIRST CHAPTER IS A LEGISLATIVE 4 5 AND BUSINESS PLAN OVERVIEW. IT'S ESSENTIALLY BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT FOR THE BUSINESS PLAN. IMPORTANTLY, IT DESCRIBES THE 6 STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS THAT WE HAVE THAT STEM FROM OUR ENABLING 7 8 LEGISLATION, THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA REGIONAL HOUSING ACT, AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN HERE IN THE BUILDING AS "THE ACT," AND SO 9 YOU SEE A NUMBER OF THOSE DIFFERENT COMPONENTS LISTED HERE 10 ABOVE. THAT INCLUDES THE REVENUE OPTIONS, VARIOUS 11 CONSTITUTIONAL REQUIREMENTS AND LIMITATIONS, MINIMUM 12 EXPENDITURES FOR ALL THREE PS, AS WELL AS DEFINES THE WAYS IN 13 WHICH THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD WILL BE WORKING WITH THE BAHFA 14 15 BOARD AND THE BAHFA ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON ALL OF THESE 16 DECISIONS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO THE EQUITY FRAMEWORK IS THE SECOND CHAPTER -- WELL, THE SUMMARY OF THE EQUITY FRAMEWORK IS 17 THE SECOND CHAPTER. THE EQUITY FRAMEWORK IS THE FOUNDATION FOR 18 THE REMINDER OF THE BUSINESS PLAN, AND IT ROOTS ALL OF OUR 19 PROGRAMS IN AN ANALYSIS OF RACIAL AND SOCIAL EQUITY, AND A 20 21 CONCOMITANT COMMITMENT TO ACTUALLY REDUCE DISPARITIES. A KEY PART OF THE EQUITY FRAMEWORK IS A SET OF OBJECTIVES AND 22 METRICS THAT WILL GUIDE ALL OF BAHFA'S FUTURE WORK. THESE SET 23 FORTH VERY SPECIFIC EQUITY OUTCOMES THAT BAHFA WILL SEEK TO 24 ACHIEVE AND ESTABLISHES STANDARDIZED METRICS THAT WE WILL 25

REPORT ON TO ACTUALLY TRACK AND HAVE ACCOUNTABILITY FOR 1 MEETING THOSE GOALS ALONG THE WAY. AND JUST A REMINDER THAT 2 3 THIS IS ONE OF THE COMPONENTS THAT YOU HAVE ACTUALLY ALREADY APPROVED. CHAPTER 2 IS A SHORT SUMMARY OF THE EOUITY FRAMEWORK 4 5 AND THE FULL EOUITY FRAMEWORK IS INCLUDED AS APPENDIX ONE. WE GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THE FUNDING PROGRAMS, SO A QUICK 6 NOTE HERE. THE FUNDING PROGRAMS WITHIN THE BUSINESS PLAN APPLY 7 8 TO THE 20% OF FUNDS THAT WOULD BE RETAINED BY BAHFA. IT DOES NOT DIRECTLY CONTROL THE 80% OF FUNDS THAT ARE ADMINISTERED 9 DIRECTLY BY THE COUNTIES AND SEVERAL OF THE CITIES. BUT THESE 10 FUNDING PROGRAMS FOR THE 20% OF FUNDS RETAINED BY BAHFA DO 11 DESCRIBE THE INITIAL INVESTMENT STRATEGIES THAT BAHFA WILL 12 EMPLOY IN SOME DEGREE OF DETAIL, AND HOW THOSE STRATEGIES ARE 13 DESIGNED TO FULFILL OUR STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS, IMPLEMENT THE 14 15 EQUITY FRAMEWORK, AND SERVE AS THE BUILDING BLOCKS, THE 16 FINANCIAL BUILDING BLOCKS FOR HOW BAHFA CAN ACHIEVE LONG-TERM SELF-SUFFICIENCY, WHICH IS GOING TO BE THE FOCUS OF THE NEXT 17 CHAPTER. AND AGAIN, THIS IS ONE OF THE OTHER PIECES THAT HAS 18 ACTUALLY ALREADY BEEN ADOPTED, SO CHAPTER 3 IS A SUMMARY OF 19 THE FULL SET OF FUNDING PROGRAMS, AND THE FULL DESCRIPTIONS OF 20 21 THOSE FUNDING PROGRAMS ARE INCLUDED AS AN APPENDIX. IF WE GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE, I'LL SPEND JUST A LITTLE BIT MORE TIME ON 22 THIS SLIDE. THIS IS VERY EXCITING. IF THE PRIOR CHAPTERS LAY 23 OUT THE POLICY FRAMEWORK, THE EQUITY PRIORITIES AND THE 24 25 INITIAL FINANCING PRODUCTS, CHAPTER 4 DESCRIBES THE

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OPERATIONAL STRUCTURE AND THE CONSIDERATIONS NECESSARY FOR 1 BAHFA TO ACTUALLY DELIVER ON ALL OF THOSE GOALS, OBJECTIVES 2 AND PROGRAMS. SO THIS IS -- IT'S NOT JUST A PLANNING DOCUMENT. 3 THE IDEA IS NOT TO HAVE THIS VERY LONG BUSINESS PLAN LIVE ON A 4 5 SHELF. IT'S MEANT TO BE A BLUEPRINT AND A GUIDE FOR IMPLEMENTATION ITSELF, AND THIS CHAPTER DESCRIBES IN A LITTLE 6 BIT MORE DETAIL HOW THAT CAN HAPPEN. THAT COULD BRING ABOUT 7 8 SYSTEMS CHANGE IN THE HOUSING FINANCE ECOSYSTEM IN THE BAY AREA AS DIRECTOR TIEDEMANN HAD DISCUSSED PREVIOUSLY, THIS IS 9 THE OFT-DESCRIBED NEW YORK MODEL, AND SO ONE KEY THING TO 10 EMPHASIZE THAT'S EXTREMELY EXCITING ABOUT THE VOTE YOU JUST 11 TOOK IS WHILE WE'RE TRYING TO MODEL THIS ON NEW YORK, WE 12 ACTUALLY HAVE SOME TOOLS AT OUR DISPOSAL THAT NEW YORK DID NOT 13 HAVE. AND NAMELY THAT IS THE ABILITY TO RAPIDLY CAPITALIZE 14 15 BAHFA THROUGH A GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND. SO WHEREAS IN NEW 16 YORK IT TOOK THEM 50 YEARS TO GET WHERE THEY ARE NOW, WE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO ACCELERATE INTO A SELF-SUSTAINING FINANCIAL 17 INSTITUTION HERE IN THE BAY AREA MUCH MORE RAPIDLY BECAUSE 18 WE'RE GOING TO BE ABLE TO START OFF WITH THAT BIG INITIAL SET 19 OF CAPITAL INVESTMENTS. SO JUST TO OUICKLY DESCRIBE HOW DOES 20 21 THIS WORK, WHAT'S THE PATH, FIRST IS THAT BAHFA WILL USE THE BOND FUNDS TO BUILD A PORTFOLIO OF CONSTRUCTION, PERMANENT AND 22 SUBSIDY LOANS FOR PROJECTS ACROSS THE NINE COUNTY BAY AREA. 23 THE NET INCOME, WHICH ARE REVENUE THAT WE DERIVE FROM FEES, 24 25 INTEREST, ET CETERA, WILL THEN BE REINVESTED BACK INTO OUR

PROGRAMS INSTEAD OF WORKING WITH BANKS THAT WILL PAY OUT THEIR 1 2 STAKEHOLDERS OR THEIR INVESTORS OR THEIR EXECUTIVES, WE'RE 3 ACTUALLY ABLE TO RETAIN THAT EXTRA VALUE WITHIN THE PUBLIC SECTOR TO BE REINVESTED BACK INTO OUR COMMUNITIES, AND THEN 4 5 FARTHER INTO THE FUTURE WE'RE ABLE TO LEVERAGE THE BALANCE SHEET THAT BAHFA BUILDS AND OUR STAFF EXPERTISE OVER TIME TO 6 BRING NEW LENDING SOURCES OF CAPITAL TO BEAR, INCLUDING 7 8 THROUGH THE PRIVATE MARKETS. THIS IS VERY EXCITING. THIS IS ABOUT BUILDING THAT GENERATIONAL PERMANENT NEW INSTITUTION 9 10 THAT CAN HELP PROVIDE FUNDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING FAR, FAR, FAR AFTER THESE BOND FUNDS THAT ARE RAISED THROUGH -- THAT ARE 11 APPROVED BY THE VOTERS AFTER WE SPEND THOSE. SO IF WE GO TO 12 THE NEXT SLIDE, THIS IS JUST A NICE GRAPHIC THAT TRIES TO TELL 13 THE SAME STORY THAT I JUST DESCRIBED, SO YOU SEE THE EVOLUTION 14 15 OF BAHFA IN ITS EARLY YEARS INTO YEARS 10 PLUS, SO STARTING 16 WITH, YOU KNOW, ONE PARTICULAR SOURCE OF INITIAL CAPITALIZATION FROM THE BONDS, BUT THEN OVER TIME GROWING TO A 17 DIVERSIFIED SET OF REVENUE STREAMS, STARTING WITH ADDITIONAL 18 REGIONAL CAPACITY THAT CAN PROVIDE TECHNICAL EXPERTISE AND 19 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO ALL OF OUR COUNTIES AND CITIES THAT 20 21 EVOLVES INTO TIME AS A REAL TRUE PUBLIC MORTGAGE LENDER WITH AN ESTABLISHED TRACK RECORD THAT CAN ACCESS THOSE DIVERSIFIED 22 REVENUE STREAMS, AND THEN AT THE BOTTOM YOU SEE THE VARIOUS 23 PROGRAMS THAT CAN EVOLVE FROM THE INITIAL SET OF LOAN PRODUCTS 24 THAT BAHFA IS ABLE TO OFFER TO IN THE FUTURE A MUCH BROADER 25

RANGE OF FINANCING, AND A KEY PIECE HERE IS THAT OVER TIME IF 1 WE'RE ABLE TO GENERATE NET REVENUE FROM OUR LENDING 2 3 ACTIVITIES, THOSE DOLLARS WOULD NOT BE SUBJECT TO THE SAME RESTRICTIONS AS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, WHICH PROVIDES A 4 5 REVENUE SOURCE FOR TENANT PROTECTIONS, HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION, ET CETERA, THAT WE KNOW ARE SO CRITICALLY NEEDED 6 HERE IN THE BAY AREA. SO NEXT SLIDE. THIS IS THE RECOMMENDED 7 8 ACTION. SO YOU SEE A LOT OF WORDS HERE THAT THE PRESIDENT ALREADY RECITED AS A PART OF THE ITEM, AND SO VERY PLEASED TO 9 10 REST WITH THIS AND ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS. 11 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: THANK YOU SO MUCH, MR. SAVER, FOR THE 12 REPORT ON ITEM 10A. BEFORE WE TAKE UP DISCUSSION, DO I HAVE A 13 MOTION AND A SECOND TO --14 15 16 PAT EKLUND: I'LL MOVE APPROVAL. 17 SPEAKER: TIEDEMANN SECONDS. 18 19 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: WE HAVE A MOTION, COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND AND 20 21 SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER TIEDEMANN. ARE THERE ANY EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS WITH ANY COMMENTS OR QUESTIONS? 22 23 SPEAKER: I HAVE A QUESTION, SUSAN ADAMS FROM NORTH PARK. 24 25

1 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: GO AHEAD, MAYOR.

2

3 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. KATE HARTLEY AND I TALKED ABOUT THIS A
4 LITTLE BIT AND I JUST WANT YOU TO GIVE US A READER'S DIGEST
5 VERSION OF SO FUNDS COME INTO THE CITY OF PARK, AND WE HAVE
6 EXPENDED THEM ON SOME HOUSING AND PRESERVING AND ALL THE OTHER
7 THINGS INVOLVED IN THIS. AT SOME POINT MONEY WILL FLOW BACK,
8 RIGHT? PEOPLE WILL PAY THEIR RENT. CAN YOU GIVE US JUST A
9 PRIMER ABOUT HOW THAT WORKS?

10

KATE HARTLEY: SURE. SO ROHNERT PARK WILL GET A PORTION OF BOND 11 FUNDS, AND THE DEVELOPERS WILL USE THOSE FUNDS WITH OTHER 12 FUNDING, SO TAX CREDITS -- TYPICALLY TAX CREDITS, TAX-EXEMPT 13 BONDS, MAYBE SOME MONEY FROM THE HOUSING AND COMMUNITY 14 15 DEVELOPMENT, AND THEN OFTENTIMES A LOAN FROM A COMMERCIAL 16 BANK. AND SO THE WAY THAT THE CASH FLOW FLOWS IS THAT THE COMMERCIAL LENDER ALWAYS GETS PAID BACK. THE OPERATING COSTS 17 MUST BE COVERED, OF COURSE. AND THEN IF THERE'S ANYTHING LEFT 18 OVER, THEN THOSE MONIES WILL FLOW BACK TO ROHNERT PARK TO 19 REPAY THAT LOAN FROM THE BOND. AND WHATEVER ROHNERT PARK OR 20 21 THE COUNTY GETS BACK, THE PRINCIPAL MUST BE -- IF THERE'S PRINCIPAL REPAID, IT MUST GO FOR A BOND-ELIGIBLE USE. THE 22 INTEREST PAID, IF THERE'S REPAYMENT THERE, CAN BE USED FOR 23 MORE FLEXIBLE PURPOSES. WHAT HAPPENS, THOUGH, IS BECAUSE YOU 24 25 WANT TO GET AS MUCH DEBT FROM COMMERCIAL LENDER AS POSSIBLE,

AND OPERATING EXPENSES ARE EXPENSIVE, AND THEY GO UP EVERY 1 2 YEAR, USUALLY WHAT HAPPENS TO THOSE PUBLIC SECTOR LOANS IS 3 THERE'S NOT VERY MUCH MONEY PAID BACK. IT'S VERY RARE TO HAVE PRINCIPAL PAID BACK, AND SO WHAT IS SO NEW -- WHAT WILL BE SO 4 5 NEW FOR US AND SO EXCITING IS THAT IF BAHFA CAN BE THE PERMANENT LENDER, INSTEAD OF THE INTEREST AND FEES AND THOSE 6 REPAYMENTS GOING BACK TO A COMMERCIAL LENDER, THEY WILL COME 7 BACK TO BAHFA AND BAHFA CAN TAKE THE INTEREST AND FEES AND PUT 8 IT BACK INTO COMMUNITIES. 9

SPEAKER: SO THAT'S A GREAT -- I AGREE THAT IS VERY EXCITING.
THANK YOU FOR POINTING THAT OUT. I DON'T KNOW IF THIS IS A
POSSIBILITY, SO CHALK THIS UP TO JUST PLAIN IGNORANCE, BUT WHY
WOULDN'T WE AS A CITY COME TO YOU AND SAY WE WOULD LIKE YOU TO
BE THE LENDER OF CHOICE FOR A PROJECT IN ROHNERT PARK?

17 KATE HARTLEY: YOU CAN, AND I HOPE YOU WILL.

18

19 SPEAKER: THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

20

21 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: OKAY. THANK YOU. I'M GOING TO GO TO
22 COUNCILMEMBER FLIGOR.

23

24 SPEAKER: THANK YOU, MADAM PRESIDENT. I HAVE A PROCESS

25 QUESTION, AND I ACTUALLY WENT BACK AND FORTH ON WHETHER TO ASK

THIS OUESTION WHEN YOU WERE DISCUSSING 10C OR WAIT UNTIL WE 1 MOVED ON TO THE PLANS. DEFINITELY I'M VERY HAPPY THAT WE ALL 2 APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY SUBMITTING THE BALLOT MEASURE FOR 3 NOVEMBER. CONGRATULATIONS. THE PROCESS OUESTION AS WE LOOK 4 AHEAD TO THIS GOING TO THE BAHFA BOARD IN MAY AND JUNE, I KNOW 5 THE MARCH 2024 POLLING RESULTS WEREN'T WHERE WE WANTED THEM TO 6 BE, AND I'M JUST CURIOUS, YOU KNOW, COME JUNE WHEN THE BAHFA 7 8 BOARD WILL BE LOOKING AT THE POLLING RESULTS TO INFORM THEM WHETHER OR NOT TO DO A 10 OR \$20 BILLION BOND MEASURE, IF IN 9 10 JUNE THE POLLING RESULTS ARE SIMILAR, GOD FORBID WORSE THAN WHAT WE SAW IN MARCH, I'M JUST CURIOUS TO GET STAFF'S 11 PERSPECTIVE ON IF THERE'S STILL TIME IN THE TIMELINE FOR US TO 12 GO OUT FOR ANOTHER POLL AFTER JUNE TO MAKE SURE THAT WE ARE 13 WHERE WE WANT TO BE BEFORE WE FINALLY APPROVE PUTTING THE 14 15 MEASURE ON THE BALLOT, AND WOULD THAT HAVE TO COME BACK TO THE 16 ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD? BECAUSE AS WE MOVE FORWARD WITH 10A AND 10B THIS EVENING, YOU KNOW, WE'RE SAYING WE NEED TO PUT THESE 17 PLANS IN PLACE, WE HAVE TO START LAYING THE GROUNDWORK BECAUSE 18 WE ALL HOPE THAT THIS MOVES FORWARD AND WE'RE SUCCESSFUL IN 19 NOVEMBER, BUT I WAS CURIOUS ABOUT THAT. IF THERE'S TIME IN THE 20 21 TIMELINE COME JUNE WITH THAT POLL, TO GO OUT FOR ANOTHER POLL, OR HOW DOES STAFF SEE THAT HAPPENING? 22

24 KATE HARTLEY: LET ME START BY SAYING THAT THE POLLING THAT WE25 HAVE DONE IN THE LAST SIX MONTHS OR SO HAS BEEN PRETTY

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CONSISTENT, AND AS MAYOR ARREGUIN NOTED, THE POLLING HASN'T 1 INDICATED A HUGE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN 10 AND \$20 BILLION. WE 2 3 BELIEVE THAT THE FINAL NO-GO POLL WILL CONTINUE TO HAVE CONSISTENCY ON THAT PARTICULAR POINT, BUT WE WANT TO BE SURE. 4 5 THERE IS NOT TIME AFTER JUNE TO CONDUCT ANOTHER POLL, AND WE DON'T HAVE REASON TO BELIEVE THAT IT WOULD BE DIFFERENT. SO IN 6 OUR ESTIMATION, WE ARE AT A POINT WHERE WE THINK THAT IF WE 7 8 CAN -- IF THE ACA 1 EFFORT IS SUCCESSFUL AND WE RESOLVE OR WE FINALIZE THESE DOCUMENTS HERE TODAY THAT WE COME TOGETHER, WE 9 10 COLLECTIVELY HAVE THE GREAT SENTIMENT AND ACTION AND MOMENTUM THAT WAS EXPRESSED SO WELL HERE TODAY, AND WE MOUNT A 11 FANTASTIC -- OR THERE IS A CAMPAIGN THAT IS VERY SUCCESSFUL, 12 WE WILL NOT BE MOUNTING THAT, BUT THAT WE CAN -- THAT THE 13 MEASURE CAN BE SUCCESSFUL, AND WE HAVE MANY RECENT EXAMPLES OF 14 15 THOSE VOTES OUTPERFORMING THE POLLING. SO WE WILL -- WE THINK 16 THAT THE PATH THAT WE CHARTED OUT WILL PROVIDE US ALL THE INFORMATION WE NEED TO GET TO THAT FINAL VOTE IN JUNE. 17

19 SPEAKER: GREAT, THANK YOU, AND I ASSUME YOUR ANSWER WASN'T 20 LIMITED TO JUST INFORMING US ABOUT THE AMOUNT. IT'S ALSO THE 21 SUPPORT THAT THE POLLING SO FAR HAS SHOWN, SO THANK YOU. 22

23 **PRES. BELIA RAMOS:** SUPERVISOR SACKETT?

MARY SACKETT: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, CHAIR. I WANT TO START BY 1 COMMENDING KATE HARTLEY. SHE REALLY HAS DONE AN AMAZING JOB 2 3 WITH THIS. I THINK SHE CAN GIVE A MASTER CLASS IN GOOD GOVERNANCE IN ANSWERING ALL OF OUR OUESTIONS, APPEARING IN THE 4 COMMUNITY, EXPLAINING A VERY COMPLICATED TOPIC, AND GOING INTO 5 SUCH DETAIL WITH JUST A GREAT COMMAND FOR IT, SO I REALLY WANT 6 TO APPRECIATE HER FOR WALKING US THROUGH ALL OF THIS, AND I 7 8 REALLY DO THINK IT'S AN EXAMPLE OF HOW TO DO THIS WELL. IN PREPARING TO TAKE TONIGHT'S VOTE, I HAVE HEARD FROM A NUMBER 9 10 OF PEOPLE, AND A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS CAME UP THAT I JUST WANTED TO ASK, AND IF IT'S NOT THIS ITEM, IT SHOULD BE THE 11 NEXT ITEM, PLEASE STOP ME AND I WILL DELAY MY OUESTIONS. TWO 12 QUESTIONS THAT CAME UP, AND ONE: IS THERE A CAP OR A MAXIMUM 13 AMOUNT OF DOLLARS PER UNIT THAT WOULD BE IMPOSED BY EITHER 14 15 BAHFA OR IF THE COUNTIES WANTED TO DO THAT, IS THERE A LIMIT 16 OR IS IT AN UNLIMITED AMOUNT PER UNIT? AND THEN THE OTHER QUESTION IS WHETHER OR NOT KIND OF TEEING OFF THE DISCUSSION 17 ABOUT PRIVATE MONEY, IS THERE A REQUIREMENT THAT TAX CREDITS 18 BE APPLIED FOR IN ORDER TO ALSO APPLY FOR BAHFA FUNDING? THANK 19 20 YOU.

21

22 KATE HARTLEY: THE FIRST ANSWER REGARDING WHETHER THERE'S A PER 23 UNIT CAP THAT BAHFA WILL IMPOSE OR THAT'S REQUIRED IS NO. AND 24 WE -- THE COUNTIES WILL HAVE DISCRETION AND THE CREATION OF 25 THEIR EXPENDITURE PLAN. WE HAVE -- IN OUR WORK WITH THE

COUNTIES, OUR OUTREACH, OUR ENGAGEMENT WITH COUNTIES AND 1 CITIES THROUGHOUT THE REGION, WE KNOW THAT EVERYONE WANTS 2 3 THEIR DOLLARS TO GO AS FAR AS POSSIBLE TO PRODUCE AS MANY AFFORDABLE HOMES AS POSSIBLE. WE KNOW THERE WILL BE AN EFFORT 4 5 TO LEVERAGE THE BOND FUNDS AS MUCH AS WE CAN. BUT THERE'S NO PER-UNIT CAP, AND LARGELY BECAUSE THERE WILL BE SO MANY 6 DIFFERENT BUILDING TYPOLOGIES THAT WILL BE BUILT, FROM ADUS TO 7 8 AGRICULTURAL WORKER HOUSING TO THE ACQUISITION OF HOTELS TO BRAND NEW CONSTRUCTION. SO HAVING A PER-UNIT CAP IS NOT REALLY 9 SOMETHING WE CAN DO. BUT I ALSO WILL SAY THAT IT IS BAHFA'S 10 INTENT WITH THE 20% OF FUNDS TO REALLY WORK HARD TO IMPLEMENT 11 NEW COST CONTROLS SO THAT WE CAN BUILD MORE HOUSING AND MAKE 12 OUR MONEY GO AS FAST AS POSSIBLE. TAX CREDITS ARE NOT 13 REQUIRED. THEY JUST HAPPEN TO BE THE MAIN VEHICLE THAT WE HAVE 14 15 IN OUR COUNTRY TO BUILD AFFORDABLE HOUSING, SO WE EXPECT ALL 16 THE JURISDICTIONS TO BE LEVERAGING THEIR BOND MONEY WITH TAX 17 CREDITS, BUT THERE'S CERTAINLY NOT A REQUIREMENT, AND WE WANT TO BE AS FLEXIBLE AS WE CAN TO USE EVERY AVAILABLE SOURCE OF 18 FUNDS TO BUILD MORE HOUSING. 19 20

21 PRES. BELIA RAMOS: OKAY. THANK YOU. COUNCILMEMBER COHEN?
22

23 SPEAKER: YES, THANK YOU. JUST A FOLLOW-UP QUESTION ON THE
24 REPAYMENT OF THE LOANS. SINCE BAHFA WOULD BE THE AGENCY
25 PROVIDING THE LOAN BUT THE PROJECTS ARE BY JURISDICTION, SO

THEY ARE ALLOCATED -- THE ORIGINAL FUNDING IS ALLOCATED BY 1 2 COUNTY AND CITY. AS PAYMENT COMES BACK FOR PRINCIPAL AND 3 INTEREST, DOES THAT THEN GET EARMARKED AS ALLOCATED BACK TO THE CITY OR COUNTY WITH THE PROJECT IS, OR DOES IT JUST GO 4 5 BACK TO THE GENERAL AND SEPARATE ALLOCATION IS DONE LATER FOR THE RE-USE OF THE MONEY IN A SECOND ROUND? 6 7 8 KATE HARTLEY: SO THE HYPOTHETICAL PUT FORWARD WAS FOR BAHFA TO BE A PERMANENT LENDER IN A HOUSING DEVELOPMENT THAT A 9 JURISDICTION IS ALSO SPONSORING. SO ONE THING I THINK WOULD BE 10 A GREAT MODEL FOR US ALL TO WORK ON IS THE JURISDICTION USES 11 THEIR BOND FUNDS FOR SUBSIDY LOANS AND BAHFA COMES IN AS THE 12 PERMANENT LENDER INSTEAD OF A COMMERCIAL BANK, AND SO THE 13 JURISDICTION WILL HAVE THEIR SUBSIDIES IN THE TYPICAL WAY THAT 14 15 WE DO NOW, AND BAHFA WILL HAVE ITS MONEY, BRINGING ITS 20% TO 16 THE JURISDICTION, AND THEN WE'LL HAVE THE INTEREST REPAYMENT, THE PRINCIPAL REPAYMENT, AND WE'LL BE USING THAT THROUGHOUT 17 THE COUNTIES, BUT WE'LL KEEP THOSE -- THAT BAHFA ALLOCATION 18 AND THE JURISDICTIONS ALLOCATIONS SEPARATE. 19 20 SPEAKER: I GUESS JUST A FOLLOW UP. THE MONEY THAT THE COUNTIES 21 HAVE ALLOCATED COULD ALSO GET PAID BACK THROUGH THIS PROCESS 22 AS WELL IF THEY ARE HANDLED AS LOANS TO THE DEVELOPERS, RIGHT? 23

AND SO BAHFA -- AND WE'LL 11 TALK ABOUT THIS A LITTLE BIT MORE IN THE EXPENDITURE PLAN. 12 BAHFA IMAGINES, HAS PLANNED FOR PROVIDING SUBSIDY LOANS WITH 13 OUR 20% AND PERMANENT LOANS SO THAT WE CAN STREAMLINE THE 14 15 FINANCING AND BE MORE OF A ONE-STOP SHOP. BUT THE COUNTIES 16 COULD CERTAINLY BE A PERMANENT LENDER ON THEIR PROJECTS.

I'M HERE TONIGHT TO EXPRESS OUR 10 ORGANIZATION'S WHOLE HEARTED SUPPORT FOR THE PROPOSED NOVEMBER 11 BALLOT MEASURE FOR THE GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND FOR HOUSING. 12 WE'RE VERY EXCITED TO SEE THIS MEASURE ADVANCE TOWARDS THE 13 BALLOT TONIGHT, AND JUST WANTED TO SAY THAT THE PROSPECT OF A 14 15 REGIONAL HOUSING ENTITY AND THE REGIONAL HOUSING BOND AS SET 16 FORWARD IN THE BUSINESS PLAN PROMISES TO CATALYZE AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT BY PROVIDING RESOURCES AT THE SCALE 17 NECESSARY TO ADDRESS THE REGION'S CRITICAL HOUSING NEEDS. KATE HARTLEY: THANK YOU, PRESIDENT RAMOS. IN THE INTEREST OF 7 8 TIME, I WILL BE SUPER QUICK, BUT I -- AND I WANT TO SAY THAT HAVING ITEM 10C GO FIRST WAS LIKE DESSERT FOR DINNER, SO THANK 9 YOU SO MUCH FOR YOUR VOTE, FOR YOUR SUPPORT. I WANT TO THANK 10 MANY, MANY PEOPLE WHO PARTICIPATED IN CREATING THE EXPENDITURE 11 PLAN, INCLUDING OUR BOARD MEMBERS AND ADVOCATES FOR TENANTS 12 AND HOUSING AND EQUITY, AND SPECIFICALLY REGARDING THE LABOR 13 STANDARDS THAT ARE IN OUR EXPENDITURE PLAN, I WANT TO OFFER 14 15 SPECIAL THANKS TO ORGANIZED LABOR REPRESENTATIVES, TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPERS, AND TO THE ABAG HOUSING 16 COMMITTEE WHO VERY -- AS THEY ALWAYS DO, SHOWED TREMENDOUS 17 LEADERSHIP LAST WEEK AND PROVIDED THE COHESION AND THE INSIGHT 18 AND ALL THE PARTICIPANTS IN THE ROOM, AND THERE WERE MANY, DID 19 20 AS WELL, THEIR COLLECTIVE WORK ENABLED OUR PRESENCE HERE 21 TODAY, SO I'M VERY GRATEFUL TO EVERYONE. ALL RIGHT, SO LET'S GO. I'LL BE QUICK, BUT WE'LL HAVE PLENTY OF TIME FOR 22 OUESTIONS. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. AND NEXT SLIDE. WE KNOW WHY 23 WE'RE HERE, THE EXPENDITURE PLAN. THE EXPENDITURE PLAN IS JUST 24 A 10-PAGE DOCUMENT. IT'S GOT ALL THE INFORMATION REQUIRED BY 25

OUR STATUTE. IT'S THE WHO, WHAT, WHEN, HOW, WHY, AND IT'S VERY 1 FACTUAL. NEXT SLIDE. AND IN CREATING OUR EXPENDITURE PLAN, WE 2 DID HAVE TO MAKE ASSUMPTIONS. WE -- YOU'LL BE GLAD TO KNOW 3 THAT THE ASSUMPTIONS THAT WE PUT IN THIS DRAFT DOCUMENT, WHICH 4 5 WILL FILL IN THE NUMBERS WHEN THE FINAL DECISION IS MADE, BUT WE DID ASSUME 20 BILLION, SO WE'RE IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION, AND 6 FOR A \$20 BILLION BOND, WE WILL BE PUTTING THAT MONEY OUT, AND 7 8 WE EXPECT IN SEVEN SEPARATE EXPERTISES OR TRANCHES, AND WE CAN GO FASTER IF THE COUNTIES WANT TO SPEND THE MONEY FASTER, BUT 9 THAT'S JUST THE ASSUMPTION FOR TODAY. OUR EXPENDITURE PLAN 10 PERIOD IS FIVE YEARS, SO BETWEEN 2025 -- THAT'S WHEN WE WANT 11 TO GET OUR FIRST ISSUANCE OUT. WE'RE NOT GOING TO WAIT AROUND. 12 IT'S GOING TO BE FAST -- AND 2030, WE EXPECT TO HAVE TWO 13 ISSUANCES, AND THAT WOULD BE \$1.1 BILLION. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. 14 15 AND THIS IS ONE OF THE ELEMENTS THAT WE'RE REQUIRED TO SHOW, 16 WHICH IS HOW MUCH IS GOING TO WHICH OF THE THREE PS AND OUR LOCAL GOVERNMENT GRANT PROGRAM. I JUST WANT TO POINT OUT THAT 17 FOR PRODUCTION AND PRESERVATION, THE REASON YOU SEE A RANGE 18 THERE IS BECAUSE BAHFA HAS 18% FLEXIBLE FUNDS, AND SO WE WILL 19 BE PUTTING THE FLEXIBLE FUNDS INTO PRODUCTION FOR THE FIRST 20 ISSUANCE, BUT IT WILL BE UP TO THE BOARDS TO DECIDE WHERE 21 THOSE FLEXIBLE FUNDS WILL GO FOR THE SECOND ISSUANCE. THEY MAY 22 GO TO PRESERVATION FULLY OR MAYBE SPLIT BETWEEN PRODUCTION AND 23 PRESERVATION. THAT WILL BE YOUR DECISION, BUT THAT'S WHY THE 24 25 RANGE IS THERE. NEXT SLIDE. AND WE ARE REQUIRED TO SHOW WHO WE

WILL SERVE BY INCOME LEVEL. SO FOR OUR PRODUCTION MONEY, WE 1 EXPECT 44% OF ALL THOSE FUNDS TO GO TO HOUSEHOLDS WHO ARE VERY 2 LOW INCOME AND EXTREMELY LOW, ACUTELY LOW INCOME, 50% AND 3 BELOW, AND THEN FOR PRESERVATION, WE CAN SERVE PEOPLE UP TO 4 5 120% OF AMI. WE EXPECT MOST OF THE PRESERVATION DOLLARS TO PEOPLE EARNING BETWEEN 50% AND 80% OF AREA MEDIAN INCOME. NEXT 6 SLIDE. THIS SLIDE IS REALLY IMPORTANT. IT'S A UNIT COUNT, AND 7 8 IT GOES TO THOSE ISSUES ABOUT BAHFA'S FUTURE ROLE AS A PUBLIC LENDER. WE ARE ANTICIPATING THAT WITH OUR FIRST TWO ISSUANCES, 9 10 OR THE 30% OF THE FUNDS THAT WE'LL HAVE, WE CAN PRODUCE AND PRESERVE ABOUT 2400 UNITS. NOW IF YOU DO THE MATH, THAT ADDS 11 UP TO ABOUT \$460,000 PER DOOR, WHICH IS VERY HIGH COMPARED TO 12 THE TYPICAL PUBLIC LOAN FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING. THE REASON IS 13 WE ARE ANTICIPATING THAT WE WILL BE OUT IN COMMUNITIES MAKING 14 15 NOT JUST SUBSIDY LOANS BUT ALSO PERMANENT LOANS, AND IN SOME 16 CASES CONSTRUCTION LOANS AS WELL. SO WE WILL BE PUTTING MORE 17 FUNDING INTO PARTICULAR PROJECTS THAN WE TYPICALLY DO AS A REGION, BUT THAT MEANS WE WILL BEGIN TO BUILD BAHFA AS THAT 18 PUBLIC MORTGAGE LENDER, AND WE WILL BEGIN TO GENERATE -- WE 19 WILL BEGIN GENERATING THE FEES THAT WILL THEN BE REINVESTED 20 21 INTO MORE HOUSING AND CONTINUE ON THAT BENEFICIAL CYCLE OF FUNDING LONG AFTER THE ORIGINAL BOND FUNDS ARE SPENT. NEXT 22 SLIDE. AND THIS IS ELEMENT FOUR, PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS. WE 23 DON'T KNOW WHAT PROJECTS WE WILL INVEST IN RIGHT NOW, BUT WE 24 DO HAVE DIRECTION FROM THE BOARD ON OUR PRIORITIES. SO FOR 25

EXAMPLE, WE WILL BE IN EVERY SINGLE COMMUNITY WITH OUR 1 2 PRODUCTION FUNDS ON A RETURN-TO-SOURCE BASIS MAKING 3 INVESTMENTS. FOR PRESERVATION, FOR EXAMPLE, WE'RE GOING TO BE PRIORITIZING INVESTMENTS IN HISTORICALLY DISINVESTED AREAS, 4 5 AND WE WILL HAVE A 20% SET ASIDE FOR COMMUNITY-CONTROLLED HOUSING, AND I DID WANT TO CALL OUT ONE OF THE PRIORITIES THAT 6 YOU SEE, AND THAT IS TO PUT FIRST AS OUR VERY FIRST FUNDING 7 8 PRIORITY FOR PRODUCTION MONEY PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING AND EXTREMELY LOW-INCOME HOUSING. YOU'LL SEE THAT -- AND YOU'VE 9 SEEN THIS BEFORE. THESE DOCUMENTS HAVE BEEN APPROVED BY THE 10 ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND THE JOINT HOUSING COMMITTEES. IT SAYS 11 PRIORITIZE PSH AND ELI HOUSING WHEN FINANCIALLY FEASIBLE. THAT 12 CLAUSE, THAT QUALIFYING PHRASE, WHEN FINANCIALLY FEASIBLE, HAS 13 RAISED SOME QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS, SO WE JUST WANT TO GIVE A 14 LITTLE MORE CONTEXT TO IT. BAHFA DOES NOT HAVE ACCESS TO OR 15 16 CONTROL OPERATING SUBSIDIES, AND PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING AND EXTREMELY LOW-INCOME HOUSING, THIS IS HOUSING FOR PEOPLE 17 WHO MAKE PERHAPS ZERO AMOUNT OF MONEY OR 10% OR 20% OF ELI. 18 THOSE RENTS DON'T COVER OPERATING EXPENSES, SO IN ORDER FOR 19 THEM TO BE SUCCESSFUL, WE NEED TO HAVE OPERATING SUBSIDIES. SO 20 21 PUBLIC HOUSING AUTHORITIES HAVE ACCESS TO OPERATING SUBSIDIES. SOME JURISDICTIONS HAVE ACCESS TO CONTINUUM OF CARE DOLLARS 22 FROM HUD. BAHFA DOES NOT, SO THE REASON THAT WE CALLED THAT 23 OUT WAS TO JUST HIGHLIGHT FOR THE BOARD THAT THAT PRIORITY 24 25 WILL REQUIRE CO-LENDING BY US AND PARTNERSHIPS BY US WITH

PUBLIC HOUSING AUTHORITIES OR JURISDICTIONS WHO HAVE OPERATING 1 SUBSIDIES WITH HUD THROUGH STATE PROGRAMS. WE JUST WANT TO 2 HIGHLIGHT THAT AS A DIFFERENT, A DIFFERENT LENDING STRUCTURE 3 THAN HOUSING FOR HOUSEHOLDS AT 50 TO 80% OF AREA MEDIAN 4 5 INCOME, WHICH CAN BE FINANCIALLY SELF-SUSTAINING THROUGH RENTS AND COVER OPERATING EXPENSES. WE ARE ABSOLUTELY COMMITTED TO 6 THAT PRIORITY. IT'S NOT IN ANY WAY LIMITING. WE WILL DO THAT 7 8 BY PUTTING IT OUT IN OUR FIRST AND SUBSEQUENT NOTICES OF FUNDING AVAILABILITY SO THAT ALL PSH AND ELI DEVELOPMENTS RISE 9 TO THE TOP, AND THEN WE'LL UNDERWRITE ALL OF THE PROJECTS IN 10 THE SAME WAY BECAUSE WE NEED TO ENSURE THAT THESE PROJECTS 11 WILL BE SUCCESSFUL, BECAUSE IF THEY ARE NOT, AND YOU DON'T 12 HAVE TO LOOK TOO FAR TO SEE AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENTS 13 THAT HAVE FAILED, IT'S THE TENANTS WHO SUFFER, AND SO WE ARE 14 COMMITTED TO INVESTING IN SAFE, DECENT, OUALITY HOUSING THAT 15 16 LASTS OVER THE LONG TERM. AND MEANWHILE, WE WILL BE ADVOCATING 17 AT HUD AND THE STATE AS WE HAVE BEEN FOR MORE HOUSING CHOICE VOUCHERS, FOR MORE OPERATING SUBSIDIES. WE DESPERATELY NEED 18 THOSE. SO I JUST WANT TO RAISE THAT. WE RECOMMEND IF THE BOARD 19 FINDS THAT THAT OUALIFYING LANGUAGE IS CONFUSING OR 20 21 CONCERNING, WE CAN TAKE THAT OUT. AND WE WILL MAINTAIN OUR COMMITMENT TO THESE INVESTMENTS AS, YOU KNOW, STRONG AND SAFE 22 AND LONG TERM FOR TENANTS. SO WITH THAT, NEXT SLIDE. THIS IS A 23 NEW SECTION, AND WE ARE VERY HAPPY TO BE PRESENTING THIS AGAIN 24 AS AN OUTCOME OF THE MEETING LAST WEEK REGARDING LABOR 25

STANDARDS. THEY ARE GUIDED -- THE LABOR STANDARDS INCLUDED IN 1 YOUR EXPENDITURE PLAN ARE GUIDED BY THE UNDERLYING PRINCIPLES 2 3 OF BAHFA'S MANDATE, AND THAT IS TO CREATE EQUITY, TO ENSURE FAIR AND EOUITABLE WORKER PROTECTIONS, IN ADDITION TO AN 4 5 EQUITABLE HOUSING APPROACHES AND TO ALSO BUILD AT SCALE BECAUSE WE NEED MORE HOUSING NOW, AND THEN TO PRESERVE OUR 6 ABILITY TO BUILD HOUSING FLEXIBLY AND EMPLOY NEW FINANCING 7 TECHNIQUES AND WORK WITH A WIDE RANGE OF STAKEHOLDERS. NEXT 8 SLIDE. SO OUR RECOMMENDED LABOR STANDARDS ARE: PREVAILING 9 WAGES WITH AN ENFORCEABLE RIGHT OF ACTION FOR BUILDINGS OVER 10 50 UNITS OR MORE ADD TO THAT A HEALTH CARE BENEFIT PAYMENT AS 11 WELL AS THE USE OF APPROVED APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAMS. AND THEN 12 FOR PRESERVATION DEVELOPMENTS, IN ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF THE HIGH 13 DEGREE OF DIFFICULTY IN DOING AN OCCUPIED REHAB, THE 14 15 ACQUISITION AND IMPROVEMENT OF THOSE PROPERTIES WITH PEOPLE LIVING THERE, WE RECOMMEND HAVING ONE LABOR STANDARD FOR 16 17 SMALLER SITES, WHICH TYPICALLY HAVE FINANCIAL FEASIBILITY ISSUES FROM THE GET-GO, AND ANOTHER STANDARD FOR LARGER 18 PRESERVATION DEVELOPMENTS THAT HAVE SUBSTANTIAL REHAB SCOPES. 19 NEXT SLIDE. WE RECOMMEND THAT THOSE LABOR STANDARDS, IF WE ARE 20 21 ABLE TO EXPAND THEM TO ALL THE NINE COUNTIES, THAT THEY ARE EXPANDED FOR THE PURPOSE OF HAVING FAIR EQUITABLE WORKABLE 22 PROTECTIONS IN EVERY COUNTY. NEXT SLIDE. AND AT THE APRIL 10, 23 2024, MEETING, TO THAT POINT, THE JOINT HOUSING COMMITTEES 24 RECOMMENDED THIS ADDITIONAL PROVISION THAT THE STAFF SHOULD BE 25

WORKING WITH THE STATE LEGISLATURE TO AMEND OUR ACT IN ORDER 1 TO IMPOSE THOSE LABOR STANDARDS. SO WE VERY PROACTIVELY 2 ADDRESSED THIS, AND THAT WE KEEP THE COMMITTEES AND THE BOARDS 3 INFORMED OF THE PROGRESS OF THAT ACTION. NEXT SLIDE. AND THEN 4 5 FINALLY, ASSUMING THAT WE ARE SUCCESSFUL IN THIS EFFORT TO EXPAND LABOR STANDARDS TO THE NINE COUNTIES, WE RECOMMEND, AND 6 THIS IS IN YOUR RESOLUTION, THAT THERE BE A PROJECT LABOR 7 8 AGREEMENT SAFE HARBOR SO THAT FOR ANY COUNTY OR CITY THAT OPTS TO NEGOTIATE AND EXECUTE A PLA, THAT THE TERMS OF THE PLA ARE 9 10 THE LABOR STANDARDS, THEY SUPERSEDE WHAT WOULD BE THE BASELINE, THE WAGES, HEALTH CARE AND TRAINING THAT WE 11 PREVIOUSLY DESCRIBED. NEXT SLIDE. THESE STANDARDS PRESENTED 12 FOR YOUR ADOPTION TODAY, THEY REFLECT EXTENSIVE DISCUSSION 13 WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF LABOR ORGANIZATIONS, AFFORDABLE 14 15 HOUSING DEVELOPERS, OTHER STAKEHOLDERS, BOARD MEMBERS, AND 16 THEY WERE UNANIMOUSLY RECOMMENDED BY THE JOINT HOUSING 17 COMMITTEES. HARTLEY? 9 10 SPEAKER: I HAVE HEARD MENTIONED SEVEN TRANCHES, SIX TRANCHES, AND PAGE FOUR SAYS FIVE TRANCHES, I THINK, IN THE FOURTH 11 BULLET. SO DO WE NEED TO BE CONSISTENT? 22 KATE HARTLEY: THE PRESERVATION PROJECTS, ONE VERY CLEAR WAY 23 THAT WE COULD DISTINGUISH A LARGER PROJECT WITH A SUBSTANTIAL 24 REHAB SCOPE IS IF THAT DEVELOPMENT USED LOW-INCOME HOUSING TAX 25 CREDITS TO FINANCE THEIR REHAB. SO THAT COULD BE ONE WAY TO

DISTINGUISH THE PROJECTS. OTHER -- THERE ARE COMMUNITIES WITH 1 PRESERVATION PROJECTS RIGHT NOW THAT DEFINE THE SIZE OF 2 3 PROJECTS. MUCH OF THE PRESERVATION WORK THAT WE ANTICIPATE 19 WILL BE DONE WILL BE BUYING EXISTING MARKET RATE DEVELOPMENTS 20 THAT GO ON THE MARKET FOR SALE THAT HAVE RESIDENTS PAYING 21 RESIDENT AND CONVERTING THEM TO PERMANENT AFFORDABILITY. 13	EVERYBODY. THANK YOU.

15	V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. COUNCILMEMBER MOTOYAMA?

17	SPEAKER: THANK YOU. IT'S MOMENTOUS TO BE AT THE TABLE WHILE
18	THIS IS HAPPENING. I WANT TO THANK STAFF AND ALL THE PARTNERS
19	IN BRINGING THIS FORWARD BECAUSE I THINK IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT
20	TO SEE THIS DOCUMENT, UNDERSTAND THAT THERE'S STILL THINGS
21	THAT CAN CHANGE, THAT THERE'S STILL WORK TO BE DONE, BUT THE
22	CRITICAL THING IS THAT WE MADE THE MOMENT THAT THIS MOVES
23	FORWARD NOW, BECAUSE I THINK THE YOU KNOW, I THINK WE
24	TALKED A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE PERFECT BEING A STUMBLING BLOCK
25	TO THE GOOD, AND I THINK WE'VE OVERCOME THAT, AND I REALLY

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APPRECIATE ALL THE STAKEHOLDERS IN STEPPING UP AND TRUSTING 1 THE PROCESS AND HAVING GOOD, STRONG LABOR STANDARDS, 2 3 POTENTIALLY MORE IN THE FUTURE FOR THE COUNTY PORTIONS, AND WORKING WITH STAFF SO CLOSELY TO BRING THIS FORWARD, AND I 4 5 REALLY, REALLY WANT TO SAY THANK YOU FOR THAT. 6 V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. COUNCILLOR REID? 7 8 COUNCILLOR BAS? 9 SPEAKER: THANK YOU, I WANT TO RECOGNIZE THE WORK THAT HAS BEEN 10 DONE BY THE STAFF AND THE STAKEHOLDERS, IT'S VERY SATISFYING 11 TO BE IN THIS MOMENT WHERE WE HAVE COME TO CONSENSUS OF 12 ADDRESSING THE HOUSING CRISIS AND HOMELESSNESS BUT ALSO THE 13 ECONOMIC INEQUITY THAT RESULTS IN NOT HAVING ENOUGH GOOD-14 15 PAYING JOBS. I SHARED AT THE HOUSING COMMITTEE MEETING 16 RECENTLY THAT BAHFA IS NOT ONLY AN OPPORTUNITY TO CREATE 17 AFFORDABLE HOUSING TO ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS. IT'S ALSO AN OPPORTUNITY WITH THESE LABOR STANDARDS TO ADDRESS PROVIDING 18 LIVING-WAGE JOBS THROUGH OUR LABOR PARTNERS, AND SO I WANT TO 19 THANK THE CARPENTERS, THE BUILDING TRADES, EVERYONE WHO WAS 20 21 PART OF THAT DISCUSSION WITH OUR STAFF. AND THEN NOTING THE MOTION THAT WAS MADE AND THE COMMENT FROM SHARON EARLIER ABOUT 22 -- I CAN'T REMEMBER THE EXACT TERM, BUT THE ACUTE LEVELS OF 23 INCOME. I AM CURIOUS TO HEAR REGARDING BAHFA WILL REPORT 24 25 ANNUALLY ON PSH ELI PRODUCTION ACHIEVEMENT, IS THERE MORE TO

BE SAID THROUGH THE CHAIR TO THE STAFF ABOUT WHAT THAT LOOKS 1 LIKE? I'M ALSO REALIZING THAT THROUGH -- OBVIOUSLY THROUGH OUR 2 3 -- THROUGH THIS, THROUGH OUR SPENDING PLANS THAT WE EACH DO IN OUR CITIES AND COUNTIES, WE COULD ALSO BE CREATING SPENDING 4 5 PLANS THAT SAY WE'RE GOING TO TARGET X AMOUNT TO ACUTELY LOW INCOME, IF THAT'S THE CORRECT PHRASE. AGAIN, I WAS WONDERING 6 IF THAT WAS 0 TO 15 OR 0 TO 20%. IF THERE COULD BE A LITTLE 7 8 BIT MORE CLARITY ON HOW WE HAD POTENTIALLY ADDRESSED THAT THROUGH OUR SPENDING PLANS. 9

KATE HARTLEY: YES, COUNTIES CAN AND CITIES DIRECT ALLOCATION 11 CITIES CAN BAKE INTO YOUR EXPENDITURE PLANS ALL OF THOSE KINDS 12 OF REQUIREMENTS AND REPORTING GOALS. I WILL LOOK TO BOARD 13 MEMBER MOTOYAMA. I THINK ACUTELY LOW IS 0 TO 20, YES. AND THEN 14 15 EXTREMELY LOW GOES UP TO 30, AND AGAIN, WHEN WE REFER TO 16 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, WE TYPICALLY SEE ZERO TO -- UP 17 TO 30 OFTENTIMES, BUT THAT SEPARATE CATEGORY OF ACUTELY LOW-INCOME IS ALSO PERFECTLY GOOD TO REPORT ON. MY RECOMMENDATION 18 FOR THAT REPORTING OBLIGATION THAT WE ADDED IN THE EXPENDITURE 19 PLAN WOULD BE THIS. BAHFA WILL BE PUTTING OUT A NOTICE OF 20 FUNDING AVAILABILITY, AND WE'RE GOING TO HAVE AS NUMBER ONE 21 PRIORITY ALL PROJECTS THAT SERVE ZERO TO -- PERMANENT 22 SUPPORTIVE HOUSING DEVELOPMENTS AND EXTREMELY LOW-INCOME 23 DEVELOPMENTS, AND WE WILL INCLUDE IN THAT, OF COURSE, 0 TO 20. 24 AND THOSE PROJECTS WILL RISE UP TO THE TOP, AND WE ARE VERY, 25

VERY DESIROUS OF FUNDING THEM. WE KNOW, AGAIN, FOR THEM TO BE 1 SUCCESSFUL THEY NEED AN OPERATING SUBSIDY, AND SO WE WILL BE 2 WORKING WITH THE SPONSORS AND APPLICANTS TO MAKE SURE THAT 3 THEY HAVE WHAT THEY NEED FOR SUCCESS. THEN IN OUR REPORTING, 4 5 WHAT I'D LIKE TO DO IS PROVIDE THE LIST OF APPLICANTS FOR THOSE DEVELOPMENTS, THOSE WE FUNDED, WHERE THEY ARE, HOW MANY 6 UNITS, ET CETERA, ALL THOSE NORMAL REPORTING REQUIREMENTS, BUT 7 8 ALSO THE PROJECTS THAT CAME FORWARD WITH AN APPLICATION BUT THAT WE DIDN'T FUND BECAUSE THEY -- FOR WHATEVER REASON, SO 9 10 THAT WE CAN ANALYZE WHAT ARE THE STUMBLING BLOCKS, WHAT HAPPENED, WHAT DO WE NEED, WHAT DO WE -- WHAT CAN WE DO TO 11 TURN AROUND THAT ISSUE THAT RESULTED IN HAVING TO SKIP OVER 12 THAT DEVELOPMENT. SO WITH THAT INFORMATION I THINK YOU'LL HAVE 13 THE FULL LANDSCAPE OF THE DEVELOPMENTS COMING FORWARD, THE 14 15 RECIPES FOR SUCCESS, AND THEN WHAT WE COLLECTIVELY, AS A 16 REGION, NEED TO DO TO BRING FORWARD MORE PSH AND ELI HOUSING. 17

20 V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: COUNCILLOR REID?

SPEAKER: YES, THANK YOU. I WANTED TO SHARE ONE TO MS. HARTLEY, AND THANK ALSO, DANIEL. I REALLY APPRECIATE YOUR PRESENTATION AND THE WORK THAT YOU'VE LED. MS. HARTLEY AND I HAD A MEETING AND WE TALKED IN-DEPTH ABOUT A NUMBER OF STRATEGIC

OPPORTUNITIES FOR COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND OUTREACH, AND I 1 JUST APPRECIATE JUST THE OPENNESS TO THE MANY NUMBERS OF 2 DIFFERENT TOUCH POINTS THAT WE HOPE TO BUILD ON AND EXPAND ON 3 WITH OUR EOUITY FRAMEWORK AND HOW THAT OUTREACH LOOKS IN EACH 4 5 OF OUR JURISDICTIONS. AND SO I WANTED TO HIGHLIGHT FOR THE PUBLIC THAT IN OAKLAND, AS COUNCILLOR PRESIDENT BAS SHARED, WE 6 HAVE SEVERAL MEETINGS IN OAKLAND. THE ONE THAT I WILL BE 7 8 LEADING ALONG WITH SUPERVISOR MILEY AND COUNCIL MEMBERS --KEVIN JENKINS IS ON APRIL 25 FROM 6 P.M. TO 7:30 P.M. WHERE 9 THERE WILL BE AN OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE THIS DISCUSSION AROUND 10 THIS BOND AND HOW AN INVESTMENT OF OVER \$380 MILLION CAN 11 SUPPORT OAKLAND'S AFFORDABLE HOUSING GOALS. I WANTED TO ALSO 12 SHARE, AS WE THINK ABOUT THE ACUTELY LOW INCOME GROUP OF 13 PRIMARILY SENIORS, AS WE HEAR ABOUT THAT DEMOGRAPHIC GROWING, 14 15 IS THAT IN OAKLAND, I BROUGHT FORTH AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO 16 MOVE OUR MAYOR'S COMMISSION ON AGING FROM OUR CITY HALL BUILDING OUT INTO THE COMMUNITY CENTERS, THE SENIOR CENTERS 17 WHERE OUR ELDERS AND COMMUNITY GEMS KNOW AND GO. I'M NOT SURE 18 HOW MANY OF THEM WILL PLUG INTO THIS VIRTUAL DISCUSSION, BUT 19 WHAT WE DID SEE IN OUR FIRST MEETING IN APRIL OF MEETING OUR 20 SENIORS WHERE THEY ARE, WHERE THEY GO, AND WHERE THEY ARE MOST 21 COMFORTABLE WITH CONNECTING, IS THAT WE HAD A ROOM OF OVER 75 22 TO 80 SENIORS SHOWING UP AT 10 A.M. TO HAVE A DISCUSSION ON 23 HOUSING, AFFORDABLE HOUSING WITH SOME STATE HOMEKEY HOUSING 24 25 THAT'S COMING INTO OUR DISTRICT, AND SOME PUBLIC SAFETY AND

OTHER INITIATIVES, AND SO I WANT TO ENCOURAGE US AS WE'RE 1 2 THINKING ABOUT HOW TO MEET THOSE WHO ARE MORE DEEPLY AFFECTED AND IMPACTED BY THIS HOUSING CRISIS IS THAT WE HAVE A STRATEGY 3 TO MEET THOSE COMMUNITIES WHERE THEY ARE, THAT WE HAVE A 4 5 STRATEGY TO ENGAGE WITH OUR FAITH-BASED PARTNERS WHO ARE TYPICALLY NOT INVOLVED IN SOME OF THESE CONVERSATIONS HERE 6 YET, HAVE DEEP ROOTS IN HOW THEY TOUCH AND SUPPORT THAT 7 8 COMMUNITY, THAT WE THINK ABOUT HOW WE MIGHT BE PARTNERING WITH OUR MINORITY CONTRACTORS AND THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN LEFT OUT AND 9 10 NOT ENGAGED AT THE TABLE WITH HOUSING DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS AND OPPORTUNITIES TO BUILD UP IN OUR COMMUNITIES. I WANT US TO 11 EXPAND WHERE AND HOW WE MAY BE WORKING TO REACH THOSE 12 COMMUNITIES THAT ARE MOST IMPACTED AT EVERY AREA OF 13 OPPORTUNITY FOR THIS BOND AS IT COMES FORTH, AND JUST WANT TO 14 15 APPRECIATE MS. HARTLEY AND JUST THE WAYS THAT WE WERE ABLE TO 16 ENGAGE WITH ME AND MY STAFF AROUND HOW WE CAN PARTNER TOGETHER 17 IN AND BEYOND OAKLAND. THANK YOU.

19 V. PRES. JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU. ANY OTHER BOARD MEMBERS?
20 YES, COUNCILLOR TIEDEMANN?

SPEAKER: THANK YOU. I JUST WANTED TO ECHO MY THANKS TO STAFF.
WE HAVE HAD MANY CONVERSATIONS ON THIS EXPENDITURE PLAN AT THE
HOUSING COMMITTEES, ESPECIALLY ON THE LABOR STANDARDS, AND I
KNOW THAT THERE'S A LOT OF WORK THAT'S GONE INTO THAT OF

WORKING WITH THE IMPORTANT LABOR STAKEHOLDERS AND GETTING US 1 AN EXPENDITURE PLAN THAT REALLY WORKS AND DOES EVERYTHING WE 2 3 WANT IT TO DO, AND IT'S REALLY WELL THOUGHT OUT. I WILL ALSO EMPHASIZE, LIKE COUNCILMEMBER REID JUST MENTIONED, THERE ARE A 4 5 VARIETY OF MEETINGS HAPPENING IN THE DIRECT ALLOCATION CITIES AND IN THE COUNTIES THAT ARE GOING TO HAVE TO DRAFT SIMILAR 6 EXPENDITURE PLANS, AND I WANT TO EMPHASIZE THAT IF THERE'S 7 8 ANYTHING THAT SOME OF US DON'T SEE IN HERE THAT WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE OR THAT WE WANT TO EMPHASIZE IN OUR OWN COMMUNITIES, 9 THAT'S WHERE THE RUBBER MEETS THE ROAD IN OUR OWN COMMUNITIES 10 OF EVERY COUNTY AND EVERY DIRECT ALLOCATION CITY HAS TO DRAFT 11 THEIR OWN EXPENDITURE PLAN. AS GREAT AS THIS ONE IS, WE CAN'T 12 JUST COPY ALL OF KATE'S LOVELY WORK, AND SO I THINK IT'S 13 INCUMBENT ON ALL OF US, BOTH CITIES AND SUPERVISOR 14 15 REPRESENTATIVES, TO WORK ON THOSE EXPENDITURE PLANS, ENSURE 16 THAT THEY ARE TARGETING VERY LOW-INCOME, EXTREMELY LOW-INCOME AND ACUTELY LOW-INCOME AND, YOU KNOW, GET AT THE POPULATIONS 17 WE NEED TO. AND I'LL JUST SAY THAT IN ALAMEDA COUNTY WITH 18 MEASURE A 1 WE HAD A SUCCESSFUL GOAL OF 20% OF THE UNITS 19 PRODUCED WITH THAT AT 20% OR BELOW, AND WE EXCEEDED THAT GOAL, 20 SO THAT'S A MODEL THAT WE CAN ALL LEARN FROM IF WE WANT TO, 21 TARGET THESE VERY, VERY LOW-INCOME TARGETS AND PROVIDE THOSE 22 VERY AFFORDABLE UNITS, BUT WE ALL HAVE TO START DOING THAT 23 WORK NOW BECAUSE THE DEADLINE TO GET THOSE EXPENDITURE PLANS 24 25 DONE IS GOING TO COME UP ON US PRETTY QUICK.

SPEAKER: YEAH, FIRST OF ALL, I WANTED TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE VICE 4 5 PRESIDENT'S ROLE IN TRYING TO GET US TO A PLACE IN TERMS OF THE AMENDMENT THAT WAS PROFFERED AT THE HOUSING COMMITTEE THAT 6 ALLOWED US TO GET HERE THIS DISCUSSION BETWEEN THE VARIOUS 7 8 LABOR GROUPS THAT ARE INTERESTED IN HAVING STRONG STANDARDS, 9 AND WE KNOW THAT THERE ARE SOME DIFFERENCES THERE, AND WE ALSO 10 KNOW THAT WITHIN SACRAMENTO, WHETHER IT'S WITHIN A SENATOR'S OFFICE OR -- OFFICE, AS WELL AS THE LABOR ENTITIES THAT ARE 11 THERE TALKING TO SACRAMENTO ABOUT POTENTIAL LEGISLATION, THAT 12 YOU KNOW REALLY GETS TO THE SOLUTION THAT WE NEED, WHICH WOULD 13 BE TO AMEND THE STATE LAW TO ALLOW BAHFA TO APPLY WHATEVER 14 15 STANDARDS THEY COME UP WITH, AND WE MUTUALLY COME UP WITH, TO 16 ALL 100% OF THE MONEY. I THINK WE ALL WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT 17 LABORERS ARE PROTECTED, THAT THE BENEFITS ARE FLOWING, THAT PREVAILING WAGES ARE INDEED BEING PAID. SO I THINK THAT I'M 18 CERTAINLY IN SUPPORT OF THE MOTION. THERE WAS THE REMOVAL OF 19 THE WORD "STRONG," BUT I THINK THAT COULD BE A SUBJECTIVE 20 21 TERM, BUT OBVIOUSLY THE VARIOUS PARTIES THAT ARE GOING TO BE DISCUSSING THIS IN THE NEAR FUTURE TO TRY TO COME UP WITH A 22 COMPROMISE THAT PERHAPS THEN FLOWS BACK TO US TO DO THE STATE 23 LEGISLATION I THINK WE WILL ALL BE IN THEIR OWN WAYS 24 25 ADVOCATING STRONGLY FOR THEIR POSITIONS, AND I LOOK TO THE

SENATE AND THE ASSEMBLY, IF THAT'S WHERE IT ENDS UP, TO HELP 1 2 CRAFT THAT COMPROMISE. I KNOW WE HAVE MEMBERS OF LABOR HERE WHO MAY WANT TO SPEAK TO THIS, BUT I THINK WE'RE GOING IN THE 3 RIGHT DIRECTION, AND WE GOT THERE, AGAIN, SIGNIFICANTLY 4 5 BECAUSE THE VICE PRESIDENT WAS ABLE TO CRAFT THIS LANGUAGE THAT KIND OF ENCOMPASSED AND ALLOWED KIND OF ALL THOSE LABOR 6 GROUPS TO INDEED WITHIN THAT CONTEXT OF THE SACRAMENTO 7 8 DISCUSSIONS TO MOVE FORWARD WITH THIS. SO THANK YOU, JESSE, AND CERTAINLY I'M READY TO VOTE YES ON THIS ITEM. I THINK THE 9 WORDING FROM STAFF ENCAPSULATES AND WILL BRING BACK TO US ANY 10 LEGISLATION THAT COMES FORWARD. THANK YOU. 11

WITH THOSE BAY AREA PROJECTS COME LONG WORK DAYS FOLLOWED BY A LONG 6 COMMUTE HOME IN TRAFFIC. THOSE OF US WHO ARE SINGLE PARENTS 7 8 ARE AT THE MERCY OF DAYCARES, FAMILY IF WE'RE LUCKY TO TAKE CARE OF OUR KIDS WHILE AT WORK. WE BELIEVE THAT 6 LABOR STANDARDS SHOULD BE A PRIORITY IN THIS ONCE IN A 7 8 LIFETIME REGIONAL BOND MEASURE AND SHOULD NOT BE OVERLOOKED. SET BEFORE YOU TODAY IS AN OPPORTUNITY TO UPHOLD THE DIGNITY 9 OF ALL WORKERS AND FOSTER A MORE SUSTAINABLE ECONOMY. THE CARPENTERS ARE FULLY ON-BOARD WITH THE LABOR STANDARDS. YOU'RE GOING TO HEAR A LOT OF OTHER GROUPS AND 17 INDIVIDUALS DOWNPLAY LABOR STANDARDS, CALLING THEM THE FLOOR, 18 SO ON AND SO FORTH. THANK YOU. 6 7 8 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: TIM RIFF, FOLLOWED BY SCOTT LITTLEHALE. 9 SPEAKER: GOOD EVENING, COMMITTEE MEMBERS. I'M A FIELD REMEMBER 10 WITH CARPENTERS LOCAL 22. I HELP REPRESENT THOUSANDS OF 11 WORKERS THAT WORK IN SAN FRANCISCO COUNTY. WE STAND IN SUPPORT 12 OF THE LABOR STANDARDS RECOMMENDED BY STAFF IN THE DRAFT 13 REGIONAL EXPENDITURE REPORT. THESE STANDARDS WILL RAISE THE 14 15 BAR FOR RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION WORKERS AT A REGIONAL SCALE 16 THROUGH PREVAILING WAGE, HEALTH CARE AND APPRENTICESHIP 17 PARTICIPATION. THESE REQUIREMENTS CREATE A POWERFUL BASELINE THAT WILL UPLIFT RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION WORKERS AND THEIR 18 FAMILIES, AND WILL LEVEL THE PLAYING FIELD FOR HIGH ROAD 19 CONTRACTORS WHO COMPETE AGAINST LOW-BIDDING CONTRACTORS 20 21 RELIANT ON WAGE THEFT AND TAX FRAUD. I URGE YOU TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND APPROVE THE REGIONAL EXPENDITURE. LET'S CROSS 22 THE FINISH LINE AND START BUILDING. THANK YOU. 23 24

AND THESE STANDARDS WERE BACKED BY LABORERS AND CARPENTERS IN SACRAMENTO WHICH WERE IN TURN BACKED BY 9 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE THAT APPROVED THESE SORTS 10 OF LABOR STANDARDS FOR ALL 58 COUNTIES, FOR ALL 400 11 JURISDICTIONS, AND THE ARTFUL RESOLUTION FROM VICE PRESIDENT 12 ARREGUIN WAS SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR CHAVEZ AT THE MTC BAHFA 13 OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY. WE HAVE OVER 400 23 ORGANIZATIONAL AND INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS, AND WE ARE ALSO A PROUD 24 AND VERY ACTIVE MEMBER OF THE BAY AREA HOUSING FOR ALL 25 COALITION. AND WHILE I HAVE ONLY BEEN WITH THEM FOR SIX

MONTHS, I HAVE BEEN HUSTLING FOR THIS BOND FOR BAHFA FOR 1 2 YEARS, SO I AM SO STOKED TO BE HERE WITH ALL OF YOU, AND I 3 WANT TO THANK YOU ALL FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP AND FOR YOUR WISDOM AND YOUR COURAGE ON THE VOTES THIS EVENING. THE BAY AREA HOUSING FOR ALL COALITION. THE HAF STRONGLY URGES 1 YOU TO KEEP THE MEASURE MOVING FORWARD TODAY, AND PART OF THAT 2 BEING SUPPORTING LABOR STANDARDS PROPOSED TODAY BY BAHFA 3 STAFF.
