



Adobe Acrobat Reader

Finding Words

You can use the Find command to find a complete word or part of a word in the current PDF document. Acrobat Reader looks for the word by reading every word on every page in the file, including text in form fields.

To find a word using the Find command:

- 1. Click the Find button (**Binoculars**), or choose Edit > Find.
- 2. Enter the text to find in the text box.
- 3. Select search options if necessary:

 Match Whole Word Only finds only occurrences of the complete word you enter in the box. For example, if you search for the word *stick*, the words *tick* and *sticky* will not be highlighted.

Match Case finds only words that contain exactly the same capitalization you enter in the box.

Find Backwards starts the search from the current page and goes backwards through the document.

4. Click Find. Acrobat Reader finds the next occurrence of the word.

To find the next occurrence of the word, Do one of the following:

Choose Edit > Find Again Reopen the find dialog box, and click Find Again. (The word must already be in the Find text box.)

Copying and pasting text and graphics to another application

You can select text or a graphic in a PDF document, copy it to the Clipboard, and paste it into another application such as a word processor. You can also paste text into a PDF document note or into a bookmark. Once the selected text or graphic is on the Clipboard, you can switch to another application and paste it into another document.

Note: If a font copied from a PDF document is not available on the system displaying the copied text, the font cannot be preserved. A default font is substituted.



To select and copy it to the clipboard:

1. Select the text tool T, and do one of the following: To select a line of text, select the first letter of the sentence or phrase and drag to the last letter.

To select multiple columns of text (horizontally), hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option (Mac OS) as you drag across the width of the document.

To select a column of text (vertically), Hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option+Command (Mac OS) as you drag the length of the document.

To select all the text on the page, choose Edit > Select All. In single page mode, all the text on the current page is selected. In Continuous or Continuous – facing mode, most of the text in the document is selected. When you release the mouse button, the selected text is highlighted. To deselect the text and start over, click anywhere outside the selected text. The Select All command will not select all the text in the document. A workaround for this (Windows) is to use the Edit > Copy command. Choose Edit > Copy to copy the selected text to the clipboard.

2. To view the text, choose Window > Show Clipboard

In Windows 95, the Clipboard Viewer is not installed by default and you cannot use the Show Clipboard command until it is installed. To install the Clipboard Viewer, Choose Start > Settings > Control Panel > Add/Remove Programs, and then click the Windows Setup tab. Double-click Accessories, check Clipboard Viewer, and click OK.

- 1 PANDEMIC CONTINUES TO UNFOLD. LET ME START FIRST WITH AN
- 2 IMPORTANT OBSERVATION THAT THE TRANSIT OPERATORS HAVE BEEN
- 3 COMMITTED TO TACKLING THE SAFETY NEEDS OF THEIR EMPLOYEES AND
- 4 RIDERS SINCE THE BEGINNING OF THE PANDEMIC. SINCE DAY ONE,
- 5 THERE HAS BEEN CRITICAL ATTENTION TO THIS. AND THE OPERATORS
- 6 HAVE SHOWN AN EXTRAORDINARY COMMITMENT TO ADDRESS THE
- 7 CHALLENGES TO PUBLIC SAFETY ACROSS OUR REGION. AND TO THEIR
- 8 CREDIT, THEY ESTABLISHED A WORKING GROUP AND THAT GROUP HAS
- 9 BEEN WORKING WITH MTC STAFF AND THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE
- 10 ONCE THAT -- WE HAD HIGHLIGHTED AND DAYLIGHTED THE IMPORTANCE
- 11 OF THIS SUBJECT IN THAT FORUM. SO THE TASK FORCE RECEIVED A
- 12 PRESENTATION, THIS LAST MONDAY, BY THE PUBLIC TRANSIT
- 13 OPERATORS. THOUGH RIDING TOGETHER BAY AREA HEALTHY TRANSIT
- 14 PLAN. AND THAT PLAN ESTABLISHING COMMON HEALTH AND SAFETY
- 15 COMMITMENTS FOR EMPLOYEES AND PASSENGERS INCLUDING THOSE THAT
- 16 RIDE MULTIPLE SYSTEMS. PLAN HIGHLIGHTS ESSENTIAL PARTNERSHIPS
- 17 WITH THE REGION'S TRANSIT CUSTOMERS TO WORK TOGETHER TO
- 18 MINIMIZE A TRANSITION OF COVID-19. AND IMPORTANTLY TRANSIT
- 19 OPERATORS HAVE COMMITTED TO IMPLEMENTING THE PLAN INDIVIDUALLY
- 20 AND COLLECTIVELY WITH AN EYE TO CONTINUALLY IMPROVING AND
- 21 ADJUSTING TO CHANGING CIRCUMSTANCES AND OPPORTUNITIES DURING
- 22 THIS UNPRECEDENTED CRISIS, AND I THINK WE CAN ALL APPRECIATE
- 23 HOW WE DO NOT KNOW HOW THE PANDEMIC IS GOING TO UNFOLD GOING
- 24 FORWARD, AND WE'RE ALL WORKING TOGETHER TO RESPOND TO
- 25 CIRCUMSTANCES AS THEY PRESENT THEMSELVES. THE FOLLOWING STEPS



- 1 THAT EMERGED FROM -- OR ARE CLOSELY RELATED TO THE TASK FORCE
- 2 INPUT AND RECOMMENDATION ARE AS FOLLOWING. RIDING TOGETHER BAY
- 3 AREA HEALTHY TRANSIT PLAN WHICH I'LL REFER TO NOW AS "THE
- 4 PLAN" WILL BE REFERRED PUBLICLY IN THE NEXT 30 DAYS AND
- 5 ACCOMPANIED BY A COMPANION COMMUNICATION CAMPAIGN LED BY MTC
- 6 AND THIS CAMPAIGN WILL SUPPORT THE COORDINATED INDIVIDUAL
- 7 AGENCY COMMUNICATION AND INFORMATION EFFORTS THAT THEY ALSO
- 8 HAVE, FOR THEIR SYSTEM. MTC REQUESTS THAT THE TRANSIT
- 9 OPERATORS PRESENT TO THEIR GOVERNING BOARDS AND SUBMIT TO THE
- 10 COMMISSION A RESOLUTION THAT COMMITS EACH AGENCY TO
- 11 IMPLEMENTING THE RIDING TOGETHER BAY AREA HEALTHY TRANSIT
- 12 PLAN. AND CONSISTENT WITH THE PLAN'S HEALTH AND SAFETY COMMON
- 13 COMMITMENT, A SET OF PUBLIC TRANSIT BASELINE HEALTH CONDITIONS
- 14 WILL BE OUTLINED IN A DASHBOARD FOR PUBLIC ACCESS AND
- 15 INFORMATION. AND THIS WILL BE AVAILABLE TO THE COMMISSION AT
- 16 ITS AUGUST MEETING. AT THE AUGUST MEETING, WE WILL SEE THE
- 17 BASELINE METRICS THAT WILL BE TRACKED, AND AT THAT TIME IT
- 18 WILL BE ACCOMPANIED BY A FRAMEWORK FOR HOW THOSE METRICS WILL
- 19 BE MEASURED AND REGULARLY REPORTED TO BE TRACKED AND REPORTED
- 20 TO THE COMMISSION IN SUBSEQUENT MEETINGS AND THAT WILL BE DONE
- 21 ON A MONTHLY BASIS. SO, JUST WANTED TO MAKE SURE THAT THE FULL
- 22 COMMISSION WAS AWARE OF THE SIGNIFICANT WORK THAT HAS BEEN
- 23 ACCOMPLISHED TO DATE, A LOT MORE GOING FORWARD, BUT AS CHAIR
- 24 SPERING -- COMMISSIONER SPERING, WHO IS THE CHAIR OF THE BLUE
- 25 RIBBON TASK FORCE HAD SPECIFICALLY REQUESTED THAT I OUTLINE



- 1 STATUS TO YOU TODAY. LET ME GO ON TO CLIPPER START, ANOTHER
- 2 REALLY SIGNIFICANT AND IMPORTANT PROGRAM. THE NEW CLIPPER
- 3 START IS A MEANS-BASED FARE PILOT. IT WAS REFERRED TO DURING
- 4 OUR BAIFA PRESENTATION EARLIER TODAY. AND IT ALLOWS LOWER
- 5 INCOME ADULTS AGED 19 TO 64 TO RECEIVE LARGE FARE DISCOUNTS ON
- 6 SELECT TRANSIT SERVICES AROUND THE REGION, AND IT WAS LAUNCHED
- 7 ON WEDNESDAY JULY 15TH. NOW, AGAIN, THIS IS A PILOT, AND THERE
- 8 IS FOUR AGENCIES THAT ARE CURRENTLY INVOLVED. MUNI, CALTRAIN,
- 9 SELECT SCHOOLS, TRANSIT AND FERRY GROUPS AND BART. THIS IS A
- 10 PILOT PROGRAM INITIATED BY THE BAY AREA TRANSIT AGENCIES AND
- 11 MTC THAT USES THE CLIPPER FARE PAYMENT SYSTEM AS A BASIS FOR
- 12 PUTTING FORWARD IN CONVEYANCE OF DISCOUNTS AND IT'S CRITICAL
- 13 BECAUSE IT'S COMING AT A TIME WHEN SOME OF OUR MOST VULNERABLE
- 14 RIDERS ON OUR SYSTEM ARE FACING IMPACTS FROM THE ECONOMIC
- 15 COVID CLIMATE WHICH WE ALL KNOW AND APPRECIATE. MTC HAS
- 16 RECENTLY ENGAGED 17 ADDITIONAL TRANSIT OPERATORS ON THE TOPIC
- 17 OF JOINING THE PROGRAM. AND WE WILL BE UPDATING THE COMMISSION
- 18 ON THAT PROGRESS OVER THE NEXT COUPLE OF MONTHS. SO, A MAJOR

- 2 OVERSEEING IT LOCALLY. AND MAKING SURE OUR TRANSIT AGENCIES
- 3 ARE DOING THE RIGHT THING. I WANT TO BE CLEAR I'M NOT SAYING
- 4 THEY'RE NOT DOING THE RIGHT THING. I WANT TO BE CLEAR, I KNOW
- 5 OUR TRANSIT OPERATORS ARE VERY INTERESTED IN MAKING SURE THEIR
- 6 BUSSES AND TRAINS AND FERRIES ARE SAVE SO THEY CAN GET THEIR
- 7 PASSENGERS BACK. I UNDERSTAND THAT'S THEIR GOAL AND I SHARE
- 8 THAT GOAL WITH THEM BUT I CERTAINLY WOULD LIKE TO SEE THE
- 9 MOTION INCLUDE THE REPORTING BACK MONTHLY TO MTC AND I THINK
- 10 WE HAVE SOME REALLY, REALLY BRIGHT STAFF PEOPLE AT MTC AND
- 11 THEY CAN PUT TOGETHER SOMETHING THAT TRANSIT AGENCIES CAN FILL
- 12 OUT AND THEN ALSO I -- IF THEY'RE SPENDING ALREADY TWO PERCENT
- 13 ON PPE THEN WHY CAN'T WE REQUIRE T BUT I'LL LISTEN TO MY
- 14 FELLOW COMMISSIONERS ON THAT. WITH THAT I'M GOING TO GO TO
- 15 GINA PAPAN NOW.

- 17 GINA PAPAN: THANK YOU MR. CHAIR. I AGREE WITH THE COMMENTS OF
- 18 THE CHAIR. TESTIMONY TODAY SHOWS OTHERWISE. AND THAT'S DEEPLY
- 19 CONCERNING TO MYSELF A COMMISSIONER AND ALSO A MEMBER OF THE
- 20 BLUE RIBBON RECOVERY TASK FORCE. WE'RE BEING TOLD ONE THING BY
- 21 THE PROVIDERS AND THEIR UNIFORM STANDARDS AND YET WE'RE NOT
- 22 GETTING THE ASSURANCES AND OBVIOUSLY THE OPERATORS, THE
- 23 EMPLOYEES, AND THE PUBLIC STILL ARE FACING GRAVE RISKS,
- 24 IMMEDIATELY. SO, I HAVE ASKED, DURING THE COMMISSION, THE TASK
- 25 FORCE, THAT WE GET MORE THAN A COMMITMENT, WHAT IS HAPPENING



- 1 RIGHT NOW. SO I AGREE WITH THE CHAIR THAT WE NEED TO KNOW
- 2 THAT, AND WE NEED TO KNOW HOW THEY ARE PROGRESSING AND WE
- 3 SHOULD BE IMPLEMENTING MONTHLY REQUIREMENTS ARE IS ALMOST TOO
- 4 LATE AT THIS POINT. WE NEED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE REQUIREMENTS
- 5 ALONG THESE LINES AND FOR ONE CLARIFICATION, I DON'T THINK WE
- 6 WERE STRIKING ONE SENTENCE OF THIS, I THINK IT ONLY RELATED AS
- 7 THE MOTION GOES TO FUTURE FUNDING AND I WOULD LIKE
- 8 CLARIFICATION LATER. THANK YOU SIR.

- 10 SAM LICCARDO: THAT WAS ALSO MY UNDERSTANDING COMMISSIONER WELL
- 11 I LICCARDO.

- 13 SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: THANK YOU. WE'LL GET A REVOTE
- 14 COMMISSIONER LICCARDO AND COMMISSIONER PAPAN. I'M NOW GOING TO
- 15 GO TO COMMISSIONER SPERING.

- 17 JAMES P. SPERING: THANK YOU MR. CHAIRMAN. I JUST WANT TO
- 18 REMIND EVERYONE, THE BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE, THE MAIN FOCUS WAS
- 19 FORUM SO THERE WAS AN ESSENTIAL CLEARING HOUSE THAT COULD DEAL
- 20 WITH AND ADDRESS SOME OF THESE ISSUES. ONE THING THAT IS
- 21 ABSENT IN ALL OF THIS DISCUSSION AND EVEN AT THE BLUE RIBBON
- 22 COMMITTEE IS WE'RE DEALING WITH THE GENERAL MANAGERS OR
- 23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS AT WHAT POINT ARE THE ELECTED BOARDS OF
- 24 THESE TRANSIT AGENCIES BEING HELD RESPONSIBLE? ALL THE
- 25 COMMENTS AT OUR BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE WE'RE HEARING AND ALL



- 1 COMMENTS WE'RE HERE RIGHT NOW AT MTC THEY NEED TO BE PRESENTED
- 2 TO EACH ONE OF THOSE ELECTED BOARDS AND THEY NEED TO ANSWER
- 3 THOSE QUESTIONS. ARE THEY DOING THIS? WHY AREN'T THEY DOING IT
- 4 AND THEN HAVE THAT RESPONSE. I THINK IT'S FOOLISH TO THINK
- 5 THAT, YOU KNOW, THOSE ARE COMPLETELY AUTONOMOUS ISSUES, THE
- 6 CARES MONEY WAS NOT SENT TO MTC TO CONDITION IT, OR TO HOLD IT
- 7 HOSTAGE, IT WAS TO GET IT OUT TO THE TRANSIT OPERATORS SO THAT
- 8 THEY COULD CONTINUE TO OPERATE, AND YOU KNOW, THE MORE MONEY,
- 9 AND THE MORE DELAY THAT, YOU KNOW, THAT WE KEEP FIDDLING
- 10 AROUND WITH, YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE MORE PEOPLE LAID OFF, PEOPLE
- 11 LOSING THEIR JOBS TRANSIT OPERATORS AREN'T GOING TO BE ABLE TO
- 12 MOVE FORWARD. YOU KNOW, THE IMPRESSION THAT THE TRANSIT
- 13 OPERATORS ARE NOT DOING ANYTHING UNTIL THEY REPORT BACK TO US,
- 14 IT'S JUST NOT CORRECT. I MEAN, THEY ARE DOING, YOU KNOW,
- 15 THEY'RE DOING A LOT OF THE BASELINE WORK WE HAVE ASKED FOR. WE
- 16 HAVE ASKED FOR THEM TO COORDINATE AND COMMUNICATE WITH EACH
- 17 OTHER IN THE SMALL, LARGE TRANSIT OPERATORS, THEY'RE ALL DOING
- 18 THAT. YOU KNOW, AT SOME POINT, THOSE DIRECTLY ELECTED BOARDS
- 19 AND IF THERE EVER IS AN ARGUMENT FOR CONSOLIDATION THIS IS IT.
- 20 BUT THEY HAVE TO BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE AND AT SOME POINT THEY
- 21 HAVE TO WEIGH IN ON THIS WE'RE HEARING FROM THE UNION LEADERS
- 22 WHAT IS THE BART BOARD SAYING ABOUT PROTECTING. WHAT IS AC
- 23 TRANSIT AND SOLTRANS SAYING? WE NEED TO HEAR FROM THOSE
- 24 BOARDS. AND IT'S REALLY UNFAIR TO PLACE THIS WHOLE BURDEN ON
- 25 MTC AND THE BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE WHICH HAS NO AUTHORITY. NONE



- 1 AT ALL. AND SO, I WOULD CERTAINLY HOPE THAT, YOU KNOW, WE GET
- 2 A MUCH HIGHER LEVEL OF COOPERATION WORKING TOGETHER,
- 3 TREMENDOUS STRIDES HAVE BEEN MADE. WE'RE SEEING COOPERATION
- 4 AND COORDINATION THAT WE HAVEN'T SEEN, SOME OF THIS HISTORIC.
- 5 BUT HEALTH AND SAFETY SAY HIGH PRIORITY FOR EVERYBODY. IF
- 6 THEY'RE NOT GOING TO PUT HAND SANITIZER ON THESE VEHICLES,
- 7 THEN TELL US WHY. BUT FOR US TO REQUIRE IT, NOT KNOWING WHY
- 8 IT'S NOT POSSIBLE OR NOT FEASIBLE, IT JUST DOESN'T MAKE SENSE.
- 9 AND SO, MR. CHAIRMAN, YOU KNOW, ON MONEY WE'RE ALLOCATING A
- 10 PERCENTAGE IS GOING TO HELP WITH SAFETY OPERATIONS WHAT
- 11 PERCENTAGE IS I DON'T KNOW, TO HAVE THEM REPORT BACK WOULD BE
- 12 GOOD TRANSIT OPERATORS HAVE AGREED TO REPORT TO MTC ON A
- 13 MONTHLY BASIS SO WE'RE REALLY PUSHING THE ENVELOPE. IT'S
- 14 PROBABLY NOT GOING AS FAST AS EVERYONE WOULD LIKE, BUT IT
- 15 REALLY IS A LOT HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED. AND YOU KNOW, A LOT OF
- 16 THE ISSUES THAT ARE BEING RAISED WITH THE TRANSIT EMPLOYEES, I
- 17 THINK ARE VERY VALID, AND THEY NEED TO BE ADDRESSED BUT THE
- 18 TRANSIT BOARDS HAVE TO BE ACCOUNTABLE FOR SOME OF THE
- 19 QUESTIONS BEING ASKED. MTC CAN'T TELL ANY TRANSIT OPERATOR
- 20 WHAT THEY'RE GOING TO DO. WE DON'T HAVE THAT AUTHORITY. MR.
- 21 CHAIR I JUST WANT TO CLARIFY THAT BOTH BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE
- 22 AND MTC ARE DOING AS MUCH AS WE CAN. WE'RE BRINGING AS MUCH OF
- 23 THIS TO THE FOREFRONT AND YOU KNOW, MAKING SURE THESE
- 24 DISCUSSIONS ARE DONE IN THE SUNSHINE, AND YOU KNOW, I THINK
- 25 THE TRANSIT OPERATORS, I HOPE THE TRANSIT BOARDS ARE HEARING



- 1 WHAT IS BEING SAID. BUT THERE HAS TO BE SOME ACCOUNTABILITY ON
- 2 THE PART OF THOSE BOARDS. THANK YOU MR. CHAIRMAN.

- 4 SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: THANK YOU MR. CHAIRMAN OF THE BLUE
- 5 RIBBON COMMITTEE. AND I WOULD JUST LIKE TO SAY THAT, YOU KNOW,
- 6 AT THE LAST BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE MEETING I DID TALK ABOUT
- 7 THESE TRANSIT BOARDS PASSING RESOLUTIONS OF, YOU KNOW, HOW

- 11 VOTE HIS WAY HE'S GOING TO MAKE SURE WE DON'T GET VOTED FOR,
- 12 WELL YOU KNOW WHAT, THERE IS ELECTED TRANSIT MEMBERS WHO ARE
- 13 RUN BEING THESE THINGS YET IT'S EASY TO CALL UP AND THREATEN
- 14 UP. HE DOESN'T HAVE TO VOTE. I DON'T CARE.

- 16 JAMES P. SPERING: THERESE MCMILLAN SAID SHE SUPPORTS. THAT'S A
- 17 GOOD SUGGESTION AND WE'RE NOT WAITING UNTIL THE SEPTEMBER
- 18 MEETING ON THOSE THEE ISSUES.

19

- 20 SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: OKAY KEEP IN MIND WE'RE WORKING IN
- 21 AUGUST TOO. DUTRA-VERNACI?

- 23 CAROL DUTRA-VERNACI: THANK YOU. FIRST OF ALL SINCE I WAS NOT A
- 24 MEMBER OF THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE I WANT TO THANK EACH AND
- 25 EVERY ONE OF YOU FOR ALL YOUR HARD WORK DONE ALONG THESE LINES



- 1 AND SPEAKING IN SUPPORT OF SPERING, HE HIT THE NAIL ON THE
- 2 HEAD IT'S THE AGENCIES THAT NEED TO BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE AND
- 3 WITH THE NUMBER OF SPEAKERS WE HEARD FROM TODAY I AM SURE ALL
- 4 OF US COMMISSIONERS, AS I RECEIVED INNUMEROUS E-MAILS NOT JUST
- 5 FROM THE TRANSIT AGENCY WORKERS BUT RIDERS, PLEADING FOR THE
- 6 MASKS AND SANITIZER. SO, I'M CERTAINLY IN SUPPORT OF DOING
- 7 EVERYTHING WE CAN AS QUICKLY AS WE CAN TO MAKE SURE THAT THAT
- 8 MONEY IS BEING USED APPROPRIATELY FOR THOSE MEASURES AND NOT
- 9 JUST FOR THE PROVIDERS OR THE TRAIN OPERATORS, BUT I THINK
- 10 ALSO THE RIDING PUBLIC AS WELL, BECAUSE WITH THIS PANDEMIC
- 11 CONTINUING TO SPIRAL UPWARDS IT'S THE RIDERS WHO ARE GETTING
- 12 ON WITHOUT EQUIPMENT AND WHAT HAVE YOU THEN IF WE, IF THERE IS
- 13 THE CAPABILITY THEY SHOULD BE HANDED MASKS AS WELL TO PROTECT
- 14 EVERYONE FROM EACH OTHER. SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THE
- 15 OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK.

- 7 THAT'S HOW I REMEMBER.

- 9 SAM LICCARDO: YES. INCLUDING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING TO EXISTING
- 10 FEDERAL PROGRAMS IT'S NOT JUST MONEY WITH A NEW ACRONYM ON THE
- 11 BILL. THAT IS IF THERE IS SUPPLEMENTAL CMAQ MONEY, THAT THAT
- 12 WOULD BE FUNDING THAT COULD BE CONSIDERED. IS AGAIN IT WOULD
- 13 ALL BE SUBJECT TO.

15 **SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR:** VICE CHAIR PEDROZA?

- 17 ALFREDO PEDROZA, VICE CHAIR: THANK YOU MR. CHAIR. I'LL COMMENT
- 18 ON THE PPE AND EMPLOYEE SAFETY IS RIDERSHIP SAFETY. WAY I LOOK

- 23 TO LOOK AT IT FROM A REGIONAL PERSPECTIVE. I SUPPORT THE
- 24 ACCOUNTABILITY REPORTING AND OVERSIGHT I FEEL THAT'S THE SPACE
- 25 MTC SHOULD BE PARTICIPATING IN BUT WE SHOULD BE EMPOWERING



- 1 LOCAL OPERATORS TO ENSURE THEY'RE DOING AS MUCH AS THEY CAN.
- 2 WHAT THEY DO IN NAPA MAY BE DIFFERENT BUT IT'S ABOUT RESTORING
- 3 RIDERSHIP CONFIDENCE. I THINK OPERATORS ARE GOING TO TAKE IT
- 4 UPON THEMSELVES TO MAKE SURE THEY'RE INVESTING IN HAVING SAFE
- 5 SYSTEMS SO AGAIN I SUPPORT THE DIRECTION OF HAVING
- 6 ACCOUNTABILITY, HAVING REPORTING OUT TO MTC IN A VERY
- 7 TRANSPARENT WAY, AND THEN WE ACT BASED OFF THAT INFORMATION IF
- 8 WE'RE SEEING ANY GAPS BUT I DO THINK WE NEED TO DEPLOY THE

- 6 AMY R. WORTH: I'LL BE BRIEF FIRST I WANT TO CONCUR WITH
- 7 COMMISSIONER SPERING AND COMMISSIONER PEDROZA'S COMMENTS. I
- 8 ALSO BELIEVE THAT PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY FOR OUR OPERATORS
- 9 AND RIDERS, OUR DRIVERS, OUR WORKERS ARE EXTREMELY IMPORTANT
- 10 IT'S THE MOST IMPORTANT THING WE'RE DOING. AND SO SERVING ON A
- 11 TRANSIT BOARD, I CAN AFFIRM THAT THESE ISSUES ARE EXTREMELY
- 12 IMPORTANT TO OUR BOARD AND IN FACT WE NORMALLY ARE TAKING A
- 13 BREAK IN AUGUST, AND WE HAVE -- WE HAVE SCHEDULED A MEETING SO
- 14 THAT WE CAN DO THE KIND OF ADOPTION THAT THIS COMMISSION AND
- 15 THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE ARE TALKING ABOUT IN TERMS OF A
- 16 RESOLUTION, IN TERMS OF AFFIRMATION OF THE HEALTH AND SAFETY
- 17 PROTOCOLS THAT WILL BE PUT IN PLACE. I ALSO CONCUR WITH THE
- 18 MOTION WITH REGARDS TO THE TRUE UP. BUT I DO THINK IT'S
- 19 IMPORTANT TO RECOGNIZE THIS IS THE INTENTION OF THIS IS NEW,
- 20 NEW MONEY THIS IT'S NOT ANYTHING OTHER THAN THAT. SO, AND I
- 21 THINK THAT'S THE SPIRIT IN WHICH THIS HAS BEEN CONVEYED TO ME.

- 4 COM. NICK JOSEFEWITZ: I HAVE TO UNMUTE MYSELF BEFORE I DO
- 5 THAT. SO I THINK I PROBABLY RASHLY STRUCK THAT LAST SENTENCE.
- 6 SPIRIT OF THE AMENDMENT THAT MAYOR LICCARDO HAS CLARIFIED
- 7 WORKS FINE. IT'S WHAT WORKS WELL FOR ME, AND FOR -- BECAUSE

- 12 THE STATUS OF THE OPERATORS PPE, ON THE STATUS OF HOW THE
