3	SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: MY SUGGESTION IS YOU MAY WANT TO ADD
4	THAT COMPENSATION ANNOUNCEMENT TO THE ADMONISHMENT OF COVID
5	AND IT ROLLS RIGHT IN. JUST MY THOUGHT. WE HAVE A CONFIRMED
6	QUORUM WE'RE NOW GOING TO MOVE TO ITEM TWO, WHICH IS THE CHAIR
7	REPORT, WHICH IS THE BLUE RECOVERY WHOO I'LL TALK ABOUT IS
8	THE BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT TASK FORCE HEALTHY TRANSIT PLAN
9	UPDATE. GIVEN THE COMMISSION'S DISCUSSION LAST MONTH ON THE
10	TRANSIT OPERATORS EFFORT TO COORDINATE ON THE HEALTHY TRANSIT
11	PLAN I ASKED STAFF TO PROVIDE AN UPDATE TO THE COMMISSION
12	TODAY THIS IS AN ACTION ITEM AS IT'S IMPORTANT FOR STAFF TO
13	GIVE DIRECTION ON NEXT STEPS AND MTC'S ROLES. I WOULD LIKE TO
14	TURN IT OVER TO OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR THERESE MCMILLAN TO
15	GIVE THE UP WITH DATE ON THE WORK OF MTC TRANSIT STAFF OVER
16	THE LAST MONTH AND THE ROLE OF MTC GOING FORWARD.

18	THERESE MCMILLAN: THANK YOU MR. CHAIR, AND GOOD MORNING
19	COMMISSIONERS. I'M GOING TO TAKE MYSELF OFF VIDEO GIVEN IT
20	SEEMS TO BE RUNNING WITH BANDWIDTH CHALLENGES.
21	
22	SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: THAT'S OKAY. YOUR VIDEO WASN'T WORKING
23	ANYWAYS.



- 1 THERESE MCMILLAN: WELL THERE WE GO. NOW YOUR -- AS YOU
- 2 MENTIONED, IN JULY, I HAD PROVIDED A STATUS REPORT ON A
- 3 CRITICAL ELEMENT OF THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE, WHICH WAS
- 4 ONGOING DETERMINE THE OF THE PUBLIC TRANSIT OPERATORS, WRITING
- 5 TOGETHER BAY AREA HEALTHY TRANSIT PLAN. THAT HEALTHY TRANSIT
- 6 PLAN WAS COMPLETED WAS PUBLICLY RELEASED ON AUGUST 18TH AND IS
- 7 INCLUDED AS ATTACHMENT A IN MY REPORT. I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT
- 8 TO NOTE, STARTING OUT, THAT THE PLAN IS BUILT AROUND U.S. AND
- 9 INTERNATIONAL HEALTH AGENCY GUIDANCE BY HEALTH AGENCY EXPERTS
- 10 FROM THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH, U.S. CENTERS
- 11 FOR DISEASE CONTROL, AND PREVENTION, AND THE WORLD HEALTH
- 12 ORGANIZATION, AS WELL AS THE TRANSIT AGENCY'S OWN COORDINATION
- 13 EFFORTS WITH BAY AREA PUBLIC HEALTH REPRESENTATIVES. AND IT'S
- 14 ON THIS FOUNDATION, THAT THE PLAN ESTABLISHES THE OPERATORS
- 15 COMMON HEALTH AND SAFETY COMMITMENTS FOR BOTH TRANSIT
- 16 EMPLOYEES AND TRANSIT PASSENGERS. VERY IMPORTANTLY, WE HAVE
- 17 COMMITTED TO IMPLEMENTING THE PLAN INDIVIDUALLY AND
- 18 COLLECTIVELY, WITH AN EYE TO CONTINUALLY IMPROVING AND
- 19 ADJUSTING TO THE CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE PANDEMIC, WHICH ARE
- 20 CHANGING ALL THE TIME, THEREFORE THIS HAS TO CHANGE AS WELL. I
- 21 JUST NOTE THEY HAVE ASKED SPECIFICALLY, IN A REQUEST THAT EACH
- 22 TRANSIT AGENCY BOARD APPROVE A RESOLUTION ENDORSING THE
- 23 HEALTHY TRANSIT PLAN, THE TEMPLATE WAS ATTACHED AS ATTACHMENT
- 24 B, AND I AM ANTICIPATING THAT THE AGENCIES WILL ADOPT SUCH
- 25 RESOLUTIONS TO IMPLEMENT THE PLAN BY THE END OF SEPTEMBER. I



- 1 WOULD ALSO NOTE, IMPORTANTLY, THAT A BAY AREA WIDE PUBLIC
- 2 COMMUNICATIONS EFFORT WAS LAUNCHED ALONGSIDE THE PLAN'S
- 3 RELEASE AT A PRESS EVENT ON AUGUST 19TH. CHAIR OF THE BLUE
- 4 RIBBON TRANSIT RECOVERY TASK FORCE, SPERING WAS PRESENT AT
- 5 THAT EVENT, AND MTC WILL BE PROVIDING ONGOING SUPPORT TO
- 6 OPERATOR IN THAT SITUATION. -- EXCUSE ME, WITH THAT
- 7 COMMUNICATION'S PLAN. NOW WE ALSO NOTE THAT SOME MEMBERS OF
- 8 THE BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT RECOVERY TASK FORCE AND THE PUBLIC
- 9 HAVE URGED MTC TO ENSURE AND OVERSEE A LIST OF SPECIFIC HEALTH
- 10 STANDARDS, THAT THEY HAVE OUTLINED AS WELL AS LABOR
- 11 STIPULATIONS, TO -- THAT THEY RECOMMEND BE INCLUDED IN THE
- 12 HEALTHY PLAN, AND ATTACHMENT C TO THIS REPORT, INCLUDED THAT
- 13 CORRESPONDENCE. TO DO SO WOULD EXTEND THE COMMISSION BEYOND
- 14 ITS EXPERTISE AND AUTHORITY. I STRONGLY RECOMMEND AGAINST
- 15 TAKING THAT RESPONSIBILITY RATHER I RECOMMEND AND SUPPORT
- 16 MTC'S ROLE AS A PARTNERSHIP ALONGSIDE, AND COMPLIMENTING THE
- 17 REGION'S TRANSIT AGENCY POLICY BOARDS, PUBLIC HEALTH
- 18 PROFESSIONALS IN THE REGION, AND OTHER KEY STAKEHOLDER GROUPS.
- 19 I DO WANT TO EMPHASIZE, HOWEVER, IN CONCLUSION, THAT MTC WILL
- 20 CONTINUE TO PLAY A COORDINATION AND SUPPORTING ROLE TO BETTER
- 21 BENEFIT OUR TRANSIT PARTNERS DURING THIS CRISIS, IT'S EXTENDED
- 22 FURTHER THAN ANY OF US ANTICIPATED. TO THAT END, OUR ROLE IN
- 23 THE COMING MONTH, BEYOND THE POINTS THAT I IDENTIFIED BEFORE,
- 24 WILL BE, AGAIN, THE RESOLUTIONS THAT WE'LL BE COLLECTING,
- 25 PUBLICLY ACCESSIBLE HEALTH INFORMATION THAT IS PART OF THE



- 1 HEALTHY TRANSIT PLAN WILL BE PRESENTED AS A DASHBOARD,
- 2 INFORMATION ON THAT WAS ALSO INCLUDED IN THIS REPORT. THERE
- 3 WILL BE A ONE STOP LINK ON OUR WEB SITE TO THE TRANSIT
- 4 OPERATORS HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORTING DASHBOARD UNDER
- 5 DEVELOPMENT AND WE WILL BE ACTIVELY CONTRIBUTING TO SAFETY
- 6 MESSAGING AS RIDERS RETURN TO THEIR JOBS AND OTHER ACTIVITIES,
- 7 WHICH HAS AND WILL BE TRACKED WITH STATE AND LOCAL DIRECTORS
- 8 ON LIFTING SHELTER-IN-PLACE. WE ALSO FINALLY ARE AGGRESSIVELY
- 9 ADVOCATING FOR ADDITIONAL PUBLIC TRANSIT FUNDING AT THE
- 10 FEDERAL AND STATE LEVEL AND THAT WILL CONTINUE TO BE AN
- 11 IMPORTANT ROLE THAT MTC WILL LEAD. WITH THAT, MR. CHAIR, THAT
- 12 CONCLUSION MY REPORT AND I'LL TURN IT BACK OVER TO YOU.
- 14 SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: THANKS THERESE. I APPRECIATE THE
- 15 REPORT. I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE CHAIR SPERING THE OPPORTUNITY,
- 16 HE'S CHAIR OF THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE. WHICH BY THE WAY,
- 17 I'M SUPER PROUD OF. I THINK THEY ARE DOING GREAT WORK IT'S A
- 18 COLLABORATION. IT SEEMS TO ME IN MY OPINION EVERYBODY'S AT THE
- 19 TABLE AND I AM PLEASED WITH THE WAY CHAIR SPERING IS OPERATING
- 20 THROUGH THE WATERS OF TRANSIT, IN THESE TIMES. SO GIVE HIM AN
- 21 OPPORTUNITY TO WEIGH IN, GIVEN THAT HEALTH AND SAFETY HAS BEEN
- 22 A REALLY IMPORTANT PART OF THE TASK FORCE DISCUSSIONS TODAY.
- 24 JAMES P. SPERING: THANK YOU SCOTT, MR. CHAIRMAN. YOU KNOW, AS
- 25 THERESE SAYS, AND YOU KNOW, I AGREE WITH WHAT SHE HAS LAID OUT

- 1 FOR DIRECTION FOR MTC, I THINK AS MOST OF YOU KNOW, A LOT OF
- 2 DISCUSSION ABOUT MTC SHOULD PLAY SOME OVERSIGHT ROLE, AND I'M
- 3 CERTAINLY NOT IN SUPPORT OF THAT, AND I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE
- 4 SOME OF THE REASONS. AS THERESE HAD MENTIONED, WE HAD THAT
- 5 TOGETHER BAY AREA HEALTHY TRANSIT PLAN ON AUGUST 19TH, THE
- 6 PRESS CONFERENCE MANY OF THE TRANSIT OPERATORS, EXECUTIVE
- 7 DIRECTOR SPOKE, VERY MEANINGFUL PRESENTATION, REALLY TALKED
- 8 ABOUT A LOT OF THINGS WE'RE DOING, JUST A TREMENDOUS STEP
- 9 FORWARD ON PROVIDING HEALTH AND SAFETY STANDARDS, YOU KNOW,
- 10 THROUGHOUT THE SYSTEM. AND, BUT THE ISSUE, FOR US, MTC, IS
- 11 THAT, FIRST MTC DOESN'T HAVE THE SKILL SET TO JUDGE ANY
- 12 ADEQUACY OF SAFETY AND HEALTH STANDARDS. I MEAN IT'S JUST NOT
- 13 SOMETHING THAT WE'RE FAMILIAR WITH, OR OUR STAFF REALLY DEALS
- 14 WITH, IN ANY DEPTH. MTC HAS NO DESIGNATED AUTHORITY, SO WHAT
- 15 IT REALLY WOULD DO IS PUT US IN A POSITION WHERE WE'RE ASKING
- 16 FOR SOMETHING, WHERE REALLY DON'T HAVE ANY AUTHORITY TO EITHER
- 17 ENFORCE IT OR REQUIRE IT. AND EVERY TRANSIT AGENCY, AS WE ALL
- 18 KNOW, HAVE POLICY BOARDS, BOTH ELECTED AND APPOINTED, AND
- 19 THEY'RE REALLY ACCOUNTABLE TO THEIR EMPLOYEES AND TO THE
- 20 PUBLIC, AND HOW THESE SAFETY PLANS ARE IMPLEMENTED. AND THEIR
- 21 EVALUATION OF THE TRANSIT AGENCIES, WELL, WE DON'T HAVE
- 22 AUTHORITY, REALLY UNDERMINES THE COLLABORATION AND
- 23 COORDINATION THAT WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO BUILD WITH THE TRANSIT
- 24 OPERATORS, AND MTC HAS, YOU KNOW, BEFORE, SOME LARGE
- 25 TRANSFORMATIVE PLANNING AHEAD, AND WE REALLY NEED TO HAVE THAT



- 1 STRONG WORKING RELATIONSHIP, AND A TRUST BETWEEN US AND THE
- 2 TRANSIT OPERATORS. AND MR. CHAIRMAN, THE OPERATORS ARE KEENLY
- 3 AWARE THAT THEY HAVE TO FIGHT THE HIGH PRIORITY UNDER THE
- 4 SAFETY AND HEALTH STANDARDS, THAT THEY KNOW THE RIDERS ARE NOT
- 5 GOING TO COME BACK IF THEY DON'T HAVE THAT SENSE EVER SECURITY
- 6 AND IT HAS TO BE THROUGHOUT THE SYSTEM IF YOU GET ON A BUS IN
- 7 SLOB -- SOLANO COUNTY THAT YOU TRANSFER IN THE VARIOUS
- 8 OPERATIONS, THAT YOU KNOW, IT'S GOING TO BE CONSISTENT. AND
- 9 THERE IS RECOURSE, FOR THE RIOTERS, AND THE RIOTERS AND
- 10 EMPLOYEES. BARGAINING AGREEMENTS, I THINK MOST OF YOU HAVE
- 11 SEEN THE LETTER WE GOT FROM TRANSFORM AND URBAN HABITAT AND
- 12 WAS SIGNED ON BY SEVERAL OF THE UNIONS THAT REPRESENT THE
- 13 TRANSIT OPERATORS, AND IT REALLY WOULD BE VERY INAPPROPRIATE
- 14 FOR MTC TO GET IN THE MIDDLE OF THOSE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING
- 15 DISCUSSIONS AND AGREEMENTS. SO WE HAVE CAL OSHA HAS REGULATORY
- 16 AUTHORITY TO INVESTIGATE ANY OF THE COMPLAINTS, INCLUDING
- 17 PUBLIC TRANSIT. RIDERS CAN GO DIRECTLY TO THE DESIGNATED
- 18 BOARDS, AND REALLY, I THINK, HOLD THEM RESPONSIBLE FOR THE
- 19 CONDITIONS OF THE, YOU KNOW, THE TRANSIT SYSTEM. AND IF ANY
- 20 AGENCY IS NOT RESPONSIVE INDIVIDUALS CAN CONTACT COUNTY HEALTH
- 21 OFFICERS AND CAL OSHA AND FILE A COMPLAINT. WE CAN HOLD MTC
- 22 DISCRETIONARY DOLLARS, IN THE EVENT THAT IF DEEMED AN
- 23 EFFECTIVE TODAY TO PROTECT TRANSIT RIDERS, IF THERE ARE THINGS
- 24 THAT MTC CAN CLEARLY IDENTIFY THAT REALLY NEEDS TO BE DONE.
- 25 AND, YOU KNOW, THERE REMAINS A LOT OF WORK AHEAD FOR THE BLUE



- 1 RIBBON COMMITTEE, WE HOPE TO DEVELOP A TRANSFORMATIVE PLAN AS
- 2 I MENTIONED FOR THE REGION'S PUBLIC TRANSIT SYSTEM, AND THE
- 3 TRANSIT OPERATORS ARE AN IMPORTANT PARTNER IN THAT DEVELOPMENT
- 4 OF THAT PLAN. AND MTC NEEDS TO PUT OUR ATTENTION, YOU KNOW,
- 5 WHERE OUR ROLE, AS A REGIONAL PLANNER, FUNDER, AND COORDINATOR
- 6 FOR PUBLIC THOUGHT IS USED. AS THERESE MENTIONED WE'RE REALLY
- 7 GOING TO PUT A STRONG EFFORT INTO RAISING REVENUE TO HELP WITH
- 8 THE TRANSIT OPERATIONS, AND WE REALLY SHOULDN'T BE INVOLVED IN
- 9 FURTHER DISCUSSIONS RELATED TO HEALTH AND SAFETY IN THE
- 10 FOREFRONT. IT REALLY IS JUST TAKING UP A LOT OF TIME IN ON AN
- 11 AREA WHERE WE REALLY DON'T HAVE A TRUE AUTHORITY. AND MR.
- 12 CHAIRMAN, WHAT I WOULD LIKE TO DO, IS WHEN IT'S APPROPRIATE, I
- 13 WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A MOTION AS TO WHAT MTC SHOULD DO, AND YOU
- 14 KNOW, WHEN THE TIME IS APPROPRIATE, OR YOU WANT TO HAVE A
- 15 MOTION I WOULD LIKE TO MAKE ONE.

- 17 SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: I WOULD ALLOW IT NOW. I MEAN, WE DO
- 18 HAVE SOME DISCUSSION, BUT I THINK FOR THE PEOPLE THAT WANT TO
- 19 SPEAK, IT'S IMPORTANT THAT THEY KNOW WHAT THEY'RE SPEAKING TO.
- 20 SO I'LL ALLOW THE MOTION NOW.

- 10 OF THE SPEAKERS. YOU KNOW, WE WANT TO CONTINUE WORKING WITH
- 11 YOU ON THESE ISSUES. AND THIS, IN MY COMMENTS AT THE PRESS
- 12 RELEASE, THIS IS A FIRST STEP. AND I THINK, YOU KNOW, AS ALETA
- 13 DUPREE, WHICH I APPRECIATE THE COMMENTS THERE, IS THAT THIS IS
- 14 A FIRST STEP. THIS PLAN IS GOING TO GET DEVELOPED. AND YOU
- 15 KNOW, THE SAFETY OF OUR EMPLOYEES IS NUMBER ONE. AND SO IT'S
- 16 JUST HOW WE'RE APPROACHING THIS. IT'S NOT WE'RE NOT HEARING
- 17 WHAT YOU'RE SAYING BECAUSE WE ARE HEARING WHAT YOU'RE SAYING
- 18 IT'S JUST HOW WE GET THERE. APPROACH I WAS PROPOSING IN
- 19 DISCUSSION WITH OUR STAFF AND OTHER COMMISSIONERS IS THAT WE
- 20 DO IT IN A COOPERATIVE WAY, WORKING WITH THE TRANSIT
- 21 OPERATORS, TO IMPLEMENT MANY OF THE THINGS THAT ARE BEING
- 22 ASKED FOR. AND YOU KNOW, THIS IS A LONG JOURNEY THAT WE'RE ON,
- 23 AND, YOU KNOW, THE TRANSIT OPERATORS UNDERSTAND THAT MANY OF
- 24 THESE THINGS HAVE TO BE IMPLEMENTED TO GET RIDERS BACK INTO
- 25 THEIR SYSTEM. SO, YOU KNOW, I SUPPORT THE MOTION THAT WAS



- 1 MADE. I'LL CERTAINLY CLARIFY T I WILL, AGAIN, MR. CHAIRMAN,
- 2 MANY OF THE COMMENTS, I AGREE WITH, BUT IT'S HOW DO WE
- 3 IMPLEMENT WHAT THEY'RE ASKING FOR, AND I WOULD PROPOSE THAT WE
- 4 DO IT MORE OF A COOPERATIVE PARTNERSHIP WAY WORKING WITH THE
- 5 TRANSIT OPERATORS TO GET MANY OF THESE STANDARDS IMPLEMENTED.
- 6 AND YOU KNOW AS I SAID, THIS REALLY IS A FIRST STEP. AND TO
- 7 JUST CONSTANTLY SAYING THAT PUBLIC TRANSIT ISN'T SAFE, THEY'RE
- 8 NOT DOING ANYTHING, IS REALLY COUNTERPRODUCTIVE TO US GETTING
- 9 THESE RIDERS BACK INTO THE SYSTEM. POSITIVE IS TO SAY THAT
- 10 WE'RE WORKING TOGETHER UNIFYING THESE STANDARDS, AND WHAT I
- 11 SAID IN MY COMMENTS NEEDS TO HAPPEN, IT'S GOT TO BE UNIFORM
- 12 FROM MY COUNTY TO SAN FRANCISCO, AND THAT IS THE GOAL. AND SO,
- 13 YOU KNOW, I DON'T WANT TO DISMISS THE COMMENTS THAT WE HAVE
- 14 HEARD. AND I WANT TO SAY THAT WE HAVE HEARD YOU, BUT WE HAVE
- 15 TO BE, YOU KNOW, REALISTIC ABOUT HOW WE CAN GO FORWARD. YOU
- 16 KNOW, IMPLEMENTING MANY OF THE THINGS THAT ARE BEING ASKED
- 17 FOR. AND SO, MR. CHAIRMAN, I JUST WANTED TO PUT IT IN THAT
- 18 CONTEXT IN MY MOTION, I AM NOT APPROVING ANY PLAN TODAY. THAT
- 19 IS NOT PART OF THE MOTION. AND SO, YOU KNOW JUST FOR CLARITY,
- 20 I REALLY WANT TO JUST IDENTIFY WHAT MTC'S ROLE IS, WHEN IT
- 21 COMES TO DEVELOPING HEALTH STANDARDS, WHICH IS REALLY, YOU
- 22 KNOW, OUT OF OUR LANE, SO TO SPEAK, AND BEING AN ENFORCEMENT.
- 23 WE DON'T HAVE ANY AUTHORITY. I WOULD IMAGINE, LIKE MR. LINDSAY
- 24 SAID, THEY DO HAVE A LOT OF AUTHORITY, BUT THAT COMES TO THOSE
- 25 TRANSIT AGENCY BOARDS, THAT'S WHERE IT NEEDS TO BE DIRECTED



- 1 AND IF WE NEED TO GO SHOULDER TO SHOULDER WITH THEM TO GO TO
- 2 THOSE BOARDS THEN WE NEED TO DO THAT. BUT PUT MTC IN THAT
- 3 POSITION, THIS IS JUST GOING TO BE AN ONGOING DEBATE AND
- 4 DISCUSSION. AND YOU KNOW, AUTO -- IT'S REALLY I DON'T THINK

- 13 A HEALTH AND SAFETY SYSTEM THAT WE CAN ALL RELY ON.
- 15 SCOTT HAGGERTY, CHAIR: THANK YOU MR. CHAIRMAN. ONE OF THE
- 16 THINGS THEY WOULD ASK, THAT IF PEOPLE WOULD BE AMENABLE, IS TO
- 17 -- I REALIZE THE BULLET THAT SAYS MTC WILL NOT BE SET SUGGEST
- 18 STANDARDS OR PLAY ENFORCEMENT ROLE AS IT PLAYS TO THE HEALTHY
- 19 TRANSIT PLAN IMPLEMENTATION. FIRST OF ALL, I KIND OF FEEL LIKE
- 20 WE WILL. BECAUSE IF THEY'RE NOT OPERATING SAFELY WE'RE GOING
- 21 TO PENALIZE THEM WITH MONEY. WE HAVE SAID THAT OVER AND OVER.

- 3 A BROAD GUIDANCE DOCUMENT THAT WOULD HAVE TO BE TRANSLATED ON
- 4 AN AGENCY BY AGENCY BASIS IN SOME WAY. SO, YOU KNOW, CERTAINLY
- 5 WE COULD REQUEST TO SEE WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE. YOU KNOW, AS
- 6 EACH AGENCY PULLS THAT TOGETHER, SO I JUST WANTED TO OFFER
- 7 THAT'S THE BEST -- AND WITH MULTIPLE AGENCIES, ONE OF THE

- 11 DIFFERENT EQUIPMENT, DIFFERENT SIZES OF VEHICLES WOULD REQUIRE
- 12 DIFFERENT DISTANCE METRICS THAT MAY BE ATTACHED TO IT, AND
- 13 LOADING METRICS THAT MAY BE, YOU KNOW, PUT FORWARD. SO GIVEN
- 14 THE DIVERSITY OF THE SYSTEMS, AND THE SERVICES THAT ARE PUT
- 15 OUT THERE, AND IT WAS VERY IMPORTANT WE DISTINGUISH -- AND
- 16 WHAT WAS DISTINGUISHED IN THIS PLAN WAS PARATRANSIT WAS A
- 17 FIXED ROUTE, EACH AGENCY IS NEEDING TO DEVELOP SOMETHING THAT
- 18 ALIGNS WITH A SPECIFICS OF THEIR OWN SERVICES. AND SO, PART OF
- 19 OUR RESOLUTION, I THINK, IS BUILT ON THE ASSUMPTION THAT EACH

- 9 BEST PRACTICES, AND AS BEEN NOTED TODAY REALLY SERVING AS A
- 10 MINIMUM SET OF GUIDELINES FOR SAFETY THAT SHOULD BE MET BY ALL
- 11 THE OPERATORS IN THE REGION. I GUESS WHAT I'M STRUGGLING WITH
- 12 THOUGH IS THE WORDING IN THEY PROPOSED MOTION, WHICH SAYS THAT
- 13 MTC WILL NOT SET STANDARDS. NOW, ON ONE HAND I THINK THAT DOES
- 14 REFLECT THAT THE ROLE THAT I JUST OUTLINED FOR MTC, ON THE
- 15 OTHER HAND, WE ARE ESSENTIALLY PUTTING FORWARD A PLAN, AND WE
- 16 WANT THE LOCAL AGENCIES TO, IN FACT, AGREE TO IT, WHICH IS
- 17 PRESUMED, BASICALLY BECAUSE THEY HAVE WORKED TO COME UP WITH

- 24 MET. NOW WE ALSO RECOGNIZE THAT LOCAL CONDITIONS ARE
- 25 DIFFERENT. SO THERE WILL BE DIFFERENT STANDARDS, POTENTIALLY



- 1 IN DIFFERENT LOCALITIES. BUT WITH THE STARTING POINT, AND
- 2 AGAIN, RECOGNIZING THIS IS A LIVING DOCUMENT. SO I GUESS I
- 3 WOULD BE MORE COMFORTABLE IN, YES, MTC IN EFFECT WILL NOT BE

- 8 I THINK IT'S JUST TOO BLACK AND WHITE TO SAY NO ROLE IN
