PLEASE CALL THE 11 ROLL. 12 13 CLERK OF THE BOARD: [ROLL CALL VOTE] PASSES UNANIMOUSLY BY ALL 14 15 MEMBERS PRESENT. 16 JULIE PIERCE, CHAIR: THANK YOU MARTHA A NEXT ITEM ON THE 17 18 AGENDA 3A UPDATE ON THE NOVEMBER 2020 ELECTION. REBECCA, YOU'RE GOING TO HANDLE THIS ONE FOR US. 19 20 REBECCA LONG: ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR. GOOD MORNING 21 BOARD MEMBERS, COMMISSIONERS. SO, WE ALL ARE WAITING FOR MORE 22 CERTAINTY AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL, FOR SURE, BUT WE DO HAVE A LOT 23 OF RESULTS THAT WE HAVE HIGHLIGHTED IN KIND OF A VIRTUAL HAND 24 OUT, IF YOU WILL, THAT WAS SENT TO YOU LAST NIGHT BUT MARTHA A 25



- 1 SO IF YOU HAVEN'T SEEN T YOU MIGHT FIND THAT IN YOUR INBOX.
- 2 I'M NOT GOING TO WALK THROUGH ALL THE DETAILS BUT WHAT WE HAVE
- 3 TRIED TO DO THERE IS HIGHLIGHT THE RESULTS OF THE STATEWIDE
- 4 BALLOT MEASURES THAT SEEM MOST RELEVANT TO ABAG AND MTC, AS
- 5 WELL AS THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION AND LAND USE MEASURES, AND
- 6 THEN A LITTLE BIT OF A SNAPSHOT ON NATIONAL MEASURES WITH
- 7 RESPECT TO TRANSPORTATION, AND THEN OUR BAY AREA DELEGATION
- 8 RACES. SO STARTING AT THE TOP, ON THE BALLOT MEASURES, YOU
- 9 KNOW, MOST NOTABLY, THE ONE BALLOT MEASURE THAT WE DID TAKE,
- 10 BOTH BOARDS TOOK A SUPPORT POSITION ON PROP 16 WAS DEFEATED. I
- 11 THINK, PROBABLY NOT A BIG SURPRISE, IF FOLKS WERE TRACKING THE
- 12 POLLING, BUT THAT WAS A DISAPPOINTMENT, IT RECEIVED 44 PERCENT
- 13 SUPPORT STATEWIDE. ONE OF THE THINGS WE NOTED IN A NUMBER OF
- 14 THESE MEASURES IS HOW THE BAY AREA VOTED VERSUS THE STATE AS A
- 15 WHOLE AND FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO ARE JUNKIES ABOUT THIS STUFF
- 16 YOU MIGHT ENJOY LOOKING AT THE SECRETARY OF STATE WEB SITE
- 17 WHERE THEY HAVE MAPS BY COUNTY OF ALL THE RESULTS THAT ARE
- 18 STATEWIDE MEASURES. AND YOU CAN SEE, AGAIN, WHERE THE BAY AREA
- 19 DIFFERS FROM THE REST OF THE STATE. SO, A NUMBER OF BAY AREA
- 20 COUNTIES DID SUPPORT PROP 16, BUT OBVIOUSLY NOT ENOUGH FOR IT
- 21 TO WIN STATEWIDE. PROP 15, I'M SURE WAS VERY MUCH ON MANY OF
- 22 YOUR MINDS, GIVEN THE POTENTIAL FOR ADDITIONAL LOCAL AND
- 23 SCHOOL FUNDING. THAT ALSO APPEARS TO HAVE LOST. IT HAD ABOUT
- 24 48 PERCENT SUPPORT, STATEWIDE, BUT BAY AREA COUNTIES SUPPORTED
- 25 IT THROUGHOUT THE NINE COUNTIES, AS WELL AS A NUMBER OF



- 1 NORTHERN COUNTIES. AND THEN IN THE REST OF THE STATE, IT WAS
- 2 ONLY SUPPORTED BY LA, ALPINE, AND IMPERIAL COUNTIES. OTHER
- 3 PROPERTY TAX MEASURE THAT HAS FISCAL IMPACTS TO LOCAL
- 4 GOVERNMENTS THAT DID PASS WAS PROP 19. IT WAS ALSO A NARROW
- 5 DECISION, ABOUT 51 PERCENT IN SUPPORT. AND LET'S SEE. AND THEN
- 6 MOVING ALONG THE OTHER TWO MEASURES THAT WE HIGHLIGHTED HERE
- 7 WAS THE RENT CONTROL, WHICH WAS INTERESTINGLY A VERY SIMILAR
- 8 RESULT TO THE LAST EFFORT, ABOUT 59 PERCENT AGAINST THE RENT
- 9 CONTROL MEASURE. VERY CLOSE TO WHAT IT WAS IN PROP 10, 2 YEARS
- 10 AGO, ON THERE, INTERESTINGLY ENOUGH, LOOKING AT THE MAP, THERE
- 11 WAS JUST ONE COUNTY STATEWIDE THAT SUPPORTED IT, AND THAT WAS
- 12 SAN FRANCISCO. AND, SORRY -- THAT WAS IN THE BAY AREA, AND
- 13 THEN IT ALSO WANT SUPPORTED -- OR IT CAME CLOSE TO BEING
- 14 SUPPORTED IN LA COUNTY. AND THEN PROP 22, THE TRANSPORTATION
- 15 NETWORK COMPANY GIG WORKER MEASURE, I THINK EVERYONE IS
- 16 PROBABLY WELL AWARE THAT THERE WAS A LOT OF SUPPORT FOR THAT
- 17 STATEWIDE, YOU KNOW, MAYBE NOT THAT SURPRISING GIVEN THE
- 18 AMOUNT OF RESOURCES PUT INTO THAT CAMPAIGN. SO, LOOKING, NOW
- 19 MORE REGIONALLY, THE TWO MEASURES THAT MTC SUPPORTED, THE
- 20 CALTRAIN MEASURE, AND SONOMA COUNTIES, SALES TAX RENEWAL, BOTH
- 21 APPEAR TO HAVE WON. THEY'RE BOTH AROUND 70 TO 72 PERCENT. SO
- 22 THAT'S LOOKING PRETTY SOLID, AND CONGRATULATIONS TO THOSE OF
- 23 WHO YOU WERE INVOLVED IN THOSE MEASURES. A LOT OF DIFFERENT
- 24 MEASURES RELATED TO HOUSING. I THINK, YOU KNOW, A BIT OF THE
- 25 MIXED BAG THERE, AND THE ZONING SIDE OF THINGS, BUT SAN



- 1 FRANCISCO VOTERS APPROVED A SIGNIFICANT GENERAL OBLIGATION
- 2 BOND OF 487 MILLION, AND THAT IS ELIGIBLE FOR HOMELESS
- 3 SHELTERS AND OTHER, ALSO, TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE, SO
- 4 THAT WAS A GO BOND THERE. AND THEN IN ALAMEDA COUNTY THERE WAS
- 5 A SUPPORTED NEW HALF CENT SALES TAX FOR GENERAL COUNTY NEEDS
- 6 ALSO HIGHLIGHTING HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS SERVICES. AND THEN
- 7 IN BERKELEY, VOTERS SUPPORTED A TENANT PROTECTION MEASURE, SO
- 8 THAT WAS THE ONLY ONE THAT WE WERE AWARE OF THAT WAS SPECIFIC
- 9 TO TENANT PROTECTION IN THE REGION, AND THAT DID PASS. AND
- 10 THEN, I WON'T GO THROUGH ALL OF THESE, BUT THESE SOMEWHAT
- 11 IMPORTANT ONES, I DID WANT TO HIGHLIGHT SONOMA COUNTY ALSO
- 12 VOTERS APPROVED BY 16 PERCENT A NEW HALF CENT SALES TAX FOR
- 13 LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH AND, AGAIN, HOMELESSNESS SERVICES. SO I'LL
- 14 LEAVE IT TO YOU TO READ THE REST OF THIS, BECAUSE I KNOW YOU
- 15 DO HAVE A BUSY MORNING TODAY, AND WHAT WE WANT TO FOCUS ON IS
- 16 THE NEXT ITEM, OUR ADVOCACY PROGRAM, BUT HOPEFULLY IT'S A
- 17 USEFUL DOCUMENT FOR YOU TO GET AN OVERVIEW, AND THEN JUST
- 18 FINALLY TALKING ABOUT OUR DELEGATION, NO CHANGE IN WASHINGTON,
- 19 D.C. EXCEPT THAT WE MAY HAVE A NEW SENATOR, BUT ON THE
- 20 LEGISLATIVE SIDE OF COURSE WE'RE EXCITED TO HAVE A NEW STATE
- 21 SENATOR, CONGRATULATIONS COMMISSIONER BOARD MEMBER CORTESE.
- 22 AND WE ALSO HAVE A COUPLE OF OTHER NEW STATE SENATORS, ONE IS
- 23 A FAMILIAR NAME, FORMER ASSEMBLYMEMBER JOHN LAIRD WHO WAS AN
- 24 ASSEMBLYMEMBER FOR MANY YEARS, AND THEN WAS SECRETARY OF THE
- 25 RESOURCES AGENCY UNDER GOVERNOR BROWN, HE IS RETURNING TO



- 1 REPRESENT THAT SOUTHERNMOST DISTRICT CURRENTLY HELD BY SENATOR
- 2 MONNING AND NEW MEMBER JOSH BECKER WILL BE FILLING THE SEAT BY
- 3 JERRY HILL AND SIMILARLY ALEX LEE IN THE SOUTH BAY. THOSE ARE
- 4 THREE NEW FACES FOR US AND ONE GOOD FRIEND WHOLE BE JOINING
- 5 OUR SACRAMENTO DELEGATION. AND, YEAH, I THINK THAT CONCLUDES
- 6 MY REPORT ON THE ELECTION, AND YOU WILL BE HEARING MORE
- 7 INSIGHTS UNDER OUR FEDERAL UPDATE WITH OUR DC LOBBYISTS LATER
- 8 IN THIS AGENDA. BACK TO YOU MADAM CHAIR.

- 24 PARTICULAR FOLKS LIKE SUPERVISOR DAVE PINE, SUPERVISOR
- 25 [INDISCERNIBLE] IN SAN FRANCISCO AND [INDISCERNIBLE] GREAT



EFFORT. AND GLAD TO SEE IT GET OVER THE GOAL LINE WE'RE 1 EXCITED ABOUT THE VOTE COUNT, IT'S DECLINE BUT WE HOPE IT WILL 2 3 REMAIN OVER THE TWO THIRDS THRESHOLD. THANK YOU. 4 5 JULIE PIERCE, CHAIR: WE'RE ALL PULLING FOR YOU SAM. THAT WAS A BIG ONE FOR THE REGION. ANY OTHER COMMENTS? I DON'T SEE ANY 6 7 HANDS RAISED. MARTHA DO WE HAVE COMMENT ON THIS ITEM 8 CLERK OF THE BOARD: NO PUBLIC COMMENT SUBMITTED ON THIS ITEM 9 10 AND ONE MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC HAS THEIR HAND RAISED. ROLAND, GO AHEAD AND UNMUTE YOURSELF. 11 12 SPEAKER: YES. THIS IS ROLAND, YES. AND YES, I DO WANT TO TALK 13 ABOUT MEASURE RR, AND I WOULD LIKE TO START LIKE TO START BY 14 15 THANKING COMMISSIONER SPERING AND LICCARDO AND OTHERS FOR 16 SUPPORT IN PASSING THIS MEASURE AND AS MAYOR LICCARDO MENTIONED IT'S EXTREMELY TITHE. I WANT TO SHARE WITH YOU MY 17 PERSONAL EXPERIENCE WITH WHAT HAPPENED. I DID NOT SEE THIS 18 COMING. ABOUT SIX WEEKS AGO, I STARTED RECEIVING CALLS FROM 19 MARKETING AND INDIVIDUALS, WHO NORMALLY WOULD BE EXPECTED TO 20 21 SUPPORT RR, EVERY SINGLE ONE OF THEM WAS EXTREMELY CONCERNED ABOUT THE GOVERNMENT'S ISSUE WITH CALTRAIN. AND WHAT I ENDED 22 UP DOING IN EVERY CASE -- SO THE REASON THERE WERE CONCERN IS 23 BECAUSE OF THE CONDITIONS THAT WE PUT IN PLACE IN PUTTING THIS 24

MEASURE ON THE BALLOT IN THE FIRST PLACE, WERE NOT CLEARLY



- 1 SPELLED OUT IN THE BALLOT LANGUAGE. SO IN EVERY CASE, WHAT I
- 2 DID, I POINTED THEM TO THE BOARD RESOLUTION THAT HAD TO PASS
- 3 IMMEDIATELY BEFORE PUTTING THE MEASURE ON THE BALLOT, AND ASK
- 4 ALL THESE PEOPLE TO PLEASE DISTRIBUTE THIS INFORMATION TO
- 5 THEIR CHANNELS. -- SOCIAL CHANNELS, BUT INCLUDING, WHAT I WANT
- 6 TO BRING TO THE COMMISSION'S ATTENTION IS THAT MOVING FORWARD,
- 7 WE NEED SUPPORT FROM THE COMMISSION ADDRESSING THIS ISSUE,
- 8 BECAUSE IF YOU DON'T KNOW ADDRESS IT VERY SOON, I AM SEEING
- 9 SOME SERIOUS BACKLASH COMING BACK FROM THE VOTERS. I DON'T
- 10 KNOW WHAT FORM IT'S GOING TO BE IN, BUT PEOPLE THERE ARE VERY,
- 11 VERY CONCERNED ABOUT, BASICALLY, TRUSTING THE EXISTING
- 12 ADMINISTRATION, WITH ESSENTIALLY \$3 TRILLION OF TAXPAYER
- 13 DOLLARS. THANK YOU.

- 23 AGENDA ITEM 3B WHICH IS THE JOINT ADVOCACY PROGRAM, AND
- 24 REBECCA, THIS ONE IS YOURS AS WELL.



- 1 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR. SO FOR THIS ONE, IF I
- 2 COULD RECOMMEND THAT YOU GUYS PULL UP, ON YOUR PACKET, THE PDF
- 3 FOR ITEM 3B. WE DON'T HAVE POWERPOINT SLIDES FOR THIS. BECAUSE
- 4 THERE IS VERY MUCH DETAIL FOR THOSE OF YOU LISTENING IT'S ITEM
- 5 3B THAT MIGHT BE AVAILABLE ON THE WEB. WE DO THIS EVERY YEAR.
- 6 WE UPDATE OUR LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR SACRAMENTO AND
- 7 WASHINGTON AND THIS SEEMS LIKE A PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT YEAR
- 8 TO REFRESH THEM GIVEN THE PANDEMIC AND IMPACTS ON REVENUE
- 9 PARTICULARLY FOR TRANSIT AGENCIES. SO WE HAVE, YOU KNOW, GONE
- 10 THROUGH THE CURRENT YEAR' PROGRAM AND REFRESHED IT, AND ADDED
- 11 NEW ITEMS AND RESTRUCTURED. SO WHAT WE HAVE DONE JUST TO KIND
- 12 OF SIMPLIFY THINGS FOR YOUR REVIEW IS HIGHLIGHTED, IN SALMON
- 13 COLOR, THE ITEMS THAT ARE NEW, THERE MIGHT BE MINOR TWEAKING
- 14 OF THE WORDING AND OTHERS BUT THOSE ARE OTHERWISE BASICALLY
- 15 CARRYOVERS FROM A DIFFERENT YEARS. SO I'M GOING TO WALK
- 16 THROUGH AND HIGHLIGHT THE MOST SIGNIFICANT NEW ITEMS. FIRST
- 17 ONE RELATED TO TRANSPORTATION FUNDING, AND SO THE WAY THIS IS
- 18 STRUCTURED IS, THERE IS KIND OF A BROAD GOAL, AND THE SPECIFIC
- 19 OBJECTIVES WITHIN. SO WITHIN THE TRANSPORTATION FUNDING
- 20 CATEGORY IS TO SEEK TRANSIT OPERATING FUNDS WITH TRANSIT
- 21 OPERATORS AND CALIFORNIA TRANSIT ASSOCIATION, WE RECOGNIZE
- 22 THAT IT'S MUCH MORE FEASIBLE, FINANCIALLY, FOR THE FEDERAL
- 23 GOVERNMENT TO PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO TRANSIT OPERATORS THAN IT
- 24 IS FOR THE STATE SINCE THE STATE IS OPERATING WITHIN ITS OWN
- 25 BUDGET AND DOESN'T HAVE THE POWER TO SIMPLY, YOU KNOW, PRINT



- 1 MONEY IN THE SAME WAY THAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT DOES.
- 2 HOWEVER, WE ARE AWARE THAT, IF WE DON'T RECEIVE FUNDING FROM
- 3 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, QUICKLY ENOUGH, WE REALLY MAY NEED
- 4 SOME ADDITIONAL STATE ASSISTANCE. AND SO THIS IS IN LINE WITH
- 5 THE LEGISLATIVE STRATEGY OF THE CALIFORNIA TRANSIT
- 6 ASSOCIATION, AND WE WANT TO, YOU KNOW, SUPPORT THEIR EFFORTS,
- 7 AND THOSE OF TRANSIT OPERATORS TO SEEK ADDITIONAL TRANSIT
- 8 OPERATING FUNDING IN SACRAMENTO AS WELL. OF COURSE IF WE'RE
- 9 FORTUNATE ENOUGH TO RECEIVE A SIGNIFICANT INFUSION OF FEDERAL
- 10 FUNDS THIS WOULD NOT BE NECESSARY BUT WE DON'T WANT TO
- 11 BASICALLY NOT MAKE AN EFFORT IN SACRAMENTO ON THIS FRONT. ITEM
- 12 1C IS MUCH MORE OF A KIND OF INTERNAL BUDGET ITEM, WHERE WE
- 13 WOULD LIKE TO SEE SOME REDUCTION IN THE COST THAT WE'RE
- 14 CHARGED, SPECIFICALLY MTC BATA WITH REGARD TO OVERHEAD COST BY
- 15 CALTRANS AND BASICALLY WE'RE SEEKING TO RECEIVE SIMILAR
- 16 TREATMENT AS THE SELF-HELP COUNTIES WHO WERE ABLE TO GUILTY A
- 17 LOWER ADMINISTRATIVE OVERHEAD CHARGE THROUGH PRIOR BUDGET
- 18 ACTIONS. AND THAT COULD SAVE US SEVERAL MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR
- 19 THAT COULD GO BACK INTO SUPPORTING BRIDGE REHAB AND OTHER
- 20 NEEDS. OTHER SIGNIFICANT ITEMS IS 2B ARTICULATING THE SUPPORT
- 21 FOR LEGISLATION THAT'S LIKELY TO EMERGE FROM THE
- 22 RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BLUE RIBBON RECOVERY TASK FORCE AND WE
- 23 HIGHLIGHTED THREE AREAS WHERE WE BELIEVE THE LEDGE MIGHT BE
- 24 PROBABLY OR KIND OF GENERAL THEMES AND THOSE ARE GETTING
- 25 TRANSIT OUT OF TRAFFIC, MAKING THE TRANSIT REQUIRED EXPERIENCE



- 1 MORE SEAMLESS AND CONVENIENT AND WHERE APPROPRIATE GOVERNANCE
- 2 CHANGES EXPECTED TO IMPROVE TRANSIT SERVICE BY ELIMINATING THE
- 3 FRICTION OR REDUNDANCY CAUSED BY EXISTING TRANSIT AGENCY
- 4 SERVICE BOUNDARIES. OF COURSE WHATEVER THE LEGISLATION LOOKS
- 5 LIKE IS GOING TO DEPEND ON THE RECOMMENDATIONS THAT COME OUT
- 6 OF THE TASK FORCE, BUT WE WANT TO BE ENGAGING CLOSELY
- 7 ASSEMBLYMEMBER CHIU AND OTHER LEGISLATORS INTERESTED IN THIS
- 8 TOPIC. KEY TO THIS PIECE. ON HOUSING, NEXT ITEM, THREE, WE
- 9 KIND OF HAVE THREE ITEMS HERE WHICH IS, ONE IS A SLIGHT
- 10 RECASTING OF WHAT WE HAVE HAD FOR A NUMBER OF YEARS IN SUPPORT
- 11 OF SUPPORTING HIGHER DENSITY NEAR TRANSIT AND IN JOB RICH
- 12 AREAS. WE HAVE BROUGHT A NUMBER OF BILLS TO YOU, OVER THE
- 13 YEARS, THAT HAVE MOVED IN THIS DIRECTION. UNFORTUNATELY NONE
- 14 MADE IT TO THE GOVERNOR'S DESK THIS PAST YEAR. WE'RE
- 15 ARTICULATING SUPPORT FOR THOSE GENERAL THEMES AS WELL AS
- 16 AUTHORIZING HOUSING IN COMMERCIAL ZONES SUCH AS SHOPPING MALLS
- 17 AND COMMERCIAL CORRIDORS WHERE IT MIGHT BE MORE PALATABLE FOR
- 18 IN SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENCES. AND THERE WILL LIKELY BE A LOT OF
- 19 ZONING CHANGES CONSISTENT WITH RHNA THIS WHOLE CATEGORY IS
- 20 ABOUT HELPING AGENCIES DELIVER ON THEIR RHNA. AND THE NEXT
- 21 ITEM IS SUPPORTING A ONE TIME INFUSION OF FUNDS FOR THE BAY
- 22 AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITIES PILOT PROJECTS. THIS IS
- 23 ESSENTIALLY A STRATEGY TO SEEK STATE MATCHING FUNDS TO A
- 24 PHILANTHROPIC EFFORT THAT A NUMBER OF OUR PART AGENCIES MPH
- 25 AND OTHERS ARE PURR SUING, WHILE WE THINK STATE FINANCES ARE



- 1 TIGHT RIGHT NOW OUR BAY AREA DELEGATION REALLY PRIORITIZES
- 2 HOUSING, AND I THINK THEY'RE EXCITED ABOUT THE LAUNCH OF THE
- 3 BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY AND THESE PILOT PROJECTS
- 4 ARE DESIGNED TO REALLY BUILD CAPACITY SO THAT IF AND WHEN A
- 5 MEASURE IS PUT ON THE BALLOT, ALL AS A REGION REALLY BOTH
- 6 LOCAL AGENCIES AND OUR STAFF ARE READY TO GO AND DELIVER
- 7 SIGNIFICANT CAPITAL DOLLARS. AND THEN THE NEXT ITEM IS
- 8 ARTICULATING THAT WE DO WANT TO SUPPORT POLICIES IS FUNDING
- 9 PROPOSALS PREVENTING AND ENDING HOMELESSNESS THAT'S AN
- 10 IMPORTANT ROLE FOR OUR AGENCIES. AND MOVING DOWN TO CLIMATE
- 11 CHANGE ON THE VERY RELEVANT TO THE DISCUSSION YOU HAD IN THE
- 12 PRIOR MEETING. SB 375 IMPLEMENTATION AND REFORM. YOU KNOW, WE
- 13 DO THINK IT'S TIME TO TAKE A STEP BACK AND LOOK AT SB 375 AND
- 14 HOW IT IS WORKING AND HOW IT'S NOT WORKING ONE THING WE HAVE
- 15 BEEN FRUSTRATED IS THE DYNAMIC OF COMPETITION WITH THE STATE
- 16 AROUND WHO IS GOING TO GET CREDIT FOR DIFFERENT GREENHOUSE GAS
- 17 REDUCTION STRATEGIES, RATHER THAN REALLY WORKING IN
- 18 PARTNERSHIP, AND THERE IS JUST AN ENORMOUS AMOUNT OF ENERGY
- 19 SPENT ON THE MODEL AND HOW DO WE REACH A SPECIFIC TARGET AS
- 20 OPPOSED TO THINKING ABOUT WHAT ARE MEANINGFUL POLICY ACTIONS
- 21 THAT ARE GOING TO DELIVER NEAR-TERM GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION.
- 22 AND WE ALSO HAVE GROWN FRUSTRATED WITH THE CONFLICTS THAT ARE
- 23 ARISING BETWEEN, YOU KNOW, COMPETING STATE PLANNING GOALS,
- 24 THINKING ABOUT RHNA AND GOALS RELATED THERE TO EQUITY AND FAIR
- 25 HOUSING, AND THE SORT OF SINGLE FOCUS OF THE SUSTAINABLE



- 1 COMMUNITY STRATEGY ON CLIMATE CHANGE AND GHG REALLY DOESN'T
- 2 ALLOW FOR A MORE NUANCED MULTI-GOAL STRATEGY. SO, WE DON'T
- 3 BELIEVE THAT THIS IS SOMETHING THAT WILL BE EASY, AND THAT CAN
- 4 BE RUSHED THROUGH, NECESSARILY THIS YEAR, BUT WE WOULD REALLY
- 5 LIKE TO START ENGAGING IN THIS CONVERSATION STATEWIDE WITH OUR
- 6 OTHER PARTNER AGENCIES AND STATEWIDE PARTNERS, YOU KNOW, MEAN
- 7 THINK THE AIR RESOURCES BOARD, HOUSING AND COMMUNITY
- 8 DEVELOPMENT AGENCIES, AND OTHERS TO FIGURE OUT IF THERE ISN'T
- 9 A BETTER WAY, AND AN UPDATE THAT WE ALL CAN AGREE ON. NEXT
- 10 ITEM IS REALLY BUILDING ON THE GOVERNOR EXECUTIVE ORDER AND
- 11 CONSISTENT WITH THE DRAFT, PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 BLUEPRINT TO
- 12 SUPPORT STRATEGIES THAT CAN REALLY ACCELERATE THE
- 13 ELECTRIFICATION OF THE PASSENGER FLEET. AND ONE OF THOSE THAT
- 14 IS INCORPORATED INTO THE BLUEPRINT IS THIS IDEA OF A FEE BATE
- 15 THAT ESTABLISHES HIGHER REGISTRATION ON VEHICLES TO HELP FUND
- 16 REBATES ON CLEAN AIR VEHICLES TO MITIGATE ANY REGRESSIVE
- 17 IMPACT. SIMILAR TO WHAT WE HAVE HAD IN THE PAST, I THINK YOU
- 18 WILL REMEMBER BOTH BOARDS SUPPORTED ASSEMBLYMEMBER MULLIN'S
- 19 BILL WITH AN AMENDMENT SOUGHT WITH RELATED TO CLIMATE
- 20 ADAPTATION THIS REFINING OUR VISION THERE TO BUILD AND
- 21 COMPLIMENT EXISTING AND REGIONAL AGENCY CAPACITY AND PROCESSES
- 22 ALREADY UNDERWAY THE STATE HAS DEVELOPED IN THE GENERAL PLAN
- 23 REOUIREMENTS PLAN REOUIREMENTS TO LOOK AT RESILIENCE TO LOOK
- 24 AT RISKS AND HAZARDS WE WANT TO MAKE SURE IF THERE IS ANY
- 25 REGIONAL CLIMATE ADAPTATION PLANNING MANDATES THOSE ARE



- 1 INTEGRATED WITH WHAT WE'RE DOING WITH THE SUSTAINABLE
- 2 COMMUNITY STRATEGY AND THAT WE MAKE SURE THAT ANY CLIMATE
- 3 ADAPTATION FUNDING THAT FOCUSED ON DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES
- 4 IS AWARDED IN SUCH A WAY THAT REFLECTING THE BAY AREA'S
- 5 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES AND DOESN'T JUST RELY ON THE
- 6 CALENVIROSCREEN. MOVING ON TO SAFETY. WE -- THIS IS AN ITEM
- 7 THAT HAS BEEN ON THERE BEFORE, BUT THIS IS KIND OF A MORE
- 8 POINTED FOCUSED ARTICULATION OF THE GOAL. AND THAT IS THE ZERO
- 9 TRAFFIC FATALITIES GOAL, VISION ZERO, WE DID HAVE STAFF
- 10 PARTICIPATE IN THE ZERO TRAFFIC FATALITIES TASK FORCE LAST
- 11 YEAR AND WE WOULD LIKE TO SUPPORT LEGISLATION THAT IS AIMED AT
- 12 REVISING THE 85th PERCENTILE METHODOLOGY FOR MAINTAINING SPEED
- 13 LIMITS THERE WAS CONSENSUS COMING OUT OF THE TASK FORCE THAT
- 14 THAT IS APPROPRIATE TO, YOU KNOW, REVISE, AND A NUMBER OF
- 15 STATES HAVE DONE SO. AND ALSO KEEP OUR EYES OPEN FOR
- 16 LEGISLATION TO SUPPORT AUTOMATED SPEED ENFORCEMENT TO ALSO
- 17 REALLY IMPROVE SAFETY IN SOME OF OUR HOTSPOTS FOR HAZARDS FOR
- 18 BICYCLES AND PEDESTRIAN IN OUR CITIES. AND THEN LAST BUT NOT
- 19 LEAST, ON THE STATE SIDE, WE THINK THAT, YOU KNOW, WITH ALL OF
- 20 THE ADDITIONAL FLEXIBILITY THAT WE HAVE ENJOYED, IT IS TIME TO
- 21 THINK ABOUT WHETHER THE BROWN ACT SHOULD BE REVISED TO
- 22 INCORPORATE SOME OF THIS ADDITIONAL FLEXIBILITY AROUND VIRTUAL
- 23 MEETINGS, VIRTUAL PARTICIPATION, OVER THE LONG RUN. SO THIS IS
- 24 NOT SOMETHING WE'RE PROPOSING WE WOULD LEAD, WE'RE WORKING IN
- 25 CLOSE PARTNERSHIP WITH THE LEAGUE OF CITIES AND ASSOCIATIONS



- 1 AND OTHERS AND IN OUR VARIOUS CONVENINGS IN THE LAST FEW
- 2 MONTHS IT SEEMS THERE IS QUITE A BIG APPETITE TO EXPLORE THAT.
- 3 SO THAT ARE AN ARTICULATION OF THAT THERE. MADAM CHAIR, WOULD
- 4 YOU LIKE TO PAUSE THERE ON THE STATE SIDE? OR SHOULD I JUST
- 5 KEEP GOING?

- 7 JULIE PIERCE, CHAIR: I WOULD SAY KEEP GOING AND THEN WE'LL
- 8 HAVE QUESTIONS ALL AT ONCE.

- 10 REBECCA LONG: OKAY. SOUNDS GOOD. SO ON THE FEDERAL SIDE, YEAH,
- 11 NOT AS MUCH NEW. SURFACE TRANSPORTATION, REAUTHORIZATION IS
- 12 DEFINITELY GOING TO BE A BIG SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION NEXT YEAR.
- 13 AS YOU MIGHT RECALL, THEY, AS PART OF THE CONTINUING
- 14 RESOLUTION FOR THE APPROPRIATIONS THIS YEAR, THEY DID PASS A
- 15 ONE YEAR EXTENSION OF THE AUTHORIZATION BILL. SO WE'RE NOT
- 16 LOOKING AT AN IMMEDIATE DEADLINE, BUT THE POLICY COMMITTEES
- 17 ARE REALLY READY TO GO. THEY HAVE ALREADY DEVELOPED, YOU KNOW,
- 18 A DRAFT, OR AN INITIAL BILL ON BOTH SIDES. AND SO WE ARE JUST
- 19 ARTICULATING AGAIN, THE SAME PRIORITIES OF RAISING NEW
- 20 REVENUES, MAINTAINING SOME OF THE CORE PROGRAMS THAT ARE IN
- 21 THE FAST ACT, IS LOOKING AT INTEGRATING CLIMATE CHANGE INTO
- 22 MORE OF THE PROGRAMS. WE ARE HIGHLIGHTING AN ITEM, 2D HERE,
- 23 COVID EMERGENCY AID AND ECONOMIC RECOVERY THAT IS OUR NUMBER
- 24 ONE PRIORITY IN WASHINGTON. AND YOU WILL HEAR MORE ABOUT THAT
- 25 FROM OUR LOBBYISTS SHORTLY, AND THEN, AGAIN, LOOKING AT



- 1 CLIMATE CHANGE, AND DISASTER RESPONSE, RESILIENCE, WE DO THINK
- 2 PARTICULARLY IF WE HAVE A PRESIDENT BIDEN THAT THERE WILL BE A
- 3 BIG APPETITE TO LOOK AT WAYS TO BOTH STIMULATE THE ECONOMY
- 4 THROUGH INVESTMENTS, IN CLIMATE RESILIENCE, AND JUST GENERALLY
- 5 HAVE MORE NATIONAL ROLE WITH RESPECT TO REDUCING GREENHOUSE
- 6 GAS REDUCTION. SO WITH THAT I'M HAPPY TO CONCLUDE AND TAKE ANY
- 7 COMMENTS OR QUESTIONS. THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR.

- 9 JULIE PIERCE, CHAIR: THANK YOU REBECCA. THAT'S REALLY HELPFUL.
- 10 AND I'M GLAD YOU HAVE OUTLINED SOME OF THESE THINGS THAT WE
- 11 HAVE BEEN STRUGGLING WITH OVER THIS LAST PERIOD OF TIME. HOW
- 12 TO CONDUCT MEETINGS, YOU KNOW, IT'S REALLY NICE NOT TO SPEND
- 13 THREE HOURS GETTING TO AND FROM AN MTC ABAG MEETING, AND WHILE
- 14 THIS IS NOT IDEAL, AND WE MISS SEEING OUR COLLEAGUES ON A
- 15 REGULAR BASIS, IT'S PROBABLY A WHOLE LOT MORE EFFICIENT AND
- 16 CERTAINLY HELPS OUR GREENHOUSE GAS AND VEHICLE MILES TRAVELED
- 17 GOALS. THAT SAID, THIS IS A DRAFT LIST. WE ARE ASKING FOR
- 18 COMMENTS FROM COMMISSIONERS, THE FINAL RECOMMENDATION WILL
- 19 COME BACK AFTER COMMENTS FROM THIS MEETING AND OTHERS OVER
- 20 THIS NEXT MONTH. IT WILL COME BACK TO US IN DECEMBER, AND
- 21 PROBABLY EVEN BE REFINED SOME MORE IN JANUARY, I WOULD GUESS,
- 22 AS WE START THE NEXT LEGISLATIVE SESSION. SO COMMISSIONER
- 23 COMMENTS? AMY?



- 1 AMY R. WORTH: THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR. I ALSO WANT TO THANK
- 2 STAFF FOR YOUR TREMENDOUS WORK ON THIS LAST YEAR AND MOVING
- 3 FORWARD. AND BEING AVAILABLE TO ALL THE COMMISSIONERS THAT
- 4 CALL YOU AT ALL HOURS NEEDING TO GET AN UPDATE ON WHAT'S
- 5 HAPPENING WITH THE LATEST BILL AND TO TRY TO FINE TUNE OUR
- 6 ADVOCACY EFFORTS AS THESE MOVE THROUGH THE LEGISLATURE. THANK
- 7 YOU VERY MUCH. I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT THE IMPORTANCE OF THE BILL
- 8 WITH REGARDS TO THE BRIDGES, AND THE OVERHEAD. YOU KNOW, WE
- 9 PAY SIGNIFICANTLY MOREOVER HEAD THAN THE CONGESTION MANAGEMENT
- 10 AGENCIES, THE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AGENCIES ACROSS THE STATE.
- 11 WE'RE DOING THE SAME THINGS. AND AS THE BATA RECOVERY WORKING
- 12 GROUP DRILLS INTO THE FINANCES OF THE BRIDGES, AND OUR
- 13 RESPONSIBILITY TO MAINTAIN THEM, AND TO MAKE THEM, YOU KNOW,
- 14 FLOW AS WELL AS THEY CAN, YOU KNOW, EVERY THERE IS CRITICAL,
- 15 AND SO WE ARE GOING TO -- WE'RE KIND OF COMING TO THE CRITICAL
- 16 PATH WITH REGARDS TO THE CAPTAIN INVESTMENT OF THE BRIDGES.
- 17 THIS IS AN IMPORTANT INITIATIVE THIS YEAR, AND WE NEED A LOT
- 18 OF HELP WITH OUR LEGISLATIVE DELEGATIONS TO GET THIS THROUGH.
- 19 BUT I WANT TO THANK STAFF, BECAUSE THIS ANTICIPATES THE
- 20 INFORMATION THAT WE'RE GOING TO BE BRINGING TO THE COMMISSION
- 21 WHEN THE TASK FORCE KIND OF COMPLETES PULLING TOGETHER ITS
- 22 WORK AND RECOMMENDATIONS. SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR INCLUDING
- 23 THIS.

1 BARBARA HALLIDAY: I WANT TO ECHO, REALLY GOOD JOB ON THIS PLAN 2 3 AND GOING THROUGH IT. IT REALLY SPEAKERS TO A LOT OF IMPORTANT ISSUES GOING ON RIGHT NOW. I AM THRILLED THAT WE'RE GOING TO 4 5 BE ADVOCATING FOR AUTOMATED SPEED ENFORCEMENT. I HAVE BEEN REALLY CHAMPIONING THAT FOR A WHILE, AND ALSO LOOKING AT THE 6 BROWN ACT, I HOPE WE END UP BE MORE OF A HYBRID. I MISS SEEING 7 8 PEOPLE IN REALTIME BUT BALANCING THAT WITH ESPECIALLY THESE COMMITTEE MEETINGS AND ALL, AND YOU KNOW, KIND OF THE WAY WE 9 DO IT AND THEY RUN INTO EACH OTHER IT WOULD BE REALLY NICE TO 10 BE ABLE TO HAVE THEM CONTINUING IN THE ONLINE FORMAT. BUT I 11 WANTED TO GO BACK TO, I YOU THINK IT'S 8G UNDER CLIMATE 12 ADAPTATION, IF YOU COULD JUST EXPLAIN A LITTLE MORE ABOUT WHAT 13 THAT MEANT ABOUT ADVOCATING FUNDING TOWARDS DISADVANTAGED 14 15 COMMUNITIES AND DEFINITION INCLUDING LOW INCOME HOUSEHOLDS 16 RATHER THAN RELYING ON THE STATE CAN ENVIROSCREEN METHOD. I DIDN'T COMPLETELY UNDERSTAND THAT. 17 18 REBECCA LONG: SURE. HAPPY TO DO THAT. AND THIS IS A VERY 19 TECHNICAL ISSUE THAT MTC AND ABAG HAVE BEEN ADVOCATING FOR FOR 20 21 SOMETIME. BUT IT HASN'T BEEN SOMETHING WE HAVE TALKED ABOUT SO MUCH IN THE LAST COUPLE OF YEARS. SO THE CALIFORNIA EPA 22 DEVELOPED A SCREENING TOOL CALLED CALENVIROSCREEN DESIGNED TO 23 LOOK AT MULTIPLE HAZARDS IT'S A COMPLEX TOOL AND HAS SOCIO-24 ECONOMIC FACTORS AND ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS AND THEY SORT OF 25



- 1 FUSE TOGETHER BY CENSUS TRACT, WHAT THE SORT OF PERCENTILE IS
- 2 FOR EACH OF THESE CATEGORIES. AND SO BECAUSE THE BAY AREA
- 3 TENDS TO NOT HAVE AS MUCH EXPOSURE, FOR EXAMPLE, TO SOLID
- 4 WASTE FACILITIES AND WE DON'T HAVE AS SEVERE AIR QUALITY, AS
- 5 FOR EXAMPLE, THE CENTRAL VALLEY, WHAT TENDS TO HAPPEN IS EVEN
- 6 IN SOME OF OUR SOCIO-ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED, WE'RE TALKING
- 7 IN THE THIRD PERCENTILE STATEWIDE, THEY DON'T QUALIFY AS
- 8 DISADVANTAGED UNDER THIS TOOL BECAUSE OF THE SORT OF
- 9 COMBINATION OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS. SO WE HAVE LONG
- 10 ADVOCATED FOR JUST A BROADER DEFINITION. WE CERTAINLY, YOU
- 11 KNOW, WANT TO SEE IT FOCUSED ON GENUINELY DISADVANTAGED
- 12 COMMUNITIES. AND WE DON'T WANT TO COMPETE WITH THE CENTRAL
- 13 VALLEY OR DISREGARD THEIR SEVERE CHALLENGES, BUT WE WANT TO

- 19 JAKE MACKENZIE, VICE CHAIR: THANK YOU MADAM CHAIR. I DO NOT
- 20 FIND ZOOM MEETINGS CONDUCIVE TO THE PUBLIC DEBATE AND THE

AND IT'S EDUCATION, AND -- MAYBE I MISS IT 24 BECAUSE I DIDN'T THINK IT WAS RELATED TO TRANSPORTATION. I 25



- 1 DON'T SEE WHY WE CAN'T HAVE IT IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY AND IN TWO

- 3 EXTEND TO THE WORK THAT REBECCA AND I DO. AND ABAG HAS RUN THE
- 4 ESTUARY PROGRAM FOR A LONG TIME AND THE BAY TRAIL AND WHAT
- 5 WE'RE SEEKING TO DO IS TO HAVE THE BAY AREA AND ITS ESTUARY
- 6 TREATED IN SOME SENSE OF SIMILARITY TO A PROGRAM THAT FUNDS

- 6 WEEKS AGO. AND WHILE MANY -- WELL, I SHOULD SAY THAT MIGHT BE
- 7 CONGRESS'S DESIRE. I THINK THE WILD CARD HERE IS REALLY GOING
- 8 TO BE WHETHER TRUMP WILL BE A TEAM PLAYER AND PUSH THE SAME
- 9 AGENDA AS HE HAD TALKED ABOUT BEFORE THE ELECTION. MANY
- 10 REPUBLICANS IN THE SENATE WILL LIKELY HOLD THEIR POSITION TO
- 11 NOT SPEND OUTSIDE OF THEIR COMFORT ZONE BUT DO HAVE A STRONG
- 12 INCENTIVE TO BOTH FINISH THE FY '2021 APPROPRIATIONS BILL AND
- 13 UNDER THE RIGHT CONDITIONS A COVID PACKAGE. WHILE THEY AT
- 14 LEAST HAVE THE ABILITY TO PLAY A SIGNIFICANT ROLE IN SHAPING
- 15 WHAT THAT LEGISLATION WOULD LOOK LIKE. YOU KNOW, WE HAVE
- 16 SPOKEN WITH A NUMBER OF DEMOCRATS ON THE HOUSE AND SENATOR
- 17 APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEES WHO HAVE INDICATED THEY WANT TO
- 18 CLOSE OUT FY 2021 TO CLEAR THE DECKS SO THEY CAN FOCUS ON
- 19 HIGHER PROFILE ISSUES IN THE FIRST 100 DAYS, WHICH IS LOOKING
- 20 TO BE A BIDEN ADMINISTRATION. AS MARK HAD MENTIONED, THAT IS
- 21 THE DESIRE OF WHAT THE BIDEN TEAM IS PUTTING TOGETHER RIGHT
- 22 NOW, WHAT THAT PACKAGE IS GOING TO LOOK LIKE, WHETHER IT'S THE
- 23 STIMULUS, ANOTHER STIMULUS OUT OF THE GATE AS HE WOULD COME
- 24 IN, LOOKING AT MORE OF THE LONGER TERM INFRASTRUCTURE,
- 25 PROBABLY WITHIN THE FIRST SIX MONTHS. SO I THINK THAT'S JUST



- 1 WHAT WE'RE GOING TO BE FOCUSING ON. AND I ALSO HAVE HEARD THAT
- 2 THE SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE MAY RELEASE BIPARTISAN
- 3 SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIRMAN'S MARKS IN THE NEXT WEEK OR SO THE WILL
- 4 ALLOW THEM TO REACH A DEAL ON SENDING PACKAGE BY DECEMBER 11TH
- 5 WHEN THE CURRENT RESOLUTION EXPIRES. TRUMP COULD TRY TO
- 6 PREVENT THIS OR ANY EFFORT TO ALLOW AN AGREEMENT TO BE REACHED
- 7 DURING THE LAME DUCK. SO WE JUST HAVE TO SEE HOW THAT'S GOING
- 8 TO SHAKE OUT AND PLAY OUT. THAT WOULD RESULT IN SOME SORT OF
- 9 CR BEING PASSED. DATE I HAVE SEEN THROWN OUT SO FAR HAS BEEN
- 10 TO MARCH 2021, NOT A COMPLETE YEAR LONG CR, BUT WE'RE HOPEFUL
- 11 FROM WHAT WE'RE HEARING THE DESIRE TO HAVE AN OMNIBUS BY THE

- 21 WILLINGNESS TO PUT POLITICS ASIDE IF YOU WILL IN ORDER TO GET
- 22 THE MUCH NEEDED RELIEF OUT TO PEOPLE IN BUSINESSES. SO WHILE
- 23 THE WINDOW REMAINS SMALL THERE IS A POTENTIAL FOR REACHING
- 24 SOME SORT OF SKINNY COVID PACKAGE LOOKING AT A BIGGER \$2
- 25 TRILLION PACKAGE WILL BE MORE DIFFICULT. BUT THAT'S ALL GOING



- 1 TO DEPEND ON THE CONTENT OF THE DEAL. SO IF THE REPUBLICANS
- 2 ARE STANDING BEHIND THE LIABILITY PROTECTIONS IS THINGS THAT
- 3 THEY KNOW DEMOCRATS WOULD NOT SUPPORT, IF THAT MEANS SPENDING

- 22 AND YOU ALL ARE FORTUNATE IN THAT IT'S A TOP PRIORITY FOR
- 23 NANCY PELOSI, AND IT'S A TOP PRIORITY FOR CHUCK SCHUMER
- 24 BECAUSE OF INTEREST SENDING MTA, AND THOSE ARE -- AND IT WAS A
- 25 PRIORITY FOR NITA, WHO IS CURRENTLY THE CHAIR OF THE
