1 2 JAMES P. SPERING, MTC CHAIR: INFORMATION ITEMS, PLANNING 3 DEVELOPMENT, PLANNING GRANTS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. MARK, AND BRAD, ARE YOU GOING TO KICK THIS OFF? 4 5 MARK SHORETT: YES. THANK YOU COMMISSIONER SPERING, AND THANKS 6 EVERYBODY. LATER THIS YEAR STAFF PLANS SOLICITING LETTERS OF 7 8 INTEREST FROM LOCAL JURISDICTIONS FOR PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREA AND PLANNING AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS WHICH WILL 9 BE THE 8TH ROUND OF THIS GRANT PROGRAM. I'LL PROVIDE A FLAVOR 10 FOR THE HISTORY OF THE PROGRAM AND WHAT WE HAVE LEARNED TO 11 DATE AND BEGIN TO SKETCH OUT WHAT LIES AHEAD FOR YOUR 12 FEEDBACK. BEFORE I GET STARTED, TO REFRESH YOUR MEMORY -- AND 13 THIS PROBABLY ISN'T NECESSARY FOR EVERYBODY HERE ON THIS 14 PARTICULAR ZOOM -- BUT PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREAS ARE TRANSIT 15 16 SERVED PLACES NOMINATED BY LOCAL GOVERNMENTS FOR FUTURE HOUSING AND JOB GROWTH. PDAS WERE THE FOCAL POINT FOR THE 17 GROWTH PATTERN IN THE FIRST TWO PLANNED BAY AREAS AND CONTINUE 18 TO BE A PART OF THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 BLUEPRINT. THE PDA 19 PROGRAM IS ONE OF THE BAY AREA'S PRIMARY TOOLS FOR LINKING 20 21 REGIONAL AND LOCAL PLANNING AND FOR SYNCHRONIZING THE PLACES WE PLAN FOR HOUSING AND JOB GROWTH WITH THE PLACES WE MAKE 22 MAJOR REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION INVESTMENTS. THE PROGRAM EMERGED 23 IN THE MID-2000'S WELL BEFORE THE FIRST PLANNED BAY AREA AND 24 PRIOR TO ADOPTION OF SENATE BILL 375 WITH A REGIONAL



- 1 COLLABORATIVE APPROACH WITH THE REGIONAL FOOTPRINT IN 2002
- 2 FOLLOWED BY THE FOCUS PROGRAM, FOLLOWING THE FIRST STAGE ROUND
- 3 OF PLANTING GRANTS AND PLANNED BAY AREA 2013 AND 2017 SET
- 4 ASIDE FOR PDA PLANNING GRANTS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. SINCE
- 5 ITS INCEPTION THE PDA PROGRAM HAS FUNDED MORE THAN 60 PLANS
- 6 FOR CITIES THROUGHOUT THE BAY AREA AND TOGETHER THESE LOCALLY
- 7 ADOPTED PLANS HAVE ADDED CAPACITY FOR MORE THAN 100,000 HOMES
- 8 AND 75 MILLION SQUARE FEET OF COMMERCIAL FLOOR SPACE THIS
- 9 INCLUDES PLANS FOR PDAS AROUND BART STATIONS, INCLUDING THOSE
- 10 EXPANSE IN STATIONS FUNDED THROUGH 3434, AND SMART STATIONS
- 11 THROUGHOUT SONOMA AND MARIN COUNTY AS WELL AS MULTIPLE PLANS
- 12 IN EIGHT OF THE REGION'S NINE COUNTIES. BACK ONE. GRANT FUNDED
- 13 PLANS RANGE FROM RE-ENVISIONS CORRIDORS BY SAN PABLO PLAN AND
- 14 PLANNING ENTIRE NEIGHBORHOODS AROUND RAIL STATIONS SUCH AS
- 15 FARFIELD VACAVILLE TRAIN STATION PLAN, FOR SITES TO A DIVERSE
- 16 SET OF LAND USES THROUGH FREMONT'S WARM SPRINGS COMMUNITY PLAN
- 17 AND I'LL STOP FOR A MOMENT ON THE LAST WARM SPRINGS COMMUNITY
- 18 PLAN IT'S RELEVANT IN THAT IT TOOK PLACE AT A MOMENT OF GREAT
- 19 UNCERTAINTY. GRANT FUNDING ENABLED THE CITY OF FREMONT TO PLAN
- 20 DURING THE GREAT RECESSION FOR AN AREA THAT INCLUDED A FUTURE
- 21 BART STATION AND AT THE SITE OF THE RECENTLY CLOSED
- 22 [INDISCERNIBLE] AUTO PLAN. ADOPTED 2014 THE COMMUNITY DRIVEN
- 23 PLAN POSITIONED THE AREA FOR IMPLEMENTATION WITH THE RETURN OF
- 24 THE REAL ESTATE MARKET AND THE OPENING OF WARM SPRINGS BART
- 25 STATION WITH PART OF THE AREA REUSED AS THE TESLA FACTORY MOST



- 1 OF THE SITE WAS PLANNED AS A MIXED USE MIXED INCOME COMMUNITY.
- 2 MORE THAN HALF OF THE 5,000 PLANNED UNITS, STARTING WITH 500
- 3 AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY PARK
- 4 WERE EITHER BUILT OR UNDER CONSTRUCTION. THROUGH THE SEVEN
- 5 GRANT CYCLES THE PDA GRANT PROGRAM HAS EVOLVED TO MEET THE
- 6 CHANGING NEEDS OF THE JURISDICTIONS. IN ADVANCE OF THE FIRST
- 7 PLANNED BAY AREA, SMALLER DOLLAR TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS
- 8 WERE ADDED TO RESPOND TO SHARED IMPLEMENTATION OBSTACLES
- 9 IDENTIFIED BY CITIES WITH PDAS THROUGHOUT THE REGION. AND TO
- 10 ALLOW CITIES TO ADAPT TO CHANGES IN THE REAL ESTATE MARKET,
- 11 STATE LEGISLATION, OR COMMUNITY PRIORITIES, AND YOU CAN SEE ON
- 12 THE SCREEN, KIND OF THE ARRAY OF THINGS THAT HAVE BEEN
- 13 PROVIDED THROUGH THIS PROGRAM, AND TO SUPPORT CITIES IN
- 14 ADDRESSING THIS SPREAD OF CHALLENGES WE PROVIDED TECHNICALLY
- 15 DIVERSE STAFF AND CONSULTING TEAM TO CARRY THESE PROJECTS OUT
- 16 ON CALL. FEW EXAMPLES OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROJECTS.
- 17 STARTING IN THE LOWER RIGHT HAND CORNER IN SAN JOSE THE CITY'S
- 18 CONSOLIDATING COMMERCIAL INDUSTRIAL AND RESIDENTIAL DESIGN
- 19 GUIDELINES CREATED IN AN ERA OF SINGLE SEPARATED LAND USE IN
- 20 THE 1990S TO SET CLEAR EXPECTATIONS OF SITE DESIGN
- 21 ARCHITECTURE IN THE PROCESS THE CITIES ARE ALIGNING
- 22 DEVELOPMENT PROCESS WITH RECENT LEGISLATION SUCH AS HOUSING
- 23 ACCOUNTABILITY ACT THAT REDUCES DISCRETIONARY REVIEW WHILE
- 24 ENSURING THAT THIS IS ALIGNED WITH LOCAL PRIORITIES. ANOTHER
- 25 EXAMPLE OF CHANGING TO ADAPTING TO CHANGING CONDITIONS IS A



- 1 MULTI-CITY TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE GRANT THAT ENABLED FREMONT,
- 2 HAYWARD, AND CONCORD TO WORK TOGETHER AS PART OF A COHORT TO
- 3 UPDATE ITS TRANSPORTATION IMPACT ANALYSIS APPROACH TO REVIEW
- 4 THE AMOUNT OF AUTO TRAVEL CREATED BY NEW PROJECTS OR VMT, AND
- 5 EVERYONE HEREOF COURSE IS FAMILIAR WITH THAT TERM THROUGH
- 6 PLANNED BAY AREA AND THIS IS PART OF THE BODY OF LEGISLATION
- 7 THAT ALLOWS COMPLIANCE AS THEY MOVE AWAY FROM LEVEL OF SERVICE
- 8 APPROACH AS TO TRAFFIC CIRCULATION AND FINALLY TO EMERYVILLE
- 9 SUPPORTING APPROACH TO LIMITED ON-STREET PARKING SPACE.
- 10 LOOKING BACK OVER THE FIRST SEVEN CYCLING SOME OF THE
- 11 SUCCESSES SIMPLY TO SCALE THE IMPACT, TO GO TO CONFERENCES
- 12 IT'S THE NATIONAL MODEL, WE EXPOSED THE NUMBER OF NEW UNITS
- 13 AND FLOOR SPACE FACILITATED BY THE PROJECT AND INTEGRATION OF
- 14 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION INVESTMENT WITH LOCAL PLANNING AND THE
- 15 ABILITY TO EVOLVE TO MEET CHANGING LOCAL NEEDS AND ALSO
- 16 ENABLING CRITICAL PLANS TO MOVE FORWARD THROUGH FINANCIAL DOWN
- 17 TURNS SET OFFING THE STAGE FOR THE NEXT DEVELOPMENT CYCLE. AND
- 18 I APOLOGIZE, THAT IS NOT MINE. THERE IS ANOTHER PERSON IN MY
- 19 HOUSEHOLD HERE. SO, SOME OF THE CHALLENGES, THE AFFORDABILITY
- 20 OF NEW HOMES, UNEVEN BUILD-OUT OF ANTICIPATED OFFICE AND
- 21 RETAIL, THERE ARE MANY CASE IN WHICH WE HAVE SEEN A DESIRE FOR
- 22 A RANGE OF USES AND IT'S CHALLENGING TO GET THOSE WHEREAS
- 23 RESIDENTIAL HAS TENDED TO GO FASTER OR AT LEAST HAPPENED WHEN
- 24 THE MARKET PICKS UP, AND WE HAVE SEEN IN THE OVERVIEW DEMANDS
- 25 TO REDUCE RACIAL INEQUITY IN THE MOST RECENT ROUND OF PLANNING



- 1 GRANTS. WE HAVE A CLEAR SET OF CHALLENGES ON OUR PLATE. AND I
- 2 DO WANT TO MOVE BACK TO, AND THIS IS BOTH A SUCCESS AND A
- 3 CHALLENGE, THE PIECE ABOUT ENABLING PLANS TO MOVE FORWARD
- 4 THROUGH FINANCIAL DOWN TURNS BECAUSE THIS IS ONE OF THOSE
- 5 TIMES, I THINK, WHEN CITIES ARE -- [INDISCERNIBLE] THAT
- 6 FINANCIALLY -- THIS IS A TIME WE WANT TO HELP FACILITATE THAT.
- 7 PLANNING GRANTS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WILL TAKE PLACE
- 8 DURING THE UPDATED REGIONAL GROWTH FRAMEWORK AND THE 2050
- 9 BLUEPRINT. AND A BIG PART OF THIS IS THE UPDATED PDA CRITERIA
- 10 AND DEFINITION THAT THIS COMMITTEE ADOPTED IN 2019. AND TO
- 11 REFRESH YOUR MEMORY THIS INVOLVED ESTABLISHING TWO PDA
- 12 CATEGORIES TO RECOGNIZE THE DIVERSITY OF THE REGION'S
- 13 COMMUNITIES AND CHANGES IN MOBILITY OPTIONS. AS WELL AS
- 14 UPDATING THE DEFINITION OF PDAS TO INTEGRATE RACIAL EQUITY
- 15 ACCESS TO OPPORTUNITY AND JOBS. SO LOOKING AHEAD, THE 2021
- 16 CALL FOR PDA PLANNING GRANTS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. BASED
- 17 ON ALL OF OUR CONVERSATIONS WITH LOCAL STAFF, HERE ARE SOME OF
- 18 THE THINGS THAT WE'RE ANTICIPATING PEOPLE MIGHT BE LOOKING
- 19 FOR, AND WE'RE INTERESTED, AT THE CONCLUSION OF THIS
- 20 PRESENTATION, HEARING ALL OF YOUR THOUGHTS AS WELL. FIRST WE
- 21 HAVE THE HOST OF PDAS WITH ADOPTED PLANS. IN THOSE CITIES
- 22 OFTENTIMES WE SEE A NEED FOR PLAN AND ZONING CODE AMENDMENTS.
- 23 THEIR SITUATIONS LIKE WE SAW EARLIER THE SAN PABLO AVENUE
- 24 SPECIFIC PLAN THEY HAVE COMPLETELY PERMITTED THE DEVELOPMENT
- 25 IN THEIR FIRST EIR SO THEY NEED A NEW ONE. THERE ARE



- 1 SITUATIONS LIKE THAT AND SITUATION WHERE IS THERE IS
- 2 OVERESTIMATION OF DEVELOPMENT THAT THE PLAN WOULD ATTRACT
- 3 THERE IS A NEED TO MAKE ADJUSTMENTS THERE. TECHNICAL
- 4 SITUATIONS TEND TO OVERCOME OBSTACLE. THEN WE HAVE THE PDAS
- 5 ADOPTED THIS YEAR AND PDAS ALREADY IN PLACE THAT DON'T HAVE
- 6 PLANS AS PART OF THE UPDATED CRITERIA WE NEED TO HAVE THOSE
- 7 PLANS ADOPTED BY 2025 IN THOSE CASES WE NEED TO SUPPORT NEW
- 8 SPECIFIC PLANS AND PROGRAMMATIC EIRS IN SUPPORT OF THOSE. AND
- 9 THEN REGION WIDE, WE WANT TO HELP PROVIDE SORT OF A MORE ON-
- 10 CALL, ON-DEMAND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE APPROACH THAT ALLOWS
- 11 PEOPLE TO ADDRESS SOME OF THE UNANTICIPATED ISSUES THAT ARISE
- 12 DURING PLANNING PROCESSES. ALSO, WE KNOW PEOPLE NEED TO
- 13 CONTINUE TO ADAPT TO TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING POLICY SOME OF
- 14 THIS IS RELATED TO STATE LEGISLATION SOME RELATED TO THINGS
- 15 THAT ARISE ORGANICALLY FROM THE GROUND ALSO PROCESS
- 16 ENHANCEMENTS IN TERMS OF BEING ABLE TO HAVE THE CAPACITY TO

- 21 FORWARD. SO, THE PDA PROGRAMS NEXT ROUND OF PLANNING GRANTS
- 22 AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WILL ALSO YOU ROLL OUT AT THE SAME
- 23 TIME AS THE REGIONAL EARLY ACTION PROGRAM. THAT IS GOING TO BE
- 24 DISCUSSED THIS MONTH BY THE ABAG HOUSING COMMITTEE AND ABAG
- 25 EXECUTIVE BOARD. YOU'RE SEEING IT HERE ON THE SCREEN NEXT TO



- 1 THE PDA PROGRAM, BECAUSE WHAT WE LIKE TO DO IN THIS ROUND IS
- 2 TO COMBINE THESE TWO, SO THAT WE MAKE THE MOST OF THE
- 3 AVAILABLE RESOURCES, SHARED EXPERTISE OF JOINT STAFF, AS WELL
- 4 AS MAKE THINGS EASIER FOR CITIES AND LOCAL STAFF WHO ARE
- 5 INCREASINGLY STRAPPED. WHILE REAP IS SOUARELY FOCUSED ON
- 6 HOUSING AND THE PDA PROGRAM SITS AT THE INTERSECTION OF
- 7 HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION MANY OF THE PROGRAMS FUND THE SAME
- 8 ACTIVITIES SUCH AS ZONING AMENDMENTS AND PDAS IN OTHER AREAS
- 9 NEAR TRANSIT AND SAME WOULD APPLY TYPICALLY WITH GRANTS FROM
- 10 LOCAL PROGRAMS. AND GIVEN THE URGENT NEED FOR REGIONAL SUPPORT
- 11 STAFF PROPOSED TO STREAMLINE THE APPLICATION PROCESS FOR REAP
- 12 AND PDA PLANNING THROUGH A SINGLE INTEGRATE THE CALL FOR
- 13 LETTERS OF INTEREST USING A CHECK BOX APPROACH LOCAL
- 14 APPLICANTS WOULD IDENTIFY AND DESCRIBE TYPES OF SUPPORT NEEDED
- 15 YOU CAN SEE EXAMPLES OF HOW THAT WOULD WORK ON THE RIGHT AND
- 16 REGIONAL STAFF WOULD MATCH FUNDS WITH AVAILABLE RESOURCES FROM
- 17 BOTH PROGRAMS AND RETURN TO THE PLANNING COMMITTEE FOR
- 18 AUTHORIZATION TO PROCEED WITH THE RECOMMENDED PROJECTS. HERE
- 19 ARE SOME OF THE NEXT STEPS. WE HAVE RELEASED WE'RE PLANNING ON
- 20 THE NEAR TERM RELEASING REQUEST FOR QUALIFICATIONS FOR
- 21 CONSULTANT BENCH THAT WOULD SERVE NEEDS ACROSS THESE CITIES IN
- 22 VARIOUS AREAS OF PLANNING AND DOING A CALL FOR LOCAL PLANNING
- 23 AND HOUSING ASSISTANCE, THAT WOULD BE A LETTER OF INTEREST
- 24 TARGETED IN LATE DECEMBER AND WE'LL ALSO COME BACK TO REQUEST
- 25 APPROVAL OF THE BENCH AS FAR AS REQUESTING APPROVAL FOR THE



1 PLANNING GRANTS AND TA AWARDS WE ANTICIPATE THAT HAPPENING IN 2 MARCH. AND WITH THAT WE'LL OPEN UP FOR DISCUSSION.

- 22 LAST MONTH THAT DIRECTED STAFF TO LOOK AT THE TELECOMMUTE
- 23 STRATEGY, WE HEARD FROM KEY BUSINESS ORGANIZATIONS AND THREE
- 24 CITY MAYORS AND SEVERAL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES INCLUDING THE
- 25 REGIONAL TRANSIT AGENCIES THEIR CONCERN IS THE EFFECT THIS



- 1 POLICY WOULD HAVE ON THEIR RIDERSHIP POST COVID-19. I AM SURE
- 2 MOST OF YOU HAVE BEEN CONTACTED ABOUT THIS ISSUE, THERE HAS
- 3 BEEN A LOT OF DISCUSSION IN THE REGION ABOUT THE TELECOMMUTING
- 4 STRATEGY, AND I WANT TO THANK MAYOR LICCARDO AND MAYOR SCHAFF,
- 5 BOTH HAVE BEEN WORKING WITH US TRYING TO COME UP WITH A POLICY
- 6 THAT'S GOING TO WORK AND STILL MEET OUR GREENHOUSE GAS
- 7 REOUIREMENTS. BASED ON THE FEEDBACK WE RECEIVED, STAFF HAS

- 13 COMMITTEE, AND WE SAID, YOU KNOW, WHATEVER CHANGES ARE MADE,
- 14 THAT WE ARE NOT GOING TO REDUCE OR NOT HIT OUR TARGET OF THAT
- 15 19 PERCENT. THE APPROACH WE'RE TAKING DOESN'T SOLELY RELY ON
- 16 THE TELECOMMUTING AND THE ALTERNATIVE WILL PROVIDE MORE OF A
- 17 CAFETERIA STYLE APPROACH WHERE EACH EMPLOYEE CAN CHOOSE FROM A
- 18 TRIP REDUCTION OPTIONS THAT WORK FOR THEIR PARTICULAR OPTIONS
- 19 WE HOPE TO BRING TOGETHER THE STRATEGY EN SEVEN AT THE
- 20 COMMISSION MEETING, A LOT OF WORK IS BEING DONE ON THIS AND I
- 21 DON'T KNOW IF MAYOR LICCARDO WANTED TO COMMENT. HE HAS BEEN
- 22 WORKING IN HELPING US DEVELOP THIS NEW STRATEGY THAT'S A QUICK
- 23 OVERVIEW ON THE TELECOMMUTING STRATEGY. AND I WANT TO LET
- 24 EVERYONE KNOW WE'RE WORKING ON THIS WE TOOK COMMENTS SERIOUSLY
- 25 AND WE UNDERSTAND THE IMPACT IT WAS HAVING ON THE BAY AREA,



- 1 AND THE CONCERNS THAT BUSINESS HAD AND MANY OF THE ELECTED
- 2 OFFICIALS. SAM UNLESS YOU HAVE ANY COMMENT I WAS GOING TO TURN
- 3 IT OVER TO CHIRAG RABARI TO PRESENT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION

- 25 ABAG DEVELOPED FOR THE PREVIOUS LONG RANGE PLAN PLANNED BAY



- 1 AREA 2040, WHICH SAW MOVING IN THE WRONG DIRECTION AND CASA
- 2 WAS A NOTABLE INITIATIVE THAT GREW OUT OF THE ACTION PLAN.
- 3 WITH THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN, WE'RE HOPING TO BUILD ON THE
- 4 SUCCESSES OF THE ACTION PLAN BY DEVELOPING AN EVEN MORE
- 5 COMPREHENSIVE EFFORT. THIS TIME ONE THAT IS LIKE PLANNED BAY
- 6 AREA 2050 ITSELF, MORE STRATEGY FOCUSSED IN NATURE. HERE WE'RE
- 7 GOING TO LOOK AT ARTICULATING THE SPECIFIC SHORT-TERM ACTIONS
- 8 THAT WE AND OUR PARTNERS CAN TAKE TO FULFILL THE GOALS AND
- 9 VISION OF THE PLAN AND ADVANCE ITS 30 PLUS ADOPTED STRATEGIES
- 10 OVER THE NEXT 1 TO 5 YEARS. WE ENVISION PARTNERSHIP AND
- 11 COLLABORATION AS A MAJOR COMPONENT OF THIS EFFORT. VERY FEW OF
- 12 THE STRATEGIES PROPOSED IN THE PLAN CAN BE IMPLEMENTED BY MTC
- 13 AND ABAG ALONE. OUR INTENTION IS TO ENGAGE LOCAL GOVERNMENTS,
- 14 AGENCIES THE PUBLIC, CIVIC AGENCIES NON-PROFIT AND BROAD ARRAY
- 15 OF STAKEHOLDERS AS WE NAVIGATE THROUGH CHALLENGES. ALTHOUGH
- 16 THIS CAN CHANGE AND EVOLVE AS THE PROCESS MOVES FORWARD WE
- 17 HAVE IDENTIFIED FOUR GOALS FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PLAN
- 18 FIRST MAXIMIZE THE VIABILITY OF THE PLAN'S STRATEGIES WITH
- 19 FOCUS ON EOUITY EFFECTIVENESS AND EFFICIENCY. WE WANT TO
- 20 REINFORCE THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF EXISTING INTERNAL, EXTERNAL,
- 21 OR HYBRID INITIATIVES THAT COMPLIMENT THE STRATEGY AND VISION
- 22 THIS MEANS IMPLEMENTATIONS RECOMMENDATIONS EFFORT ANDS OF BLUE
- 23 RIBBON TRANSIT RECOVERY TASK FORCE. WE WANT TO BE RESPONSIVE
- 24 TO ISSUES RAISED BY PARTNERS STAKEHOLDERS AND THE PUBLIC. AND
- 25 FINALLY WE WANT TO MAKE SURE WE ADDRESSING ALL OF OUR



- 1 TECHNICAL OBLIGATIONS AND REOUIRES AS DEFINED BY THE REGIONAL
- 2 TRANSPORTATION PLAN COMMUNITY STRATEGY BY THE TRANSPORTATION
- 3 COMMISSION. NEXT SLIDE. IT'S IMPORTANT TO OFFER A QUICK
- 4 CLARIFICATION BETWEEN THE STRATEGY AND IMPLEMENTATION ACTION
- 5 AS WE HAVE PRESENTED BEFORE WE DEFINE STRATEGIES AS EITHER
- 6 PUBLIC POLICY OR SET OF INVESTMENTS THAT CAN BE IMPLEMENTED
- 7 OVER THE 30 YEAR HORIZON OF PLANNED BAY AREA 2050. STRATEGIES
- 8 ARE NOT THERE FOR NEAR TERM ACTIONS OR LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS.
- 9 BY CONTRAST IMPLEMENTATION ACTIVITIES ARE THE SPECIFIC ACTIONS
- 10 REQUIRED TO MOVE THOSE PUBLIC POLICIES INVESTMENTS FORWARD. WE
- 11 SEE THESE AS THE WHO, WHAT, WHERE, WHEN AND HOW OF MAKING THE
- 12 STRATEGIES A REALITY WITH A FOCUS ON THE NEXT 1 TO 5 YEARS.
- 13 NEXT SLIDE. AS THE IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS MOVES FORWARD WE
- 14 HAVE DEFINED SPECIFIC IMPLEMENTATION OBJECTIVES FOR EACH PLAN
- 15 STRATEGY. WE WILL BE WORKING THROUGH THE IDENTIFICATION AND
- 16 RECOMMENDATION PROCESS COLLECTIVELY WITH PARTNERS AND
- 17 STAKEHOLDERS FIRST UNDERSTANDING THE PRIMARY ELEMENTS THAT A
- 18 GIVEN STRATEGY REQUIRES TO SUCCEED WHETHER THAT'S LEGAL
- 19 AUTHORITY AS DEFINED THROUGH LEGISLATION, REOUISITE CONTROL
- 20 AND STABILITY INSTITUTION WRAP AROUND OF STAFFING KNOWLEDGE
- 21 AND PROCEDURE AS WELL AS PUBLIC AND POLITICAL SUPPORT. GIVEN
- 22 THOSE STRATEGIES SUCCESS REQUIREMENTS WE WANT TO IDENTIFY AN
- 23 APPROPRIATE MTC ABAG ROLE FOR IMPLEMENTATION WHETHER TO LEAD,
- 24 PARTNER, OR SUPPORT, AND IMPORTANTLY IDENTIFY WHO THE
- 25 APPROPRIATE PARTNERS ARE AS WELL AS THEIR EXPECTED ROLES AND



- 1 RESPONSIBILITIES. WE WANT TO IDENTIFY THE APPROPRIATE VEHICLES
- 2 FOR STRATEGY IMPLEMENTATION, WHETHER IT'S ADVOCACY
- 3 LEGISLATION, CONVENING TASK FORCE, A NEW PROJECT OR PROGRAM OR
- 4 PERHAPS PLANNING AND RESEARCH AND THEN WE WANT TO IDENTIFY
- 5 DETAILED IMPLEMENTATION ACTIONS INCLUDING TIME FRAMES FOR
- 6 IMPLEMENTATION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. OUR INITIAL INTERNAL WORK
- 7 IS FOCUSED ON CONDUCTING AN ASSESSMENT OF THE REQUIREMENTS FOR
- 8 STRATEGY SUCCESS ACROSS THE PLAN'S 30 PLUS STRATEGIES AS WELL
- 9 AS GETTING LAY OF THE LAND ON INITIATIVES WE'LL REVIEW A FEW
- 10 INITIAL OUTPUTS FROM THIS WORK IN A MOMENT. EXTERNAL
- 11 ENGAGEMENT PHASE KICKS OFF TODAY INCLUDING TWO LARGE VIRTUAL
- 12 STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS HELD NOVEMBER 17TH AND NOVEMBER 19TH,
- 13 THESE WILL BE VIRTUAL BRAINSTORMING MEETINGS FOR US AND OUR
- 14 PARTNERS AND STAKEHOLDERS TO PULL TOGETHER SOME INITIALLY
- 15 IDEAS ON OBJECTIVES ARTICULATED STRATEGIES REQUIREMENTS, ROLES
- 16 AND RESPONSIBILITIES IMPLEMENTATION VEHICLES AND DETAILED
- 17 ACTIONS. THIS WILL BE FOLLOWED BY OFFICE HOURS AND SMALL GROUP
- 18 MEETINGS AS IN DECEMBER AS WE IDENTIFY AREAS WHERE ADDITIONAL
- 19 DEEPER AND MORE FOCUSED CONVERSATIONS AND FOLLOW-UPS ARE
- 20 REQUIRED. DURING THE EARLY PART OF 2021 WE'LL BE DOING PUBLIC
- 21 OUTREACH FOCUSED ON LOW INCOME COMMUNITIES AND THOSE WITHOUT
- 22 INTERNET, NON-ENGLISH SPEAKERS, PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES,
- 23 YOUTH, AS WELL AS OUTREACH TO EOUITY CBOS WE'LL RETURN TO THE
- 24 COMMITTEES IN FEBRUARY TO PRESENT ON WHAT WE HAVE LEARNED AND
- 25 GIVE A PREVIEW OF THE DRAFT IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AS WELL AS GET



- 1 GUIDANCE ON CONTINUED POTENTIAL ENGAGEMENT FOR SPRING AND
- 2 SUMMER, THE DRAFT PRESENTATION WILL BE RELEASED IN CONJUNCTION
- 3 WITH THE DRAFT EIR AND IT'S STILL TO BE DETERMINED BUT WE'RE
- 4 ANTICIPATING IN THE SPRING AND SUMMER THAT WE'LL MEET FOCUS
- 5 GROUPS TO FIGURE OUT THE PARTNERSHIPS NECESSARY TO IMPLEMENT
- 6 STRATEGIES AND THIS MAY FOCUS ON COMPLICATED COMPLEX OR
- 7 POLITICALLY CHALLENGED ITEMS THAT EMERGE THROUGH THE PUBLIC
- 8 PROCESS IN THE FALL AND WINTER. AND AT THIS POINT, WE'LL ALSO
- 9 BE DOING OUR OWN INTERNAL RESOURCE ASSESSMENTS AND
- 10 PRIORITIZATION TO MAKE SURE FOR EXAMPLE, THAT ANY WORK THAT'S
- 11 IDENTIFIED FOR THE REGIONAL PLANNING PROGRAM, FOR EXAMPLE, IS
- 12 CONSISTENT WITH OUR WORK PLAN, AND VICE-VERSA. AND THEN
- 13 FINALLY THE FINAL IMPLEMENTATION PLAN WILL BE RELEASED IN FALL
- 14 OF 2021. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE HERE WE WANTED TO PROVIDE A HIGH
- 15 LEVEL SUMMARY OF THE KIND OF WORK THAT WILL BE PRESENTED IN
- 16 GREATER DETAIL AT NOVEMBER STAKEHOLDER WORKSHOPS IN A COUPLE
- 17 OF WEEKS AND TO GIVE INSIGHT HOW WE'RE THINKING ABOUT THE
- 18 FRAMEWORK FOR EVALUATING THE STRATEGIES. FIRST WE WANT TO
- 19 CONDUCT AN ASSESSMENT LOOKING AT FOUR FACTORS FOR STRATEGIES
- 20 SUCCESS DESCRIBED EARLIER AUTHORITY FINANCIAL RESOURCES
- 21 TECHNICAL CAPACITY AND PUBLIC POLITICAL SUPPORT. THE IDEA HERE
- 22 WAS TO GET AN INITIAL PICTURE THAT WOULD FIRST HELP GET US
- 23 ORIENTED WITH RESPECT TO MTC'S ABAG POTENTIAL ROLE IN STRATEGY
- 24 IMPLEMENTATION AND SECOND TO IDENTIFY CHALLENGES AND
- 25 OPPORTUNITY THAT COULD INFORM THE DEVELOPMENT OF SPECIFIC



- 1 IMPLEMENTATION ACTIVITIES IN CONCERT WITH OUR PARTNERS AND
- 2 STAKEHOLDERS. ON THE QUESTION OF OUR ROLE, GENERALLY SPEAKING,
- 3 IF WE'RE GOING TO LEAD, WE EITHER WANT TO HAVE OR BE IN A GOOD
- 4 POSITION TO SECURE ALL THE FOUR FACTORS FOR STRATEGY SUCCESS.
- 5 IF WE ARE GOING TO PARTNER PERHAPS WE MAY HAVE OR WILL BE ABLE
- 6 TO SECURE SOME BUT NOT ALL OF THOSE FACTORS. BY CONTRAST IN A
- 7 SUPPORT ROLE, WE MAY NOT BE IN THE BEST POSITION TO SECURE
- 8 STRATEGY TO IMPLEMENT STRATEGY BUT WE HAVE AN IMPORTANT ROLE
- 9 TO PLAY IN GENERATING POLITICAL SUPPORT. AS YOU CAN SEE MANY
- 10 OF THE STRATEGIES EXIST ON A SPECTRUM, FOR SOME OF THE
- 11 ECONOMIC STRATEGIES IN THE PLAN, YOU KNOW, HAVING LIMITED
- 12 AUTHORITY IS CERTAINLY A CHALLENGE, AND WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO
- 13 WORK WITH OUR PARTNERS TO FIGURE OUT WHAT THE BEST APPROACH IS
- 14 TO MOVE THOSE FORWARD WHEREAS WITH SOMETHING LIKE EXPANDING
- 15 CLEAN VEHICLE INITIATIVES A LOT OF THE TOOLS ARE ALREADY IN
- 16 PLACE TO IMPLEMENT THAT. SIMILARLY WITH FUNDING, IN SOME
- 17 CASES, YOU KNOW, THEIR EXISTING FUNDING SOURCES THAT CAN BE
- 18 DIRECTED TOWARDS MAKING A STRATEGY A REALITY. IN OTHER CASES,
- 19 THERE IS LESS FUNDING AVAILABLE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AND,
- 20 AGAIN, SIMILARLY WITH TECHNICAL CAPACITY AND PUBLIC POLITICAL
- 21 SUPPORT. YOU KNOW, AGAIN, WITH SOME OF THE ECONOMIC
- 22 STRATEGIES, YOU KNOW, WE MAY NOT BE IN THE BEST POSITION IN
- 23 TERMS OF OUR CAPACITY, BUT ON THE TRANSPORTATION SIDE MAYBE
- 24 WE'RE IN A BETTER POSITION. I WANT TO EMPHASIZE OUR ATTENTION
- 25 HERE IS NOT ONLY TO FOCUS ON AREAS WHERE WE MAY SCORE HIGH PER



- 1 SE INSTEAD OF, AND IN COLLABORATION WITH YOU AND MANY
- 2 STAKEHOLDERS WE HOPE THIS WILL HELP CLARIFY WHERE THE NEEDS
- 3 ARE, WHERE THE OPPORTUNITIES ARE, WHAT THE APPROPRIATE
- 4 IMPLEMENTATION VEHICLES AND ACTIONS ARE, AND AS WELL AS WHAT

- 10 OUR GOVERNMENT PARTNERS, AND THEN THERE IS A BROAD WORLD IN

- 23 FURTHER REFINED AS WE MOVE FORWARD WITH AN EYE TOWARDS MAPPING
- 24 IN GREATER DETAIL THESE DIFFERENT COMPLIMENTARY INITIATIVES
- 25 AND PARTNERS TO SPECIFIC THEMES AND STRATEGIES IN THE PLAN.

- 16 AGO, AND THAT'S THE REASON TESLA HAS BEEN DELAYED, WHILE TESLA

- 11 OTHER ISSUE THAT HAS BEEN COMING UP CONSISTENTLY IN MY COUNTY,
- 12 I SUSPECT IT HAS IN ALL OF YOURS AS WELL. THE BUZZ THAT THIS
- 13 STUDY FROM THE EMBARCADERO INSTITUTE AND CITING FREDDIE MAC
- 14 STUDIES AND THAT SORT OF THING, HAS REALLY RAISED SOME
- 15 CONCERNS AND IT'S CREATING A LOT OF ANGST, AND FRANKLY, I HAVE
- 16 SEEN THE DOCUMENTS, I HAVE TRIED TO SKIM THEM, BUT THERE ARE
- 17 HUNDREDS OF PAGES. IT'S VERY TECHNICAL. AND I'M REALLY HOPING
- 18 THAT STAFF CAN GIVE US A BIT OF A COMPREHENSIVE RESPONSE TO
- 19 THIS, SO THAT WHEN THESE QUESTIONS COME TO US, WE KNOW WHAT
- 20 WE'RE TALKING ABOUT, AND CAN ADDRESS THE CONCERNS THAT SOUND
- 21 VERY VIABLE, BUT I HAVE DONE SOME TALKING WITH STAFF FROM THE
- 22 -- WELL, FROM CALCOG AND OTHERS THAT PUT MY MIND SOMEWHAT AT
- 23 REST, BUT I THINK IT WOULD BE REALLY HELPFUL FOR ALL OF US TO
- 24 GET A RESPONSE BACK TO THESE CHARGES. I MEAN, SOUTHERN
- 25 CALIFORNIA HAS GOT 50 CITIES ON BOARD THAT ARE CHALLENGING THE



- 1 NUMBERS THAT WE HAVE ALL GOTTEN FROM HCD. SO I WOULD REALLY
- 2 APPRECIATE -- NOT NECESSARILY OFF THE TOP OF YOUR HEAD HERE,
- 3 BUT MAYBE AT OUR RESPECTIVE BOARD MEETINGS, IF WE COULD GET A
- 4 RESPONSE THAT PUTS THAT STUDY INTO A CONTEXT THAT MAKES SENSE
- 5 FOR ALL OF US BECAUSE WE'RE ALL BEING CHARGED TO ANSWER THE
- 6 QUESTION. SO I WOULD LIKE TO ASK THAT SO THAT WE CAN CARRY
- 7 THAT BACK TO OUR RESPECT OF AGENCIES.
