PLEASE RAISE YOUR HAND IF YOU WISH TO SPEAK. KAREN MITCHOFF: THANK YOU. I STILL CAN'T BELIEVE THAT WE'RE IN 3 THIS PANDEMIC TO THE EXTENT THAT WE CAN'T WISH OUR COLLEAGUES 4 5 A GOODBYE IN PERSON, AND TO ALL THOSE YOU MENTIONED, PRESIDENT ARREGUIN THEY HAVE SERVED WITH SUCH DISTINCTION. BUT, THERE IS 6 NO BUTS. BUT THE REASON I'M SPEAKING DIRECTLY ABOUT SCOTT, IS 7 8 HE HAS JUST BEEN A WONDERFUL SUPPORTER, A WONDERFUL FRIEND, A TERRIFIC SUPERVISOR. SCOTT KEEPS A LIST. YOU DON'T WANT TO BE ON THAT LIST, AND IF WE DO SOMETHING WRONG, IT WOULD NOT 17 18 SURPRISE ME TO SEE HIM SHOW UP AT A MEETING. IT IS NOT PAST SCOTT HAGGERTY IF HE'S BEEN WRONG OR HE FEELS SOMETHING WRONG, 19 TO COME BACK, AND DON'T TRY TO STOP HIM AT THREE MINUTES OF 20 PUBLIC COMMENT. SO SCOTT, JUST LET ME KNOW WHAT YOUR ADDRESS S 21 BECAUSE I MIGHT BE MOVING IN NEXT TO YOU IN A COUPLE YEARS 22 WHEN THIS IS OVER. [LAUGHTER] THANKS FOR SOME GREAT TIMES. 23 24

WE DO HAVE THIS AS PART OF OUR STATE ADVOCACY PROGRAM, BUT WE'RE STILL VERY HOPEFUL AND 17 THINGS ARE LOOKING ENCOURAGING THAT WE MIGHT SEE SOME 18 ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDING THERE WHICH WOULD OFFSET THE NEED 19 AT THE STATE LEVEL. AND THEN JUST TO KIND OF SHARE WITH YOU, 20 21 BECAUSE I AM SURE YOU'RE ALSO INTERESTED IN TRANSIT AGENCY TRANSFORMATION. MTC HAS CONVENED THIS BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT 22 RECOVERY TASK FORCE. AND SO A BIG FOCUS OF OUR ADVOCACY 23 PROGRAM ON TRANSPORTATION IS GOING TO BE LOOKING AT 24 IMPLEMENTING RECOMMENDATIONS COMING OUT OF THAT TASK FORCE. 25

WHICH, YOU KNOW, IS SCHEDULED RIGHT NOW TO RELEASE ITS 1 2 RECOMMENDATION IN JUNE, BUT ASSEMBLYMEMBER CHIU IS VERY 3 INTERESTED IN AUTHORING A BILL ON THIS, SO WE THINK THAT CONVERSATION WILL GET STARTED PRIOR TO JUNE. SO, MOVING ON TO 4 5 ITEM THREE, WHICH IS HOUSING. WE HAVE AN ITEM IN THERE, 3B THAT WE HAVE WORKED QUITE A BIT WITH THE LEGISLATION COMMITTEE 6 TO REFINE THE LANGUAGE ON, AND ESSENTIALLY THIS IS ABOUT 7 8 HOUSING PRODUCTION. AND YOU KNOW, ARTICULATING SUPPORT FOR, YOU KNOW, GENERAL, A VARIETY OF BILLS THAT ARE GOING TO ASSIST 9 LOCAL JURISDICTIONS IN, YOU KNOW, FACILITATING INCREASED 10 HOUSING, SUCH THAT, YOU KNOW, WE'RE ALL ASKED TO DO UNDER 11 RHNA, PARTICULARLY FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING. WE HAD A GOOD 12 CONVERSATION LAST WEEK ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF ANY KIND OF 13 LEGISLATION THAT'S TRYING TO INCENTIVIZE HOUSING CONSTRUCTION 14 15 INCLUDING ANTI- PROVISIONS AND REALLY PRIORITIZING 16 CONSTRUCTION OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING. WE TOOK SOME POSITIONS ON 17 BILLS LAST YEAR WHICH HAVE BEEN REINTRODUCED. SO ONE OF THOSE, FOR EXAMPLE, HAS TO DO WITH ALLOWING ZONING CHANGES FOR MODEST 18 UPZONING TO BE FACILITATED WITHOUT REQUIRING A CEQA DOCUMENT 19 FOR THE ZONING CHANGE ITSELF. THAT'S ARTICULATED TO SOMETHING 20 THAT WE WOULD SUPPORT. SO THOSE ARE KIND OF THE NATURE OF 21 ITEMS IN ITEM 3B, ALONG WITH ALLOWING HOUSING TO BE A 22 PERMITTED USE IN COMMERCIAL CORRIDORS, SUCH AS SHOPPING MALLS, 23 OFFICE PARKS, AND MAJOR COMMERCIAL CORRIDORS, AS ROADWAYS. 24 SUBJECT TO LOCAL APPROVAL, BUT WITHOUT REQUIRING ZONING 25

CHANGES. SO, THAT IS ITEM 3B, WHICH I AM SURE FOLKS MAY HAVE 1 2 QUESTIONS ON, AND IS OF INTEREST. THE NEXT HOUSING RELATED 3 ITEM IN OUR ADVOCACY PROGRAM IS ITEM 3C, AND THIS IS SEEKING A ONE TIME FUNDING ALLOCATION FROM THE STATE BUDGET. WE DON'T 4 5 OFTEN LOOK FOR DEDICATED FUNDING OUTSIDE OF NORMAL PROGRAMS, BUT WE REALLY SEE AN OPPORTUNITY AND AN URGENCY TO SECURE SOME 6 FUNDING TO HELP POSITION ABAG, MTC, AND OUR NEW BAY AREA 7 8 HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, THANKS TO A.B. 1487, TO DO SOME PILOT PROJECTS ACROSS THE THREE P'S OF PROTECTION, PRODUCTION, 9 AND PRESERVATION THAT WILL REALLY POSITION OUR AGENCY TO BE 10 READY WHEN A BALLOT MEASURE LOOKS LIKE IT'S READY TO GO, AND 11 THAT WE COULD SECURE SIGNIFICANT FUNDING TO DELIVER. AND SO 12 THESE PILOTS, YOU KNOW, WILL BASICALLY DO SOME DEMONSTRATION 13 PROJECTS THAT WILL HELP US GET THERE. AND THIS FUNDING AMOUNT, 14 YOU KNOW, WE HAD STARTED WITH A SLIGHTLY LOWER AMOUNT BUT IN 15 16 LIGHT OF THE SURPLUS AT THE STATE BUDGET WE THOUGHT THAT WAS AN APPROPRIATE ASK. IN ADDITION TO THE PILOTS WE'RE ALSO 17 LOOKING AT FUNDING SOME PRESERVATION CAPITAL PROJECTS 18 DIRECTLY. AND THEN, FOR THE FIRST TIME WE HAVE PUT IN OUR 19 ADVOCACY PROGRAM, AN ITEM SPECIFICALLY ON HOMELESSNESS. 20 21 BECAUSE WE DO, YOU KNOW, BELIEVE THAT THAT'S JUST OF SUCH URGENCY, AND THAT WE ARE IN A POSITION AS A REGIONAL AGENCY 22 PARTICULARLY NOW THAT WE HAVE ESTABLISHED BAHFA WITH ITS 23 FINANCING CAPACITY TO DO SOME WORK ON THE PREVENTION SIDE, 24 REALLY, SO LOOKING AT HOW DO WE PREVENT PEOPLE FROM BECOMING 25

HOMELESS IN THE FIRST PLACE, AND HOW CAN WE HAVE SOME 1 2 ECONOMIES OF SCALE AND COORDINATION ROLE AT THE REGIONAL LEVEL 3 THERE. I'M MOVING QUICKLY, BECAUSE THE REST OF THESE ITEMS HAVE BEEN IN OUR PROGRAM THIS CURRENT YEAR. BUT THE NEXT 4 5 HIGHLIGHTED CATEGORY IS ITEM 8A RELATED TO SB 375 AND THIS AS YOU KNOW IS KIND OF THE FOUNDATIONAL STATUTE THAT ESTABLISHED 6 THE SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES STRATEGY, WHICH IS THE, WHAT WE'RE 7 8 CURRENTLY CALLING PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 THIS'S OUR CURRENT VERSION OF OUR SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES STRATEGY. WE BASICALLY 9 THINK IT'S TIME FOR A REFRESH ON THIS. THE BILL WAS SIGNED IN 10 2008, AND YOU KNOW, THERE IS A VARIETY OF THINGS WE WOULD LIKE 11 TO ENGAGE WITH THE STATE AND OUR PARTNERS ON POTENTIAL REFORMS 12 THERE, YOU KNOW, ONE OF WHICH REALLY HAS TO DO WITH TRYING TO 13 EXPAND THE SCOPE OF THE SDS, SO IT'S NOT JUST THINKING ABOUT, 14 15 AND SINGLE FOCUSED ON GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION. IT'S ALSO INCORPORATING CONCERNS ABOUT EQUITY, ABOUT FAIR HOUSING, 16 BECAUSE RIGHT NOW IT'S -- IT CREATES SOME CHALLENGES WITH SOME 17 OF OUR OTHER PLANS, SUCH AS RHNA WHICH WE'RE GOING TO BE 18 TALKING ABOUT LATER THIS EVENING. AND WE ALSO WOULD LIKE TO 19 HAVE MORE FLEXIBILITY WITH THE STATE AND REALLY BE WORKING 20 21 MORE IN PARTNERSHIP AROUND HOW CAN WE MOVE TO, YOU KNOW, HAVING A CARBON NEUTRAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM. THE WHOLE 22 STATUTE SB 375 IS REALLY TARGETED AROUND VEHICLE MILES 23 TRAVELED REDUCTION, BUT IF THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES TO REDUCE 24 25 EMISSIONS FROM THE TRANSPORTATION SECTOR, FOR EXAMPLE, THROUGH

ACCELERATING ELECTRIFICATION, WE WOULD LIKE TO BE ABLE TO 1 2 PURSUE THOSE AND KIND OF GET CREDIT FOR THAT, AND UNDER THE 3 CURRENT FRAMEWORK WE CAN'T. WE'RE ONLY ALLOWED TO USE ONE TOOL AND THAT'S REDUCING VEHICLE MILES TRAVELED AND THAT'S 4 5 EXTREMELY CHALLENGING AND WE NEED MORE TOOLS IN OUR TOOLBOX. SO THAT'S KIND OF THE NATURE OF WHAT WE'RE LOOKING AT ON THIS 6 ITEM. AND THEN CLIMATE ADAPTATION. WE HAVE MADE SOME CHANGES 7 8 RELATIVE TO THE CURRENT YEAR. THAT, REALLY, WE ARE PURSUING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH ALL OF THE OTHER BAY AREA REGIONAL 9 COLLABORATIVE AGENCIES, SO BCDC AND OTHERS. PURSUING MORE 10 DEFINITION AND STRUCTURE IN STATUTE ABOUT WHAT IS THE, YOU 11 KNOW, APPROPRIATE ROLE OF REGIONAL AGENCIES TO BE DOING 12 CLIMATE ADAPTATION PLANNING, HOW SHOULD REGIONAL PLANNING TIE 13 IN WITH LOCAL PLANNING, AND HOPEFULLY SECURING SOME ADDITIONAL 14 FUNDING, AS WELL, FOR THAT REALLY IMPORTANT CLIMATE ADAPTATION 15 WORK. CERTAINLY AT THE PLANNING LEVEL, MORE DOLLARS ARE NEEDED 16 THERE, BUT WE'LL TAKE ANY CAPITAL FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES WE CAN 17 18 GET AS WELL. AND THEN ON SAFETY, I KNOW THAT THIS ZERO TRAFFIC FATALITIES PROPOSAL IS ALSO SOMEWHAT TRANSPORTATION SPECIFIC, 19 BUT I'M SURE NEAR AND DEAR TO YOUR HEARTS AS LOCAL GOVERNMENT 20 21 REPRESENTATIVES AND WE'RE JUST ARTICULATING OUR SUPPORT FOR EFFORTS TO PROMOTE POLICIES THAT CAN HELP ACHIEVE VISION ZERO 22 GOALS OF NO ROADWAY DEATHS. AND SO SOME OF THOSE IDEAS HAVE TO 23 DO WITH MODIFYING THE 85th PERCENTILE METHODOLOGY, AND ALSO 24 AUTHORIZING AUTOMATED SPEED ENFORCEMENT TO ENFORCE SPEED 25

LIMITS PARTICULARLY IN HIGH HAZARD LOCATIONS. AND THEN LASTLY 1 ON THE STATE SIDE, WE'RE ARTICULATING SUPPORT FOR BROWN ACT 2 3 REFORMS. WE ARE LOOKING TO, YOU KNOW, REALLY PARTNER WITH THE LEAGUE OF CITIES AND OTHERS ON THIS. WE HAVE ALL SEEN SOME OF 4 5 THE BENEFITS OF REMOTE MEETINGS IN THIS STRANGE PANDEMIC ENVIRONMENT, BUT IT DOES SPEAK TO AN OPPORTUNITY TO REALLY 6 MODERNIZE THE STATE'S, YOU KNOW, OPEN GOVERNMENT LAWS, AND SO 7 8 WE'RE INTERESTED IN ENGAGING IN THAT AS WELL. ON THE FEDERAL SIDE, IT'S REALLY ABOUT COVID, ECONOMIC EMERGENCY AID AND 9 ECONOMIC RECOVERY BOTH FOR TRANSPORTATION, HOUSING, YOU KNOW, 10 IF WE'RE TALKING ABOUT A REAL ECONOMIC STIMULUS, WE ALSO THINK 11 CLIMATE ADAPTATION WOULD BE A GOOD CANDIDATE THERE. AND ALSO, 12 JUST LOOKING AT OTHER EFFORTS TO INCREASE RESOURCES ON 13 DISASTER MITIGATION AND RESILIENCE AS WELL. SO WITH THAT, I 14 WILL CLOSE AND SEE IF THERE ARE ANY QUESTIONS. 15

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. COLLEAGUES, I'LL ENTERTAIN A MOTION TO APPROVE THE FINAL 2021 ADVOCACY PROGRAM.

20 **PAT ECKLUND:** I'LL MOVE THE 2021 ADVOCACY PROGRAM. THIS IS PAT 21 ECKLUND.

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: MOVED BY EKLUND SECOND BY HALLIDAY. 1 2 LYNETTE MCELHANEY? 3 LYNETTE GIBSON MCELHANEY: DID WE PUSH FOR LEGISLATION AROUND 4 5 SEA LEVEL RISE IN YOUR OVERALL ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES WE'RE 6 DEEPLY CONCERNED ABOUT SEA LEVEL RISE SPECIFICALLY. 7 8 REBECCA LONG: IN THE ADAPTATION CATEGORY THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE WANT TO BE PLANNING FOR, SO IN THAT CATEGORY UNDER STATE AS 9 WELL AS FEDERAL. SO IT'S ABSOLUTELY ON OUR RADAR. 10 11 LYNETTE GIBSON MCELHANEY: THANK YOU. AND THEN WAS THERE 12 ANYTHING SPECIFICALLY UNDER THE CLIMATE PIECE TO DEAL WITH 13 14 WILDFIRES, THERE WERE A NUMBER IN THE REGION THAT ARE DEEPLY CONCERNED ABOUT WILDFIRE THREAT EVEN IN OAKLAND. AS YOU 15 16 REMEMBER THE WILDFIRE STORM, FOLLOWING UNDER MITIGATION. 17 **REBECCA LONG:** ITEM EIGHT IS LIKE THE BROAD PICTURE. IT'S 18 CLIMATE CHANGE, ENERGY EFFICIENCY, RESILIENCE AND ESTUARY 19 HEALTH AND THEN SPECIFICALLY, WE HAVE CALLED OUT WILDFIRES IN 20 21 E, ITEM 8E. 22 23 LYNETTE GIBSON MCELHANEY: OKAY. ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU. 24 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR LEE? 25

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1 OTTO LEE: YES THANK YOU REBECCA, GOOD REPORT HERE. I HAVE A 2 3 COUPLE OF MINOR QUESTIONS. ITEM THREE UNDER HOUSING UNDER 3B, YOU MENTIONED CHANGING THE LANGUAGE TO ALLOW HOUSING, SO YOU 4 5 DON'T NEED TO GO THROUGH A ZONING CHANGE. DO YOU MEAN LIKE PUTTING HOUSING OVER COMMERCIAL SPACE? IS THAT WHAT WE'RE 6 7 TALKING ABOUT? 8 REBECCA LONG: RIGHT. SO THAT IS WHAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT, AND 9 I JUST WANT TO, AGAIN, BE CLEAR THAT WE'RE NOT SUGGESTING A 10 11 KIND OF BY RIGHT PROPOSAL. BUT, YOU KNOW, IF A JURISDICTION FELT THAT, YOU KNOW, IN A CERTAIN MALL THAT MIGHT BE 12 UNDERUTILIZED OR IN A CERTAIN COMMERCIAL CORRIDOR THAT IT 13 WOULD BE WELL SUITED FOR HOUSING GOING THROUGH NORMAL 14 APPROVALS ON THAT FOR HOUSING, THAT YOU COULD DO THAT WITHOUT 15 16 HAVING TO REZONE. SENATE TONY ATKINS HAD A BILL THAT WAS TARGETED AT SPECIFIC TYPES OF LOCATIONS THAT'S THE THING THAT 17 WE WOULD BRING BACK TO YOU THAT'S WHAT WE'RE INDICATING 18 19 GENERAL SUPPORT FOR. 20 OTTO LEE: AN EXAMPLE WOULD BE TO SAY THIS IS ZONED FOR A 21 22 MCDONALD'S, YOU COULD BUILD A BUILDING WITH MCDONALDS 23 DOWNSTAIRS WITH PEOPLE LIVING UPSTAIRS IS THAT CORRECT? 24 **REBECCA LONG: CORRECT.** 25

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1 OTTO LEE: I WAS BORN IN HONG KONG, AND THAT'S SOMETHING WE'RE 2 3 USED TO, BUT HERE IT'S A NEW CONCEPT. IT'S SOMETHING TO GET USED TO. THAT'S ALL I HAVE. THANK YOU. 4 5 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: DIRECTOR GIBBONS. 6 7 8 GIBSON MCELHANEY: THANK YOU. TO THAT PARTICULAR COMMENT, I THINK THE ISSUE IS BEING A BIT OVERSIMPLIFIED, AND THAT IS A 9 10 CONCERN TO ME. OBVIOUSLY WE ALL HAVE OPPORTUNITIES. WE ARE COMMERCIAL ZONED, ARE NOT AS VIABLE AS THEY ONCE WERE AND 11 SHOULD HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO DO HOUSING. I AM CONCERNED 12 ABOUT THE LANGUAGE OF ELIMINATING CEQA, BUT I AM PARTICULARLY 13 CONCERNED ABOUT WHAT YOU JUST SAID WHICH IS THEY DON'T HAVE TO 14 15 BE REZONED. AND SO, THAT, I THINK, IS A PROBLEM, BECAUSE WE 16 WANT TO BE SURE TO HAVE THE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION, AND THE 17 OWNERS, AND NEIGHBORS PARTICIPATION. BUT ALSO THERE IS SOME EXISTING STATE LEGISLATION AND THE ONE THAT'S COMING TO MY 18 MIND, I MAY BE WRONG, BUT IT'S SB 330. WITH THERE MAY BE SOME 19 CONFLICTS WITH SAYING THAT YOU DON'T HAVE TO REZONE. SO I 20 WOULD BE THOUGHTFUL ABOUT SOME OF THAT LANGUAGE GOING FORWARD. 21 I CAN TALK MORE LATER, WITH OTHERS ABOUT IT, BUT I WOULD JUST 22 OFFER SOME CAUTION. LEGISLATION ON HOUSING, AND CEQA HAS BEEN 23 DRASTICALLY DYNAMICALLY FLIPPING AROUND THE LAST 5, 6 YEARS, 24 AND IT'S VERY HARD TO KEEP UP WITH IT, AND ITS CONFLICTS SO I 25

JUST OFFER AS A CAUTION GOING FORWARD, THAT IF THAT'S A 1 PLATFORM WE WANT TO BE THOUGHTFUL ABOUT WHAT IT REALLY MEANS 2 3 TO SAY YOU DON'T HAVE TO REZONE. YEAH, I KNOW THERE IS A SPECIFIC EXAMPLE THAT WON'T COME TO MY MIND, WHERE STATE LAW 4 5 SAYS THAT YOU DON'T HAVE -- YOU HAVE TO -- ANY PROJECT THAT'S BEING REZONED DOESN'T FALL UNDER THE RAPID APPROVAL SCHEDULE, 6 I THINK THAT'S WHAT IT IS SO IT'S JUST UNINTENDED 7 8 CONSEQUENCES, THAT'S THE PHRASING. SO I WOULD REQUEST OF STAFF TO KEEP AN EYE OUT FOR CONFLICTS OF THAT KIND OF LANGUAGE. 9 10 REBECCA LONG: DEFINITELY, THANK YOU DIRECTOR GIBBONS, I WOULD 11 NOTE THESE TYPES OF BILLS ARE COMPLEX AND THE DEVIL IS IN THE 12 DETAILS AND WE WOULD BE REVIEWING IT TO SEE IF IT MAKES SENSE 13 AND IF WE WANT TO RECOMMEND SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS WE WOULD 14

15 BRING THAT TO THIS BODY FOR DISCUSSION.

16

17 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR GARCIA? 18

19 LEON GARCIA: YES. I WOULD BE INTERESTED TO KNOW IF THERE HAVE 20 BEEN ANY ANALYSIS OF THE ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BUILDING 21 HOUSES, PARTICULARLY LOW, VERY LOW INCOME, WITH RESPECT TO 22 LAND COST, MATERIALS, LABOR? THAT SEEMS TO BE IMPACTED IN THE 23 CAPACITY TO BE ABLE TO BUILD IN JURISDICTIONS. IN AMERICAN 24 CANYON, WE HAD PLANS JUST APPROVED THE BEST TENTATIVE EFFORT 25 OF 98 HOUSES THAT PROJECT WILL INCLUDE 252 HOUSES WHEN IT'S

COMPLETED AND AREAS IN NAPA VALLEY, THE LAND COST IS
 PROHIBITIVE, MAJOR INDUSTRY, IN NAPA BEING THE WINE INDUSTRY.
 JUST WONDERING, IN THE RHNA NUMBER SAYS YOU HAVE TO BUILD SO
 MANY HOUSES BUT IS THAT EVEN POSSIBLE AT THE VERY LOW INCOME
 LEVEL WHEN THE COST IS SO HIGH? THANK YOU.

REBECCA LONG: I CAN TAKE A STAB AT THE RESPONSE. WHAT I WAS 7 8 GOING TO SAY IS THAT, DIRECTOR GARCIA, CERTAINLY IN OUR REGION, AFFORDABLE HOUSING DOES REQUIRE A SUBSIDY, AND YOU 9 10 KNOW, DEPENDING ON THE JURISDICTION, IT'S, YOU KNOW, VERY HIGH. AND SO THAT'S, YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE MAIN REASONS WHY WE 11 PURSUED A.B. 1487 IS TO CREATE MORE RESOURCES SO THAT WE CAN 12 BUILD DEDICATED AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AND WE'RE ALSO SUPPORTIVE 13 OF LOOKING AT FUNDS FROM THE STATE LEVEL AND THE FEDERAL 14 LEVEL. SO IT DOESN'T, YOU KNOW, PAY FOR ITSELF, GIVEN THE COST 15 16 OF LAND AND CONSTRUCTION IN OUR REGION.

18 LEON GARCIA: WELL IT DEPENDS ON HOW BIG THAT POT OF MONEY IS
19 AND HOW IT'S DIVVIED UP. THANK YOU.

21 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR HUDSON?
22

23 DAVID E. HUDSON: I WANT TO GO BACK TO THE COMMENT FROM

24 DIRECTOR GIBB ORDINANCE. SB 330 HAS TWO MAJOR POINTS THAT

25 UNFORTUNATELY I'M DEALING WITH NOW ONE IS THAT THE TIME FRAME

THAT WAS SET IN 2018 AND YOU'RE NOT GOING TO REZONE OUT OF 1 WHAT YOU HAD BACK IN 2018 BUT IT'S ALSO OUT OF FIVE MEETINGS 2 3 YOU'RE NOT GOING TO HOLD FIVE MEETINGS SO YOU BETTER LEAVE ONE OPEN FOR THE PL IF IT COMES TO THE COUNCIL. AND YOU'RE SPOT O 4 5 WHEN YOU'RE TRYING TO GET AROUND OR WHEN YOU'RE TRYING TO DEAL WITH SIMPLICITY AND SPEED TO REZONE, YOU MIGHT RUN INTO 6 PROBLEMS, WHERE I'M MORE CONCERNED, THOUGH, IS, THERE IS THAT 7 8 CONCERN, BUT REBECCA HIT A KEY PHRASE THERE, THAT, DO NOT FORGET, AND THAT'S WHERE ALL OF THESE -- NOT ALL -- BUT SOME 9 OF THESE PIECE OF LEGISLATION ARE HEADED AND THAT'S BUILD BY 10 RIGHT. THAT'S THE TERM THAT I WANT. WHEN WE GET INTO THESE MTC 11 ABAG LEGISLATIVE MEETINGS, I GUARANTEE EVERY TIME I READ 12 SOMETHING LIKE THAT AND I SEE ONE OF THOSE BUZZ WORDS THAT IS, 13 YOU KNOW, JUST A SENATOR, OR AN ASSEMBLY PERSON JUST FEEDS ON 14 IT, SEE, WE GOT TO DO THIS, BECAUSE THESE CITIES AREN'T DOING 15 THEIR RESPONSIBILITY, THAT JUST PUTS THE RED FLAG UP FOR ME. 16 I'M GLAD YOU BROUGHT IT UP. BUT I CAN TELL YOU THE LEGISLATIVE 17 COMMITTEE THEY REMEMBER IS, EVERYBODY'S COGNIZANT OF, THIS 18 EVERYBODY'S LISTENING AND WE'RE ALL JUST TRYING TO FIGURE OUT, 19 OKAY, HOW DO WE MOVE FORWARD. SO ANYTHING THAT KEEPS US OUT OF 20 21 BUILD BY RIGHT, I'M FOR.

AND I THINK THOSE 14 15 ARE REALLY INTERESTING CONCEPTS AND IT'S THE SAME AT THE MTC 16 MEETING IN OCTOBER, PRESIDENT ARREGUIN OFFERED THE IDEA THAT, 17 YOU KNOW, WE WILL BE LOOKING IN 2021 HOW TO REALLY ADDRESS THE STATE BUREAUCRACY THAT MAKES IT DIFFICULT FOR LOCAL CITIES AND 18 THEIR ALWAYS VERY GOOD IDEAS OF VERY LOW AND EXTREMELY LOW AND 19 MIXED INCOME HOUSING IDEAS THOSE IDEAS GET CLOGGED UP, AND 20 PERHAPS WE WILL BE WORKING ON HOW TO UNTANGLE THOSE THINGS AND 21 I AM INTERESTED IN WHAT 2021 WOULD LOOK LIKE, AND I KNOW CASA 22 IN THE SOUTH BAY HAVE DONE AMAZING WORK, I FEEL VLI MIXED 23 INCOME IDEAS ARE REALLY IMPORTANT TO TALK ABOUT AND HOW TO 24 25 SHAPE OUR HOUSING, AND THEY CAN SHAPE GOOD IDEAS. ONCE AGAIN, THANK YOU TO REBECCA LONG AND STAFF FOR ALL YOUR WORK IN 4 5 PREPARING THIS ADVOCACY PLATFORM. 6 7 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU. 8 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: WE'LL GO TO ITEM NINE UPDATE IN 9 ADVANCE OF OUR JANUARY 2021 MEETING ON THE DRAFT RHNA 10 METHODOLOGY AND SUBREGIONAL SHARES. GILLIAN ADAMS WILL GIVE 11 THE PRESENTATION. 12 13 GILLIAN ADAMS: THANK YOU PRESIDENT ARREGUIN, CAN WE CALL UP 14 15 THE SLIDES, PLEASE? GOOD EVENING EVERYONE MY NAME IS GILLIAN 16 ADAMS PROJECT MANAGER FOR THE REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION PROCESS AND I'M GOING TO BE PROVIDING AN UPDATE ON 17 THE COMMENTS ABAG RECEIVED ON THE PROPOSED REGIONAL 18 METHODOLOGY. I KNOW MANY OF YOU ARE LOOKING FORWARD TO SEEING 19 THE DRAFT RHNA METHODOLOGY AND HOW THINGS LOOK WITH 20 21 INTEGRATION OF THE PLANNED BAY AREA, STAFF HAVE BEEN CONSIDERING COMMENTS AND DATA TO THE FINAL BLUEPRINT INTO THE 22 RHNA METHODOLOGY. HOWEVER WE WEREN'T ABLE TO COMPLETE OUR WORK 23 ON THE DRAFT METHODOLOGY THE TIME TO INCLUDE THAT INFORMATION 24 IN THE PACK MATERIALS FOR TONIGHT'S MEETING WE PLAN TO PRESENT 25

MATERIALS FROM THE FINAL DRAFT METHODOLOGY IN THE NEXT FEW 1 DAYS TO MAKE IT POSSIBLE TO REVIEW THE INFORMATION PRIOR TO 2 3 THE MEETINGS IN JANUARY WHEN THE ABAG REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE AND EXECUTIVE BOARD ARE SCHEDULED REVIEW THE 4 5 METHODOLOGY. STATE-MANDATED PROCESS IDENTIFYING SHARE OF REGION'S HOUSING NEEDS FOR EACH JURISDICTION WAS PLANNED OVER 6 EIGHT PERIOD AGO BY LAW ABAG IS RESPONSIBLE FOR DEVELOPING 7 8 METHODOLOGY OR FORMULA DIVIDING REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS IMPLEMENTATION IN THE BAY AREA RECEIVED FROM THE STATE AMONG 9 EACH CITY, TOWN, AND COUNTY WITHIN THE REGION. EACH LOCAL 10 GOVERNMENT WILL RECEIVE A NUMBER OF UNITS BY INCOME CATEGORY 11 FROM ABAG, AND MUST UPDATE THE HOUSING ELEMENT OF ITS GENERAL 12 PLAN TO SHOW HOW IT'S GOING TO ACCOMMODATE RHNA ALLOCATION. IT 13 IS IN THE HOUSING ELEMENT THAT LOCAL JURISDICTIONS CHOOSE THE 14 15 SPECIFIC LOCATIONS WITHIN THEIR COMMUNITIES THAT WILL BE ZONED 16 FOR HOUSING THIS SLIDE SHOWS KEY MILESTONES FOR DEVELOPING THE PROPOSED METHODOLOGY. THE HOUSING METHODOLOGY COMMITTEE WORKED 17 COLLABORATIVELY, FOR ABOUT A YEAR, TO RECOMMEND A PROPOSED 18 METHODOLOGY THAT ADVANCES THE FIVE RHNA OBJECTIVES IDENTIFIED 19 IN HOUSING ELEMENT LAW AND IS CONSISTENT WITH THE FORECASTED 20 21 DEVELOPMENT PATTERN OF PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 AS REQUIRED BY LAW. THE COMMITTEE VOTED TO RECOMMEND THE PROPOSE ADD 22 METHODOLOGY TO THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD AND THE BOARD VOTED TO 23 RELEASE IT FOR PUBLIC COMMENT IN OCTOBER. THIS WAS FOLLOWED BY 24 A PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD IN A PROPOSED METHODOLOGY FROM OCTOBER 25

24TH TO NOVEMBER 27TH. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. TODAY I'LL BE 1 WALKING THROUGH A SUMMARY OF THE MAIN THEMES THAT WE HEARD 2 3 ABOUT THE PROPOSED RHNA METHODOLOGY IN THE LETTERS WE RECEIVED AND IN THE COMMENTS PROVIDED AT THE PUBLIC HEARING IN 4 5 NOVEMBER. I ALSO WANTED TO NOTE THAT WE HAD A CONCURRENT PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD RELATED TO THE DRAFT SUBREGIONAL SHARES. 6 WE DID NOT RECEIVE ANY COMMENTS ON THOSE. SO WE WILL BE 7 8 FOCUSING TONIGHT ON FEEDBACK ABOUT THE PROPOSED METHODOLOGY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. DURING THE PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD, ABAG 9 RECEIVED 106 WRITTEN COMMENTS THAT PROVIDED PERSPECTIVES FROM 10 OVER 200 LOCAL GOVERNMENT STAFF AND ELECTED OFFICIALS, 11 ADVOCACY ORGANIZATIONS AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC AS IN LETTERS 12 WERE SIGNED BY MULTIPLE ENTITY. THERE WERE ALSO COMMENTS AT 13 THE PUBLIC HEARING ON NOVEMBER 12TH. THE TABLE ON THIS SLIDE 14 15 SHOWS THE NUMBER OF COMMENTS RECEIVED FROM PUBLIC AGENCY IN 16 EACH COUNTY AND FROM ADVOCACY ORGANIZATIONS AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. IN TOTAL, 42 OF ABAG'S 109 JURISDICTIONS PROVIDED 17 18 COMMENTS ON THE METHODOLOGY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. I'M GOING TO WALK THROUGH A SUMMARY OF THEMES IDENTIFIED IN THE COMMENTS. 19 WE HEARD CONCERNS FROM A NUMBER OF JURISDICTIONS AND RESIDENTS 20 21 OF THE ABILITY TO ACCOMMODATE AN ACCOMMODATION BECAUSE THE BUILD-OUT LACK SUFFICIENT INFRASTRUCTURE. REQUIRING RHNA TO 22 INCREASE THE HOUSING SUPPLY IN A MIX OF HOUSING TYPES FOR ALL 23 JURISDICTIONS. INFORMATION FROM LOCAL GOVERNMENTS ABOUT PLANS, 24 25 ZONING, PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTIC, AND POTENTIAL DEVELOPMENT

OPPORTUNITIES AND CONSTRAINTS WAS USED AS INPUT INTO THE 1 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 BLUEPRINT WHICH IS THE BASELINE 2 3 ALLOCATION FROM THE PROPOSED RHNA METHODOLOGY. THE BLUEPRINT ALLOWS ADDITIONAL FEASIBLE GROWTH WITHIN THE URBAN FOOTPRINT 4 5 BY INCREASING ALLOWABLE RESIDENTIAL DENSITIES AND EXPANDING HOUSING INTO SELECT AREAS FOR COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL USES. 6 ULTIMATELY BY LAW ABAG CANNOT LIMIT RHNA BASED ON EXISTING 7 8 ZONING OR LAND USE RESTRICTIONS THE STATUTE REQUIRES ABAG TO CONSIDER THE POTENTIAL FOR INCREASED RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT 9 UNDER ALTERNATE ZONING ORDINANCES AND LAND USE RESTRICTIONS. 10 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF COMMENTS THAT 11 SUGGESTED THE RHNA METHODOLOGY SHOULD FOCUS MORE ON TRANSIT 12 AND JOBS TO BETTER ALIGN WITH PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 AND THE 13 STATUTORY RHNA OBJECTIVE TO PROMOTE INFILL DEVELOPMENT AND 14 ACHIEVE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS REDUCTION TARGETS. THIS 15 16 INCLUDE PROPOSALS TO CHANGE THE RHNA METHODOLOGY TO HOUSEHOLD GROWTH FROM THE PLANNED BAY AREA BLUEPRINT AS A BASELINE 17 ALLOCATION INSTEAD OF TOTAL HOUSEHOLDS IN THE YEAR 2050 18 STAFF'S RESPONSE IS PROPOSED A METHODOLOGY CORRECTLY 19 INCORPORATES THE FORECAST DEVELOPMENT PATTERN FROM THE PLANNED 20 21 BAY AREA 2050 BLUEPRINT AS THE BASELINE ALLOCATION IN THE BLUEPRINT EMPHASIZING GROWTH NEAR JOB CENTERS AND LOCATIONS 22 23 NEAR TRANSIT AS WELL AS HIGH RESOURCE AREAS AND REDUCING GREENHOUSE EMISSIONS STRATEGIES IN SHORTING INTO THE BLUEPRINT 24 IMPROVE REGIONS JOBS/HOUSING LICENSE LEAVES SHORTER COMMUTES. 25

THE PROPOSED REGIONAL METHODOLOGY PROPOSED FACTORS THAT MEAN 1 METHODOLOGY FACTORS ALLOCATE NEAR HALF OF RHNA UNITS BASED ON 2 3 JOB PROGRAM. THE PROPOSED RHNA METHODOLOGY PERFORMS WELL IN MEETING ALL FIVE OF THE STATUTORY OBJECTIVES THIS ANALYSIS 4 5 SHOWS THAT WITH THE PROPOSED METHODOLOGY JURISDICTIONS WITH THE MOST ACCESS TO JOBS AND TRANSIT AS WELL AS JURISDICTIONS 6 WITH THE LOWEST VEHICLE MILES TRAVELED PER RESIDENT EXPERIENCE 7 8 HIGHER GROWTH RATES FROM THEIR RHNA ALLOCATIONS THAN OTHER JURISDICTIONS IN THE REGION. THE PERFORMANCE EVALUATION ALSO 9 SHOWS THAT USING PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 HOUSEHOLD GROWTH AS THE 10 BASELINE FOR THE RHNA METHODOLOGY PERFORMS MARGINALLY BETTER 11 ON THE RHNA OBJECTIVE RELATED TO REDUCING GREENHOUSE GAS 12 EMISSIONS BUT IT APPEARS TO FALL SHORT IN ACHIEVING STATUTORY 13 REQUIREMENTS RELATED TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING. 14 15 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THE THIRD THING WE HEARD IS THAT THE RHNA 16 METHODOLOGY NEEDS TO DO MORE TO REDUCE ALLOCATION IN AREAS WITH HIGH HAZARD RISKS AND SUGGESTIONS INCLUDED A HAZARD 17 FACTOR IN THE RHNA METHODOLOGY OR USE OF DATA ABOUT WILDLAND 18 URBAN INTERFACES OR WUIS AND FLOODWAYS IN THE BLUEPRINT 19 STAFF'S RESPONSE NOTES THAT INCLUDING THE BLUEPRINT IN THE 20 21 METHODOLOGY ADDRESSES CONCERNS ABOUT NATURAL HAZARDS AS THE BLUEPRINTS EXCLUDES AREAS WITH UNMITIGATED HIGH HAZARD RISK 22 FROM THE GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES. FOR FIRE RISK THE BLUEPRINT 23 GROWTH GEOGRAPHIES EXCLUDE THE HIGH FIRE SEVERITY AREAS 24 DESIGNATED BY CAL FIRE AS WELL AS COUNTY DESIGNATED WUIS WHERE 25

APPLICABLE. THE BLUEPRINT STRATEGIES FOCUS GROWTH AWAY FROM 1 THE HIGHEST FIRE RISK ZONES, SUPPORT INCREASED WILDLAND 2 3 MANAGEMENT PROGRAMS, AND SUPPORT RESIDENTIAL BUILDING UPGRADES THAT REDUCE THE LIKELIHOOD FOR DAMAGE WHEN FIRES OCCUR IN 4 5 WUIS. THE BLUEPRINT ALSO INCORPORATES STRATEGIES TO MITIGATE THE IMPACTS OF SEA LEVEL RISE, PROTECTING NEARLY ALL 6 7 COMMUNITIES IT'S RISK OF NEARLY TWO FEET OF PERMANENT 8 INNOVATION. HOWEVER TEMPORARY RIVER FLOODING IS NOT INTEGRATED INTO THE BLUEPRINT BECAUSE EXISTING REASON DOESN'T PROVIDE 9 GUIDANCE ON HOW MODEL IMPACTS. IT'S IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT 10 COMMUNITIES CAN CHOOSE TO TAKE HAZARD RISK INTO THE 11 CONSIDERATION WHEN THEY CHOOSE WHERE SITE DEVELOPMENT. WE 12 RECEIVED COMMENTS FROM RESIDENTS LOCAL JURISDICTIONS AND 13 ADVOCACY ORGANIZATIONS SUPPORTING PROPOSED METHODOLOGY 14 15 PARTICULARLY ITS IMPORTANCE FOR FURTHERING REGIONAL EOUITY 16 STAFF ALIGNS WITH THESE COMMENTS AND THESE COMMENTS INDICATE PROPOSED METHODOLOGY FOR SUCCESS FEDERALLY FURTHERING AFFAIR 17 HOUSING. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE ANOTHER THEME WAS COMMENTS THAT 18 FOCUSED ON THE EFFECTS OF THE PANDEMIC AND SUGGESTED A NEED TO 19 EITHER DELAY RHNA OR RECONSIDER THE FOCUS ON PROXIMITY TO 20 21 JOBS. IN RESPONSE STAFF APPRECIATES CONCERN ABOUT THE SIGNIFICANT ECONOMIC AND SOCIETAL CHANGES RESULTING FROM 22 COVID-19 AND THESE CONCERNS WERE COMMUNICATED TO THE STATE IN 23 EARLY SUMMER. HOWEVER ABAG IS OBLIGATED BY STATE LAW TO MOVE 24 FORWARD WITH THE RHNA PROCESS SO JURISDICTIONS CAN COMPLETE 25

UPDATES TO THEIR HOUSING ELEMENTS ON TIME. ADDITIONALLY, THE 1 EIGHT YEAR RHNA CYCLE WHICH STARTS IN 2023, REPRESENTS A 2 3 LONGER TERM OUTLOOKING THAN THE NEAR-TERM IMPACTS OF COVID IN 2020 AND 2021. THE POTENTIAL IMPACTS OF THE 20ED TOWARD 4 5 TELECOMMUTING IN THE LONG-TERM ARE INCORPORATING INTO THE RHNA METHODOLOGY WITH INTEGRATION OF THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 6 BLUEPRINT WHICH INCLUDES STRATEGIES TO EXPAND COMMUTE TRIP 7 8 REDUCTION PROGRAMS THROUGH TELECOMMUTING AND OTHER SUSTAINABLE MODES OF TRAVEL. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. ANOTHER COMMON THEME WAS 9 CONCERNS THAT THE PROPOSED RHNA METHODOLOGY ALLOCATES TOO MUCH 10 11 GROWTH TO UNINCORPORATED AREAS THAT ARE RURAL AND LACK INFRASTRUCTURE TO SUPPORT DEVELOPMENT. THE PLANNED BAY AREA 12 2050 BLUEPRINT FORECASTS VERY LITTLE GROWTH IN UNINCORPORATED 13 COUNTY AREAS AND IT IS FOCUSED INSIDE THE URBAN GROWTH 14 15 BOUNDARIES. THE ILLUSTRATIVE RHNA ALLOCATIONS TO THESE AREAS 16 ARE DRIVEN LARGELY BY THE NUMBER OF EXISTING HOUSEHOLD IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS SINCE THE 2050 HOUSEHOLDS BASELINE IN THE 17 18 PROPOSED METHODOLOGY IS THE SUM OF EXISTING HOUSEHOLDS AND FORECASTED HOUSEHOLD GROWTH. ABAG MTC STAFF HAS ENGAGED IN 19 DIALOGUE WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENT STAFF IN THE COUNTIES THAT HAVE 20 21 EXPRESSED CONCERN ABOUT THEIR POTENTIAL RHNA ALLOCATIONS TO 22 THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS WHICH IS SANTA CLARA, SOLANO AND SONOMA, AND STAFF CONTINUE TO EXPLORE POTENTIAL WAYS TO 23 ADDRESS THESE CONCERNS. IT'S ALSO IMPORTANT TO NOTE THE 24 HOUSING ELEMENT LAW INCLUDES PROVISIONS THAT ALLOW A COUNTY TO 25

TRANSFER ALLOCATION WAS A PORTION TO TRANSFER TO A CITY LATER 1 IN THE RHNA PROCESS OR IF LAND IS ANNEXED AFTER IT RECEIVES 2 3 ITS ALLOCATION FROM ABAG. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. WE RECEIVED COMMENTS THAT WERE GENERALLY SUPPORTIVE OF THE PROPOSED 4 5 METHODOLOGY BUT IT ADVOCATED FOR INCORPORATING THE EQUITY ADJUSTMENT FOR SOME HMC MEMBERS INTO THE METHODOLOGY TO 6 ADVANCE THE STATUTORY REOUIREMENT TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER 7 8 FAIR HOUSING IN RESPONSE STAFF'S ANALYSIS UPON INDICATES THE PROPOSED METHODOLOGY DOES ACHIEVE ALL FIVE STATUTORY 9 OBJECTIVES OF RHNA INCLUDING AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR 10 HOUSING STAFF'S CONCERN ABOUT THE EQUITY ADJUSTMENT IS THE 11 UNDERLYING METHODOLOGY FOR THE COMPOSITE SCORE AND ADJUSTMENT 12 APPROACH WOULD MAKE IT DIFFICULT FOR POLICY MAKERS AND MEMBERS 13 OF THE PUBLIC TO UNDERSTAND THE MEAN OF THE METHODOLOGY WHILE 14 ADJUSTMENT WOULD SHIFT LESS THAN TWO PERCENT OF THE REGION'S 15 16 LOW INCOME RHNA TO THE JURISDICTIONS EXHIBITING ABOVE AVERAGE RACIAL AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC EXCLUSION, AND THE METHODOLOGY 17 CONSIDERED EQUITY ADJUSTMENT AND CHOSE NOT TO MOVE FORWARD 18 WITH THE PROPOSAL AND ITS RECOMMENDATIONS IN THE RHNA 19 METHODOLOGY NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SEVERAL COMMENTS SUGGESTED THAT 20 THE REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS TERMINATION CALCULATIONS MAY HAVE 21 BEEN FLAWED AND RESULTED IN THE ABAG RECEIVING ALLOCATION FROM 22 THE STATE THAT WAS TOO LARGE IN RESPONSE DETERMINATION 23 PROVIDED BY HCD BASED ON THE POPULATION FORECAST FROM 24 CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE HAS BEEN MODIFIED BY STAFF AT 25

HCD TO TACKLE OVERCROWDING AND MAKE OTHER ADJUSTMENTS TO 1 PROCEDURES REQUIRED BY LAW. ABAG STAFF HAVE REVIEWED HMM CD'S 2 3 CALCULATION METHODOLOGY AND BELIEVE IT ADHERES TO THE APPLICABLE REQUIREMENTS THE BOARD DECIDED NOT TO APPEAL THE 4 5 DETERMINATION IN JUNE OF 2020. AT THIS TIME THE WINDOW OF APPEAL OF THE NEED ARE DETERMINATION HAS BEEN CLOSED. THE 6 PROCESS IS MOSTLY PROVIDED TO HCD RATHER THAN ABAG. NEXT SLIDE 7 8 PLEASE. OUR LAST THEME IS THAT SOME JURISDICTIONS RAISED CONCERNS ABOUT THE ACCURACY OF THE BLUEPRINTS UNDERLYING DATA. 9 STAFF'S RESPONSE IS THAT LOCAL JURISDICTIONS STAFF ARE 10 PROVIDED WITH SEVERAL MONTHS TO COMMENT ON THE BASIS DATA USED 11 AS THE INPUT FOR THE BLUEPRINT AS WELL AS THE ADDITIONAL 12 PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON THE DRAFT BLUEPRINT DURING SUMMER OF 13 2020. ABAG MTC STAFF APPRECIATES JURISDICTIONS FEEDBACK ON THE 14 15 BLUEPRINT DATA AND HAS WORKED DIRECTLY WITH JURISDICTION STAFF 16 TO ADDRESS THESE CONCERNS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. STAFF HAS BEEN CONSIDERING THE COMMENTS RECEIVED AND WILL RECOMMEND ANY 17 NECESSARY ADJUSTMENTS TO THE DRAFT RHNA METHODOLOGY. AS I 18 MENTIONED PREVIOUSLY, WE ANTICIPATE RELEASING THE PLANNED BAY 19 AREA FINAL BLUEPRINT AND DRAFT RHNA METHODOLOGY WITHIN THE 20 NEXT WEEK. OUR GOAL IS TO MAXIMIZE THE AMOUNT OF TIME THAT 21 PEOPLE WILL HAVE TO REVIEW THE MATERIALS IN PREPARATION FOR 22 23 THE JANUARY 14TH MEETING OF THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE WHERE IT WILL MAKE A RECOMMENDATION ABOUT THE DRAFT 24 METHODOLOGY TO THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD WHICH WILL CONSIDER IT 25

FOR ADOPTION AT ITS MEETING ON JANUARY 21ST. AFTER A DRAFT 1 RHNA METHODOLOGY IS ADOPTED, ABAG WILL SUBMIT IT TO HCD FOR 2 3 REVIEW AND WILL USE THE STATE AGENCY'S FEEDBACK TO DEVELOP A FINAL METHODOLOGY AND DRAFT RHNA ALLOCATION IN SPRING OF 2021. 4 5 RELEASE OF THE DRAFT ALLOCATION WILL BE FOLLOWED BY AN APPEALS PERIOD IN THE SUMMER OF 2021 WITH THE FINAL RHNA ALLOCATION 6 ASSIGNED TO EACH OF BAY AREA'S LOCAL GOVERNMENTS IN LATE 2021. 7 8 THANK YOU. AND WITH THAT I'M HAPPY TO TAKE ANY QUESTIONS. 9

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THE
PRESENTATION. AND AS MS. ADAMS NOTED, OUR JANUARY MEETING IS A
VERY IMPORTANT MEETING. WE'RE VOTING NOT JUST ON THE FINAL
BLUEPRINT BUT ALSO ON THE PROPOSED RHNA METHODOLOGY. I
ENCOURAGE ALL EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS TO ATTEND IF NOT PLEASE
ASK YOUR ALTERNATES TO COME. AND I'LL ASK IF THERE ARE ANY
QUESTIONS ON THE PRESENTATION. DIRECTOR EKLUND?

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PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU, PRESIDENT ARREGUIN I GUESS MY QUESTION 18 -- I HAVE A QUESTION AND A COUPLE OF COMMENTS. ONE IS THAT YOU 19 INDICATED THAT THERE IS NO GUIDANCE ON HOW TO MODEL IMPACT OF 20 21 THE TEMPORARY RIVER FLOODING DUE TO CLIMATE CHANGE I'M NOT SURE IT'S TEMPORARY ACCORDING TO SOME OF THE EXPERTS IN THAT 22 FIELD. HAVE YOU HAD A CHANCE TO TALK TO THE SAN FRANCISCO 23 ESTUARY PROJECT TO SEE IF THEY HAVE HAD -- IF THEY HAVE ANY 24 INFORMATION ON HOW TO MODEL THE IMPACTS OF SEA LEVEL RISE AND 25

HOW THAT IMPACTS THE RIVERS AND STREAMS? >DAVE VAUTIN: THIS IS 1 DAVE VAUTIN WITH MTC ABAG. I AM HAPPY TO TAKE YOUR QUESTION 2 3 DIRECTOR EKLUND. RIVER INE FLOODING IS PARTICULARLY COMPLEX. THE WATER THAT FLOWS INTO IT STILL DOESN'T HAVE GOOD MAPPING 4 5 OF THE IMPACTS THAT SEA LEVEL RISE WILL HAVE ON RIVERINE SYSTEMS AND THE GOAL FOR HAVING GOOD DATA FOR FUTURE PLANS IS 6 TO DO MAPPING OF THOSE DIFFERENT RIVER AND CREEK SYSTEMS THAT 7 8 FEED INTO THE LARGER BAY. ONCE THE ANALYSIS IS DONE WE WILL BE ABLE TO ANTICIPATE INTEGRATING THAT INTO THE PLANS FOR FUTURE 9 10 ITERATIONS OF PLANNED BAY AREA.

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PAT ECKLUND: I SUGGEST YOU CONTACT THE PLANNERS IN EACH OF 12 CITIES AND COUNTIES ESPECIALLY THE FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT. I 13 BET THEY HAVE A LOT OF INFORMATION THAT YOU COULD USE IN THE 14 15 INTERIM, AT LEAST THAT'S WHAT I HAVE. AND I WILL GET OUR 16 PLANNERS TO TRY TO COORDINATE SOME OF THAT. MY OTHER QUESTION, AND COMMENT IS, I APPRECIATE YOUR PUTTING SOME EFFORT INTO 17 DETERMINING THE HIGHEST FIRE RISK AREAS. I WOULD SAY THAT IT'S 18 HIGH AND HIGHEST. AND HOW THAT'S DETERMINED IS REALLY GOING TO 19 BE CRITICAL. AND AS I MENTIONED, THE CAL FIRE MAPS DON'T 20 21 NECESSARILY REFLECT THE HIGH OR HIGHEST FIRE RISK. THERE IS NOT CONSISTENCY IN THEIR MAPPING. BUT I WOULD SUGGEST, ON THAT 22 ONE TOO, THAT YOU, ABAG REACHES OUT TO THE PLANNERS IN THE 23 COUNTIES AND THE CITIES, AND TRY TO GET SOME INFORMATION FROM 24 THEM. I BET YOU WILL GET SOME INFORMATION FROM THEM. 25

OBVIOUSLY, BECAUSE THEY HAVE TO DO IT AS PART OF THE GENERAL 1 PLAN, AND I WILL ALSO SEND AN E-MAIL TO THE PLANNERS TO SEE IF 2 3 THEY CAN GENERATE SOME INFORMATION AND SEND IT TO YOU, DAVE. AT LEAST FROM MARIN, BUT I DON'T HAVE THE PLANNERS NAMES AND 4 5 THE WHOLE REGION, SO, ABAG MAY WANT TO DO THAT. BUT, AT LEAST FOR MARIN COUNTY, I'LL DO IT. >DAVE VAUTIN: THANKS FOR THAT. 6 WE'RE MORE THAN HAPPY TO TAKE A LOOK. I WILL NOTE THAT THE 7 8 POINT OF USING THE CAL FIRE DATA WHICH I'LL NOTE CONTINUES TO EVOLVE OVER TIME IS TO HAVE A CONSISTENT MAP ACROSS THE REGION 9 10 AS GILLIAN MENTIONED WE'RE DOING RHNA AND THESE LARGE PLANNING EFFORTS THAT'S IMPORTANT THAT'S NOT CONSTRAINED BY LOCAL 11 POLICIES THAT LIMIT GROWTH IN CERTAIN PLACES. THERE ARE IN 12 FACT SOME JURISDICTIONS THAT HAVE LARGE SWATHS OR THEIR ENTIRE 13 JURISDICTION AS A WUI WHICH WOULD PRECLUDE FROM RHNA GROWTH 14 15 AND THERE ARE MAPS THAT CAL FIRE HAS USED TO GIVE SENSE EVER 16 CONSISTENCY ACROSS THE REGION WE GET THAT KIND OF CONSISTENT DATA SET ACROSS THE BAY AREA SO THERE IS NO WINNERS OR LOSERS 17 SAY WE'RE USING A CONSISTENT SET OF DATA. 18

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20 PAT ECKLUND: I'LL LOOK FORWARD TO THAT DISCUSSION IN JANUARY.
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22 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: OKAY. THANK YOU, DIRECTOR LEE.

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OTTO LEE: YES. THANK YOU, JESSE. THE QUESTION I HAVE ISRELATING TO THE ALLOCATION OF HOUSING TO US THROUGHOUT THE

COUNTY. A GOOD PART OF THE COUNTY IS RURAL, AND BY NOW, WITH 1 RHNA CLOSE TO 4200 UNITS HERE WHICH IS THREE TIMES OF 1500 2 3 PERCENT OVER THE LAST TIME. AND WE RAISED AN ISSUE, AND THERE WAS EXPLANATION THEIR SAYING THAT THE COUNTY COULD THEN 4 5 ALLOCATE SOME OF THESE UNITS TO THE CITY. I WASN'T FOLLOWING. 6 SO IS IT POSSIBLE YOU CAN EXPLAIN THAT AGAIN? 7 8 GILLIAN ADAMS: THERE IS A PROVISION IN STATE LAW THAT ALLOWS SPECIFICALLY A TRANSFER FROM AN UNINCORPORATED COUNTY OR AREA 9 TO A CITY OR TOWN IN THAT COUNTY. AND THAT PROCESS OCCURS 10 AFTER THE JURISDICTIONS HAVE RECEIVED THEIR ALLOCATIONS FROM 11 ABAG. SO IN BETWEEN THE PERIOD WHEN A JURISDICTION GETS ITS 12 ALLOCATION AND FINISHES ITS HOUSING ELEMENTS, THE TWO 13 JURISDICTIONS CAN WORK OUT AN AGREEMENT. BUT IT'S SPECIFICALLY 14 ONLY FROM COUNTY AREAS TO CITIES, NOT BETWEEN TWO CITIES. 15 16 THAT'S NOT ALLOWED. 17 OTTO LEE: RIGHT, CERTAINLY NOT GOING FROM CITIES TO COUNTIES 18 AND THE REASON I'M MAKING THAT POINT IS FOR ALL THE SMART 19 GROWTH REASON IT IS DOESN'T MAKE SENSE TO PUT 4,000 UNITS TO A 20 COUNTY RURAL AREA WHICH IS EXACTLY WHAT WE DON'T WANT TO DO. 21 THAT'S WHY THAT NUMBER SEEMS TO BE SO HIGH AND DOESN'T MAKE 22 23 SENSE IN THAT ENVIRONMENTAL MOVEMENT HAS BEEN SHOCKED ABOUT

24 THOSE NUMBERS. I WANTED TO ASK THE QUESTION AND BRING IT UP.

25 THANK YOU.

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1 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR ROMERO? CARLOS, 2 3 ARE YOU THERE? 4 5 CARLOS ROMERO: YES, CAN YOU HEAR ME? 6 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: WE'RE HAVING TROUBLE HEARING YOU. 7 8 CAN YOU SPEAK UP? 9 CARLOS ROMERO: IT'S MY MICROPHONE. I'M REALLY SORRY. I'LL TRY 10 TO GUILTY A CALL IN. 11 12 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR DIEP. 13 14 LAN DIEP: I HAVE A FOLLOW UP TO SUPERVISOR LEE'S PREVIOUS 15 16 QUESTION. YOU SAID AFTER THE ABAG RHNA NUMBERS ARE ALLOCATED, THERE CAN BE AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN COUNTY AND CITY, ONE WAY 17 ONLY, THE COUNTY SHARING THEIR NUMBERS WITH CITIES, AND I 18 UNDERSTAND THAT, BUT THE FACT THAT YOU SAID AGREEMENT ALMOST 19 SEEMS LIKE IT'S AN INVITATION FOR CONFLICT, WHAT IF THE CITY 20 21 DOESN'T WANT IT? I'M CURIOUS IF IT'S THE POWER OF THE COUNTY TO DIRECT THE CITY TO TAKE IT BY SORT OF AGREEMENT AND BY 22 AGREEMENT THERE HAS TO BE A MEETING OF THE MINDS AND THAT 23 SEEMS TROUBLESOME TO ME. 24

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GILLIAN ADAMS: IT'S MY UNDERSTANDING THAT THE STATUTE REQUIRES 1 2 AGREEMENT, SO IT'S THE TWO JURISDICTIONS COMING TO A MEETING 3 OF THE MINDS, I WOULD SAY. 4 5 LAN DIEP: OKAY. I WANTED CLARIFICATION ON THAT. 6 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: MS. ADAMS WHEN WILL THE FINAL DRAFT 7 8 BLUEPRINT BE RELEASED FOR REVIEW. 9 GILLIAN ADAMS: WE'RE GOING TO HAVE THE FINAL DRAFT BLUEPRINT 10 AND RONA METHODOLOGY WITHIN THE NEXT WEEK. 11 12 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR GIBBONS. LIZ 13 GIBBONS: THANK YOU. I HAVE QUESTIONS AFTER PUBLIC COMMENT. I 14 15 APPRECIATE THE INFORMATION THAT'S PROVIDED HERE, AND I DID IN 16 FACT READ THROUGH A LOT OF THE LETTERS AND ALL OF THAT. SOME THINGS THAT WERE BROUGHT UP AT PREVIOUS EXECUTIVE BOARD 17 MEETINGS, THEY DON'T THINK HAVE BEEN ANSWERED. SO, I'M 18 WONDERING, IF, HOW YOU ARE HANDLING THE COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS 19 FROM PREVIOUS BOARD MEETINGS. I MEAN, I'LL GIVE YOU AN 20 EXAMPLE. THERE IS SIGNIFICANT CONCERN ABOUT THE DATA FROM THE 21 -- THAT 2050 WAS UTILIZING, AND THERE IS -- I DON'T SEE HOW 22 THAT'S BEEN ANSWERED. >DAVE VAUTIN: I'M HAPPY TO SPEAK TO THAT 23 CONCERN. WITH REGARDS TO THE DATA IN PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, WE 24 ACTUALLY HAVE THE MOST OPEN AND TRANSPARENT -- OF THE DATA OF 25

ANY PLANNED BAY AREA ITERATIONS WE HAVE DONE. WE HAVE OPENED 1 2 UP ALL OF OUR BOOKS IN THE JURISDICTIONS TO LOOK AT IN THE 3 PERIOD OF FALL AND WINTER OF 2019 AND EARLY 2020 WE ALSO HAD AN EXPERIENCE FOR LOCAL FEEDBACK DURING AND AFTER THE DRAFT 4 5 BLUEPRINT RELEASE IN SUMMER OF 2020. WE REALIZE THE ITERATIVE PROCESS IS -- WE [INDISCERNIBLE] WE CODED LATEST GENERAL PLANS 6 THROUGH BASIS INITIATIVES AND A CHANCE TO REVIEW ALL THE DATA 7 8 WE HAVE CONTINUED THE CONVERSATION WITH MANY JURISDICTIONS WELL PAST THE CONCLUSION AND CONTINUE HEARING THEIR FEEDBACK. 9 LIZ GIBBONS: DAVE, I APPRECIATE THAT STAFF WORKED HARD TO 10 RECEIVE INFORMATION, FRANKLY DON'T SEE IT IN THE RESULTS. 11 THAT'S WHERE MY CONCERN S SO I WOULD JUST OFFER THAT. I AM 12 CONCERNED FOR THE CITIES IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY THAT THE INPUT 13 HAS NOT BEEN REFLECTED. SO THAT'S ONE OF MY QUESTIONS. SO. 14 >DAVE VAUTIN: UNDERSTOOD, AND I JUST WANT TO NOTE THAT WITH 15 16 THE RELEASE OF THE FINAL BLUEPRINT IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS AS 17 GILLIAN MENTIONED, FURTHER IMPROVEMENTS TO THE DATA HAVE BEEN MADE, WE ENCOURAGE TO YOU CHECK THAT OUT AND IT HAS REFLECTED 18 SOME CHANGES FROM FURTHER CHANGES IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY 19 SPECIFICALLY. LIZ GIBBONS: OKAY. SO FOR EVERYONE'S BENEFIT, IF 20 21 WE HAVE, REVIEWING THE MATERIAL -- THANK YOU ALL FOR GETTING IT TO US AHEAD OF TIME, IT'S GREATLY APPRECIATED, EVEN IF IT 22 IS OVER THE HOLIDAY, HOW DO WE -- HOW CAN WE GET THE COMMENTS 23 TO YOU SO THAT THEY CAN IN FACT BE INCORPORATED INTO THE FINAL 24 25 PRESENTATION, WHICH YOU ARE NOW SCHEDULED FOR, FIRST, ON

JANUARY 14TH AND THEN AGAIN ON THE 21st? WE NEED TO MAKE SURE 1 YOU GET THE COMMENTS AND CAN BE INCORPORATED. >DAVE VAUTIN: 2 3 WE'RE MORE THAN HAPPY TO TALK TO ANY OF THE ELECTED OFFICIALS ON THIS BOARD WITH OUESTIONS OR CONCERNS FOLLOWING THE FINAL 4 5 RELEASE OF THE BLUEPRINT AND THE DRAFT RHNA METHODOLOGY AS WELL. FROM A LOCAL JURISDICTION PERSPECTIVE, FOR FOLKS WHO ARE 6 LOOKING AT THE DATA AND THE NUMBERS AND THE OUTPUTS, THAT'S 7 8 WHY WE HAVE SETUP OUR OFFICE HOURS PROGRAM WHERE FOLKS CAN COME IN & SAY WHY DID THIS NUMBER GO UP OR WHY DID THIS NUMBER 9 10 GO DOWN IT'S AN OPPORTUNITY FOR CONVERSATION.

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12 LIZ GIBBONS: I APPRECIATE THAT. FURTHER COMMENTS LATER.

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14 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: DIRECTOR RABBIT.

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16 DAVID RABBIT: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO TALK TO OUR OWN PLANNING STAFF TODAY AND THEY HAD NOTHING BUT 17 PRAISE FOR THE WORK STAFF IS DOING IN PULLING TOGETHER ALL OF 18 THE RHNA ISSUES, AND I THINK YOU PROBABLY KNOW THROUGH THEIR 19 CONVERSATIONS WITH YOU, WHAT I'M GOING TO SAY, BUT WE NEED TO 20 21 CONTINUE TO WORK ON THESE THINGS. JUST LOOKING AT OUR COUNTY, WE ARE -- I SAID THIS BEFORE, THAT WE ARE ACTIVELY TRYING TO 22 BUILD UP OUR HOUSING STOCK IN THIS COUNTY. WE HAVE LOST 23 POPULATION, WE HAVE LOST 7,000 STRUCTURES OVER THE LAST, NOW, 24 THREE AND A HALF YEARS, DUE TO WILDFIRES. IT'S BEEN ONE 25

DISASTER AFTER ANOTHER AND CERTAINLY NO COUNTY HAS SUFFERED 1 WHAT WE HAVE. AT THE SAME TIME, WE HAVE OPPORTUNITIES IN THIS 2 3 COUNTY. WE HAVE URBAN GROWTH BOUNDARIES, ALL VOTER MANDATED EVERY CITY HAS ONE GREENBELTS OPEN SPACE. WE HAVE THE WILDLAND 4 5 INTERFACE, WE HAVE VERY HIGH FIRE SEVERITY ZONES WHICH ARE BEING REVIEWED AS WE SPEAK. AND WE HAVE, WERE FIRST IN THE 6 STATE TO GO THROUGH WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF FORESTERIES, PIECES 7 8 OF SAFE ROADS WHICH IS NOW INSTALLED AND WILL BECOME A BIGGER NEWS ITEM AS WE CONTINUE GOING FORWARD. AND OF COURSE IN 9 UNINCORPORATED COUNTY AREAS, DO LACK SERVICES AND WATER ASK 10 SEWER, AND WHAT WE HAVE IS A FIVE AND A HALF FOLD INCREASE. 11 AND GILLIAN I HEARD YOU SAY A LOT OF THAT IS BASED UPON THE 12 EXISTING UNITS THAT ARE WITHIN THAT AREA. AND I THINK IT GOES 13 TO WHAT IS OUR GOAL IS DON'T REPEAT SOMETHING THAT SHOULDN'T 14 15 HAVE BEEN THERE IN THE FIRST PLACE OR THAT HAD TOO MANY UNITS 16 IN THE FIRST PLACE THAT WE ARE REALLY NOW TRYING TO GET CITY CENTERED GROWTH AND HAVING NOT BEING EXASPERATED IN THE 17 OUTLYING UNINCORPORATED AREAS. I KNOW YOU WORKED HARD IN 18 TRYING TO MAKE THINGS -- WE WANT TO BUILD THE HOUSING IN THE 19 URBANIZED AREAS OF THE COUNTY AND IN THE CITY CENTERS, WE 20 THINK THAT WE'RE GETTING CLOSE BUTTERY THINK RIGHT NOW THE 21 NUMBER IS SCARY. BECAUSE WE THINK WE KNOW, HERE WE'RE GOING TO 22 HAVE THIS GREAT CITY CENTER GROWTH FEATHERING OUT INTO THE 23 OUTSKIRTS OF EVERY INDIVIDUAL UNINCORPORATED CITY AND THEN BE 24 FORCED TO OPPORTUNITIES FOR SERVICES THAT ARE INCREASE IN 25

DENSITY AND THANK YOU FOR THE GOOD WORK AND LOOK FORWARD TO 1 THE ADJUSTMENTS THAT WE HAVE THE RIGHT TOOLS GOING FORWARD. 2 3 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. DIRECTOR MAR? 4 5 GORDON MAR: THANK YOU PRESIDENT ARREGUIN. I JUST HAD MORE OF A 6 TECHNICAL OUESTION. I HAD HEARD THAT THE PLANNED BAY AREA 7 8 BASELINE NUMBERS FOR POPULATION GROWTH MIGHT -- ARE NOT YET FINALIZED AND THEY MIGHT CHANGE. SO I WAS JUST WONDERING IF 9 YOU CAN SPEAK TO THAT, AND IF SO WHAT THE IMPLICATIONS OF THAT 10 FOR US, KIND OF FINALIZING THE RHNA METHODOLOGY IN JANUARY, IF 11 THE POPULATION GROWTH BASELINE NUMBERS ARE STILL INFLUX, AND 12 MAY CHANGE? >DAVE VAUTIN: I'M HAPPY TO TAKE THAT QUESTION. SO 13 THIS BOARD APPROVED THE REGIONAL GROWTH FORECAST FOR PLANNED 14 BAY AREA 2050 IN SEPTEMBER. SO THAT HAS NOT CHANGED. THE TOTAL 15 16 POPULATION OF THE REGION, AS A WHOLE, IS LOCKED IN AT THIS POINT FOR PLANNED BAY AREA 2050. BUT THE PROJECTIONS ON THE 17 COUNTY AND SUBCOUNTY LEVELS DO CONTINUE TO EVOLVE, AND THAT'S 18 IN FACT WHAT THE STRATEGIES THAT YOU ALL ADOPTED THIS FALL, 19 WILL INFLUENCE, THE LOCATION OF GROWTH WITHIN THE BAY AREA 20 21 WILL BE SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT IN THE FINAL BLUEPRINT THAN IT WAS SIGNIFICANT DRAFT BLUEPRINT. A WIDE VARIETY OF NEW HOUSING 22 STRATEGIES WERE INTEGRATED INTO THAT ACTION, MODIFICATIONS OF 23 TRANSPORTATION AND OTHER INVESTMENT IN THE PLAN WERE MADE, SO 24 THAT AFFECTS THE DISTRIBUTION OF GROWTH WITHIN THE BAY AREA. 25

SO AS YOU WILL SEE, SHORTLY, IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS, AS I SAID, 1 2 THERE ARE IMPACTS FOR DIFFERENT CITIES AND COUNTIES ACROSS THE 3 REGION, SOME WILL SEE HIGHER LEVELS OF GROWTH OTHERS LOWER LEVELS OF GROWTH IS THAT DATA DOES FEED INTO THE DRAFT RHNA 4 5 METHODOLOGY THAT GILLIAN WAS SPEAKING ABOUT, GIVEN THAT THE BASELINE FOR RHNA IS DRIVEN BY PLANNED BAY AREA 2050. SO, THE 6 SHORT ANSWER IS, STAY TUNED. AND THAT'S WHAT WE'LL BE BACK 7 8 HERE NEXT MONTH TO TALK ABOUT AS WE SHOW YOU BOTH OF THESE TWO ITEMS AND YOU WILL SEE ALL OF THE IMPLICATIONS AT THE CITY 9 10 LEVEL.

12 GORDON MAR: GREAT. THANK YOU.

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: SO WHEN THE DRAFT -- THE FINAL 14 BLUEPRINT COMES OUT NEXT WEEK, WE SHOULD ALL TAKE A VERY CLOSE 15 16 LOOK. BECAUSE THAT GROWTH PATTERN WILL DEFINITELY INFORM THE RHNA ALLOCATIONS. THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR MAR, ANY OTHER 17 OUESTIONS? OKAY. THANK YOU. I UNDERSTAND DIRECTOR ROMERO'S ON 18 THE ATTENDEE SIDE, SO I'M GOING TO ACTIVATE HIS LINE. HE'S 19 CALLING IN THE NUMBER ENDING IN 2852. DIRECTOR ROMERO PLEASE 20 21 UNMUTE YOURSELF IF YOU WISH TO OFFER COMMENTS.

AND MY UNDERSTANDING IS THERE WILL BE SOME CHANGES, WE JUST DON'T KNOW TO WHAT MAGNITUDE. >DAVE VAUTIN: 9 YEAH. THAT'S CORRECT. THERE IS VARIATION, MANY CITIES WILL SEE 10 LIMITED CHANGE OTHERS WILL SEE MORE SIGNIFICANT CHANGE. BY 11 RELEASING THE FINAL BLUEPRINT IN THE DRAFT RHNA, AND AGAIN, IN 12 JUST THE NEXT FEW DAYS, REALLY THE COMMENT PERIOD IS ALL THE 13 WAY UP THROUGH THE ABAG MEETINGS INTO MID-AND LATE JANUARY SO 14 15 THERE IS PLENTY OF TIME FOR FOLKS REVIEW AND PROVIDE COMMENT 16 BEFORE THE MEETING.

CARLOS ROMERO: SO AT THE RPC MEETING THAT WILL BE OPPORTUNITY 18 FOR FOLKS TO PROVIDE COMMENTS ALL THE WAY UP TO APPROVAL. THIS 19 IS MORE SAN MATEO COUNTY SLIGHTLY PAROCHIAL THING. BUT I KNOW 20 21 BRISBANE HAS BEEN TALKING ABOUT SOME OF THE CONCERNS THAT MAYBE THE MAPS DIDN'T INCORPORATE SOME OF THE AREAS THAT IN 22 INCORPORATE AREAS THAT DIDN'T HAVE DEVELOPMENT POTENTIAL SOME 23 OF THE DISCUSSION GOING ON AND THAT IS REFLECTED IN THE FINAL 24 BLUEPRINT IS THAT CORRECT? >DAVE VAUTIN: THAT IS CORRECT. 25

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CARLOS ROMERO: GREAT. I WANTED TO FOLLOW UP. BECAUSE I KNOW 2 3 BRISBANE TALKED ABOUT THAT. AND THE FINAL THING S I WAS ONE OF THOSE FOLKS, WHO, ARE THE RPC AS WELL AS HMC ADVOCATING FOR 4 5 THE EQUITY ADJUSTMENT, I AM INTERESTED IF SEEING HOW THE FINAL BLUEPRINT WINDS UP MOVING NUMBERS AROUND. AND, AGAIN, I DON'T 6 WANT TO COMPLETELY TOSS OUT THE POSSIBILITY OF EQUITY 7 8 ADJUSTMENT. AS WE CERTAINLY REASONABLE, I THINK IT FELL SHORT BY TWO VOTES. ANYWAY, I PUT THAT OUT THERE, THE WORK, I 9 SUPPORT EIGHT A ABSOLUTELY, BUT I THINK IT WOULD BE A BETTER 10 OPTION IF IT HAD THE EQUITY OPTION INCLUDED IN T THANK YOU. 11 12 APPRECIATE IT.

SPEAKER: HI I'M SHAJUTI HOSSAIN OF PUBLIC ADVOCATES THANK YOU 7 8 FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO TALK ABOUT THE UPCOMING DRAFT PARTNERSHIP. WITH THE HOUSING ORGANIZATIONS IN THE BAY AREA WE 9 STRONGLY SUPPORT THE PROPOSED METHODOLOGY OPTION 8A HOUSING 10 BASELINE BUT ALSO SUPPORT THE EQUITY ADJUSTMENT TO FULLY MEET 11 THE FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING OBJECTIVE. I APPRECIATE BOARD 12 MEMBER ROMERO'S POINT ABOUT HAVING THE OPPORTUNITY TO COMMENT 13 AND I THINK THE OTHER BOARD MEMBERS SAID IT WOULD BE HELPFUL 14 FOR STAKEHOLDERS AND ELECTED'S TO PROVIDE COMMENTS AFTER WE 15 16 SEE ANY CHANGES IN THE RHNA ALLOCATIONS, OR THE ILLUSTRATIVE 17 ALLOCATIONS BASED ON THE FINAL PLANNED BAY AREA, SO, YOU KNOW, I APPRECIATE HAVING THE OPPORTUNITY TO PROVIDE COMMENTS BEFORE 18 THE RPC MEETING IN JANUARY, AND I WOULD HOPE THAT THOSE WILL 19 BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION. AND, JUST TO TOUCH ON THE EQUITY 20 21 ADJUSTMENT, AS A REFRESH, AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING MEANS TO REPLACE SEGREGATED LIVING PATTERNS WITH 22 INTEGRATED LIVING PATTERNS. AND THE PROPOSALS FOR THE 23 METHODOLOGY ARE NOT DOING WELL ON THE OBJECTIVE WHILE OPTION 24 25 8A PERFORMS WELL WITH EQUITY ADJUSTMENT FOR ALL FIVE OF THE

OBJECTIVES I AM TO COMMENT ON SLIDE SEVEN REGARDING EOUITY 1 ADJUSTMENTS SAYS THAT PROPOSED METHODOLOGY CURRENTLY ACHIEVES 2 3 THE OBJECTIVE OF AFFH HOWEVER WE DISAGREE WITH THAT CONCLUSION BECAUSE THERE ARE 17 EXCLUSIVE JURISDICTIONS THAT ARE NOT 4 5 GETTING THEIR PROPORTIONAL SHARE OF LOW INCOME ALLOCATIONS AND ESPECIALLY WITH THE POSSIBILITY OF CHANGING ALLOCATIONS I 6 THINK IT'S IMPORTANT TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE AN EQUITY ADJUSTMENT 7 8 TO MAKE SURE WE'RE NOT HARMING THE FURTHERING AFFIRMING FAIR HOUSING PIECE. THANK YOU SO MUCH. 9 10 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. 11 12 CLERK OF THE BOARD: NEXT SPEAKER IS BLARE BEAKMON, GO AHEAD, 13 14 SIR. 15 16 SPEAKER: HI. THANK YOU. FOR THIS ITEM, BLAIR BEAKMON HERE. I WAS FORTUNATELY -- I DID NOT SUBMIT A LETTER TO THE PROCESS IN 17 NOVEMBER. AND I HOPE THAT, YOU KNOW, MY THOUGHTS AND COMMENTS 18 OVER THE FOLLOWING MONTHS CAN BE NOTED FOR THE RHNA PROCESS. 19 I'M JUST LEARNING THAT THE BAHFA PROCESS IS VERY MUCH OF GREAT 20 21 INTEREST TO MYSELF. I AM INTERESTED HOW THE IDEAS OF RHNA AND MTC HOUSING IDEAS CAN TAKE THEIR MORE EXPERIMENTAL IDEAS AND 22 BRING THEM INTO BAHFA FINANCING IDEAS. AND, LIKE, WHAT I 23 SUGGESTED -- WHAT I OFFERED EARLIER, THAT, YOU KNOW, I'M 24 INTERESTED IN, YOU KNOW, HOW THIS CAN GO TO THE EVENTUALLY GO 25

TO THE STATE LEVEL AND ASK QUESTIONS OF VERY LOW AND EXTREMELY 1 2 LOW INCOME AND MIXED INCOME REALLY IDEAS ON ADDRESSING EQUITY 3 ISSUES, IN THE NEXT DECADE AND LOCAL CITIES ARE VERY INTERESTED IN THAT. HOW THAT WORKS. I WANT TO THANK ONE OF THE 4 5 BOARD PERSONS TONIGHT WHO ASKED ABOUT WILDFIRE CONDITIONS AND SITUATIONS AND HOW THAT CAN WORK INTO PLANNING, AND THAT'S THE 6 KIND OF WORDS I NEED TO HEAR. I'M TRYING TO LEARN HOW TO 7 8 INTEGRATE THE WORRIES, AND NEEDS OF NATURAL DISASTER AND WILDFIRES AND EARTHOUAKE BASICALLY IN THE NEXT 5 TO 10 YEARS 9 AND HOW WE INTEGRATE THAT INTO OUR THINKING, AND I HEAR THAT 10 OFTEN HOW OUR LOCAL OFFICIALS TALK AND HOPEFULLY I CAN BE A 11 PART OF THAT LANGUAGE IS LEARN THAT LANGUAGE TO INCORPORATE 12 THAT INTO OUR DAILY KIND OF DIALOGUE, AND IT TAKES PRACTICE TO 13 LEARN HOW TO DO THAT. AND HOPEFULLY I'M LEARNING THAT. THANKS 14 15 FOR YOUR TIME.

19 CLERK OF THE BOARD: NEXT SPEAKER IS AARON ECKHOUSE. GO AHEAD20 PLEASE.

22 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. MY NAME IS AARON ECKHOUSE, THE REGIONAL 23 POLICY MANAGER FOR CALIFORNIA YIMBY, YES IN MY BACKYARD. I 24 ATTENDED EVERY MEETING OF THE HOUSING METHODOLOGY COMMITTEE. I 25 SAW HOW THAT PUT INTO CRAFTING THE BALANCE METHODOLOGY THAT

MET ALL OF THE STATUTORY OBJECTIVES THAT'S WHY WE SUPPORTED 1 ADOPTING THE METHODOLOGY WITH A FEW MINOR ADJUSTMENTS THEY 2 3 THINK YOU HAVE HEARD ABOUT, TO ADDRESS ISSUES IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS, AND POTENTIALLY IMPROVE PERFORMANCE ON 4 5 EQUITY. I THINK THAT CONTINUES TO BE OUR POSITION. IT WILL BE INTERESTING TO SEE THE CHANGES TO PLANNED BAY AREA HOW THEY 6 AFFECT THE GROWTH PATTERN AND WHETHER THERE ARE ANY ADDITIONAL 7 8 CHANGES THAT NEED TO BE MADE. BUT GENERALLY, THE METHODOLOGY FROM HMC IS BALANCED REGIONAL INTEREST IT BALANCES THE FULL 9 RANGE OF STATUTORY OBJECTIVES, AND CAN ADDRESS THE MOST 10 SIGNIFICANT CONCERNS. I THINK THERE ARE SOME CONCERNS THAT 11 HAVE BEEN RAISED THAT YOU CANNOT ADDRESS, AND FRANKLY YOU 12 SHOULD NOT ADDRESS PEOPLE WHO SAY THAT WE SHOULD WAIT BASED ON 13 THE CURRENT PANDEMIC, AND WE DON'T NEED TO ADDRESS OUR HOUSING 14 15 NEEDS UNTIL WE SEE THE AFTER EFFECTS OF THE PANDEMIC, THAT 16 SEEMS WRONG TO ME. PEOPLE, IN THE CRISIS PRE PANDEMIC, STILL EXISTS DURING THE PANDEMIC, AND WILL POST PANDEMIC. WHETHER 17 THEY'RE WORKING PEOPLE HAVE A HUGE UNMET NEED AND THE IDEA 18 THAT WE WOULD PUT THAT ON HOLD BECAUSE, YOU KNOW, NINE OF THE 19 TEN MOST SEGREGATED CITIES IN THE BAY AREA, WROTE TO YOU, AND 20 21 ARE UPSET THAT THEY CAN'T MEET THESE GOALS, I WOULD LOOK ON THAT WITH A CRITICAL EYE. SO, PLEASE DO UPHOLD THIS 22 METHODOLOGY, AND THANK YOU. 23

GO AHEAD, SIR. 3 SPEAKER: THANK YOU GOOD EVENING EVERYONE MY NAME IS ROD 4 5 MONIQUENCE I SERVE ON THE HOUSING AUTHORITY COMMITTEE AND I WOULD LIKE TO AFFIRM MY COLLEAGUES AT CALIFORNIA YIMBY AND 6 PUBLIC ADVOCATES AS WELL AS COMMENTS OF DIRECTOR ROMERO THE 7 8 ADJUSTMENT IS ESSENTIAL TO SAFEGUARD AND UPHOLD OUR AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING AND REFINING THE 9 10 FINALIZED BLUEPRINT HOUSING PROJECTIONS. 11 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER IS JUSTINE. GO 12 AHEAD PLEASE. 13 14 SPEAKER: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. MY NAME IS JUSTINE MARK US. I AM 15 16 WITH ENTERPRISE, WE SHARED IN OUR COMMENT LETTER ALONG WITH 30 EQUITY HOUSE ORGANIZATIONS ACROSS THE REGION STRONG SUPPORT 17 FOR OPTION 8A WITH THE ADDITIONAL REFINEMENT OF EQUITY 18 ADJUSTMENT FOR FURTHER F AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHERING FAIR 19 HOUSING. IT MEETS ALL THE FIVE STATUTORY OBJECTIVES AND WE 20 21 WORKED TIRELESSLY TO PROVIDE DATA AND ENGAGE WITH STAKEHOLDERS AND LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO REFINE THE METHODOLOGY WORKING 22 TOWARDS CONSENSUS OVER THE PAST YEAR. CONSIDERING THE 23 METHODOLOGY IN PREPARATION FOR THE VOTE IN OUR SUBMISSION IN 24 THE NEXT YEAR I OF THE TO LIFT UP THE CONTINUED SUPPORT FOR 25

THE AGGREGATE OPTION TO ADVANCE OBJECTIVES FOR AFFIRMATIVELY 1 FURTHERING FAIR HOUSING. UNLIKE OTHER GOALS LIKE REDUCING 2 3 GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS VAULTING AFFIRMATIVELY FAIR HOUSING IN THE AGGREGATE DOES NOT CAPTURE OUR SUCCESS IN MEETING THE 4 5 STATUTORY OBJECTIVE. MORE OVER ALTHOUGH THE EOUITY ADJUSTMENT MAY ADD ADDITIONAL COMPLEXITY TO THE METHODOLOGY, WE'RE 6 BELIEVE THAT ADDRESSING RACIAL RESIDENTIAL SEGREGATION AND 7 8 UPHOLDING THIS UNIFORM STANDARD IS A GOAL MORE WORTHY OF ADDITIONAL COMPLEXITY. RHNA ASKED US TO ADDRESS COMPLEX 9 CHALLENGES AND I URGE YOU ALL TO NOT STOP SHORT OF ALL WE CAN 10 DO TO MEET THIS GOAL. THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME AND WE LOOK 11 FORWARD TO WORKING WITH YOU IN THE NEW YEAR. 12

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KNOW DIRECTOR GIBBONS, YOU SAID YOU HAD SOME COMMENTS. I DON'T 1 KNOW IF YOU WANT TO SPEAK AT THIS TIME? 2 3 GIBSON MCELHANEY: SORRY. I AM HAVING A LITTLE TROUBLE WITH MY 4 5 SEQUENCE OF SCREENS HERE. BUT, YES, PLEASE. 6 7 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: TAKE IT AWAY. 8 GIBSON MCELHANEY: THANK YOU. SO --9 10 LIZ GIBBONS: THIS HAS BEEN A PROCESS IN INFORMATION AND 11 LEARNING KNOWLEDGE AND I CERTAINLY APPRECIATE EVERYTHING THAT 12 I'M LEARNING. I HAVE BEEN ASKED TO MAKE SURE THAT WHEN PEOPLE 13 HAVE COMMENTS IT'S A LITTLE CONCERNING THAT THE FINAL REPORT 14 15 IS GOING TO BE PUBLISHED AND PEOPLE WANT ME TO BE ASKED TO BE 16 SURE THAT THERE IS AN OPPORTUNITY THAT THE FINAL CAN IN FACT BE CHANGED BASED ON INFORMATION COMING FORWARD AFTER THIS 17 WEEK'S PUBLICATION. TWO, THAT THERE IS A RISK OF UNINTENDED 18 CONSEQUENCES THAT CITIES FACED BECAUSE OF NEW LEGISLATION, 19 THAT CONTROLS THE FACT THAT YOU CAN'T USE PARCELS LESS THAN 20 21 HALF AN ACRE FOR YOUR HOUSING ELEMENT, AND MORE THAN TEN ACRES, AND THAT THE CYCLE FIVE PARCELS CAN'T BE USED IN QUITE 22 THE SAME WAY THAT THEY WERE PREVIOUSLY. SO THERE IS AN AWFUL 23 LOT OF LEGISLATION IMPACTS ON THE VIABILITY OF AVAILABLE LAND. 24 AND IT'S ONE OF THOSE WEIRD THINGS THAT'S HAPPENED SINCE THE 25

HCD DATA WAS PROVIDED. SO THAT'S A HUMDINGER. THE OTHER 1 COMMENT WAS THAT THE 30 TO 45 MINUTE TRAVEL TIME HAS THE 2 3 POTENTIAL UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCE IN ONE OF THE RESPONSES TONIGHT TALKS ABOUT A JOB IMPROVING THE JOBS/HOUSING RATIO, 4 5 AND YET, IN FACT IT MAY MAKE IT WORSE, BECAUSE SOME -- IN CERTAINLY IN THE SOUTH BAY, AND I AM QUITE SURE IT'S TRUE IN 6 OTHER COMMUNITIES AS WELL, IN OTHER COUNTIES, THAT YOU CAN 7 8 DRIVE-THRU A CITY OR TWO OR THREE IN 30 MINUTES OR PUBLIC TRANSIT TAKES YOU THROUGH SEVERAL. SO, YOU MAY IN FACT BE 9 CREATING BEDROOM COMMUNITIES, BECAUSE CITIES CAN'T CONTROL THE 10 BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT APPROVED BY ADJACENT CITIES. CITIES ALL 11 KNOW THAT JOBS GENERATION CREATES MORE INCOME AT LOWER EXPENSE 12 TO A CITY, WHEREAS HOUSING IS HIGHER SERVICE AND LOWER 13 REVENUE. SO, THERE IS THE POTENTIAL TO EXACERBATE THE HOUSING 14 15 SITUATION. AND MAKE THE SITUATION OF HIGH -- ABOVE MARKET RATE 16 HOUSING EVEN HIGHER. THERE IS THINGS LIKE THAT. SO, I WAS ALSO ASKED TO STRESS THAT WITH THE LATEST ROUND OF, STAYING IN 17 PLACE, THAT CITIES DON'T HAVE STAFF CAPABILITIES AS MUCH AS 18 THEY MIGHT HAVE, AND THAT THE REVENUE INCOME IS GOING TO BE 19 DOWN SIGNIFICANTLY MORE. I THINK ALL OF US KNOW THAT. BUT FOR 20 21 COMMUNITIES WHERE PROPERTY TAX, HOTEL TAX, AND SALES TAX ARE THE SOURCES OF INCOME, TWO OUT OF THE THREE ARE DRASTICALLY 22 REDUCED. AND THERE WAS A STRONG REQUEST, I KNOW THAT PRESIDENT 23 ARREGUIN HAS WRITTEN TO THE STATE BEFORE, BUT THERE IS A 24 STRONG REQUEST THAT WE TRY AND POSTPONE THE HOUSING ELEMENTS 25

UPDATES FOR A YEAR. IF THE PERSON ON SMALLER CITY IN 1 2 PARTICULAR, IS VERY, VERY DIFFICULT. SO WITH APPRECIATION, I 3 THINK THERE IS A LOT OF RISK FOR UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES THAT WE'RE DEALING WITH. I HAVE SENT IN TEN OR 12 LETTERS OR 4 5 ARTICLES TO ALL THE EXECUTIVE BOARD AND STAFF SHOWING THE NUMBER OF BUSINESSES MOVING OUT OF OUR AREA. THAT'S 6 PARTICULARLY TRUE IN SAN MATEO AND SANTA CLARA COUNTIES, THAT 7 8 IS HAVING A DIFFERENCE, POLICY CHANGES FROM FACEBOOK AND GOOGLE AND SO FORTH WORKING FROM HOME TREMENDOUS CHANGES SINCE 9 THE LAST TIME IT WAS LOOKED AT IN THE SUMMER. I THINK WE HAVE 10 A RESPONSIBILITY TO TAKE ANOTHER LOOK AT DELAYING THIS 11 PARTICULAR CYCLE. SO WITH THAT, I LOOK FORWARD TO RECEIVING 12 THE INFORMATION FROM STAFF. BUT I THINK, AS A BODY, WE 13 PROBABLY NEED TO TAKE SOME HARD LOOKS AT WHAT IT IS WE FEEL WE 14 15 CAN DO TO THE BEST INTEREST OF THE HOUSING PROBLEM, AND THE 16 SOLUTIONS THAT DON'T CREATE MORE PROBLEMS THAN THEY SOLVE. 17 THANK YOU.

19 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. MS. MCMILLAN.

21 THERESE MCMILLAN: YES. THANK YOU PRESIDENT ARREGUIN. AND I 22 JUST WANTED TO REMIND ALL OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS INTO 23 SOME OF THING OBSERVATIONS THAT DIRECTOR GIBBONS MADE. WE MADE 24 A PRESENTATION JUST LAST MONTH ON THE EXTRAORDINARY LEVEL OF 25 TECHNICAL RESOURCES THAT ARE BEING MADE AVAILABLE TO LOCAL

JURISDICTIONS, CITIES AND COUNTIES TO HELP WITH THE 1 2 DEVELOPMENT OF THE HOUSING ELEMENT. THIS WAS THE, YOU KNOW, 3 THE SHARE OF THE \$25 MILLION THAT CAME, YOU KNOW, TO THE REGION BASED ON THE GOVERNOR'S -- THE REEF AND REAP GRANTS, 4 5 SOME OF THE MONEY GOING DIRECTLY TO LOCAL JURISDICTIONS AND A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT BEING COORDINATED AT THE REGIONAL LEVEL AND 6 WORKING EXTREMELY CLOSELY WITH LOCAL PLANNERS AND HOUSING 7 8 DEVELOPMENTS TO FIND OUT WHAT YOU NEED. AND WE HAVE CONSTRUCTED, FROM ALL ACCOUNTS, THE UNPRECEDENTED LEVEL OF 9 ASSISTANCE TO HELP LOCAL JURISDICTIONS GET THE HOUSING 10 ELEMENTS DONE. I THINK WE ALL KNOW THAT THIS WAS NEVER GOING 11 TO AN EASY PROCESS, AND I THINK WE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THE COVID 12 SITUATION HAS MADE THE SITUATION HARDER, BUT WE DO HAVE THE 13 RESOURCES THAT WILL BE AVAILABLE TO LOCAL JURISDICTIONS AND 14 15 THAT IN FACT HAVE BEEN TAILORED BASED ON THEIR ASSESSMENTS OF 16 WHERE THEIR GREATEST NEEDS ARE. SO I JUST WANTED TO REMIND MEMBERS THAT THAT RESOURCE IS GOING TO BE AVAILABLE. 17

19 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: THANK YOU.

21 LIZ GIBBONS: I APPRECIATE THAT STATEMENT. BUT MY REQUEST22 REMAINS.

JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: OKAY. I AGREE WITH MS. MCMILLAN, AS
WAS PRESENTED AT THE LAST MEETING, WE ARE ALREADY IMPLEMENTING

THE REAP PROGRAM, AND THERE WILL BE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE, A 1 2 CONSULTING BENCH, DIRECT GRANTS WHICH WE'LL BE AUTHORIZING 3 SOON TO UPDATE THEIR ZONING AND IMPLEMENTING THEIR HOUSING ELEMENTS. WE KNOW THAT DUE TO RECENT CHANGES THE STATE 4 5 LEGISLATION HAS SAID THIS REGION DOES HAVE TO ACCOMMODATE A NUMBER IN EVERY COMMUNITY. OUR JOB IS NOT JUST TO MAKE THE 6 DECISION ON HOW THOSE UNITS ARE DISTRIBUTED BUT ALSO TO 7 8 PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT IN DEVELOPING THEIR HOUSING ELEMENT. I THINK THAT'S A REALLY CRITICAL PROGRAM THAT 9 10 WE'RE LAUNCHING, AND I WANT TO THANK STAFF FOR ALL THEIR WORK. COLLEAGUES, ANY QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS ON THE PRESENTATION OF 11 RHNA? IF SO PLEASE RAISE YOUR HAND. I DO NOT SEE ANY OTHER 12 RAISED HANDS. SO AT OUR NEXT MEETING ON JANUARY 21ST, WE WILL 13 BE VOTING ON SENDING THE RHNA METHODOLOGY TO HCD, AND ON THE 14 15 FINAL BLUEPRINT, SO STAY TUNED FOR INFORMATION FROM STAFF ON 16 THE FINAL BLUEPRINT, AND THE RHNA METHODOLOGY. AND WE SHOULD 17 HAVE A ROBUST DISCUSSION AT OUR NEXT MEETING. AND SO, LOOK FORWARD TO A DISCUSSION AND ACTION ON THOSE ISSUES. SO THANK 18 YOU. OKAY. THAT COMPLETES OUR ITEMS ON OUR AGENDA. SO BEFORE 19 WE CLOSE, I JUST WANT TO ONCE AGAIN THANK ALL OF THE DEPARTING 20 21 BOARD MEMBERS FOR YOUR MANY YEARS OF SERVICE AND YOUR EXCEPTIONAL LEADERSHIP ON THIS BOARD AND FOR THE REGION. THE 22 YOU WILL BE MISSED. I HOPE THAT SOON WE WILL BE ABLE TO MEET 23 AND HONOR YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE IN PERSON, SO STAY TUNED FOR 24 INFORMATION ON THAT. BEFORE WE CLOSE THIS HAS BEEN ONE OF THE 25

MOST DIFFICULT YEARS THAT WE HAVE EVER EXPERIENCED AND I WANT 1 TO THANK ALL OF YOU. YOU ARE ALL LEADER IN YOUR COMMUNITIES 2 AND IN THIS REGION. THANK YOU FOR HELPING GET OUR REGION 3 THROUGH THIS UNPRECEDENTED TIME. THANK YOU FOR ALL YOUR HARD 4 5 WORK. PLEASE BE SAFE AND HAPPY HOLIDAYS, AND WITH THAT, THE NEXT REGULAR MEETING OF THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD IS ON JANUARY 6 7 21ST, 2021, AND THIS MEETING IS ADJOURNED. THANK YOU. 8 [ADJOURNED]
