

AGENDA ITEM FOUR BLUE 9 RIBBON TRANSIT RECOVERY TASK FORCE UPDATE. RANDI KINMAN WILL 10 GIVE US AN UPDATE. RANDI IS THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL CHAIR. 11 AND WILL PRESENT THIS INFORMATIONAL ITEM. RANDI, PLEASE. 12 13 RANDI KINMAN: THERE IS NOT MUCH TO UPDATE ON, BECAUSE THINGS 14 HAVE BEEN GOING SO RAPIDLY. THEY'RE IN THE PROCESS OF 15 16 OUTLINING THE MANAGER -- THE OVERALL TRANSIT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM BY DOING A LOT OF INTERVIEWS. THEY'VE ALSO DONE TWO SESSIONS 17 WITH, ONE WITH THE SMALL OPERATORS, AND ONE WITH THE LARGE 18 OPERATORS. AND TO GATHER INPUT FROM THEM. THAT WAS PERFECT, AND I AM 17 IMPRESSED. MOST PEOPLE DON'T SAY THAT NAME CORRECTLY. I 18 APPRECIATE THAT. GOOD MORNING EVERYONE. IS THE PRESENTATION 19 ABLE TO COME UP? I WASN'T SURE IF THAT WAS POSSIBLE. OH THERE 20 WE GO. THANK YOU VERY MUCH THANK YOU SO MUCH. MY NAME IS JOHN 21 22 KANNEGEISER AND MY PARTNER HERE KY-NAM MILLER I'M HERE TO SPEAK TODAY ABOUT THE SUMMER, SCHOOL AND COLLEGE INTERNSHIP 23 PROGRAM. I'M HERE TO TALK ABOUT HISTORY AND HIGHLIGHTS AND 24

PLANS AND PARTNERSHIPS WE'RE CULTIVATING. HIGHLIGHTS, AS MANY



- 1 OF YOU ARE AWARE THE PROGRAM WAS ESTABLISHED 20 YEARS AGO TO
- 2 PROMOTE RACIAL EQUITY BEFORE THAT WAS EVEN GIVEN A TERM
- 3 REPORTING THE DIFFERENCE ESPECIALLY FEMALES AND THOSE OF COLOR
- 4 HAVE 100 PLUS STUDENTS GONE THROUGH THE PROGRAM THROUGHOUT
- 5 HIGH SCHOOL INTERNSHIP. OUR HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE PROGRAMS
- 6 WERE PAUSED LAST YOU TUBER DUE TO BUDGET CONSTRAINTS AND
- 7 COVID-19. THE GOAL WAS TO REFOCUS PROGRAMS TO ENSURE OUR
- 8 PROGRAM IS SERVING UNDERREPRESENTED GROUPS BOTH LOW INCOME AND
- 9 THOSE OF COLOR TO EXPOSE THE STUDENTS TO THE PROFESSIONAL
- 10 ENVIRONMENT AND SUPPORTING THEIR PATHWAYS TO HIGHER EDUCATION.
- 11 IN TERMS OF PARTNERSHIPS TO MAKE THAT RETOOLING MOST EFFECTIVE
- 12 WE HAVE BEEN MEETING MONTHLY WITH OUR INTERNSHIP WORKING
- 13 GROUP, WHICH IS COMPRISED OF REPRESENTATIVES FROM MTC HR,
- 14 LEGISLATION AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS, LPA, THE AIR DISTRICT AND SOME
- 15 POLICY ADVISERS MEMBERS COUNCIL MEMBERS AS WELL. THE GROUP HAS
- 16 ESTABLISHED PROPOSE SAID A ROADMAP ON HOW TO RE-ESTABLISHED
- 17 THE HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM AND COLLEGE INTERNSHIP PROGRAM TO
- 18 PROPOSE NECESSARY STAFF FOR FISCAL YEAR 2021 AND 2022 TO
- 19 REALLY RESTART AND RELAUNCH THE PROGRAMS, AND LOOK FORWARD TO
- 20 WAYS TO DEVELOP THE PLAN IN FUTURE YEARS. THIS WORK GROUP WILL
- 21 CONTINUE TO MEET EVERY OTHER MONTH UNTIL THE FALL WITH AD-HOC
- 22 MEETINGS AHEAD FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL RELAUNCH. OUR PROGRAM WILL
- 23 LOOK FOR ADDITIONAL STUDENT RECRUITMENT METHODS PARTICULARLY
- 24 FOR STUDENTS OF DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES AND COMMUNITIES OF
- 25 COLOR. WE WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT IS OUR TARGET AUDIENCE AND



- 1 THAT WE'RE FINDING PEOPLE TO PLACE FROM THAT TARGET AUDIENCE
- 2 BEYOND OUR TRADITIONAL PRACTICES, REACHING OUT TO STUDENTS
- 3 RISING ABOVE, HELPING STUDENTS FROM DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES
- 4 AND PEOPLE OF COLOR TO HELP WITH OUR RECRUITING EFFORTS. WE'LL
- 5 REACH OUT TO A VARIETY OF HIGH SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES THAT
- 6 TRADITIONALLY SERVE STUDENTS OF COLOR AND STUDENTS LIVING IN
- 7 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. DUE TO THE
- 8 BUDGET PUBLIC HEALTH WITH COVID, AND CAPACITY CONSTRAINTS, THE
- 9 HIGH SCHOOL INTERNSHIP PROGRAM WILL FULLY RELAUNCH UNTIL 2022.
- 10 HOWEVER, MTC IS IN WORKS WITH AIR DISTRICT STAFF AND OUR
- 11 INTERNSHIP WORKING GROUP ON HAVING A NON-COMPENSATED SHORT
- 12 SEMINAR SUMMER CERTIFICATION PROGRAM FOR HIGH SCHOOLERS TO
- 13 LEARN THE BAY AREA'S REGIONAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES THIS SUMMER
- 14 OF 2021. THE GOAL IS FOR SUMMER '22 TO RELAUNCH AN EMPLOYEE
- 15 WITH HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH AGENCY PARTNERS LIKE WE DID IN
- 16 THE PAST BUT WITH ENHANCEMENTS. DETAILS WILL BE WORKED OUT ON
- 17 HOW TO ENHANCE THE EXPERIENCE FOR THE STUDENTS WITH THE
- 18 INTERNSHIP WORKING GROUP. OUR PLAN IS TO HAVE A COLLEGE
- 19 INTERNSHIP PROGRAM AT MTC FOR THIS COMING SUMMER OF 2021.
- 20 WE'RE TARGETING 10 STUDENTS STARTING THIS JUNE, AS MENTIONED
- 21 PREVIOUSLY, OUR GOAL IS TO IMPLEMENT ALTERNATIVE METHODS OF
- 22 RECRUITMENT TO ENSURE WE'RE RECRUITING STUDENTS FROM
- 23 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES AND COMMUNITIES OF COLOR. THE
- 24 PROGRAM WILL RUN FOR EIGHT WEEKS, JUNE AND JULY. NEXT SLIDE



PLEASE. SO, NOW, I WOULD LIKE TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS, AND KY-1 2 NAM IS HERE AS WELL TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS THAT YOU MAY HAVE. 3 VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: RICK COATES I SEE YOU HAVE A QUESTION. 4 5 RICK COATES: ACTUALLY I HAVE THREE QUESTIONS. I WOULD LIKE TO 6 KNOW WHO ARE THE SONOMA MEMBERS ARE THAT ARE IMPLEMENTING THIS 7 8 OR HAVE IMPLEMENTED THIS. THE SECOND IS, DOES DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES INCLUDE DISABLED? AND THE THIRD OUESTION IS, HOW 9 DO YOU INTEGRATE THIS INTO A SCHOOL PROGRAM THAT'S ALREADY 10 PACKED? I'M AN EX-TEACHER. MY WIFE IS TEACHING, WE'RE ALWAYS 11 CONSCIOUS OF THE FACT THAT THERE ARE STATE STANDARDS THAT HAVE 12 TO BE MET, AND TESTING REQUIREMENTS AND TRYING TO FIT 13 SOMETHING ELSE INTO THE CURRICULUM IS ALWAYS A DIFFICULT TASK. 14 15 16 JOHN KANNEGIESER: ALL GOOD QUESTIONS. AND OF COURSE WITH THE SONOMA PIECE, THE MEMBERS OF THE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL THAT 17 ARE ON OUR INTERNSHIP WORKING GROUP NOW ARE CYNTHIA MURRAY, 18 AND CHRISTINA GOTUACO. AM I SAYING THAT RIGHT? BUT IN TERMS OF 19 MAKING SURE THAT WE'RE INCORPORATING THOSE STUDENTS, WHEN WE 20 ARE DOING OUR OUTREACH FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL INTERNSHIP 21 PLACEMENTS NEXT YEAR AND ALSO FOR THE PROGRAM WE'RE GOING TO 22 HAVE THIS SUMMER WE'RE COMMITTED TO MAKING SURE THAT WE REACH 23 ALL OF THE COUNTIES THROUGHOUT BAY AREA, NOT JUST THE BIG 24

ONES. WE WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE REALLY ARE HAVING THAT



- 1 IMPACT AND THAT OUTREACH TO THOSE COMMUNITIES. AND I AGREE
- 2 WITH YOU, REGARDING DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, DISABLED DOES
- 3 NEED TO BE A PART OF THAT COMPONENT, AND WE ARE MAKING SURE
- 4 THAT WE'RE MAKING IT OUR GOAL TO OUTREACH TO THOSE COMMUNITIES
- 5 AS WELL. IN TERMS OF A PROGRAM THAT'S ALREADY PACKED, I SEE
- 6 WHAT YOU MEAN BY PEOPLE BEING SO BUSY, BUT LUCKILY THIS
- 7 PROGRAM WOULD BE IN THE SUMMER SO HOPEFULLY THEY'LL HAVE TIME
- 8 TO DO THE WORK, FOR EXAMPLE, ON THE PROGRAM THAT WE'RE GOING
- 9 TO HAVE IN THE SUMMER, AND OF COURSE INTERNSHIPS WILL BE RUN
- 10 IN THE SUMMER AS WELL FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS. ALL GOOD
- 11 QUESTIONS, AND FAIR.

IN TERMS OF THE TARGET 12 GROUP, YOU DID MENTION COMMUNITIES OF COLOR, PEOPLE OF COLOR, 13 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. WHICH GROUP, SPECIFICALLY, ARE YOU 14 15 TARGETING? YOU KNOW? AND, FOR ME, PERSONALLY, YOU KNOW, I'M 16 INVOLVED IN THE BLACK HISTORY MONTH WITH SEVERAL ORGANIZATIONS AND I REMEMBER TALKING TO ONE OF THE SENATORS LAST WEEK. I 17 SAID, DO YOU HAVE ANY PEOPLE OF COLOR IN YOUR OFFICE TO HELP 18 US WITH THE BLACK HISTORY MONTH. HE SAID, OH YEAH, I HAVE 19 SOMEBODY OF COLOR AND IT ENDED UP BEING A JAPANESE PERSON. TO 20 ME, I WAS THINKING OF IT BEING A BLACK PERSON SO I WAS WRONG 21 TO SAY PEOPLE OF COLOR. SO, AFTER THAT MEETING, I THINK I AM 22 BEGINNING TO WONDER WHAT IS, PEOPLE OF COLOR, COMMUNITY OF 23 COLOR? CAN WE BE MORE SPECIFIC ABOUT THE TARGET WE'RE LOOK AT? 24 25 YOU KNOW, JUST EDUCATE ME.

BUS TRANSPORTATION SO THEY CAN GET TO WORK AND SHOPPING. THANK 1 2 YOU. 3 JUDIS SANTOS: THE PREVIOUS CYCLE INCLUDED \$7 MILLION IN 5307 4 5 FUNDS SO WE HAVE AN UPCOMING CYCLE. THE LIFELINE IS STILL BEING FUNDED WITH 5307 FUNDS. AND THERE ARE NO ADDITIONAL FUND 6 7 SOURCES THAT ARE IDENTIFIED. 8 9 RICHARD HEDGES: DO WE KNOW HOW MUCH THAT'S GOING TO BE? 10 JUDIS SANTOS: AROUND 7 MILLION. 11 12 RICHARD HEDGES: THAT'S WHAT WE WERE TOLD ABOUT A YEAR AGO WHEN 13 WE FIRST STARTED THIS PROCESS. THAT'S UNFORTUNATE BECAUSE I'M 14 15 SURE THAT SAMTRANS OTHER AND AGENCIES THAT HAVE THESE 16 ADDITIONAL FUNDING SOME OF THESE LINES WILL NOT HAVE BEEN 17 FUNDED. 18 19 VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: THANK YOU. YOU CAN TELL US WHEN THE NEW CYCLE WILL BEGIN? 20 21 22 JUDIS SANTOS: WE'RE PREPARED FOR THE UPCOMING CYCLE WITHIN 23 THIS YEAR. SO WE'RE GOING TO BE [INDISCERNIBLE] THAT 24 RELATIVELY SOON.

THAT'S WHAT THAT SLIDE SAYS. 18 19 JUDIS SANTOS: THIS ITEM IS AN INFORMATION ITEM FOR TODAY AND 20 21 THIS IS AN ACTION THAT WE'RE GOING TO BE RECOMMENDING TO THE PROGRAMMING AND ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE TO FORWARD TO THE 22 COMMISSION FOR APPROVAL. 23 24

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ANNE OLIVIA ELDRED: OKAY.

JUDIS SANTOS: WELL, WE WOULD LIKE -- IF YOU CAN PULL UP THE 1 2 SLIDE, THE ONE WITH THE OPPORTUNITY AREAS AND NEXT STEPS, 3 PLEASE. SO WHAT WE'RE LOOKING FOR IS, YOU KNOW, THE PB PILOT WE FOUND WAS SUCCESSFUL WITH ENGAGEMENTS AND POWER THESE NEXT 4 5 STEPS, WE WANT TO LOOK AT WAYS WHERE WE CAN SUPPORT LOCAL PB EFFORTS BUT WE KNOW THERE IS AN UPFRONT COST IN FUNDING THE 6 PLANNING EFFORT, AS WELL AS FUNDING THE PROJECTS THAT RESULT 7 8 FROM THE PB PROCESS. SO, WHAT WE WOULD LIKE TO DO IS LOOK AT, EXPLORE DIFFERENT FUND SOURCES THAT WOULD MEET PROGRAM NEEDS 9 THAT ARE MORE FLEXIBLE THAN THE 5307 FUND SOURCES, THAT'S PB 10 AS A WHOLE BUT WE WANT TO LOOK AT DIFFERENT ELEMENTS THAT MAKE 11 UP PB LIKE INCLUSION METRICS AND SHARED DECISION MAKING AND 12 COMMUNITY LEARNING ROLLED OUT IN THE PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS 13 THAT WE EXECUTE AT MTC. SO AS FAR AS WHEN, SO THIS IS A PILOT 14 15 THERE HASN'T BEEN A DECISION WHETHER TO HAVE AN UPCOMING 16 CYCLE, BE IT A PB IMPLEMENTATION, AS WELL. I THINK IT WOULD BE IMPORTANT TO IDENTIFY THAT FUND SOURCE, THOUGH, IN ORDER --17 WHEN INDIVIDUALS GO OUT TO IDENTIFY WHAT THE COMMUNITY NEEDS 18 ARE, THAT FUND SOURCE MATCHES UP WITH THAT. 19 20 RICK COATES: I WOULD CERTAINLY HOPE THERE WOULD BE ANOTHER 21 CYCLE. AND I WAS STRUCK BY WHAT WALTER POINTED OUT, THE 22 DIVERGENCE BETWEEN WHAT THE PUBLIC SEEMS TO WANT AND WHAT THEY 23 GET. I HAVE A FEELING THAT MAYBE CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS TEND 24

TO SKEW THE RESULTS A LITTLE MORE THAN WE WOULD LIKE IT TO.

AND IT'S 21 22 PART OF A -- AN EXISTING PROGRAM THAT MUNI RUNS. 23 MICHAEL LOPEZ: SO IS THAT A 24/7 PROGRAM? OR WHATEVER THE 24

BUT GOING BACK TO THE CBT PIECE THIS IS ESSENTIAL BECAUSE IT'S COMMUNITY-BASED TRANSPORTATION 24

PLANNING. WHEN THESE ARE DONE, THE COMMUNITY HAS AN



EXPECTATION THAT THINGS WILL ACTUALLY GET DONE THAT OUITE 1 OFTEN DON'T GET DONE BECAUSE -- NOT BECAUSE OF POLITICS, BUT 2 3 BECAUSE OF FUNDING. IT IS A TRANSIT AGENCY'S GOAL TO PUT AS MANY RIDERS IN SEATS AS POSSIBLE. THAT DOESN'T NECESSARILY 4 5 MEAN THAT THAT ALIGNS WITH AN EOUITY PLATFORM WHICH WE REALLY HAVEN'T HAD ACROSS THE BOARD. AND 11 THE PROBLEM THAT WE'RE GOING TO HAVE, COMING INTO THIS, IS 12 IDENTIFYING A FUNDING SOURCE. BECAUSE THE LOCAL AGENCIES DO 13 NOT HAVE THE MONEY TO DO THIS. NOW, I'M SITTING ON A CBTP FROM 14 15 22 YEARS AGO, THEY STILL USE AS MY BLUEPRINT FOR WHY IS THIS 16 STREET NOT GETTING LANE REDUCTIONS AND BIPLANES. SO THAT CAN 17 ALWAYS BE ROLLED INTO A NEW CBTP. BUT THE REALITY IS, IT'S THE ONLY ONE THAT WE HAVE, AND IT'S THE ONLY ONE WE HAVE IN WHAT'S 18 CONSIDERED A BLIGHTED NEIGHBORHOOD AND IS STILL NOT LIFTED UP 19 FROM THAT STATUS. SO I WOULD BE REALLY INTERESTED IN IF STAFF 20 21 HAVE THE LABELED TO DO THAT, TO BRING BACK THAT KIND OF INFORMATION. AND I -- PILOT PROGRAMS ARE DESIGNED TO SHOW 22 WHETHER A PROCESS CAN WORK. AND TO SHOW THE PROS AND THE CONS 23 OF THIS PROCESS TO TWEAK WHATEVER OUT -- YOU KNOW, TO TWEAK 24

- 18 RAIL STOP SAYING THIS IS THE LIGHTRAIL STOP FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE
- 19 ACCESSING VALLEY CENTER WHICH IS OUR COUNTY HOSPITAL, THEY
- 20 WILL USE THAT. AND I SAY, NO, I LIVE HERE. THEY'RE GOING TO
- 21 USE THE NEXT ONE DOWN BECAUSE IT'S SHORTER, NUMBER ONE, AND
- 22 NUMBER TWO, IT'S ON A NEIGHBORHOOD STREET, SO THEY'RE NOT

- 12 VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: THANK YOU. CAN EVERYONE HEAR ME? I GOT
- 13 BUMPED AND THEN I HAD TO COME BACK. OUR TIME DOES GROW SHORT.
- 14 AND AS I VIEWED THIS SLIDE I'M GLAD RICH BROUGHT THIS UP. SO
- 15 WE REALLY HAVE TO SEE, OR WE SEE THAT OUR ONLINE VOTING IS
- 16 MAINLY SKEWED FOR THE WHITE VIEWER, AND TO REACH ALL OF OUR
- 17 COMMUNITIES OF CONCERN, IT'S BETTER TO HAVE THE IN-PERSON
- 18 OUTREACH THAN ONLINE VOTING. ALTHOUGH BOTH ARE EXCELLENT. AND
- 19 ESPECIALLY DURING THIS TIME OF COVID. WHEN DID YOU DO THESE
- 20 OUTREACH EVENTS? WAS IT PRIOR TO COVID? THE BEGINNING OF
- 21 COVID? OR IN 2020?

- 23 JUDIS SANTOS: IT WAS PRIOR TO COVID, AND WE ALSO FOUND THAT
- 24 THE PAPER MAIL-IN VOTING WAS ESSENTIAL AS WELL.



VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: EXCELLENT. MARTHA, HOW MUCH TIME DO WE 1 HAVE BEFORE OUR MEETING ENDS? I DON'T WANT TO GO OVER. 2 3 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: 30 MINUTES. 4 5 VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: OKAY GREAT. WE STILL HAVE PLENTY OF TIME. 6 7 RAHMON, DID YOU HAVE A QUESTION? 8 RAHMON MOMOH: THANK YOU. I WAS GOING TO MENTION ABOUT YOUR 9 VOTING. I THOUGHT THAT WAS DONE DURING THE PANDEMIC. BUT IT 10 WOULD BE NICE TO KNOW WHEN THAT VOTING TOOK PLACE, 11 SPECIFICALLY. AS YOU KNOW, PROBABLY THIS EXPLAINS THE REASON 12 FOR MORE PEOPLE OF COLOR HAVING ACCESS TO THE INTERNET 13 COMPARED TO OTHER GROUPS, WHICH IS SOMETHING I FOUND OUT WITH 14 15 THIS COVID, PEOPLE GETTING ACCESS TO ONLINE, TO GETTING 16 VACCINATED FOR COVID AND WE FIND OUT A LOT OF PEOPLE DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO THE INTERNET TO, YOU KNOW, MAKE A RESERVATION. 17 SO, THIS IS FOR SONOMA COUNTY. DO YOU HAVE ANY PLAN FOR CONTRA 18 COSTA? YOU KNOW, ESPECIALLY EAST CONTRA COSTA COUNTY? 19 20 JUDIS SANTOS: SO THAT'S THE NEXT STAGE OF THE PILOT. SO WE 21 HAVE DONE EVALUATIONS, SO THE NEXT STEP IS TO IDENTIFY A 22 FLEXIBLE FUND SOURCE AND ALSO TO -- ALSO NOT ONLY FUND 23

PROJECTS, BUT ALSO FUND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF A PB PROCESS.

RAHMON MOMOH: OKAY. JUST, I THINK IN TERMS OF INCOME, THE 1 2 CONTRA COSTA AREA IS PROBABLY GOING TO BE THE MOST DESIRABLE -3 - I MEAN, ONE OF THE REASONS I MOVED THIS FAR IS BECAUSE I FOUND OUT I CANNOT AFFORD TO LIVE IN SAN FRANCISCO, OAKLAND, 4 5 WHICH IS CLOSER TO MY WORK. AND I KNOW A LOT OF PEOPLE THAT NEED A LOT OF ASSISTANCE IN THE CONTRA COSTA AREA. SO I'M NOT 6 SURE WHICH THE CRITERIA IS YOU USE TO DETERMINE, SONOMA AND 7 8 BAYVIEW, BUT I THINK CONTRA COSTA WOULD BE AN AREA THAT YOU PROBABLY SHOULD BE CONSIDERED FIRST. 9 10 JUDIS SANTOS: YES. SO AT THE VERY BEGINNING OF THE PROCESS, WE 11 OFFERED THE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AGENCIES, IF THERE WAS 12 ANYONE THAT WAS INTERESTED IN PARTICIPATING IN THE PILOT AND 13 THE TWO COUNTIES THAT RESPONDED WERE SAN FRANCISCO AND SOLANO. 14 15 16 VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: THANK YOU. WALTER, AND THEN RANDI. 17 WALTER WILSON: YES, THEN -- SO, YEAH, I AGREE WITH RAHMON AND 18 VEDA, THE EARLIER CONVERSATION, AS WELL, ABOUT THE ACCESS TO 19 VOTING. I THINK THERE IS DEFINITELY A DISPARITY FOR PEOPLE OF 20 21 COLOR, PARTICULARLY AFRICAN AMERICAN PEOPLE. BUT THERE IS SOMETHING ELSE TOO. BAYVIEW HAS A PRETTY SIGNIFICANT AFRICAN 22 AMERICAN SENIOR POPULATION. AND MOST OF THOSE SENIOR PEOPLE 23 THERE ARE USED TO GOING TO THEIR POLLING PLACES AND VOTING. 24

- 1 IT'S BEEN. SO I THINK THAT'S A BIG PART OF IT THE OTHER THING
- 2 IS I DON'T THINK THEY HAVE THE ACCESS TO ONLINE VOTING OR THE
- 3 EDUCATION AS YOUNGER PEOPLE WOULD V BUT I WOULD LIKE TO SAY
- 4 THAT SIMILARLY TO THE MAIL-IN VOTING WHICH IS VERY PREDOMINANT
- 5 NOW, A LOT OF SENIORS HAVE BEEN ABLE TO ADAPT HAD TO THAT OVER
- 6 TIME, AND I THINK YOU WILL SEE THE SAME THING HAPPEN ONLINE AS

- 11 THE SECURITY IN ONLINE VOTING IS ABOUT AS SECURE AS ANYTHING
- 12 CAN BE. NOW, THAT DOESN'T MEAN THERE ARE NOT FALLACIES, BUT I
- 13 THINK THE SECURITY IS SO TIGHT THAT THEY TRY TO DO MULTIPLE
- 14 VOTES TO COVER THE WAY THINGS IS SETUP IS ALMOST NEARLY
- 15 IMPOSSIBLE. THANK YOU.
- 17 VEDA FLOREZ, CHAIR: IT'S KIND OF INTERESTING WITH ONLINE
- 18 VOTING, WHEN I WORKED FOR A NON-PROFIT, WE HAD MULTIPLE PEOPLE
- 19 WHO WERE INTERESTED IN VOTING, YET EVERYONE VOTED ON THE SAME
- 20 COMPUTER. SO BY LOCKING THE COMPUTER AND SAYING ONLY ONE
- 21 PERSON CAN VOTE FROM AN IP ADDRESS, OR AN E-MAIL ACCOUNT, MAY
- 22 LIMIT THOSE INDIVIDUALS WHO ACTUALLY DO WORK THROUGH THE
- 23 ONLINE PROCESS. SO WE WERE VOTING ON MTC, THE ORIGINAL PLANNED
- 24 BAY AREA, AND THERE WERE SEVERAL PEOPLE, PROBABLY A DOZEN
- 25 PEOPLE WHO WORKED FROM ONE SPECIFIC COMPUTER. SO THAT'S



- 1 SOMETHING TO KEEP IN MIND AS WELL. THANK YOU RANDI FOR LETTING
- 2 ME SLIP THAT COMMENT IN.

- 4 RANDI KINMAN: NO PROBLEM. I WANT TO CIRCLE BACK TO THE CBTPS,
- 5 THE AGING ONE AND JUST TO CAUTION YOU, AND EVERYBODY, IF THERE
- 6 IS AN EXISTING CBTP DOESN'T MEANTIME WORK HASN'T GONE ON IN
- 7 THE PAST. AS AN EXAMPLE, IT WAS CERTIFIED 22 YEARS AGO IN OUR
- 8 TRANSPORTATION PLAN DEVELOPMENT AND YES IT'S AGING BUT WE KNEW
- 9 WE HAD AT LEAST A TEN YEAR WAIT FOR THIS PROJECT TO BE
- 10 FINISHED, BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT THERE WAS A MAJOR
- 11 INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECT THAT INVOLVED RAIL AND OTHER THINGS
- 12 THAT WAS COMING DOWN THE LINE IN SEQUENTIAL YEARS. SO WE KNEW
- 13 WE AT LEAST HAD THAT GAP. BUT WHAT WE WOUND UP DOING, WHEN WE
- 14 REACHED A CERTAIN POINT, RATHER THAN CONDUCTING AN ENTIRELY
- 15 NEW PROCESS, WHICH CAN TAKE A YEAR, WHICH DELAYS EVERYTHING A
- 16 YEAR TO 18 MONTHS, BECAUSE IT'S A YEAR OF OUTREACH IT'S A YEAR
- 17 OF TALKING TO NEIGHBORHOODS AND THEN SIX MONTHS TO PUT THE
- 18 REPORT TOGETHER, WE DID A QUICK ANALYSIS THROUGH SOME
- 19 COMMUNITY MEETINGS OF, YOU KNOW, THIS IS A REALLY OLD PROJECT,
- 20 DOES IT STILL FIT YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD, IS IT STILL WHAT YOU
- 21 WANT, AND RECONFIRMED RATHER THAN REANALYZED. SO THERE MAY BE
- 22 PROJECTS THAT ARE LOW HANGING FRUIT, LIKE THAT, THAT CAN GET
- 23 OFF THE BOARD A LITTLE QUICKER. IT, YOU KNOW, WE HAVE A
- 24 PATIENT NEIGHBORHOOD. SO, WE JUST GOT KICKED IN THE TEETH,
- 25 AGAIN, BUT AT LEAST WE KNEW THAT OUR PROJECT WASN'T GOING TO

- 3 THINGS THAT HAD TO COME ALONG AHEAD OF TIME BECAUSE THERE IS
- 4 NO WAY YOU'RE GOING TO TEAR YOU THE STREET WHEN THEY'RE GOING
- 5 TO TEAR IT UP FOR LIGHT RAIL OR TRAIN REROUTE OR OTHER
- 6 INFRASTRUCTURE, SO IN THAT RESPECT I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT IF
- 7 THERE ARE PROJECTS THAT ARE OUT THERE, THAT HAVE BEEN THROUGH
- 8 A PROCESS THAT WE DON'T START ALL OVER AGAIN. THANK YOU.
