- 1 KENNETH KAO: GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS, ITEM THREE ACTION
- 2 ITEM TO ADOPT ALTERNATE FUNDING PLAN. THE CALIFORNIA
- 3 TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION APPROVED \$407 MILLION IN SENATE BILL
- 4 ONE COMPETITIVE FOUNDING FOR BAY AREA REPRESENTING ABOUT 20%
- 5 OF 2 BILLION AVAILABLE STATEWIDE PROJECTS SHOWN IN TABLE ONE
- 6 ATTACHMENT ONE OF YOUR MEMO. AMONG THE PROJECTS OF THE BAY
- 7 AREA FIVE PROJECTS HAVE REGIONAL MEASURE THREE FUNDS COMMITTED
- 8 IN THE FUNDING PLANS REGIONAL MEASURE THREE FUNDS IS UNDER
- 9 LITIGATION AND NOT AVAILABLE TO MATCH FUNDS IN THE NEAR-TERM.
- 10 MTC HAS ISSUED LETTERS OF NO PREJUDICE TO ALLOW SPONSOR TO
- 11 SPEND OTHER FUNDS TO BE REPAID IF RM3 IS CLEARED BY THE COURTS
- 12 FOR CURRENT YEAR CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS SP ONE FUNDING TO US101
- 13 MARIN SONOMA NARROWS PROJECT SPONSORED BY THE TRANSPORTATION
- 14 AUTHORITY AND SOLANO 880 EXPRESS LANES PROJECT SOLANO
- 15 TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY THERE IS NO LOCAL FUNDS TO BACK. CTC
- 16 SELECTIVE PROGRAMMING MILLIONS OF DOLLARS TO THESE PROJECTS SO
- 17 DELAY COULD DAMAGE THE REGION'S STRONG PROJECT TRACK RECORD
- 18 AND NEGATIVELY IMPACT PERFORMANCE IN FUTURE STATEWIDE FUNDING
- 19 COMPETITIVE PROGRAMS. SECOND SCHEDULE DELAYS TRANSLATE TO
- 20 ESCALATION COSTS NOT ACCOUNTED FOR AND FOR WHICH FUNDING IS
- 21 NOT YET IDENTIFIED. FINALLY ENVIRONMENTAL PERMITS MAY EXPIRE
- 22 IF THE PROJECT IS DELAYED BEYOND THE PERMIT VALIDITY DATE.
- 23 THEREFORE TO KEEP THESE CONSTRUCTION READY SP ONE PROJECTS
- 24 READY STAFF IS RECOMMENDING \$175 MILLION IN FEDERAL
- 25 TRANSPORTATION FUNDS FOR PROJECTS IN MARIN AND SOLANO.





- 1 REPRESENTING ABOUT A YEAR'S WORTH OF THE REGION'S FEDERAL MAX
- 2 CAPACITY RECOMMENDATION. MTC OBAG TYPICALLY LAGS BEHIND
- 3 FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS BY YEAR OR MORE AND FEDERAL FUNDS WOULD
- 4 HAVE NO ACCUMULATIVE IMPACT THROUGH FUNDING AS LONG AS IT'S
- 5 PAID BACK TO MTC. \$176 MILLION TO MARIN AND 100 MILLION TO
- 6 SOLANO AND STP CMAQ AND TIP FUNDING REPAYMENT PROFILES WILL BE
- 7 RETURNED. [INDISCERNIBLE] AND CAN BE USED FOR A VARIETY OF
- 8 GREATER PROJECTS. FUNDING WILL ENSURE THE REGION DELIVERS ALL
- 9 FEDERAL FUNDS AVAILABLE TO THE REGION THIS YEAR WHICH WILL
- 10 ENSURE REGION'S ELIGIBILITY TO RECEIVE ADDITIONAL FEDERAL
- 11 FUNDS NOT USED BY OTHER STATES KNOWN AS REDISTRIBUTION. THE
- 12 RELIEF SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT KNOWN AS CRRSAA
- 13 PROVIDES ABOUT \$912 MILLION TO CALIFORNIA ADMINISTERED BY THE
- 14 FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION. LAST MONTH CTC APPROVED
- 15 DISTRIBUTING 40% OF THIS MONEY TO THE REGION SPLIT BETWEEN THE
- 16 STIP AND STGP FORMULA THROUGH THE STIP MARIN SONOMA COUNTIES
- 17 WILL COMMIT SHARES TO THE FUNDING GAP PLUS FUNDS FOR PLANNING
- 18 PROGRAMMING AND MONITORING. TOTALS ABOUT 3 MILLION AND CAN BE
- 19 REPAID. HOWEVER IF PROJECTS DELAYED BEYOND 2023MTC REFERS THE
- 20 RIGHT TO CHARGE INTEREST ON THE LOAN FEDERAL FUNDS DEDUCTED
- 21 FROM THE STIP SUBJECT TO FUNDING AGREEMENT. FINALLY
- 22 RECOMMENDING LOCAL FUNDS AND THE TABLE THREE IN YOUR MEMO
- 23 SUMMARIZED PROPOSED PROJECTS. STAFF NOTES FOR YOUR
- 24 CONSIDERATION THE PROPOSAL ASSUMES RM3 WILL BE ALLOWED BY THE
- 25 COURTS AND THE REGIONAL FUNDS TO TWO PROJECTS IN THE NORTH BAY



- 1 IS BALANCE SAID BY THE REPAYMENT OF NON-FEDERAL FUNDS TO MTC
- 2 WHICH WILL BE REDISTRIBUTED BY THE O BAG THREE FRAMEWORK THAT
- 3 BENEFITS THE ENTIRE REGION. IF RM3 BROKE DOWN BY THE COURTS
- 4 LOAN FUNDS WILL LIKELY NOT BE REPAID. THE TWO SIGNIFICANT

- 9 SUCCESS WILL BE ADJUSTED TO ACCOUNT FOR THE FUNDING AND
- 10 FINALLY THE PROPOSAL WILL BE FOCUSED TO BE REDISTRIBUTED AMONG
- 11 ALL MODES AND WILL BE BENEFICIAL TO ADVANCE ALL MODES
- 12 INCLUDING TRANSIT AND ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION SINCE THEY WON'T
- 13 NEED TO FOLLOW FEDERAL CONTRACTING AND ENVIRONMENTAL
- 14 REQUIREMENTS. STAFF RECOMMENDS REFERRING MTC RESOLUTIONS 4202
- 15 REVISED AND 4212 REVISED TO THE COMMISSION FOR APPROVAL. I
- 16 WOULD BE HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS.

- 23 REGARDLESS OF THE SLINGS AND ARROWS THAT GET THROWN AT US OR
- 24 GET THROWN AT THE PROJECTS. AND THESE ARE TWO PROJECTS THAT
- 25 HAVE LONG BEEN IN THE WORKS IN THE MARIN SONOMA NARROWS. IS

- 1 THAT RIGHT? WHEN I DRIVE NORTH I FEEL LIKE THERE IS A NEW
- 2 CONSTRUCTION PROJECT ON THAT HIGHWAY. AND SO I NEED A
- 3 REGIONALLY IMPORTANT PROJECTS. SO I THINK IT'S TERRIFIC THAT
- 4 WE'RE FINDING A WAY TO MOVE THESE FORWARD. I WANT TO PICK UP
- 5 ON SOMETHING THAT WAS RAISED IN THE MEMO, WHICH I DIDN'T --
- 6 WHICH I THINK IT WOULD BE HELPFUL FOR ME TO UNDERSTAND BETTER
- 7 FOR THE REST OF THE COMMITTEE, ARE THESE LOANS THAT ARE BEING
- 8 MADE? AND I THINK THAT CERTAINLY THERE IS PROBABLY -- THERE'S

- 14 THERESE MCMILLAN: WELL LET ME PAINT THE BROAD PICTURE HERE.
- 15 FIRST OF ALL, IF RM3 IS NOT AFFIRMED BY THE COURTS, WE HAVE A
- 16 PORTFOLIO OF ISSUES THAT IS NOT BIGGER AND BROADER THAN JUST
- 17 THIS. SO I THINK THAT'S JUST AN IMPORTANT, YOU KNOW,
- 18 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT THAT THAT IN AND OF ITSELF PRESENTS A
- 19 SIGNIFICANT CHALLENGE FOR THE COMMISSION TO WAGER. SO I THINK
- 20 THAT'S SORT OF AN IMPORTANT START. IN THIS PARTICULAR CASE,
- 21 AND I THINK -- AND BRIAN MAY WANT TO WEIGH IN -- WHEN WE TALK
- 22 ABOUT LOANS, IT'S REALLY IN THE CONTEXT OF, AGAIN, THIS LARGER
- 23 LONP STRUCTURE THAT WE HAVE SETUP, YOU KNOW, FOR RM3, BUT FOR
- 24 THE NUMBER OF OTHER PROJECT SPONSORS WHEREIN, SORT OF AT RISK,
- 25 THE PROJECT SPONSOR SAYS I'M GOING TO, FOR EXAMPLE, ADVANCE MY

- 2 THAT AT RISK KNOWING THAT IF RM3 DOES NOT GET PAID, I'M
- 3 BASICALLY ON THE HOOK. TO A LARGE DEGREE THAT'S WHERE THE
- 4 REGION IS WITH THESE FEDERAL FUNDS, AS WELL. AND, YOU KNOW,
- 5 THE EXPECTATION AS WITH ANY LONP, IF THE RM3 WOULD BE
- 6 SUCCESSFUL AND SO WE HAVE AN AGREEMENT THAT, SWAP. DONE, WE'RE
- 7 ALL GOOD. IN THIS PARTICULAR CASE, WE'RE JUST ACKNOWLEDGING
- 8 THAT THIS ISN'T JUST RELATED TO A SINGLE PROJECT SPONSOR WITH,
- 9 YOU KNOW, ALTERNATIVE FUNDS, FOR LACK OF A BETTER TERM, THAT'S
- 10 AT THEIR DISPOSAL BUT THAT THIS IS DRAWING ON A REGIONAL
- 11 PROGRAM. SO THE QUESTION WOULD BECOME HOW WOULD THAT PROGRAM
- 12 GET REPLENISHED IF IN A WORST-CASE SCENARIO RM3 IS NOT THERE.
- 13 I THINK THE BROAD QUESTION S WE'RE NOT SURE. WE DON'T KNOW.
- 14 AND, YOU KNOW, I THINK THE IMPORTANT THING GOING FORWARD IS,
- 15 AGAIN, AS THE COMMISSION PROBABLY, YOU KNOW, AGAIN, HAS TO
- 16 UNTANGLE ALL OF THE CASCADE OF ISSUES THAT A NON-CONFIRMED RM3
- 17 WOULD OUTLINE, ONE OF THEM WOULD BE, YOU KNOW, WHAT OPTIONS
- 18 WOULD WE HAVE TO REFRESH A VERY VALUABLE FEDERAL FLEXIBLE
- 19 PROGRAM THAT THE REGION HAS PUT IN A LOT OF STOCK IN FRONT OF
- 20 DEALING WITH ISSUES. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS LOOKING WITH A
- 21 NEW ADMINISTRATION TO HAVE A MUCH MORE ROBUST PROGRAM OF
- 22 FUNDS, INCLUDING, WE'RE ADVOCATING OURSELVES, AS A NUMBER OF
- 23 OTHER PARTIES TO HAVE A MUCH HIGHER LIFT IN FTP FUNDS, OR SORT
- 24 OF AN EQUIVALENT FLEXIBLE FUNDS COMING OUT OF REAUTHORIZATION,
- 25 COMING OUT OF THE FEDERAL STIMULUS, ET CETERA, SO I THINK WITH



A VERY UNCERTAIN FUTURE ATTACHED TO THIS THAT COULD BE ONE 1 PLACE TO RECONCILE THE OUTCOME OF AN RM3, BUT I THINK THE 2 SHORT ANSWER IS, IT'S UNCLEAR, AND AGAIN, JUST REPRESENTS THE 3 AT-RISK SITUATION THAT ANY LONP ATTACHED TO THE PROGRAM WOULD 4 5 CARRY. 6 COM. NICK JOSEFOWITZ: SO, BUT IT'S A -- IF IT'S A LOAN, WHICH, 7 8 IF THAT'S RIGHT THERE, IS A SORT OF -- EVEN IF IT DOESN'T --THEY'RE NOT GOING TO WANT TO -- THESE ARE SIGNIFICANTLY 9 10 REGIONAL PROJECTS, WITH MY PERSPECTIVE AS A COMMISSIONER I WOULDN'T WANT TO GO INTO A LOAN AND THE PROJECT GOES INTO 11 BANKRUPTCY OR ANYTHING LIKE THAT, IS THERE A KIND OF 12 DISCUSSION ABOUT WHAT THE OPTIONS ARE AVAILABLE TO KIND OF, AT 13 LEAST MAYBE IN PART, TO REPAY THE REGION SOME OF THESE FEDERAL 14 15 FLEXIBLE FUNDS? 16 THERESE MCMILLAN: I'M GOING TO ASK BRIAN TO SUPPLEMENT WHAT I 17 SAY. I THINK THE EXPECTATION THAT THERE WOULD BE A DISCUSSION 18 ABOUT WHAT OPTIONS ARE OUT THERE IS A FAIR ONE, IN TERMS OF A 19 DISCUSSION, BUT THERE IS -- YOU KNOW, AGAIN, LIKE EVERYTHING 20 ELSE, THERE IS NO LEGAL DOCUMENT THAT, YOU KNOW, PUSHES THE 21 PROJECT SPONSOR TO SAY, YOU ARE NOW LEGALLY LIABLE FOR X, Y, 22

Z. BUT, AGAIN, THAT'S NOT UNCOMMON WITH AN LONP STATION FOR

THESE CIRCUMSTANCES. WHEN WE ENTER INTO AN LONP WITH ANOTHER

PROJECT, THE ALAMEDA CTC, WHICH IS ON THAT LIST OF FIVE, THEY

BRIAN DO YOU WANT TO COMMENT? ^ 4 5 BRYAN ALBEE: ^ 6 7 BRIAN STANKE: ^ 8 BRIAN MAYHEW: CONCEPT OF THIS LONP ANTICIPATES THE PROJECT 9 GETS STUCK, THE PROJECT ITSELF IS AUTHORIZED TO GET ANOTHER 10 FUNDING SOURCE AND THEN WHEN RM3 IS CLEARED THEN THE PROJECT 11 ITSELF CAN REPLENISH ITS FUNDING SOURCE THAT IT GOT TO 12 SUBSTITUTE RM3 THAT'S THE VERY CONCEPT OF LONP. THEN THE ANTICIPATION OF AN LONP IS THAT THE FUNDING 17 SOURCE IN AND OF ITSELF, THAT THE LOCALS OR IN THIS CASE MTC 18 PUT ON, IN THE PROJECT, IS AT RISK, AND THAT DECISION HAS BEEN 19 MADE. THERE ARE NO LOANS. WE DON'T BOOK A RECEIVABLE. WE DON'T 20 21 BOOK A LOAN. WE DO BOOK AN AGREEMENT THAT SAYS IF THIS HAPPENS AND THAT HAPPENS AND THAT HAPPENS, YOU WILL REPLENISH -- YOU 22 WILL REPLENISH YOUR FUNDING SOURCE. WHETHER IT'S FEDERAL -- IN 23

THIS INSTANCE, FTA FUNDS, OR IN THE CASE OF LOCAL SALES TAXES,



WE'RE INDIFFERENT TO THAT IN THE SENSE OF THAT'S WHAT THE LONP 1 2 CONTEMPLATES. DID I GET THAT RIGHT? 3 COM. NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THAT'S HELPFUL TO UNDERSTAND. I 14 15 MEAN, WE HAVE SENT DISCRETIONARY DOLLARS, MILLIONS OF DOLLARS 16 TO SAN FRANCISCO, SAN JOSE, OAKLAND, EVERY COUNTY IN THE REGION AND IT'S AMONG US COMMISSIONERS WE ADVANCE PROJECTS 17 THAT ARE READY TO GO IT SAVES MILLIONS OF DOLLARS AND MAKES 18 CAPACITY FOR OTHER JOBS AND FOR SOLANO TO GUARANTEE REPAYMENT 19 I DON'T THINK IS JUSTIFIED. 21 INVESTMENTS ALONG US101. IT COMPLETES A CONTINUOUS CARPOOL

22 LANE BETWEEN MARIN AND SONOMA COUNTIES. IT'S BEEN A GREAT

23 PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN MTC, CALTRANS, CTC, AND SONOMA AND MARIN

24 COUNTIES. B7 ALONE WILL CREATE OVER A THOUSAND JOBS IS WHAT'S

25 BEING PROJECTED AND AS COMMISSIONER PAPAN SAID, EARLY DELIVERY



- 1 OF SHOVEL READY PROJECTS IS WHAT WE'RE ALL ABOUT AND AS WE ALL

COMMISSIONER CHAVEZ'S COMMENTS, IN SOLANO COUNTY WE TRIED 2 3 SALES TAX AND MISSED BY 1%. CITIES HAVE COME TOGETHER AND WE HAVE A FEE ON EVERY STRUCTURE THAT GOES UP IN SOLANO COUNTY TO 4 5 THE BOARD OF TRANSPORTATION AND IT DOES A LOT OF COUNTY PROJECTS THAT TAKES TRAFFIC OFF THE I-880 AND OFF OUR MAJOR 6 ARTERIALS, AND SONOMA COUNTY IS CONTRIBUTING IN A DIFFERENT 7 8 WAY I DON'T WANT TO SET THE IMPRESSION THAT NOBODY'S DOING ANYTHING IN OUR COUNTY BECAUSE WE ARE WE LEVERAGE EVERY DOLLAR 9 IN OUR PROJECTS YOU LOOK AT THE TRUCK SCALES AND MANY BENEFITS 10 FOR THE REGION. IT'S VERY COMPLEX BUT NOT UNUSUAL FOR MTC TO 11 ADVANCE PROJECTS WITHOUT ANY REAL COMMITMENT TO BE PAID BACK 12 AND IT'S ALWAYS WORKED OUT. COMMISSIONERS HAVE ALWAYS WORKED 13 14 TOGETHER. I WAS JUST WONDERING IF WE HAD A SORT OF A PLAN FOR HOW TO --20 21 HOW TO HELP OUR TRANSIT AGENCIES TRANSITION TO ALL ELECTRIC 22 FLEETS, IN COMPLIANCE WITH SORT OF STATE REGULATION? AND --



THERESA ROMMELL: THIS IS THERESA FROM MTC'S POLICY AND PROGRAM 1 2 SECTION. I THINK YOU WERE FINISHED WITH YOUR QUESTION, 3 COMMISSIONER? 4 5 COM. NICK JOSEFOWITZ: YES. 6 THERESA ROMMELL: WE ARE LOOKING AT AND STUDYING THE QUESTION 7 8 OF CONVERTING THE FLEET AS REQUIRED BY LAW. - 11 SUGGESTION OF VICE CHAIR JOSEFOWITZES THAT WE DO LOOK AT THIS
- 12 COMPREHENSIVELY. BECAUSE THE CHALLENGE IS -- AND I HAVE SPENT
- 13 A LOT OF TIME TALKING ABOUT PEOPLE IN THE ENERGY FIELD -- IS
- 14 THAT WE DO HAVE A STATE MANDATE. HOWEVER, YOU KNOW, WE ALSO
- 15 HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO DELIVER RELIABLE TRANSIT. UPHILLS,
- 16 DOWN HILLS, OVER THE BRIDGE, IN NEIGHBORHOODS, ON A WIDE
- 17 VARIETY. AC IS PROBABLY A GREAT EXAMPLE OF THE TRANSIT
- 18 FACILITY ALONG WITH COUNTY CONNECTION WHERE THEY DELIVER
- 19 SERVICES THAT HAVE TO BE RELIABLE. WE HAVE HAD THE EXPERIENCE
- 20 OF HAVING AN ELECTRONIC TROLLEY IN OUR SERVICE AND WE HAVE
- 21 LEARNED FIRSTHAND SOME OF THE CHALLENGES IN WORKING WITH
- 22 TECHNOLOGY MAKING NEW ENERGY TRANSIT BUSES WORK. THAT BEING
- 23 SAID, I THINK THAT CALIFORNIA HAS TO REALLY FACE THIS ISSUE OF
- 24 PROVIDING THE POWER FOR THIS. YOU KNOW, I KNOW BUS COMPANIES
- 25 ARE WORKING ON DEVELOPING TECHNOLOGY SO THESE VEHICLES WILL BE



- 1 AVAILABLE. I KNOW MOST OF OUR TRANSIT OPERATORS ARE LOOKING AT
- 2 PHASING IN NON-DIESEL. BUT IT'S REALLY A HYBRID. SO THERE IS A
- 3 COMBINATION OF -- YOU KNOW, A BALANCE THAT CAN BE PROVIDED IN
- 4 THIS EARLY PERIOD. BUT I THINK WE AS A REGION REALLY HAVE TO

- 4 NON-STOP ON GETTING IMPORTANT INFORMATION IN THAT REGARD, BUT
- 5 BEYOND THAT, AS WELL. THIS COULD BE, YOU KNOW, FOR THE
