2	CHERYL CHI: I AM HERE TO PRESENT THIS PROGRAM TO PROVIDE
3	FUNDING FOR THE REGIONAL MEASURE TWO OPERATING AND MARKETING
4	PROGRAM COMPRISED OF 4.8 MILLION IN RM2 OPERATING FUNDS. JUST
5	A REMINDER THIS PROGRAM NEEDS TO BE KEPT WITHIN THE 30%
6	STATUTORY LIMIT OF REGIONAL MEASURE TOLL FUNDS RECEIVED. WE
7	ARE PLANNING TO PROGRAM ABOUT 85% OF ESTIMATED REVENUES TO BE
8	CONSERVATIVE IN THIS PROGRAMMING. A FEW THINGS TO NOTE WITH
9	THIS PROGRAM IS THAT WE'RE RECOMMENDING SUSPENSION OF BAY
10	PRIVILEGE FORWARD FUNDING, WHICH HAD BEEN PROVIDED TO THE
11	WATER EMERGENCY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY SINCE FISCAL YEAR
12	'17, THIS WAS A ONE TIME COMMITMENT OF UP TO TWO AND A HALF
13	MILLION DOLLARS TO SUPPORT ADDITIONAL SERVICE BY WETA TO HELP
14	DEAL WITH AGAINST CONGESTION SORRY WITH HIGH DEMAND
15	DURING THE COMMUTE. WE ARE PROPOSING ABOUT 425,000 IN ADDITION
16	FUNDING FOR DUMBARTON BUS SERVICE. THIS PROJECT HAD BEEN UNDER
17	THE STATUTORILY ALLOWED FUNDING LIMIT, A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT,
18	AND THEY HAD REQUESTED ADDITIONAL FUNDING TO HELP SUPPORT
19	THEIR BUS OPERATIONS. FINALLY, I WANT TO NOTE THAT WE ARE
20	ALLOWING OPERATORS MORE FLEXIBILITY TO SHIFT FUNDS BETWEEN
21	ROUTES AS DEMAND TO ADDRESS THEIR DEMAND. AND THIS ISN'T FLEX
22	BELIEVABILITY THAT WE HAVE ALLOWED OPERATORS BEFORE WHEN FUNDS

HAVE BEEN PROGRAMMED TO SPECIFIC ROUTES THEY WERE TO BE USED

FOR THAT SPECIFIC ROUTE. ON TO THE MARKETING PROGRAM. AGAIN,

THERE IS 4.6 MILLION PROPOSED FOR THE MARKETING PROGRAM, AND

- 14 AN EXTENSION OF THAT AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO EVALUATE THE
- 15 PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENT AS WELL AS CONSIDER MODIFICATIONS TO
- 16 THE PROGRAM DURING THIS TIME. AND THAT RESPONSE TO THE

- 15 THERESE MCMILLAN: GREAT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. SINCE WE'RE
- 16 HAVING OUR TEAM BRING UP THE PRESENTATION, I JUST WANT TO
- 17 NOTE, THANK YOU FOR YOUR PATIENCE. IT'S BEEN A LONG DAY. I
- 18 THINK A NUMBER OF FOLKS HAVE BEEN WAITING FOR THIS PARTICULAR
- 19 PRESENTATION. I THINK IT WILL TIE TOGETHER A NUMBER OF THREADS

- 6 GOUT OUT IN RECORD SPEEDS TO DEAL WITH THE DEVASTATING EFFECTS

- 14 2020. IN FACT, WE WERE IN THE MIDDLE OF A SURGE, AND TRANSIT
- 15 OPERATORS ACROSS THE COUNTRY WERE APPROACHING THE PROVERBIAL
- 16 FISCAL CLIFF. SOME OF THEM, INCLUDING SOME IN OUR REGION, AS
- 17 THE CARES ACT MONEY WAS RUNNING OUT, CONGRESS CAME BACK WITH
- 18 THE CRRSAA ALLOCATIONS ALMOST ANOTHER BILLION DOLLARS TO OUR
- 19 REGION AND MANY KUDOS TO OUR LEGISLATIVE TEAM WHO HAD WORK
- 20 REALLY CLOSELY ON WHAT THE BASIS FOR THAT FUNDING SHOULD BE.

- 1 FISCAL YEAR COULD BE MET WITH THE CRRSAA FUND. SO IN TOTAL,
- 2 \$2.3 BILLION HAVE BEEN ALLOCATED BY THIS COMMISSION ALREADY,
- 3 AMONG OUR 27 DIFFERENT TRANSIT OPERATORS. AND IT WAS ROBUST AS
- 4 TO THE ESTIMATED REVENUE LOSSES THAT WE HAD FOR THE END OF THE
- 5 YEAR WAS ONLY 1.8 BILLION AND IF YOU GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE
- 6 ILLUSTRATES THE FACT THAT WE ACTUALLY HAD A CUSHION THAT OUR

- 15 WALKING INTO THE NEXT FISCAL YEAR THAT WILL ALLOW US -- NEXT
- 16 SLIDE PLEASE -- TO THOUGHTFULLY THINK THROUGH HOW TO USE THE
- 17 THIRD WAVE OF THE COVID RELIEF FUNDS, THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN
- 18 OR AARP FUNDS, WHICH IS AT AN A SOUNDING LEVEL OF ALMOST \$1.7
- 19 BILLION THANKS TO THE BIDEN HARRIS ADMINISTRATION, AND
- 20 CONGRESS IS NOW AVAILABLE TO US. NOW THESE APPORTIONMENTS WERE
- 21 JUST APPROVED BY FTA AT THE VERY END OF MARCH. WE ARE BINGING
- 22 FORWARD TO YOU, A SERIES OF STEPS HOW WE CAN EVALUATE GOING
- 23 FORWARD WITH THE 1.7 BILLION WITH THE ADVANTAGE OF HAVING THIS
- 24 CUSHION, WALKING FORWARD, THE LITTLE BLUE BAR IN THE MIDDLE
- 25 AND THE BOTTOM. IN ORDER TO BEST STRATEGIZE HOW A TOTAL OF





- 1 \$3.9 BILLION IN RELIEF CAN BEST BE USED AMONG OUR TRANSIT
- 2 OPERATORS, BUT MOST CRITICALLY TO SERVE OUR TRANSIT RIDERS.
- 3 NEXT SLIDE. IT'S VERY IMPORTANT, THOUGH, TO TAKE AN
- 4 OPPORTUNITY NOW TO RETHINK WHAT IS GOING TO BE THE BASIS OF
- 5 HOW WE EVALUATE, HOW WE USE THESE PRECIOUS DOLLARS?
- 6 DISTRIBUTION OF CARRIES AND CRRSAA AT THE TIME WAS BASED ON
- 7 DETERMINING A APPROACH LOOKING BACK TO THE WORLD AS WE KNEW IT
- 8 IN FEBRUARY 2020 TO SAY IF THAT WAS THE LEVEL OF SERVICE OUT
- 9 THERE, WHAT'S THE PROJECTED REVENUE LOSS OF OUR TRANSIT
- 10 AGENCIES IN TERMS OF, YOU KNOW, THE RIDERSHIP LOSSES THAT THEY
- 11 EXPERIENCE, THE SERVICE REDUCTIONS THAT HAPPENED, AND WHAT
- 12 WOULD THIS COVID RELIEF MONEY DO TO FILL THOSE -- TO ADDRESS

- 5 NOT A BRIDGE WITHOUT -- IT'S A ONE TIME NON-RECURRING NOR WERE
- 6 FUNDS CAPABLE OF BUILDING ECONOMIC HOUSE CREATED BY THE

- 13 WITH THE BEST POSSIBLE INFORMATION WE HAVE, LOOKING FORWARD,
- 14 INTO THIS NEW NORMAL TO ENSURE THAT ENDURING INCREASED LEVELS
- 15 OF SERVICE CAN GO FORWARD. NEXT SLIDE. IT'S IMPORTANT TO
- 16 RECOGNIZE THAT WE'RE NOT ALONE IN THIS FRONT-FACING STRATEGY
- 17 THIS IS A TIME TO TAKE A BREATH AND NOT STRETCH THIS OUT INTO
- 18 INFINITY BUT TO MAKE SURE WE'RE MAKING THE BEST DECISIONS THAT
- 19 BEE CAN. AND THE CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE ANALYST'S OFFICE LMAO
- 20 HAD THE SAME OBSERVATION WITH RESPECT TO HOW THE STATE OF
- 21 CALIFORNIA SHOULD BE USING ITS SHARE OF AARP FUNDS. THEY SAID,
- 22 QUOTING FIRST AMONG THE SUGGESTED PRINCIPLES IS A
- 23 RECOMMENDATION THAT THE LEGISLATURE TAKE SOME TIME TO DEFINE
- 24 ITS GOALS AND DEVELOP A PLAN FOR ALLOCATING THE FEDERAL FUNDS.
- 25 THIS PRINCIPLE UNDERPINS OUR GUIDELINES, BECAUSE, IN ADDITION





- 1 BEING A ONCE IN A GENERATION MAGNITUDE, THE AARP DOES NOT
- 2 REQUIRE THE STATE TO SPEND THE FEDERAL RESOURCES IMMEDIATELY.
- 3 IN OTHER WORDS, THEY'RE URGING, TAKE THE TIME TO DO IT RIGHT.
- 4 NEXT SLIDE. HERE'S SOMETHING THAT WAS MENTIONED IN DISCOURSE
- 5 TO DATE THE CARES AND CRRSAA FUNDING ALREADY ALLOCATED AS
- 6 MENTIONED ARE SUFFICIENT TO COVER THE OPERATING EXPENDITURES
- 7 AT LEAST FOR THE FIRST QUARTER OF THE NEXT FISCAL YEAR AND
- 8 LONGER FOR MANY OPERATORS. WHY? BECAUSE EACH OPERATOR AS A
- 9 UNIQUE MIX OF ITS BASIC REVENUE BASE FOR THEIR OPERATIONS OF
- 10 WHICH SOME SOURCES HAVE RECOVERED RAPIDLY FROM THE PANDEMIC
- 11 BUT OTHERS ARE LAG. WHAT WE SEE IN THIS CHART IS FOR DIFFERENT
- 12 OPERATORS, IN THE BLUE SORT OF WORST-CASE LOOKING IN THE REAR
- 13 VIEW MIRROR REVENUE LOSS SCENARIO THROUGH THE END -- FROM
- 14 MARCH OF 2020, THROUGH JUNE EVER 2021, COMPARED TO THE FEDERAL
- 15 RELIEF FUNDS THAT HAVE ALREADY BEEN ALLOCATED. YOU CAN SEE IN
- 16 MANY INSTANCES THE GRAY BAR IS SOME DISTANCE HIGHER THAN THE
- 17 BLUE BAR. THIS COMMISSION IS GOING TO MOVE FORWARD TO ENSURE
- 18 THAT THE OPERATORS ARE PUT ON SOME SORT OF CANNOT FINANCIAL
- 19 FOOTING GOING FORWARD INTO FISCAL YEAR '21, '22 NEXT SLIDE.
- 20 WITH THAT BACKGROUND WE HAVE THREE PRINCIPLES WE WOULD LIKE
- 21 YOUR APPROVAL TODAY OR CERTAINLY FOR THE COMMISSIONERS TO MOVE
- 22 FORWARD FOR APPROVAL, FIRST IS TO PROVIDE TRANSIT OPERATORS
- 23 WITH A LEVEL OF FINANCIAL CERTAINTY FOR FISCAL YEAR 2021, AND
- 24 2022 AND THAT MTC TRANSIT OPERATORS HAVE JOINTLY DEVELOPED
- 25 PRINCIPLES TO GUIDE DISTRIBUTION BY THE AARP AND BY THE WAY WE





- 1 RECEIVED A LETTER FROM MAJOR TRANSIT OPERATORS SUPPORTING THE
- 2 APPROACH WE'RE DESCRIBING TODAY WE HAVE NOT DONE THIS IN A
- 3 VACUUM BUT WE'RE WORKING CLOSELY WITH TRANSIT OPERATORS TO
- 4 UNDERSTAND WHAT THEIR NEEDS ARE GOING FORWARD. SECOND IS
- 5 RESTORING SERVICE FOR THOSE MOST DEPENDENT ON TRANSIT IS OF
- 6 PARAMOUNT IMPORTANCE. WE CANNOT FORGET THAT IS SOMETHING THAT
- 7 HAS TO UNDERRIDE THE PRINCIPLES THAT WE'RE OUTLINING FOR U

- 13 THAT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO MATCH THE ECONOMY AS IT RECOVERS IN
- 14 SOME CASES LEAVING IT AS AN INCENTIVE BUT IN ORDER TO DO THAT
- 15 WE NEED SOME THOUGHTFUL PRINCIPLES TO GUIDE US GOING FORWARD
- 16 FIRST STABILIZING SUSTAINED TRANSIT, SECOND RESTORE REIMAGINE
- 17 THE SERVICE THAT WE PUT OUT IN THE NEXT FEW MONTHS AND THIRD
- 18 IS TO IMPROVE THE CUSTOMER EXPERIENCE FOR THE SERVICE THAT WE
- 19 DO GET OUT THERE. SO I'M GOING TO TURN IT OVER TO BILL BACON
- 20 TO WALK THROUGH EACH ONE OF THESE PRINCIPLE IN A LITTLE MORE
- 21 DEPTH. BILL?
- 23 WILLIAM BACON: THANK YOU THERESE. MY NAME IS BILL BACON, MTC
- 24 CO-PROJECT MANAGER. I'M GOING TO WALK YOU THROUGH THE
- 25 CONSULTATION WITH TRANSIT OPERATORS TO GUIDE DISTRIBUTION. THE





- 1 PRINCIPLES MAY BE FOUND IN ATTACHMENT A IN YOUR AGENDA. FIRST
- 2 COUPLE EVER PRINCIPLES FOCUSED ON FINANCIAL STABILIZING. THE
- 3 BIDEN HARRIS ADMINISTRATION MADE IT CLEAR THAT COMBINED ROUNDS
- 4 OF PANDEMIC FUNDS CARES ACT CRRSAA SHOULD BE USED TO PREVENT
- 5 FURLOUGH AND LAYOFFS OF TRANSIT OPERATOR AND STAFF. EACH
- 6 OPERATOR IS IF A UNIQUE FINANCIAL POSITION GIVEN THE VARYING
- 7 DEGREES TO WHICH REVENUE SOURCES HAVE BEEN IMPACTED BY THE
- 8 PANDEMIC SOME AGENCIES HAVE SIGNIFICANT FINANCIAL CUSHIONS
- 9 BECAUSE OF A COMBINATION OF EARLY FEDERAL RELIEF FUNDS QUICKLY
- 10 IMPROVING REVENUE AND OTHERS WITH PARKING REVENUES AND FARE
- 11 REVENUE ARE CONTINUING TO EXPERIENCE LOSSES THAT THREATEN

- 16 DO NOT -- [INDISCERNIBLE] THIS IS HIGHLIGHTED IN 1C
- 17 HIGHLIGHTED IN THE BOX ON THIS SLIDE FURTHER CALLING FOR
- 18 OPERATORS TO TAKE ACTION TO AMEND BUDGETS TO ACCOMMODATE
- 19 ALLOCATIONS AS THEY ARE MADE AVAILABLE TO ADDRESS OPERATING
- 20 AND SERVICE ADJUSTMENT IN A TIME LEAN MANNER. NEXT SLIDE
- 21 PLEASE. THE SECOND PRINCIPLE IS FOCUSED ON RESTORING AND
- 22 REIMAGINING SERVICE. SPECIFICALLY THE PRINCIPLE STATES THAT
- 23 AARP FUNDS SHOULD BE DISTRIBUTED WITH THE DIRECTION THE
- 24 TRANSIT OPERATORS TAKE MEASURES TO RESTORE SERVICE IN A WAY
- 25 THAT ADVANCES EQUITY AND TO AT LEAST MATCH CURRENT DEMAND FOR





- 1 TRANSIT AS WELL AS TO PLAN TO DEPLOY ADDITIONAL SERVICE AT A
- 2 LEVEL NECESSARY TO SUPPORT INCREASED LOCAL AND REGIONAL
- 3 TRANSIT DEMAND THAT'S EXPECTED BY SEPTEMBER OF THIS YEAR. THE
- 4 PRINCIPLE ENCOURAGES OPERATORS TO REMAIN NIMBLE AND CREATIVE
- 5 IN THEIR SERVICE PLANNING SO THAT OPERATORS CAN DEPLOY SERVICE
- 6 TO THOSE MOST IN NEED AND ACKNOWLEDGES THAT DISTRIBUTING AARP
- 7 FUNDS OVER SEVERAL ALLOCATION TRANCHES WILL ALLOW FUNDS TO BE
- 8 BEST TARGETED TO ALLOW CHANGE RIDERSHIP AND REVENUE TRENDS. I
- 9 WANT TO CALL YOUR ATTENTION TO THE BOX ON THIS SLIDE WHICH
- 10 HIGHLIGHTS PRINCIPLE 2A FOCUSING ON RESTORING SERVICE AND
- 11 ELIMINATING PASSENGER PASS UPS. THE PRINCIPLE STATES THAT AARP
- 12 ACT FUNDS SHOULD BE USED TO RESTORE SERVICE AND DEPLOY
- 13 OPERATING STAFF IN A MANNER THAT SIGNIFICANTLY REDUCES PASS
- 14 UPS WHILE PHYSICAL DISTANCING PUBLIC HEALTH ORDERS REMAIN IN
- 15 PLACE AND ELIMINATE PASS UPS ENTIRELY AS POSSIBLE AS CHANGES
- 16 IF PHYSICAL DISTANCING HEALTH PRIORITIES ARE NOTED. IT WILL
- 17 LIKELY TAKE THE RELAXATION OF PHYSICAL DISTANCING PUBLIC
- 18 HEALTH ORDER WHICH IS LIMIT VEHICLE CAPACITY TO FULLY
- 19 ELIMINATE PASS UPS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. FINALLY, THE THIRD
- 20 PRINCIPLE IS FOCUSED ON IMPROVING THE CUSTOMER EXPERIENCE.

- 25 AFTER THE PUBLIC HEALTH RISK WITH COVID HAS RECEDED IN ORDER





- 1 TO SUCCEED FOR CUSTOMERS TRANSIT MUST BE SAFE RELIABLE
- 2 AFFORDABLE EASY TO USE I'LL CALL TO YOUR ATTENTION THE BLUE
- 3 BOX PRINCIPLE 3A NOTING AARP FUNDS SUPPORT IMPLEMENTATION AND
- 4 RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT TASK FORCE AND
- 5 WILL INCREASE THE VALUE AND ENHANCE CUSTOMERS EXPERIENCE.

- 11 PRINCIPLES THAT WE JUST DISCUSSED, THE PRINCIPLES COULD THEN
- 12 BE CONSIDERED BY THE FULL COMMISSION AT ITS MEETING IN TWO
- 13 WEEKS ON MAY 26TH. ON JUNE 9TH AT THE REGULARLY SCHEDULED
- 14 PROGRAMMING AND ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE MEETING STAFF PLANS TO
- 15 RETURN TO THE COMMITTEE WITH POLICY DECISIONS FOR THE
- 16 COMMISSION TO CONSIDER WEIGHING EVALUATION OF APPROACHES OF
- 17 THE INITIAL DISTRIBUTION OF AARP FUNDS THEN JUNE 9TH SPECIAL
- 18 PROGRAMMING AND ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE WORKSHOP THAT WILL HELD

- 3 COUNTY THAT REALLY ARE NOT SERVING THE PUBLIC AND THE PEOPLE
- 4 THAT NEED IT, IT'S JUST INEFFICIENT. SO WE HAVE TO MAKE SURE
- 5 THAT THERE IS A MECHANISM IN THERE TO DEAL WITH THOSE TYPES OF
- 6 OPERATIONS. AND THAT THERE IS A REWARD FOR THE WORK THAT
- 7 SONOMA CAN'T HAS DONE. AND IN ADDITION \$750,000, THAT'S AN
- 8 INVESTMENT THAT WE REALLY OUGHT TO BE LOOKING AT, BECAUSE

- 21 SMALL -- IN CONTRA COSTA, WE HAVE A NUMBER OF SMALL OPERATORS,
- 22 AND CERTAINLY WE'RE SEEING A LOT OF COLLABORATIVE ACTION
- 23 THAT'S GOING ON AMONG THOSE. AND WE WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE
- 24 INCENTIVIZE THOSE SMALL OPERATORS FOR THE ABILITY TO DO THE
- 25 TYPE OF COLLABORATIVE ACTIONS THAT IT TAKES TO GET PEOPLE





- 1 MOVEMENT FROM REGION TO REGION WITHIN A PARTICULAR COUNTY. SO
- 2 I JUST WANT TO PIGGYBACK OFTEN OF HIS COMMENTS, AND SAY THAT
- 3 THERE NEEDS TO BE A STICK AND A CARROT.

- 5 DAVID RABBIT, CHAIR: GREAT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. ANYONE ELSE
- 6 HAVE ANY QUESTIONS, COMMENTS OR CONCERNS? I WANT TO SAY, ONCE
- 7 AGAIN, LIKE MANY OF YOU, WE ALL WEAR THESE DIFFERENT HATS AND
- 8 I SHARE RESPONSIBILITY FOR THREE OF OUR CURRENT 27 TRANSIT
- 9 AGENCIES AND THAT'S ON THE GOLDEN GATE BRIDGE WHERE I HAPPEN
- 10 TO BE THE FINANCE CHAIR, FRONT AND CENTER WITH ALL OF THE
- 11 FINANCE DOLLARS AND HEMORRHAGING THAT'S BEEN GOING ON THROUGH
- 12 COVID. CHAIR OF SMART SEEING A DIFFERENT APPROACH ON SALES TAX
- 13 REVENUE IN THE NORTH BAY AND IN OUR COUNTY BEING RELATIVELY
- 14 STABLE AND SONOMA COUNTY ON OUR OWN TRANSIT AGENCY ALL HAVING
- 15 DIFFERENT ENACTS AND I HAVE SEEN FIRST HANDS THE CONSEQUENCES
- 16 OF THE DIFFERENT REVENUE STREAMS AND I THINK THAT'S VERY REAL,
- 17 OBVIOUSLY. I THINK WHAT THAT REALLY, FOR ME, THE BIGGEST
- 18 OUESTION THAT IT ALWAYS COMES DOWN TO ON ANY OF THE AID
- 19 PACKAGES IS THE BURN RATE. HOW LONG WILL IT LAST UNTIL, YOU
- 20 KNOW, WE ARE LOOKING FOR THAT NEXT AUGMENTATION. YOU KNOW, I -
- 21 OBVIOUSLY, I THINK WE ALL KIND OF KNEW, AFTER CARES, THAT
- 22 THERE WOULD BE SOMETHING FOLLOWING. WE DIDN'T KNOW QUITE WHEN.
- 23 THE GOLDEN GATE BRIDGE HIT ITS FISCAL CLIFF EARLY BASED ON
- 24 TOLLS BEING WEIGHED OUT PEOPLE STAYING HOME NOT GOING INTO SAN
- 25 FRANCISCO AND THEN OF COURSE THE TOLLS BEING HALF THE REVENUE





- 1 FOR THE BUS AND FOR DIVISION. FERRY BEING DOWN UP TO, YOU
- 2 KNOW, 98% REDUCTION IN RIDERSHIP. AND WHEN YOU HAVE A HIGH
- 3 FARE BOX RECOVERY ON A SYSTEM LIKE THAT, THAT'S JUST
- 4 DEVASTATING FINANCIALLY. AT THE SAME TIME, YOU KNOW, HERE IN
- 5 THE NORTH BAY, SIGNIFICANT SMALLER BUS SYSTEMS MORE RELIANT ON
- 6 PROPERTY TAX OR SALES TAX DIFFERENT IMPACTS, FINANCIAL
- 7 IMPACTS. SAME IMPACTS, SOMETIMES ON RIDERSHIP, BUT DIFFERENT
- 8 IMPACTS FINANCIALLY. I'M ALWAYS WORRIED ABOUT THE BURDEN RATE
- 9 HOW LONG THINGS WILL LAST THIS IS A WISE MOVE AT THIS
- 10 PARTICULAR POINT IN TIME WE DON'T KNOW WHAT THE FUTURE HOLDS
- 11 IF THERE IS SOME DATE IN THE FUTURE WHAT THAT DATE WILL BE AND
- 12 HOW QUICKLY WE WILL COME BACK TO QUOTE UNDER QUOTE NORMAL
- 13 WHATEVER THAT WILL BE. AND I APPRECIATE COMMISSIONER SPERING
- 14 ON THE BLUE RIBBON RECOVERY TASK FORCE AND THE FACT THAT MTC
- 15 SET THAT UP THROUGH CHAIR PEDROZA I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT
- 16 WE HAVE AN OPEN AND HONEST LOOK ABOUT, IS THIS A 2, 3, 4, 5
- 17 YEAR RETURN TO PRECOVID NUMBERS AND WE REALLY NEED TO COME TO
- 18 GRIPS WITH THAT AND I KNOW THAT NO ONE HAS A CRYSTAL BALL BUT
- 19 WE NEED TO BE AS CAUTIOUS AS POSSIBLE. AT THE SAME TIME, I
- 20 KNOW THAT EVERY INDIVIDUAL AGENCY WANTS TO DO THE QUOTE
- 21 UNQUOTE WELCOME BACK CAMPAIGN. WE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT THAT
- 22 UP HERE AS WELL, AND I LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH BOTH THE
- 23 BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE AND MTC TO MAKE SURE THAT WE CAN DO THAT
- 24 TO ENSURE THAT THE PUBLIC, GETTING BACK ON PUBLIC TRANSIT IS
- 25 SAFE, SECURE, AND A GREAT WAY TO GO, EVEN BETTER PERHAPS GOING

- 1 SPEAKER: I AM SPEAKING TO SUPPORT AGENCIES PROVIDING CLEAR
- 2 ESTIMATE OF THEIR ALLOCATION BEFORE JULY SO THEY CAN INCLUDE
- 3 IT IN THEIR FISCAL YEAR BUDGET AND ALLOCATE A SUFFICIENT
- 4 AMOUNT TO RESTORE SERVICE THIS YEAR AND ON OTHER URGENT
- 5 SPENDING PRIORITIES. MTC MADE A STATEMENT TO THE PRESS THAT NO
- 6 MONEY IS BEING WITHHELD AND THAT MONEY IS BEING MADE AVAILABLE
- 7 AS NEEDED. MTC ISN'T HOLDING ANYTHING BACK I OUESTION THIS
- 8 BECAUSE AC TRANSIT THE SECOND LARGEST TRANSIT AGENCIES IN THE
- 9 BAY AREA HAS STATED THEY DO HAVE URGENT SPENDING NEEDS WHICH
- 10 DO NEED TO BE ADDRESSED. AS AN EXAMPLE AC SERVICE HAS MANY

- 19 PRINCIPLES. MTC HAS BEEN RELYING ON WHAT HAS BEEN COMMUNICATED

- 3 YOU FOR YOUR TIME.
