GOOD MORNING. 24 OUR FOCUS AS OF LATE HAS BEEN MOSTLY ON DROUGHT, AND 25



MESSAGING OUT A LOT OF THE STATE BOARD MESSAGING 1 AROUND CONSERVATION EFFORTS. WE'VE MET WITH MARIN 2 WATER DISTRICT. WE'RE DOING SOME EMERGENCY PERMITTING 3 TO ALLOW THEM TO DISINFECT SECONDARY TREATED 4 WASTEWATER FOR USE FOR PEOPLE IN THEIR YARDS IN LIEU 5 OF USING THE DRINKING WATER SUPPLY, AND NOW WE'RE 6 TALKING LONGER RANGE WITH THEM ON EMERGENCY WATER 7 8 SUPPLIES. WE HAVE ALSO BEEN TALKING, YOU KNOW, BEYOND JUST THE MARIN REGION WITH WASTEWATER OPERATORS ABOUT 9 OTHER EMERGENCY MEASURES THAT WE COULD BE TAKING TO 10 INCREASE WATER SUPPLY, FROM WATER RECYCLING. AND THE 11 OTHER BIG DEAL THAT'S HAPPENING STATEWIDE IS RACIAL 12 EOUITY DRAFT RESOLUTION THAT THE STATE BOARD RELEASED 13 ON JUNE 24TH. THIS HAS BEEN UNDERWAY FOR A NUMBER OF 14 MONTHS THERE WERE PUBLIC SESSIONS, LISTENING SESSIONS 15 INTERNALLY WITHIN THE WATER BODE ENTERPRISE WITH 400 16 STAFF PARTICIPATING THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF INPUT AND 17 THAT DRAFT RESOLUTION IS OUT FOR COMMENT AND WILL 18 LIKELY BE ADOPTED BY THE STATE BOARD IN SEPTEMBER. WE 19 HAVE ALSO BEEN WORKING ON OUR OWN RACIAL EOUITY 20 EFFORTS. I WANT TO THANK THE AIR DISTRICT AND 21 22 VERONICA EADY, THEY HAVE BEEN LEADING THE CHARGE REGIONALLY AND SPENT TIME TALK WITH OUR FOLKS AND WE 23 HAVE LEARNED A LOT FROM THAT CONVERSATION, AND I WANT 24 TO THANK ALLISON FOR THE FORMS SHE PULLED TOGETHER 25



WHERE ALL OF THE BARC AGENCIES GOT A CHANCE TO TALK 1 ABOUT THIS WORK, AND IT'S REALLY ENCOURAGING. WE'RE 2 GOING TO BE DOING, SORT OF, AN UPDATE TO THE WORK 3 THAT WE'RE DOING IN THE FALL. SO I'M EXCITED. IT'S 4 GOING TO FALL ON EFFORTS OF THE STATEWIDE RESOLUTION 5 ONCE IT'S ADOPTED. AND THAT IS MOST OF WHAT I HAVE TO 6 SHARE. I HAVE SOME GOOD NEWS. YOU KNOW, A WHILE BACK, 7 8 I MENTIONED, THERE WAS A BOAT THAT WAS STRANDED ON THE COAST OFF OF WEST MARIN, I'M HAPPY TO HEAR THAT 9 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, WORKING WITH STATE LANDS, HAS 10 11 COBBLED TOGETHER A FUNDING AND A STRATEGY FOR REMOVING THAT VESSEL. AND, SO I JUST THOUGHT I WOULD 12 CIRCLE BACK, BECAUSE I HAD MENTIONED IT A WHILE BACK 13 AT ONE OF THE PRIOR BARC MEETINGS, AND IT'S GREAT TO 14 SEE THAT TYPE OF COLLABORATION BETWEEN THE STATE AND 15 FEDERAL AGENCIES. AND, THANKFULLY, WE DIDN'T HAVE TO 16 GET THAT INVOLVED. IT'S GREAT TO SEE THAT COME 17 TOGETHER. THERE IS ALSO SOME OTHER EFFORTS ON 18 DERELICT VESSELS, I KNOW BCDC HAS BEEN LEADING THE 19 CHARGE ON THAT. THANK YOU. 20

LARRY GOLDZBAND: THANK YOU. I WANT TO TALK ABOUT ONE 1 THING, WHICH IS SOME REALLY GOOD NEWS. A NUMBER OF 2 YEARS AGO THE CALIFORNIA STATE AUDITOR RELEASED AN 3 AUDIT ON THE BCDC ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM EFFORTS WHICH 4 WAS FAR LESS THAN FLATTERING WITH BCDC, BASICALLY 5 TOLD THE COMMISSION, STATE AUDITOR IS THAT WE 6 DISAGREE WITH YOUR CHARACTERIZATION AND 7 8 RECOMMENDATIONS. BCDC STAFF BECAUSE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA WAS ABLE TO PROVIDE FUNDING TO BCDC TO 9 HIRE AN ENFORCEMENT MANAGER FOR THE FIRST TIME AND 10 ATTORNEY FOR THE FIRST TIME, RESPONDED TO THE AUDIT, 11 OF THE 20 OR SO RECOMMENDATIONS THAT THE AUDIT MADE. 12 BCDC HAS ADOPTED VERSIONS OF PROBABLY 16 OR 17 OF 13 THEM. AND, SO THE AUDIT HAS TURNED OUT TO BE VERY 14 USEFUL IN TERMS OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS. BUT, THE 15 POINTS OF WHAT I'M SAYING, REALLY, IS THAT IT, REALLY 16 GOES TO WHOM YOU HIRE. BECAUSE, YESTERDAY, AT THE 17 BCDC COMMISSION MEETING, IN WHAT IS A, SORT OF 18 REGULAR EVERY ENFORCEMENT UPDATE -- ALTHOUGH IT WAS A 19 MONTH BEHIND BECAUSE OF ISSUE NOT RELATED TO 20 ENFORCEMENT. THE COMMISSION WAS TOLD THAT AT THE END 21 OF 2020, THERE WERE 211 ENFORCEMENT CASES THAT WERE 22 ACTIVE. AS OF JUNE 30TH, THAT NUMBER HAD DROPPED BY, 23 BASICALLY, A THIRD. AND THE NUMBER OF CASES THAT HAD 24 BEEN OPENED AND CLOSED, ALSO, HAD BEEN DROPPING BY 25



SIGNIFICANT AMOUNTS, AND THAT IS BECAUSE THE FOLKS 1 THAT WE HIRED TO FILL THOSE TWO NEW POSITIONS HAVE 2 DONE AN ABSOLUTELY TREMENDOUS JOB AT MAKING A PROCESS 3 ACTUALLY WORK. AND TO DO THAT, THEY ACTUALLY HAD TO 4 DEVELOP A PROCESS, AND IN DEVELOPING THE PROCESS, 5 WHAT THEY HAVE SAID, AND WHAT THEY WILL CONTINUE TO 6 SAY, IS THAT THERE ARE FOUR PARTS TO ANY ENFORCEMENT 7 8 PROGRAM. DETERRENCE TO REMOVE THE INCENTIVE TO VIOLATE THE LAWS AND POLICIES, TRANSPARENCY TO 9 CLEARLY COMMUNICATE EXPECTATIONS, ENSURE PROCESSES 10 ARE KNOWN AND UNDERSTOOD, CONSISTENCY E MAINTAINING A 11 CLEAR DOCUMENTED ENFORCEMENT PROCESS THAT'S PUBLICLY 12 TRANSPARENT AND CONSISTENT, AND FAIRNESS TO TREAT 13 VIOLATION SIMILAR IN NATURE AND IMPACT THE BAY IN 14 PUBLIC ACCESS SIMILARLY AND WITH ALL OF THAT I CAN 15 TELL THAT YOU THE COMMISSION, I THINK, HAS REALLY 16 RESPONDED VERY WELL, INDEED THE ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE 17 18 OF THE COMMISSION, WHICH WAS LED UNTIL A COUPLE OF WEEKS AGO BY GREG SCHARFF OF PALO ALTO WHO IS NOW 19 BCDC'S NEW GENERAL COUNSEL, AND NOW MARIE GILLMOR WHO 20 IS THE FORMER MAYOR OF ALAMEDA HAS BEEN ABSOLUTELY 21 22 TREMENDOUS IN PROVIDING LEADERSHIP. I WANTED TO GIVE YOU AN UPDATE ON ONE ASPECT OF WHAT BCDC DOES. THANK 23 YOU. 24

SO WE'RE WORKING ON THAT. ONE 15 THING WORTH NOTING IS THAT THE CALIFORNIA AIR 16 RESOURCES BOARD, CARB, RECENTLY UPPED THEIR STIPENDS 17 FOR THE ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE FROM \$100 PER 18 MEETING TO \$500 PER MEETING. THAT'S REALLY PUSHING US 19 IN A PARTICULAR DIRECTION. ALTHOUGH THAT'S NOT AT ALL 20 TO SUGGEST THAT EVERY ENCOUNTER THAT WE HAVE, EVERY 21 BIT OF ADVICE THAT WE GET FROM COMMUNITY JUSTICE --22 FROM ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE ADVOCATES ARE ALSO GOING 23 TO GET THAT \$500 STIPEND. IF WE DO ADOPT THAT, IF THE 24 BOARD ADOPTS IT, THAT WILL CERTAINLY BE ON THE HIGH 25

JAMES P. SPERING: THANK YOU, AMY. YOU KNOW, ON BARC, 6 THE ONE ROLE I THINK BARC COULD PLAY IS TO BUILD THE 7 8 REGIONAL ADVOCACY, AND ACTUALLY WORK DIRECTLY WITH THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE AND THE LEGISLATURE. IN TERMS OF LEADERSHIP, THERE IS NO OUESTION 5 THIS IS A RECURRENT AND EVOLVING ISSUE. BUT, AS I 6 SAID IN THE BEGINNING OF MY REMARKS, BCDC HAS 7 8 PROVIDED LEADERSHIP IN THIS AREA. AND WE EXPECT TO CONTINUE TO DO SO.
