IN THE TRANSPORTATION REALM THE NEED 8 WAS HEARD TO IDENTIFY MORE CLEARLY THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PLANNED 9 BAY AREA 2050 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AND THE WORK OF THE BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT 10 RECOVERY TASK FORCE. 1 PARTNERS WE HEARD ABOUT STAFFING SHORTAGES, SKILLS GAPS, AND IN GENERAL, 2 THE CHALLENGING LABOR MARKET CONDITIONS THAT HAVE CONTINUED AS THE 3 PANDEMIC REMAINS WITH US TO ADDRESS THESE REVISIONS UNDER STRATEGY EC TWO 4 EXPAND JOB TRAINING AND INCUBATOR PROGRAMS EXPAND THE EMPHASIZING 5 IMPORTANCE OF APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES AND HIGH ROAD CAREER 6 OPPORTUNITIES INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION THROUGH REGIONAL ADVOCACY EFFORTS AS 7 WELL AS PARTNERS WITH REGIONAL STAKEHOLDERS INCLUDING LABOR BUSINESS 8 EDUCATION PARTNERS AND AMONG OTHERS RESEARCH AND MODELING OF WORKFORCE 9 SUPPLY CHALLENGES IN THE REGION. 1 STARTING IN 2022 TO MTC/ABAG COMMITTEES ADVISORY BODIES AND PROPOSING TO 2 BUILD ON VITAL SIGNS REGIONAL PERFORMANCE MONITORING INITIATIVES AND MEANS 3 TO SUPPORT PERFORMANCE TRACKING AND ENGAGE OUR PROGRESS IN IMPLEMENTING 4 THE PLAN. OVERALL ACROSS THE MANY DIFFERENT PARTNERSHIP PHASE ELEMENTS. WE 5 SAW 45 DISTINCT PARTNERS OFFERING POTENTIAL COMMITMENTS OR STATEMENTS OF 6 SUPPORT TO ADVANCE IMPLEMENTATION OVER THE NEXT 1 TO 5 YEARS ACROSS ALL OF 7 THE PLAN'S STRATEGIES. STAFF WILL THEN CONDUCT A FINAL ROUND OF STAKEHOLDER 12 AND PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS TO THE REGIONAL ADVISORY WORKING GROUP, MTC 13 POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL ABAG REGIONAL PLANNING COMMITTEE AND FOCUS ON 14 CHANGES MADE BETWEEN THE DRAFT AND FINAL PLAN AS WELL AS NEAR-TERM NEXT 15 STEPS AS WE PIVOT FROM PLANNING TO IMPLEMENTATION. CLOSING THE BOOK ON 2021, AND PREPARING TO HIT THE GROUND RUNNING IN EARLY 2022. AFTER THOSE 16 17 INFORMATIONAL PRESENTATIONS, STAFF WILL BRING FORWARD FINAL PLANNED BAY 18 AREA 2050 TO THE JOINT PLANNING AND ADMIN COMMITTEE AND REQUEST THAT THE 19 PLAN BE FORWARDED TO THE JOINT COMMISSION AND ABAG BOARD MEETING ON 20 OCTOBER 21ST. SHOULD FINAL PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 BE ADOPTED BY MTC AND 21 ABAG IN OCTOBER, STAFF WOULD THEN WORK WITH FEDERAL AND STATE PARTNERS AT 22 THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION, FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION, 23 CALTRANS, AND THE CALIFORNIA AIR RESOURCES BOARD TO SECURE ALL THE 24 NECESSARY FEDERAL AND STATE APPROVALS IN FALL OF 2021 AND WINTER OF 2022. 25 SUFFICE TO SAY THAT OCTOBER WILL BE A BUSY MONTH, AS WE MOVE NEXT SLIDE.

1 FORWARD TOWARDS THE COMPLETION OF THIS NEARLY FOUR-YEAR LONG REGIONAL 2 PLANNING PROCESS FOR TRANSPORTATION, HOUSING, THE ECONOMY, AND THE 3 ENVIRONMENT. AND OF COURSE, WE ALSO BE DOING THE RHNA APPEALS PROCESS 4 THAT MONTH, AS WELL. I WANT TO ECHO CHIRAG'S THANKS TO OUR PARTNERS FOR 5 ALL OF THEIR INPUT IN THE PAST YEAR ON THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AND YOUR 6 ONGOING ENGAGEMENT OF THE COURSE OF THIS FOUR-YEAR LONG PLANNING PROCESS 7 WE'LL BE BACK NEXT MONTH WITH AN ACTION ITEM AT THE COMMITTEE AND BOARD 8 LEVELS BUT FOR NOW WE'RE HAPPY TO TAKE ANY QUESTIONS.

10 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU VERY MUCH DAVE FOR ALL OF THE WORK YOU 11 HAVE ENGAGED IN OVER SEVERAL YEARS NOW AND IT'S HARD TO BELIEVE THAT WE'RE 12 ALMOST AT THE END OF THE FOUR YEAR PROCESS ABOUT PLANNED BAY AREA AND 13 WE'LL BE MEETING NEXT MONTH AT THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION 14 TO TAKE PUBLIC TESTIMONY AND TAKE FINAL VOTE ON THE FINAL PLAN THIS WAS 15 INTENDED TO BE A PREVIEW FOR DISCUSSION WE'LL BE HAVING NEXT MONTH. DAVE, 16 BEFORE I GO TO EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS, WHEN WILL THE REVISED PLAN, EIR 17 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN WHEN WILL ALL THAT BE RELEASED FOR PUBLIC REVIEW. 18 >DAVE VAUTIN: NO LATER THAN THE WEEK OF IRKED FOURTH SEVERAL WEEKS BEFORE 19 THE JOINT BOARD AND COMMISSION MEETING.

21 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: DAVE?

DAVID E. HUDSON: ONE THING REALLY CAUGHT MY EYE, DAVE, I THINK I BROUGHT
IT UP ONCE BEFORE, JUST TOO MANY MEETINGS, TOO MANY THINGS BROUGHT UP, AND
IT HAS TO DO WITH ADVOCACY AND LEGISLATION, IN THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

1 ITSELF, AND I HAVE THE BRIEF IN FRONT OF ME. I DON'T KNOW HOW MANY 2 REVISIONS THERE ARE, SO IT'S ON PAGE THREE, ACTUALLY, IF YOU WANT TO SEE 3 "ADVOCATE THE REFORMS TO SENATE BILL 375." THERE'S MORE TO IT. HAVE IT. 4 YOU GOT ANY IDEA WHERE WE'RE GOING WITH THIS? BECAUSE I MEAN, BASICALLY, 5 THE LAST PLAN WAS BUILT AROUND 375. WHAT ARE WE TALKING ABOUT DOING HERE? 6 BECAUSE IT SAYS YOU'RE 1 AND 2. SO SOMETHING'S GOT TO BE BREWING. >DAVE 7 VAUTIN: YEAH. I'M HAPPY TO PROVIDE A BRIEF RESPONSE, AND REBECCA LONG FROM 8 LEGISLATION IS HERE AS WELL. WE THERE ARE SEVERAL BILLS IN THE LEGISLATURE FOCUSED ON REFORMING 375, AND WHILE THEY DIDN'T PROCEED THIS YEAR WE 9 10 EXPECT THEY WILL COME BACK IN THE 2022 LEGISLATION. WE HAVE BEEN WORKING 11 UNDER SB 375 SINCE 2008, 13 YEARS NOW. THE FOCUS ON CLIMATE CHANGE AND 12 POLICY ISSUES, THERE ARE ALSO WEAKNESSES OF SB 375, BLIND SPOTS WHERE IT'S 13 NOT CAPTURING ALL OF THE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS REDUCTIONS. IT'S NARROW 14 FOCUS ON TRANSPORTATION WHEN THERE ARE WAYS WE CAN LOOK AT BROADER WAYS TO 15 REDUCE CLIMATE EMISSIONS. AND, REALLY, AN APPROACH THAT SILOS REGIONS, LOCALS, AND STATES, INTO BUCKETS AS OPPOSED TO LOOKING FOR WAYS TO ADVANCE 16 17 PROGRAMS TOGETHER IN PARTNERSHIP AND TREATING THAT AS A WIN. SO THERE IS 18 MUCH MORE TO SAY ABOUT THE TOPIC OF 375 REFORM, BUT IT'S SNAG WE'RE 19 ACTIVELY ENGAGING WITH, WITH THE LEGISLATURE, AND THESE VARIOUS BILLS TO 20 TRY TO UNDERSTAND, YOU KNOW, WHAT THE BEST PATH FORWARD IS TO, TO REFORM 21 THIS AND SET THIS UP FOR SUCCESS WITH FUTURE PLANNING WORK.

23 DAVID E. HUDSON: A LOT OF THE PLANNING AROUND HOUSING WAS WHAT SB 375 WAS
24 ABOUT. AND I HAVEN'T BEEN ON THE TRANSPORTATION PART OF THE LEAGUE OF
25 CALIFORNIA CITIES FOR A COUPLE OF YEARS, BUT SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA BE

CAUTIOUS IS ALL I'M SAYING. THEY WOULD LOVE TO SCRAP THAT THING. AND I
 DON'T WANT TO START OVER AGAIN THESE THINGS ARE LONG ENOUGH AS THEY ARE.
 I'LL LEAVE IT AT THAT.

5 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: MAYOR EKLUND.

6

7 PAT ECKLUND: AT THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, I MENTIONED, AND I 8 HAVE MENTIONED IT A COUPLE OF TIMES IS THAT ONE OF THE ISSUES THAT CITIES 9 AND COUNTIES ARE HAVING SOME ISSUES WITH IS TRYING TO GET MORE 10 AFFORDABILITY IN THE HOUSING. AND AN IDEA THAT HAS BEEN PROMOTED WITHIN 11 THE MARIN COUNTY PLANNERS IS, IS THERE A WAY THAT ABAG MTC CAN TRY TO HELP 12 BUY DOWN THE LEVEL OF AFFORDABILITY? A LOT OF THIS -- AND A LOT OF THE 13 CITIES ARE CHANGING THEIR 20% INCLUSIONARY BECAUSE BUILDERS DON'T WANT TO 14 DO IT. AND SO THAT'S REDUCING THE NUMBER OF AFFORDABLE UNITS. I'M VERY 15 STRONG. I'M GOING TO KEEP 20% AS LONG AS I CAN KEEP THE MAJORITY ON THE 16 COUNCIL. I HAVEN'T SEEN ANY CHANGES IN THIS LAST IMPLEMENTATION PLAN, WHAT 17 CITIZEN BEST VENUE FOR US TO GET IT INTO THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN SO THAT 18 WE CAN AT LEAST SAY THAT THAT IDEA IS AT LEAST CONSISTENT WITH PLANNED BAY 19 AREA 2050? WHERE CAN WE MAKE SURE THAT WE GET IT IN THERE? OR IS IT IN 20 THERE ALREADY AND THEN I'LL JUST STOP ASKING THE OUESTION. BUT IS THAT 21 SOMETHING -- THE COST OF HOUSING IS JUST TOO MUCH. AND THIS IS, I THINK 22 IT'S A GOOD WAY OF TRYING TO BRING IT DOWN. SO, I DON'T KNOW. DO YOU KNOW 23 OF WHERE IT MIGHT BE? OR, CAN WE PUT IT IN THERE? >DAVE VAUTIN: FIRST OF 24 ALL, THANKS FOR THAT, SINCE I KNOW YOU BROUGHT THAT UP AT THE COMMITTEE 25 LEVEL OF COURSE THIS IS JUST OUR SEPTEMBER ITERATION OF THE IMPLEMENTATION

1 PLAN. I CAN START, AND CHIRAG, IF YOU HAVE MORE TO ADD HERE, I THINK WE 2 HAVE LAID OUT A PRETTY LONG LIST OF DIFFERENT IMPLEMENTATION ACTIONS 3 RELATED TO HOUSING AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN. OF 4 COURSE, WE DO HAVE A STRATEGY FOCUSED ON THE INCLUSIONARY ZONING POLICY, 5 SO I SEE THE NEXUS THERE WITH WHAT YOU'RE REFERRING TO. WE CAN CERTAINLY 6 REFLECT ON THAT SUGGESTION AND SEE IF THERE IS ANY WAY THAT THAT CAN BE 7 CONSIDERED FOR THE FINAL IN OCTOBER. BUT, I'LL TURN IT OVER TO THERESE. I 8 SEE SHE HAS HAND RAISED.

10 THERESE MCMILLAN: THANK YOU DAVE. AND THANK YOU MAYOR EKLUND FOR BRINGING 11 IT UP AND REMINDING US OF JUST ONE OF THE KEY OBJECTIVES WE HAVE. Α 12 COUPLE OF THINGS, THOUGH, TO UNDERSCORE, IS TWO THINGS. I THINK WE ALL, 13 ALSO VIEW THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN ELEMENT, IN PARTICULAR, AS A BIT OF A 14 LIVING DOCUMENT, FOCUSING ON THE FIVE YEAR PERIOD WHERE THERE COULD BE 15 LEGISLATION THERE COULD BE NEW REGULATORY A NUMBER OF THINGS THAT WE WANT 16 TO CARRY OUT IN WHAT WE WANT TO ACHIEVE IN THE LONG-TERM. AND THE OTHER 17 THING I WOULD POINT OUT TO PRESIDENT ARREGUIN'S WORK SETTING THIS UP, YOU 18 HAVE A NEW ABAG HOUSING COMMITTEE. [LAUGHTER] AND THAT COMMITTEE, WORKING 19 HAND IN GLOVE, WITH THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, YOU KNOW, 20 OVERSIGHT MEET THAT WAS SETUP, YOU KNOW, BY BAHFA, WORKING IN TANDEM, IS 21 THE FOCUS, I THINK, FOR CONTINUED DIALOGUE. AND PLANNING OF WHAT WE CAN DO 22 IN THIS SPACE. AND, SO, YOU KNOW, JUST WANTED TO POINT OUT THAT, AS COMPREHENSIVE AND, I THINK, EXTRAORDINARILY INSIGHTFUL AS PLANNED BAY AREA 23 24 2050 IS, AND THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN, IN PARTICULAR, WITH ITS FOCUS ON 25 REALLY TRYING TO GET IMPACTFUL ACTION IN THE NEXT FIVE YEARS, IT IS NOT

THE ONLY THING, AND SERVES AS A GUIDE TO HELP US IN A NUMBER OF OTHER
 AVENUES. SO JUST WANTED TO MAKE THAT POINT, AND PARTICULARLY POINT OUT THE
 FORMULA OF THE ABAG HOUSING COMMITTEE AND WORK AHEAD, AND I DON'T KNOW IF
 PRESIDENT ARREGUIN WOULD LIKE TO COMMENT ON THAT AS WELL.

6 PRESIDENT, JESSE ARREGUIN: I THINK YOU SUMMED IT UP VERY WELL, AND THIS IS
7 SOMETHING THAT I THINK WE CAN CONTINUE TO DISCUSS AT THE HOUSING

THE OTHER THING WE WANT TO TALK ABOUT, AND I'M 6 CERTAINLY GOING TO TALK TO MY OWN BOARD ABOUT IT, NEXT MONTH, IS THAT WHEN 7 WE ADOPTED THE \$570,000 PAYMENT TO MTC, SUPPORT PAYMENT TO MTC, WE DID NOT 8 TAKE INTO ACCOUNT, OVERHEAD THAT WOULD ULTIMATELY BE TRANSFERRED TO MTC 9 AND THE REASON FOR THAT WAS, AT THE TIME, THERE WAS NO OVERHEAD TO 10 TRANSFER TO MTC, NOW THE GRANTS HAVE BEEN SQUARED AWAY, THE OVERHEAD 11 STRUCTURES AND GRANTS I THINK WITH THE EXCEPTION OF TWO, HAVE BEEN 12 COMPLETELY ENFORCED AND THE TRANSFERS ARE HAPPENING, AND AS SUCH THE 13 TRANSFER REVENUE IS NOW CLOSE TO \$1.4 MILLION WHICH, SORT OF, NOW MAKES 14 MOOT THE 570,000 SO WHAT I WOULD PROPOSE TO SUGGEST IS THAT, AS LONG AS 15 THE AMOUNT OF THE TRANSFER, THE GRANT TRANSFERS -- AND THEY'RE ONLY GETTING BIGGER -- YOU KNOW, EXCEEDS THE \$570,000, THAT WE WOULD WAIVE THAT 16 17 AND JUST TAKE THE OVERHEAD WOULD BE TRANSFERRED TO MTC IN LIEU OF IT. TO MY FIRST QUESTION, IT'S TO YOU. 20 21 BRIAN MAYHEW: WELL, LET ME TRY A COUPLE OF THINGS, ONE, THIS ISN'T 22 COMPLETELY -- I MEAN, OBVIOUSLY, THESE ARE CONCEPTS. IF THE CONCEPTS DON'T 23 GET AN IMMEDIATE NO, WE'RE GOING TO GO BACK AND WORK ON THEM AGAIN. I AM 24 THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER OF MTC MY CHIEF RESPONSIBILITIES EXTEND TO YOU 25 AND MTC. AT THIS STAGE I WOULDN'T HAVE ANYBODY FROM ABAG TO NEGOTIATE.

1 HOWEVER, I DO THINK THAT THERE ARE ADVANTAGES TO CONSOLIDATE WHAT ARE 2 BASICALLY SPACES AROUND THE BUILDING AS WE'RE GOING INTO DOING OTHER 3 PLANNING AND THE RETURN OF EMPLOYEES, AND I THINK THERE ARE SOME 4 ADVANTAGES TO MTC AND THE AIR DISTRICT TO THINK OF THIS, I THINK THERE ARE 5 ADVANTAGES TO ABAG TO THINK THAT MAYBE OWNING THE WHOLE BUILDING ISN'T 6 EXACTLY WHAT YOU NEED TO DO ANYMORE ESPECIALLY SINCE YOU DON'T HAVE A 7 PHYSICAL PRESENCE HERE, THAT'S ALL COVERED BY US NOW. IT'S JUST A THOUGHT. 8 WELL, CERTAINLY, IF THE ANSWER IS NOT A FLAT NO, THEN WE'LL SIT DOWN AND 9 THINK ABOUT SOME CONCEPTS AS TO HOW TO DO IT.

JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: YEAH, MAYOR ROMERO, I THINK THAT'S THE IDEA, THAT STAFF IS, SORT OF, GOING TO EXPLORE SOME OF THOSE CONCEPTS FURTHER. I THINK THE IDEA WAS TO BRING BACK TO THE ABAG FINANCE COMMITTEE FOR FURTHER DISCUSSION ON SOME OF THESE IDEAS. AT THE END OF THE DAY, THEY'RE GOING TO HAVE TO COME BACK TO THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD, A NUMBER OF THINS REFINANCING CALPERS OBLIGATIONS IS SOME OF THE OTHER SUGGESTIONS. THERESE DO YOU HAVE ANYTHING TO ADD? NEXT STEPS?

19 THERESE MCMILLAN: I THINK THE ONLY THING TO REINFORCE, AND IT WAS 20 DISCUSSED AT THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, AT THE SCALE OF THE STRUCTURAL DEFICIT 21 THAT WE'RE EXPERIENCING, YOU'RE GOING TO NEED A COMPENDIUM OF OPTIONS. AND 22 WHAT WE HAVE PUT FORWARD IS A RANGE OF POTENTIAL OPTIONS. END OF THE DAY 23 IS FINANCIAL STABILITY FOR ABAG, SO WHETHER YOU TAKE SOMETHING OFF THE 24 TABLE, REPLACE IT CAN SOMETHING ELSE, THE ACCUMULATIVE EFFECT SHOULD BE 25 GETTING TO YOU A STABLE PLACE. SO I WOULD SAY THAT'S THE CONTEXTUAL LARGER

ANALYTICAL ASSESSMENT WE WOULD DO AND JUST CAUTION THAT WE NOT LOOK AT
 EACH INDIVIDUAL PIECE IN ISOLATION BUT HOW THEY WOULD WORK TOGETHER TOWARD
 THE END OF PUTTING YOU IN, ABAG, IN A MORE SUSTAINABLE FINANCIAL POSITION.

5 CARLOS ROMERO: MR. PRESIDENT, ONE MORE COMMENT, AND THIS IS NOT AN 6 INDICTMENT OF, CERTAINLY, MR. MAYHEW, BUT CERTAINLY UNDERSTANDING THE 7 CAPITALIZATION AND FUTURE VALUE, YOU KNOW, DIGGING INTO NET PRESENT VALUE 8 ASSUMPTIONS, WHAT ARE DISCOUNT RATES, ET CETERA. I MEAN, THOSE ARE 9 DIFFICULT THINGS TO UNDERSTAND. AND I THINK IT WOULD BE IN THE INTEREST OF 10 ABAG -- AND NOW I'M SAYING AS A SEPARATE ENTITY FROM MTC TO POTENTIALLY 11 THINK ABOUT WHETHER OR NOT IT ACTUALLY WANTS TO HAVE A CONSULTANT ON THE 12 OTHER SIDE TO UNDERSTAND THE COMPLEX REAL ESTATE ASPECTS THAT MAY COME 13 INTO PLAY IN THE EVALUATION OF A BUILDING THAT HAS A NUMBER OF MOVING 14 PARTS, INCLUDING INCOME GENERATION. SO IT MIGHT BE IN OUR INTEREST TO 15 POSSIBLY HAVE THAT, AND THAT IS NOT AN INDICTMENT OF MR. MAYHEW, WHO I 16 THINK IS ONE OF THE FINEST.

18 BRIAN MAYHEW: WE WOULD DO THAT ANYWAY. AND YOU'RE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT. AGAIN, 19 WE HAVE GONE INTO THIS WITH A CLASSIC BUSINESS APPROACH, HOW DO YOU GET 20 YOUR ASSETS TO WORK BETTER FOR YOU, HOW DO YOU REDUCE YOUR LIABILITIES AND 21 HOPEFULLY THAT MATCHES UP TO A BETTER BOTTOM LINE. YOU KNOW, WE HAVE TO DO 22 SOMETHING. BUT YOU'RE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT. WE WOULD MAKE ABSOLUTELY CERTAIN 23 THAT ONCE WE DEAL WITH SOME THINGS, THERE ARE SOME THINGS THAT ARE MUCH 24 EASIER HERE, BECAUSE THE AMOUNT A BUILDING IS WORTH WAS FIXED IN THE 25 ORIGINAL PURCHASE, BUT WE WOULD CERTAINLY MAKE ABSOLUTELY CERTAIN THAT

1 SOMEBODY FROM THE OUTSIDE IS REVIEWING THIS, INDEPENDENT OF ME, AND 2 INDEPENDENT OF THERESE LITERALLY INDEPENDENT OF EVERYBODY, BECAUSE YOU 3 WANT AN INDEPENDENT REPORT. 4 5 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: YES. I WOULD AGREE, AND THANK YOU CARLOS FOR THAT 6 SUGGESTION. I COMPLETELY AGREE. IF WE ARE GOING TO GO DOWN THIS PATH WE 7 WANT TO HAVE A CONSULTANT ASSIST IN DOING THE EVALUATION. MAYOR GIBBONS? 8 9 LIZ GIBBONS: THANK YOU. INTERESTING DISCUSSION. I CERTAINLY HOPE THE 10 MOTIVATION BEHIND WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO DO IS SOLVE THE STRUCTURAL 11 FINANCIAL PROBLEM. 5 DARCIE LUCE: GOOD EVENING EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS. I'M AN ENVIRONMENTAL 6 PLANNER WITH THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP. THANK YOU FOR THE 7 OPPORTUNITY TO GIVE THIS PRESENTATION THIS EVENING AND I PROMISE TO KEEP 8 THIS BRIEF AND TO THE POINT. SINCE IT'S BEEN A LITTLE WHILE SINCE WE 9 BROUGHT THIS ITEM TO YOU I'LL GIVE A BRIEF BACKGROUND ON THE SAN FRANCISCO 10 ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP AND TALK ABOUT OUR UPDATE PROCESS AND THEN WELCOME ANY 11 DISCUSSION AND Q&A AT THE END. NEXT SLIDE. THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY 12 PARTNERSHIP IS A PLACE-BASED NON-REGULATORY PROGRAM OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL 13 PROTECTION AGENCY. WE ARE 1 OF 28 MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM, 14 WHICH FOCUSES ON PARTNERSHIP, COLLABORATION, AND CONSENSUS BUILDING. EPA 15 PROVIDES WITH PROGRAM APPROVAL AND SMALL AMOUNT OF BASE FUNDING PASSED 16 THROUGH APPROXIMATELY \$75 MILLION ANNUALLY FUNDING THE LOCAL PARTNERS ON 17 THE GROUND FOR IMPLEMENTATION PROJECTS AND BENEFIT THE SAN FRANCISCO 18 ESTUARY. WE ARE REQUIRED TO HAVE A LOCAL ADMINISTRATIVE HOME WHICH HAS 19 BEEN ABAG SINCE OUR FOUNDING IN 1988. AND WHILE THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD 20 AND MTC PROVIDE US WITH ADMINISTRATIVE GUIDANCE, OUR PROGRAMMATIC WORK IS 21 GUIDED BY OUR 38 MEMBER IMPLEMENTATION COMMITTEE OR IC WHICH INCLUDES 22 REPRESENTATIVES FROM LOCAL, STATE, AND FEDERAL AGENCIES BUSINESSES, 23 SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH ORGANIZATIONS AND CITIZEN ADVOCACY GROUPS. OF COURSE, 24 WE HAVE ABAG REPRESENTATION ON OUR IC, AND MANY THANKS TO MAYOR PAT 25 EKLUND, WHO REPRESENTS THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD ON OUR IC, AND HAS ALSO

1 BEEN SERVING ON OUR ESTUARY BLUEPRINT UPDATE STEERING COMMITTEE. NEXT 2 SLIDE. OUR ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP PLANNING AREA COVERS ALL OF THE WATER 3 SHEDS THAT DRAIN TO THE ESTUARY INCLUDING BOTH THE BAY AND THE UPPER 4 ESTUARY OR SACRAMENTO SAN JOAOUIN DELTA. THIS IS ALSO UPDATE ON THE 5 PLANNING BLUEPRINT. THIS MAY REFER TO PAST IMPLEMENTATION PLANNED BAY 6 AREA. WE SEEK TO ALIGN THE ESTUARY BLUEPRINT WITH PLANNED BAY AREA, BCDC'S 7 BAY ADAPT AND ALSO DELTA ADAPT CLIMATE CHANGE PLANNING PROCESS. THE 8 BLUEPRINT FILLS A UNIQUE AND CRITICAL NICHE IN REGIONAL PLANNING BY 9 PRIORITIZING THE HEALTH AND RESILIENCE OF THE ESTUARY. WE SEE THE HEALTH 10 OF OUR HUMAN COMMUNITIES AS INEXTRICABLY LINKED TO THE HEALTH OF OUR 11 NATURAL ENVIRONMENT AND WE'RE WORKING TO ENSURE THAT OUR ECOLOGICAL 12 SYSTEMS BENEFIT OUR HUMAN SOCIAL PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTURE AS WE FACE THE 13 THREAT OF CLIMATE CHANGE AND SEA LEVEL RISE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THE 14 ESTUARY BLUEPRINT IS A NON-REGULATORY REGIONAL PLANNING DOCUMENT REQUIRED 15 BY THE CLEAN WATER ACT. IT HAS THE TECHNICAL NAME OF THE COMPREHENSIVE 16 CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT PLAN, AND IT WAS FIRST COMPLETED IN 1993, WHEN 17 IT SERVED AS THE FIRST COLLABORATIVE PLAN OF THE ESTUARY DEVELOPED BY 100 18 STAKEHOLDER GROUPS AND MANY HAD NEVER SAT DOWN TOGETHER TO AGREE ON 19 PRIORITIES. THE PLAN WAS UPDATED IN 2,007 IS REVISED IN 2016 WHEN WE CAME 20 UP WITH THE SHORTER NAME OF THE ESTUARY BLUEPRINT. THE CURRENT PLAN IDENTIFIES PRIORITY ACTIONS AGREED UPON BY OVER 80 ORGANIZATIONS AND 21 22 SERVES TO ELEVATE THOSE PRIORITY ACTIONS FOR POTENTIAL FUNDING AND PROJECT DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION. FOR EXAMPLE, THE BLUEPRINT IS ONE OF THE 23 24 REGIONAL PLANS THAT CAN BE REFERENCED WHEN APPLYING FOR SAN FRANCISCO BAY 25 RESTORATION AUTHORITY GRANTS PROJECT PROPOSALS APPLYING TO THE EPA'S WATER

1 OUALITY IMPROVEMENT FUND MUST IMPLEMENT OBJECTIVES AND ACTIONS IN THE 2 BLUEPRINT AND REPRESENTATIVE JACKIE SPEARS PROPOSED THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY 3 RESTORATION BILL IF PASSED WOULD ESTABLISH FUNDING FOR PROJECTS AND 4 STUDIES IN THAT ADVANCE THE GOALS OF THE OBJECTIVES AND BLUEPRINT. AND A 5 SIMILAR BILL HAS BEEN SET ON THE SIDE. NEXT SLIDE. -- -- I'LL GIVE A SNAPSHOT OF OUR CURRENT PLAN OF THE 2016 THROUGH 2021 ESTUARY BLUEPRINT. 6 7 IN OUR MOST RECENT UPDATE IN 2016 WE UNDERTOOK A REVISION OF THE DOCUMENT 8 KNOW OFFING ABOUT WHERE WE WANT TO BE IN 2050 AND WHAT WE CAN DO IN THE 9 NEXT FIVE YEARS TO GET THERE. THAT MIGHT SOUND FAMILIAR TO PLANNED BAY 10 AREA. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THE ESTUARY BLUEPRINT HAS FOUR GOALS, OVERARCHING 11 GOALS AND AREAS BRADLEY REFLECTED HERE IN THE ORANGE CIRCLES. BUT THE REAL 12 WORK TO BE HONEST HAPPENS AT THE ACTION LEVEL WE HAVE 32 ACTIONS THAT 13 BRIDGE ACROSS THOSE FOCUS AREAS AND WITH EACH ACTION IS ONE OR MORE TASKS 14 TO IMPLEMENT THAT ACTION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. HERE WE HAVE AN EXAMPLE 15 ACTION. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. NOW WE 21 ARE IN THE MIDST OF UPDATING OUR 2016 ESTUARY BLUEPRINT FOR THE NEXT FIVE 22 YEARS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. ON THIS ROUND WE ARE TAKING A MORE STREAMLINED 23 APPROACH TO THE UPDATE FOCUSING ON REVIEWING THE CURRENT 32 ACTIONS FOR 24 RELEVANCE AND IMPORTANCE ASSESSING THE COMPLETION OF EXISTING TASKS AND 25 ESTABLISHING TASKS TO ADVANCE OUR GOALS. PROCESS GUIDED BY A STEERING

1 COMMITTEE CONSISTING OF REPRESENTATIVES FROM OUR LARGER IMPLEMENTATION 2 COMMITTEE AND WE ARE VERY GRATEFUL TO MAYOR EKLUND FOR JOINING US ON THAT 3 STEERING COMMITTEE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. FOR THIS UPDATE, WE HAVE DEVELOPED 4 THESE GUIDING PRINCIPLES TO HELP FOCUS OUR EFFORTS THESE ARE SOME GUIDING 5 PRINCIPLES YOU MAY HAVE SEEN IN SOME OTHER REGIONAL PLANNING PROCESSES AND 6 SOME HAVE BEEN CARRIED THROUGH OUR PREVIOUS VERSIONS. I'LL TOUCH ON TWO OF 7 THEM. WITH THIS UPDATE WE'RE ARE FOCUSING ON STAKEHOLDER GROUPS AND 8 BRINGING PARTNERS ON BOARD WITH IMPLEMENTING THE BLUEPRINT AND 9 COMPLEMENTARY ELEVATION BRINGING A HUMAN DIMENSION TO THE UPDATE. I'LL 10 PROVIDE A BRIEF OVERVIEW OF A FEW OF THE WAY IN WHICH WE PRIORITIZING 11 CLIMATE RESILIENCE IN THIS UPDATE IDENTIFYING WAYS TO PROTECT NATURAL 12 RESOURCES SUCH AS ESTUARY HABITATS AND WILDLIFE AS AN INTEGRAL PART OF ANY 13 EFFORT TO INCREASE RESILIENCE OF SHORELINE COMMUNITIES AT RISK FROM 14 FLOODING AND RISING ACCESS. WE'RE EXPLORING A CENTRALIZED HELP-DESK 15 NETWORK TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO CITIES, COUNTIES, AND OTHER 16 STAKEHOLDERS FOR CLIMATE CHANGE PLAN ADAPTATION AND DONE IN A WAY THAT 17 FACILITATES NATURAL RESOURCE PROTECTION. WE'RE PRIORITIZING IMPROVEMENTS 18 OF UPDATING REGULATORY PROCESSES TO FACILITATE INNOVATIVE MULTI-BENEFIT 19 CLIMATE ADAPTING A PROJECTS. MAYOR EKLUND? 15 PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH PRESIDENT ARREGUIN. I JUST WANTED TO PUT 16 17 A SHOUT OUT FOR ALL THE WORK THAT CAITLIN IS HER TEAM ARE DOING. ESPECIALLY 23 24 GIVEN THE FACT THAT THERE IS PCD CONTAMINATION FROM CITIES AND COUNTIES 25 THAT WE'RE DEALING WITH. AND THE ISSUE ABOUT SOME OF THE MEDICINE BEING

1 USED TO TREAT ANIMALS IS NOW APPEARING IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY NOW TOO, AND 2 THAT'S ANOTHER AREA WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO START LOOKING AT TRYING TO 3 MOVEMENT SO IT DOESN'T ADVERSELY IMPACT THE BAY. SO THERE IS A LOT OF 4 EMERGING ISSUES, AND I REALLY WANT TO ENCOURAGE PEOPLE TO PARTICIPATE IN 5 THE STATE OF THE ESTUARY. WE DIDN'T HAVE ONE LAST YEAR, BUT THE YEAR 6 BEFORE, I DID. AND IT'S AMAZING HOW MANY PEOPLE ARE SO FOCUSED ON THIS. 7 AND, SO, ANYWAYS. SO, JUST WANTED TO DO A SHOUT OUT TO KATE LYNN AND HER 8 GROUP FOR DOING A FANTASTIC JOB. HONORED TO BRING SOME OF MY TECHNICAL AND 9 PROGRAMMATIC EXPERIENCE FROM EPA, AND ALSO KNOWLEDGE ABOUT HOW CITIES AND 10 GOVERNMENTS WORK, TO THE ESTUARY. THANK YOU.
