

JAMES P. SPERING, MTC CHAIR: THANK YOU. ITEM FIVE, THE MOBILE 1 2 HUB PILOT RECOMMENDATION. AND KRUTE? 3 KRUTE SINGA: GOOD MORNING COMMISSIONERS. I'M KRUTE SINGA WITH 4 5 MTC/ABAG. I CAME THIS PAST FEBRUARY WITH AN UPDATE ON MOBILITY HUBS AND WITH A CALL FOR PROJECTS AND I'M BACK HERE TODAY WITH 6 THE RECOMMENDED AWARD LIST FOR THE PILOT PROGRAM. IF YOU COULD 7 8 BRING UP THE SLIDES? MOVE TO SLIDE THREE? GREAT. THANK YOU. JUST TO PROVIDE A QUICK REFRESHER ON THE PROGRAM. MOBILITY 9 HUBS IS A CLIMATE STRATEGY THAT IS IDENTIFIED IN PLANNED BAY 10 AREA 2040. IT ALSO IS INCLUDED IN PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, AND 11 IN STRATEGY EN9, WHICH ENCOMPASSES TRANSPORTATION DEMAND 12 MANAGEMENT PROGRAMS AS SHOWN ON THE BADGE ON THE TOP RIGHT OF 13 THE SLIDE. BECAUSE IT'S A CLIMATE STRATEGY THE PRIMARY GOAL OF 14 15 THE PROGRAM IS TO REDUCE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS AND 16 REDEFINING MOBILITY HUBS AS ANCHORS AND ENABLE TRAVELERS OF ALL BACKGROUNDS AND ABILITIES TO ACCESS MULTIPLE STATION 17 OPTIONS INCLUDING SHARED SCOOTERS, BICYCLES CARS AND TRANSIT 18 AS WELL AS COHESIVE SPACE. REFRESHER ON THE FUNDING PROGRAM 19 \$22 MILLION COMMITTED TO ONE BAY AREA GRANT PROGRAM OR OBAG 20 21 TWO INCLUDING 22 MILLION OF IMPLEMENTATION THAT IDENTIFIES STRATEGIES, IN ELECTRIC VEHICLE INCENTIVE INFRASTRUCTURE AS 22 WELL AS TARGETED TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES. ALLOCATION 23 INCLUDES \$10 MILLION TO THE BAY AREA AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT 24

- 11 STRATEGIES TACTICAL APPROACHES AND MANAGEMENT TECHNIQUES FROM
- 12 OUR PARTNERS WE RECEIVED INPUT ON LOCATION ANALYSIS WHICH
- 13 IDENTIFIED 1700 HUB LOCATIONS AROUND THE REGIONS WHICH HAVE
- 14 FREQUENT AND INTERJURISDICTIONAL TRANSIT SERVICE THAT HAVE THE
- 15 POTENTIAL TO REDUCE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS IDENTIFY HIGH
- 16 MOBILE NEED LACK FREQUENT OR HIGH CAPACITY TRANSIT OR OTHER
- 17 MOBILITY SERVICES LOCATED IN EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES.
- 18 INPUT HOW TO PRIORITIZE SUBSET OF 1700 SITES FOR THE PILOT
- 19 PROGRAM WE ENDED UP PRIORITIZING 150 SITES THAT HAVE THE
- 20 GREATEST NUMBER OF TRANSIT CONNECTIONS AND MOBILITY SERVICES
- 21 HAVE WALKING AND BICYCLING CONNECTIVITY, PROXIMITY TO MAJOR
- 22 TRIP GENERATORS LIKE STADIUMS, UNIVERSITIES CAMPUS LOCATIONS
- 23 AND PRIORITY COMMUTING PRIORITIZATION SUPPORTING PILOTS
- 24 IMPLEMENTATION, CONSTRUCTION, RELATIONSHIPS AND OPERATIONS. WE
- 25 RELEASED A CALL FOR PROJECTS IN MAY AND NOTIFIED LOCAL



- 1 JURISDICTIONS AND TRANSIT PARTNERS WHO IS BEEN PROVIDING INPUT
- 2 THROUGHOUT THE PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT AS WELL AS MAKING
- 3 PRESENTATIONS AT SEVERAL MEETINGS. APPLICATIONS ARE DUE IN
- 4 LATE JUNE AND COULD BE COMPLETED THROUGH AN ONLINE FORM WHICH
- 5 IS CREATED SIMPLE TO COMPLETE TO ENCOURAGE APPLYING. NEXT
- 6 SLIDE PLEASE. THE QUESTIONS THAT FORMULATE TO THE CRITERIA
- 7 AND THE CRITERIA REFLECT OBJECTIVES OF THE PILOT AND
- 8 DEFINITION AND GOALS OF THE MOBILITY HUBS PROGRAM I MENTIONED
- 9 EARLIER. SO THE CRITERIA FOR FOCUS ON PROJECTS THAT ARE
- 10 IMPLEMENTATION ORIENTED CONNECT TO THE COMMUNITY HAVE AND WILL
- 11 HAVE PARTNERSHIPS NEEDED WITH LOCAL AGENCIES AND COMMUNITIES
- 12 NEEDED TO MAKE A HUB SUCCESS IN TERMS OF IMPLEMENTATION
- 13 OPERATION COMPRISED OF MTC STAFF AND EXTERNAL EXPERTS USING
- 14 CRITERIA TO EVALUATE APPLICATIONS AND RECOMMEND PROJECT
- 15 AWARDS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. OVERALL WE RECEIVED A GREAT
- 16 SELECTION OF PROJECTS. THE ONES WE'RE ADVANCING PROVIDE A GOOD
- 17 REPRESENTATION OF MOBILITY HUB TYPOLOGIES. THE PROJECTS ALSO
- 18 REPRESENT A VARIETY OF ANCHOR SERVICES INCLUDING BUS, REGIONAL
- 19 RAIL, FOR E-BIKE SHARE AND CAR SHARE. THERE IS GOOD SAMPLE OF
- 20 BOTH QUICK BUILD AND PERMANENT CONSTRUCTION AND THEY FALL INTO
- 21 A VARIETY OF PLANNED BAY AREA GEOGRAPHIES INCLUDING PRIORITY
- 22 DEVELOPMENT AREAS, EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES. NEXT SLIDE.
- 23 SEVERAL PROJECTS WILL PROVIDE GOOD LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES ON A
- 24 RANGE OF ABILITY TYPES NOURISHING SCOOTERS AND BIKES,
- 25 ELECTRIFICATION INFRASTRUCTURE OPTIONS, PEDESTRIAN SAFETY AND



- 1 WAYFINDING IMPROVEMENTS AND HOW TOCATE A COHESIVE SPACE WITH
- 2 PLACE MAKING ELEMENTS. OPPORTUNITIES WITH APPROPRIATE TRANSIT
- 3 AGENCY STAFF TO SEEK INPUT AND UNDERSTAND THEIR SUPPORT FOR
- 4 PROJECTS. AND FOR THOSE THAT ARE NOT AWARDED THIS ROUND WE
- 5 PLAN TO WORK WITH PROJECT SPONSORS TO ASSIST IN THE
- 6 DEVELOPMENT OF AN APPLICATION FOR THE NEXT ROUND OF PROGRAM
- 7 FUNDING THAT IDENTIFY A VISION FOR ENHANCING PLACEMENT GAIN IN
- 8 A MORE COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH TO HUB DEVELOPMENT. NEXT SLIDE,
- 9 PLEASE. SO, THE TOTAL REQUEST IS JUST OVER 2.7 MILLION FOR
- 10 THE SEVEN PROJECTS. THIS WILL REQUIRE PROGRAMMING AN
- 11 ADDITIONAL 1.7 MILLION FROM THE OBAG TWO CLIMATE INITIATIVES
- 12 PROGRAM BALANCE I MENTIONED EARLIER. ALLOCATING ADDITIONAL
- 13 FUND FOR THE SEVEN PROJECTS WOULD BE BENEFICIAL FOR A FEW
- 14 REASONS. ONE IS THAT STAFF AND THE COMMISSION WILL BE ABLE TO
- 15 LEARN FROM THE DIVERSITY OF BOTH HUB PILOT PROJECTS. THE
- 16 LEARNINGS WILL INFORM THE NEXT PHASE OF THE MOBILITY HUB'S
- 17 PROGRAM AND IF ANY FURTHER TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IS NEEDED. AND
- 18 WE'LL BE ABLE TO LEARN HOW TO INCORPORATE PLAY MAKING AND
- 19 REFUNDING IN A VARIETY OF LOCATIONS WHICH ARE KEY COMPONENT IN
- 20 CREATING A SUCCESSFUL WELL FUNCTIONING MOBILITY HUB. WE ARE
- 21 RECOMMENDING 150,000 TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO ALL
- 22 THE PROJECT SPONSORS THROUGH AN ON-CALL CONSULTANT. AND THE
- 23 REASON FOR THIS IS THAT IMPLEMENTING MOBILITY HUBS IS
- 24 COMPLICATED WITH MANY AGENCIES AND COMPONENTS THAT NEED TO
- 25 EFFECTIVELY COME TOGETHER TO MAKE FOR A SUCCESSFUL CUSTOMER

2	COMMUNITY ARRANGER. BECAUSE ORIENTATION AND COHESIVENESS IS AN

IT CONCERNS ME. PAGE THREE ADVOCACY AND LEGISLATION REFORMS 6 SENATOR BILL 375 I LIKE THAT IT'S TO SUPPORT POLICY OUTCOMES 7 8 WITH RESPECT TO REDUCING GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS, BUT I'M UNDER THE IMPRESSION SB 375, AND THE BASICS WE STARTED IN 2008 9 IT'S PRETTY DARN GOOD PROCESS, IT HAD A LOT OF LEAD-UP TO IT. 10 375 IS A THREE PART LEGISLATION YOU GET THE GREENHOUSE GAS OUT 11 OF THE FORMULATION OF GAS, INCREASE MILES PER GALLON, AND THE 12 ONLY THING WE CAN TOUCH WHICH IS VEHICLE MILES TRAVELED, 13 TRANSPORTATION. THIS IS WHAT WE DID WITH ALL THE PDAS AND 14 EVERYTHING FOR. WHAT ARE WE TRYING TO DO THERE IF WE TRY TO DO 15 16 SOMETHING LIKE WE TALKED EARLIER TODAY ABOUT PRIORITIZING THINGS THAT CAME OUT OF BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE, THEN, BY ALL 17 MEANS, I WANT TO BE A BIG SUPPORTER OF THAT. BUT -- WHAT WAS I 18 LOOK -- I CAN'T EVEN READ MY OWN WRITING. IT'S VERY LIMITED IN ITS TERMS OF SCOPE WE SUPPORT 7 8 COORDINATING TRANSPORTATION AND LAND USE AND ACHIEVE GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION GOALS WHAT'S IMPORTANT THAT'S COME UP 9 IN THE PROCESS IS THE IMPORTANT THINGS THAT FELL OUTSIDE THE 10 SCOPE OF 375 THINGS LIKE BUILDING DECARBONIZATION WHICH FOR 11 EXAMPLE, ARE NOT ALLOWED TO BE INCLUDED THAT CAN GET KIND OF 12 CONFUSING FOR OFFICIALS IN THE SCOPE OF WHAT'S INCLUDED IN SB 13 375 AND IN TERMS OF STATUS AND GUIDELINES THAT'S WHY WE WERE 14 15 CAREFUL TO INCLUDE IN THE LANGUAGE IT'S NOT JUST THE STATUTES, 16 IT'S THE GUIDELINES THAT THE STATE AGENCIES PUT OUT THERE IS WAYS TO MAKE THE PROCESS MORE EFFICIENT AND EFFECTIVE. HOW 17 MUCH TECHNICAL MODELING ARE WE DOING IN THIS PROCESS? HOW MUCH 18 ARE WE FOCUSING ON THE TECHNICAL STUFF, VIS-A-VIS FOCUSING ON 19 STRATEGIES AND GETTING THINGS IMPLEMENTED OUT THERE. THAT'S 20 THE SPIRIT OF THINGS WE'RE TALKING ABOUT. 21 22 23 DAVID E. HUDSON: THAT AND FIRE SUPPRESSION. THAT'S IT FOR ME.

15	WANT TO HEAR THAT WE'RE TARGETING AND DOING DIRECT OUTREACH TO
