YOU HAVE IT BEFORE YOU, I'M NOT 17 GOING TO READ IT, EACH WHEREAS STATEMENT, IT'S A PRETTY 18 COMPREHENSIVE TELLING OF THE CLIMATE ISSUES THAT WE'RE FACING, 19 BOTH GLOBALLY, AND IT BRING IT DOWN -- MULTIPLE HAZARDS WE'RE 20 21 FACING HERE IN THE BAY AREA AND HOW WE'RE WORKING TOGETHER TO

BOTH TRY TO MITIGATE THE CLIMATE CHANGE, BUT ALSO RECOGNIZING

THAT WE'RE ALREADY EXPERIENCING MANY OF THE IMPACTS OF CLIMATE

CHANGE. AND IT'S REALLY AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO WORK TOGETHER

IN A MEANINGFUL WAY. REALLY HEIGHTEN OUR COORDINATION AND

- 2 OF URGENCY TO ADDRESS THIS ISSUE. EACH OF OUR AGENCIES BRING A
- 3 LOT OF TREMENDOUS EXPERTISE, AUTHORITY, AND ABILITIES, AND I
- 4 THINK, ON MANY OF -- A LOT OF THIS WORK, I THINK WE RECOGNIZE
- 5 THAT IN MOST INSTANCES, ONE AGENCY CAN'T TACKLE THIS ON THEIR
- 6 OWN. SO, YOU KNOW, WHAT THIS DOES IS REALLY COMMIT ALL OF US
- 7 TO WORK TOGETHER TO FIND THOSE PROJECTS AND WAYS IN WHICH IT'S
- 8 CLEAR WE NEED TO BE WORKING TOGETHER TO DEVELOP SOME
- 9 MEASURABLE GOALS IN THE NEXT NEAR-TERM, MORE 1 TO 5 YEARS,
- 10 WHAT ARE THOSE THINGS THAT WE CAN DO TOGETHER TO MEASURABLY
- 11 IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE FOR PEOPLE, ADDRESS THE CRISIS AS
- 12 BEST WE CAN. I DID WANT TO NOTE ON THE PRINCIPLES, THIS IS A
- 13 COMMITMENT, BUT OF COURSE, THE PRINCIPLES THAT THE GOVERNING
- 14 BOARD APPROVED IN 2015, YOU KNOW, JUST A REMINDER, THAT EACH
- 15 BARC MEMBER AGENCY RETAINS ITS AUTHORITY, AND IS VOLUNTARILY
- 16 MAKING, YOU KNOW, ENTERING INTO THIS AGREEMENT. YOU KNOW? SO,
- 17 BUT, I THINK FOR ALL OF US TO SIGN OFF AND REALLY MAKE AN
- 18 EFFORT TO DO THIS WORK TOGETHER, CAN HAVE A MEANINGFUL IMPACT
- 19 FOR OUR REGION. SO THAT'S REALLY THE BACKGROUND ON IT, AND
- 20 REALLY, THE WORK IS GOING TO BE FOLLOWING THIS RESOLUTION IN
- 21 DEVELOPING THIS WORK PLAN TOGETHER AND ASSIGNING STAFF TO TAKE
- 22 ON DIFFERENT ROLES AND FUNCTIONS. AND ALSO THAT EACH AGENCY IS
- 23 -- THERE IS GOING TO BE A LEAD AGENCY ON MANY OF THESE
- 24 PROJECTS, BUT THE RECOGNITION THAT IT REQUIRES PARTNERSHIP. IT
- 25 JUST REQUIRES PARTNERSHIP ACROSS THE AGENCIES TO REALLY

- 2 ANY QUESTIONS. AND JUST, WHAT YOU WILL HEAR FOLLOWING THIS
- 3 ITEM, YOU WILL ALSO HEAR FROM BCDC WHO BROUGHT FORWARD THE
- 4 RESOLUTION ASKING BARC TO ENDORSE THE BAY ADAPT JOINT
- 5 PLATFORM, AND WE REALLY SEE THAT THIS RESOLUTION, WHICH IS A
- 6 MULTIHAZARD, HOW WE'RE GOING TO WORK TOGETHER TO ADDRESS THE
- 7 MULTI-HAZARDS WE'RE FACING TOGETHER AS A REGION, BUT THIS JOIN
- 8 MECHANISM CAN HELP TO MEET THE GOALS IN THE BAY ADAPT PLATFORM
- 9 AND HELP, YOU KNOW, AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO MEET THE
- 10 IMPORTANT GOALS OUTLINED IN ADDRESSING SEA LEVEL RISE THAT
- 11 BCDC HAS BEEN WORKING ON. I'LL LEAVE IT AT THAT, CHAIR.

- 14 HARD WORK BRINGING THIS TOGETHER. FIRST OF ALL, I WOULD LIKE

- 20 FOR THIS RESOLUTION. I THINK THE BACKGROUND FRAMING THE ISSUE
- 21 AND THE COMMITMENT TO ALL OF OUR MEMBER AGENCIES WORKING
- 22 TOGETHER ON A JOINT STRATEGY AND PLAN FOR HOW WE'RE GOING TO
- 23 ADDRESS CLIMATE ADAPTATION SEA LEVEL RISE IS LONG OVERDUE. WE
- 24 HAVE HAD SEVERAL CONVERSATIONS HERE OVER, I WOULD SAY, THE
- 25 PAST COUPLE OF YEARS AROUND THE BETTER NEED FOR REGIONAL



- 1 COORDINATION, SEA LEVEL RISE AND MORE BROADLY CLIMATE
- 2 ADAPTATION NOT JUST RESPONSE TO SEA LEVEL RISE BUT FIRE
- 3 THREATS AND OTHER HAZARDS THAT ARE INCREASINGLY BECOMING
- 4 COMMONPLACE DUE TO WORSENING CLIMATE CHANGE. I WANT TO THANK
- 5 STAFF AND THE LEADERSHIP OF ALL THE AGENCIES COMING TOGETHER.
- 6 THIS IS AN IMPORTANT POINT FOR ON YOU REGION TO BEGIN TO
- 7 EMBARK ON THIS PROCESS AND LOOKING FORWARD TO ALL OF TO YOU
- 8 HELP IN THE OUTCOME OF THE PROCESS.

- 10 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: JESSE THANK YOU FOR YOUR COMMENTS. ANY
- 11 QUESTIONS NOW? I KNOW SOME OF YOU HAVE BEEN WORKING ON THIS,
- 12 THE VERY BEGINNING OF THIS COMMITTEE, WHICH USED TO BE THE
- 13 JOINT POLICY COMMITTEE, AND KNOW THAT WAS KIND OF THE INTENT,
- 14 I THINK, ORIGINALLY WHEN TORLAKSON AND DESAULNIER LOOK TO
- 15 BRING OUR REGIONAL AGENCIES TOGETHER. DIRECTOR GIOIA?

- 17 JOHN GIOIA: WE'RE UNIQUE IN THE BAY AREA THAT WE HAVE THIS
- 18 STRUCTURE TO BRING TOGETHER THE WORK OF THE REGIONAL AGENCIES
- 19 AND WE ALL KNOW THAT CLIMATE CHANGE HAS IMPACTS ACROSS SO MANY
- 20 AREAS, AND AMY AS YOU HAVE SAID EACH OF THE AGENCIES AT
- 21 VARIOUS POINTS ARE GOING TO SERVE AS THE LEAD ON PARTICULAR
- 22 ISSUES. BCDC HAS BEEN TAKING A LEAD, FOR EXAMPLE, ON
- 23 RESILIENCY ALONG THE BAY. SO I THINK IT WILL BE GREAT TO HAVE
- 24 THIS, AND IT'S NICE TO FORMALIZE IT. BUT ULTIMATELY THE WORK
- 25 IS GOING TO GET DONE IN EACH OF THE AGENCIES AND HAVING THIS



- 1 VEHICLE AT BARC TO BE ABLE TO, SORT OF, COORDINATE THAT WORK.
- 2 SO JUST SUPPORTIVE OF THAT.

- 21 SEASON IT'S EASY TO PUSH SEA LEVEL RISE TO THE BACK OF OUR
- 22 MINDS BUT THE BAY AREA STANDS TO BE THE -- COASTAL AREA IN
- 23 NORTH AMERICA THE BAY AREA SHORELINE ACCOUNTS FOR JUST 1/3 OF
- 24 THE ENTIRE LENGTH OF CALIFORNIA'S COASTLINE BUT THE BAY AREA
- 25 IS PROJECTED TO EXPERIENCE TWO-THIRDS OF THE ECONOMIC IMPACTS



- 1 DUE TO SEA LEVEL RISE. BCDC HAS EXTENSIVELY STUDIED
- 2 VULNERABILITIES AND WE KNOW WHAT IS AT RISK WHEN IT COMES TO
- 3 OUR VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES HOMES AND JOBS AND OUR COMMUTE
- 4 NATURAL HAD BEEN AT THIS TIMES AND BILLIONS OF DOLLARS OF
- 5 ASSETS WILL BE INUNDATED WITHOUT ACTION TO THREAT. OUR
- 6 COMMUNITIES CITIES AND COUNTIES HAVE DIFFERENT HISTORIES
- 7 DIFFERENT CHALLENGES AND DIFFERENT OPPORTUNITIES THERE IS NOT
- 8 A ONE SIZE FITS ALL APPROACH DEALING WITH THESE CHALLENGES.
- 9 STUDIES SHOW THAT RISKS FROM SEA LEVEL RISE ON UNEQUALLY
- 10 DISTRIBUTED ACROSS THE BAY AREA DISPROPORTIONATELY IMPACTING
- 11 LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES OF COLOR WHO ALSO HAVE LONG BEEN
- 12 VICTIMS OF OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES. WE CONTINUE TO LEARN
- 13 HOW NATURE PROTECTS PEOPLE FROM NATURAL DISASTERS AND IMPROVES
- 14 PUBLIC HEALTH BUT AS WATER LEVELS RISE COASTAL HABITAT RISK
- 15 BEING DROWNED AND LOST BOTH NATURE AND PEOPLE WILL SUFFER. AS
- 16 YOU KNOW BAY AREA IS COMPRISED OF ENTITIES CLUSTERED AROUND A
- 17 SINGLE BAY NO ONE ENTITY IS IN CHARGE OF ADAPTING TO SEA LEVEL
- 18 RISE. THE GOOD NEWS IS THERE IS LOTS OF EXAMPLES HAPPENING
- 19 AROUND THE REGION RESTORING NATURAL WETLAND AND BUFFERING
- 20 AGAINST STORMS AND PROTECTION IN THE FORM OF SEA WALLS, WE MAY
- 21 NEED TO REMOVE THINGS THAT ARE ALREADY BUILT. ADAPTATION WILL
- 22 BE SPURNED AS WE LEARN TO COEXIST WITH WATER IN THE FUTURE.
- 23 HERE IS THE APPROACH PROTECTING OUR ENTIRE BAY AREA SHORELINE,
- 24 ADDRESS MISSED OPPORTUNITIES TO OFFICIALLY SOLVE PROBLEMS AND
- 25 PREVENT THE BAY AREA FROM GETTING OUR FAIR SHARE OF RESOURCES



- 1 BECAUSE WE WENT BE SPEAKING LOUDLY WITH ONE VOICE LOCAL
- 2 ACTIONS ARE NOT ENOUGH PREVENTING HARM DUE TO SEA LEVEL RISE
- 3 IS A REGIONAL PROBLEM. BCDC APPROACHED A GROUP OF 30 BAY AREA
- 4 LEADERS WITH A HYPOTHESIS, CAN WE COME TOGETHER AS LEADERS
- 5 ACROSS A VARIETY OF SECTORS PRIVATE PUBLIC COMMUNITY NON-
- 6 PROFIT WITH A CONSENSUS DRIVEN STRATEGY THAT LAYS OUT ACTIONS
- 7 NECESSARY TO ADOPT THE BAY AREA TO RISE IN SEA LEVEL
- 8 PROTECTION. ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE CAUCUS TWO PUBLIC FORUMS AND
- 9 MANY EXPERT WORKING GROUPS TEN COMMUNITIES LOCAL GOVERNMENT
- 10 FOCUS GROUPS AND 50 PRESENTATIONS AROUND THE REGION WE ASKED
- 11 PEOPLE TO ROLL UP THEIR SLEEVES. WE WEREN'T QUITE SURE WHAT
- 12 THE SOLUTIONS MIGHT BE, WE HEARD FROM ENVIRONMENTALISTS
- 13 CONCERNED THAT THE REGION'S NATURAL AREAS ARE IN NEED OF
- 14 PROTECTION IF NOT MORE THAN OTHER ASSETS LIKE ROADS AND
- 15 BUILDINGS. ENGINEERS AND SCIENTISTS WARN THAT WE NEED TO GET

- 24 ADAPT JOINT PLATFORM WHICH IS INCLUDED IN YOUR MAIN PACKET FOR
- 25 TODAY DESCRIBES A SET OF NINE ACTIONS IN 21 TASKS TO ADAPT



- 1 FASTER BETTER AND MORE EQUITABLY TO A RISING BAY. WE GOT THE
- 2 GREEN LIGHT FROM THE BAY ADAPT ADVISORY GROUP IN JUNE TO MOVE
- 3 THE PLATFORM FORWARD. AND THAT LIST OF LEADERSHIP GROUP
- 4 MEMBERS IS REALLY IMPRESSIVE, MANY MEMBERS OF YOU ON THE
- 5 MEETING TODAY ARE PART OF THAT GROUP. THE PLATFORM DOES NOT
- 6 ITSELF SPECIFY SPECIFIC PROJECTS FOR THE SHORELINE BUT AIMS TO
- 7 LEVERAGE THE POWER OF COLLECTIVE ACTION AND WILL ULTIMATELY DO
- 8 A BUNCH OF THINGS FOR BAY AREA COMMUNITIES IF SUCCESSFULLY
- 9 IMPLEMENTED. THIS INCLUDES REDUCING FLOOD RISK, PROTECTING
- 10 NATURAL AREAS AND WILDLIFE RECOGNIZING AND PROVIDING EQUITABLE
- 11 SUPPORT FOR LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES OF COLOR IN THEIR
- 12 ADAPTATION JOURNEYS. INTEGRATING ADAPTATION INTO COMMUNITY
- 13 FOCUSED LOCAL PLANS. ACCELERATING, PERMITTING AND PROJECT
- 14 CONSTRUCTION PARTICULARLY FOR NATURE BASED AND MULTI-BENEFIT
- 15 PROJECTS. PROVIDING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS
- 16 AND GETTING MORE FUNDING FOR THE BAY AREA FOR ADAPTATION. A
- 17 FEW WEEKS AGO WE KICKED OFF A PUBLIC FEEDBACK PERIOD ON THE
- 18 JOINT PLATFORM AT AN EVENT COHOSTED WITH SPUR. OVER 160 PEOPLE
- 19 ATTENDED THE EVENT WHICH INCLUDED A PANEL DISCUSSION WITH
- 20 SEVERAL DISTINGUISHED SPEAKERS INCLUDING SUPERVISOR GIOIA. THE
- 21 FEEDBACK PERIOD ENDS SEPTEMBER 25TH AND COMMENTS CAN BE
- 22 PROVIDED AT WWW.BAYADAPT.ORG. THE TASK OF DEVELOPING REGIONAL
- 23 RESILIENCE IS FAR BIGGER THAN ANYONE CAN DO ON THEIR OWN. THE
- 24 PLATFORM WAS CREATED COLLABORATIVELY AND WILL BE IMPLEMENTED
- 25 COLLABORATIVELY. IT WILL REQUIRE LEADERS TO STEP INTO BIGGER



- 1 ROLES AND WORK WITH A WIDE WEB OF THINKERS, BUILDERS, DREAMERS
- 2 RATHER THAN DO IT ALONE IT CALLS FOR DIFFERENT ORGANIZATIONAL
- 3 EFFORTS WITH AGENCIES AND ORGANIZATIONS AROUND THE BAY AREA. I
- 4 ESPECIALLY LIKE TO THANK THE LEADERSHIP AND STAFF AT MTC,
- 5 ABAG, THE WATER BOARD COASTAL CONSERVANCY CALTRANS AND BARC
- 6 PARTNERING IN THE DEVELOPING PLATFORM. WE HAVE SEEN
- 7 COORDINATION PLAY OUT IN THE COORDINATION OF PLANNED BAY AREA
- 8 AND THE JOINT WORK BROUGHT STRENGTHENED CONNECTIONS. STARTING
- 9 TO THINK ABOUT QUESTIONS AND FIGURING OUT HOW IT'S FINALIZED.
- 10 THE BOARD SENDS A STRONG MESSAGE TO THE REGION THAT THE

- 13 TO ENDORSE THE DRAFT JOINT PLATFORM AND THROUGH THE BARC
- 14 GOVERNING BOARD'S ENDORSEMENT OF THE JOINT RESOLUTION TO
- 15 ADDRESS CLIMATE CHANGE THAT SUPPORTS THE DEVELOPMENT OF A

- 22 THE WORK THAT HAS BEEN DONE TO BRING US TO THIS POINT IN TERMS
- 23 OF COMMUNITY OUTREACH. FIRST I WOULD LIKE TO TURN TO DIRECTOR

- 1 GETTING ON THE CALL, ZACK. I'M GLAD THE TECHNOLOGY WORKED
- 2 BECAUSE WE'RE GOING TO WAIT FOR YOU, WHATEVER IT TOOK.

- 4 ZACK WASSERMAN: I APPRECIATE YOUR PATIENCE. I APOLOGIZE FOR MY
- 5 TECHNICAL DIFFICULTIES AND I AM VERY GLAD THAT I'M HERE. JUST
- 6 A FEW REMARKS TO FOLLOW UP ON JESSICA'S PRESENTATION, WHICH I
- 7 THINK LAID OUT VERY WELL, AND PRETTY MUCH AS CONCISELY AS
- 8 POSSIBLE WHAT THIS IS AND WHAT WE ARE ABOUT. WHEN I STARTED,
- 9 AS BCDC CHAIR, NINE YEARS AGO, IT WOULD HAVE BEEN ALMOST

- 4 ADAPT AT OUR SECOND MEETING IN OCTOBER. PREVIOUSLY, MAYOR
- 5 ARREGUIN HAS SUGGESTED THAT THE ABAG EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ADOPT
- 6 AND ENDORSE BAY ADAPT, AND I HOPE THAT WILL HAPPEN. ABAG IS
- 7 PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT IN THIS GROUP, BECAUSE SO MANY OF THE
- 8 AGENCIES THAT WILL NEED TO ACT ARE REPRESENTED THERE. I ASK

- 11 A TREASURE, AND IT'S WONDERFUL THAT WE HAVE COME SO FAR AND
- 12 BEEN ABLE TO APPROVE THIS RESOLUTION AND ADOPT AND ENDORSE
- 13 THIS BCDC PLAN, WHICH IS SO COMPREHENSIVE, AND SO, YOU KNOW,
- 14 REALLY, A REFLECTION, TOO, OF THE PRIORITY THE VOTERS HAVE PUT
- 15 IN, OVERWHELMINGLY APPROVING MEASURE AA SEVERAL YEARS AGO ALSO

- 23 REFERRED TO THE THREE FOUNDING WOMEN. THAT WAS PRETTY AMAZING
- 24 WORK. BRAD WAGENKNECHT AND I, I THINK WE ARE CURRENTLY THE
- 25 LONGEST SERVING MEMBERS OF BCDC. WE HAVE BOTH BEEN ON SINCE



- 1 JANUARY OF 1999, AND WE HAVE SEEN AN AMAZING SHIFT IN WORK.
- 2 BCDC HAS CONTINUE TO DO ITS INITIAL WORK OF PREVENTING THE BAY
- 3 FROM BEING FILLED BUT ALSO TAKEN ON THIS MASSIVE ROLE OF
- 4 ADDRESSING SEA LEVEL RISE. I THINK THERE IS SOME IRONY, FROM
- 5 PREVENTING THE BAY FROM BECOMING SMALLER TO NOW ADDRESSING THE
- 6 ISSUE OF PREVENTING, MAYBE THE BAY FROM BECOMING BIGGER IN
- 7 TERMS OF SEA LEVEL RISE. SO MAYBE THERE IS SOME IRONY IN

- 1 JESSICA AND ZACK'S LIVES FOR SO LONG. ONE IMPORTANT POINT,
- 2 MAYOR SAM LICCARDO SIX WEEKS AGO MENTIONED DURING I BELIEVE AN
- 3 ABAG MEETING, THE NEED TO STUDY WHETHER IT IS TIME TO PUT A
- 4 BARRIER UNDER THE GOLDEN GATE DUE TO RISING SEA LEVEL AND COST
- 5 ASSOCIATED WITH ADAPTATION. WE ARE WORKING WITH MAYOR LICCARDO
- 6 TO MAKE SURE THAT HE UNDERSTANDS WHAT THAT CONSISTS OF. AND
- 7 YOU SHOULD KNOW THAT THE BAY AREA COUNCIL SEEMS TO HAVE TAKEN
- 8 UP THIS ISSUE AND IS WORKING TO ARRANGE SOME TYPE OF STUDY,
- 9 PRESTUDY, SCOPING ISSUE ON IT. THAT THEY ARE WORKING WITH A
- 10 NUMBER OF PEOPLE TO DEVELOP. BCDC IS HAPPY TO ASSIST IN
- 11 DEVELOPING SUCH A STUDY, SO LONG AS IT TRULY IS A HOLISTIC

AND WE'LL NOW MOVE ON TO ITEM 6B, WHICH IS THE BAY AREA AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT. 4 5 VERONICA EADY: YES, GOOD MORNING EVERYONE. I'M VERONICA EADY, 6 STANDING IN FOR JACK BROADBENT THIS MORNING. I HAVE A COUPLE 7 8 OF ITEMS TO COVER: ONE, AN UPDATE ON THE EQUITY WORKSHOP THAT OUR CHAIR CHAVEZ ASKED FOR THE BOARD. I'M LOOKING AT A MULTI-9 SESSION RIGHT NOW, THREE SESSIONS, EQUITY WORKSHOP FOR OUR 10 BOARD, WE'RE GOING TO KICK IT OFF IN OCTOBER AND THEN HAVE 11 FOLLOW UP SESSIONS IN NOVEMBER, DECEMBER. THE THREE COMPONENTS 12 THAT WE'RE GOING TO COVER IN THIS TRAINING IS STRUCTURAL 13 RACISM WHICH WILL BE IN OCTOBER, THEN IN NOVEMBER WE'RE GOING 14 TO TALK ABOUT POWER SHARING WITH THE COMMUNITY AND DEVELOPING 15 COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS. AND THEN THE THIRD ONE, IN DECEMBER, 16 WILL BE COLLABORATIVE PROBLEM SOLVING AND LAYING OUT TOOLS FOR 17 MANAGING CONFLICT. WE HAVE NEVER DONE THIS BEFORE. - 21 HAVE A LOT OF ALIGNMENT ISSUES, YOU BUT WE HAD AN
- 22 ADMINISTRATIVE MEETING BACK IN FEBRUARY WHICH GAVE OPPORTUNITY
- 23 TO IDENTIFY CONCERNS AND ADDRESS THEM FOR THE CURRENT DRAFT WE
- 24 ARE GOING TO HAVE TWO DAYS OF TESTIMONY HEARING OCTOBER 12TH
- 25 AND 13TH. THE PROVISIONS, IT BASICALLY CONTINUES A NUMBER OF



- 1 PROVISIONS FROM THE PRIOR PERMIT, BUT IT DOES HAVE SOME
- 2 UPDATED REVISED REQUIREMENTS FOR TRASH CONTROLS. INCLUDING
- 3 EXTENSION OF THE DEADLINE TO ACHIEVE FULL COMPLIANCE. THERE IS

- 14 THEY HAVE DONE VERY WELL. PART OF THEIR PROGRESS HAS BEEN IN
- 15 WORK MUNICIPALS ON PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENTS TO BUILD TRASH
- 16 CAPTURE DEVICES THAT COVER BOTH CALTRANS AND LOCAL RIGHT OF
- 17 WAY IT'S REALLY BEEN A HUGE EFFORT AND COORDINATION AND
- 18 COLLABORATION. IN THE LAST SIX MONTHS, THIS IS IMPRESSIVE, 18
- 19 AGREEMENTS IN PLACE TO COVER \$50 MILLION AND PROJECTS THIS
- 20 REALLY REDUCERS AND LOWERS THE COST BURDEN TO LOCALS FOR
- 21 MEETING TRASH TARGETS AROUND STORMWATER PERMIT. I WANT TO
- 22 THANK CALTRANS FOR STAYING ON TOP OF THAT AND DOING THE EXTRA
- 23 WORK FOR THE LOCALS TO PUT THOSE AGREEMENT IN PLACE. SHIFTING
- 24 STORMWATER INTO THE CLIMATE SPACE, I THINK I MENTIONED BEFORE
- 25 THAT WE ARE ASKING ALL OF THE WASTEWATER FACILITIES IN THE BAY



- 1 MARGIN AS WELL AS REFINERIES AND A NUMBER OF LANDFILLS TO DO
- 2 SHORELINE VULNERABILITY ANALYSIS REPORT TO US ON THEIR EFFORTS
- 3 TO PLAN FOR SEA LEVEL RISE AT THEIR FACILITIES AND ALSO TELL
- 4 US HOW THEY'RE WORKING WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENT. SO, WE HAD A FEW
- 5 POTWS THAT DID NOT PROVIDE TIMELY INFORMATION SO WE FOLLOWED

- 8 AREA. AND, FIRST, I JUST WANTED TO MENTION, THE SOUTH SAN
- 9 FRANCISCO BAYSHORE LINE PROJECT. AT THIS POINT, I SOUND LIKE A
- 10 BROKEN RECORD WITH THIS UPDATE, BUT THE CORE OF ENGINEERS
- 11 AWARDED A \$129 MILLION CONTRACT TO BUILD THE LEVEE, WHICH IS
- 12 GOING TO PROVIDE COASTAL FLOOD PROTECTION, SEA LEVEL RISE
- 13 PROTECTION FOR THE COMMUNITY EL VISO IN SAN JOSE AND ALLOWED
- 14 US TO MOVE FORWARD WITH 3,000 ACRES OF WETLANDS RESTORATION.
- 15 20-YEAR-EFFORTS, FINALLY, WE'RE GOING TO MOVE TO THE
- 16 GROUNDBREAKING. WE'RE WAITING FOR THE CONTRACTOR TO TELL US
- 17 EXACTLY WHEN THEY'RE GOING TO MOBILIZE SO THAT WE CAN PLAN A
- 18 GROUNDBREAKING EVENT. AND WITH THE STATE COASTAL CONSERVANCY
- 19 IN TERMS OF THE BUDGET, SB155 WAS ONE OF SEVERAL BUDGET
- 20 TRAILER BILLS AND IT PROVIDES 350 MILLION IN FY '22/'23, AND
- 21 150 MILLION FOR FY2023, 2024 FOR THE STATE COASTAL CONSERVANCY
- 22 FOR COASTAL RESILIENCE. THAT'S HAPPENING UP-AND-DOWN THE BAY.
- 23 AND STARTING JULY FIRST 202, WE ARE GOING TO UNDERTAKE A
- 24 REALLY FOCUSED PLANNING EFFORT ENGAGEMENT EFFORT, SO THAT WHEN
- 25 WE PUT THIS 500 MILLION TO WORK, WE'RE ACTUALLY MOVING THE



- 1 NEEDLE ON COASTAL RESILIENCE. AND PUTTING PROJECTS INTO PLACE
- 2 THAT ARE, YOU KNOW, VISIBLE, AND THAT THE PUBLIC CAN SEE THE
- 3 BENEFITS IN THEIR COMMUNITIES. AND THEN THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY
- 4 RESTORATION AUTHORITY ON A COUPLE OF THE BOARD MEMBERS ARE

- 6 ARE OTHERS ON BARC. THEY HAVE THEIR NEXT BOARD MEETING OCTOBER
- 7 15TH. PRIOR TO THAT, ON OCTOBER 7TH, THE ANNUAL GRANT ROUND
- 8 APPLICATIONS ARE DUE. SO, IT'S, YOU KNOW, GETTING VERY CLOSE
- 9 NOW, BUT IF YOU ARE AWARE OF PROJECTS OUT THERE, THAT SHOULD

- 13 ARE TAG TEAMING THIS MORNING, AND I AM GOING TO PRESENT TO YOU
- 14 ON THE CLIMATE RESILIENCE ADAPTATION FUNDING THAT HAS BEEN
- 15 INCLUDED IN THE STATE BUDGET, AND JUST A LITTLE BIT MORE
- 16 DETAIL ON WHAT THERESE ALREADY COVERED RELATED TO SOME OF THE

- 18 OVERALL, I JUST WOULD REALLY EMPHASIZE, THIS WAS A VERY

- 5 THERE IS 45 MILLION AROUND THE OFFICE OF PLANNING AND RESEARCH
- 6 AND THE COUNCIL FOR A NUMBER OF NEW PLANNING IMPLEMENTATION
- 7 PROGRAMS THAT ARE GOING TO BE RELEVANT TO OUR REGION AND I'M
- 8 GOING TO GO INTO DETAIL ON THE NEXT SLIDE OF THE 50 MILLION
- 9 FOR EXISTING URBAN GREENING PROGRAMS. 150 MILLION FOR THE
- 10 TRANSFORMATIVE COMMUNITIES CLIMATE PROGRAM AND BACK TO MY
- 11 EARLIER COMMENT, I PERSONALLY WOULDN'T PUT THIS UNDER THE
- 12 CLIMB ADAPTATION AND RESILIENCE SPENDING CATEGORY BECAUSE IT'S
- 13 A PROGRAM THAT REALLY HAS BROADER GOALS FOCUSED ON GHG
- 14 REDUCTION AND OTHER GOALS BUT IT IS BEING FRAMED AS
- 15 ADAPTATION. LEGISLATURE IS TALKING ABOUT IT SO I WANTED TO
- 16 INCLUDE IT HERE. IT'S A GREAT PROGRAM FOR OUR REGION BECAUSE
- 17 IT'S VERY FOCUSED ON CALENVIROSCREEN AND SCHOOLS HOPEFULLY
- 18 WE'LL BE ELIGIBLE FOR SOME OF THE 5 MILLION, AND SPECIFICALLY
- 19 CALLED OUT FOR SAN FRANCISCO BAY CONSERVANCY UNDER THIS
- 20 CATEGORY, 5 MILLION FOR VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES, MAPPING, THERE
- 21 IS ALSO QUITE A BIT OF MONEY TO THE STATE FOR THE CLIMATE
- 22 CHANGE. DEEPER DIVE INTO THIS NEW PROGRAM, 25 MILLION UNDER
- 23 OPR FOR A REGIONAL CLIMATE RESILIENCE PLANNING AND
- 24 IMPLEMENTATION PROGRAM AND OF THAT, HALF OF IT, AT LEAST HALF
- 25 OF IT IS DIRECTED TO GO TOWARDS REGIONAL CLIMATE ADAPTATION



- 1 PLANNING AND ACTION PLANS. EARLIER IN THE MEETING, CHAIR
- 2 WORTH MENTIONED ASSEMBLYMEMBER MULLIN HAD A BILL, A.B. 897
- 3 THAT BILL UNFORTUNATELY WAS HELD IN COMMITTEE SO IT'S NOT ON
- 4 THE GOVERNOR'S DESK BUT THE IDEAS YOU MIGHT REMEMBER THE
- 5 TERMINOLOGY OF CLIMATE ADAPTING A ACTION PLAN HAS MADE ITS WAY
- 6 INTO THE BUDGET TRAILER BILLS THESE ALSO HAVE PRETTY TIMELY
- 7 EXPENDITURE DEADLINES SO THE THINK THE BAY AREA IS WELL
- 8 POSITIONED FOR THIS AND HOPEFULLY THAT IS SOMETHING THAT BARC,
- 9 THROUGH ALL OF YOU, WE CAN POSITION OURSELVES APPLY FOR
- 10 FUNDING FOR ALL OF THE IMPORTANT PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION
- 11 WORK THAT WE HAVE. THEN THERE IS 10 MILLION FOR CLIMATE
- 12 ADAPTATION AND RESILIENCE PLANNING GRANTS THAT SEEM MORE
- 13 TARGETED TOWARD THE LOCAL LEVEL. THEN THIS OTHER PROGRAM WHICH
- 14 IS SUPPORTING THE REGIONAL CLIMATE COLLABORATIVE PROGRAM,
- 15 WHICH HAS BEEN CREATED STATUTE SEVERAL YEARS AGO BUT NEVER
- 16 RECEIVED FUNDING THAT'S TARGETED TOWARDS COMMUNITY-BASED
- 17 ORGANIZATIONS TO THE NEIGHBORHOOD LEVEL IDENTIFYING THEIR
- 18 NEEDS AND PROVIDING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR COMMUNITIES TO
- 19 POSITION THEMSELVES TO APPLY FOR GRANTS. SO THAT'S THE FIRST
- 20 SEED FUNDING FOR THAT, AND THAT'S ALSO OVERSEEN BY OPR. NEXT
- 21 SLIDE. SO, AS I MENTIONED, THIS WAS A REALLY SIGNIFICANT YEAR
- 22 IN MAKING SOME BIG DOLLAR CONDOMINIUMS, BUT IT IS IMPORTANT TO
- 23 NOTE THAT WHILE THESE ARE INCLUDED IN A TRAILER BILL THAT I
- 24 DON'T BELIEVE THE GOVERNOR SIGNED YET BUT THERE IS NO QUESTION
- 25 THAT HE WILL SIGN IT, THIS IS ALL SUBJECT TO FUTURE



- 1 APPROPRIATION. SO IT'S A REALLY BIG DEAL FROM AN ADVOCACY
- 2 STANDPOINT, IT'S FANTASTIC, YOU HAVE A SPECIFIC AMOUNT FOR
- 3 FUNDING AMOUNTS FOR FISCAL YEAR '22, '23 IN THE FOLLOWING YEAR
- 4 BUT IT'S NOT REAL MONEY YET UNTIL THE LEGISLATURE VOTES. 708
- 5 MILLION FOR MULTI-BENEFIT NATURE BASED SOLUTIONS SIGNIFICANT
- 6 AMOUNT FOR COASTAL PROTECTION ADAPTATION AND THE REGIONAL
- 7 CLIMATE RESILIENCE PIECE THE LEGISLATURE RECOGNIZED THERE IS A
- 8 LOT OF ADVOCACY FOR THAT BUT WE DON'T HAVE NECESSARILY A LOT
- 9 OF PROJECTS THAT ARE READY TO GO. SO THEY, SORT OF, HAVE

- 1 IT'S A GREAT MARKER AND MADE IT INTO THE FIRST BILL AND
- 2 HOPEFULLY IT WILL BE INCLUDED IN NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AS PART OF
- 3 THE HIGH SPEED RAIL CONVERSATION. NEXT SLIDE. THEN, FINALLY,
- 4 JUST TO EXPAND ON WHAT THERESE MENTIONED EARLIER, THE FEDERAL
- 5 INFRASTRUCTURE BILL DOES HAVE A LOT OF FUNDING FOR RESILIENCE.
- 6 IT'S IN MANY DIFFERENT PROGRAMS. IT'S HARD TO KIND OF
- 7 HIGHLIGHT, EXACTLY, ALL OF THE DIFFERENT ONES, BUT THE TOP
- 8 LINE NUMBER IS AROUND \$46 BILLION. SOME OF THIS FUNDING
- 9 EXISTING PROGRAMS LIKE FEMA'S BRICK PROGRAM BUILDING RESILIENT
- 10 INFRASTRUCTURES AND COMMUNITIES PROGRAM. DOWN THE LINE,
- 11 WHETHER IT'S FLOOD MITIGATION WILDFIRE MANAGEMENT DROUGHT
- 12 RESILIENCE, THERE IS SOME OF THE FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES THERE.
- 13 THERE IS ALSO A NEW PROTECT GRANTS, THAT ARE INCLUDED WITHIN
- 14 THE FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION BILL, AND THAT INCLUDES ABOUT 250
- 15 MILLION, NATION-WIDE, LOOKING FOCUSED AT EVACUATION ROUTES,
- 16 AND PLANNING AND INFRASTRUCTURE. AND THEN AUTHORIZATION FOR
- 17 TRANSPORTATION RESILIENCE AND ADAPTATION CENTERS FOR
- 18 EXCELLENCE, BUT THOSE ARE NOT FUNDED AT THIS TIME. SO THAT'S
- 19 JUST A HIGH-LEVEL RUN THROUGH OF STATE FUNDING AND SOME OF THE
- 20 FEDERAL OPPORTUNITIES ON THE HORIZON. AND WITH THAT I'LL CLOSE
- 21 AND TURN IT OVER TO ALAN.

- 3 LOOKS LIKE, HERE WE GO. NEXT SLIDE. MY NAME IS ALAN A, BAY
- 4 AREA OFFICER WITH AQMD. THIS SLIDE, I KNOW THERE IS A LOT OF
- 5 STUFF IN THERE AND THE ONLY REASON I PUT IT UP THERE IN THIS
- 6 WAY IS TO SHOW FOLKS THAT EVERY YEAR IT'S A CHALLENGE FOR
- 7 LOCAL AIR DISTRICTS TO GET FUNDING IN THE STATE BUDGET ON A
- 8 CONSISTENT BASIS. AND SO, THE AIR DISTRICTS RELY ON THREE
- 9 SOURCES OF FUNDING IN THE STATE BUDGET, THE AIR POLLUTION
- 10 CONTROL FUND, WHICH IS MANAGED BY CARB, THE GREENHOUSE GAS
- 11 REDUCTION FUND, WHICH IS FROM CAP-AND-TRADE PROGRAM, IS THEN,
- 12 ON OCCASION, SOME MONEYS FROM THE GENERAL FUND. AND SO, YOU
- 13 CAN SEE THAT IN THE FY '19/'20 BUDGET WHAT THINGS WERE LIKE
- 14 BEFORE COVID HIT, THE 2021 BUDGET HAD SOME -- WE TOOK SOME
- 15 SIGNIFICANT LOSSES IN TERMS OF STATE FUNDING, PRIMARILY
- 16 BECAUSE THE CAP-AND-TRADE PROGRAM HAD SOME PROBLEMS COLLECTING
- 17 REVENUE FROM THE CAP-AND-TRADE PROGRAM THEN WE FOUGHT THIS
- 18 YEAR THROUGH THE PROPOSED BUDGET AND EARLY ACCESS MEASURES AND
- 19 OPEN THE BUDGET GOING THROUGH SOME OF THE PROGRAMS THE 617
- 20 IMPLEMENTATION PROGRAM WAS FUNDED AT \$50 MILLION THIS WAS
- 21 MONEY AIR DISTRICTS USE TO WORK IN THEIR AB 617 DISADVANTAGED
- 22 COMMUNITIES DOING OUTREACH WORKING ON AIR QUALITY MONITORING
- 23 PROJECTS DOING EMISSIONS REDUCTION PLANS AND WE HAVE TWO
- 24 COMMUNITIES WHERE WE DO A LOT OF FOCUSED WORK ON RIGHT NOW,
- 25 WEST OAKLAND, AND RICHMOND SAN PABLO AREA, AND WE'LL LIKELY BE



- 1 ADDING 1 TO 2 COMMUNITIES IN THE COMING YEARS, SO THIS WORK IS
- 2 REALLY IMPORTANT FOR THE WORK WE DO IN OUR COMMUNITIES THAT
- 3 HAVE BEEN HISTORICALLY BURDENED BY AIR POLLUTION. THE 617
- 4 INCENTIVES ARE FOR BASICALLY REPLACEMENT PROJECTS TO REPLACE
- 5 OLDER EQUIPMENT WITH NEW EQUIPMENT, REDUCE DIRECT EMISSIONS
- 6 REDUCTION PROJECTS, AND WE FIND THAT BY REPLACING TRUCKS AND
- 7 PORT EQUIPMENT, AND ANYTHING THAT'S OLDER AND MORE POLLUTING
- 8 WITH SOMETHING THAT'S NEWER TECHNOLOGY GETS THOSE REALLY FAST
- 9 REDUCTIONS THAT COMMUNITY MEMBERS CAN SEE AND APPRECIATE AS
- 10 PART OF THAT 617 PROGRAM. THE CLEAN VEHICLE REBATE PROGRAM,
- 11 THAT'S THE REBATES FOR BUYING ELECTRIC VEHICLES, WAS, HAD SOME

- 15 HALF A BILLION DOLLARS. CLEAN TRUCK AND BUS PROGRAM ANOTHER
- 16 INCENTIVE PROGRAM TO CHANGE OUT OLDER TRUCKS AND OLDER SCHOOL
- 17 BUSES WITH NEWER, LOWER EMITTING EQUIPMENT. WE GOT \$315
- 18 MILLION. THE FARMER PROGRAM, WHICH IS REPLACING OLDER TRACTORS
- 19 WITH NEWER TRACTORS GOT A PRETTY SIGNIFICANT BOOST IN FUNDING
- 20 THIS YEAR. THE CLEAN CARS FOR ALL PROGRAM, THIS IS A VERY
- 21 SUCCESSFUL PROGRAM WE RUN IN THE BAY AREA WHERE OLDER LIGHT
- 22 DUTY VEHICLES IN LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS CAN BE SCRAPPED WITH
- 23 FUNDING ASSISTANCE FOR THEM TO EITHER BUY A NEW OR USED
- 24 HYBRID, NEW OR USED PLUG IN ELECTRIC HYBRID, OR A STRAIGHT-UP
- 25 ELECTRIC VEHICLE OR FUELCELL VEHICLE HAS BEEN FUNDED FOR



- 1 SEVERAL YEARS IN THE FUTURE. WE, THE BAY AREA AIR DISTRICT
- 2 RAN A COUPLE OF BILLS IN RESPONSE TO WILDFIRES BACK IN 2017
- 3 AND 2018 AND OUR HOPE THAT WE COULD CREATE PUBLICLY AVAILABLE
- 4 CENTERS WHERE PEOPLE COULD GO AND GET A BREATH OF FRESH AIR IF
- 5 THEY DIDN'T HAVE ACCESS TO A WORKING HVAC SYSTEM EITHER AT
- 6 THEIR HOME OR PLACE OF BUSINESS, AND SO WE HAVE RECEIVED A
- 7 LITTLE BIT OF FUNDING FOR THAT IN THE PAST. AND THAT CONCEPT
- 8 IS KIND OF MORPHED INTO A DIFFERENT CONCEPT CALLED RESILIENT
- 9 CENTERS, AND THESE ARE PUBLIC PLACES WHERE, NOT ONLY CAN YOU
- 10 GO TO GET A BREATH OF FRESH AIR, BUT IT MIGHT BE A COOLING
- 11 CENTER AT SOME TIMES OF THE YEAR. IT MIGHT BE A WARMING CENTER
- 12 AT SOME TIMES OF THE YEAR, A HYDRATION CENTER, IT MIGHT HAVE
- 13 BROADBAND SERVICE, IT'S, SORT OF, A MULTI-FUNCTION FACILITY
- 14 THAT FOLKS CAN GO TO FOR A WHOLE HOST OF CLIMATE-TYPE PROBLEMS
- 15 THAT THEY MAY FACE. SO THAT'S BEEN GIVEN SOME FUNDING TO GET
- 16 THAT CONCEPT GOING. AND THEN ONE PROGRAM THAT WAS ONLY JUST
- 17 BEGUN THIS YEAR IN THE BUDGET BILL JR. SB170 IS THE ZERO-
- 18 EMISSION LAWN AND GARDEN EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT PROGRAM. SO
- 19 THIS IS, I THINK, A REALLY SIGNIFICANT PROGRAM. CARB, RIGHT
- 20 NOW, IS LOOKING AT REGULATIONS THAT WOULD START TRANSITIONING,
- 21 LAWN AND GARDEN, SOME TYPES OF LAWN AND GARDEN AND SMALL OFF-
- 22 ROAD EMISSIONS TO ZERO-EMISSION IN THE NEXT 10 TO 15 YEARS SO
- 23 THE 0-EMISSIONS LAWN AND GARDEN FUNDING WILL HOPEFULLY ALLOW
- 24 US TO START CONTACTING COMMERCIAL LANDSCAPERS AND TRYING TO
- 25 HELP THEM TRANSITION OUT OF GAS POWERED EQUIPMENT TO BATTERY



- 1 ELECTRIC EOUIPMENT. SO WE'RE REALLY EXCITED THIS PROGRAM IS
- 2 GETTING OFF THE GROUND AND HOPEFUL WE'LL BE ABLE TO ACCESS
- 3 SOME OF THAT FUNDING FOR PROGRAMS IN THE BAY AREA. NEXT SLIDE
- 4 PLEASE. AND THEN THIS CHART JUST SHOWS THE STATE'S COMPLETE
- 5 ZERO-EMISSION VEHICLES PACKAGE. AND SO THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF
- 6 -- THERE WAS A LOT OF PRESS ATTENTION GIVEN TO THIS WHEN THE
- 7 BUDGET WAS ORIGINALLY PASSED DURING THE SUMMER. AND YOU CAN
- 8 SEE THE TOTAL FUNDING OVER THE NEXT THREE YEARS FOR VARIOUS

- 10 AND SO THERE IS GOING TO BE SOME SIGNIFICANT OPPORTUNITIES,

- 12 ZERO EMISSIONS FUELING INFRASTRUCTURE, DRAYAGE, AND DRAYAGE

- 24 HOPEFULLY THAT WE WILL BE ABLE TO ACCESS THERE IS FUNDING IN
- 25 THE INFRASTRUCTURE BILL AND RECONCILIATION PROPOSED FOR CLEAN



- 1 PORT EQUIPMENT THE INFRASTRUCTURE HAS \$50 MILLION A YEAR FOR
- 2 FIVE YEARS BUT THE RECONCILIATION BILL ADDS ANOTHER HALF
- 3 BILLION DOLLARS TO THAT AMOUNT. THAT'S PRETTY SIGNIFICANT
- 4 THERE IS TAX CREDITS REBATES PROGRAM FOR BUILDING

- 12 AND HOPEFULLY WE'LL BE ABLE TO KEEP THOSE THINGS IN BOTH OF
- 13 THOSE BILLS AND GET THEM TO A SUCCESSFUL VOTE. SO WITH THAT,
- 14 THAT'S MY PRESENTATION. AND I'M SURE, BETWEEN REBECCA, AND I,
- 15 WE CAN ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS YOU HAVE.
- 17 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: TERRIFIC. WELL, THANK YOU, BOTH OF YOU, FOR
- 18 THOSE EXCELLENT REPORTS. AND I KNOW THAT REPRESENTS A LOT OF
- 19 HARD WORK FROM BOTH OF YOU, AND ALL OF OUR, AS LEGISLATIVE
- 20 ADVOCATES, EITHER IN-PERSON, OR VIRTUALLY BOTH IN THE HALLS OF

- 18 DOUBLE-EDGED QUESTION IS, WAS THERE ANY DISCUSSION OVER THAT

- 22 PRESENT TO US ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY NOT SO MUCH FOR THIS MONEY
- 23 BUT AT HEAT FOCUSING ON IT TO GO FORWARD PERHAPS JOINING WITH

- 10 COMMUNITIES PROGRAM HAS BEEN FUNDED FOR A NUMBER OF YEARS,
- 11 RECEIVED SOME CAP-AND-TRADE FUNDING OVER THE YEARS AND HAS
- 12 REGULAR UPDATES TO THE GUIDELINES. AND IN THAT PROCESS, I
- 13 THINK THERE HAS DEFINITELY BEEN A RECOGNITION OF THE CONCERNS

- 16 COMPETE. IT WAS LIMITED TO THE TOP 5%. CALENVIROSCREEN, CENSUS
- 17 TRACTS, I BELIEVE, SO THERE WERE ABOUT TWO CENSUS TRACTS, 2 TO
- 18 3 IN THE ENTIRE BAY AREA THAT COULD QUALIFY. THAT HAS CHANGED.
- 19 SO IT IS A LITTLE BIT MORE, SORT OF, FLEXIBLE. BUT ESSENTIALLY
- 20 PROJECTS HAVE TO BE SCORING IN THE -- SORRY -- I'M TRYING TO
- 21 OPEN UP MY SCREEN HERE, WITHIN THE TOP 10%, AND SO THERE IS A
- 22 LOT OF MOVING PARTS HERE. THAT'S IN THE CURRENT ITERATION OF
- 23 THE GUIDELINES, UNDER CALENVIROSCREEN 4.0 WHICH IS IN THE
- 24 DRAFT FORM RIGHT NOW, WE HAVE ABOUT 19 CENSUS TRACTS THAT
- 25 SCORE WITHIN THE TOP 10%. SO THAT'S A LOT MORE. AND I DO THINK



- 1 -- I DO NOT HAVE THE MAP IN FRONT OF ME RIGHT NOW, BUT I THINK
- 2 CENSUS TRACKS IN WEST OAKLAND, IN THE COMMUNITIES THAT WE KNOW
- 3 ARE MOST IMPACTED DO QUALIFY FOR THAT. SO, YOU KNOW, I THINK,
- 4 BROADLY WE'RE NOT TALKING ABOUT OUR MOST DISADVANTAGED
- 5 COMMUNITIES NOT HAVING A SHOT AT THIS. SO THAT'S GOOD. AND
- 6 THEN I WOULD JUST SAY THAT THERE IS AN OPPORTUNITY BOTH WITH
- 7 THE UPDATE TO CALENVIROSCREEN AND UPDATES TO THE
- 8 TRANSFORMATIVE CLIMATE COMMUNITIES GRANT PROGRAM TO TALK WITH
- 9 THE STATE ABOUT DESIGNING IT, PARTICULARLY AS IT'S BECOMING
- 10 NOW FRAMED AS MORE ABOUT ADAPTATION TO MAKE SURE THAT THE
- 11 COMMUNITIES THAT BCDC HAS IDENTIFIED AS MOST IMPACTED AND
- 12 VULNERABLE TO SEA LEVEL RISE, FOR EXAMPLE, ARE ELIGIBLE. SO,
