SO I JUST WANT TO SUMMARIZE THE PROCEDURE FOR THE HEARING TODAY. AND WE WILL NOW TAKE UP ITEM 6 SEVEN, THE CONTINUATION OF THE PUBLIC HEARING ON THE REGIONAL 7 8 HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION APPEALS. THE PUBLIC HEARING IS NOW REOPENED, AND A CERTIFIED SHORTHAND REPORTER IS TRANSCRIBING 9 THESE PROCEEDINGS. WHEN IT IS TIME FOR PUBLIC COMMENT IF YOU 10 WISH TO TESTIFY, PLEASE USE THE RAISED HAND FEATURE ON ZOOM OR 11 PRESS STAR NINE AND PLEASE WAIT TO BE RECOGNIZED. WITH THAT 12 WE'LL PROCEED TO ITEM SEVEN A, A REPORT ON THE REGIONAL 13 HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION APPEAL FOR THE TOWN OF FAIRFAX. 14 BEFORE I TAKE UP THE ITEM, MAYOR EKLUND, DO YOU WISH TO BE 15 16 RECOGNIZED? 17 PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH PRESIDENT ARREGUIN FOR 18 CALLING ON ME. AND THANK YOU FOR ASKING FOR AN UPDATED LIST. 19 I HAVE NOT RECEIVED IT YET. AND I THINK THE LAST LIST THEY 20 21 RECEIVED WAS DATED SEPTEMBER 28TH. I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT FOR THOSE WHO HAVE NOT BEEN PARTICIPATING IN PREVIOUS APPEALS, 22 ESPECIALLY THE PUBLIC, AND THE APPLICANT, THAT THIS LIST IS A 23 -- OUR LIST OF TOPICS THAT THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD OR 24 ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE WILL BE TAKING UP AND LOOKING AT IN 25



THE FUTURE THAT DEFINITELY HAS A RELATIONSHIP TO ESTABLISHING 1 2 THE REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION. AND, UNFORTUNATELY, 3 THERE ARE ISSUES THAT CANNOT BE DEALT WITH AS PART OF THE APPEALS. BECAUSE THEY WERE NOT PART OF THE METHODOLOGY. SO I 4 5 JUST THINK THAT IT'S IMPORTANT FOR THE PUBLIC AND THE APPLICANT TO REALIZE THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THAT LIST AND SO I 6 LOOK FORWARD TO GETTING IT BEFORE WE MOVE TOO FAR DOWN THE 7 8 LIST. 9 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: IN SEPTEMBER LEGAL NOTICES WERE 10 PUBLISHED IN MULTIPLE LANGUAGES IN NEWSPAPERS IN EACH OF THE 11 NINE COUNTIES IN THE BAY AREA PUBLIC HEARING DATES WERE POSTED 12 ON THE ABAG WEB PAGE IN ORDER FOR US TO CONSIDER THESE 13 APPEALS. WITH THAT WE'LL CONTINUE TO THE TOWN OF FAIRFAX AND 14 15 START WITH A PRESENTATION FROM THE TOWN OF FAIRFAX ON THEIR 16 APPEAL AND YOU HAVE FIVE MINUTES. WHO WILL BE PRESENTING? 17 BEN BERTO: THERE ARE THREE BASIS FOR OUR APPEAL FIRST IS FIRE 18 RISK AND EVALUATION FACTORS ARE INACCURATE AND INCOMPLETE AS 19 PRESENTED BY ABAG. THE SECOND IS THAT THE JOBS/HOUSING RATIO 20 21 WILL NOT BE IMPROVED WITH THE ADDITIONAL HOUSING, AND THE THIRD IS THAT OUR WATER SUPPLY IS CURRENTLY INADEQUATE. NEXT 22 THE REDUCTION REQUEST IS FAIRLY MODEST, THE DRAFT RHNA 23 SLIDE. FOR THE SIX CYCLE FOR FAIRFAX IS 490 HOUSING UNITS AND REQUEST 24 REDUCTION IS 370 HOUSING UNITS AND THE PROPOSED DRAFT RHNA IS 25



- 1 800 INCREASE OVER OUR CURRENT NUMBER. NEXT SLIDE. I WANT TO
- 2 MAKE THIS POINT CLEARLY. FAIRFAX SUPPORTS HOUSING. WE ARE
- 3 SCHEDULED TO BUILD, BASICALLY, DOUBLE OUR CURRENT FIFTH CYCLE
- 4 RHNA WE HAVE ALREADY DOUBLED OUR CURRENT CYCLE RHNA IN THE
- 5 VERY LOW AND LOW-INCOME CATEGORY. AND AGAIN OUR REQUEST IS FOR
- 6 370 HOUSING UNITS WHICH WILL REPRESENT AN INCREASE IN OUR RHNA
- 7 ALLOCATION BY OVER 500%. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, IN TERMS OF
- 8 APPEAL BASIS, FIRE AND EVACUATION, THE HOUSING ELEMENT SITE
- 9 SELECTION TOOL INACCURATELY DEPICTS OVER HALF OF FAIRFAX'S
- 10 CONTAINING POTENTIAL HOUSING SITE WHEREAS THE CAL FIRE, FIRE
- 11 RISK MAPS THAT ARE USED TO DETERMINE THE HES TOOL IN POTENTIAL
- 12 CONSTRAINT SHOW THAT THE DESIGN TOWN IS IN CONSTRAINT.
- 13 FURTHERMORE, AND THIS IS STILL SOMETHING THAT WE'RE
- 14 DEVELOPING, FAIRFAX HAS UNIQUELY HAZARDOUS EVACUATION
- 15 CIRCUMSTANCES. BASICALLY, A HIGH PERCENTAGE OF OUR ROADS ARE
- 16 ONE WAY IN AND OUT, NARROW, LESS THAN 20 FEET WIDE, HILLY AND
- 17 WINDING. FURTHERMORE, OUR POSITION AT THE END OF ROSS VALLEY
- 18 MEANS THAT WE HAVE THE LONGEST AND MOST CONGESTED EVACUATION
- 19 TO ANY REALISTIC POINT OF SAFETY OF ANY JURISDICTION IN MARIN.
- 20 YOU SEE IN THE YELLOW THE CONSIDERED POTENTIAL HOUSING SITES
- 21 AND IF YOU WANT TO ZOOM IN, WE HAVE SUPER IMPOSED THE CAL FIRE
- 22 RISK SECURITY ZONES AND THE ENTIRE AREA SHOWN IN YELLOW ON
- 23 THAT MAP IS IN FACT RED. SO EVERY LOCATION IN FAIRFAX IS

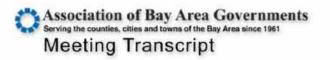

CAN YOU HELP ME TO UNDERSTAND WHY FAIRFAX DID NOT? 4 5 BEN BERTO: THANK YOU FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK. I BELIEVE 6 YOU ANSWERED THE OUESTION DISCUSSED IN THE METHODOLOGY USED BY 7 8 ABAG THAT THE PRIMARY BASIS FOR DOING THAT SURVEY WERE ALREADY REMOVED FROM THE DISCUSSION. 9 10 PAT ECKLUND: OKAY. SURVEY. I WANT TO CLARIFY THAT FOR THE RECORD.



1 2 PAT ECKLUND: RIGHT. DID YOU DID YOU EXPLAIN THAT TO THE TOWN 3 COUNCIL. 4 5 BEN BERTO: THE COUNCIL IS AWARE THAT WE DID NOT COMPLETE A SURVEY, AS I STATED THE REASONS BEHIND THAT. I WOULD POINT OUT 6 THAT APPEALS BASIS THAT WE CITED IN TERMS OF THE JOBS/HOUSING 7 8 RATIO AND THE FACT THAT IT WILL GO AGAINST ABAG'S OWN STATED GOALS AND FAIRFAX IS COMMITTED TO PROVIDING AFFORDABLE HOUSING 9 10 AND, IN FACT, HAS DOUBLED ITS CURRENT RHNA NUMBERS AND WE ARE PLANNING FOR WAYS TO PROVIDE MEANING, AFFORDABLE HOUSING TO 11 PEOPLE WHO WORK IN TOWN, I THINK SPEAKS TO WELL FOR THE 12 FAIRFAX COMMITMENT'S TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING. THE JOBS/HOUSING 13 RATIO IN FAIRFAX IS UNIQUE TO OUR TOWN UNIQUELY LOW AND WILL 14 15 ADDING THIS HOUSING WILL GO AGAINST ABAG'S STATED GOALS. 16 PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU. 17 18 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: SOMEBODY CALLED IN? -- HUDSON? 19 20 21 DAVID E. HUDSON: MANY OF THE OTHERS THAT HAVE A RIDICULOUS, WAY MORE HOUSES THAN THEY HAVE JOBS AND THEY HAVE GREAT 22 REASONS WHY THINGS SHOULD BE CHANGED. AND I'M LOOKING AT 2 3 THE APPEAL BASIS CITED ON TWO THINGS, AND NEITHER OF THEM IS MET BY FAIRFAX, AND I WILL BE -- NOT MAKING A MOTION TO DENY 4 5 THE APPEAL, I'LL WAIT FOR OTHER PEOPLE. I THINK IT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE. BECAUSE FAIRFAX ISN'T UNIQUE. ALL OF OUR CITIES 6 7 OR MANY OF OUR CITIES ARE RUNNING INTO THE SAME PROBLEM. 8 JESSE ARREGUIN, PRESIDENT: I'LL JUSTICE SAY THAT, YOU KNOW, 9 WHAT'S DRIVING THESE HIGHER RHNA NUMBERS IS A SIGNIFICANTLY 10 HIGHER ALLOCATION FROM THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA THAT WAS --11 THAT WAS PROVIDED, DUE TO RECENT CHANGES IN STATE LEGISLATION 12 SPECIFICALLY SENATE BILL 828 AND THAT HAS ROUGHLY DOUBLED THE 13 REGION'S RHNA NUMBERS. SO OUR RESPONSIBILITY IS TO COME UP 14 WITH A METHODOLOGY THAT MEETS THE STATUTORY BASIS UNDER STATE 15 16 LAW AND TO ALLOCATE THAT HOUSING NEED EQUITABLY THROUGHOUT THE REGION. SO I JUST WANT TO EMPHASIZE THAT, YOU KNOW, THIS IS A 17 RESPONSE TO SIGNIFICANTLY HIGHER NUMBERS THE STATE HAS 18 REQUIRED THAT THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA HAS TO MEET. I YOU THINK THE 9 RESPONSIBLE THING TO DO IS TO MOVE AHEAD WITH THE METHODOLOGY 10 THAT WAS APPROVED OVER THE LAST YEAR BY DEMOCRATICALLY ELECTED 11 REPRESENTATIVES WHICH REPRESENT THE NINE BAY AREA COUNTIES AND 12 IDENTIFY AND ADDRESS ANY ISSUES IN FUTURE LEGISLATION. 13 THE NEXT CYCLE OF RHNA. 
