- 7 REAL LIFE COVID PROCESS IN THE MIDDLE OF THE PLANNING PROCESS.
- 8 YOU ALL WEIGHED IN ON THE PLAN ON MANY OCCASIONS AND AS A
- 9 REMINDER OF HIGHLIGHTS OF THAT. EARLY IN THE PROCESS YOU MIGHT
- 10 REMEMBER THE PERSPECTIVE PAPERS THAT SET THE STAGE FOR
- 11 REGIONAL STRATEGIES WHICH WERE EVALUATED ACROSS DIFFERENT
- 12 FUTURES SHAPED BY EXTENSIVE ENGAGEMENT LISTENING AND LEARNING
- 13 TO RESIDENTS OF THE BAY AREA. BOTH MTC AND ABAG APPROVED

- 17 REGIONAL ELECTRIFICATION INVESTMENTS. IN RESPONSE STAFF
- 18 SHIFTED MORE FUNDING FROM PROGRAMMATIC -- TO THE STATE'S --
- 19 [INDISCERNIBLE] SECOND, STAFF CORRECTED A TECHNICAL ISSUE IN
- 20 OUR TRAVEL COMMAND MODELING THAT ASSUMED TRAVEL DEMAND TAKEN
- 21 BY WORKERS SINCE THERE IS NO PLAN MANDATE FOR PAID TIME OFF,
- 22 THE MODELING WORK BAY AREA RESIDENTS ABLE TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF
- 23 THEIR VACATION TIME DESTINATIONS OUTSIDE THE REGION INSTEAD
- 24 CONTRIBUTE TO MORE EMISSIONS INSIDE THE BAY AREA THROUGH
- 25 COMMUTE AND NON-COMMUTE TRIPS ON DAYS THAT WOULD OTHERWISE BE



- 1 TAKEN OFF AND THERE IS A NET IMPACT HEREOF 1 TO 2 GREENHOUSE
- 2 GAS PERCENTAGE POINTS THAT AFFECTS ALL EIR ALTERNATIVES ACROSS
- 3 THE BOARD. STAFF FIXED SOME CODING ERRORS FOR TRANSPORTATION
- 4 PROJECTS BASED ON EXTERNAL FEEDBACK FROM OUR TRANSPORTATION
- 5 PARTNERS AND FINAL ROUND OF QUALITY CONTROL. ALL OF THESE
- 6 UPDATES RELATED TO TRANSPORTATION MODELING NO CHANGES WERE
- 7 MADE TO HOUSING OR ECONOMIC STRATEGIES. THE LAND USE PATTERN
- 8 REMAINS EXACTLY THE SAME AS IN JANUARY 2021 AND WHAT FORMS THE
- 9 BASELINE OF THE ONGOING RHNA PROCESS. NEXT SLIDE. SO THESE

- 20 JUST SPOKE ABOUT. NEXT SLIDE. THE FINAL EIR, WHICH DUE TO
- 21 FILE SIZE IS NOT INCLUDED IN TODAY'S PACKET IS AVAILABLE ON
- 22 PLANNEDBAYAREA.ORG AND THERE IS A LINK IN THE STAFF MEMO.
- 23 THERE ARE THREE KEY TAKEAWAYS YOU NEED TO BE AWARE OF THIS
- 24 EVENING. FIRST THERE WAS NO NEW SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION IN THE
- 25 FINAL EIR DIFFERENT THAN THE EIR MOST RESPONSE COMMENTS

- 19 FIRST PROPOSED PLAN REFLECTS PUBLIC AND STAKEHOLDER INPUT THE
- 20 STRATEGIES THAT DRIVE THE PROPOSED PLAN WERE GENERATED
- 21 ITERATED REVIEWED BY THE PUBLIC AND STAKEHOLDERS AND REVISED
- 22 FROM THE FUTURES PHASE TO THE DRAFT BLUEPRINT PHASE AND TO THE
- 23 FINAL BLUEPRINT PHASE. WHEREAS THE STRATEGIES IN THE EIR


