ROLL CALL, PLEASE. 4 5 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: YES, MA'AM. [ROLL CALL VOTE] PASSES 6 7 UNANIMOUSLY BY ALL MEMBERS PRESENT. 8 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: THANK YOU. ALL RIGHT. THEN WE'RE MOVING 9 TO ITEM SIX WHICH IS FINAL PLANNED BAY AREA 2050. WE HAVE TWO 10 ITEMS, BOTH OF WHICH ARE INFORMATIONAL. ONE PERTAINING TO MTC 11 RESOLUTION NUMBER 4484 AND ABAG RESOLUTION NUMBER 80-2021, 12 WHICH IS THE FINAL PLAN. MR. VAUTIN? PLEASE TAKE IT AWAY. 13 >DAVE VAUTIN: GOOD AFTERNOON EVERYONE. I'M DAVE VAUTIN 14 15 ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF MAJOR PLANS. 16 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: IT'S STILL MORNING, DEAR. >DAVE 17 VAUTIN: I'M SORRY. GOOD MORNING. [LAUGHTER] PLEASED TO BE 18 HERE TO SHARE OUR PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 ON HOUSING, ECONOMY, 19 AND THE ENVIRONMENT. I AM PLEASED TO BE JOINED BY ADAM 20 NOELTING, LED THE EIR PROCESS, AND CHIRAG RABARI, WHO LED THE 21 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN DEVELOPMENT, AND RALEIGH MCCOY, LED THE 22 PLAN DOCUMENT DEVELOPMENT, AND URSULA VOEGLER WHO LED OUR 23 PUBLIC WORK. I RECOGNIZE SOME OF YOU HAVE HEARD THIS 24 PRESENTATION AT LEAST ONCE. APOLOGIES ON THAT FRONT. NEXT 25

CAN WE LOAD UP THE DECK? NEXT SLIDE. AS YOU ARE 1 SLIDE PLEASE. AWARE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 HAS GONE THROUGH AN EXTENSIVE 2 3 PLANNING OVER THE PAST FOUR YEARS OVER THE YEARS HORIZON INITIATIVES SHOWN HERE 2018 AND 2019 FUTURES FOCUSING ON 4 5 STRATEGIES ON POLICIES INVESTMENTS AND ADVANCING EQUITY OUTCOMES UN-- DURING THAT BLUE RIBBON PROCESS THAT OCCURRED IN 6 2020 THE STRATEGIES WERE FURTHER REFINED TO INCREASE THE 7 8 PLAN'S PROGRESS TOWARDS KEY OBJECTIVES TO WEAVE IN FURTHER PUBLIC INPUT AND GREATER EMERGING ISSUES RELATED TO POST-COVID 9 RECOVERY. ULTIMATELY THE COMMISSION AND THE ABAG EXECUTIVE 10 BOARD VOTED IN JANUARY 2021 TO ADVANCE THE FINAL BLUEPRINT 11 INTO THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROCESS AS THE PROPOSED PLAN WHICH 12 STAFF HAS RECOMMENDED FOR ADOPTION AS THE FINAL PLAN. THIS 13 FOUR YEAR PROCESS CREATED A MORE COMPREHENSIVE REGIONAL VISION 14 15 THAN EVER BEFORE, WITH NEW ELEMENTS FOCUSED ON ECONOMIC 16 DEVELOPMENT AND ENVIRONMENTAL RESILIENCE COMP IMPLEMENTING WORK IN THE TRANSPORTATION AND HOUSING SPACES. NEXT SLIDE. 17 NOTABLY PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 IS A MAJOR EVOLUTION OF THE 18 REGION'S VISION COMPARED TO PAST ITERATIONS OF PLANNED BAY 19 IT REALLY INTEGRATES A STRATEGIC PIVOT AWAY FROM 20 AREA. PREDICTING THE FUTURE AND TOWARD EMBRACING UNCERTAINTY AND 21 PREPARING FOR IT. THE PLAN PLACES EQUITY FRONT AND CENTER AND 22 WE WORK TO CRAFT EACH STRATEGY WITH AN EOUITY FIRST MINDSET. 23 WE LEVERAGE NEW AND DYNAMIC FORMS OF PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT LIKE 24 THE GAMES MAYOR OF BAYVILLE TO PRECOVID POP-UP EVENTS AT 25

LIBRARIES AND FARMERS MARKETS AND PROJECT TACKLED BY 1 INTEGRATED TEAM OF FORMER MTC AND FORMER ABAG STAFF COMING 2 3 TOGETHER IN 2017 DEMONSTRATING HOUR EFFECTIVE A UNIFIED PLANNED BAY AREA CAN BE, AND ACKNOWLEDGING THE HOUSING CRISIS 4 5 LAYING OUT STRATEGIES THAT ARE NECESSARY TO BRING DOWN THE COST OF EXTREME LIVING IN THE REGION. WE HAVE INTEGRATED BOLD 6 NEW STRATEGIES TO ADDRESS TRANSPORTATION CHALLENGES AS WELL 7 8 AND TO CHIEF THE AMBITIOUS GREENHOUSE GAS TARGETS SET BY THE STATE. WITH ROADWAY PRICING AND LIMITING SPEED RESULTS. FOR 9 10 THE FIRST TIME RATHER THAN JUST ANALYZING SEA LEVEL RISE AS AN EXTERNAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT WE HAVE LAID OUT PROTECTIONS 11 BOTH GREEN AND GRAY THAT RING THE BAY AND PACIFIC COAST TO 12 MITIGATE NEARLY ALL IMPACTS THROUGH 2050. AND FINALLY THE 13 PLAN'S IMPLEMENTATION SPECIFIES NEAR-TERM ACTIONS FOR MTC AND 14 15 ABAG NOT JUST FOR THE NEXT FIVE YEARS FOR A HANDFUL OF 16 STRATEGIES BUT FOR ALL 35 OF THEM TURNING INTO NEAR-TERM NEXT SLIDE. CREATING THIS PLAN WOULD NOT 17 TANGIBLE ACTIONS. HAVE BEEN POSSIBLE WITHOUT DEEP SUSTAINED ENGAGEMENT FROM THE 18 PUBLIC ACROSS OUR DIVERSE REGION. WE WELL MORE THAN 450 19 MEETINGS AND EVENTS TARGETED TO THE PUBLIC AND STAKEHOLDERS 20 21 OVER THE NEARLY FOUR YEAR LONG PROCESS AND BY USING INNOVATIVE AND TARGETED ENGAGEMENT TECHNIQUES WE WERE ABLE TO INCREASE 22 PARTICIPATION AND INPUT BY AN ORDER OF MAGNITUDE COMPARED TO 23 PRIOR LONG RANGE PLANS AND AT THE END OF THE DAY WE RECEIVED 24 25 MORE THAN 234,000 PUBLIC COMMENTS. AND WE ENGAGED MORE THAN

23,000 PARTICIPANT IN THE PLANNING PROCESS. AT THE START OF 1 2 THE PROCESS WE EMPHASIZED HEARING FROM THOSE WHOSE VOICES 3 HAVEN'T BEEN HEARD ENOUGH IN TRADITIONAL PLANNING PROCESSES TARGETING EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES IN EQUITY PRIORITY COMMUNITIES 4 5 AND FOCUS GROUPS. OUTREACH EFFORTS INCLUDE LISTENING AND LEARNING FROM THE NEXT GENERATION AND FROM FOLKS WHO ARE 6 LEADING IN THIS REGION IN 2050, AND INSTEAD OF TELLING WHAT 7 8 THEY'RE ALL EXCITED ABOUT WE'RE GIVING THEM THIS OPPORTUNITY TO DO SO THROUGH THIS VIDEO HIGHLIGHTING SUMMER OF 2021. IN 9 10 OUR YOUTUBE VIDEO CHALLENGE. LET'S ROLL WILL CLIP.

SPEAKER: HI MY NAME IS MENIM AND I LIVE IN PLEASANTON 12 CALIFORNIA MY PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 STRATEGY IS PROVIDING 13 INCENTIVES TO EMPLOYERS TO SHIFT JOB LOCATION TO HOUSING-RICH 14 AREAS THAT ARE WELL SERVED BY TRANSIT. THE REASON I REALLY 15 16 LIKE THIS IS BECAUSE PEOPLE LIKE MY MOM WHO HAVE REALLY LONG COMMUTES TO WORK AND THESE COMMUTES AREN'T SERVED BY PUBLIC 17 TRANSIT USUALLY HAVE TO DRIVE VERY LONG HOURS DAY IN AND DAY 18 OUT SO THIS WOULD HELP NOT ONLY REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF CARS 19 BEING USED BUT IT ALSO REDUCES STRESS OF LOTS OF THESE 20 21 WORKERS.

DURING 2019 THE COMMISSION AND ABAG BOARD 18 ADOPTED THE PLAN VISION AND GUIDING PRINCIPLES TO ENSURE THAT 19 THE BAY AREA 2050 IS AFFORDABLE CONNECTED DIVERSE HEALTHY AND 20 21 VIBRANT DRIVEN ALL STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT OVER THE PLANNING PROCESS AND AS A RESULT WE HAVE 35 STRATEGIES NESTED UNDER 11 22 THEMES IN THE FOUR ELEMENTS OF TRANSPORTATION, HOUSING, THE 23 ECONOMY, AND THE ENVIRONMENT. AND THOSE 35 STRATEGIES ARE THE 24 25 CORE OF THIS PLAN. THE TRANSPORTATION ELEMENT FOCUSES ON

MAINTAINING AND OPTIMIZING OUR EXISTING TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM, 1 2 WHILE CREATING HEALTHY AND SAFE STREETS FOR ALL ROADWAY USERS 3 AND BUILDING OUT A HUNDRED MILLION DOLLAR NEXT GENERATION TRANSIT NETWORK FOCUSING ON HOUSING, PRODUCTION, PRESERVATION 4 5 AND PROTECTION AND STARTS FIRST WITH PROTECTION AND PRESERVATION OF THE EXISTING AFFORDABLE UNITS WHILE 6 INTEGRATING STRATEGIES FOR SPURRING NEW HOUSING CONSTRUCTION 7 8 AT ALL INCOME LEVELS AND WORKING TO CREATE MORE INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES. THE ECONOMY OF THE PLAN HAS STRATEGIES FOCUSING 9 10 ON ECONOMIC MOBILITY CREATING PATHWAYS TO THE MIDDLE CLASS AND SHIFTING LOCATION TO JOBS TO GET TOWARDS BETTER JOBS/HOUSING 11 BALANCE IN THE REGION AND ELEMENT OF STRATEGIES TO REDUCE RISK 12 FROM HAZARDS LIKE EARTHOUAKES SEA LEVEL RISE AND EXPAND ACCESS 13 TO PARKS AND RECREATION FACILITIES IN OPEN SPACE TO RECLUSE 14 15 CLIMATE EMISSIONS AND ELECTRIFICATION AND DEMAND MANAGEMENT 16 ACCOMMODATING ESTIMATED 1.4 MILLION HOUSEHOLDS IN JOBS. REOUIRING \$1.4 TRILLION OVER THE NEXT 30 YEARS AND WHILE MOST 17 TRANSPORTATION MONEY IS EXISTING WITH REMAINDER REASONABLY 18 ANTICIPATED FROM TOLLS PARKING REVENUES AND OTHER SOURCES 19 THERE ARE NOTABLE FUNDING GAPS IN THE HOUSING ECONOMIC 20 21 DEVELOPMENT AND ENVIRONMENTAL SPACES THAT WOULD NEED TO BE FILLED WITH NEW MONEYS TO REALIZE THE PLAN'S VISION. THE GOOD 22 NEWS HERE IS THAT NEW REVENUES ARE ALREADY FLOWING FROM 23 WASHINGTON AND SACRAMENTO TO HELP FILL FINANCIAL GAPS WITH 24 POTENTIALLY MORE ON THE WAY. BUT WE RECOGNIZE THAT REGIONAL 25

AND LOCAL ACTION TO GENERATE NEW REVENUES WILL BE NECESSARY IN 1 THE NEXT DECADE TO TACKLE THE CHALLENGES THE BAY AREA FACES. 2 3 NEXT SLIDE. WHILE WE CAN'T PREDICT THE FUTURE WE CAN ESTIMATE HOW THE STRATEGIES AT THE CORE OF THE PLAN WOULD INFLUENCE THE 4 5 REGIONAL TRAJECTORY MOST IMPORTANTLY THIS PLAN IMPROVES AFFORDABLE FOR ALL BAY AREA RESIDENTS. AS WE ALL KNOW, THE 6 AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD SPENT A SIGNIFICANT SHARE OF THEIR ANNUAL 7 8 INCOME, 58% ON HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION WHICH IS WELL ABOVE THE NATIONAL AVERAGE, IN 2015. AND WITH THE STRATEGIES IN THIS 9 10 FINAL PLAN, WE WOULD BE ABLE TO BRING THAT SHARE DOWN BY 13 PERCENTAGE POINTS TO 45% OF A HOUSEHOLD'S ANNUAL INCOME BY 11 2050 AND ACHIEVE GREATER REDUCTIONS FOR LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS. 12 THE PLAN IMPROVES CONNECTIVITY FOR ALL BAY AREA RESIDENTS 13 ACROSS ALL MODES OF TRANSPORTATION WITH A MORE FREQUENT AND 14 SEAMLESS TRANSIT NETWORK THAT CONNECTS COMMUNITIES, THOUSANDS 15 16 OF MILES OF NEW BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN PATHS AND FOUR OUT OF FIVE NEW HOMES WITHIN A SHORT WALK OF FREQUENCY TRANSIT WE 17 WOULD BE ABLE TO GET WORKERS OUT OF CARS AND INTO GREEN 18 ALTERNATIVE TRANSPORTATION MODES. THE PLAN PROVIDES MORE 19 AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN EXCLUSIONARY JURISDICTIONS AND CREATES 20 21 MORE CHOICES FOR HOUSING LOCATIONS FOR HOUSEHOLDS WITH LOW-INCOMES WHICH ENABLES MORE DIVERSE AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES. 22 FAMILIES WHO HAVE BEEN DISPLACED TO REGION'S PERIPHERY BUT 23 WOULD HAVE MORE OPPORTUNITY TO RELOCATE NEAR BEST THE REGION'S 24 BEST SCHOOLS PARKS AND OTHER INFRASTRUCTURE. THE PLAN MEETS 25

THE STATE-MANDATED GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION TARGET AND 1 2 PROTECTING NEARLY ALL HOMES FROM SEA LEVEL RISE AND THE PLAN LOOKS TO IMPROVE JOBS/HOUSING BALANCE IN COUNTIES THROUGHOUT 3 THE BAY AREA AND STRATEGIES SUCCEED IN BRINGING MORE JOBS TO 4 5 HOUSING-RICH COMMUNITIES IN NORTH AND EAST BAY AND MORE HOMES TO JOB RICH COMMUNITIES IN THE WEST AND SOUTH BAY WITH SHORTER 6 COMMUTES FOR ALL WORKERS. NEXT SLIDE. AS YOU MAY HAVE NOTICED 7 8 FROM THE OVERVIEW OF STRATEGIES, FUNDING AND OUTCOMES, THE CORE OF THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 REMAINS THE SAME AS THE 9 DRAFT PLAN BUT THERE ARE MINOR UPDATES THAT REFINE PERFORMANCE 10 OUTCOMES AS WELL AS RESPONSES AND REVISIONS TO THE FINAL PLAN 11 WHICH WERE INFORMED BY PUBLIC COMMENTS. WE HAVE SHARED THOSE 12 PREVIOUSLY IN AUGUST 2021, AND WE ATTACHED THEM TO THE PACKET 13 TODAY FOR YOUR REFERENCE. I'LL NOW DISCUSS EACH ASPECT OF THE 14 15 PLAN AND DESCRIBE THE TARGETED UNDATES BETWEEN DRAFT AND 16 FINAL. NEXT SLIDE. TRANSPORTATION PERFORMANCE OUTCOMES AND FUNDING LEVELS. FOR EXAMPLE, THE SHARE OF TRIPS TAKEN BY A 17 GIVEN MODE OF TRANSPORTATION HAVE SOME SLIGHT DIFFERENCES 18 BETWEEN THE DRAFT AND FINAL PLAN. AND THIS IS REALLY DRIVEN BY 19 THREE TECHNICAL UPDATES. FIRST WE MADE SOME MINOR TWEAKS TO 20 21 STRATEGY FUNDING LEVELS AS WELL AS THE PRECISE CATEGORIZATION OF INDIVIDUAL TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS NESTED WITHIN THOSE 22 STRATEGIES. AND MOST NOTABLE HERE WAS STRATEGY EN EIGHT WHICH 23 RELATES TO ELECTRIC VEHICLE INFRASTRUCTURE AND SUBSIDIES. IN 24 25 THE THIS CASE, THE CALIFORNIA AIR RESOURCES BOARD OR CARB

REQUIRED MTC AND ABAG TO GIVE THE STATE CREDIT FOR A PORTION 1 2 OF THE GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTIONS COMING FROM REGIONAL 3 ELECTRIFICATION INVESTMENTS. IN RESPONSE, MTC ABAG STAFF SHIFTED FUNDING FROM PROGRAMMATIC CATEGORIES TOWARD THE 4 5 STRATEGIES TO OFFSET LOSSES FROM THE NEW STATE REOUESTS. THIS ENABLED POSITIVE IMPACTS TO REMAIN CONSTANT BETWEEN THE DRAFT 6 AND FINAL. STAFF CORRECTED A TECHNICAL ISSUE IN TRAVEL DEMAND 7 8 MODELING THAT ASSUMED INCREASED VACATION AND PERSONAL SICK DAYS TAKEN BY WORKERS THROUGH 2050 SINCE THERE IS NO STRATEGY 9 IN THE PLAN TO DEMAND GREATER TIME OFF FOR WORKERS THE FINAL 10 PLAN MODELING ASSUMES THIS ASSUMPTION REMAINS CONSTANT THROUGH 11 2050. THE RESULT WITH FEWER BAY AREA RESIDENTS ABLE TO TAKE 12 ADVANTAGE OF THE EXTRA VACATION TIME TO FLY OFF TO DESTINATION 13 OUTSIDE OF REGION AND GENERATE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS THERE 14 15 AND INSTEAD CONTRIBUTE MORE EMISSIONS TO THE BAY AREA THROUGH 16 COMMUTE AND NON-COMMUTE TRIPS ON DAYS THAT WOULD OTHERWISE BE TAKEN OFF. WE SEE IMPACT OF GREENHOUSE GAS PERCENTAGE EFFECTS 17 FROM ALTERNATIVES ACROSS THE BOARD FROM NO PROJECT PROPOSED 18 PLAN TO EIR ALTERNATIVE 1 AND 2. STAFF FIXED CODING ERRORS FOR 19 A FEW TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS BOTH BASED ON FEEDBACK FROM OUR 20 21 TRANSPORTATION PARTNERS AND FINAL ROUND OF QUALITY CONTROL. NOTE UPDATES PERTAIN TO TRANSPORTATION MODELING, THERE WERE NO 22 CHANGES MADE TO ECONOMIC OR HOUSING STRATEGIES AND LAND USE 23 PATTERNS REMAIN THE SAME AS IN JANUARY 2021 WHICH IS THE 24 BASELINE FOR THE ONGOING RHNA PROCESS. NEXT SLIDE. THESE MINOR 25

UPDATES FOR TRAVEL OUTPUTS WERE FOLDED INTO THE FINAL EIR 1 CLARIFYING AND AMPLIFYING THE ANALYSIS OF THE DRAFT RELEASED 2 3 IN EARLY JUNE WHICH WE PRESENTED AT THE TIME. BEYOND THAT THE FINAL EIR FOCUSES ON RESPONDING TO APPROXIMATELY 150 EIR 4 5 RELATED COMMENTS RECEIVED DURING THE PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD IN A MANNER CONSISTENT WITH CEQA REQUIREMENTS. MANY COMMENTS 6 RECEIVED WERE RELATED TO EIGHT KEY ISSUE AREAS WHICH WE 7 8 SUMMARIZED FOR CLARITY AND CONSISTENCY KNOWN AS WHAT ARE MASTER RESPONSES SHOWN ON SCREEN INCLUDING THE REGIONAL GROWTH 9 FORECAST COVID-19 PANDEMIC, WATER SUPPLY, EIR ALTERNATIVE 10 SELECTION, SEA LEVEL RISE, MTC/ABAG ROLES AND AUTHORITY, THE 11 FISCALLY CONSTRAINED TRANSPORTATION PROJECT LIST AND THOSE 12 TRAVEL MODEL REFINEMENTS I JUST SPOKE TO. ALL NOT INCLUDED IN 13 THE PACKET DUE TO FILE SYSTEM IS AVAILABLE ON 14 PLANNEDBAYAREA.ORG EIR AND THERE IS A LINK IN THE PACKET AS 15 16 WELL. THREE KEY TAKEAWAYS, FIRST, THERE IS NO NEW SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION ADDED TO THE DRAFT EIR IN THE FINAL THAT WARRANTS 17 RECIRCULATION. ALL THE REVISIONS, REFINEMENTS AND RESPONSES TO 18 COMMENT REALLY JUST SERVE TO CLARIFY AND AMPLIFY PAST 19 SECOND, THE FINAL EIR DID NOT IDENTIFY ANY NEW 20 ANALYSIS. 21 SIGNIFICANT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS COMPARED TO THE DRAFT, AND IT DID NOT IDENTIFY ANY SUBSTANTIAL INCREASES IN THE SEVERITY 22 OF ANY SIGNIFICANT IMPACT. STAFF CONTINUES TO FIND THAT EIR 23 ALTERNATIVE ONE IS THE ENVIRONMENTALLY SUPERIOR ALTERNATIVE 24 25 BOTH IN DRAFT AND FINAL. THIRD, THE FINAL EIR DOES NOT MAKE A

RECOMMENDATION ON WHICH ALTERNATIVE TO ADVANCE, BUT THE JOINT 1 MTC PLANNING AND ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE MADE THAT 2 3 RECOMMENDATION AT THEIR COMMITTEE MEETING LAST WEEK, WHICH I'LL DISCUSS ON THE NEXT SLIDE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THANK YOU. 4 5 GIVEN THESE TAKE-AWAY'S AND THE COMPLETION OF THE PUBLIC REVIEW PROCESS THIS SUMMER, STAFF IS RECOMMENDING THAT THE 6 COMMISSION AND BOARD CERTIFY THE FINAL EIR NEXT WEEK. THE 7 8 JOINT PLANNING AND ADMIN COMMITTEE RECOMMENDED THAT THE COMMISSION AND BOARD AT THAT TIME ALSO ADOPT A PROPOSED PLAN 9 AS FINAL PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS. 10 WHICH WE'RE CURRENTLY WEAVING INTO THE CEQA FINDINGS AND WILL 11 BE POSTED AS PART OF THE JOINT COMMISSION BOARD PACKET. THE 12 CEOA FINDINGS INCLUDE A STATEMENT OF OVERRIDING CONSIDERATIONS 13 IDENTIFIES LEGAL, SOCIAL, AND OTHER ECONOMIC FACTORS THAT 14 15 SUPPORT APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED PLAN. HERE ARE THE FOUR KEY 16 REASONS TO ADVANCE PROPOSED PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 AS FINAL: FIRST THE PROPOSED PLAN REFLECTS GREATER PUBLIC AND 17 STAKEHOLDER INPUT THAN OTHER EIR ALTERNATIVES STRATEGIES THAT 18 DRIVE THE PLAN WERE GENERATED, ITERATED, REVIEWED BY PUBLIC 19 AND STAKEHOLDERS AND REVISED THOROUGHLY FROM FUTURES TO DRAFT 20 21 TO FINAL BLUEPRINT. WHILE STRATEGIES IN THE EIR ALTERNATIVES RESPOND TO COMMENTS DURING SCOPING THEY ARE OFTEN IN CONFLICT 22 WITH PUBLIC AND STAKEHOLDER INPUT RECEIVED EARLIER IN THE 23 PLANNING PROCESS. EXAMPLES HERE INCLUDE DEFERMENT OF ALL 24 FREEWAY EXPANSION PROJECTS IN THE EIR ALTERNATIVE ONE WHICH IS 25

INCONSISTENT WITH COUNTY PRIORITIES IN COUNTY SALES TAX 1 MEASURES AND INCLUSION OF OFFICE DEVELOPMENT CAP STRATEGIES IN 2 3 EIR ALTERNATIVE TWO WHICH DOES NOT ALIGN WITH COMMISSION AND BOARD DIRECTION ON ECONOMIC STRATEGIES PROVIDED DURING 2020 AS 4 5 IT RELIES ON THE STICK BASED APPROACH RATHER THAN CARROT BASED APPROACH. AND STRATEGIES DURING SCOPE WENT THROUGH LESS STRESS 6 TESTING DURING HORIZON BLUEPRINT PHASES IN CONTRAST TO THE 35 7 8 FINAL STRATEGIES THAT WERE CONTINUALLY HONED AND REFINED TO MAXIMIZE EFFICACY TOWARDS RESILIENCE AND EOUITY GOALS. THIRD, 9 THE PROPOSED PLAN ADVANCES ALL FIVE GUIDING PRINCIPLES 10 APPROVED AT THE START OF THE PLANNING PROCESS WHILE MEETING 11 FEDERAL AND STATE REOUIREMENTS. NOTABLY THE NO PROJECT 12 ALTERNATIVES FAILS TO MEET MOST OF THE PROJECT OBJECTIVES AS 13 WELL BY ALTERNATIVE TWO WHICH DOES NOT ADVANCE THE VIBRANT 14 15 GUIDING PRINCIPLES AS IT EXACERBATES JOBS/HOUSING BALANCE 16 BETWEEN SAN FRANCISCO AND IT'S NEIGHBORS. FINALLY THE PROPOSED PLAN IS BEST POSITIONED TO IMPLEMENTATION DUE TO STRATEGY BUY-17 IN AND ENGAGEMENT WITH OUR STAKEHOLDERS AND THE PUBLIC IN THE 18 IMPLEMENTATION PHASE. THAT PRODUCT DEFINES ACTIONS REFINED FOR 19 EACH OF THE STRATEGIES AND IT WILL ENSURE THAT MTC AND ABAG 20 21 WILL BE ABLE TO HIT THE GROUND RUNNING NEXT YEAR. NEXT SLIDE. SO PIVOTING NOW FROM THE EIR TO THE PLAN DOCUMENT AND THE 22 VARIOUS SUPPLEMENTAL REPORTS, THIS COMPONENT OF FINAL PLANNED 23 BAY AREA 2050 SAW SOME FOCUSED IMPROVEMENTS BETWEEN DRAFT AND 24 FINAL, DESIGNED TO CLARIFY THE PLAN AND RESPOND TO COMMENTS 25

RECEIVED. WE DID INCLUDE THE FINAL PLAN DOCUMENT IN YOUR 1 2 PACKET AND ALTHOUGH SUPPLEMENTAL REPORTS ARE AVAILABLE ON 3 PLANNEDBAYAREA.ORG. A FEW HIGHLIGHTS HERE. NEW SIDE BARS ON CRITICAL ISSUES LIKE THE BLUE RIBBON TRANSIT RECOVERY TASK 4 5 FORCE AND ITS WORK THIS SUMMER WERE ADDED AS WELL AS THE ADDITIONAL CONTEXT ON A COVID-19 AND HOW IT WAS INTEGRATED 6 INTO THE PLAN IN 2020 AND 2021. NEW AND IMPROVED MAPS WERE 7 8 ADDED ON IMPORTANT ISSUES LIKE PARKS, RECREATION, AND CONSERVATION, AS WELL AS A MORE COMPREHENSIVE LOOK AT EXPRESS 9 BUSES FUNDED UNDER STRATEGY T12 ADDITIONAL CLARITY ADDED TO 10 KEY ISSUES ON THE PLAN DOCUMENT INCLUDING REFLECTION OF NEEDS 11 OF ELDERLY AND DISABLED PERSON IN EACH OF THE PLAN ELEMENT 12 CHAPTERS. NEXT SLIDE. FINALLY THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AND HOW 13 BROADLY MTC AND ABAG CAN PIVOT FROM THIS FOUR YEAR PLANNING 14 EFFORT TO EQUALLY IMPORTANT WORK. WE PROVIDED A PREVIEW OF THE 15 16 FINAL IMPLEMENTATION PLAN TO VARIOUS MTC AND ABAG COMMITTEE IN SEPTEMBER AND WE HAVE NOW WOVEN THAT INTO THE FINAL CHAPTER OF 17 THE PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 DOCUMENT. SINCE THE IMPLEMENTATION 18 PLAN WAS A MORE FOCUSED ONE YEAR EFFORT WITH THE PARTNERSHIP 19 PHASE HAVING ACTIVE DIALOGUE THIS SUMMER SIZABLE REVISIONS TO 20 21 INTEGRATE STAKEHOLDER AND PUBLIC FEEDBACK HAVE BEEN MADE BETWEEN THE DRAFT AND FINAL IN CONTRAST TO MOST OTHER ASPECTS 22 OF THE FINAL PLAN. THE 80 PLUS ACTIONS IN THE FINAL 23 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN PROVIDE MORE SPECIFICITY ON HOW MTC AND 24 25 ABAG WILL PLAY A ROLE IN THE NEAR-TERM, NOW INCLUDING GENERAL

TIME FRAMES AND REFINEMENTS TO WHETHER MTC AND ABAG ARE IN A 1 2 LEAD, PARTNER, OR SUPPORT ROLE. THE FINAL IMPLEMENTATION PLAN 3 ACKNOWLEDGES MANY OF THE POTENTIAL PARTNERS THAT WILL BE ESSENTIAL TO REALIZING THE PLAN'S WIDE RANGING VISION WITH 4 5 EXPANDED REFLECTIONS ON THE IMPORTANT ROLE THAT LABOR ORGANIZATIONS CAN PLAY. WE'RE NOT GOING TO RUN THROUGH ALL 80 6 PLUS ACTIONS TODAY BUT WE WANT TO GIVE YOU A FLAVOR OF WHAT'S 7 8 NEXT IN 2022 WHICH IT COMES TO IMPLEMENTING EACH ELEMENT OF THE PLAN. NEXT SLIDE. STARTING WITH HOUSING. THERE IS A LOT 9 GOING ON IN THE REGIONAL HOUSING SPACE AS WE WORK TO ASSIST 10 LOCAL JURISDICTIONS WITH THE IMPORTANT WORK OF UPDATING THEIR 11 GOING INTO 2022, ADVANCING THE EXPANDED HOUSING ELEMENTS. 12 REGIONAL HOUSING PORTFOLIO WILL ENABLE MTC AND ABAG TO MAKE 13 PROGRESS ON A HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION SYSTEM, THE DOORWAY OF 14 15 AFFORDABLE HOUSING PLATFORM, AND MORE. WE'RE ALSO WORKING ON 16 THE TRANSIT ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT POLICY UPDATE NEXT YEAR, 17 WHICH WILL YEAR-OLD ENHANCED GUIDANCE FOR LOCAL JURISDICTIONS ON A CRITICAL LAND USE AND TRANSIT CONNECTIONS. NEXT SLIDE. 18 2022 ALSO PRESENTS OPPORTUNITIES FOR MTC AND ABAG TO PARTNER 19 ON ACCELERATING THE REGION'S ECONOMIC RECOVERY. 20 WITH FUNDING 21 PROGRAMS LIKE THE ONE BAY AREA GRANT CYCLE THREE, AND REAP 2.0 ACTIVELY BEING CRAFTED THIS MAY PRESENT OPPORTUNITIES TO FUND 22 WORK ON THE PILOT PRIORITY PRODUCTION AREA PROGRAM, AS WELL AS 23 A WINDOW TO UPDATE THE AGENCY'S ADVOCACY PLATFORM TO REFLECT 24 25 EMERGING ECONOMIC PRIORITIES. NEXT SLIDE. IN THE

TRANSPORTATION SPACE, 2022 IS A PRIME OPPORTUNITY TO POSITION 1 2 BAY AREA TRANSIT FOR SUCCESS IN THE YEARS AHEAD. BLUE RIBBON 3 IMPLEMENTATION FURTHER PROGRESS ON THE MAJOR PROJECT ADVANCEMENT POLICY, AND COMPLETION OF THE FARE COORDINATION 4 5 STUDY WILL ALL PLAY A ROLE HERE. IN THE NEXT GENERATION FREEWAY STUDY IS ANTICIPATED TO KICKOFF THIS WINTER, WHICH 6 WE'LL BE CONDUCTING DEEP AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TO EXPLORE 7 8 AND TRANSFORM OUR AGING 20TH INDUSTRY FREEWAY NETWORK AND PRICING AS A KEY PIECE OF THE PUZZLE. IMPLEMENTATION IN 9 ENVIRONMENT ELEMENT WILL ALSO BE FAST TRACKED IN 2022 AND 10 BEYOND SEA LEVEL RISE FUNDING INVESTMENT STRATEGY WAS 11 SPECIFICALLY A IDENTIFIED AS A PRIORITY IN THIS PLAN AS WELL 12 AS BAY ADAPT AND BCDC SEA LEVEL RISE EFFORTS WILL KICKOFF AND 13 WILL BE REFINED IN SHORELINE SOLUTIONS ENVISIONED IN PLANNED 14 15 BAY AREA 2050 AND EXPLORING FUNDING SOURCES THAT WOULD BEST 16 POSITION THE REGION FOR SUCCESS IN THIS SPACE. AND WORKING WITH AIR DISTRICT PARTNERS TO ACCELERATE THE IMPLEMENTATION OF 17 CRITICAL CLIMATE STRATEGIES, ELECTRIC VEHICLE SUBSIDIES AND 18 MARKETING ARE ABSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL TO MEET OUR GREENHOUSE GAS 19 TARGETS. NEXT SLIDE. ALL OF THESE INITIATIVES AND MANY MORE 20 21 WILL HELP BRING THIS LONG RANGE PLAN TO LIFE. WE HAVE ENGAGED WITH THOUSANDS OF RESIDENTS DURING THE COURSE OF THE PROCESS 22 AND LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUING TO ENGAGE WITH THEM AS WE MOVE 23 INTO IMPLEMENTATION. FURTHERMORE THIS WORK WILL REQUIRE 24 DELIBERATE AND SUSTAINED PARTNERSHIP AND THROUGH THAT WORK WE 25

BELIEVE MTC AND ABAG WILL MAKE PROGRESS WITH OUR PARTNERS 1 TOWARDS THE BOLD STRATEGIES LAID OUT IN THIS PLAN IN THE YEARS 2 AHEAD. NEXT SLIDE. BEFORE WE CAN TRANSITION TO IMPLEMENTATION, 3 MTC AND ABAG WILL NOW CONSIDER FINAL PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 FOR 4 5 ADOPTION TO SERVE AS THE REGION'S OFFICIAL PLAN. WE ASK -- WE WILL BE ASKING THAT THE COMMISSION AND BOARD ADOPT SIX 6 RESOLUTIONS NEXT THURSDAY OCTOBER 21ST. THESE INCLUDE THE 7 8 FINAL AIR QUALITY CONFORMITY ANALYSIS, THE FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT, THE FINAL PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 ITSELF, AND THE 9 10 2021 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM WHICH ALIGNS OUR NEAR-TERM TRANSPORTATION PLANNING WITH THE FINAL PLANS 11 TRANSPORTATION ELEMENT. I WANT TO THANK ALL OF THE COMMITTEE 12 MEMBERS FOR YOUR TIME, AND WE'RE HAPPY TO TAKE YOUR QUESTIONS 13 14 NOW. 15 16 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: SONJA, GO AHEAD, PLEASE. 17 SONJA TRAUSS: I HAD A QUESTION ABOUT THE JOBS/HOUSING BALANCE. 18 WHAT IS THE CURRENT JOBS/HOUSING BALANCE? AND WHAT IS YOUR 19 OR -- HOW MUCH DO YOU EXPECT IT WILL IMPROVE? 20 TARGET? PROBABLY TOLD US THIS BEFORE, I JUST FORGOT. 21 >DAVE VAUTIN: WELL, REGION-WIDE, AT THE PRESENT DAY, IT'S AROUND 1.5 JOBS 22 PER HOUSING UNIT. IN 2050 IT'S AROUND 1.3, BUT MORE 23 IMPORTANTLY IS WHAT IT IS ON EACH COUNTY LEVEL. SO I WON'T 24 RATTLE OFF ALL THE RATIOS, BUT IN THE PLAN WE HAVE PRODUCED 25

1 THE JOBS/HOUSING RATIO ON A COUNTY SCALE YOU CAN SEE COUNTIES 2 THAT ARE JOB RICH ARE MOVING IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION IN TERMS 3 OF GETTING CLOSER TO THAT REGIONAL AVERAGE OF 1.3 AND COUNTIES 4 FOR HOUSING-RICH SEEING SOME IMPROVEMENTS TOWARDS CONVERGING 5 THE REGIONAL AVERAGE TOWARDS 1.3. NOT SAYING EVERY COUNTY WILL 6 GET TO 1.3, BUT THEY'RE MOVING IN THE DIRECTION.

7

8 SONJA TRAUSS: IS 1.3 JUST THE OUTCOME OF A LOT OF OUR OTHER PLANS TO REDUCE COMMUTES? OR IS THERE SOME PARTICULAR THEORY 9 ABOUT 1.3 BEING A GREAT TARGET? >DAVE VAUTIN: I GUESS I 10 WOULDN'T DESCRIBE 1.3 AS A TARGET IT'S A REFLECTION OF OUR 11 REGIONAL GROWTH FORECAST. SO THE STRATEGIES IN THE PLAN WORK 12 TO CREATE MORE HOUSING. THEY HELP TO ADDRESS OVERCROWDING, 13 AND, SO, YOU KNOW, THERE IS SOME SIGNIFICANT ACTION THERE. WE 14 15 ALSO SEE THAT CHANGE IN THE JOBS/HOUSING RATIO, IN PART, 16 BECAUSE WE HAVE AN AGING DEMOGRAPHICS IN THE REGION. SO AS WE GO FORWARD, IT -- YOU KNOW, THERE IS GOING TO BE A LARGER 17 RETIRED POPULATION THAT IS NOT IN THE WORKFORCE SO WE SEE A 18 SLIGHT DECLINE IN JUST THAT RATIO, AS WELL. SO THERE IS A FEW 19 THINGS IN PLAY THERE. 20

22 SONJA TRAUSS: THANK YOU.

24 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: OKAY. AL?

25

AL SAVAY: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. DAVE, GREAT PRESENTATION. 1 AND IT'S REALLY EXCITING, AND AN AMBITIOUS PLAN. UNDER KEY 2 3 OBJECTIVES, ONE OF THE THINGS THAT YOU NOTED ON HOUSING, AFFORDABLE HOUSING, IS THAT THERE WILL BE SOME FUNDING SOURCES 4 5 FROM STATE AND FEDERAL DOLLARS AND THINGS LIKE THAT AROUND IMPLEMENTATION. AND, SO, IS SOMEBODY FROM ABAG MTC GOING TO BE 6 A LIAISON TO THE CITIES AND COUNTIES SO THAT WE HAVE SOME 7 8 ASSISTANCE IN ACCESSING THOSE DOLLARS. AT THE CITY AND COUNTY LEVEL IT'S TOUGH FOR STAFF THAT ARE ALREADY, YOU KNOW, KIND OF 9 10 TIGHT ON THEIR RESOURCES, TO KIND OF GO AFTER THESE DOLLARS, AND KNOW WHO TO GO TO. AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AS WE ALL KNOW IS 11 ONE OF THE KEY ISSUES IN THE REGION, AND SO ANYTHING THAT WE 12 CAN DO TO MAKE IT MORE AFFORDABLE, OR TO GET THOSE DOLLARS TO 13 THE LOCAL LEVEL, WOULD BE GREAT. BUT IT'S TOUGH FOR OUR LOCAL 14 15 ENTITIES TO KIND OF GO AFTER THOSE DOLLARS. SO, THAT'S MY 16 QUESTION, WOULD BE, YOU KNOW, IS -- HOW DO YOU SEE 17 IMPLEMENTATION, AND BRIDGING THE GAP BETWEEN THE, YOU KNOW, LOCAL COUNTY ENTITIES, AND, YOU KNOW, THE FOLKS WITH THE BOOTS 18 ON THE GROUND, GETTING THOSE DOLLARS AND HELPING AFFORDABLE 19 HOUSING IN THEIR COMMUNITIES? >DAVE VAUTIN: THANKS FOR THE 20 21 QUESTION, AL. I'M GOING TO PASS THIS QUESTION ALONG TO CHIRAG RABARI WHO LEAD OUR PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION WORK. 22

24 CHIRAG RABARI: HI. GOOD MORNING. ONE KEY THING I WOULD POINT25 TO IS WITH THE REGIONAL EARLY ACTION PLANNING FUNDING THAT WAS

26

MADE AVAILABLE THE FIRST ROUND OF FUNDING THAT WAS MADE 1 AVAILABLE FROM THE STATE, THERE HAS ACTUALLY BEEN A 2 3 SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF INFRASTRUCTURE THAT HAS BEEN BUILT-UP IN TERMS OF TECHNICAL CAPACITY, AND RESOURCES, THAT MTC AND BAG 4 5 ENTERING BEEN ABLE TO DEVELOP TO PROVIDE TO LOCAL JURISDICTIONS. THERE HAVE BEEN A HOST OF WORKING GROUPS AND 6 COUNTY COLLABORATIVES, YOU KNOW, THAT ARE REALLY FOCUSED ON 7 8 TRYING TO PROVIDE EITHER CONSULTANT RESOURCES, OR OTHER SORTS EVER RESOURCES TO HELP LOCAL JURISDICTIONS, YOU KNOW, WITH 9 10 THEIR -- THEIR PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREA PLANNING, WITH THEIR GENERAL PLAN HOUSING ELEMENT UPDATES, AND FORTHCOMING, YOU 11 KNOW, SORT OF, RHNA COMPLIANCE. AND I WOULD EXPECT THAT ANY 12 FUTURE FUNDING THAT WOULD BE MADE AVAILABLE, IN PARTICULAR, 13 SO-CALLED REAP 2.0, SOME ADDITIONAL FUNDING THAT HAS COME FROM 14 15 THE STATE, WOULD REALLY BE LOOKING TO BUILD UPON AND EXPAND 16 THIS INFRASTRUCTURE THAT HAS BEEN PUT IN PLACE OVER THE LAST 17 SEVERAL YEARS.

19 AL SAVAY: THANK YOU.

20

21 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: SO SORRY. THE KITTY CAT IS DEMANDING22 ATTENTION. RICK BONILLA?

23

24 RICK BONILLA: THANK YOU. WHEN WE WERE ON SLIDE, 17, PROBABLY,
25 TALKING ABOUT THE POSSIBLE INVOLVEMENT OF BAHFA IN PLANNING

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FOR THE \$20 MILLION OF USE, I THINK, FOR SHORT-TERM HELP WITH HOMELESSNESS. IS THERE ANY WAY THAT ANY MEMBERS -- ANY MEMBER CITIES OR AGENCIES, ANY INDIVIDUALS, THOSE OF US WHO CAN PARTICIPATE IN THAT OR BECOME AWARE OF WHO IS DOING THAT, WHAT'S GOING ON AND WHAT'S BEEN DONE AND SO FORTH?

MATT MALONEY: RICK, THIS IS MATT MALONEY DIRECTOR OF PLANNING. 7 8 I BELIEVE CHAIR MITCHOFF REPORTED OUT AT THE BEGINNING OF THE MEETING THAT WE HAVE AN ABAG HOUSING COMMITTEE MEETING THIS 9 AFTERNOON AT 1:00 JOINTLY WITH THE BAHFA ADVISORY COMMITTEE, 10 AND THAT'S, SORT OF, THE JOINT COMMITTEE WHERE WE'RE PROVIDING 11 INFORMATION AND ACTION AROUND BAHFA ACTIVITIES, AS WELL AS THE 12 ABAG REGIONAL HOUSING PORTFOLIO. IN FACT TODAY WE'LL TALK 13 ABOUT THE RECENT POLLING INFORMATION WE HAVE GOTTEN, ABOUT THE 14 15 IDEA OF A 2022 MEASURE, AND WE'LL ALSO TALK ABOUT STATE 16 LEGISLATIVE ACTION ON THAT FRONT. AND IT'S GOING TO BE THE FORUM FOR US TO KIND OF DISCUSS THE BAHFA PILOT PROGRAMS, THE 17 \$20 MILLION, AND KIND OF, NEXT STEPS, ON ALL OF THAT. SO I 18 WOULD JUST KIND OF DIRECT YOU TO THOSE MATERIALS AND WHAT'S 19 20 HAPPENING AT THAT COMMITTEE, WHICH, AGAIN, IS MEETING THIS 21 AFTERNOON.

23 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: AND IF STAFF COULD EITHER PUT IN THE
24 CHAT, OR SEND OUT -- I'M LOOKING -- I HAVE GOT THE REGIONAL
25 PLANNING ZOOM INFORMATION, BUT I DON'T THINK I HAVE -- OH

THERE IT IS THERE IS THE HOUSING -- RICK, IF YOU NEED IT,
 WE'LL BE HAPPY TO SEND THAT TO YOU. ALL RIGHT. MARILYN,
 PLEASE?

5 MARILYN EZZY ASHCRAFT: GOOD MORNING CHAIR MITCHOFF AND EVERYONE. FIRST I WANT TO SAY, I LOVE THAT VIDEO. AND I THINK 6 IT IS SUCH A GREAT REMINDER OF WHY WE ARE DOING PLANNED BAY 7 8 AREA 2050. IT'S FOR THE NEXT GENERATION AND THOSE THAT FOLLOW. AND THANK YOU VERY MUCH, DAVE VAUTIN, AND STAFF, FOR PUTTING 9 ALL OF THIS TOGETHER. SO MY QUESTION ALSO RELATES TO THE BAHFA 10 EFFORTS, AND THERE BEING SOME UNCERTAINTY IN FUNDING SOURCES. 11 BECAUSE I HAVE ALSO HEARD A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THE POLLING. AND 12 THIS IS A CHALLENGING TIME TO BRING A REVENUE RAISING MEASURE. 13 SO MY QUESTION IS, HOW WILL THE HOUSING FEATURES IN THIS PLAN 14 BE DEALT WITH? HOW WILL THEY BE SCALED BACK? TRIAGED? 15 16 WHATEVER? IF THE FUNDING SOURCES DON'T COME THROUGH AT THE LEVEL WE HOPE, OR WITH THE TIMING THAT WE HOPE. YOU KNOW? 17 SOMETIMES IT'S NOT ADVANTAGEOUS TO PLACE A MEASURE ON THE 2022 18 BALLOT SO I KICK IT OVER TO 2024 FOR A BETTER CHANCE OF 19 SUCCESS. I AM SURE YOU HAVE THOUGHT OF THAT, YOU WOULD JUST 20 LOVE TO HEAR WHAT SOME OF THE INSIGHT IS. THANK YOU. 21 >DAVE VAUTIN: THANK YOU FOR THAT QUESTION. I ENJOY THE VIDEO AS 22 WELL, SO I'M GLAD TO HEAR THAT. I THINK, WITH REGARDS TO 23 HOUSING -- AND FIRST OF ALL, THE PLAN REQUIRES NEW REVENUE, 24 BUT THAT DOES NOT MEAN THAT ALL THOSE NEW REVENUES ARE ASSUMED 25

TO APPEAR NEXT YEAR. SO WE REALLY DO UNDERSTAND THAT IT'S 1 GOING TO BE A LONG -- THIS IS A LONG-TERM PLAN, AND FUNDING 2 TAKES TIME TO GENERATE NEW MONEY. THERE MAY BE OPPORTUNITY ON 3 THE FEDERAL AND STATE LEVELS IN THESE SPACES, IN THE NEAR-4 5 TERM, MAYBE SOME OF THE REGIONAL MEASURES ARE FURTHER OUT IN THIS DECADE. BUT THIS IS A LONGER TERM VISION THAN JUST THE 6 NEXT YEAR OR TWO. THE OTHER THING I WILL POINT OUT IS IN THE 7 8 HOUSING SPACE. ONE OF THE INTERESTING THINGS IN THIS PLAN IS THERE ARE STRATEGIES THAT ARE HIGH COST AND STRATEGIES THAT 9 ARE MUCH LOWER COST, THEY ARE SOMETIMES CHALLENGING 10 POLITICALLY TO ADVANCE, BUT THERE ARE STRATEGIES OUT THERE 11 THAT DON'T ALWAYS INVOLVE SIGNIFICANT INFUSIONS OF MONEY, AND 12 ASSOCIATION AS WE, YOU KNOW, AS WE KIND OF GRAPPLE WITH THE 13 FUNDS AVAILABLE, IN THE NEAR-TERM, WE CAN, YOU KNOW, REALLY 14 LOOK TOWARDS SOME OF THE LOW COST LOW-HANGING FRUIT STRATEGIES 15 16 TO TACKLE EARLY ON, WITH LOOKING AHEAD TOWARDS FUTURE FUNDING 17 MEASURES IN HOUSING, AND TRANSPORTATION, AND RESILIENCE, YOU KNOW, THAT ARE MUCH LARGER SCALE THAT WOULD HELP TO FILL THOSE 18 GAPS FOR THE HIGHER COST STRATEGIES. 19

21 KAREN MITCHOFF, CHAIR: OKAY. ANY FURTHER QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS
