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LORI WILSON, CHAIR: WE'RE IN THE MIDST OF THE RHNA APPEALS 1 2 HEARING THAT HAVE BEEN PLACE. MEMBERS HAVE HAD THE OPPORTUNITY 3 TO ATTEND BOTH VIRTUALLY AND IN PERSON. THE HEARINGS HAVE RUN SMOOTHLY SO FAR, INCLUDING FROM A TECHNOLOGICAL STANDPOINT. 4 5 NOW, TODAY THE COMMITTEE'S PRELIMINARY ACTIONS ON THE APPEALS HAVE BEEN TO DENY ALL APPEALS APART FROM ONE APPEAL THAT WAS 6 GRANTED IN PART. THE PROCESS IS A TESTAMENT TO THE SOUNDNESS 7 8 OF THE RHNA METHODOLOGY ADOPTED BY THE EXECUTIVE BOARD. COMMITTEE MEMBERS ARE KEEPING A RUNNING LIST OF PLANNING AND 9 POLICY TOPICS EMERGING OVER THE COURSE OF THE RHNA APPEALS 10 DISCUSSION. I ENCOURAGE ANY MEMBER WHO HAS BEEN PARTICIPATING 11 IN THESE MEETINGS TO MAKE A COMMENT AFTER THE CHAIR'S REPORT. 12 THANK YOU. 13

LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU, MAYOR WILSON. AND I'LL JUST ADD SOME 15 16 BRIEF COMMENTS. I AM FRESH FROM SPENDING TIME THIS MORNING WITH SECRETARY OF HOUSING, MARCIA FUDGE, SHE IS RIGHT HERE IN 17 OAKLAND AS WE SPEAK. AND IT BRINGS TO MY MIND WHAT IS 18 HAPPENING AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL WITH REGARDS TO THE 19 RECONCILIATION, AND THE BUILD BACK BETTER LEGISLATION. FOR 20 21 THOSE OF YOU WHO WANT TO EXPRESS THE PRIORITY OF HOUSING, WE KNOW THAT, THAT CONGRESS WILL BE CALLED ON TO SKINNY DOWN WHAT 22 IS IN, YOU KNOW, THE BILL, AND SO I KNOW THAT, THAT HOUSING IS 23 SOMETHING THAT FOLKS NEED TO HEAR FROM US, IF THAT IS THE 24 PRIORITY FOR REMAINING IN THIS RECONCILIATION PACKAGE. 25

ESPECIALLY, YOU SHOULD KNOW THAT THE LOW-INCOME HOUSING TAX 1 2 CREDIT PROVISIONS, ARE THE INVESTMENT IN HOME AND CDBG, THE 3 NEW, IT'S CALLED UNLOCKING POSSIBILITIES, THEIR HOUSING PROGRAM, THOSE ARE ALL THINGS THAT POTENTIALLY COULD BE 4 5 REDUCED AS THIS PROCESS MOVES FORWARD. AND SO IT'S VERY IMPORTANT THAT WE ARE HEARD FROM. AND THEN, OF COURSE, AN 6 EXPANSION OF HOUSING CHOICE VOUCHERS. THOSE ARE ALL 7 8 POTENTIALLY AT RISK OF BEING REDUCED IN THE CURRENT PROCESS. SO, I ENCOURAGE YOU ALL, WHO THINK THAT THOSE ARE PRIORITIES 9 10 FOR THE BUILD BACK BETTER AGENDA, TO CONTACT YOUR CONGRESS MEMBER. I KNOW I HAVE CONTACTED MINE, AND CERTAINLY, IF YOU 11 HAVE ANY FRIENDS IN ARIZONA PLEASE ASK THEM TO GET INVOLVED. I 12 HEARD THAT IS A KEY STATE AT THIS MOMENT. ILL ALSO LOOK 13 FORWARD, TODAY WE'RE GOING TO HAVE A PRESENTATION ABOUT WHAT 14 IT IS POSSIBILITIES ARE, AND UNFORTUNATELY, MIGHT NOT BE, FOR 15 16 MEASURES ON THE NEXT BALLOT TO CREATE THE DESPERATELY NEEDED RESOURCES FOR, PARTICULARLY, HOUSING PRODUCTION. WE ALL 17 BELIEVE IN THE THREE P'S PRODUCE PRESERVE AND PROTECT. WE ALL 18 KNOW THAT THE CURRENT DIFFERENCE BETWEEN OUR RESOURCES AND OUR 19 RHNA REOUIREMENTS, THAT THERE IS A TREMENDOUS GAP. SO I'M VERY 20 21 EXCITED TO BE DISCUSSING WHAT THE ELECTION MAY HOLD, AS WELL AS HAVE A REALISTIC VIEW OF WHAT OUR TIMING MIGHT BE IN 22 PURSUING NEW FUNDING SOURCES, PARTICULARLY FOR THIS INNOVATIVE 23 REGIONAL AUTHORITY. 24	HEAR TODAY FROM RUTH BERNSTEIN, A POLLING GODDESS FROM EMC
25	STRATEGIES ON THE RECENT POLLING THAT THEY HAVE CONDUCTED.

REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU CHAIR SCHAFF, CHAIR WILSON, AND 9 COMMITTEE MEMBERS. IF STAFF COULD PLEASE PULL UP THE SLIDES. 10 GREAT. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AS CHAIR SCHAFF JUST NOTED, WE'RE 11 GOING TO HEAR FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE NON-PROFIT 12 HOUSING ASSOCIATION, AIMIE FISHMAN AND PRESIDENT OF EMC 13 RESEARCH REALLY WHAT TODAY'S DISCUSSION IS ABOUT IS VIABILITY 14 OF A REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE IN 2022 AS A BIGGER PICTURE 15 16 DISCUSSION OF WORK GOING FORWARD. THAT IS THE OUTLINE AND WE'RE ALSO GOING TO TALK ABOUT WHAT IS MTC/ABAG'S OPTIONS TO 17 KEEP MOVING THE BALL FORWARD AND MAKING PROGRESS ON OUR 18 HOUSING CRISIS OVER THE NEXT YEAR. AND WITH THAT, I WILL TURN 19 IT OVER TO AIMIE. NEXT SLIDE. 20

22 AMIE FISHMAN: GREAT THANK YOU ALL SO MUCH. THANK YOU FOR THE 23 INCREDIBLE WORK YOU HAVE DONE ON ESTABLISHING THE BAY AREA 24 HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, AND ALL THE WORK THAT WE HAVE BEEN 25 DOING TOGETHER. I AM HERE ON BEHALF OF BAY AREA HOUSING FOR

ALL, OR BAHA, WHICH IS YOUR PARTNERS IN THE COMMUNITY, WITH 1 MANY ORGANIZATIONS LEADING THE CHARGE TO SUPPORT US ALL IN 2 3 TACKLING THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND HOMELESS CRISIS ACROSS THE BAY AREA. AND OUR, JUST TO REMIND YOU, OUR CORE GOALS OF OUR 4 5 COALITION ARE TO RAISE \$500 MILLION TO A BILLION, ANNUALLY, FOR THE THREE P'S, PRODUCTION, PRESERVATION, AND PROTECTIONS 6 TO CREATE AN EFFECTIVE ACCOUNTABLE REGIONAL HOUSING FINANCE 7 8 AGENCY AND TO SUPPORT ALL OF THE HARD WORK OF BAHFA AND ABAG STAFF AS LEADERS AND PARTNERS TO STRENGTHEN OUR REGIONAL 9 PARTNERSHIPS TO EXPAND HOUSING AND ADVOCACY ORGANIZING ACROSS 10 THE REGION AND TO BUILD IS THE INFRASTRUCTURE THAT WE NEED TO 11 ADDRESS THE HOUSING CRISIS AT THE SCALE WITH THE RESOURCES 12 THAT WE NEED TO DO THAT. THAT'S THE IDEA. AND THE HOUSING 13 PROFIT FOR ALL LED BY NON-PROFIT HOUSING ASSOCIATION NORTHERN 14 CALIFORNIA ENTERPRISE COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS SAN FRANCISCO 15 16 FOUNDATION AND ALL HOME. WE'RE PLEASED TO HONOR AND CONTINUE THE HARD WORK THAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING TOGETHER. SO WE TOOK ON 17 DOING A POLL TO TEST ON YOU FAR WE WOULD GET FOR A NOVEMBER 18 2022 ELECTORATE WITH THE GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND AT \$10 19 BILLION FOR THE ENTIRE REGION, AND I WANT TO TURN IT OVER TO 20 21 RUTH BERNSTEIN OF EMC RESEARCH TO PRESENT THOSE FINDINGS. AND THEN I'LL BE BACK TO SUGGEST CONCLUSIONS AND NEXT STEPS. THANK 22 YOU. 23

RUTH BERNSTEIN: THANK YOU SO MUCH, AIMIE, WE DID A POLL OF BAY 1 AREA VOTERS -- LET'S GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE -- AND GO AHEAD AND 2 3 GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE AFTER THAT. AND I'LL GIVE YOU THE SHORT ANSWER, WE DID A POLL AND IT DOESN'T LOOK LIKE A GREAT 4 5 ENVIRONMENT THAT WOULD REQUIRE A BOND MEASURE THAT WOULD REQUIRE A TWO THIRDS SUPPORT. WE DID A BAY AREA WIDE POLL, 800 6 INTERVIEWS, MIXED-MODE. CONDUCTED IN AUGUST, BUT NOT A LOT HAS 7 8 CHANGED IN AUGUST SO WE FEEL LIKE THE RESULTS ARE PROBABLY STILL FRESH ENOUGH TO LOOK AT. LET'S GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE. 9 10 OVERALL, ATTITUDES, IN TERMS OF FUNDING PRIORITIES, WE ARE STILL SEEING HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS COME UP VERY HIGH. 11 HOMELESSNESS, 80 PERCENT SAY IS A PRIORITY FOR THE BAY AREA, 12 53% A VERY HIGH PRIORITY. EDUCATION, OF COURSE THIS POLL WAS 13 DONE RIGHT BEFORE SCHOOL STARTED A LOT OF PEOPLE WERE 14 15 CONCERNED TO MAKE SURE KIDS WERE BACK IN SCHOOL, HIGH PRIORITY 16 OF COURSE, CORONAVIRUS 75% HIGH PRIORITY FUNDING CLIMATE CHANGE, HOUSING PRIORITY 68% 39 VERY, VERY HIGH PRIORITY. 17 LET'S GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE. THEN, BUT WHAT WE ARE ALSO SEEING 18 IS INCREASING TAX HESITANCY. WE HAVE BEEN SEEING THIS IN A LOT 19 OF OUR POLLING SO THIS OUESTION WE HAVE BEEN ASKING OVER TIME 20 IS TAXES IN THE BAY AREA ARE HIGH ENOUGH, I WOULD VOTE AGAINST 21 ANY TAX INCREASE. WE KNOW SOME PEOPLE SAY YES TO THAT BUT THEN 22 WILL GO ON AND VOTE YES TO A MEASURE. BUT WE HAVE IN THIS 23 POLL, 62% THAT AGREE WITH THAT STATEMENT, THAT THEY THINK 24 25 TAXES ARE TOO HIGH, THEY WILL VOTE AGAINST ANY TAX INCREASE,

AND WHAT WE'RE LOOKING FOR IS TRENDS OVER TIME. ONLY TWO --1 ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO, NOVEMBER 2019, 48% AGREED WITH THAT 2 3 STATEMENT, AND THEN IN MAY OF 2020 EVEN THOUGH DURING CORONAVIRUS, 57% AGREED WITH THAT, AND NOW WE'RE UP TO 62. SO 4 5 WE ARE SEEING INCREASED TAX SENSITIVITY AND WE BELIEVE A LOT OF THAT IS AROUND UNCERTAINTY IN THE ECONOMY. THINGS HAVE BEEN 6 CHANGING A LOT BECAUSE OF COVID AND THERE JUST A LOT OF 7 8 UNCERTAINTY. ON THE NEXT PAGE, ALSO ON THIS QUESTION E AGAIN, AROUND TAX SENSITIVITY, I WOULD SUPPORT INVESTING IN 9 10 AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE BAY AREA, EVEN IF IT MEANS RAISING TAXES. WE ARE ALSO SEEING THAT DISAGREEMENT GO UP ON THAT ONE. 11 ASSOCIATION 52%, I AGREE THEY WOULD INVEST IN AFFORDABLE 12 HOUSING, EVEN IF IT MEANS RAISING TAXES AND THAT'S DOWN FROM 13 57%, WHAT WE WERE SEEING BEFORE. NOT AS MUCH OF A SHIFT, BUT 14 DEFINITELY A CONCERN. AND IT'S CERTAINLY BELOW TWO THIRDS. 15 16 THEN ON THE NEXT PAGE, WE DID ASK A BALLOT QUESTION. IT WAS 17 VERY -- THE SAME QUESTION THAT WE HAD ASKED IN OUR POLLING IN 2020. SO, YOU CAN SEE HERE, WE ASKED ABOUT A \$10 BILLION 18 GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND TO FUND STABLE HOUSING FOR HOMELESS. 19 CHILDREN AND FAMILIES, HOUSING THAT MIGHT INCLUDE MENTAL 20 21 HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES, LOCAL HOUSING THAT'S AFFORDABLE FOR VULNERABLE RESIDENTS, SENIORS, VETERANS AND 22 PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES. WE SEE 63% SAID THEY WOULD VOTE YES 23 FOR THAT MEASURE, 38% NO. ALMOST IDENTICAL TO THE POLL THAT WE 24 DID IN THE SPRING OF 2020, WHERE WE WERE AT 60/36. SO, AGAIN, 25

IT'S CERTAINLY ABOVE A MAJORITY. IF WE ONLY NEEDED A MAJORITY, 1 IT WOULD PROBABLY, YOU KNOW, GO ON TO BE SUCCESSFUL. BUT WHEN 2 3 WE NEED THE 2-3RDS, THIS IS DEFINITELY BELOW THAT 2/THIRD'S LEVEL. TO PUT IN CONTEXT IT MIGHT BE CONFUSING BUT IN 2021 WE 4 5 DID A POLL 60% YES, BOND, 38, NO. AT THE TIME IN PROPORTION, BACK IN MAY, ALL DONE DURING THE PANDEMIC PRIOR TO THE 6 PANDEMIC WE DID POLLING AND SAW HIGHER SUPPORT SO IN THE FALL 7 8 OF 2019 WE HAD A POLL THAT SHOWED SUPPORT FOR MEASURE AT 67% WINTER 65% WE BELIEVE THIS IS DUE TO UNCERTAINTY AND CHANGE 9 10 THAT HAPPENED WITH THE PANDEMIC. WE DON'T KNOW WHAT'S GOING HAPPEN. PEOPLE MAY BE FEELING GREAT OFF IN THE FUTURE AND WE 11 MIGHT SEE SUPPORT INCREASED, IT ALSO COULD BE THAT THIS 12 CONTINUES FOR A WHILE. ON THE NEXT PAGE, WHAT WE ARE SEEING IS 13 THAT THERE IS STILL A LOT OF SUPPORT FOR WHAT A BOND WOULD DO. 14 15 SO THESE WERE HERE ARE SOME THINGS A BOND WOULD DO AND YOU SEE 16 VERY HIGH SUPPORT ACROSS THE BOARD 80% OR MORE LOCAL HOUSING THAT'S AFFORDABLE FOR VULNERABLE RESIDENTS, STATE HOUSING FOR 17 THE HOMELESS, HOUSING AFFORDABILITY, CREATING JOBS WITH 18 AFFORDABLE HOUSING, ALL OF THIS, EVERYTHING IS STRONGLY 19 SUPPORTED. THEN ON THE NEXT PAGE, WE ALSO -- SO -- JUST MOVING 20 21 -- SORRY -- I THOUGHT I HAD ANOTHER ONE. I'LL JUST JUMP TO THE CONCLUSION. WHAT WE SEE IS DEFINITELY THERE IS SUPPORT FOR THE 22 CONCEPT OF WHAT A BOND WOULD PAY FOR, AND THERE IS SOME 23 CONCERN, CERTAINLY, AROUND HOUSING AFFORDABILITY AND 24 25 HOMELESSNESS. BUT TAX SENSITIVITY IS INCREASING, ESPECIALLY

ALONG WITH, KIND OF, ECONOMIC, AND POLITICAL UNCERTAINTY, AND
IT APPEARS, AS OF RIGHT NOW A HOUSING BOND NEEDED AT 2/3RDS
DOESN'T SEEM VIABLE IN 2022 AND WE CAN CERTAINLY SEE HOW
THINGS CAN CHANGE IN THE FUTURE FOR 2021 AND POTENTIALLY OTHER
OPTIONS AND I WILL TURN IT BACK TO AMIE TO TALK ABOUT THAT,
AND OF COURSE I WILL ANSWER QUESTIONS AFTER THAT. THANK YOU SO
MUCH.

AMIE FISHMAN: NEXT SLIDE. I WANT TO UNDERSCORE SOMETHING ABOUT 9 RUTH'S COMMENTS. HOW HARD IT IS TO GET TO A TWO THIRD'S 10 THRESHOLD SUPER MAJORITY AT 67 -- 67% I THINK ABOUT THE 11 ELECTIONS OUT THERE HOW MUCH WE WOULD LOSE IF THE SUPER 12 MAJORITY THRESHOLD WAS APPLIED, WE HAVE A LANDSLIDE SUPPORT --13 OUR CONCLUSIONS COMING FROM THE BOND IS THAT WE NEED TO WAIT 14 UNTIL 2024 TO TRY AGAIN TO GET A BIGGER PRESIDENTIAL TURN OUT 15 16 TO HAVE POTENTIALLY A STRONGER ECONOMIC CLIMATE AND LESS TAX SENSITIVITY AND THAT THAT'S GOING TO BE NEEDED TO ACHIEVE A 17 TWO THIRD'S SUPER MAJORITY OF VOTERS. WHILE WE'RE WAITING, 18 MEANWHILE, WE CAN STILL PURSUE A PROPOSAL THAT HAS BEEN ON THE 19 TABLE FOR A WHILE, WHICH IS TO LOWER THE VOTER THRESHOLD, OR 20 FOR GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO 55% THROUGH A CONSTITUTIONAL 21 AMENDMENT, THIS IS EXACTLY WHAT HAPPENED IN THE YEAR 2,000 22 WITH SCHOOL BONDS. SO SCHOOL BONDS CAN GO FORWARD WITH LOCAL 23 COMMUNITIES WITH A 55% VOTER THRESHOLD AND WE'RE LOOKING TO BE 24 ABLE TO DO SOMETHING SIMILAR FOR HOUSING INVESTMENTS AND IT'S 25

POSSIBLE TO DO THAT KIND OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT THROUGH 1 A, EITHER LEGISLATIVELY, OR PETITIONING ON TO A BALLOT, AND 2 3 YOU MAY KNOW THAT THERE HAVE BEEN OPTIONS TO, FOR DEDICATED REVENUE MEASURES, TO PETITION ON TO THE BALLOT FOR A SIMPLE 4 5 MAJORITY THRESHOLD BUT THAT'S ACTUALLY NOT POSSIBLE FOR A GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND BECAUSE THAT'S WRITTEN INTO THE 6 CONSTITUTION TO HAVE A SUPER MAJORITY SO IT NEEDS A 7 8 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO CHANGE THAT. SO WE COULD EXPLORE THIS, BOTH THIS NEXT YEAR, AND IN A COUPLE OF YEARS, BUT THIS 9 SHOULD BE SOMETHING ON THE TABLE THAT'S OUR CONCLUSION TO 10 CONTINUE TO PURSUE. NEXT SLIDE. HERE ARE WHAT WE THINK ARE THE 11 OPTIONS NOW THAT REFLECT WHAT WE JUST SHARED ON THE PRIOR 12 SLIDE, BUT JUST KIND OF AN OVERVIEW OF ALL THE OPTIONS THAT WE 13 HAVE BEEN EXPLORING. SO, A.B. 1487, THE LEGISLATION IN 2019 14 LED BY DAVID CHIU THAT GAVE US THE OPPORTUNITY TO GO ON TO THE 15 16 BALLOT WITH REVENUE AND OPTIONS, THERE ARE THE FOUR REVENUE OPTIONS. THE GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND, WHICH WE WERE JUST 17 TALKING ABOUT, THERE IS ALSO A HEAD TAX OR GROSS RECEIPTS TAX. 18 THE CHALLENGE WITH THOSE TWO REVENUE SOURCES IS THAT THEY 19 GENERATE A LIMITED SCALE, AND THERE ALSO WOULD GENERATE 20 CONCERN FROM THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY. SO, THE -- IT LEADS US TO 21 NOT WANT TO SERIOUSLY GO DOWN THAT PATHWAY UNLESS WE -- THERE 22 IS, SORT OF, GENERAL SUPPORT FOR THOSE OPTIONS. BUT GIVEN BOTH 23 OF THOSE CONCERNS, WE'RE LOOKING FARTHER. A PARCEL TAX IS ALSO 24 AN OPTION IN THE LEGISLATION. BUT THAT ALSO IS LIMITED IN 25

SCALE. THERE IS SOME POTENTIAL TO BOND AGAINST THE REVENUE, 1 2 AND THEN ONCE VOTERS HAVE PASSED A PARCEL TAX THEN MTC AND 3 ABAG CAN DO A COMMERCIAL LINKAGE FEE. SO WE'RE EXPLORING THIS FURTHER BUT CONCERNED BECAUSE OF THE LIMITED SCALE AND A 4 5 PARCEL TAX WOULD ALSO NEED TO GET A TWO THIRD'S SUPER MAJORITY. HOWEVER, WE COULD CONSIDER PETITIONING UNDER THE 6 LOWER VOTER THRESHOLD WE COULD CONSIDER PETITIONING ON TO THE 7 8 BALLOT AS A CITIZEN INITIATIVE FOR ONE OF THOSE REVENUE MECHANISMS ABOVE ASIDE FROM THE GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND 9 HOWEVER THE COURT CASES ARE NOT YET SETTLED SO THEY COULD GET 10 STUCK IN DELAY SO IT MAY NOT BE WORTH MOVING FORWARD PETITIONS 11 ON THE BALLOT OR REVENUE IN 2022 FOR A COUPLE OF YEARS THERE 12 ARE A NUMBER OF MEASURES RIGHT NOW GOING THROUGH THEIR LEGAL 13 PROCESS IT COULD BE DECIDED IN SIX MONTHS TIME THAT THAT IS A 14 CONCERN. AND THEN WHAT WE TALKED ABOUT THE SECOND OPTION TO 15 16 LOWER THE VOTER THRESHOLD AROUND A STATEWIDE BALLOT TO MEASURE THE LOWER THRESHOLD FOR GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR HOUSING 17 TO 55% SIMILAR TO SCHOOL BONDS, AND THAT COULD BE DONE EITHER 18 THROUGH LEGISLATION OR AS AN INITIATIVE. AND THEN FINALLY THE 19 THIRD OPTION THAT WE WANT TO KEEP ON THE TABLE IS TO CONTINUE 20 21 TO PURSUE A GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND IN 2024. THE REASON IS BECAUSE THAT MISSING UNCOMFORTABLE GETS US TO SCALE WITH \$10 22 BILLION, WE COULD DON'T DO IT IF THERE ARE MORE FAVORABLE 23 CONDITIONS ALONGSIDE DO A GENERAL BOND THEN REALLY CRITICAL 24 25 FOR US TO LOOK AT RESOURCES BECAUSE A BOND CAN ONLY BE USED

FOR CAPITAL AND WE KNOW THAT WE NEED CRITICAL RESOURCES FOR
 PROTECTIONS SERVICES AND HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION AS WELL. WE
 CONTINUE TO PURSUE MULTIPLE OPTIONS TO MAXIMIZE WHAT OUR
 OPPORTUNITIES ARE AND IMPACTS. NEXT SLIDE. BACK TO YOU
 REBECCA.

REBECCA LONG: NEXT STEPS FOR THE REMAINDER OF 2021 WE'RE GOING 7 8 DEVELOPING AND FINALIZING OUR ADVOCACY PROGRAM WHICH COULD INCLUDE CONSIDERATION OF SUPPORT FOR A CONSTITUTIONAL 9 AMENDMENT TO LOWER THE VOTER THRESHOLD FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING 10 BONDS AND LOOKING AHEAD TO 2022 ADOPTING ADVOCACY PROGRAM 11 WOULD BE WORKING AT SUPPORTING THAT ON THE COMMISSION AND ABAG 12 HAS THE OPTION OF TAKING A POSITION ON THE STATEWIDE BALLOT 13 MEASURE. WHAT WE HAVEN'T TALKED ABOUT IN THIS IS THE BEGINNING 14 15 OF THE PILOT PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION USING THE \$20 MILLION THAT 16 WE GOT IN SEED FUNDING FROM THE LEGISLATURE TO IMPLEMENT THESE REALLY PERSONALITY PILOTS WHICH ARE REALLY TIED IN WITH A 17 BALLOT MEASURE BECAUSE IT'S GOING TO BE OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO 18 DEMONSTRATE THE VALUE-ADD THAT BAHFA CAN PROVIDE. AND ALSO 19 SUPPORTING LOCAL AND STATE BALLOT MEASURES CONSISTENT WITH 20 21 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 HOUSING GOALS AND RHNA IMPLEMENTATION AND RANGING IN DISCUSSIONS ABOUT A REGIONAL FUNDING MEASURE IN 22 NOVEMBER 2024. SO THAT'S A LOT FOR YOU TO DIGEST JUST NOW, BUT 23 WE TURN IT BACK OVER TO YOU, CHAIR SCHAFF, FOR DISCUSSIONS AND 24 25 QUESTIONS. THANK YOU.

MARGARET ABE-KOGA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH TO CHAIR AND STAFF FOR 7 8 THE PRESENTATION. I HAVE A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS IN REGARDS TO THE, LOWER THE THRESHOLD TO 55%, I RECALL, IF I REMEMBER 9 10 CORRECTLY, TWO YEARS AGO, THERE WAS LEGISLATION THAT WAS INTRODUCED -- I REMEMBER, IT WAS LIKE, NUMBER FIVE, I CAN'T 11 REMEMBER IF IT WAS AC OR SB, TO TAKE EXISTING LEGISLATION AND 12 INCLUDE AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AS SOMETHING THAT COULD BE PASSED 13 AT 55%. COULD YOU -- I CAN'T REMEMBER THE STATUS, COULD YOU 14 15 REMIND ME WHAT HAPPENED TO THAT? AND, I GUESS THAT WOULD MAYBE 16 BE A PRECURSOR TO THE LIKELIHOOD OF THIS COMING UP AGAIN.

18 AMIE FISHMAN: ABSOLUTELY REBECCA DID YOU WANT TO ANSWER THAT?19 OR DID YOU WANT ME TO?

21 REBECCA LONG: I CAN TAKE A STAB AT IT. DIRECTOR ABE-KOGA THERE 22 ARE MANY THRESHOLDS TO LOWER FOR TRANSPORTATION AND THERE IS 23 CURRENTLY A PROPOSAL BY ASSEMBLYMEMBER AGUIAR-CURRY, IT'S HC 24 EIGHT, HOWEVER PURSUING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT INITIATES 25 LEGISLATIVELY NEEDS A TWO THIRDS VOTE. IT'S BEEN PROPOSED BUT

NEVER GOTTEN A HEARING. THAT'S NOT TRUE FOR PRIOR MEASURES
 SOMETIMES THEY HAVE GOTTEN FURTHER ALONG IN THE 20 YEARS I
 HAVE BEEN DOING THIS IT'S TALKED ABOUT BUT NEVER REACHED THE
 BALLOT EFFORT THAT WAS A VOTER INITIATIVE MEASURE FOR
 EDUCATION.

7 MARGARET ABE-KOGA: DO YOU THINK A VOTER INITIATIVE IS MORE
8 DOABLE THAN A LEGISLATIVE? I GUESS I'M SURPRISED THAT, GIVEN
9 OUR LEGISLATURE IS SUPER MAJORITY DEMOCRAT.

11 REBECCA LONG: GREAT QUESTION. WE HAVE GOTTEN SOME FEEDBACK WE 12 HAVE BEEN TALKING TO ASSEMBLYMEMBER AGUIAR CURRY, THIS 13 PARTICULARLY IS GOING TO BE CHALLENGING ON A LOT OF LEVELS IN 14 SACRAMENTO, THERE'S GOING TO BE A NUMBER OF ELECTIONS IN 15 NOVEMBER 2022, SO IF YOU'RE LOOKING AT 2022 IT SEEMS LIKE THE 16 INITIATIVE ROUTE IS MORE VIABLE.

MARGARET ABE-KOGA: THANK YOU. ANOTHER QUESTION ON A.B. 1487, 18 YOU MENTIONED THE COMMERCIAL LINKAGE FEES, AND HEAD TAX GROSS 19 RECEIPTS TAX, WE, IN OUR CITY, IN THE LAST FEW YEARS, WE HAVE 20 21 DONE A BUSINESS LICENSE TAX BASED ON EMPLOYEE COUNT. WE DID GET SOME OPPOSITION, AND SOME BUSINESS COMMUNITY MEMBERS 22 OPPOSED A HEAD TAX, SOME OPPOSED A GROSS RECEIPTS TAX, AND 23 SOMEWHERE SAYING DO THE OTHER. AND I GUESS MY REAL QUESTION 24 25 IS, HOW WOULD A REGION-WIDE MEASURE -- TAX -- ANY OF THESE --

INTERACT WITH, LIKE A CITY, LIKE OURS THAT ALREADY HAS
 SOMETHING LIKE THAT?

REBECCA LONG: THAT'S A GREAT OUESTION. SO A.B. 1487 LAYS OUT 4 5 THE STRUCTURE FOR ALL OF THESE DIFFERENT OPTIONS. FOR THE COMMERCIAL LINKAGE FEE, IT CAPS A PER SQUARE FOOT COMMERCIAL 6 RATE AT \$10, AND SO IF A LOCAL JURISDICTION HAS A COMMERCIAL 7 8 LINKAGE FEE THAT'S TIED TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING, AND LET'S SAY IT'S \$15, THEN THE FEE CANNOT BE IMPOSED IN THAT JURISDICTION. 9 IF IT WAS \$4, THEN IT COULD GO UP TO SIX. SO THERE IS A CAP 10 THERE. FOR HEAD TAXES AND COMMERCIAL LINKAGE -- EXCUSE ME --11 GROSS RECEIPTS TAX, THERE IS NOT A TIE-IN BACK TO THE LOCAL 12 RATE, IF THAT DOES EXIST, SO IT WOULD JUST BE ON TOP OF 13 14 WHATEVER THE LOCAL RATE IS.

MARGARET ABE-KOGA: OKAY. I'M SURE WE'LL DISCUSS ALL THAT IN MORE DETAIL DOWN THE ROAD. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

AWAY FOR ALL OF THIS AND OVERALL WHAT I SEE AS OPPORTUNITY FOR 1 OUR MOMENT IS TO PUT THIS ON THE INITIATIVE ROUTE. IT'S A 2 3 PRETTY BIG EFFORT BUT I DO BELIEVE THAT IS A PATHWAY FORWARD. AND QUITE HONESTLY, I THINK IT'S GOING TO ALLOW US TO DO THE 4 5 WORK WE NEED TO DO AND PUT US IN A POSITION OF A VERY COMPETITIVE SPOT. I THINK WE NEED TO RESIST THE TEMPTATION OF 6 ADDING TO IT I THINK WE HAVE TO BE LASER FOCUSED ON WHAT WE 7 8 WANT TO DO AND I BELIEVE THAT PATHWAY IS THE BEST ROUTE. THANK YOU CHAIR SCHAFF. 9 10 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU. COMMISSIONER RONEN. 11 12 DIR. HILLARY RONEN: THANK YOU, CHAIR SCHAFF. A COUPLE OF 13 QUESTIONS. DO YOU HAVE THE DATA PER COUNTY? I'M CURIOUS IF IT 14 15 REACHED THE TWO THIRD LEVELS IN SOME COUNTIES AND NOT OTHERS? 16 OR IT WAS ACROSS THE BOARD IT DID NOT GET THERE? 17 RUTH BERNSTEIN: YEAH, THE -- WE DO HAVE IT BY COUNTY, AND 18 THERE ARE SOME DIFFERENCES THAT WE NORMALLY SEE, SO, THE IS A 19 LITTLE BIT HIGHER IN ALAMEDA AND SAN FRANCISCO THAN WE SEE IN 20 21 OTHER COUNTIES, BASED ON IDEOLOGY, BUT IT'S NOT A SLAM DUNK ANYWHERE, SUPPORT WAS SOFTER EVERYWHERE THAN NORMALLY THAN WE 22 23 HAVE SEEN IN THE PAST.

HILLARY RONEN: AND ANOTHER OUESTION IS -- SORRY -- I LOST MY TRAIN OF THOUGHT T I HAVE ANOTHER ONE. COME BACK TO ME. I 6 7 JUST LOST MY OTHER QUESTION. 8 LIBBY SCHAAF: ALL RIGHT. I PROMISE I'LL COME BACK TO YOU. I'LL 9 10 GO TO THE NEWLY REELECTED CHAIR OF ABAG, JESSE ARREQUIN. 11 JESSE ARREGUIN: THANK YOU CHAIR SCHAFF. I WANTED TO FOLLOW UP 12 ON CHAIR PEDROZA'S COMMENTS AND CLARIFY, INITIATIVE WOULD BE 13 DONE OUTSIDE OF OUR AGENCY, THAT WOULD BE SOMETHING THAT 14 15 INDIVIDUALS WOULD HAVE TO INITIATE PRIVATELY. I DO THINK IT'S 16 IMPORTANT THAT WE TALK A POSITION AS AN AGENCY IN SUPPORTING THE LOWER THE THRESHOLD FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING BOND AND THAT'S 17 CONSISTENT WITH ASSEMBLYMEMBER AGUIAR-CURRY'S LEGISLATION AND 18 LEGISLATION FOR THE -- I THINK WE WERE ALL VERY DISAPPOINTED 19 LOOKING AT THE POLLING RESULTS THAT DOESN'T MEAN WE SHOULD NOT 20 21 STOP OUR EFFORTS TO TRY TO FIND A WAY TO ADDRESS OUR AFFORDABLE HOUSING CRISIS IN THE BAY AREA IT CONTINUES TO BE 22 ONE OF THE GREATEST CHALLENGES THAT WE FACE. AND I THINK 23 TRYING TO SEE IF WE CAN TAKE A LEGISLATIVE ROUTE, LAUNCHING 24 THE PILOT PROGRAMS THEN THANKING THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA FOR 25

THE \$20 MILLION, AND REALLY TRYING TO BUILD THE MOMENTUM SO 1 2 THAT IN 2024 WE'RE POSITIONED TO BE ABLE TO BE SUCCESSFUL I THINK IS THE BEST PATH. WE DON'T WANT TO PUT SOMETHING ON THE 3 BALLOT THAT ONE, WOULDN'T GENERATE ENOUGH RESOURCES TO ADDRESS 4 5 THE SCALE OF THE PROBLEM THAT WE HAVE IN THE BAY AREA AND TWO, WON'T BE SUCCESSFUL BECAUSE WE COULDN'T REACH THAT TWO THIRD'S 6 THRESHOLD. SO I THINK THIS TWO STEP APPROACH TO SEE IF WE CAN 7 8 LOWER THE THRESHOLD SO THAT WHEN WE DO GO OUT IN 2024, THAT WE'RE WELL POSITIONED TO PASS IT, I THINK IS THE RIGHT STEP. 9 10 WILL ALSO SAY THE CONVERSATIONS AROUND HOUSING AND TRANSPORTATION MEASURES IN 2024, HOUSING IS THE PRIORITY. I 11 THINK WE HAVE TO PRIORITIZE HOUSING. YOU KNOW, NO OFFENSE TO 12 THOSE WHO ARE ADVOCATING FOR TRANSPORTATION. BUT, YOU KNOW, 13 WITH ALL THE RESOURCES WITH THE FEDERAL INFRASTRUCTURE BILL 14 15 FOR TRANSPORTATION, AND WE DON'T KNOW WHETHER WE'RE GOING TO 16 GET MONEY FOR HOUSING, WE DESPERATELY NEED TO PASS A REGIONAL 17 HOUSING MEASURE. THAT, I THINK SHOULD BE OUR PRIORITY. SO, THANK YOU. 18

20 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU, MAYOR ARREGUIN. PRESIDENT ARREGUIN,
21 ALL YOUR HONORIFICS. COMMISSIONER RONEN.

22

23 DIR. HILLARY RONEN: I NEED TO START TAKING THE FLAXSEED OIL. I
24 HEAR THAT WORKS. [LAUGHTER] BUILT BETTER BACK, AND MAYOR
25 SCHAFF GIVEN THAT YOU WERE WITH MARTHA FUDGE TODAY, WHETHER

IT'S THE ORIGINAL VERSION, ARE THE SCALES, THE LEANER VERSION, 1 MAY SOMETHING PLEASE PASS. WOULD THE MONEY FOR HOUSING, WOULD 2 3 IT POSSIBLY COME TO A REGIONAL BODY LIKE OURS? I'M CURIOUS --I'M SO ANXIOUS, TO GET THIS BODY UP AND RUNNING, AND WORKING 4 5 REGIONALLY TO FIX OUR HOUSING -- OUR CRISIS. AND 20 MILLION, IT'S SOMETHING, IT'S A START, BUT WE ALL KNOW THAT'S NOTHING 6 FOR WHAT WE NEED. AND, I'M JUST CURIOUS, IF IT DOES PASS, IF 7 8 BAHFA WOULD GET -- WOULD BE THE RECIPIENT OF THOSE FUNDS? OR IF IT WOULD BE PER COUNTY. DOES ANYBODY KNOW THE ANSWER TO 9 10 THAT?

11

12 **LIBBY SCHAAF:** REBECCA?

13

REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU, MAYOR SCHAFF. DIRECTOR RONEN, WE HAVE 14 15 BEEN WORKING WITH DIRECTLY WITH OUR BAY AREA PARTNERS FOR ALLOWING BAHFA TO BE ABLE TO APPLY FOR SOME OF THE GRANTS, ONE 16 OF THESE IS UNLOCKING THE POSSIBILITIES PROGRAM. YOU KNOW, THE 17 MAJOR PROGRAMS THAT FUND AFFORDABLE HOUSING, COMMUNITY 18 DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANTS AND THE LOW-INCOME HOUSING CREDIT TAX 19 CREDITS THOSE WOULDN'T BE -- WE AGREE IT'S AN OPPORTUNITY FOR 20 BAHFA TO POTENTIALLY RECEIVE SOME OF THE NEW PROGRAM FUNDING 21 SO WE'RE TRYING TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE ELIGIBLE IN THAT. 22 THAT'S NOT OUR PRIORITY WE WOULD BE ELIGIBLE FOR PLANNING 23 FUNDS BUT NOT ON THE CAPITAL SIDE. 24

25

THERESE MCMILLAN: IF I COULD ADD, REBECCA YOUR OBSERVATION IS 1 RIGHT ON POINT. IT'S INTERESTING IN TRANSPORTATION REGIONAL 2 AGENCIES HOUSING HAS HAD A BIG FOOTPRINT BUT HOUSING HAS BEEN 3 LOCAL AND ON A PARALLEL PATH WITH NEW INITIATIVES WE WOULD 4 5 WANT THAT ELIGIBLE BUILT IN BUT WE SHOULD KEEP WORKING WITH HUDSON ON ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES TO EXISTING PROGRAMS WHERE IT 6 MAY NOT REQUIRE LEGISLATIVE CHANGE. BUT COULD, YOU KNOW, BE 7 8 INCORPORATED INTO, AGAIN, THINGS THAT THE ADMINISTRATION ITSELF COULD ADVANCE. SO JUST WANTED TO TAKE YOUR REALLY WISE 9 10 OBSERVATION AND SAY THERE MIGHT BE OTHER WAYS TO PURSUE IT AS WELL. 11

13 DIR. HILLARY RONEN: THANKS.

14

15 LIBBY SCHAAF: VICE CHAIR OF THE BAHFA OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.
16 AMIE WORTH?

17

AMY R. WORTH: I WANT TO FOLLOW UP ON THE OUESTIONS THAT 18 HILLARY HAD AND WHAT OUR CHAIR RAISED WITH THE SECRETARY, WITH 19 THE TAX CREDIT, AND PROJECTS, YOU COBBLE TOGETHER LOTS OF 20 21 MONEY SOURCES, SO TAX CREDITS, LOCAL MONEY, FREELAND, YOU KNOW, CITY MITIGATION -- YOU KNOW, IN LIEU FEES, WHATEVER, 22 WHATEVER THE CONCERNS THAT'S BEEN OUT THERE IS THE COST OF 23 DOING THESE UNITS. SO THEY USED TO BE 500; WE'RE NOW UP TO 750 24 25 A DOOR. I COULD BE EXAGGERATING, BUT IT'S A PRETTY HIGH

NUMBER. YOU HEAR A BILLION DOLLARS AND GO THAT'S A PRETTY HIGH 1 NUMBER. WHEN WEAN VISION A BOND DO WE ENVISION THAT WILL BE A 2 3 PORTION AND THEN THE INDIVIDUAL PROJECTS WILL PUT TOGETHER THESE OTHER FUNDING SOURCES? SO MY OUESTION IS HOW WOULD THAT 4 5 BE -- SO WHEN WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THE NUMBER OF DOORS THAT A BOND MIGHT PRODUCE, IT WOULD BE HELPFUL -- AND I RECOGNIZE THE 6 COST OF BUILDING A, YOU KNOW, A PROJECT IN, YOU KNOW, IN, SAY, 7 8 OAKLEY OR BRENTWOOD IS VERY DIFFERENT FROM SAN FRANCISCO IN THE LAND COST. DO WE HAVE THINGS -- I AM ASSUMING THE BOND 9 ISN'T GOING TO PROVIDE 100% IT'S GOING TO PROVIDE A PORTION 10 AND PART OF THAT IS GETTING THE WORD OUT TO THE PUBLIC THAT 11 THIS MONEY WILL GENERATE X -- REALLY WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE. 12 SO I'M JUST WONDERING IF THERE IS ANY INFORMATION THAT WE 13 COULD HAVE NOW OR LATER THAT MIGHT HELP US, AND I COMPLETELY 14 AGREE WITH THE MAYOR ABOUT ADVOCATING FOR, AND THERESE, AT THE 15 16 FEDERAL LEVEL. BECAUSE THOSE TAX CREDITS ARE, LIKE, GOLD. THEY'RE REALLY ONES THAT THE NON-PROFIT, THESE HOUSING 17 PROJECTS CAN USE, AND YOU KNOW, I THINK MOST OF -- A LOT OF 18 THE PROJECTS I KNOW OF HAVE BEEN BUILT THAT WAY. YOU KNOW? ALL 19 OF THESE OTHER THINGS THAT WE'RE LOOKING AT WHILE WE'RE 20 LOOKING AT LONGER TERM THINK, I THINK, ARE REALLY HELPFUL. 21 22

23 **REBECCA LONG:** THROUGH THE CHAIR?

24

25 LIBBY SCHAAF: PLEASE. PLEASE KNOW RESPOND, THANK YOU.

1

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REBECCA LONG: COMMISSIONER WORTH, THANKS FOR THAT QUESTION. IT 2 3 WAS SOMETHING WE GAVE CONSIDERATION TO, IN FACT, THE PROVISIONS OF A.B. 1487 REQUIRE THAT WE PROVIDE SOME ESTIMATES 4 5 OF THE IMPACTS OF THE REVENUE. SO WE WERE THINKING ABOUT HOW ARE WE GOING TO DO THAT. AND SO WE DEFINITELY ASSUME -- AND I 6 AM SURE AMIE FISHMAN CAN EXPAND ON THIS, YOU KNOW, FOR THE 7 8 FINANCING, IT'S NOT GOING TO BE THAT A PROJECT IS RELYING ENTIRELY ON THE BAHFA PIECE OF IT, AND SO I THINK WE WERE 9 IMAGINING IT WAS SOMEWHERE IN THE 200,000 RANGE. AND SO YOU'RE 10 LOOKING AT THE FULL SUITE OF OPTIONS THAT DEVELOPERS HAVE FOR 11 A GIVEN PROJECT. AMIE, DID YOU WANT TO ADD ANYTHING TO THAT? 12 13

AMIE FISHMAN: THAT WAS GREAT. THE ONLY THING I WOULD SAY IS, 14 15 ON ONE HAND, ONE OF THE BIG PIECES TO, THAT'S LIKE A SELLING 16 POINT IS HOW MUCH THIS MONEY LEVERAGES BILLIONS OF DOLLARS. 17 AND THAT'S, YOU KNOW, YOU CREATE -- YOU GENERATE THIS MONEY LOCALLY, JUST LIKE SOME OF THE LOCAL BOND MEASURES HAVE PASSED 18 IN CITIES AND COUNTIES AND THAT LEVERAGES ALL THE FEDERAL AND 19 STATE DOLLARS. ON THE OTHER HAND, YOUR EXACTLY RIGHT, BECAUSE 20 YOU, WHEN YOU ADD IN ALL OF THESE DIFFERENT SOURCES, IT'S 21 COMPLICATE, AND COSTLY. SO WE NEED SOME COMBINATION OF A 22 STREAMLINED APPROACH, BUT WE ABSOLUTELY USE THESE DOLLARS AS 23 LEVERAGE AND THIS LEVERAGE IS GOLD, TO BE ABLE TO BE 24 COMPETITIVE FOR ALL THE OTHER SOURCES. 25

AMY R. WORTH: SO, JUST, IF I MAY FOLLOW UP, THROUGH THE CHAIR, 2 3 SO ONE MORE CONVERSATION AT A GATHERING ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF BONDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING, YOU COULD USE THE NUMBER 4 5 200,000, 200,000, BASICALLY, IS TO SAY, IF YOU LOOK AT A LEVERAGING NUMBER. SO, IN OTHER WORDS, I -- IT -- WHAT -- SO, 6 IF A -- LET'S -- SO WHAT YOU COULD SAY IS YOU COULD USE THAT 7 8 AS A PERCENTAGE, WHAT WOULD YOU -- HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE -- I MEAN YOU COULD SAY THESE ARE LEVERAGE OTHER DOLLARS -- AND, I 9 DON'T NEED TO KNOW THIS NOW. JUST TO SAY IT'S A POINT WHERE IT 10 WOULD BE HELPFUL FOR US TO SUPPORT AND WE ENCOURAGING PEOPLE 11 TO SHOW HOW WE DOLLARS, YOU NEED THESE DOLLARS TO LEVERAGE 12 BECAUSE THE OTHER SOURCES AREN'T ENOUGH. SO IF THERE IS A WAY 13 TO TAKE IT, SAY, YOU BREAK DOWN THAT HIGH NUMBER OF 750, AND 14 15 YOU KNOW, YOU TALK A DIFFERENT NUMBER AS A MULTIPLIER, OR A 16 DIVIDING NUMBER, WHICH, YOU KNOW, AGAIN, I THINK THIS IS MAYBE DOWN THE ROAD, BECAUSE PEOPLE JUST THINK, WELL, IT'S A MILLION 17 DOLLARS A DOOR, OR 750 AND THAT'S NOT A LOT. SO IT WOULD BE 18 HELPFUL TO HAVE SOME OF THAT. 19

20

21 REBECCA LONG: COMMISSIONER, WE CAN DEFINITELY GET BACK TO YOU
22 ON THAT, AS WE THINK, WHAT DOES \$10 BILLION BUY THE REGION.
23

AMY R. WORTH: AND I HOPE THE FEDERAL -- I'M GOING TO SEE MARK
 DESAULNIER ON FRIDAY WE NEED TO GET THOSE LEGISLATORS TO KEEP
 THE HOUSING PIECE IN.

4

5 LIBBY SCHAAF: I AM HAPPY TO SHARE MY ADVOCACY TEXT THEY SENT
6 TO MY FOLKS. AND THE SECRETARY SAID IT THIS MORNING. SAID WHAT
7 CAN WE DO TO MAKE SURE HOUSING STAY IN TO SURVIVE THESE CUTS
8 AND SHE SAID THE SQUEAKY WHEEL GETS THE GREASE. THAT'S EXACTLY
9 WHAT SHE SAID. SO, VICE CHAIR ROMERO?

10

CARLOS ROMERO, V. CHAIR: THANK YOU, CHAIR. MAYOR SCHAFF, I 11 DON'T MEAN TO BE A CASSANDRA REMARKS BUT I AM WONDERING 12 WHETHER LOWERING THE THRESHOLD IS KIND OF CHIMERIC AND WHETHER 13 WE'RE LOOKING AT SOMETHING THAT HAS BEEN TRIED PREVIOUSLY, AND 14 15 THAT IF WE OPEN THIS ISSUE UP WE'RE NOT GOING TO WIND UP 16 HAVING A NUMBER OF OTHER SPECIAL, OR, YOU KNOW, SEPARATE FUNDABLE ITEMS, WHETHER IT'S, YOU KNOW, KEEPING OUR STREAMS 17 CLEAN, OR, YOU KNOW, WATER PROVISION, DOING WATER BONDS, 18 WHETHER WE'RE GOING TO WIND UP HAVING FOUR OR FIVE OR SIX 19 DIFFERENT ISSUES GLOM ON TO THE 55% LOWERING OF THE VOTER 20 21 THRESHOLD, AND THEN WE HAVE A MUCH HARDER ROAD TO HOE, WE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT 65 THRESHOLD ON HOUSING FOR AT LEAST 15 22 YEARS, AND IT'S ONLY BEEN THE SCHOOLS THAT HAVE BEEN ABLE TO 23 DO THAT. SO I JUST WANT US TO BE AS REALISTIC AS POSSIBLE WHEN 24 WE THINK ABOUT SUPPORTING THE ISSUE AND ISSUING A POLL ON IT 25

THAT MAY NOT BE ABLE TO GATHER ENOUGH STEAM TO HAVE IT PASS
 AND WHAT DOES THAT MEAN FOR 2024 WHEN WE PORTABLY DO GO FOR A
 GO BOND AND WE HAVE THIS OTHER LEGACY THAT DIDN'T QUITE PASS.

5 LIBBY SCHAAF: VICE CHAIR ROMERO, AND THE INFORMATION PRESENTED WAS CONFUSING, I DON'T THINK ANYONE IS RECOMMENDING THAT THIS 6 BODY PURSUE LOWERING THE VOTER THRESHOLD. I THINK WHAT IS PUT 7 8 OUT THERE IS THERE MAY BE AN INDEPENDENT CITIZEN GROUP THAT MAY WANT TO PURSUE THIS. WE COULD, AS A BODY, TAKE A POLICY 9 10 POSITION THAT WE SUPPORT THAT, BUT THAT PARTICULAR MEASURE WOULD NOT BE SOMETHING APPROPRIATE FOR THIS GOVERNMENTAL BODY 11 TO PURSUE. IT WOULD HAVE TO BE DONE ON A STATEWIDE BASIS AND 12 WE'RE ONLY A REGIONAL BODY SO WE DON'T HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO 13 PUT SOMETHING LIKE THAT ON THE BALLOT. SO I THINK THAT WAS 14 15 MORE FOR OUR INFORMATION AT WHAT SOMETHING IN THE ADVOCACY 16 COMMUNITY MIGHT BE TALKING ABOUT. I KNOW PEOPLE KEEP ON SAYING "WE" I THINK THEY'RE TALKING ABOUT WE THE PEOPLE OF 17 CALIFORNIA, NOT BAHFA OR MTC OR ABAG. SO THERE IS NO 18 RECOMMENDATION. THIS BODY DOESN'T EVEN HAVE THE JURISDICTION 19 OR AUTHORITY TO PLACE SOMETHING LIKE THAT ON THE BALLOT. SO 20 21 THAT WAS REALLY FOR INFORMATIONAL PURPOSES.

22

23 CARLOS ROMERO, V. CHAIR: IF I MAY, QUICKLY, ON THE OTHER HAND,
24 BUT HAVING MY ESTEEMED COLLEAGUE AMIE FISHMAN ON THE LINE, AND
25 CERTAINLY HAVING REVIEWED THE MEETING THAT YOU WERE EARLIER IN

ON TODAY, AMIE, WITH THE BAY AREA FUTURES, I CAN'T REMEMBER, I 1 MISSED THAT MEETING. CLEARLY THE ISSUE OF 5% IS OUT THERE, AND 2 3 WE ALL NEED TO THINK STRATEGICALLY, WHETHER OR NOT ELECT THE OFFICIALS, MTC/ABAG SUPPORT THIS, I MEAN, WHAT ARE THE IMPACTS 4 5 OF MOVING FORWARD WITH A CAMPAIGN OF THAT NATURE? IF IT DOESN'T GO FORWARD F IT DOESN'T PASS, AND WE WANT TO MOVE IN 6 2024. THAT'S ALL. 7 8 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU. THANK YOU. GOOD POINT. PRESIDENT 9 10 ARREGUIN, DO YOU WISH TO SPEAK AGAIN? 11 JESSE ARREGUIN: A COUPLE MORE POINTS THIS IS ABOUT THE 12 ADVOCACY PLATFORM THAT STAFF WILL BE DEVELOPING OVER THE NEXT 13 FEW WEEKS. I THINK IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE ADVOCATE THAT HUDSON 14 ALLOCATE SOME MONEY TO PROMOTE INNOVATION IN THE HOUSING 15 16 PRODUCTION. I THINK THAT GETS AT SOMETHING COMMISSIONER WORTH TALKED B MAYBE CREATING SOME, SORT OF, INCENTIVE OR BONUS 17 PROGRAM MAYBE THAT COULD BE FOLDED INTO THE BUILD BACK BETTER 18 PACKAGE. BUT WE NEED TO LOOK AT DIFFERENT WAYS OF CREATING 19 HOUSING. AND WHILE BUILDING THE TRADITIONAL ROUTE IS THE ONE 20 21 THAT'S GOING TO GET MORE MONEY THROUGH TAX CREDITS AND OTHER FUNDING SOURCES, IT ALSO IS EXTREMELY EXPENSIVE. AND IF WE 22 REALLY WANT TO INCREASE THE PRODUCTION OF HOUSING, LOOKING AT 23 MONEY FOR PRESERVATION, MONEY FOR MODULAR HOUSING, 24 25 PREFABRICATED HOUSING, OTHER DIFFERENT TYPES OF MODELS, AND

ALSO MAKING SURE THAT WHETHER STATE OR FEDERAL MONEY THAT 1 2 REGIONAL AGENCIES ARE ELIGIBLE FOR SOME PORTION OF FUNDING. 3 BECAUSE I THINK THAT GETS TO WHAT WAS SAID IS, HOW CAN WE BUILD UP OUR BUDGET AND OUR CAPACITY TO DO THIS WORK 4 5 REGIONALLY, AND I THINK THAT SHOULD ALSO BE A PARTICULAR ADVOCACY FLANK AROUND OUR FORMER HOUSING FUNDING ASKS. AND OUR 6 ELASTIC DOORWAY PILOT THAT WE'RE GOING TO BE LAUNCHING -- I 7 8 THINK IT'S GOING TO BE CRIT -- SORRY -- THE DOORWAY TO GET TO HOUSING, AND DATABASE THAT WE'RE GOING TO CREATE FOR PROJECTS 9 ALL AFFORDABLE HOUSING OUT THERE UNDER DEVELOPMENT THAT'S 10 GOING TO BE IMPORTANT TO QUANTIFY WHAT'S OUT THERE AND WHAT 11 THE NEED IS SO WHEN WE DO GO TO FEDERAL GOVERNMENT OR STATE 12 GOVERNMENT OR DO SOME MEASURE IN THE FUTURE WE HAVE NUMBERS TO 13 BACK IT UP. THANK YOU FOR GIVING ME THAT OPPORTUNITY. 14

16 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU. I THINK WE'RE SHORT-TERMING THAT,
17 CALLING THAT PIPELINE. I SEE NO ONE ELSE IN THE QUEUE FOR
18 DISCUSSION. MR. CLERK, THERE ARE ANY MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC
19 THAT WISH TO SPEAK? OR COMMENTS THAT WE HAVE RECEIVED ON THIS
20 ITEM?

21

22 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: THERE WERE NO WRITTEN COMMENTS ON THIS23 ITEM. THERE ARE TWO SPEAKERS WITH THEIR HANDS RAISED IN THE24 ATTENDEES. SHALL WE GIVE TWO MINUTES?

LIBBY SCHAAF: THAT'S GOOD. CALL THEM FOR ME, THANK YOU. 1 2 3 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: FIRST SPEAKER IS JENAI, GO AHEAD AND UNMUTE YOURSELF. YOU HAVE TWO MINUTES. 4 5 SPEAKER: THANK YOU. LEADERSHIP AND CREATIVITY THINKING ABOUT HOW WE CAN BRING ALL 1 OUR DIFFERENT STRATEGIES TO BEAR WHETHER THAT'S FEDERAL MONEY 2 3 OR THIS BALLOT MEASURE. WE HAVE HAD A CHANCE TO REVIEW THE POLLING INFORMATION AND, LIKE ALL OF YOU, WE HAVE BEEN VERY 4 5 EAGER TO SEE IF WE COULD PURSUE A MEASURE IN 2022, AND THE POLLING WAS NOT WHAT WE HAD HOPED FOR, BUT AS A COALITION THIS 6 HAS MOTIVATED US TO DOUBLE DOWN ON OUR EFFORTS TO PURSUE A 7 8 MEASURE IN 2024, AND ALSO, REALLY, ENGAGE IN THIS PARALLEL TRACK OF LOWERING THE VOTER THRESHOLD. BUT I THINK THE LEGISLATIVE 11 UPDATE MIGHT HAVE SOME MORE GOOD NEWS IN T SO, SUNDAY WAS THE 12 LAST DAY FOR GOVERNOR NEWSOME TO ACT ON BILLS THAT REACHED HIS 13 DESK. REBECCA LONG WILL PROVIDE AN OVERVIEW OF SEVERAL OF THE 14 15 VERY SIGNIFICANT HOUSING BILLS THAT WERE ENACTED THIS YEAR, 16 PARTICULARLY AT THE STATE LEVEL. SO, MS. LONG, WOULD YOU PLEASE GIVE THAT REPORT? 17 18 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU, CHAIR SCHAFF. SO IN YOUR PACKET, YOU 19 HAVE A MISDEMEANOR OWE THAT LIST SOME OF THE MORE SIGNIFICANT 20 SB 477 WAS BILLS THAT WERE SIGNED. I DO HAVE A CORRECTION. 21 ACTUALLY VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR, AND THAT WOULD HAVE CHANGED 22 THE ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTS THAT LOCAL JURISDICTIONS NEED TO 23 DO. IT WAS CHANGING IT, REALLY, TO THE INDIVIDUAL PROJECT. SO, 24 I ACTUALLY HAVEN'T HAD A CHANCE TO READ THE GOVERNOR'S VETO 25

MESSAGE, BUT I KNOW IT WAS A BILL THAT RAISED CONCERNS AMONG 1 LOCAL JURISDICTIONS, POTENTIALLY AROUND THE WORKLOAD TO DO 2 3 THAT. BUT THE MOST IMPORTANT BILL, I THINK, BY FAR, THAT DID GET SIGNED, THAT, AGAIN, MTC BAGGING DIDN'T TAKE A POSITION 4 5 ON, THAT WOULD BE SB NINE -- -- BY SENATOR ATKINS AND THIS BILL AUTHORIZES DUPLEXES IN SINGLE FAMILY ZONED AREAS AND ALSO 6 ALLOWS FOR SPLIT LOTS. SO IT HAS BEEN, YOU KNOW, DESCRIBED AS 7 8 ABOLISHING SINGLE FAMILY ZONING. SO I THINK IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT IT HAS A LOT OF EXCLUSIONS. SO ONE OF 9 10 THE VERY IMPORTANT ONES IS IT ONLY APPLIES IN URBANIZED AREAS AND URBAN CLUSTERS. SO THAT RIGHT THERE DOES TAKE A NUMBER OF, 11 YOU KNOW, PARTS OF THE REGION OUT OF THE CHANGES. AND THERE IS 12 ALSO A LOT OF EXCLUSIONS RELATED TO HAZARDS, FOR EXAMPLE, HIGH 13 AND VERY HIGH FIRE HAZARD ZONES. IT DOES NOT APPLY THERE. IT 14 DOES NOT APPLY IN FLOOD ZONES. IT DOESN'T APPLY IN AREAS THAT 15 16 HAVE PROTECTED NATURAL LANDS, WETLANDS. SO THERE ARE A LOT OF 17 GEOGRAPHIC AREAS THAT YOU NEED TO KIND OF EXAMINE, AND I DID WANT TO JUST SHARE THAT OUR PLANNING STAFF ARE DOING SOME 18 REALLY GREAT WORK TRYING TO DEVELOP, KIND OF, A DATABASE, SO 19 THAT FOLKS CAN SEE THAT, AND SO WE'LL HOPEFULLY BE ABLE TO 20 SHARE MORE DETAILS. WE DID INCLUDE A LINK IN THE MEMO TO A 21 TURNER CENTER REPORT THAT TOOK MORE OF A MARKET FEASIBILITIES 22 ANALYSIS TO THE QUESTION. BECAUSE THAT'S ALSO OBVIOUSLY 23 ANOTHER FACTOR RATE, IF YOU ARE A HOMEOWNER, IT'S NOT LIKE YOU 24 CAN JUST GO AND MAKE A DUPLEX TOMORROW. SO THEIR ANALYSIS 25

FOUND THAT ONCE YOU START TO TEASE OUT ALL OF THESE DIFFERENT 1 EXCLUSIONS AND MARKET FEASIBILITY, WOULD YOU BE LOOKING AT, 2 PROBABLY 5% OF THE COMPLETE UNIVERSE OF SINGLE FAMILY ZONES 3 THAT -- OR HOMES, IN SINGLE FAMILY ZONED AREAS THAT WOULD BE, 4 5 YOU KNOW, LIKELY TO CREATE A NEW UNIT. THEY HAD AN INITIAL NUMBER OF ABOUT 110,000 STATEWIDE THAT, AGAIN, TODAY, WOULD 6 NOT BE FEASIBLE THAT THIS BILL WOULD UNLOCK. WE'RE GOING TO 7 8 DID OUR OWN ANALYSIS AND WILL, AGAIN, HOPEFULLY BE ABLE TO SHARE THAT WITH YOU IN THE COMING MONTHS. LET'S SEE. BACK TO 9 MY SUMMARY. SO, YEAH, I THINK ANOTHER REALLY IMPORTANT BILL 10 THAT WAS SIGNED WAS SB EIGHT, BY SENATOR SKINNER. THIS WAS 11 EXTENDING THE HOUSING ACCOUNTABILITY ACT SUNSET DATE. THAT 12 BILL WAS CREATED -- IT'S BEEN A NUMBER OF TIMES THAT SENATOR 13 SKINNER HAS ENHANCE SAID THAT BILL. MOST RECENTLY IT WAS SB 14 15 330, WHICH THE COMMISSION AND ABAG DID SUPPORT, BACK IN 2019, 16 AND, BUT THAT, IN THE PROCESS, THAT BILL WAS SHORTENED TO SUNSET IN 2024, THIS EXTENDS THAT, AND I THINK DOES SOME OTHER 17 CLEAN UP. SO YOU HAVE THE LIST IS IN THERE. I DON'T WANT TO GO 18 THROUGH EVERY SINGLE ONE. I 22 THANK YOU FOR THAT. A LOT OF CITIES DON'T HAVE THEIR OWN IN-23 HOUSE CITY ATTORNEYS DEPARTMENTS. THE LAWS ARE CHANGING SO 24 QUICKLY, AND A LOT OF THE DEPARTMENTS ARE HAVING TROUBLE 25

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KEEPING UP WITH THE CHANGING IMPACTS OF LOCAL LAND USE 1 REGULATIONS AND THAT'S A REALLY IMPORTANT RESOURCE FOR LOCAL 2 GOVERNMENT. THANK YOU. 3 4 5 REBECCA LONG: THAT'S WORTH MENTIONING, AND I WANT TO CALL OUT IN THE MEMO, THAT WE WANT TO PROVIDE A WEBINAR TO REALLY DO A 6 DEEP DIVE FOR JURISDICTIONS ON WHAT ARE IN THE NEW LAWS AND 7 8 WHAT EVERYONE NEEDS TO BE AWARE OF. 9 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU. AND WE WILL ALSO 6 BE GET GOLDFARB UNDER CONTRACT AS PRESIDENT ARREGUIN MENTIONED 7 8 ON PROVIDING A DEEP DIVE AND ALL NEW LAWS THAT WILL INCLUDE STAFF TEMPLATES REPORTS SLIDE PRESENTATIONS AND TEMPLATE 9 TALKING POINTS. AND ALSO OFFICE HOURS FOR GROUP OUESTIONS ON 10 HOW SPECIFIC THINGS ARE BEING INTERPRETED. HAPPY TO PROVIDE 11 THAT. ALSO HAPPY TO REPORT IF YOU CAN BRING UP THE SLIDES, 12 PLEASE. FEEL 23 FREE TO VISIT THAT ANY TIME YOU'RE LOOKING FOR SOMETHING YOU 24 25 WILL FIND LOTS ON HOUSING AND MUCH MORE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE.

OUR REGIONAL PLANNING CONSULTING BENCH, I THINK YOU ALL KNOW 1 2 HAS BEEN AVAILABLE TO ALL BAY AREA JURISDICTIONS FOR ALL OF 3 THEIR WORK, SINCE MAY, HOWEVER, WE ARE ABOUT TO MAKE IT MUCH EASIER FOR JURISDICTIONS TO SEARCH FOR CONSULTANTS USING AN 4 5 ONLINE PORTAL THAT YOU SEE HERE. IT WILL BE MUCH LIKE SHOPPING ONLINE. THEY CAN BROWSE CONSULTANTS BIOS AND THEN PULL DOWN 6 THE DETAILED INFORMATION THAT THEY GAVE US TO QUALIFY FOR THE 7 8 BENCH. ALSO, JURISDICTIONS THAT HAVE REAP GRANTS OR PDA GRANTS, CAN USE THIS PORTAL TO REOUEST ABAG TO ADMINISTER 9 CONSULTING CONTRACTS ON THEIR BEHALF AND TAKE SOME OF THAT 10 ADMINISTRATIVE BURDEN OFF LOCAL STAFF. LOCAL STAFF WILL STILL 11 DIRECT THE WORK, BUT WE'LL DO THE PAPERWORK. TRAINING ON THAT 12 PORTAL WILL BE ANNOUNCED SHORTLY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. I ALSO 13 BELIEVE THAT YOU'RE ALL ALREADY FAMILIAR WITH OUR HOUSING 14 ELEMENT SITE SELECTION TOOL, AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN AS HAS, BUT 15 16 WE'RE HAPPY TO BE EMERGING FROM THE BETA TESTING PHASE THE NEW VERSION YOU SEE HERE IS UPGRADES WHAT WAS DEVELOPED IN 17 CONSULTANT WITH LOCAL PLANNING NOTABLY SIMPLE RED YELLOW GREEN 18 COLOR SCHEME MUCH MORE COMPLEX COLOR SCHEME THAT ALLOWS USERS 19 TO FILTER PRESENTATION WITH SIMILAR CHARACTERS, MIGHT BENEFIT. 20 21 BEING ABLE TO ESTIMATE THE REALISTIC DEVELOPMENT CAPACITY AT THE PARCEL LEVEL WHICH WE HOPE WE WILL USE TO ESTABLISH A SAFE 22 HARBOR WITH HCD WHEN THEY ARE REVIEWING HOUSING ELEMENTS AND 23 MORE LAYERS WILL BE LAUNCHED WITH AFFIRMATIVELY FURRING FAIR 24 HOUSING WHICH WE KNOW HCD WILL BE USING TO EVALUATE HOUSING 25

ELEMENTS FOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE NEW LAW. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. 1 THIS IS AN INNOVATIVE TOOL. WE ARE PROVIDING 25 LICENSES TO 2 3 LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO USE AS ONLINE PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT TOOL. IT'S CALLED BALANCES BALANCING ACT IS IT WORK IN MULTIPLE 4 5 LANGUAGES AND IT ALLOWS THE PUBLIC THROUGH THE INTERNET TO SHARE PREFERENCES ON WHERE THEY WOULD LIKE TO SEE THE NUMBER 6 OF RHNA UNITS PLACED IN THEIR COMMUNITIES AS WELL AS WHAT 7 8 TYPES OF HOUSING THEY WOULD LIKE TO SEE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. FINALLY, WE'RE EXPLORING OBTAINING LICENSES FROM A COMPANY 9 CALLED SIMBIYUM FOUNDED OUT OF A STANFORD PROGRAM LAW AND 10 COMPUTER SCIENCE SCHOOL ALLOWING ONLINE PLANNING FOR 11 PREDICTABILITY DISPLAYS PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND CHECKS 12 COMPLIANCE WITH NON-DISCRETIONARY ITEMS THAT ALLOWS STAFF TO 13 FOCUS ON THE DISCRETIONARY ITEMS WHICH IS WHERE THE HEART AND 14 15 SOUL OF PLANNING IS. FOR EXAMPLE, IF YOU ARE A HOMEOWNER AND 16 YOU WANT TO ADD A BEDROOM, YOU CAN PUT IT IN THERE AND IT WILL 17 TELL YOU ALL THE REGULATIONS THAT APPLY. YOUR SETBACKS, YOUR FAR, EVEN IF THERE IS A HERITAGE TREE REGULATION, OR 18 RESTRICTIONS THAT MOST PEOPLE DON'T EVEN THINK ABOUT. IT WILL 19 ALSO ALLOW FORMS TO BE SUBMITTED ELECTRICALLY, AND SO A PERSON 20 21 IN THE PUBLIC CAN LOOK AND SAY -- IT WILL SAY WHETHER YOU'RE IN OR OUT OF COMPLIANCE WITH ANYTHING THAT'S NON-22 DISCRETIONARY, ANYTHING THAT'S A YES OR NO ANSWER AND YOU CAN 23 FIX IT BEFORE SUBMITTING. AND EVEN IF YOU NEED A HERITAGE TREE 24 WAIVER YOU WILL GET THAT FORM, WITH SUBMISSION OF COMPLIANCE 25

INFORMATION AND STAFF HAS TO SPEND TIME WRITING BACK AND 1 SAYING NO IT'S NOT COMPLETE GET IT RIGHT. IT ALSO HELPS 2 3 PLANNERS BECAUSE IT AUTOMATICALLY FILLS IN STREET VIEWS AND SATELLITE IMAGES OF THE PROGRAM PROJECT SITE AND IT EVEN 4 5 GENERATES DRAFT COMMENT LETTERS FOR STAFF SAVING TIME. SO WHERE THE STAFF WOULD NORMALLY HAVE TO LOOK AT 28 REGULATIONS 6 AND PULL IN THEIR OWN FORM LETTER OF SAYING THE HERITAGE TREE 7 8 APPLIES OR, YES, THIS WILL DO ALL THAT STUFF UP FRONT AND GIVE THE PLANNER A DRAFT FROM WHICH THEY CAN EDIT AND MOST 9 IMPORTANTLY IT INTEGRATED WITH EXISTING SOFTWARE SYSTEM SO 10 FOLKS DON'T HAVE TO GIVE UP OR LOSE OR HAVE A MAJOR HEAVY LIFT 11 TO THEIR SYSTEMS. ONCE THIS PROCESS IS THROUGH, IT SEAMLESSLY 12 INTEGRATED BACK INTO THAT PROCESS. SO, WE ARE IN THE PROCESS 13 OF DOING THAT. AND WE'LL SEND OUT AN ELECTRONIC SOLICITATION 14 15 OF LETTERS OF INTEREST FOR JURISDICTIONS THAT WOULD LIKE TO 16 HAVE THOSE FREE LICENSES. AND IF YOU ARE NOT ABLE TO GET ONE 17 OF OUR FREE LICENSES BECAUSE OUR RESOURCES ARE LIMITED, THE COMPANY HAS -- WE HAVE NEGOTIATED FIXED PRICING FOR THE LIFE 18 OF THE PRODUCT FOR ALL BAY AREA JURISDICTIONS THAT WOULD LIKE 19 TO GET THE SOFTWARE. WITH THAT, I'M JUST GOING TO STOP, AND 20 21 OPEN IT UP FOR ANY QUESTIONS IF ANYONE HAS ANY.

23 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU SO MUCH. THAT WAS VERY INFORMATIVE.24 AND IF I MAY SAY, IMPRESSIVE. IF MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEES

COULD RAISE THEIR HANDS WITH ANY QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS. CHAIR
 PEDROZA?

ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU MAYOR SCHAFF. HEATHER THIS IS GRIT
GREAT. ONE OF THE THINGS THE MAYOR AND I HAVE BEEN DOING IS
GOING OUT TO MUNICIPALITIES AND VISITING GROUPS, ONE OF THE
THINGS THIS YEAR IS LACK OF CAPACITY. CAN YOU SHARE A LITTLE
BIT ABOUT THE REGIONAL CONSULTING BENCH MARKETPLACE. IS THERE
CAPACITY FOR BIG AND SMALL COUNTIES AND CITIES?

HEATHER PETERS: GREAT QUESTION. I AM HAPPY TO TALK ABOUT THE 11 BENCH. ONE OF THE BITS OF FEEDBACK WE HEARD EARLY ON IS THE 12 SCARCITY OF CONSULTANT IN THIS PLANNING ELEMENT CYCLE. AND SO 13 -- AND SMALLER JURISDICTIONS WERE GOING OUT AND NOT GETTING 14 15 BIDS, AND WE REALIZED WE COULD USE OUR COLLECTIVE BARGAINING 16 POWER AT THE REGION TO ATTRACT CONSULTANTS THAT SMALLER JURISDICTIONS MIGHT NOT BE ABLE TO STRATEGIC AND ALSO 17 NEGOTIATE GOOD PRICING. SO, WHAT WE DID WAS WE WENT OUT AND WE 18 CREATED -- BOY, THE MOTHER OF ALL CONSULTING BENCHES -- WE HAD 19 92 CONSULTANTS ON THIS BENCH. AND THEY ARE IN 12 DIFFERENT 20 CATEGORIES, SERVICE CATEGORIES, THEY WERE -- IT WAS CREATED BY 21 MY TEAM ON THE HOUSING SIDE, BUT WE ALSO -- WE ANTICIPATED 22 THAT THE STATE MIGHT BE IMPRESSED WITH WHAT WAS BEING DONE 23 ACROSS THE STATE WITH REAP, AND THEY MIGHT GIVE US MORE MONEY, 24 25 WHICH THEY DID. SO WE'RE READY TO SPEND THAT, AS WELL, AND WE

HAVE TRANSPORTATION CONSULTANTS, WE HAVE RESILIENCE 1 2 CONSULTANTS, WE EVEN HAVE CONSULTANTS THAT PROVIDE TEMPORARY 3 STAFFING TO PLANNING DEPARTMENTS. SO IF YOU HAVE SOMEONE GOING OUT ON FAMILY LEAVE, AND YOU JUST NEED A FEW HOURS OF TIME, 4 5 YOU CAN GO TO THAT BENCH AND GET IT. THERE ARE NO CONSTRAINTS, OTHER THAN, OF COURSE, OF THE CONSULTANTS CAN 6 CHOOSE WHICH PROJECTS TO BID O BUT WE WENT BIG. BECAUSE WE 7 8 WANTED TO MAKE SURE THAT WE DIDN'T GET, LIKE, FOLKS SAYING, GEE, WE'RE JUST TOO BUSY, THAT THERE WAS A 9 10 JACK P. BROADBENT: THING. ALSO OUTREACH. WE HAVE A REALLY, 11 REALLY BROAD OUTREACH BENCH. 12 13 ALFREDO PEDROZA: THANK YOU, HEATHER. JUST ONE MORE COMMENT, 14 CHAIR SCHAFF. HEATHER, I THINK IT WOULD BE GREAT TO MEASURE 15 16 THE SUCCESS OF THIS. I BELIEVE THIS IS SOMETHING THAT CAN BE SCALED IT HAS A LOT OF VALUE AND THIS IS ONE POINT THAT 17 INCREASES OUR OUTPUT AND WE DID THAT DURING THE NAPA COUNTY 18 FIRES WE CONTRACTED REBUILDING, AND PLANNERS WERE TRYING TO DO 19 ONE SIZE FITS ALL AND IT CREATED EXTRA WORK. SO I THING IS A 20 HUGE OPPORTUNITY TO PRODUCE OUTCOMES AND OUTPUT, BUT WE HAVE 21 GOT TO MEASURE IT SO WE CANNEL THAT STORY. AGAIN, VERY PLEASED 22 23 WITH THIS.

HEATHER PETERS: THANK YOU ABOUT THAT. SO THE PORTAL -- I'M 1 TALKING ABOUT THE PORTAL AS JUST, YOU KNOW, YOU GUYS LOOKING 2 3 FOR CONSULTANTS, BUT IT'S SO MUCH MORE THAN THAT. ON THE BACK END, SO I MENTIONED THAT REAP AND PDA GRANTS WILL DO THE 4 5 PAPERWORK FOR YOU, SO YOU COULD USE THIS PORTAL TO TYPE IN A 6 PROJECT, SEND IT OVER TO MY TEAM, AND SAY, GEE, I LIKE THESE FOUR CONSULTANTS, OR, I THINK I WOULD LIKE TO DO IT ON THIS 7 8 SCHEDULE, AND WE'LL DO THAT IN THE TOOL. AND YOU WILL HAVE VISIBILITY. WE'LL HAVE VISIBILITY. EVERYTHING WILL BE TRACKED. 9 ONE OF THE THINGS WE'RE DOING HERE TOO, IS WE'RE TRACKING BY 10 PROGRAM, PDA TRACK BY JURISDICTION, ALL 109 JURISDICTIONS, BY 11 CONSULTANT DOWN TO EVERY PROJECT, EVERY DOLLAR THAT'S BEING 12 SPENT AND THE PERCENTAGE OF SBE OR DBE SPEND ON EVERY DOLLAR 13 SPENT. AND THAT'S ALL REPORTED. IT ALSO, EVERY TIME SOMEONE 14 15 UPLOADS AN INVOICE ON THE REAP GRANTS, OF WHICH WE HAVE 109, 16 WE WILL HAVE TO REPORT TO THE STATE ON ALL OF THOSE, AND YOU WILL BE ABLE TO -- EVERY TIME SOMEONE UPLOADS AN INVOICE, THEY 17 HAVE TO GIVE US TWO SENTENCES IN THE TOOL. SO WE CAN JUST 18 EXPORT THAT AND CREATE OUR STATE REPORTING. SO, IT'S JUST 19 FANTASTIC. I LOVE THIS COMPANY. 20

22 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MS. PETERS. VICE CHAIR23 WORTH?

AMY R. WORTH: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. I WANT TO PICK UP, I 1 THINK, AS MAYOR ARREGUIN SAID, EARLIER, THE ABILITY OF ABAG 2 3 AND MTC TO PROVIDE RESOURCES ON THE GROUND FOR LOCAL JURISDICTIONS IS ABSOLUTELY INVALUABLE. AND, YOU KNOW, CONTRA 4 5 COSTA COUNTY IS A COUNTY OF 19 CITIES. YOU KNOW, MOST OF THEM ARE SMALLER. OUR LARGEST CITY IS MAYBE ONLY 10,000, 115,000 ON 6 A SUNNY DAY. SO THIS ISSUE OF HAVING THE RESOURCES IS REALLY 7 8 CRITICAL. AND, HEATHER, I HAVE HEARD FROM SO MANY CITIES, AND CERTAINLY FROM MY OWN PLANNING DIRECTOR IN OUR LITTLE DINKY 9 TOWN OF ORINDA THESE SERVICES ARE ABSOLUTELY INVALUABLE. 10 ESPECIALLY IN LIGHT OF THE NEW RHNA NUMBERS AND ITS. 11 BENEFICIAL. ALL THE TOOLS HAVE BEEN INVALUABLE ON THE GROUND 12 AND AS STAFFS ARE WORKING TO LAY OUT THE PROGRAM FOR RHNA FOR 13 INDIVIDUALS CITIES. I WANT TO SAY THANK YOU ALL. AND HOW 14 TERRIFIC AND WE'RE REALLY SEEING THE FRUITS OF THIS 15 16 INVESTMENT. SO, THANK YOU. 17

18 HEATHER PETERS: THANK YOU SO MUCH. YOU KNOW, ONE THING I HAVE 19 TO LIFT UP IS, THIS IS ALL MADE POSSIBLE BY STATE FUNDING. 20

21 AMY R. WORTH: RIGHT.

22

HEATHER PETERS: AND IT IS A LIMITED TIME. SO WE HAVE
ADDITIONAL STATE FUNDING COMING ON REAP 2.0 THAT IS BEING
PROGRAMMED RIGHT NOW, BUT THIS IS JUST KIND OF SHOWING YOU

WHAT CAN BE DONE WHEN STATE FUNDING IS AVAILABLE. BUT 1 2 UNFORTUNATELY, IT'S NOT GOING TO BE THERE FOREVER. 3 LIBBY SCHAAF: CAN I, BEFORE I CALL ON VICE CHAIR ROMERO, MS. 4 5 PETERS HOW MUCH LONGER DO WE HAVE BEFORE WE HIT THE FISCAL CLIFF? 6 7 8 HEATHER PETERS: ON REAP 1.0 UNFORTUNATELY WE HAVE UNTIL THE END OF THE CALENDAR YEE 2023. SO WE HAVE MORE THAN TWO YEARS 9 GO ON THAT. REAP 2.0 JUST PASSED, IT WILL BE ADMINISTERED BY 10 MTC. THE STATE HAS CHANGED BEYOND THE SCOPE OF WHAT WE'RE 11 TALKING ABOUT, MTC WILL BE WEIGHING IN ON THAT. BUT THAT 12 FUNDING OUR FUNDING FOR REAP 4.0 IS ABAG 24000002.0 IS 13 SLIGHTLY A HAIR UNDER 100 MILLION SO QUITE A BIT MORE MONEY 14 15 AND THAT MONEY WILL BE AVAILABLE THROUGH THE END OF 2026. 16 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU. VICE CHAIR ROMERO, THEN DIRECTOR 17 MCMILLAN? 18 19 CARLOS ROMERO, V. CHAIR: COULD YOU EXPLAIN MORE SYMBIAN LAND 20 21 CHECK PLATFORM? IS THIS SIMILAR TO -- HOW IS IT GIVEN THAT MANY CITIES HAVE DIFFERENT ERPS AND SOME ARE USING TRACK-IT, 22 AND I'M TRYING TO UNDERSTAND HOW SYMBIAN IS GOING TO -- IT'S A 23 SOFTWARE INTERFACE -- HOW IS IT INTERFACING WITH EXISTING ERP 24

PROGRAMS THAT CITIES ARE USING FOR THEIR PLAN CHECK PROCESSING
 AND APPLICATIONS?

HEATHER PETERS: GREAT OUESTION. I FORGOT YOU HAVE EXPERIENCE 4 5 WITH THE TOOL. IT ALLOWS THE PUBLIC TO LOOK AND SEE WHAT ADUS THEY CAN DO ON THEIR LAND. SO NOW IT IS ON WHICH BIGGER. THERE 6 IS STILL THE ADU TOOL AND THERE IS THIS NEW THING CALLED PLAN 7 8 CHECK AND IT DOES NOT, AT ALL, USURP OR CHANGE ANY OF THE EXISTING PERM TRACKING SOFTWARE. WHAT IT DOES RIGHT NOW IS, IF 9 10 A HOMEOWNER OR DEVELOPER HAS A QUESTION, THEY CALL UP THE COUNTER AND SOMEBODY HAS TO ANSWER IT AT THE COUNTER, AND IF 11 IT'S ON THE ROLE YOU GET A BLACK OR WHITE OUESTION AND YOU 12 HOPE OR PRAY THAT NO MATTER WHO EVER ANSWERS THE PHONE THEY 13 GIVE THE SAME QUESTION THEY GET THE SAME ANSWER, AND 14 UNFORTUNATELY THAT'S NOT TRUE ALL THE TIME AND STAFF IS 15 16 TURNING OVER IT'S HARD TO KEEP UP TO SPEED, THERE ARE SO MANY DIFFERENT RULES. THIS AUTOMATES IT'S ACTUALLY ARTIFICIAL 17 INTELLIGENCE THEY'RE ABLE TO CODE BECAUSE THEY'RE COMPUTER 18 SCIENTISTS FROM STANFORD, YOUR WHOLE CODE, EVERYTHING THAT'S 19 IN THERE, IF THERE'S A YES OR NO OUESTION, IT WILL BE 20 21 AUTOMATED. IF THERE IS A GRAY AREA, ABSOLUTELY NOT. THAT GOES TO THE PLANNER. BUT IT WILL BE ABLE TO LIFT UP, LIKE THE ADU 22 TOOL DOES. CONCERNS, AND PROBLEM, AND WHAT ARE THE PAPERS THAT 23 YOU NEED. THAT'S ALL REPLACING THE WORK THAT WAS DONE OVER THE 24 PHONE OR OVER E-MAIL OR AT THE PLANNING COUNTER. ALL THE 25

APPLICATION WORK AND HELPING PEOPLE GET THE RIGHT PAPERWORK 1 DONE. ONCE THE PAPERWORK IS DONE THEN IT HAND IT OFF TO THE 2 PLANNER. PLANNER DOES WHAT THE PLANNER DOES, AND THEN IT CAN 3 BE -- IT KEEPS THEM FROM HAVING TO ENTER IT IN AGAIN. IT CAN 4 5 JUST BE ELECTRICALLY CONNECTED TO WHATEVER EXISTING SOFTWARE IS IN PLACE. SO WHEN A PLANNER WOULD GET A PIECE OF PAPER 6 APPLICATION, AND THEY WOULD THEN TYPE IT INTO THEIR EXISTING 7 8 SYSTEM, THAT AUTOMATES ALL OF THAT, SO YOU AVOID SOME USER ERROR AS WELL. 9

11 CARLOS ROMERO, V. CHAIR: THANK YOU FOR GOING INTO THAT 12 INFORMATION FOR ME.

13

HEATHER PETERS: SOME PLANNERS HAVE SAID IT HAS SAVED THEM A
WHOLE FTE, AND ALSO HELPED PREVENT LITIGATION OVER QUESTIONS.
AND ALSO HAS A RECORD OF EVERY QUESTION THAT WAS EVER ASKED ON
THAT PARCEL.

19 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU. MS. MCMILLAN.

THERESE MCMILLAN: THIS IS PICKING UP CHAIR SCHAFF ON YOUR QUESTION ABOUT WHEN DOES THIS MONEY END, LIKE THE CHALLENGE OF PILOTS, LIKE, WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO TRANSITION INTO A SUSTAINING PROGRAM. AND JUST KEEP IN MIND CONNECTING THE DOTS BACK TO OUR PURSUIT OF A REGIONAL INITIATIVE. WE WILL NEED TO

REALLY CONSIDER THE RESOURCES NECESSARY ON ADMINISTRATIVE 1 LEVEL FOR BAHFA TO BE ABLE TO CONTINUE, YOU KNOW, BAHFA OR 2 ABAG OR WHATEVER THE APPROPRIATE REGIONAL AGENCY IS, TO 3 CONTINUE THESE PROGRAMS. YOU KNOW? AND WE'RE DEVELOPING 4 5 BUDGETS SOMETIMES THERE IS ALWAYS A TENSION OF HOW MUCH MONEY SHOULD PUSH BACK DOWN TO, YOU KNOW, LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO DO 6 PROJECTS, OR DELIVER INFRASTRUCTURE, OR WHAT NOT, VERSUS 7 8 SOMETIMES, AS CHARACTERIZED, AS THAT FUZZY ADMINISTRATIVE OVERHEAD. BUT THIS IS AN EXAMPLE OF WHERE WE HAVE SUCH VALUE 9 ADD. SO JUST TO THINK ABOUT, YOU KNOW, THAT, AS WE ARE 10 CONSIDERING THE BUSINESS PLAN THAT'S BEING DEVELOPED FOR BAHFA 11 AND OTHER THINGS, THIS IS INVESTMENT WELL WORTH THE LEVEL THAT 12 WE'RE SEEING. AND JUST WANTED TO MAKE THAT OBSERVATION, AS 13 PART OF THE DISCUSSION. THANKS. 14

16 LIBBY SCHAAF: THANK YOU, DIRECTOR. AND AT SOME POINT, WE MIGHT EACH -- NOT RIGHT AWAY -- BUT AT SOME POINT, WE MIGHT THINK OF 17 A LITTLE ROAD SHOW TO REALLY ILLUSTRATE THE VALUE-ADD FOR EACH 18 JURISDICTION SO THEY UNDERSTAND THAT THIS INVESTMENT IS ONE OF 19 THE WISEST INVESTMENTS THAT THEY COULD MAKE WHETHER THAT MIGHT 20 BE THROUGH SOME OTHER SOURCE OR SOMETHING ON THE BALLOT.
