SHE AND I 13 TALKED ABOUT THE OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE, PERHAPS, ONE AGENDA 14 ITEM, DISCUSSION ITEM ON THOSE AGENDAS, SO IT'S NOT JUST A 15 16 FORMALITY SINCE EVERYONE'S CLEARING THAT SCHEDULES AND GETTING 17 TOGETHER AND WE HAD THE DISCUSSION LIKE LAST MONTH WHERE WE ONLY HAD ONE ITEM AND PEOPLE WERE FRESH AND WE COULD HAVE A 18 GOOD DISCUSSION ABOUT IT. LET ME LEAVE IT THIS WAY, IF YOU 19 HAVE CONCERNS ABOUT THAT -- OH, YEAH, JOHN? 20 21 JOHN GIOIA: JUST A COMMENTED, I THINK IF WE'RE GOING TO DO 22 THAT, I WOULD JUST PUBLICIZE THE TIME BLOCK YOU'RE ASKING FOR. 23 BECAUSE IF I KNOW IT'S ONLY FIVE MINUTES I CAN GO ON TO MY 24

- 6 LOT OF SENSE. AND IF YOU HAVE CONCERNS PLEASE FEEL FREE TO

- 14 RULES APPLYING IN COVID TO PUBLIC MEETINGS. AND WE'RE
- 15 ACTUALLY UNDER BAGLEY KING, YOU AND I ARE BOTH MORE ATTUNED TO
- 16 THE BROWN ACT. THERE ARE A GATHERING OF DIFFERENT SETTINGS FOR
- 17 WHICH TO APPROACH IT. AND I AM HAPPY TO ENGAGE OFFLINE. IF IN

- 21 COMING FROM DIFFERENT AGENCIES, DIFFERENT RULES, AND
- 22 OBVIOUSLY, AT SOME POINT WE'RE HOPEFUL THAT COVID WILL ABATE
- 23 AND WE'LL BE ABLE TO MOVE IN A DIFFERENT DIRECTION FROM THE
- 24 ZOOM TO IN-PERSON. BUT, LET'S -- THAT WOULD BE GREAT. THAT
- 25 WOULD BE HELPFUL. OKAY. SO WITH THAT, THEN, WE'LL TURN BACK



- 1 TO THE MEMBER AGENCY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR UPDATES. SO, FIRST OF
- 2 ALL, STARTING WITH THE SAN FRANCISCO REGIONAL WATER QUALITY
- 3 CONTROL BOARD. AND, LISA BEFORE YOU START, I JUST WANT TO SAY
- 4 HOW WONDERFUL IT IS TO HAVE EXPANDED BARC TO INCLUDE THE STATE
- 5 REGIONAL AGENCIES. IT'S REALLY ENHANCED THE WORK THAT WE HAVE
- 6 DONE PARTICULARLY WHEN WE'RE FOCUSING ON THE CLIMATE CHANGE
- 7 ISSUES AND HAVING THE WATER, THE BAY, AND THE OCEAN, AND THE
- 8 COAST, ALL JOINING THE LOCAL -- I SHOULD SAY THE LOCAL
- 9 REGIONAL AGENCIES, IT'S REALLY BEEN GREAT. AND I JUST WANTED
- 10 YOU ALL TO KNOW THAT MIKE MONTGOMERY WHO HAS SERVED SO
- 11 SUCCESSFULLY IN A REALLY IMPACTFUL WAY WORKING TOGETHER WITH
- 12 ALL OF US HAS MOVED BACK TO THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION
- 13 AGENCY DISTRICT NINE WHERE WE WORKED BEFORE HE JOINED THE
- 14 WATER QUALITY CONTROL BOARD. SO WE'RE REALLY GRATEFUL FOR HIS
- 15 SERVICE AND WE KNOW HE'S GOT A GREAT TEAM. SO WE'RE IN GOOD
- 16 HANDS WITH LISA MCCANN BEING THE REPRESENTATIVE FROM BARC. SO
- 17 LISA, MAY I TURN IT OVER TO YOU. THANK YOU SO MUCH. AND THANK
- 18 YOU, AGAIN, TO MIKE, FOR HIS SERVICE.

- 13 LISA MCCANN: AND TWO ITEMS I WANT TO MENTION JUST MAYBE YOU'RE
- 14 ALL AWARE OF, BUT WE PLANNING TO RELEASE OUR PUBLIC REVIEW
- 15 DRAFT OF THE TENTATIVE ORDER FOR THE MUNICIPAL REGIONAL
- 16 STORMWATER PERMIT AT THE END OF FEBRUARY, TARGETING AN APRIL
- 17 BOARD MEETING FOR CONSIDERATION OF THAT PERMIT. AND, ALSO,
- 18 JUST CALL YOUR ATTENTION, WHICH SOME OF YOU I KNOW ARE ON TOP
- 19 OF IS CALTRANS HIGHWAY 37 PROPOSALS AND CURRENT STATE OF, WHAT
- 20 THEY'RE PLANNING TO DO OR MORE WITH WHAT THEY'RE NOT PLANNING
- 21 TO DO WHICH IS THE WATER BOARD IS NOT HAPPY WITH THE RESPONSE
- 22 -- LACK OF RESPONSIVENESS TO ALL OF THE ISSUES THAT MANY OF US
- 23 HAVE BEEN RAISING ABOUT SEA LEVEL RISE PROTECTION, FLOODING
- 24 SOLUTIONS, AND WETLANDS PROTECTION, AND THE INTEGRATIONAL
- 25 APPROACH TO LONG-RANGE PLANNING, NOT PIECEMEAL SHORT-TERM FOR



- 1 THE CURRENT STATE OF PARTS OF THE HIGHWAY THAT THEY WANT TO
- 2 DEAL WITH FIRST, AND HOW THAT I WANT TO DEAL WITH IT. SO WE'RE
- 3 CONSIDERING WAYS TO ELEVATE THAT, OUR CONCERNS, AND GET THAT
- 4 MESSAGE ACROSS. SO, STAY TUNED IN CASE THERE IS OPPORTUNITY
- 5 FOR US TO COLLABORATE, WITH THOSE OF YOU WHO WANT TO JOIN WITH
- 6 THAT EFFORT.

- 8 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: OKAY. GREAT, LISA, THANK YOU VERY MUCH.
- 9 WHAT I THINK I'LL DO IN THE INTEREST OF TIME, I'LL ASK FOR
- 10 PUBLIC COMMENT AT THE VERY -- CAN I DO THAT? YEAH, I CAN, AT
- 11 THE END OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORTS. THANK YOU. SEE,
- 12 I'M SEEING ALLISON NODDING. GREAT. THANK YOU. MOVING ON OUR
- 13 NEXT REPORT IS FROM THE CALIFORNIA STATE COASTAL CONSERVANCY.
- 14 AMY, I TURN TO YOU.

- 16 AMY HUTZEL: GOOD MORNING CHAIR WORTH. I'M MOSTLY GOING TO TALK
- 17 ABOUT MONEY AND WHAT IT CAN DO TO INCREASE OUR EFFORTS FOR
- 18 CLIMATE RESILIENCE IN THE BAY AREA. THE GOVERNOR BUDGET CAME
- 19 OUT RECENTLY, AND IT INCLUDE 350 MILLION OF COASTAL RESILIENCE
- 20 FUNDS FOR THE COASTAL CONSERVANCY AND THAT WAS LAID OUT IN A
- 21 TRAILER BILL FOR THE '21/'22 BUDGET. SO WE WERE ANTICIPATING
- 22 IT WOULD HAPPEN BUT IT'S GREAT TO SEE IT IN THE GOVERNOR'S
- 23 BUDGET AND THAT SHOULD BE FOLLOWED WITH THE '23/'24 BUDGET
- 24 WITH ANOTHER 150 MILLION FOR THE COASTAL RESILIENCE. SO THE
- 25 CONSERVANCY SHOULD BE MANAGING 50 MILLION FOR COASTAL



- 1 RESILIENCE OVER THE NEXT 5 TO 7 YEARS. IT WAS GREAT TO GET
- 2 THAT ALL IN ONE BUDGET AND WE DON'T HAVE TO ENCUMBER ALL THOSE
- 3 FUNDS IN ONE FISCAL YEAR. WE'VE BEEN GIVEN SOME TIME WE'RE
- 4 KICKING OFF THE STRATEGIC PLAN EFFORT WHICH WE NEED TO DO
- 5 ANYWAY SO OUR FIVE YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN, FINAL YEAR KICKING OFF
- 6 THAT FEBRUARY 3RD CONSERVANCY BOARD MEETING THEN IN MARCH,
- 7 APRIL, MAY, WE'LL BE DOING LOTS OF SMALL GROUP MEETINGS PUBLIC
- 8 ONLINE SURVEYS, WEBINARS, IF YOU ARE AT ALL INTERESTED IN
- 9 ENGAGING WITH OUR STRATEGIC PLAN PROCESS WE WOULD LOVE TO
- 10 INCLUDE BARC IN THAT, KIND OF, ROADSHOW THAT WE'RE DOING, FROM
- 11 OUR HOMES, VIA ZOOM. IT'S NOT REALLY A ROADSHOW. WE ALSO IN
- 12 THE GOVERNOR BUDGET, THERE WAS 10 MILLION ADDITIONAL WILDFIRE
- 13 RESILIENCE FUNDS FOR THE CONSERVANCY. I THINK WE GOT 10
- 14 MILLION EARLY ACTION FUNDS LAST YEAR 10 MILLION, 21, 22, AND
- 15 ANOTHER 10 MILLION IN THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET FOR 22, 23. AND
- 16 JUST DID RFP FOR THE LAST WILDFIRE RESILIENCE FUNDING WE GOT
- 17 78 APPLICATIONS IN CALIFORNIA, THE COAST, AND THE BAY AREA. SO
- 18 THE NEED IS HUGE TO DO WILDFIRE MANAGEMENT WORK. AND WE'RE NOT
- 19 THE ONLY AGENCY. THE ONLY STATE AGENCY MANAGING WILDFIRE
- 20 MANAGEMENT WORK. CAL FIRE, OBVIOUSLY, AND SEVERAL OTHER
- 21 AGENCIES AND CONSERVANCIES HAVE BEEN RECEIVING FUNDS. BUT IT'S
- 22 A HUGE FOCUS OF THE ADMINISTRATION. AND I WANTED TO MENTION A
- 23 COUPLE OF OTHER GRANT PROGRAMS WE HAVE GOING ON. OUR EXPLORE
- 24 THE COAST GRANT PROGRAM, WE JUST PUT OUT THE REQUEST FOR
- 25 PROPOSALS. AND PREPROPOSALS ARE DUE MARCH 11TH. ACTUALLY, I'M



- 1 NOT SURE IF IT'S PREPROPOSALS OR FULL PROPOSALS. BUT MARCH
- 2 11TH IS THE DEADLINE. WE RECEIVED 14 MILLION FOR OUR EXPLORE
- 3 THE COAST PROGRAM IN OUR '21/'22 BUDGET WHICH IS A 14 FOLD
- 4 INCREASE OVER WHAT WE HAVE GOTTEN IN THE PREVIOUS YEARS. SO
- 5 WE'RE GOING TO BE ABLE TO FUND A LOT MORE PROJECTS FOR LONGER
- 6 PERIODS OF TIME TO REALLY PROVIDE COASTAL ACCESS, WHICH
- 7 INCLUDES ACCESS TO THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY SHORELINE. AND THE
- 8 FOCUS IS REALLY ON SERVING COMMUNITIES, PEOPLE WHO FACE
- 9 SIGNIFICANT BARRIERS TO COVID AL ACCESS, OR TO ACCESSING
- 10 NATURE OR PARKS. SO, IF YOU KNOW OF ORGANIZATIONS WHO DO, YOU
- 11 KNOW, ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION, OUTDOOR EDUCATION, THAT, SORT
- 12 OF, WORK, THIS IS A REALLY GREAT GRANT PROGRAM. AND, THEN, I
- 13 ALSO WANTED TO MENTION OUR COASTAL STORY GRANT PROGRAM.
- 14 BECAUSE I DON'T THINK I HAVE MENTIONED THAT BEFORE. THIS IS A
- 15 NEW PROGRAM, A MILLION DOLLARS, I THINK IT'S PREPROPOSALS. I
- 16 SHOULD FIND OUT THIS INFORMATION ABOUT PREPROPOSALS VERSUS
- 17 PROPOSALS. -- DUE JANUARY 31ST. SO VERY SOON, IN TEN DAYS.
- 18 AND THE IDEA BEHIND THIS IS THAT MANY OF THE STORIES THAT ARE
- 19 TOLD ABOUT THE COAST, ABOUT THE SAN FRANCISCO BAYSHORE LINE
- 20 CAN REFLECT, YOU KNOW, KIND OF DOMINANT SOCIETY, AND WE REALLY

- 16 2050 THE LEAST OF WHICH, ACHIEVING THE SUPER GREENHOUSE GAS
- 17 REDUCTION TARGETS ASSIGNED TO US FROM THE STATE, AND IT SERVED
- 18 TO UNDER SCORE THAT MOVING FROM THOUGHTFUL, AMBITIOUS, AND
- 19 BOLD PLANNING TO EQUALLY THOUGHTFUL AND AMBITIOUS
- 20 IMPLEMENTATION, IT'S GOING TO BE A LOT OF WORK. AND IT'S GOING
- 21 TO REQUIRE A LOT OF DIALOGUE. IT'S GOING TO REQUIRE EXTENSIVE
- 22 PARTNERSHIPS, PARTICULARLY WITH THE AGENCIES THAT ARE HERE.
- 23 AND YET AT THE SAME TIME AT THE END OF THE DISCUSSION WE ALL
- 24 WALKED AWAY WITH A FEELING, AT LEAST ME, WITH A COMMITMENT TO
- 25 RISE TO THE CHALLENGE OF THAT. AND I THINK IT WAS A REALLY



- 1 INTERESTING AND INSIGHTFUL WAY TO KICKOFF 2022. SO, I IMAGINE
- 2 -- I KNOW OVER THE COURSE OF THE YEAR THERE MAY BE PIECES OF,
- 3 YOU KNOW, THE WORK THAT'S HAPPENING IN MTC AND ABAG'S
- 4 COMMITTEE PLANNING SPACES THAT MAY WANT TO BE BROUGHT HERE,
- 5 AND I'LL WORK WITH CHAIR WORTH AND ALLISON BROOKS AS TO WHEN
- 6 THAT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE. THE OTHER THING THAT HAPPENED ON
- 7 FRIDAY AND, AS PART OF THE JOINT LEGISLATION COMMITTEE, THE
- 8 MTC ABAG LEGISLATION COMMITTEE, WAS, ALSO, JUST POINTING TO
- 9 THE IMPORTANCE OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES ARISING AT BOTH THE

- 16 DESIGNS WITH THIS LETTER, OR FRAMING IT FOR HIS LIVING ROOM.

- 21 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: THAT'S GREAT. CONGRATULATIONS TO YOU, THE
- 22 STAFF, AND JESSE. AND YOUR TEAM, YOUR LEADERSHIP, YOUR TEAM
- 23 JESSE IT'S GREAT. NEXT ITEM WE'RE NOW MOVING ON TO THE REPORT

- 2 THANK YOU. WELCOME. THANK YOU SO MUCH.

- 4 JESSICA DAVENPORT: THANK YOU. GOOD MORNING TO ALL OF YOU,
- 5 CHAIR WORTH AND BARC BOARD MEMBERS AND STAFF. I'M VERY PLEASED
- 6 TO BE ABLE TO PRESENT TO YOU TODAY ABOUT THE PROGRESS OF THE
- 7 SAN FRANCISCO BAY RESTORATION AUTHORITY. AND I BELIEVE THERE
- 8 IS A POWERPOINT THAT'S GOING TO BE PRESENTED? SHOULD I WAIT
- 9 FOR THAT? THERE WE GO. GREAT. I'LL BE TALKING ABOUT HOW THE
- 10 RESTORATION AUTHORITY IN MEASURE A PASSED IN 2016 FUNDING
- 11 RESTORATION OF THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO
- 12 AS MANY OF YOU KNOW, SAN FRANCISCO BAY ONCE HAD OVER 200,000
- 13 ACRES OF TITLE WETLANDS, AND THAT WAS DRAINED FOR AGRICULTURE
- 14 AND URBANIZATION OVER MANY YEARS AND WAS LOST AND WE STARTED
- 15 TRYING TO RESTORE IT. EFFORTS IN THE NORTH BAY WITH THE NAPA
- 16 SALT PONDS AND VARIOUS OTHER EFFORTS. AND SO WE HAVE SOME, AS
- 17 YOU CAN SEE, SOME HOPES FOR 2030 OF WHERE WE HOPE TO BE WITH
- 18 THE GREEN REEMERGING ON THE MAP. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. AND, SO,
- 19 YOU KNOW, I'M SURE MANY OF YOU KNOW THIS ALREADY, BUT JUST AS
- 20 A REMINDER OF WHY DO WE RESTORE BAY HABITATS. THERE ARE HOMES
- 21 TO HUNDREDS OF SPECIES, FISH AND WILDLIFE. THEY FILTER
- 22 POLLUTANTS, THEY PROVIDE RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES, AND TIDAL
- 23 WETLANDS ACTUALLY HELP REDUCE WAVE ENERGY, AND HELP REDUCE HOW
- 24 HIGH LEVEE NEEDS TO BE, AND THAT WE YOU WILL SEE ON THE
- 25 GRAPHIC OUR GOAL OF 100,000 ACRES OF HEALTHY TIDAL AND MARSHES



- 1 THAT'S ABOUT HALF OF WHAT WE HAD HISTORICALLY, THAT'S OUR GOAL
- 2 WE HAVE ABOUT 40,000 AS OF 2,004 AND RESTORED 13,000 ACRES
- 3 SINCE 2,000 AND WE HAVE ANOTHER 25,000 ACRES THAT'S BEEN
- 4 ACOUIRED PROTECTED FROM DEVELOPMENT AND PLANNING FOR
- 5 RESTORATION AND THEN WE HAVE ANOTHER 22,000 THAT WE'LL NEED TO
- 6 ACQUIRE AND RESTORE. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO, AS YOU MIGHT
- 7 GUESS, WITH ANY OF THESE IMPORTANT GOALS THAT WE FACE AS A
- 8 REGION, THERE ARE CHALLENGES. AND, OF COURSE, FUNDING IS ONE,
- 9 BUT THE RESTORATION AUTHORITY HAS BEEN A GREAT SOURCE OF
- 10 FUNDS, AND THOSE HAVE BEEN MATCHED BY STATE AND FEDERAL
- 11 SOURCES. PERMITTING IS ALWAYS CHALLENGING, YOU GO WE HAVE BAY
- 12 RESTORATION REGULATORY INTEGRATION TEAM, KNOWN AS THE BRIT,
- 13 THAT WAS SETUP A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO, AND THAT'S HELPING TO
- 14 SPEED UP THAT PROCESS. THEY ARE DEDICATED TO REVIEWING,
- 15 SPECIFICALLY, BAY RESTORATION PROJECTS. SO THE PROJECTS THAT
- 16 ARE, WOULD BE ELIGIBLE FOR RESTORATION AUTHORITY GRANTS. THEY
- 17 DON'T ACTUALLY HAVE TO HAVE A GRANT YET, BUT THEY HAVE TO BE
- 18 IN THAT CATEGORY IS THEN THEY CAN GET SPECIAL ATTENTION FROM
- 19 THIS REGULATORY TEAM. AND SEDIMENT, BECAUSE OUR WETLANDS HAVE
- 20 SUBSIDED, ONCE THEY WERE DRAINED, THE LANDS HAVE SUBSIDED. IN
- 21 MANY CASES, IN ORDER TO ACTUALLY RESTORE A TIDAL MARSH, WE
- 22 NEED TO IMPORT SEDIMENT AND THERE IS NOT ENOUGH SEDIMENT TO
- 23 MEET THE PLANS FOR RESTORATION ALL AROUND THE BAY. WE'RE
- 24 WORKING ON IT. NEXT SLIDE. THIS WAS CREATED BY THE SAN
- 25 FRANCISCO ESTUARY CONSTITUTE A GRAPHIC ABOUT HOW DO WE THINK



- 1 ABOUT CREATING HEALTHY AND RESILIENT BAY LANDS WE NEED NOT
- 2 JUST THE SEDIMENT THERE BUT WE NEED MIGRATION SPACE SO THAT
- 3 THE WETLANDS CAN MIGRATE UPHILL AS SEA LEVEL RISES AND WE NEED
- 4 THE WATER SHED MANAGEMENT TO BRING INTO THE CREEKS RIVER AND
- 5 WETLANDS. NEXT SLIDE. THIS GIVES YOU AN IDEA OF ALL THE
- 6 DIFFERENT SOURCES OF SEDIMENT FROM THE RESERVOIRS WHERE THERE
- 7 HAS BEEN SEDIMENT BUILT UP BEHIND DAMS. THERE CAN BE SOME KIND
- 8 OF CHANNEL REALIGNMENT AND WETLAND CONNECTION IN THE AREAS
- 9 THERE IS AREAS WHERE YOU CAN USE TREATED WASTEWATER TO HELP
- 10 GROW THE WETLANDS, IS THEN THE NAVIGATIONAL DREDGING PRODUCED,
- 11 AND THE DREDGING OF PORTS AND MARINE PRODUCES DREDGE MATERIAL
- 12 THAT CAN BE TAKEN AND PLACED ON THE AREAS WHERE WETLANDS WILL
- 13 BE RESTORED. SO THERE IS NATURAL TRANSPORT, AND THEN THERE IS
- 14 OUR ACTIONS AND MANAGEMENT TO ACTUALLY MOVE SEDIMENT. NEXT
- 15 SLIDE PLEASE. A LOT OF YOU KNOW WHAT THE RESTORATION
- 16 AUTHORITY IS, BUT JUST A QUICK REMINDER FOR ANY NEW FOLKS. IT
- 17 WAS CREATED BY THE STATE LEGISLATURE IN 2008, BASED ON THE
- 18 RECOGNITION OF THE URGENT NEED TO RESTORE THE BAY. IT HAS A
- 19 LOCAL GOVERNING BOARD, INCLUDING SUPERVISOR GIOIA, MADE UP OF
- 20 ELECTED OFFICIALS, AND SOME OF YOUR OTHER COLLEAGUES. OUR
- 21 CHAIR IS DAVE PINE, WHO IS ALSO PART OF BARC, AND IT ALSO HAS
- 22 A COMMUNITY BASED ADVISORY COMMITTEE THAT INCLUDES A VARIETY
- 23 OF STAKEHOLDERS, BOTH GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES, AND NON-PROFIT
- 24 REPRESENTATIVES, AND INDIVIDUALS. AND MEASURE AA, WHICH WAS ON
- 25 THE BALLOT IN 2015 GENERATES THE FUNDS THROUGH A PARCEL TAX



- 1 TO, FOR THE AUTHORITY TO ACCOMPLISH ITS MISSION, AND THEN
- 2 THERE IS AN INDEPENDENT OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE THAT PROVIDES AN
- 3 UNBIASED ANNUAL REVIEW OF OUR WORK. SO UNDER MEASURE AA,
- 4 THERE IS THIS \$12 PER YEAR PARCEL TAX THAT'S GOING TO GENERATE
- 5 \$500 MILLION OVER 20 YEARS, AND WE'RE IN YEAR FIVE RIGHT NOW.
- 6 AND THIS MEASURE PASSED WITH OVER 70% OF THE VOTE. AND THIS IS
- 7 REALLY RARE. I THINK, YOU KNOW, WE HAVE RECEIVED INOUIRIES
- 8 FROM ALL OVER THE COUNTRY OF PEOPLE WHO WOULD LIKE TO DO
- 9 SOMETHING SIMILAR TO RESTORE HABITAT IN THEIR REGIONS. AND
- 10 EVEN BEYOND HABITAT, JUST TO HAVE A REGIONAL FUNDING SOURCE,
- 11 LIKE THIS, IS RARE. SO THE COMPLETE RESTORATION IS ESTIMATED
- 12 TO COST OVER 2 BILLION, SO THE RESTORATION CAN GET US PART OF
- 13 THE WAY THERE BUT OBVIOUSLY WE'LL NEED STATE AND FEDERAL FUNDS
- 14 TOO. NEXT SLIDE. AND, SO, WHAT IS ACTUALLY ELIGIBLE TO
- 15 RECEIVE THESE FUNDS? SO, THEY HAVE TO BE HABITAT PROJECTS THAT
- 16 WILL RESTORE, PROTECT, OR ENHANCE THE TIDAL WETLANDS OR OTHER
- 17 NATURAL HABITATS ALONG THE SHORELINE. BUT THOSE HABITAT
- 18 PROJECTS CAN HAVE FLOOD MANAGEMENT OR PUBLIC ACCESS ELEMENTS
- 19 AND THEN THOSE CAN BE FUNDED TOO. SO, NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE.
- 20 AND, THEN, SOME MIGHT ASK, WHAT DO YOU MEAN BY "ALONG THE
- 21 SHORELINE" SO THIS INCLUDES THE SUBTIDAL HABITATS WITHIN A
- 22 REASONABLE DISTANCE OF THE SHORELINE THAT CAN INCLUDE OYSTER
- 23 REEFS AND THE GRASS HABITAT AND THE BAY LANDS THAT'S WHAT
- 24 WE'RE MOST FAMILIAR WITH WHAT WE THINK OF BAY HABITATS, THAT'S
- 25 THE TIDAL MARSHES, MUD FLATS, AND THEN WE HAVE THE TRANSITION



- 1 ZONES. SO, JUST UPLAND OF THOSE BAY LANDS, WE HAVE AREAS THAT
- 2 ARE IMPORTANT HABITAT THAT'S PART OF A HABITAT MOSAIC THAT THE
- 3 SPECIES THAT MOVE BETWEEN SUBTIDAL BAY LAND AND TRADITION
- 4 ZONE. AND THEN THERE IS ALSO THE MIGRATION SPACE THAT WE
- 5 TALKED ABOUT SO IT MIGHT NOT BE BAY LANDS NOW BUT WE EXPECT IT
- 6 TO BE IN THE FUTURE SO IT WOULD BE GREAT TO GET IT READY FOR
- 7 THAT AS SEA LEVEL RISES. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. WITHIN MEASURE AA
- 8 THERE ARE FOCUS IN CLEAN WATER AND POLLUTION PREVENTION. SO WE
- 9 CAN FUND A VARIETY OF ACTIVITIES. PRIMARILY THE WETLANDS
- 10 THEMSELVES PROVIDING THAT CLEAN WATER FUNCTION OF FILTERING
- 11 POLLUTANTS BUT IT ALSO CAN FUND SOME SHORELINE CLEAN UP AND
- 12 OTHER WAYS OF RESTORING CREEKS WHERE THEY FLOW INTO THE BAY.
- 13 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, THIS IS KIND OF THE HEART OF THE
- 14 PROGRAM, THE VITAL FISH, BIRD, AND WILDLIFE HABITAT. WE HAVE A
- 15 FEW ANGLES ON THIS WITHIN MEASURE AA, ENHANCING THE REFUGE AND
- 16 OTHER PUBLIC LANDS TO IMPROVE THE HABITAT PROTECTING RESTORING
- 17 WETLANDS AND OTHER HABITATS AND PROVIDING STEWARDSHIP
- 18 MONITORING AND MAINTENANCE. IT'S SOMEWHAT UNUSUAL IN THAT IT
- 19 CAN ACTUALLY EXTEND STEWARDSHIP MAINTENANCE AND MONITORING A
- 20 LOT OF BOND PROGRAMS CAN RARELY SPEND ON THOSE THINGS SO IT'S
- 21 A GREAT NEED. OF COURSE, FLOOD PROTECTION AS I MENTIONED
- 22 WETLANDS CAN HELP WITH FLOOD PROTECTION AND OUR PROJECTS CAN
- 23 INCLUDE LEVEES THAT ARE PART OF A NECESSARY WETLAND
- 24 RESTORATION. I AM SURE MANY OF YOU ARE FAMILIAR WITH THE SOUTH
- 25 BAY SHORELINE PROJECT AND THAT LARGE LEVEE THAT WILL PROTECT



- 1 THE COMMUNITY ALVISO, AND PROTECT THE THOUSANDS 3,000 ACRES OF
- 2 WETLANDS. PUBLIC ACCESS IS KEY. WE WANT PEOPLE TO BE ABLE TO
- 3 GET OUT AND ENJOY THESE RESTORED HABITATS. SO OUR FUNDING CAN
- 4 CONSTRUCT NEW, OR REPAIR EXISTING TRAILS AND OTHER FACILITIES
- 5 AND PROVIDE INTERPRETIVE MATERIALS AND SPECIAL EVENTS. I THINK
- 6 THIS IS REALLY IMPORTANT, ESPECIALLY IN SOME OF THE
- 7 ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES THAT HAVE BEEN CUT OFF
- 8 FROM THE SHORELINE AND IT'S BEEN VERY INDUSTRIALIZED, BUT TO
- 9 MAKE SURE THAT THOSE AREAS THAT ARE AVAILABLE ARE MORE
- 10 ACCESSIBLE AND ARE MEETING THE COMMUNITY'S NEEDS. NEXT SLIDE,
- 11 PLEASE. SO, MEASURE AA SETS OUT SOME PRIORITIZATION CRITERIA
- 12 FOR GRANT DECISIONS. I WON'T READ THROUGH THESE, BUT YOU CAN
- 13 SEE THERE ARE A VARIETY OF AREAS OF FOCUS. NEXT SLIDE,
- 14 PLEASE. AND, THEN, WE HAVE A REQUIREMENT OVER THE 20 YEARS OF
- 15 THE PARCEL TAX TO DISTRIBUTE THE FUNDS GEOGRAPHICALLY BY THESE
- 16 FOUR REGIONS. AND THAT IS BASED ON THE 2010 CENSUS. AND, SO,
- 17 YOU WILL SEE THE NUMBERS OF THE PERCENTAGES ADD UP TO 50.
- 18 BECAUSE ONLY 50% OF THE FUNDING IS REQUIRED TO BE DISTRIBUTED
- 19 IN THIS WAY; AND THE OTHER 50% CAN BE DISTRIBUTED BASED ON THE
- 20 OTHER PRIORITIZATION CRITERIA THAT I JUST SHARED. NEXT SLIDE.
- 21 SO, WE FUNDED 30 PROJECTS TO DATE. THIS MAP KIND OF SHOWS YOU
- 22 HOW WELL DISTRIBUTED THEY ARE ALL AROUND THE BAY. WE HAVE A
- 23 NEW COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM THAT'S A SEPARATE TRACK FOR
- 24 COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS, FROM ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED
- 25 COMMUNITIES, TO GET EASIER ACCESS TO OUR GRANT FUNDS. AND THEN



- 1 WE HAVE PROJECTS SPREAD AROUND THE REGIONS. YOU WILL NOTICE
- 2 THAT WILL SOUTH AREA HAS ONLY THREE PROJECTS, BUT THEY'RE
- 3 REALLY BIG; SOUTH BAY, THE SALT PONDS, THE SHORELINE AND THEN
- 4 WE HAVE ANOTHER ONE THAT'S RELATED TO THE SOUTH BAY SALT PONDS
- 5 THAT'S GOING TO CONNECT THE CREEKS IN THAT AREA TO ONE OF THE
- 6 PONDS, AND THAT REFLECTS THE NEED TO RECONNECT MARSHES WITH
- 7 THEIR WATER SHEDS AND BRINGING SEDIMENT IN THERE. BUT YOU WILL
- 8 SEE THERE IS QUITE A LOT IN THE NORTH. THE EAST BAY HAS
- 9 SEVERAL PROJECTS. THE WEST HASN'T HAD AS MANY TO DATE, BUT
- 10 THEY'RE STARTING TO RAMP UP. AND WE HAVE AUTHORIZED \$117
- 11 MILLION SO FAR. NEXT SLIDE. SO, AS YOU CAN SEE, THE
- 12 GEOGRAPHIC, WE ARE ON TRACK TO ACHIEVE OUR 20-YEAR GOALS, FOR
- 13 THE GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDING. AFTER FOUR OF THE 20
- 14 YEARS, WE WOULD EXPECT TO BE AT 20%, AND YOU CAN SEE THAT ALL
- 15 OF THE REGIONS ARE OVER 20%. CLEARLY THE SOUTH BAY IS AHEAD,
- 16 BECAUSE OF THE SHORELINE PROJECT, BUT THE OTHERS ARE CATCHING
- 17 UP AND WE'RE CONFIDENT WE, WE HAVE DONE ANALYSIS TO SHOW THAT
- 18 WE CAN GET THERE, BASED ON THE PROJECTS THAT WE'RE AWARE OF
- 19 THAT ARE IN THE CONCEPTUAL PHASE. NEXT SLIDE. JUST TO BE

- 24 RESTORATION AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR LIVING SHORE LINES AND
- 25 BENEFITS TO ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES SUCH AS



- 1 IMPROVING PARKS AND TRAILS, CREATING JOBS AND INTERNSHIPS.
- 2 NEXT SLIDE. SO YOU MIGHT HAVE BEEN WONDERING WHAT I MEANT BY
- 3 "LIVING SHORE LINES" THIS IS AN EXAMPLE OF ALL THE KINDS OF
- 4 THINGS THAT CAN GO IN TO LIVING SHORE LINES. SO, BASICALLY WE
- 5 OFTEN THINK OF OYSTER REEFS AND THESE ARE THINGS WE CAN BUILD
- 6 INTO OUR SHORELINE PROTECTION AND HAVE NATURE BASED ELEMENTS
- 7 THEY CAN ABSORB WAVE ENERGY AND REDUCE THE HARD STRUCTURE NEED
- 8 FOR HARD STRUCTURES OR REDUCE HOW BIG AND, YOU KNOW, BASICALLY
- 9 HOW SOLID THOSE HARD STRUCTURES NEED TO BE. THEY MIGHT BE ABLE
- 10 TO BE A ROCK CALL INSTEAD OF CONCRETE OR SOMETHING LIKE THAT.
- 11 AND, SO, THE ROCKS CAN HAVE PLANTS INTERSPERSED IN THEM. SO
- 12 THERE ARE WAYS TO INTEGRATE THE IMPORTANT SHORELINE PROTECTION
- 13 THAT WE NEED WITH NATURAL ELEMENTS. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO
- 14 THESE ARE SOME EXAMPLES OF THE KINDS OF THINGS WE HAVE FUNDED.
- 15 I ALREADY MENTIONED THE SHORELINE PROJECT. THAT'S ONE OF OUR -
- 16 THAT'S OUR LARGEST GRANT TO DATE. THE TISCORNIA MARSH
- 17 PROJECT IS ANOTHER ONE THAT'S A GOOD EXAMPLE OF HOW THE
- 18 PROJECTS COMBINE, HABITAT RESTORATION, FLOOD PROTECTION, AND
- 19 PUBLIC ACCESS. THIS IS NEIGHBORING THE CANAL DISTRICT IN SAN
- 20 RAFAEL, AND THERE HAS BEEN A GREAT COLLABORATION BETWEEN MARIN
- 21 AUTOBAHN SOCIETY AND THE MULTICULTURAL CENTER OF MARIN TO
- 22 ENGAGE THE RESIDENTS IN THEIR PLANNING PROCESS. SOME EXAMPLES
- 23 OF LIVING SHORE LINES AND RESTORING FLOODPLAINS WE HAVE FUNDED
- 24 THE REMOVAL IN THE CITY OF RICHMOND AND THAT WILL BE CLEANED
- 25 UP. WALNUT CREEK RESTORATION THERE WAS A BIG CEREMONY RECENTLY



- 1 FOR THAT PROJECT THAT'S VERY EXCITING. IT'S RECONNECTING
- 2 WALNUT CREEK TO THE BAY THAT HAS BEEN DISCONNECTED, I THINK,
- 3 FOR 100 YEARS. AND SOME EXAMPLES OF ENGAGING ECONOMICALLY
- 4 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. WE HAVE BEEN TO THE OAKLAND
- 5 SHORELINE LEADERSHIP ACADEMY WHICH HAS REALLY ENGAGED A GREAT
- 6 CROSS SECTION OF RESIDENTS IN OAKLAND TO GET TO KNOW THEIR
- 7 SHORELINE, GET TO KNOW THE ISSUES AND ACTUALLY GET TO DEVELOP

- 11 JUSTICE NGO, COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATION. AND THEN ANOTHER
- 12 GREAT EXAMPLE IS THE CANDLESTICK POINT COMMUNITY STEWARDSHIP
- 13 PROJECT IT'S ONE OF OUR FIRST COMMUNITY GRANTS AND THAT'S TO
- 14 THE LITERACY FOR ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE COMMUNITY-BASED
- 15 ORGANIZATION AND THEY HAVE ALREADY BEEN ENGAGED WITH
- 16 RESTORATION FOR MANY YEARS AND THIS IS ALLOWING THEM TO DO
- 17 MORE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT FOR LOCAL YOUTH TO GET INVOLVED IN
- 18 ENVIRONMENTAL RESTORATION CAREERS. NEXT SLIDE. AND THAT'S MY

- 3 WE'RE CALLING THEM "INITIATIVES" THAT ADVANCE HIGH PRIORITY
- 4 SHARED CLIMATE GOALS. AND WE'RE TRYING, IN THIS INITIAL SHARED
- 5 WORK PLAN, WE WANT TO HAVE SOME MEASURABLE DELIVERABLES. SOME
- 6 OUTCOMES IN THE NEXT 1 TO 5 YEARS. AND THAT'S GOING TO, TO
- 7 ACCOMPLISH THAT, IT REQUIRES GREATER COORDINATION. AND I JUST
- 8 WANT TO HIGHLIGHT THIS NOTION OF, YOU KNOW, THIS ISN'T JUST A
- 9 PLANNING EXERCISE. I THINK IT'S -- AND THERESE WAS GETTING TO
- 10 THIS EARLIER, IT'S THIS IDEA OF REALLY THINKING ABOUT
- 11 PLANNING. WE ALWAYS NEED TO BE DOING PLANNING. PLANNING IS
- 12 ISN'T A STATIC EXERCISE. WE ALWAYS NEED TO BE THINKING OF THE
- 13 FUTURE MAKING ADJUSTMENTS CHECKING TO MAKE SURE PLANS IN PLACE
- 14 ARE ACHIEVING WHAT WE NEED TO ACHIEVE, BUT WE NEED TO THINK
- 15 ABOUT ACTIONABLE PLANNING AND TYING IT TO IMPLEMENTATION. AND
- 16 WHAT THAT DOES IS IT SETS UP VALUES AND CRITERIA AND
- 17 PRINCIPLES THAT MAKE SURE OUR IMPLEMENTATION IS SUCCESSFUL AND
- 18 IS MEETING OBJECTIVES WE INTENDED AND ALSO MAKE CHECKING UP
- 19 AND YOU HOLDING US ACCOUNTABLE MAKING SURE WE'RE MEETING THE
- 20 GOALS WE OUTLINED AROUND EQUITY AND ENSURING WE'RE NOT DOING
- 21 ANY FURTHER HARM TO OUR MOST DISADVANTAGED, ECONOMICALLY
- 22 DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, BUT WE'RE ACTUALLY IMPROVING THE
- 23 OUALITY OF LIFE IN THOSE COMMUNITIES AND MAKING SURE THAT
- 24 EVERYTHING WE'RE DOING IS ORIENTED TO THAT. SO, IT'S ABOUT
- 25 THINKING OF PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION CONCURRENTLY, AND



- 1 IDENTIFYING THOSE PLACES WHERE IT'S ESSENTIAL THAT WE WORK
- 2 TOGETHER, THAT NO ONE AGENCY CAN DO IT ALONE. SO THOSE TWO
- 3 AREAS THAT WE'RE WORKING O AND WE HAVE DEVELOPED TWO WORKING
- 4 GROUPS AND WE'RE GOING TO DELVE INTO THAT MORE IS FOCUS ON
- 5 CLIMATE ADAPTATION SO FOLKS LIKE JESSICA D WHO YOU JUST HEARD
- 6 FROM IS SERVING ON THE CLIMATE ADAPTATION WORKING GROUP AND WE
- 7 ALSO HAVE A GROUP FOCUSED ON GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION. AND
- 8 IT'S KIND OF GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION LET'S SAY WRIT LARGE
- 9 BECAUSE IT'S ALSO FOCUSED ON CLEAN AIR, REDUCING, YOU KNOW,
- 10 WE'RE INITIALLY FOCUSING ON ELECTRIFICATION OF VEHICLES, BUT I
- 11 THINK IT STARTS TO EXPAND INTO A LOT OF DIFFERENT AREAS. SO
- 12 WE'RE WRESTLING WITH DEVELOPING THE INITIATIVE IN THAT AREA.
- 13 AND PART OF THIS, TO CHAIR WORTH'S POINT, IS, EACH OF THE
- 14 AGENCIES WHO ARE PARTICIPATING, ALL OF THE AGENCIES YOU HAVE
- 15 HEARD FROM, FROM THE EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP, ARE COMMITTING TO -
- 16 COMMITTING APPROPRIATE STAFF TIME AND RESOURCES TO THESE
- 17 INITIATIVES IN THIS NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AND HOPEFULLY FUTURE
- 18 YEAR BUDGETS, AND JUST ACCOUNTING FOR STAFF TIME EFFORT ANDS
- 19 TO ACCOMPLISH THE GOALS WE'RE SETTING OUT. COMMITMENT TO
- 20 EQUITY. SO WE'LL GET INTO THE EVALUATION CRITERIA, AND KATE IS
- 21 GOING TO TALKS ABOUT THE EVALUATION CRITERIA WE'LL USE TO
- 22 IDENTIFY THESE INITIATIVES, BUT FUNDAMENTAL TO THAT IS A
- 23 COMMITMENT TO EQUITY. AND, YOU KNOW, WRITTEN INTO THE JOINT
- 24 RESOLUTION IS THIS -- IS THE IDEA OF DEVELOPING WORKING
- 25 TOGETHER, A TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM WORKING IN



- 1 PARTNERSHIP WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENTS, COMMUNITY-BASED
- 2 ORGANIZATIONS, YOU KNOW, IF FUNDED, IF WE CAN GET THE
- 3 RESOURCES TO DO THIS, TO REALLY ADVANCE THESE GOALS, AND, YOU
- 4 KNOW, WE HAVE TALKED A LOT PREVIOUSLY ABOUT WHAT'S THE ROLE OF
- 5 LOCAL GOVERNMENT. WHAT NEEDS TO HAPPEN AT THE LOCAL LEVEL?
- 6 WHAT'S THE ROLE OF THE REGIONAL AGENCIES AND REGIONAL PARTNERS
- 7 AND SUPPORTING LOCAL ACTION. SO REALLY GETTING INTO THE WEEDS
- 8 AND THE DETAILS ABOUT HOW TO CREATE THIS KIND OF FUNCTIONAL

- 10 THE THINGS THAT NEED TO HAPPEN AT ALL SCALES OF GOVERNMENT,
- 11 OPTIMIZING THE SKILLS AND EXPERTISE AROUND THE REGION TO REACH

- 23 WHICH WE -- WHICH JESSICA MENTIONED, TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE
- 24 MAKING GOOD DECISIONS AND LOCAL -- IN COMMUNITIES. IN
- 25 ADDRESSING THOSE POTENTIAL CONFLICT BETWEEN CLIMATE ADAPTATION



- 1 PLANNING AND HOUSING PRESERVATION AND PRODUCTION. WE DON'T
- 2 WANT -- WE KNOW WE NEED MORE HOUSING. WE NEED, DESPERATELY,
- 3 BUT WE ALSO HAVE SOME REAL RISK IN HAZARDS WE'RE DEALING WITH
- 4 AND THINKING ABOUT THESE THINGS CONCURRENTLY, AND NOT USING

- 1 REQUIREMENT, MAYBE WE COULD TAKE AN HOUR ON FEBRUARY 18TH, TO
- 2 JUST DO A LITTLE BIT OF WORKSHOPPING BASED ON THE WORK THAT'S
- 3 HAPPENING BETWEEN NOW AND THEN, POTENTIALLY. SO WE'RE GOING TO
- 4 FIGURE OUT IF THAT'S POSSIBLE. WE WANT TO BRING A DRAFT

- 12 FRAMEWORK IS A REALLY GOOD START. I DID HAVE A FEW OUESTIONS,
- 13 ONE AROUND SLIDE -- WHAT IS THIS -- THE SLIDE ON EXAMPLES OF
- 14 POTENTIAL SHARED WORK PLANNING INITIATIVES AND THEN A QUESTION
- 15 AROUND METRICS. I AM VERY INTERESTED IN SOME OF THE, SORT OF,
- 16 INITIATIVES AROUND CLIMATE ADAPTATION. THE LINKED LENS
- 17 PLANNING AND CLIMATE ADAPTATION THIS IS COMPLEX IS MANY OF US
- 18 HAVE TALKED ABOUT FOR OUITE SOMETIME AND COMES UP FREQUENTLY
- 19 AT BCDC, AND I THINK MEMBERS OF THIS BOARD HAVE SAID THAT THEY
- 20 WISHED THAT BCDC OR SOME EXISTING REGULATORY AGENCY HAD MORE
- 21 AUTHORITY IN THIS AREA. BECAUSE THERE IS A DISCONNECT BETWEEN
- 22 LOCAL LAND USE PLANNING AND THE THREATS OF SEA LEVEL RISE AND
- 23 THE NEED FOR US TO CONSIDER THOSE RESPECTED IMPACTS, AND HOW
- 24 WE PLAN AND HOW WE GROW IN THAT'S SUSTAINABLE, AS WELL AS
- 25 EQUITABLE. THAT'S KIND OF ONE OF THE KEY PRINCIPLES BEHIND



- 1 PLANNED BAY AREA. AND THAT'S THE GOAL OF PLANNED BAY AREA IS
- 2 HOW WE LOOK AT PLANNING IN A COMPREHENSIVE WAY IN THE REGION
- 3 BUT HOW DO WE TAKE THAT HIGH-LEVEL DOCUMENT AND ACTUALLY
- 4 CREATE CHANGE ON THE GROUND, I GUESS IS WHAT YOU'RE TALKING
- 5 ABOUT AND I AM CURIOUS, I'M REALLY INTERESTED IN THIS
- 6 QUESTION, HOW DO WE DO THAT, WITHOUT GETTING SOME REGULATORY
- 7 AGENCY THE AUTHORITY TO IMPLEMENT OR ENFORCE? IS IT, YOU
- 8 KNOW, HAVING COMMON, KIND OF, SORT OF, COMMON LAND USE
- 9 PLANNING PRINCIPLES AND THEN WORKING WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO
- 10 INTEGRATE THEM IN THEIR HOUSING ELEMENTS AND AREA PLANS? SO
- 11 THERE HAS GOT TO BE A TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PIECE. WE'RE GOING
- 12 TO HAVE TO HAVE, SORT OF, COMMON, SORT OF, TEMPLATE POLICIES
- 13 FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO IMPLEMENT, THEN THERE IS ALSO, HOW DO
- 14 WE PROVIDE THE TRAINING AND THE SUPPORT FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS,
- 15 IN THESE REGULATORY AGENCIES, AS WELL. SO I'M CURIOUS ABOUT
- 16 WHAT -- YOU KNOW, WHAT YOU'RE THINKING AROUND THAT. BECAUSE I
- 17 THINK IT'S A REALLY IMPORTANT ISSUE. AND IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT
- 18 RIGHT NOW AS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS ARE DOING THEIR HOUSING ELEMENT
- 19 UPDATES TO IMPLEMENT THOSE RHNA NUMBERS OF THAT MS. MCMILLAN
- 20 JUST TALKED ABOUT THAT WE APPROVED. I'M CURIOUS WHAT YOUR
- 21 ENVISIONING AND HOW SOON WE WOULD BE ABLE TO LAUNCH SOME OF
- 22 THAT WORK?

24 ALLISON BROOKS: I THINK JUST SOLVED IT ALL. [LAUGHTER] YOU

25 JUST LAID IT OUT SO CLEARLY VICE CHAIR ARREGUIN. THERE IS



- 1 REALLY NO MAGIC HERE. ONE OF THE THINGS WE'RE DOING CURRENTLY,
- 2 THERE IS SOME STATE MONEY NOW FOR REGIONAL PLANNING, AND SOME
- 3 RESOURCES COMING TO THE AGENCIES HERE AROUND THE TABLE, AND
- 4 REALLY FIGURING OUT WHAT WOULD A REGION PLAN, THERE'S A
- 5 SHORELINE PLAN, WHICH I KNOW BCDC WANTS TO TAKE -- WILL TAKE A
- 6 LEAD ON -- BUT THEN THIS LARGER, KIND OF, LAND USE PLAN, AND
- 7 HOW -- THAT WE NEED TO DEVELOP SOME CRITERIA FOR, LIKE, SOME
- 8 STANDARDS FOR WHAT WE'RE EXPECTING FOR SHORELINE PLANNING, AND
- 9 FOR LAND USE PLANNING, AND THEN, HOPEFULLY, A PLANNING GRANT
- 10 PROGRAM FOR RESOURCES GOING TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO DO, AS YOU
- 11 SAY, KIND OF INTEGRATE THIS WORK INTO THEIR EXISTING PLANNING
- 12 PROCESSES, OR DEVELOP AN ADAPTATION PLAN FOR THEIR COMMUNITY
- 13 WITH STRATEGIES. AND THEN THE AGENCIES WORKING TOGETHER TO
- 14 PROVIDE THAT WRAP AROUND SUPPORT, OR TECHNICAL SUPPORT TO
- 15 SUPPORT LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AS THEY'RE GOING THROUGH THIS
- 16 PROCESS AND PROVIDING TOOLS AND GUIDANCE AS THEIR DEVELOPING
- 17 THEIR PLANS AND IMPLEMENTING THEIR PLANS. AND I CAN OPEN IT UP
- 18 TO ANY OF MY PARTNERS HERE THAT COULD WEIGH IN, BUT THAT
- 19 REALLY IS -- AND I THINK IT'S ESSENTIAL TO TIE IT IN, BOTH BAY
- 20 ADAPT THAT BCDC HAS DEVELOPED IS LAYING OUT SOME ACTIONS, AND
- 21 YOU KNOW THERE'S A TON OF WORK WITH BAY ADAPT AND PLANNED BAY
- 22 AREA BEING INTEGRATED TOGETHER TO THINK ABOUT HOW TO DO THIS
- WORK.



- 1 JESSE ARREGUIN, V. CHAIR: I GUESS, ONE FOLLOW-UP OUESTION THEN
- 2 AN ENTIRE DIFFERENT ISSUE TO SUPERVISOR GIOIA, WOULD THERE BE
- 3 -- WHO WOULD DO THIS WORK WHAT ENTITY TO KIND OF PERPETUATE,
- 4 TO PROVIDE THE GRANT FUNDS AND SUPPORT THE TECHNICAL
- 5 ASSISTANCE?

- 7 ALLISON BROOKS: THOSE ARE THE DETAILS WE WOULD WANT TO WORK
- 8 OUT IN THE INITIATIVE. AND I THINK IN PREVIOUS RESOLUTIONS
- 9 THERE IS -- AND THIS IS WHERE, YOU KNOW -- THERE IS AN ENTITY
- 10 THAT MANAGES THE GRANT. MTC AND ABAG COULD RECEIVE FUNDING AND
- 11 MANAGE THE ADAPTATION PLANNING GRANT PROGRAMS OF COASTAL
- 12 CONSERVANCY, POTENTIALLY, AGENCIES WORKING TOGETHER THERE IS A
- 13 COLLABORATIVE WAY OF LAY OUT THOSE ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES
- 14 AND MAPPING OUT AND EVERYONE IS CLEAR ON WHO IS DOING WHAT, I
- 15 THINK WE'LL RESOLVE SOME OF THESE CHALLENGES THAT YOU HAVE
- 16 IDENTIFIED.

- 18 JESSE ARREGUIN, V. CHAIR: QUESTION ON, SORT OF, THE METRICS.
- 19 AROUND EFFECTIVENESS. I THINK, YOU KNOW, ONE ISSUE IS, SORT
- 20 OF, THERE IS, SORT OF, THE GOALS OF EACH RESPECTIVE AGENCY,
- 21 BECAUSE WE ALL HAVE DIFFERENT ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES, BUT
- 22 I THINK WE NEED TO, KIND OF, MEASURE, LIKE, WHAT IS THE LONG-
- 23 TERM GOAL, AS IF, ARE WE MEASURING BASED ON BAY ADAPT OR
- 24 PLANNED BAY AREA? YOU KNOW? LIKE, WHAT ARE THE OUTCOMES THAT
- 25 WE WANT TO ACHIEVE? AND WE HAVE TO LOOK AROUND ALL THESE



- 1 DIFFERENT PLANNING DOCUMENTS. I THINK, OVERALL OUTCOME IS TO
- 2 PROTECT OUR REGION FROM THE IMPACTS OF SEA LEVEL RISE, AND TO
- 3 CREATE GREATER RESILIENCY, AND TO REDUCE GHG, AND TO
- 4 TRANSITION TOWARDS A FOSSIL FREE FUTURE, BUT I THINK WE NEED
- 5 TO HONE IN ON WHAT THOSE SPECIFIC METRICS ARE SO THAT WE WITH
- 6 MEASURE EFFECTIVENESS ON THAT BASIS. SO I WANTED TO SUGGEST
- 7 THAT. I'M VERY EXCITED BY THIS. I THINK THIS IS A HUGE STEP
- 8 FORWARD. YOU KNOW, WE DID ADOPT THE BAY ADAPT PLATFORM, ABAG,
- 9 IN DECEMBER. I THINK THIS IS A CRITICAL PIECE OF OUR
- 10 RECOMMENDATION. AND A WORKING PARTNERSHIP.

- 12 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: I SEE OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR HAS A QUESTION.
- 13 I THINK YOU WANT TO RESPOND TO HIS COMMENTS? THEN JOHN WE'LL
- 14 TURN TO YOU, AND THEN COMMISSIONER SPERING.

- 16 THERESE MCMILLAN: JUST VERY BRIEFLY, BECAUSE I THINK VICE
- 17 CHAIR ARREGUIN DID NAIL. [LAUGHTER] THE CHALLENGING AHEAD. AND
- 18 BACK TO THE EXAMPLES OF THE INITIATIVES THEMSELVES,
- 19 PARTICULARLY THE ONE, AS YOU POINTED OUT ON THE REGULATORY
- 20 FRONT, AND HOW THAT GETS MANAGED, BUT THEN THE CRITICAL
- 21 COORDINATION WITH HOUSING. [LAUGHTER] AND CLIMATE ADAPTATION.
- 22 I THINK ONE OF THE THINGS IS, YOU KNOW, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR
- 23 TEAM THAT WE NEED TO CONSIDER IN ALL OF THIS IS THE OPTIMAL
- 24 VERSUS TACTICAL APPROACH TO DEALING WITH ALL OF THIS. AS AN
- 25 EXAMPLE, AS YOU HIGHLIGHTED, THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE HOUSING



- 1 ELEMENTS FOR RHNA SIX IS A HUGE OPPORTUNITY, RIGHT, FOR BETTER
- 2 COORDINATION. BUT THAT'S GOT A VERY STRICT AND IMMOVABLE
- 3 TIMELINE. SO IF IT'S NOT POSSIBLE FOR, YOU KNOW, CITY A, ON
- 4 THE SHORELINE, THAT HAS TO DEAL WITH THE BIG NUMBER, TO PUT IN
- 5 PLACE THE TYPE OF LOCAL, COORDINATED, REGIONAL SEA LEVEL RISE
- 6 ADAPTATION CLIMATE PLAN, WHAT DO WE DO IN THE MEANTIME? RIGHT?
- 7 AND I THINK IN THAT -- IN ORDER TO TAKE AS MUCH ADVANTAGE OF
- 8 THE FACT THAT THEY'RE DEVELOPING A HOUSING ELEMENT WITH
- 9 CONSIDERATIONS WE WOULD WANT THEM TO DO, AND, YOU KNOW, AGAIN,
- 10 I THINK IT'S LOOKING TO TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE OPPORTUNITIES, AS
- 11 YOU KNOW, WHEN WE PUT TOGETHER THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE
- 12 PROGRAM UNDER REAP, 1.0, 1 OF THE THINGS THAT WE ESTABLISHED
- 13 WERE THESE, SORT OF, COUNTY COLLABORATIVES WHERE THERE COULD
- 14 BE SHARED PLANNING ON A COMMON ISSUE, AND AS I RECALL, AND I
- 15 DON'T HAVE MY EXPERTS ON THE OTHER LINE -- MY STAFF EXPERTS --
- 16 BUT I BELIEVE ONE HAD TO DO WITH CLIMATE RISK, WILDFIRE RISK,
- 17 OR ONE OF THOSE, THERE COULD BE A MODEL MAYBE SUPPORTED BY
- 18 REAP 2.0, FOR A SIMILAR FOCUS HERE. SO, EVEN THOUGH THE
- 19 COMPREHENSIVE WRAP AROUND LOCAL CLIMATE POLICY MIGHT NOT BE
- 20 TIMED WITH THE, YOU KNOW, THE CONCLUSION OF THE HOUSING
- 21 ELEMENTS, THERE COULD BE AN AWARENESS OF PRIORITIES AND
- 22 CONSIDERATIONS AND WHAT NOT THAT COULD BE WRAPPED IN. SO I
- 23 THINK THAT'S -- THAT'S SOMETHING THAT CROSSES MY MIND AS WE
- 24 LOOK TO THESE POINTS OF MOVING FROM PLANNED IMPLEMENTATION. IS
- 25 THAT SOMETIMES THERE IS CONSTRAINTS WE CAN'T CHANGE, BUT IT



- 1 DOESN'T MEAN WE CAN'T S CORRECTIVELY WORK WITH THEM OR WORK
- 2 WITHIN THEM, AND I THINK THAT'S ONE OF THE THINGS THAT,
- 3 CERTAINLY, I AND MY TEAM WOULD HAVE AN EYE ON.

- 13 FOR THE NEXT RHNA CYCLE, WE PROBABLY SHOULD TALK ABOUT STATE
- 14 LEGISLATION TO REQUIRE THAT COUNTIES AND CITIES HAVE TO DO
- 15 THE, INTEGRATE THIS, INTO THEIR PLANNING RATHER THAN DOING IT
- 16 VOLUNTARILY. I DON'T THINK WE'RE GOING TO SOLVE IT RIGHT NOW,
- 17 BUT THAT'S JUST A KIND OF PERSPECTIVE THING. THANK YOU, MADAM
- 18 CHAIR.

- 20 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: I THINK WITH THE SUCCESS OF THE REAP PROGRAM
- 21 ENABLING CITIES TO DO THE HOUSING PLANNING FOR THIS CYCLE, IT
- 22 MAKES A HUGE DIFFERENCE TO HAVE THOSE RESOURCES TO DO THAT
- 23 PLANNING. SO, THANK YOU, JESSE, FOR THOSE COMMENTS AND
- 24 QUESTIONS. NOW I WOULD LIKE TO TURN TO SUPERVISOR GIOIA AND
- 25 THEN SUPERVISOR SPERING.

- 2 JOHN GIOIA: THANKS, AMY. AND I WANT TO SAY, I APPRECIATE
- 3 MAYOR ARREGUIN RAISING THIS ISSUE ABOUT, YOU KNOW, REGIONAL
- 4 REGULATORY ACTION VERSUS, YOU KNOW, LOCAL, SORT OF, VOLUNTARY
- 5 ACTION. I THINK THIS IS REALLY AT THE HEART OF SO MANY ISSUES
- 6 WE'RE DEALING WITH, AND I AM GOING TO SAY SOMETHING THEY SAID
- 7 WHEN WE -- WHEN AT BCDC WE VOTED TO APPROVE BAY DEPENDANT. THE
- 8 BAY ADAPT DOES NOT GO FAR ENOUGH. IT'S DEPENDENT -- SEA LEVEL
- 9 RISE AND RESILIENCY, THAT DEPENDS UPON SOLITARY ACTION BY
- 10 CITIES ISN'T GOING TO ULTIMATELY GET THE JOB DONE. BECAUSE,
- 11 WHEN IMPACTS, WHETHER IT'S AIR QUALITY IMPACTS, SEA LEVEL
- 12 RISE, ARE REGIONAL IN NATURE, AND IF ONE JURISDICTION, ONE
- 13 CITY, OR ONE COUNTY, DOESN'T TAKE THE ACTION THEY NEED TO, IT
- 14 AFFECTS EVERYBODY ELSE. IT AFFECTS THE BAY, IT AFFECTS AIR
- 15 OUALITY. AND I THINK ALL WE HAVE TO DO IS LOOK AT THE HISTORY
- 16 OF BCDC THAT WHEN IT WAS FORMED IN THE 1960S, IT WAS FORMED
- 17 BECAUSE CITIES WERE FILLING THE BAY. AND ANY ACTION TO
- 18 VOLUNTARILY GET THE CITIES NOT TO FILL THE BAY WASN'T
- 19 SUCCESSFUL, WHICH IS WHY, RIGHT, ENVIRONMENTAL ADVOCATES
- 20 WORKED FOR STATE LEGISLATION TO SETUP A REGIONAL BODY THAT HAD
- 21 PERMITTING AUTHORITY OVER THE SHORELINE, OVER THE 100-FOOT
- 22 SHORELINE BAN WHICH HAS BEEN CREDITED WITH SAVING SAN
- 23 FRANCISCO BAY. LIKEWISE, AS WE ADDRESS SEA LEVEL RISE, IF ONE
- 24 CITY, HOWEVER MUCH WE INCENTIVIZE THEM DOESN'T TAKE ACTION TO
- 25 ADDRESS RESILIENCY IT AFFECTS NEIGHBORING CITIES. SO I



- 1 APPRECIATE MAYOR ARREGUIN'S COMMENTS, BECAUSE IT GETS TO THE -
- 2 I THINK, THE FACT THAT WE DO NEED MORE REGIONAL AUTHORITY.
- 3 YOU KNOW, AIR POLLUTION IS THE SAME. IF WE LEFT IT UP TO EVERY
- 4 CITY TO REGULATE AIR POLLUTION IN THEIR CITY, IF THEY DIDN'T
- 5 DO IT APPROPRIATELY, IT WOULD AFFECT THE AIR QUALITY IN THE
- 6 NEIGHBORING JURISDICTIONS WHICH IS WHY WE HAVE A REGIONAL AIR
- 7 QUALITY AGENCY. SO, WHETHER IT'S HOUSING, AND ESPECIALLY SEA
- 8 LEVEL RISE -- I THINK, AS ELECTED OFFICIALS, I THINK THE POWER
- 9 IS WITH US TO ADVOCATE FOR THAT, IS TO, SORT OF, PUT ON OUR
- 10 BIG "R "REGIONAL HAT AND ADVOCATE FOR ADDITIONAL REGIONAL
- 11 AUTHORITY TO SOLVE PROBLEMS. I THINK WE ARE NOT GOING TO
- 12 ADEQUATELY ADDRESS SEA LEVEL RISE ISSUES BY LEAVING IT UP TO
- 13 THE INDIVIDUAL CITIES AND COUNTIES ON THEIR OWN TO DO THE
- 14 RIGHT THING. HISTORY HAS SHOWN THAT DOESN'T WORK, WHETHER IT'S
- 15 HOUSING, IT DOESN'T WORK. WHETHER IT'S SEA LEVEL RESILIENCY IT
- 16 DOESN'T WORK. SO I THINK WE SHOULD HAVE A DISCUSSION ABOUT
- 17 THESE ISSUES OF HOW DO WE GET MORE REGIONAL AUTHORITY, AND
- 18 JESSE COMMENT ABOUT LEGISLATION, TO REQUIRE THAT LOCAL
- 19 JURISDICTIONS BUILD, YOU KNOW, CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS INTO THEIR
- 20 PLANNING, I THINK IS SOMETHING WE SHOULD BE TALKING ABOUT, AS
- 21 WELL AS THE BROADER ISSUE OF REGIONALISM WITH REGARD TO THESE
- 22 OTHER ISSUES.

- 24 AMY WORTH, CHAIR: JOHN, THANK YOU FOR YOUR COMMENTS.

- 2 JAMES P. SPERING: THANK YOU. YOU KNOW, ALLISON, I WANT TO
- 3 THANK YOU FOR BRINGING THIS ISSUE FORWARD. AND YOUR COMMENTS
- 4 IN THE BEGINNING ABOUT THE EOUITY ISSUE. YOU KNOW, THE ONE
- 5 THING I THINK BARC SHOULD DELVE INTO DEEPER IS THE
- 6 ACCUMULATIVE IMPACT THAT ALL OF THESE THINGS THAT WE'RE DOING
- 7 THEY'RE HAVING ON OUR DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, LOW-INCOME,
- 8 VERY LOW-INCOME, EVERY ONE OF US, ALL OF THESE THINGS THAT
- 9 WE'RE TALKING ABOUT AND ALL OF THE MISSES AT ALL OF THESE
- 10 AGENCIES ARE VERY IMPORTANT BUT IT'S HAVING IMPACT, AND THIS
- 11 GAP BETWEEN THE HAVES AND HAVE NOT IN THE BAY AREA IS GROWING
- 12 AT AN ALARMING RATE. AND WE CAN'T SAY WE CAN DO IT AT THE
- 13 EXPENSE OF ALL OF THESE THINGS, AT THE EXPENSE OF THE
- 14 VULNERABLE POPULATION LOOK AT THE REGULATIONS WE'RE MAKING IT
- 15 IMPOSSIBLE FOR AND LOW-INCOME OR MODERATE INCOME PERSON TO
- 16 OPEN A BUSINESS. I MEAN, MY GOD LOOK AT ALL THE REGULATIONS IN
- 17 SOLANO COUNTY. IT'S VERY DISTURBING. THE FEDERAL DOLLARS ARE
- 18 COMING IN, AND IT BRINGS WITH IT THIS HIDDEN DEVASTATION
- 19 IMPACT TO LOW AND MODERATE INCOME FAMILIES, IT'S CALLED
- 20 INFLATION, WE'RE HEARING FROM PEOPLE INVOLVED, GASOLINE, FOOD,
- 21 RENT, THIS IS HURTING LOW-INCOME FAMILIES, VERY LOW-INCOME
- 22 FAMILIES OUR SENIORS ARE FEELING THIS, PEOPLE ON FIXED INCOME.
- 23 VERY FEW PEOPLE ON THESE CALLS ARE FEELING THESE DEVASTATING
- 24 IMPACTS. IT'S WHAT'S HAPPENING TO INDIVIDUALS. THESE PROJECTS,
- 25 I LOOK AT 37 AND THE NUMBER OF MINORITIES AND PEOPLE THAT ARE



- 1 LOSING QUALITY OF LIFE, THEY'RE SITTING IN 1 TO 3 HOURS OF
- 2 DELAY, TIMES THAT THEY LOSE WITH THEIR FAMILY ALMOST ON A
- 3 DAILY BASIS ANYMORE, AND IT SEEMS LIKE WE ALWAYS WANT TO THROW
- 4 IN ONE MORE LAYER HOW CAN WE DELAY THIS PROJECT. WE HAVE GOT
- 5 TO START WORKING TOGETHER TO DELIVER THESE PROJECTS IN A MORE
- 6 TIMELY FASHION AND GET TO THOSE OTHER VERY IMPORTANT
- 7 ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES AND KEY THINGS THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT.
- 8 AND WHEN WE ASK A QUESTION, HOW DOES THIS IMPROVE, YOU KNOW,
- 9 THE MINORITIES OR DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES, I THINK WE OUGHT

- 11 THEM?" AND WE NEED TO MITIGATE THAT. I JUST REALLY -- AS I
- 12 SAID, I REALLY APPRECIATE YOU BRINGING THIS FORWARD. AND I
- 13 THINK BARC, THIS IS ONE AREA THAT WE REALLY HAVE TO START
- 14 TALKING ABOUT THIS ACCUMULATIVE IMPACT THAT WE'RE HAVING ON
- 15 MINORITIES PEOPLE OF LOW-INCOME, VERY LOW-INCOME, IT'S GETTING
- 16 VERY, VERY DIFFICULT FOR THEM TO EVEN SURVIVE AND WE COULDN'T
- 17 IGNORE IT. AND I THINK ALL OF THESE INITIATIVES WE'RE TALKING
- 18 ABOUT ARE VERY IMPORTANT BUT IT CAN'T BE AT THE EXPENSE OF
- 19 THIS VERY VULNERABLE POPULATION IN THE BAY AREA. AND WE'RE ALL
- 20 TALKING ABOUT, YOU KNOW, I KNOW AT MTC WE'RE TALKING ABOUT, WE
- 21 LOOK AT OUR PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, AND WE LOOK AT ADDITIONAL
- 22 REVENUES. I MEAN, WE'RE TALKING ABOUT FUTURE TAXES, YOU KNOW,
- 23 SALES TAX, WHICH DEVASTATES THIS VULNERABLE POPULATION. EVERY
- 24 ONE OF US IS LOOK FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING EVERY ONE OF THOSE
- 25 LAYERS WE HAVE TO TALK CONSCIOUSLY ABOUT HOW DO WE MITIGATE



- 1 THESE IMPACTS GOING FORWARD. AND ALLISON I REALLY APPRECIATE
- 2 YOU RAISING THIS ISSUE. IT'S ONE THAT THIS GROUP CANNOT
- 3 CONTINUE TO IGNORE. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 6 SEE THAT SUPERVISOR HAUBERT HAS -- I WOULD LIKE TO CALL ON

- 9 DAVID HAUBERT: THANK YOU. I'M GOING TO BRING UP A TOPIC. IT'S
- 10 RELATED. WE HAVE TALKED ABOUT IT BEFORE IN SEVERAL DIFFERENT
- 11 REGIONAL BODIES. I THINK IT AFFECTS THE WORK WE DO WITH
- 12 PLANNING AT ABAG, IT AFFECTS TRANSPORTATION. I KNOW WE HAVE

- 14 IMBALANCE OF JOBS AND HOUSING ACROSS THE BAY AREA, AND I

- 21 LAWS WHICH ALLOW FOR CHANGES TO BE MADE. WE HAVE TO HAVE THE
- 22 POLITICAL WILL TO REBALANCE JOBS, HIGH PAYING JOBS, WITH WHERE
- 23 PEOPLE LIVE IN ORDER TO PROTECT THE ENVIRONMENT, IN ORDER TO

- 2 IS, ADVOCACY. AND IN PARTICULAR, I WOULD LIKE TO ADD ADVOCACY
- 3 FOR REBALANCING PROFESSIONAL JOBS WITH WHERE PEOPLE ACTUALLY
- 4 LIVE. AND I HAVE HEARD MORE ABOUT PRIORITIZING HOUSING. I JUST
- 5 HAVEN'T HEARD ENOUGH ABOUT REPRIORITIZING BALANCING OR
- 6 PRIORITIZING BALANCING OF JOBS. AND, SO, I WOULD JUST LIKE TO
- 7 ADD THAT TO PEOPLE'S MINDS, AND LET'S GET IT DONE.
