



- 4 GENERAL BROWN ACT LANGUAGE AND IT DOES AUTHORIZE TELECOMMUTING
- 5 AS IT'S REFERRED TO, IN A MORE FLEXIBLE MANNER SO THAT BOARD
- 6 MEMBERS CAN DO SO FROM THE PRIVACY OF THEIR OWN HOME AS LONG
- 7 AS THEY'RE ALSO PROVIDING A STREAMING OPTION TO THE PUBLIC.

- 18 REBECCA LONG: THANK YOU, DIRECTOR HALLIDAY. YEAH, I THINK I
- 19 MAY HAVE MISSPOKEN A BIT I APOLOGIZE. I HAVEN'T LOOKED AT THE
- 20 BILL IN THE LAST COUPLE OF DAYS. I THINK THE LANGUAGE IS
- 21 STRUCTURED IN TWO PARTS SO THERE'S THE PORTION THAT WAS
- 22 AMENDED IN A.B. 361 THAT STAYS IN EFFECT THROUGH NEXT YEAR AND
- 23 THAT'S WHERE WE'RE SEEKING THE AMENDMENT AROUND THE 30 DAY

- 15 SYMPTOMS OR ANYTHING LIKE THAT, THEY HAVE TO QUARANTINE, I
- 16 GUESS, AND, SO THEN DOES THE JURISDICTION THEN HAVE TO MAKE A
- 17 DETERMINATION FOR THAT ONE COUNCILMEMBER, AN EMERGENCY EXISTS,
- 18 AND SO SHE CAN OR HE CAN PARTICIPATE BY TELECONFERENCING?

- 20 REBECCA LONG: DIRECTOR EKLUND, I THINK THAT, YOU KNOW --
- 21 THROUGH THE CHAIR -- IF THE DIRECTION FROM THE COMMITTEE IS TO
- 22 EVALUATE THE BILL AND TO RECOMMEND AMENDMENTS THAT SIMPLY
- 23 ALLOW FOR THIS FLEXIBILITY WITHOUT ANY CONSTRAINTS, YOU KNOW,

WHAT I'M HEARING FROM A FEW OF YOU. WE CAN SEE IF THAT'S 1 VIABLE. BUT THAT'S CERTAINLY SOMETHING THAT WE COULD REQUEST 2 3 OF THE AUTHOR. 4 5 PAT EKLUND: I WOULD REALLY SUGGEST THAT, BECAUSE I THINK THE LAST TWO YEARS IT'S REALLY SHOWN US THAT TELECONFERENCING 6 FLEXIBILITY DOES NOT HAMPER PUBLIC ACCESS OR YOU KNOW, OPEN 7 8 MEETING LAWS, OR WHATEVER. AND I THINK THAT BETWEEN -- WE'RE GOING TO BE LIVING WITH COVID, I THINK, FOR A LONG TIME, 9 10 DEPENDING WHEN THE VARIANTS COME OR DON'T COME, YOU KNOW, THE ELECTED OFFICIAL SHOULD HAVE AN OPTION TO BE ABLE TO 11 PARTICIPATE VIA TELECONFERENCING IF THEY'RE OUARANTINING OR 12 TRYING TO PROTECT THEMSELVES OR PROTECT OTHER PEOPLE FROM 13 MAYBE GETTING EXPOSED. SO I WOULD JUST GIVE -- I WOULD SUGGEST 14 15 THAT WE GIVE REBECCA A LITTLE BIT MORE FLEXIBILITY ON WHAT SHE 16 CAN TALK TO THE AUTHORS ABOUT: 17 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: IF I MAY, ON THAT, YOU KNOW, JUST 18 GETTING 361 PASSED WAS A LIFT, AND ASSEMBLYMEMBER LEE HAD A 19 BILL LAST YEAR THAT WOULD HAVE BROUGHT IN THE USE OF 20 21 TELECONFERENCING FOR PUBLIC MEETINGS AND THAT WAS VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR, AND THE ARGUMENT THAT THE GOVERNOR MADE, WELL, 22 IN ADDITION TRANSLATION REQUIREMENTS WE HAD THE GOVERNOR JUST 23 SIGNED 361 SO WHY DO WE NEED ANOTHER BILL, I JUST WANT TO BE 24

- 1 REBECCA, HOW LIKELY IS IT FOR US TO GET THE BILL AMENDED AND
- 2 PASSED IF WE DID WHAT COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND SUGGESTED. I'M NOT
- 3 AGAINST WHAT SHE'S SUGGESTING. I THINK WE SHOULD JUST ALLOW
- 4 THE FLEXIBILITY WITHOUT ANY REQUIREMENT THAT IT BE TIED TO A
- 5 STATE OF EMERGENCY. I WOULD BE INTERESTED IN YOUR PERSPECTIVE
- 6 AS OUR KIND OF LEGISLATIVE ADVOCATE.

- 8 REBECCA LONG: I THINK THAT WE'RE RECOMMENDING A SUPPORT AND
- 9 SEEK AMENDMENT POSITION SO THAT MEANS THAT EVEN AS DRAFTED WE
- 10 THINK IT'S GOING TO BE HELPFUL AND THAT WAY WE'RE STILL
- 11 HELPING TO ADVANCE THE BILL AND BRINGING OUR INFLUENCE THERE
- 12 AND WE CAN SEE. I THINK THAT THERE ARE A LOT OF PUBLIC
- 13 AGENCIES OBVIOUSLY WHO ARE VERY SUPPORTIVE OF THIS CHANGE.


- 15 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: YEAH. SO THE MAKER OF THE MOTION WAS
- 16 MAYOR SCHAFF. AND, SO, ARE YOU PROPOSING A FRIENDLY AMENDMENT
- 17 COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND?

- 19 PAT EKLUND: YES. IT'S A FRIENDLY AMENDMENT JUST FOR STAFF TO
- 20 TALK WITH THE AUTHOR TO SEE IF THAT IS POSSIBLE. AND IF IT'S
- 21 GOING TO TANK THE WHOLE THING, FORGET IT. [LAUGHTER] BUT, I
- 22 REALLY THINK THAT WE'RE GOING TO HAVE THIS VARIANT OR OTHER
- 23 THINGS THAT COME UP, AND WE SHOULD HAVE THE FLEXIBILITY IF THE
- 24 PERSON CAN STILL PARTICIPATE AND NOT HAVING ANY SYMPTOMS, WHY
- 25 NOT?



1 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: SO THAT WOULD BE TO PROVIDE DIRECTION 2 3 TO STAFF TO EXPLORE WITH THE AUTHOR AMENDMENT TO THE BILL, IN ADDITION TO THE AMENDMENTS THAT WE ARE ADOPTING FORMALLY BY 4 5 RECOMMENDING THIS POSITION, AMENDMENTS TO ALLOW TELECONFERENCING WITHOUT A DECLARED STATE OF EMERGENCY. 6 7 8 PAT EKLUND: EXACTLY. 9 LIBBY SCHAAF: IF I MAY, CHAIR, AS THE MAKER OF THE MOTION, I 10 ABSOLUTELY ACCEPT THAT FRIENDLY AMENDMENT. I ALSO WANT TO 11 ACKNOWLEDGE THAT DURING THIS PANDEMIC, WE HAVE MADE TREMENDOUS 12 STRIDES IN CLOSING THE DIGITAL DIVIDE. I WOULD ARGUE THAT MORE 13 PEOPLE HAVE ACCESS TO ONLINE MEETINGS THAN ARE ACTUALLY ABLE 14 15 TO PHYSICALLY GET TO AN IN-PERSON MEETING. AND SO I BELIEVE 16 IT'S IN THE INTEREST OF DEMOCRACY AND OPEN GOVERNMENT TO CONTINUE TO ALLOW ONLINE ACCESS, STREAMING ACCESS, AND FOR US 17 DECISION MAKERS TO NOT GET IN OUR POLLUTING CARS -- ALTHOUGH I 18 TAKE BART, BUT I KNOW MANY OF YOU DO NOT HAVE THAT OPTION, I 19 ABSOLUTELY, FOR MANY REASONS, AGREE WITH THIS AMENDMENT, AND I 20 21 THINK WE SHOULD PUSH FOR PERMANENT CHANGES TO ALLOW MORE TELECOMMUTING, TELECONFERENCING, ET CETERA. SO, THANK YOU FOR 22 23 THAT COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND. 24



- 12 THE BAY AREA INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCING AUTHORITY, OR BAIFA. WE
- 13 HAVE BROUGHT A PROPOSAL FORWARD, I THINK IT'S GOING TO BE
- 14 ACTUALLY AN ACTION ITEM, NEXT MONTH, TO CHANGE THE GOVERNANCE
- 15 OF BAIFA WHICH IS CURRENTLY KIND OF A SUBSET OF THE COMMISSION
- 16 TO BE COTERMINUS WITH THE FULL COMMISSION SO THAT THE NORTH
- 17 BAY COUNTIES WOULD BE FULLY REPRESENTED ON BAIFA. THE BILL
- 18 LISTS OUT THE ELIGIBLE EXPENDITURES AS I MENTIONED FOR THE
- 19 INTERIM PROJECT AS WELL AS THE ULTIMATE SEA LEVEL RISE PROJECT
- 20 AND ALSO ALLOWS FOR RESTORATION PROJECTS. SO, LAND ACQUISITION
- 21 RELATED TO WETLAND MITIGATION OTHER TYPES OF ENHANCEMENT
- 22 PROJECTS THAT CAN SERVE AS NEAR-TERM FLOOD PROTECTION. AS FOR
- 23 TOLLING POSITIONS THE BILL HAS SOME FLEXIBILITY RIGHT NOW. IT
- 24 DOESN'T SPECIFY EXACTLY WHAT THE TOLL IS, BUT IT PROVIDES KIND
- 25 OF A RANGE, IF YOU WILL. SETS A MINIMUM OF \$1, AND A MAXIMUM



- 1 OF THE EQUIVALENT OF WHAT BATA CHARGES. SO IT ALSO SAYS THAT
- 2 THE TOLLS COULD NOT GO INTO EFFECT UNTIL AFTER 2020 -- JANUARY
- 3 1ST, 2026, BY WHICH POINT THE TOLLS WOULD BE \$8. ON THE BATA
- 4 FACILITIES. AND IT ALLOWS FOR A DISCOUNT FOR HOV LANES, OR
- 5 RATHER IT REQUIRES A DISCOUNT FOR HOV LANES OF 50% AND IT
- 6 REQUIRES THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A LOW-INCOME MEANS BASED
- 7 DISCOUNT FOR RESIDENTS OF THE NORTH BAY COUNTIES. IT DOESN'T
- 8 DEFINE LOW-INCOME. THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE'RE WORKING ON. WE
- 9 WANT THAT TO BE CONSISTENT WITH THE DEFINITION THAT WE'RE
- 10 GOING TO USE FOR THE 880 EXPRESS LANE PILOT THAT WE'RE WORKING
- 11 ON, AND ALSO THE -- IT PROVIDES A RANGE FOR WHAT THAT DISCOUNT
- 12 WOULD BE FOR LOW-INCOME MOTORISTS. SO IT'S BETWEEN 25 TO 50%.
- 13 LASTLY, THE BILL REQUIRES THAT THE TOLLS BE REMOVED AFTER FULL
- 14 REPAYMENT OF ANY BONDS AND RELATED OBLIGATIONS UNLESS THE
- 15 AUTHORITY DETERMINES BY A 230S VOTE THAT TOLLING IS NECESSARY
- 16 TO CONTINUE TO REDUCE VEHICLE MILES TRAVELED, AND SUPPORT
- 17 INCENTIVES FOR TRANSIT AND CARPOOLING. SO FAR THAT'S A SUMMARY
- 18 OF THE BILL. AND WE'RE ASKING FOR A RECOMMENDATION OF SUPPORT
- 19 TO MTC AND ALSO AUTHORIZATION TO COMMUNICATE THAT POSITION
- 20 AFTER TODAY SO WE CAN ALSO SHARE THAT WITH THE COMMITTEE,
- 21 WHICH IS VOTING ON THE BILL MARCH 22ND. AND THAT CONCLUDES MY
- 22 PRESENTATION. THANK YOU.
- 24 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. WE'LL GO TO VICE CHAIR
- 25 JOSEFOWITZ.



1 NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THANK YOU. I'M OBVIOUSLY VERY SUPPORTIVE OF 2 3 THIS. IT'S SUCH AN IMPORTANT PROJECT, AND IT'S VERY ENCOURAGING TO SEE THE SENATOR AND ALL THE STAKEHOLDERS 4 5 WANTING TO INTEGRATE THE TOLLING INTO THE EXISTING TOLLING STRUCTURES WE HAVE THE BAY AREA OR NOT. LIKE, MY COUNTY AND 6 OTHERS WANT TO GO AND SETUP THEIR OWN TOLLING SYSTEMS WHICH 7 8 DON'T NECESSARILY INTEGRATE WITH THE OTHERS. I THOUGHT IT WAS GREAT TO, SORT OF, SEE THE BILL IN ITS CURRENT STATE 9 ADDRESSING MEANS BASED TOLLING AS SOMETHING THAT WE'RE ALSO 10 REALLY DRIVING FORWARD ON 880, ALTHOUGH OBVIOUSLY 880 THE 11 TOLLS ARE MUCH LOWER THAN THEY WOULD BE ON THIS STATE ROUTE. I 12 WAS WONDERING HOW MUCH FLEXIBILITY WE WOULD HAVE TO HAVE, TO 13 EXPAND THE LOW-INCOME DISCOUNTS TO RESIDENTS OUTSIDE OF THE 14 15 NORTH BAY? BECAUSE IT DOES FEEL A LITTLE -- I'M NOT SURE HOW 16 I'M -- HOW -- I DON'T KNOW WHETHER THE ECONOMICS -- OR WHAT IMPACT WOULD HAVE ON THE ECONOMICS, WHICH IS IMPORTANT, BUT IT 17 DOES FEEL A LITTLE ODD THAT IF YOU LIVE IN NORTHERN CONTRA 18 COSTA COUNTY AND YOU HAVE TO DRIVE ACROSS 37, AND YOU'RE LOW-19 INCOME, YOU HAVE GOT TO PAY THE FULL FREIGHT, AND IF YOU LIVE 20 NORTH OF CONTRA COSTA COUNTY, SONOMA, YOU CAN GET A 75% 21 DISCOUNT. JUST HOW -- IS THERE FLEXIBILITY ON THAT? OR DOES IT 22 NECESSARILY NEED TO BE PART OF THE LEGISLATION? IS THERE 23 FLEXIBILITY ON THAT? 24



- 1 REBECCA LONG: I THINK THIS'S A GOOD OUESTION. I WOULD WANT TO
- 2 GO BACK AND LOOK AT THE SPECIFIC WAY THE LEGISLATION IS
- 3 WRITTEN. I THINK RIGHT NOW IT REQUIRES A DISCOUNT FOR THOSE
- 4 COUNTIES. AND WHETHER IT COULD BE SOMETHING THAT THE AUTHORITY
- 5 COULD EXPAND. YOU KNOW WE COULD LOOK AT STRUCTURING IT THAT
- 6 WAY. I THINK THE RATIONALE FOR THE GEOGRAPHIC LIMITATIONS
- 7 THERE IS IT'S REALLY TRYING TO PROVIDE AN ASSURED DISCOUNT FOR
- 8 LOW-INCOME DISCOUNT FOR REGULAR USERS OF THE FACILITY. AND AS
- 9 YOU POINT OUT TO THE EXTENT THAT YOU'RE SIGNIFICANTLY
- 10 EXPANDING THE ELIGIBILITY YOU'RE GOING TO REDUCE THE REVENUE.
- 11 IT'S SOMETHING WE CAN CERTAINLY LOOK AT I IMAGINE OUR TRAVEL
- 12 MODEL CAN HELP US IDENTIFY WHERE ARE THOSE USERS OF THE
- 13 FACILITY ORIGINATING FROM AND DO A SENSITIVITY ANALYSIS THERE.
- 14 SO HAPPY TO LOOK INTO THAT FURTHER.
- 16 NICK JOSEFOWITZ: I APPRECIATE THAT. THIS IS A REALLY BIG ISSUE
- 17 IN SAN FRANCISCO AROUND TREASURE ISLAND TOLLS WHERE THIS IS
- 18 COMPLETELY BLOWN UP, YEARS AND YEARS OF WORK. I THINK
- 19 EVERYTHING IN THE REGION SHOULD GET THE DISCOUNTS NOT JUST
- 20 LOW-INCOME IN SAN FRANCISCO. I THINK THAT WAS THE RIGHT THING
- 21 TO DO.
- 23 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND?

PAT EKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH MAYOR ARREGUIN. I HAD THE SAME 1 ISSUE THAT COMMISSIONER NICK RAISED. I THINK IT SHOULD BE ANY LOW-INCOME RESIDENT IN THE BAY AREA. I WOULDN'T LIMIT IT TO 9 THOSE FOUR COUNTIES. AND I UNDERSTAND THAT IT HAS POTENTIAL 10 LIMIT -- IMPLICATIONS FOR PAYING OFF ANY POTENTIAL BONDS, BUT, 11 FRANKLY, LOW-INCOME FOLKS ARE HAVING TO MOVE FURTHER AND 12 FURTHER OUT OF THE BAY AREA, AND THEY'RE STILL COMMUTING BACK 13 IN. SO, I TOTALLY AGREE WITH ELIMINATING THOSE FOUR COUNTIES, 14 15 AND JUST HAVE IT FOR ALL LOW-INCOME PEOPLE. WE GOT TO REALLY 16 HAVE A -- WE HAVE GOT TO HELP THEM MOVE ON THE LADDER AND BY DOING THESE KINDS OF THINGS, I THINK REALLY MAKES A 17 DIFFERENCE. 18 19 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SUPERVISOR CONNOLY. 20 21 DAMON CONNOLLY: THANK YOU. JUST A COUPLE OF QUICK ITEMS, ONE 22 IS AROUND FLEXIBILITY ON USE OF THE TOLL REVENUES TOWARDS 23 SEGMENT A, WHICH IS THE MARIN SEGMENT RELATED TO FLOODING, 24

WHICH, AS WE KNOW HAS BEEN AN ISSUE. IN THE PAST, THE PREVIOUS

- 22 PARTICULARLY THE SEGMENT A PIECE.





21	JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. QUESTIONS OR
22	COMMENTS FROM MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE? OKAY. VICE CHAIR
23	JOSEFOWITZ?

- 1 NICK JOSEFOWITZ: THANK YOU. AND I, YOU KNOW, I THINK THIS
- 2 LEGISLATION IS AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO FORMALIZE -- FOR THE
- 3 STATE TO HELP US FORMALIZE THE COMMITMENTS THAT WE HAVE MADE
- 4 TO EACH OTHER AS A REGION THROUGH THIS TRANSFORMATIVE ACTION
- 5 PLANNING PROCESS AND THAT WE WILL MAKE TO EACH OTHER AS PART
- 6 OF THE NETWORK BUSINESS -- NETWORK MANAGEMENT BUSINESS CASE
- 7 PROCESS. AND, SO, I THINK THIS IS AN IMPORTANT PART OF WHAT WE
- 8 NEED TO BE -- WHAT WE NEED TO BE NOURISHING. AND I'M GLAD THAT
- 9 WE'RE TAKING A SUPPORT POSITION AT THE HIGHEST -- AT, SORT OF,
- 10 THE BROAD LEVEL. I DO THINK, THOUGH, THAT SOME OF THE
- 11 AMENDMENTS THAT HAVE BEEN SUGGESTED BY STAFF ARE A LITTLE BIT
- 12 AGGRESSIVE IN TERMS OF HOW MUCH THEY ROLL BACK SOME OF WHAT

- 24 GIVE A LITTLE BACKGROUND. MYSELF, AS THE CHAIR OF THE BLUE
- 25 RIBBON, AND CHAIR PEDROZA, WE DID MEET WITH SENATOR BECKER AND



- 1 REALLY APPRECIATE HIM BRINGING THIS BILL FORWARD, BUT WE
- 2 EXPRESSED SOME CONCERNS THAT WE HAD. MYSELF, AND MANY
- 3 COMMISSIONERS, WE DIDN'T EVEN KNOW THIS BILL WAS BEING
- 4 INTRODUCED AND I THINK MAYBE OUR STAFF DOES, AND NONE OF THE
- 5 OPERATORS DID EITHER AND THAT WAS JUST A CONCERN THAT WE HAD.
- 6 AND, YOU KNOW, WE ARE NOT BACKING AWAY FROM THE COMMITMENTS
- 7 THAT WE HAVE MADE THROUGH THE BLUE RIBBON, AT ALL, BUT, YOU
- 8 KNOW, WE DON'T WANT TO GO THROUGH WHAT WE HAVE BEEN DEALING
- 9 WITH FOR THE PAST 30 YEARS AND JUST BRINGING BILLS THAT DON'T
- 10 GIVE THIS BROAD SUPPORT THAT WE CAN PASS AND THAT'S ONE MORE
- 11 STEP BACKWARDS. THE STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS CAN BE VERY
- 12 DISRUPTIVE AND ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE TO DELIVER. I THINK THE
- 13 OPERATORS RIGHTLY SO ARE CONCERNED BECAUSE IT HAS A FINANCIAL
- 14 IMPACT ON THEIR ABILITY TO PROVIDE SERVICES SO WE HAVE TO WORK
- 15 THAT OUT WITH THEM. I DON'T WANT THIS BILL TO HAVE DEVASTATING
- 16 CONSEQUENCES WHERE IT DOESN'T ACCOMPLISH OUR OBJECTIVES. THE
- 17 PURPOSE OF THE BLUE RIBBON WAS TO BUILD THIS RELATIONSHIP
- 18 BETWEEN THE ADVOCATES, THE OPERATORS, MTC, AND YOU KNOW, THE
- 19 SMALL AND LARGE OPERATORS AND WE DID A GOOD JOB DOING THAT,
- 20 BUT TO HAVE A BILL INTRODUCED WHERE THE OPERATORS AREN'T EVEN
- 21 INFORMED ABOUT THIS BILL, I THINK IS NOT HELPFUL. SO WHAT
- 22 WE'RE PROPOSING TODAY IS, AT LEAST TAKE THIS FIRST STEP, YOU
- 23 KNOW, THE RECOMMENDATIONS WE'RE MAKING TODAY, THEY'RE GOING TO
- 24 CHANGE A LITTLE BIT. WE'RE ALL GOING TO NEGOTIATE, BUT I THINK
- 25 IT'S EXTREMELY IMPORTANT THAT WE PUT THE CONCERNS THAT WE





- 1 HAVE, OUT FRONT RIGHT NOW, BECAUSE THESE ARE SERIOUS CONCERNS.
- 2 AND, I THINK, TO BRING FORTH A BILL THAT WE CAN ALL GET
- 3 BEHIND, WE'RE NOT GOING TO AGREE ON EVERYTHING IN THIS BILL,
- 4 BECAUSE I THINK THERE ARE THINGS THAT THE BLUE RIBBON WANTS
- 5 THAT THE OPERATORS ARE A LITTLE UNCOMFORTABLE WITH BUT THEY'RE
- 6 GOING TO HAVE TO DEAL WITH THAT. BUT IT HAS TO BE A BILL THAT
- 7 EVERYBODY'S HAD OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE DEVELOPMENT
- 8 OF AND BRING SOMETHING FORWARD THAT WE CAN HAVE BROAD SUPPORT
- 9 AND RIGHT NOW IT DOESN'T HAVE THAT. IT NEEDS TO BE REASONABLE
- 10 AND IT NEEDS TO BE THE FIRST STEP TO DEALING WITH THIS
- 11 SEAMLESS SYSTEM THAT WE ALL WANT. I URGE THAT WE TAKE THIS
- 12 FIRST STEP IT PUTS EVERYBODY'S RADAR WHAT NEED TO BE ADDRESSED
- 13 I THINK THESE DEADLINES DEFINITELY COULD HAVE MORE DISCUSSION
- 14 AND I CAN'T AGREE MORE WITH MY COLLEAGUE, COMMISSIONER
- 15 JOSEFOWITZ, I WAS SO DISAPPOINT TO SEE TRANSIT PRIORITY, WHICH
- 16 IS ONE OF OUR NUMBER ONE PRIORITIES, IT'S DELIVERABLE AND
- 17 WITHIN OUR REACH AND WITH A MODEST INVESTMENT, AND IT'S NOT
- 18 EVEN MENTIONED IN THIS BILL. THERE IS SERIOUS CONCERNS ABOUT
- 19 IT. I'M NOT THREATENED BY THE LANGUAGE THAT'S BEING PROPOSED
- 20 TODAY WE'RE GOING TO CERTAINLY NEGOTIATE WITH ALL OUR PARTNERS
- 21 BUT IT'S EXTREMELY IMPORTANT THAT THE ADVOCATES, THE
- 22 OPERATORS, AND MTC, WITH MY ABAG COLLEAGUES, THAT WE ALL WORK
- 23 TOGETHER TO TRY AND BRING A BILL FORWARD THAT REALLY WILL
- 24 BRING ABOUT THE CHANGE THAT WE ALL HAVE BEEN WORKING FOR MANY
- 25 YEARS. AND I UNDERSTAND, COMMISSIONER JOSEFOWITZ, YOUR CONCERN



- 1 ABOUT THIS, BUT I THINK IT'S A STARTING POINT. THESE DATES
- 2 HAVE TO BE NEGOTIATED A LITTLE BIT MORE. BUT I THINK THIS AT
- 3 LEAST PUTS THE SERIOUS ISSUES ON THE TABLE. SO I WOULD
- 4 ENCOURAGE THAT WE MOVE FORWARD WITH THE WAY THE LANGUAGE IS
- 5 BEING PRESENTED. AND LET'S START THE DISCUSSION. AND, YOU
- 6 KNOW, I AM GOING TO WORK VERY HARD. WE MET WITH THE TRANSIT
- 7 OPERATORS, NONE OF THEM HAVE BACKED AWAY FROM THESE

- 1 ELIMINATE, WHEN IS SAYS FARE INTEGRATION, WHEN, IN FACT, BLUE
- 2 RIBBON, THE PARTIES HAVE ALL BEEN FOR THAT. SO SOME OF THOSE
- 3 WORDS I'M REALLY NOT COMFORTABLE WITH HERE. I KNOW WE'RE GOING
- 4 TO WORK WITH THE SENATOR AND THE PARTIES. I'M REALLY CONFIDENT
- 5 ABOUT THAT. AND I THINK IF YOU LEAVE WORDS LIKE E "ELIMINATE"
- 6 IN, IT REALLY DOESN'T SEND THE MESSAGE THAT THE BLUE RIBBON
- 7 WANTED TO SEND AND THAT MTC HAS ALREADY VOTED ON, THE FARE
- 8 INTEGRATIONS. I CAN'T EMPHASIZE ENOUGH, I'M NOT GOING TO
- 9 WORDSMITH EVERYTHING HERE, BUT THAT REALLY SENDS THE WRONG
- 10 MESSAGE ALL THE WAY ACROSS THE BOARD. SO, I AGREE, THE
- 11 STARTING POINT, THIS IS GREAT. THIS IS WONDERFUL, BUT WE NEED
- 12 TO LEAVE THE DOOR OPEN TO THE THINGS MTC HAS ALREADY PROMOTED
- 13 AND THE OPERATORS HAVE ALREADY PROMOTED IN THE ACTION PLAN. SO
- 14 I DO ASK THAT A WORD LIKE THAT IS TAKEN OUT, HERE. AND I WANT
- 15 TO REALLY SEE US GET TO THINGS THAT I THINK WE CAN EASILY GET
- 16 TO WITH THE HELP OF SENATOR BECKER AND THE LEGISLATURE HERE.
- 17 THE MAPPING AND WAYFINDING. YOU KNOW, I DON'T THINK THAT'S A
- 18 DIFFICULT ONE. AND I THINK I'M REALLY HOPING WE CAN GET THERE
- 19 SOONER RATHER THAN LATER. WORKING WITH DATES, WOULD BE
- 20 WONDERFUL, AND WORKING FURTHER WITH THE OPERATORS. SO, PLEASE,
- 21 LET'S JUST TONE THINGS DOWN A BIT HERE, LET'S MAKE THIS A
- 22 REALLY WORKABLE STARTING POINT SO THAT WE CAN MOVE FORWARD IN
- 23 A CONSTRUCTIVE MANNER. BECAUSE I DO THINK WE HAVE GOTTEN AS
- 24 FAR AS WE HAVE GOT BECAUSE WE HAD DAVID CHIU'S PRIOR
- 25 LEGISLATION. AND I THINK THIS WILL ASSIST US IN GETTING TO



- 1 WHERE WE WANT TO BE. ALL THAT WORK THAT WENT INTO THE BLUE
- 2 RIBBON AND THE ACTION PLAN, I REALLY WANT US TO GET THERE. SO
- 3 IF WE CAN TONE THINGS DOWN A LITTLE BIT AND REALLY BRING
- 4 EVERYBODY TOGETHER, I THINK WE'LL BE MORE PRODUCTIVE. SO IF WE
- 5 CAN, JUST TAKE OUT WORDS LIKE "ELIMINATE" AND WORK W I THINK
- 6 WE WOULD BETTER POSITION OURSELVES MOVING FORWARD HERE.
- 7 BECAUSE MTC HAS MADE MOVES ALREADY IN THIS DIRECTION. SO I ASK
- 8 THAT, PLEASE, IF WE ARE GOING TO MOVE THIS IN ANY WAY SHAPE OR
- 9 FORM LET'S DO THIS IN A WAY THAT WE CAN BE POSITIVE AND REALLY
- 10 MAKE THIS A GOOD STARTING POINT. THANK YOU

- 12 JESSE ARREGUIN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. GOING NEXT TO COMMISSIONER
- WORTH.

- 15 AMY R. WORTH: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIR, AND I APPRECIATE --
- 16 ALTHOUGH I'M NOT A MEMBER OF THE COMMITTEE, I APPRECIATE BEING
- 17 ABLE TO MAKE SOME COMMENTS, HAVING SERVED ON THE BLUE RIBBON
- 18 TASK FORCE AS WELL AS SITTING ON A TRANSIT BOARD. FIRST I WANT
- 19 TO ASSOCIATE MY COMMENTS WITH COMMISSIONER SPERING IN TERMS
- 20 COMMENTS THAT HE MADE BOTH IN TERMS OF THE PROCESS AND MOVING
- 21 FORWARD. I HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IN THE TRANSPORTATION FOR A LONG
- 22 TIME AND I HAVE NEVER SEEN THE KIND OF COOPERATION AND
- 23 UNPRECEDENTED COLLABORATION BETWEEN ALL OF THE TRANSIT
- 24 AGENCIES AND COMMISSION BEFORE COVID AND THE BLUE RIBBON TASK
- 25 FORCE. I THINK IT'S INCREDIBLE TO BE CLEAR ABOUT ALL OF THE



- 1 CONNECTION THAT OUR TRAIT AGENCIES HAVE TOGETHER. WITH OUR BUS
- 2 SCHEDULES ALL AGENCIES COORDINATE CLOSELY WITH BART SCHEDULES.
- 3 THIS IS HOW WE LINKING PEOPLE TO THE REGIONAL EFFORT. AND I
- 4 RECOGNIZE THERE MAY BE OPPORTUNITIES TO ALLOCATE RESOURCES
- 5 ACROSS THE SYSTEM TO DO WHAT WE WANT GIVEN THE EXISTING FUNDS.
- 6 BUT IF WE'RE GOING TO PROVIDE THE FUND FOR DAY-TO-DAY
- 7 NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY TRANSIT TO THE NEIGHBORHOOD DEPENDENT
- 8 THAT ARE SUCH A HIGH PRIORITY FOR US AS WELL AS EXPANDING
- 9 OPPORTUNITIES FOR REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION THAT HAVE BEEN
- 10 IDENTIFIED IN SOME OF THE DISCUSSIONS WE ABSOLUTELY NEED
- 11 ADDITIONAL REVENUE. AND I DON'T THINK ANYBODY -- I WOULD BE
- 12 VERY CONCERNED ABOUT SOME OF THE FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS IN
- 13 SOME OF THESE IN TERMS OF THE FINAL OF THE BILL. IT'S THE
- 14 DEADLINES THAT ARE THE CHALLENGE. THE DATES. LOOKING AT THAT
- 15 SENTENCE, TAKE OUT ALL THE TEXT AND IT'S THE DEADLINES WE'RE
- 16 TALKING ABOUT. WITH TRANSIT, WE HAVE ARE HAVE IMPORTANT ROLE
- 17 IN THE FEDERAL CIVIL RIGHTS LEGISLATION. AND THAT IS
- 18 FOUNDATIONAL IN TERMS OF THE KIND OF SERVICE DECISIONS THAT
- 19 THE TRANSIT AGENCIES MAKE AND THAT WE IN THE REGION NEED TO
- 20 MAKE. SO THERE ARE A NUMBER OF SPECIFIC THINGS THAT CREATE
- 21 CHALLENGES FOR US TO BE ABLE TO TRY TO IMPLEMENT ON THIS
- 22 PARTICULAR TIME SCHEDULE. I ALSO SHARE THE CONCERN THAT THIS
- 23 WAS A SURPRISE, THIS BILL WAS A SURPRISE WHEN IT CAME FORWARD.
- 24 BECAUSE, AGAIN, I THINK THAT THE INTENT -- AND I KNOW ALL OF
- 25 OUR STAFF WAS ARE WORKING SO HARD TO IMPLEMENT THE KINDS OF



- 1 RECOMMENDATIONS THAT CAME OUT OF THE BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE.
- 2 AND THAT THE STAFF ARE PUTTING IN P WE'RE PUTTING IN
- 3 TREMENDOUS RESOURCES IN THIS PROCESS. I BELIEVE OUR REGION IS
- 4 WORKING CLOSELY TOGETHER TO ACHIEVE THESE GOALS BUT WE NEED TO
- 5 BE ABLE TO DO THEM IN A CONTEXT SO WE'RE ABLE TO ACHIEVE THE
- 6 GOALS AND IMPROVE AND ENHANCE THE SERVICES, AS OPPOSED TO SOME
- 7 OF THE ELEMENTS THAT MAY IN FACT -- I WOULD CONCUR WITH
- 8 STAFF'S RECOMMENDATIONS RELATIVE TO THE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR
- 9 THE AMENDMENTS, AND LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH THE SENATOR
- 10 IN ACHIEVING THE GOALS THAT WE ALL SHARE IN TERMS OF
- 11 INCREASING TRANSIT'S ACCESS, CONNECTIONS, AND MOBILITY, AND
- 12 RECOGNIZING AS WE MOVE FORWARD TO ACHIEVE OUR GREENHOUSE GAS
- 13 EMISSIONS STANDARDS AND GOALS FOR OUR PLANNED BAY AREA,
- 14 TRANSIT IS GOING TO BE THE FUTURE. SO, I WANT TO THANK STAFF
- 15 AND JUST, AGAIN, CONCUR WITH THE STAFF RECOMMENDATION.

- 19 DAVID CANEPA: I JUST WANT TO RISE IN SUPPORT OF STAFF'S
- 20 RECOMMENDATION. I THINK IT'S QUITE CONCERNING TO ME THAT THIS





- 2 STRATEGICALLY LEVERAGE OPPORTUNITIES ACROSS THE BOARD. SO
- 3 THAT'S ONE REALLY IMPORTANT POINT. THE SECOND IS THAT THE
- 4 FEDERAL DISCRETIONARY ECOSYSTEM, IF YOU WILL, IS COMPETITIVE
- 5 AND FIERCE. AND ONE OF THE THINGS THAT WE HAVE TRIES TO DO IS
- 6 ACKNOWLEDGE AND USE THE RULES OF ENGAGEMENT THAT IT'S GOING TO
- 7 TAKE TO BE SUCCESSFUL ON THE NATIONAL STAGE AND WE WANT TO BE

- 17 IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THAT THE BIL DID A HUGE LIFT ON
- 18 FORMULA FUNDING WHICH WAS DISCUSSED AT THE PROGRAMMING
- 19 COMMITTEE LAST WEDNESDAY THE REASON I RAISE THAT IS THAT THE
- 20 FORMULA FUND HUGE PLUS-UP FOR TRANSIT, SIGNIFICANT FOR
- 21 BRIDGES, SIGNIFICANT FOR IN HIGHWAYS, IS THAT THAT MONEY IS
- 22 GUARANTEED AS A FORMULA PROGRAM THAT'S SOMETHING WE HAVE. BUT,
- 23 TODAY, WHAT WE'RE LOOKING AT IS THE POTENTIAL, CAPITAL P, OF
- 24 ADDITIONAL BIL FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FROM IF THE DISCRETIONARY
- 25 COMPETITIVE PROGRAMS, WHICH WERE OUTLINED AT SOME LENGTH LAST





- 1 MONTH IN TERMS OF THE STRUCTURE SO WE WON'T REPEAT THAT FOR
- 2 YOU TODAY. BUT COMPETITION IS OBVIOUSLY NOT A GUARANTEED
- 3 OUTCOME. AND, AS I SAID, STRATEGIC CHOICES ARE GOING TO HAVE
- 4 TO BE MADE BECAUSE EVERY PROJECT DESIRING AND DESERVING OF
- 5 DOLLARS WILL NOT GET FUNDED IN THIS PROGRAM. SO TO MAKE THE
- 6 STRATEGIES MORE EFFECTIVE IS, WE NEED TO CONSIDER THE OTHER
- 7 IMPORTANT PUZZLE PIECES OF HOW WE BRING DOLLARS TO THE TABLE.

- 10 SIGNIFICANT PLUS-UP IN THAT STATE PROGRAM. THE SB1 FUNDING
- 11 PROGRAMS, ALSO AT THE STATE LEVEL, ARE COMING FORWARD. THE
- 12 POTENTIAL TRANSPORTATION DIRECTS FROM THE FY '22 STATE GENERAL
- 13 FUND SURPLUS THAT REBECCA JUST TALK ABOUT, SIGNIFICANT
- 14 OPPORTUNITY BEING NEGOTIATED RIGHT NOW. THE MEGA PROJECT
- 15 INVOLVEMENT POLICY TO FURTHER REFINE AND LEVERAGE MULTIPLE
- 16 FUNDING OPTIONS IS SOMETHING WE WANT TO GET DONE BY THE
- 17 SUMMER. IS THEN OBAG THREE, WHICH WAS JUST DISCUSSED, IS
- 18 ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY POTENTIALLY, DEPENDING ON PROJECT SCALE,
- 19 WHERE PROJECTS CAN GET FUNDED. SO THE WHOLE POINT OF THAT IS
- 20 TO SAY, THIS ISN'T A LIVE OR DIE POSITION ON THE BIL STRATEGIC
- 21 RECOMMENDATIONS WE'RE MAKING FOR PROJECTS TO FIND FUNDING. IN
- 22 TERMS OF RULES OF ENGAGEMENT THERE ARE NUMEROUS FACTOR IN
- 23 PLACE WITHIN DC WITH THE DISCRETIONARY COMPETITIVE PROGRAMS
- 24 BOTH IN THE USDOT BUILDING AND WITHIN THE HILLS IN THE HALLS
- 25 OF CONGRESS AS ELECTED OFFICIALS UNDERSTAND BRINGING EMPHASIS



- 1 AGAIN TO THE TERMS OF THE CONSIDERATIONS BRINGING TO BEAR
- 2 BRINGING FORWARD A COMPETITIVE PROGRAM. FIRST OF ALL
- 3 ELIGIBILITY IS DIFFERENT FROM COMPETITIVENESS FIRST IT WILL
- 4 GET YOU IN THE DOOR BUT WILL DETERMINE IF YOU SIT AT THE HEAD
- 5 OF THE TABLE IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THAT. USDOT
- 6 DISCRETIONARY PROGRAMS FIRST AND FOREMOST WILL REFLECT THE
- 7 ADMINISTRATION'S PRIORITIES IN THE CASE OF BIDEN
- 8 ADMINISTRATION THAT IT WOULD BE CLIMATE, EQUITY, MULTI-
- 9 MOBILITY AND THAT IN ADDITION TO WHAT THE STATUTE MAY REQUIRE
- 10 AS ELIGIBLE CRITERIA. AND THE THIRD POINT IS THE PRIORITIES
- 11 THAT THE ADMINISTRATION HAVE ALSO HAVE A DISTINCT MODAL FLAIR.
- 12 THE FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION LOOKS AT PROJECTS VERY
- 13 DIFFERENTLY THAN THE FEDERAL RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION, WHICH
- 14 LOOKS AT THEIR PROJECTS VERY DIFFERENTLY THAN THE FEDERAL
- 15 HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION AND SO ON. AND THAT'S REALLY IMPORTANT,
- 16 BECAUSE THOSE DISTINCTIONS WEAVE DOWN TO RELATIONSHIPS AND
- 17 PARTS THAT NEED TO BE PLAYED IN TERMS OF PUTTING TOGETHER
- 18 THESE PACKAGES. THE FTA AS AN EXAMPLE HAS A VERY STRONG
- 19 RELATIONSHIP AT THE REGIONAL AND LOCAL LEVEL. BUT FRA AND FHWA
- 20 LEAN HEAVILY ON THE STATES THAT THERE'S A REALLY IMPORTANT
- 21 NEED TO MAKE SURE WE KNOW THOSE IN TERMS OF WHO IS GOING TO BE
- 22 MAKING INFLUENCING POLICY CHOICES AND AT THEN OF THE DAY, THE

- 2 POTS. IN CONCLUSION, OUR CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION IS MINDFUL
- 3 OF AND NEEDS TO ADEPTLY MANEUVER THESE INTENSIVELY COMPETITIVE
- 4 ENVIRONMENT TAKING ALL THINGS INTO ACCOUNT AND FOR THEM WHAT'S
- 5 YOUR BOTTOM LINE BECOMES THE DRIVING OUESTION AND IF WE GIVE
- 6 OUR MEMBERS THEORETICALLY 15 NUMBER ONE PRIORITY FOR EVERY
- 7 SINGLE DISCRETIONARY PROGRAM IT DIFFUSES AND IMPACTS AND
- 8 WEAKENS OUR VOICE SO WE NEED TO HELP OUR DELEGATION BY

- 8 BUT ALSO FOR YOUR REFERENCE, WE HAVE, IN YOUR HANDOUTS, A MAP
- 9 OF ALL THE PROPOSED PROJECTS AND PROJECT LIST AS WELL AS THE
- 10 LAST ITEM IN YOUR HANDOUT IS DATED, SORT OF, CHEAT SHEET ON
- 11 WHICH OF THE HUNDRED BILLION DOLLARS PLUS OF FEDERAL
- 12 DISCRETIONARY GRANT RESOURCES WE'RE PROPOSING BE PART OF THIS
- 13 REGIONAL FOCUSED ADVOCACY STRATEGY AND THEN ALSO WHICH OF THE

- 21 OF RESOURCE THAT IS GUARANTEED TO COME TO THE PROGRAM, AND
- 22 THEN THE LAST COLUMN IS THE DISCUSSION WHICH ARE THE PROPOSED
- 23 PROJECT OR PROJECT CATEGORIES WE'RE RECOMMENDING AND
- 24 REQUESTING THAT THE COMMITTEE APPROVE AND, FORWARD TO THE
- 25 COMMISSION -- SORRY -- SUPPORT AND GO TO THE COMMISSION FOR



- 1 APPROVAL THIS MONTH. SO TO START WITH THE CAPITAL -- THE FIRST
- 2 PROGRAM ON HERE IS THE CAPITAL INVESTMENT GRANT PROGRAM
- 3 RELATED TO RAIL EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION. IS THIS IS WITHIN
- 4 THE, SORT OF, LARGE PROJECT CATEGORY FOR CIG. SO, YOU KNOW,
- 5 MANY OF YOU ARE ALL VERY FAMILIAR WITH THIS PROGRAM. IT'S A
- 6 HIGHLY STRUCTURED PROCESS TO SECURE GRANTS FOR THIS PROGRAM
- 7 THAT PROCESS WILL LIMIT GRANTS WITHIN THE FIVE YEARS OF THE
- 8 BIPARTISAN INFRASTRUCTURE PERIOD. WE THINK IT MAKES SENSE TO
- 9 REORIENT AND REITERATE OUR PRIORITIES HERE. SO FOR REGIONAL
- 10 PRIORITIZATION, WE'RE SUPPORTING PROJECTS WITH EXISTING FULL
- 11 FUNDING GRANT AGREEMENTS THAT'S CALTRAIN ELECTRIFICATION AND
- 12 BART CORE CAPACITY AND PART OF THIS ADVOCACY STRATEGY IS
- 13 RECOMMENDING TO SEEK SUPPLEMENTARY FUNDING FROM FUTURE YEAR
- 14 APPROPRIATIONS TO OFFSET COST INCREASES. WITH RESPECT, WE'RE

- 21 REFERENCES THIS WILL ALLOW FOR ROBUST DISCUSSION ABOUT NEW
- 22 ENTRANTS WE HAVE HEARD FROM VALLEY LINK AND MODERNIZATION
- 23 INTEREST IN THAT SPACE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THIS SLIDE COVERS
- 24 THE COVER CATEGORY OF EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION PROGRAMS.
- 25 THE FIRST ON HAD THIS LIST IS THE SMALL STARTS PROGRAM A



- 1 COMPONENT OF THE CAG, ONE WE DISCUSSED EARLIER FOR SMALLER
- 2 SCALE TRANSIT EXPANSION PROJECTS IN THIS SPACE THERE IS LESS
- 3 OF A CLEAR PIPELINE OF PROJECTS THAT ARE PRIMED TO COMPETE
- 4 WELL OVER THE NEXT FIVE YEARS SO FOR THIS AND THE OTHER BUS
- 5 MODERNIZATION PROGRAMS WE'RE RECOMMENDING A PROGRAMMATIC
- 6 APPROACH. IN THIS SPACE WE'RE THINKING IT WOULD ALLOW FOR
- 7 ENTRANTS LIKE VRT OR OTHER PRIORITY PROJECTIONS IDENTIFIED IN
- 8 COMING YEARS. NEXT RELATED TO BUS AND BUS FACILITIES
- 9 REPLACEMENTS. SO WE BELIEVE THAT THE BIPARTISAN INFRASTRUCTURE
- 10 LAW IS A HUGE OPPORTUNITY TO HELP THE BAY AREA MEET OUR
- 11 TRANSIT ELECTRIFICATION GOALS. THE REGION HAS NOT HISTORICALLY

- 22 AREA TO RECEIVE A PROPORTIONATELY LARGE SHARE OF THESE




